

Kenny McLean dies at Taber rodeo

Canada's top cowboy is dead at age 63. Kenny McLean died of a massive heart attack in Taber, Alberta, where he was competing in Senior Pro rodeo. At his death, he still held the Canadian record for the most major championships. During his career, Kenny McLean won 14 championships! He was the only cowboy inducted into the BC Sports Hall of Fame, in 1974, and was inducted into the Canadian Cowboy Hall of Fame in 1995. In 1976, he was awarded the Order of Canada.

Kenny McLean was born in May, 1939, and grew up in Okanagan Falls, B.C. His first rodeo experiences were casual, at the Allison Ranch in Chopaka. He entered his first points rodeo in 1956, and six years later held the World Saddle Bronc title. He later went into steer wrestling and calf roping and held the All Round Champion for four years. In later years, he was well-known in team roping and Senior Pro circuits. He and his wife, Paula, lived in Princeton during the 1990's, and moved to Hamilton, Montana, in 2000. Fair okays wagon races

Fall Fair members gave a positive reaction to a proposal by Ruby Bey that chuckwagon races would add to the fun at the fair. Members agreed to finance the \$100 per chuckwagon and the prize money, but Garnet Woodford pointed out it would be necessary to find sponsors for this event.

The chuckwagon idea was first presented by Bey to members of Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) on July 9. There was no objection raised by PXA members to the extensive changes required to the rodeo arena if the chuckwagon races are to be run.

Ruby Bey explained that she and her husband, John, had attended the Williams Lake Stampede, where they met with chuckwagon racers and found out the chuckwagons are not booked for Fall Fair weekend. They asked about the cost of bringing them to Princeton, and what their needs would be.

Stan Thompson said workers would be really hard-pressed to have the work done to change the rodeo arena in time for the event.

The matter was referred to the Fall Fair meeting two days later, where the issue was raised. John Bey and Stan Thompson had said they would be willing to do the work, but Bey needed more welders and help was required to move the steel rails. Young men

Police believe speed and alcohol were major factors in the crash. A traffic analyst is investigating and the driver could face several charges.

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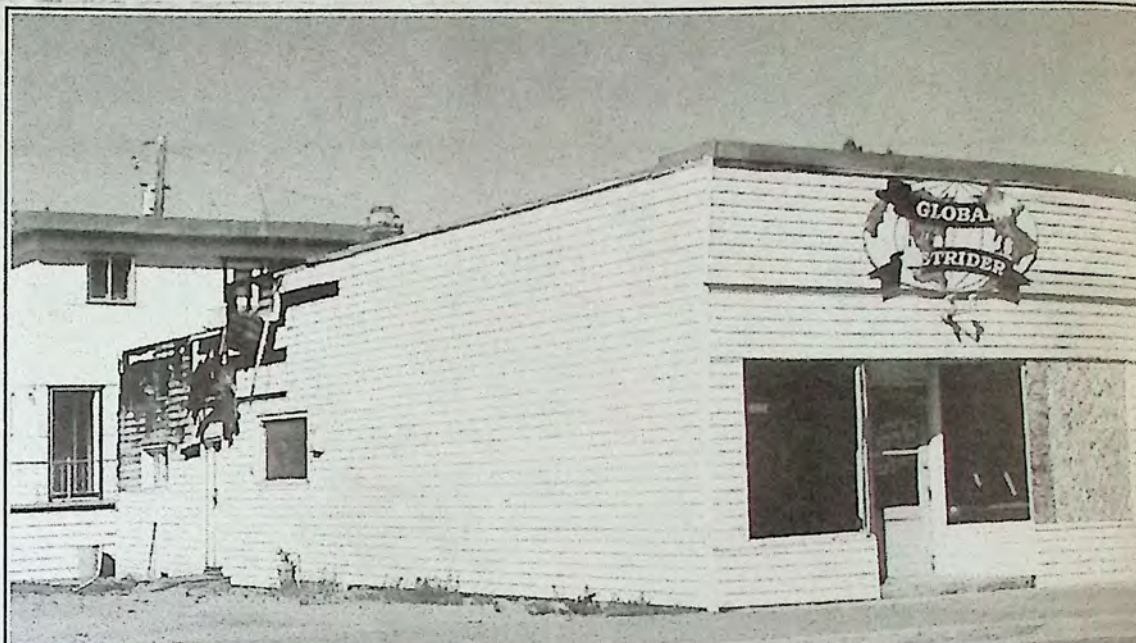
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Early morning fire is under investigation

Started as a grassroots committee meeting in local homes and restaurants, Princeton Area Business Enhancement Association (BEA) has evolved into a registered society.

The purposes of the society, as registered in its charter, are to promote and encourage business growth and development, thereby improving the quality of life in Princeton, to promote, foster and develop community spirit and good citizenship, to promote and foster public understanding of and participation in community planning, to develop and facilitate the completion of community-based projects which are in line with the association's purpose, and to receive, acquire and hold gifts, donations, legacies, and devise to be utilized for the above purposes.

BEA has divided the work of community development into nine separate and distinct categories and formed working sub-committees to address appropriate strategies.

The responsibility of the marketing committee is to develop a framework for marketing Princeton for new business development.

The recreation and tourism committee is charged with facilitating development of opportunities related to recreation tourism.

New business development is charged with monitoring, reporting and managing opportunities for projects and associations which are integral to the overall purposes.

There is a communications committee to create an awareness of the Association and its priorities, and to stimulate interest in participation in order to build membership.

One of the committees has the responsibility to liaise with Town Council and stay informed about what Council is doing in relation to business development, and to keep Council informed about the activities of the BEA.

BEA formed a community forest committee charged with monitoring the activities of the Community Forest Corporation and reporting on the opportunities for projects and involvement consistent with the overall purpose of BEA.

A training committee exists to identify skills gaps, training needs, and to work with the Skills Centre.

There is a committee responsible for monitoring and reporting on the development and marketing the industrial park, the community's greatest asset to future industrial development.

The ninth committee's responsibility is fundraising, researching and developing proposal materials to be used in garnering outside funding for specific projects.

Chairs of the committee are elected from within the committee. All of these are voluntary positions. Appointed representatives from the Town of Princeton, Regional District, Chamber of Commerce, Upper Similkameen Indian Band, along with the committee chairs, form the directorship of the BEA.

On Saturday evening, July 13, Hedley Heritage Museum Society honoured its founding members. A dinner in the heritage garden at the museum brought together founding members and current members, as well as friends of the Museum Society.

Chuck Schmidt, Museum Society President, who operated Wild Goat Gift Shop for a few years, was Master of Ceremonies. In his welcome before the dinner, Schmidt commended the founders for their vision and idea of creating a museum.

Later, Helen Moore and Lorraine Lance talked about the government grant that helped them put the museum in place, saying the government had been generous.

"We are the envy of many small towns," Schmidt said. "Hedley is known everywhere and visitors

come from the four corners of the earth to visit our museum."

Last year, there were 10,000 visitors to the museum!

Schmidt went on to say visitors are amazed by the artifacts and the pictorial record of Hedley's golden past.

Most of the photographic record is the work of Vince Flynn, who meticulously photographed old photos and often enlarged and enhanced them.

Schmidt went on to say how the Mascot Mine buildings perched on the cliffs above Hedley, and the stories of the history of Nickel Plate, never cease to amaze visitors. He outlined the many contributions past and present members of the Museum Society had made to Hedley, from building a major tourist attraction to hosting the Hedley Centennial celebration in 1998. More recently, the society has put a new roof on St. John's Anglican Church and plans a project related to Grace Church. The society has purchased property across from the museum for future enhancement and development.

Chuck Schmidt thanked the people who organized the dinner - Ann Jensen, Linda Craggs, Sharon Minshull and Stefania Eymundson, with special thanks to Linda and Sharon for the food. Appreciation was expressed for local businesses which helped with the preparation.

The final formal portion of the dinner came when Chuck Schmidt presented each of the founding members with a memento of the occasion, a limited edition print showing the old Hedley Stamp Mill. The prints were made from a painting by Hedley artist Linda Anderson. The recipients were thrilled with the gifts.

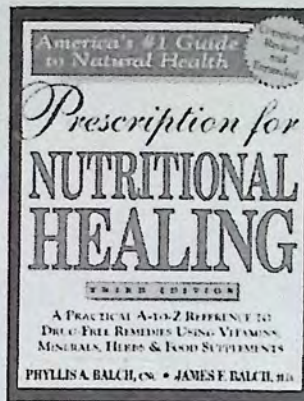
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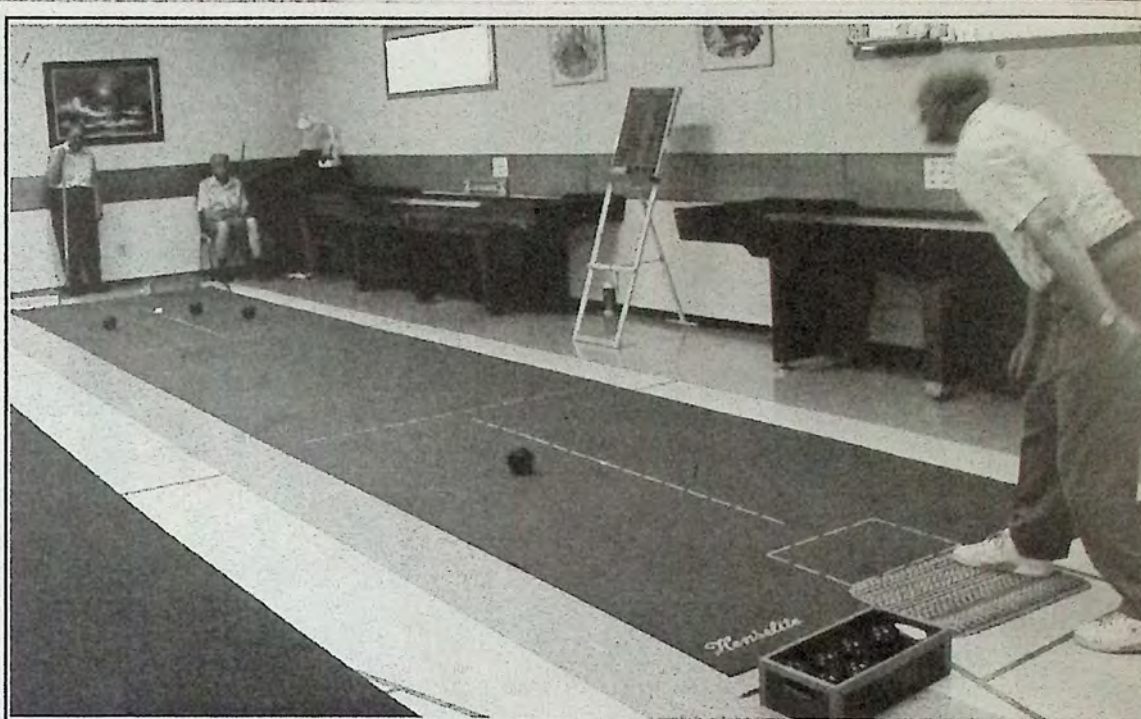

Keremeos, which was located on the road to Ollala. The yard contains antique farm machinery, and is well worth a look.

"It's great! I get to talk to people from so many different places," she says.

The museum opened on June 24, and she has welcomed 86 visitors in three weeks. The guest book tells the story of visitors from B.C., Alberta, Ontario, Nova

Scotia, Quebec, England, and Texas, as well as a lot of people from Keremeos, Cawston and Ollala. Leanne says she is really pleased with the number of local residents who are exploring the South Similkameen past.

The museum will be open Monday through Saturday until the end of the month, when the Katimavik volunteers move to their next rotation. After August 1, the museum will be open weekdays. Hours of operation are from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

who are members of the Fall Fair Association have volunteered welding skills and muscle to help do the job.

The next hurdle is negotiating with the chuckwagon racing group. Bey has spoken with a representative, and presented the Fall Fair request to have them put on races in Princeton. 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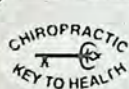
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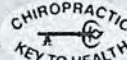
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Seat belts save money and lives

Three months ago, ICBC launched the *Clicking In* campaign to push residents of the Southern Interior to wear seat belts. According to ICBC, their initiative is already yielding results. The number of drivers now wearing seat belts is up seven percent, reaching 85 percent of the travelling public.

The Southern Interior had the worst record for not wearing a seat belt - 78 percent belted up. New seat belt surveys were conducted on 92,285 vehicles in 45 communities.

Young men most likely to die

Despite the seat belt campaign,

male drivers under age 25 were still the least likely to wear a seat belt, making them the most likely to die in a crash.

Millions saved in claims

ICBC research shows an estimated \$304,000 in annual claims cost is saved by each one percent increase in the number of people wearing seat belts. This means an estimated \$2 million plus will be saved by the Southern Interior's seven percent increase in seat belt use.

The campaign began in the Kootenays in recent years, and the

result is a dramatic drop in the number of fatalities.

Of the 246 people who died in crashes in the Southern Interior in 2000 and 2001, about half were not wearing a seat belt.

Seat belt survey results - Keremeos:

In Keremeos, in 87 per cent of the vehicles checked in April 2002, the driver and passengers were wearing seat belts as compared with 62 percent in November 2001.

Princeton:

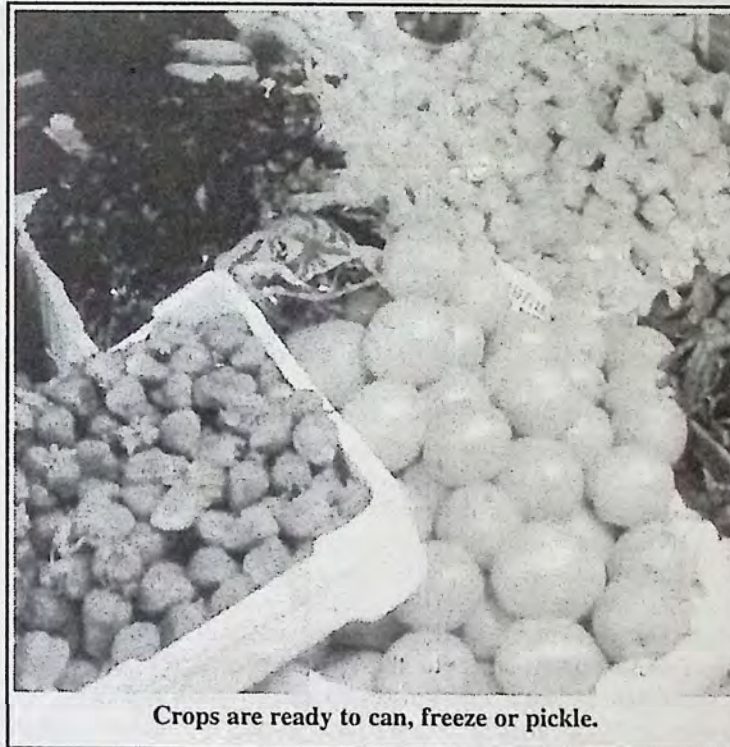
Princeton area vehicles checked in November 2001 showed a rate of 60.1 percent wearing seat belts. In April 2002, 75 percent were wearing seat belts.

Worst case locations:

In the entire Southern Interior region, Enderby had the worst record for seat belt use as of November 2001, when only 8.1 percent wore seat belts. By April, the rate had increased to 88 percent, giving them the highest rate of increase. Nest to Enderby, Lumby was the worst in November, with 51 percent seat belt usage. This climbed to 58 percent in April, making it the community with the lowest rate of seat belt usage in the region.

Best seat belt usage:

Kelowna went from a 66 percent seat belt usage rate in November 2001 to a 91 percent rate, but Penticton scored highest overall, going from 82 percent to 92 percent.

Set jars aside for Fall Fair

Canning and preserving nature's bounty is a task for summertime, but you should remember to set aside a couple of jars of canning, or jam, for entry into the Fall Fair this year.

Did you know you can eat better and save money by doing your own canning and preserving? When you have canned cherries, peaches, apricots, pears and plums, you always have a dessert ready to serve, at half the cost of buying from a store, because we live in a prime orchard area. When you make your own jellies and jams, you save money and you have a good supply tucked away in your cupboard.

One of the great things about the Similkameen Valley is its free crop of berries. Each year, there are saskatoons, hawthorn, Oregon grape, huckleberries and elderberries free for the picking. You can can them, freeze them, or make them into jelly or jam.

There are a lot of vegetables you can put up in jars or freeze for the winter, and if you grow your own, the cost is negligible.

The Fall Fair is mentioned because one of the purposes of agricultural fairs is to encourage self-sufficiency in food production. Agricultural fairs are about what we can produce for ourselves. If you have never done any preserving, go to your library and borrow a book on it.

Living past 100

Vitamins are not a waste of your money

Some recent news releases give the impression there is no point in spending your money on vitamin and mineral supplements. This is far from the truth.

While this column urges you to make the most of the food you eat in order to maintain maximum benefit from a wide variety of food sources, there is no doubt there are people who need vitamin and mineral supplements. North Americans, due to their diet of refined and processed foods, are often deficient in vitamins and minerals. They need to take supplements. Some people, due to illness or aging, are not able to break down food well enough to derive all the benefits from it. These people need supplements. People living in certain areas may have mineral or chemical deficiencies. For example, deficiencies in iodine (leading to thyroid disease) and selenium are common in many places in Canada. Supplements supply these important trace elements. All Canadians should be taking Vitamin D in winter, due to the lack of sunlight. Our bodies do not produce Vitamin D, an essential vitamin for bones and teeth, unless we have sufficient levels of exposure to the sun. In our long winters with short periods of sunlight, most Canadians need to add Vitamin D to their daily diet.

There is no question that fruit, vegetables, dairy products and meats give a lot more than we can derive from supplements. There are enzymes in food that cannot be easily transferred through supplements. However, when a deficiency occurs in a vitamin or mineral, the body is already in stress, and eating a whole lot more of some food will not replace what is missing, especially if the person is ill.

Many physical conditions, and illnesses, prevent people from being able to eat the wide range of foods required to prevent deficiencies. For these people, life depends on vitamin and mineral supplements.

Fall Fair participants raised \$180 in sponsorships for the race and felt, as the bed cost nothing and the Nordquists donated their efforts and time, all of the money should go to the Foundation.

Former resident goes to jail

Edward George Knippelberg, a former Princeton resident and recently of Merritt, was sentenced in Penticton Provincial Court on July 10. Knippelberg had made several appearances in court in Princeton during the past year. He pled guilty in October, 2001, to five charges related to sexual assault and indecent assault of minors over a period of 20 years. His case was heard in Princeton as charges arose from incidents which occurred in Princeton.

During the sentencing hearing in Penticton, Counsel for the defence asked for a sentence of two years plus a day, with house arrest for one year and three years probation, plus community work service. During this period of time, Knippelberg was to undergo intensive rehabilitative counselling.

Judge G. Sinclair stated 64 year old Knippelberg would have expert counselling in the correc-

tion system and sentenced Knippelberg to two years on each of two counts of sexual assault, to be served concurrently. He was sentenced to one year in prison on each of two additional counts of indecent assault, to be served concurrently, and an additional six months in prison for another sexual assault charge, for a total of four and one-half years in prison.

In handing down the sentence, Judge Sinclair described Knippelberg's crimes as "offensive and repugnant", and said the sentence must reflect society's denouncement of the offences, and added there is a need to separate Knippelberg from society to deter him from continuing to offend.

Although Knippelberg had no prior criminal record, he was ordered to give a DNA sample and is prohibited from possessing firearms for the remainder of his lifetime.

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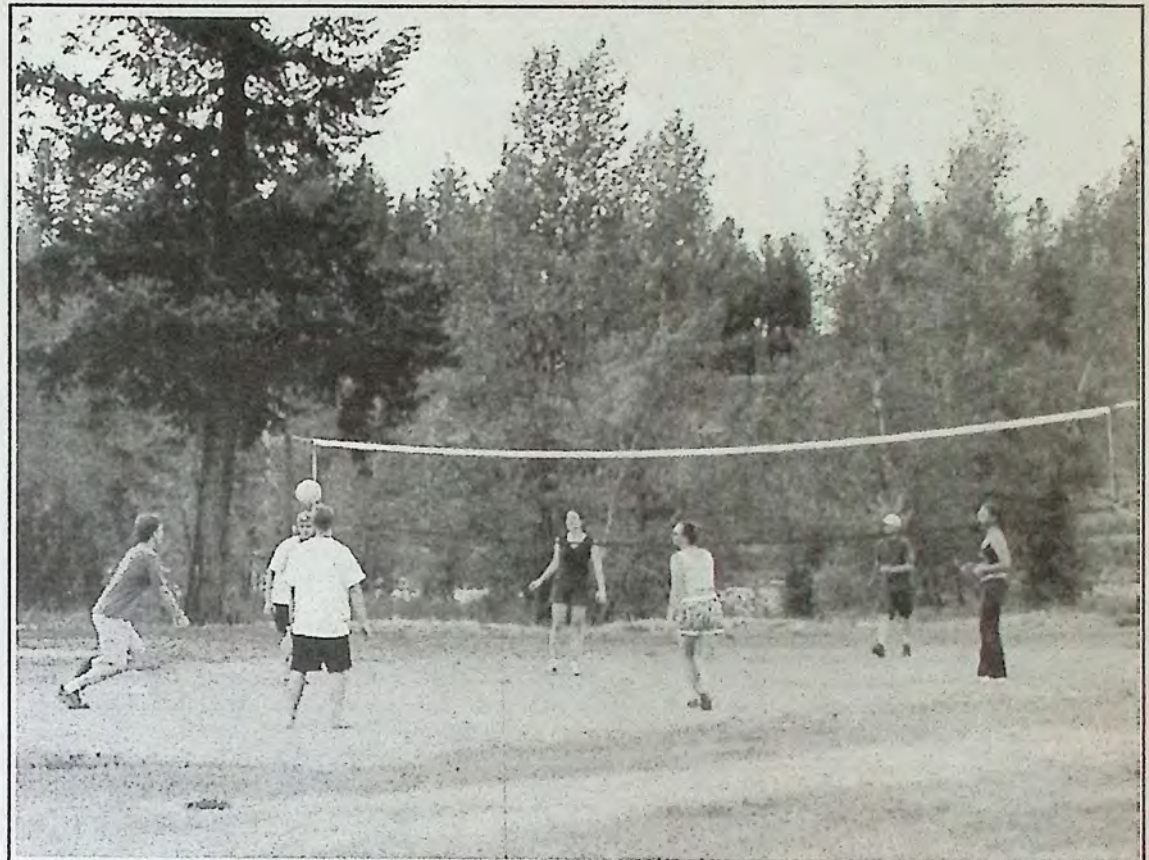

Learning equals summer fun

Learning does not take a vacation. Summertime and school holidays are not supposed to be a time to let children's minds go blank.

Statistics Canada did a survey on Canadian Social Trends and found that, on average, Canadian parents spend only four to nine minutes teaching their children, and only four to five minutes reading to or talking with them. These results are particularly alarming when these same parents reported spending between 277 to 317 minutes of leisure time each day!

These results should serve as a wake-up call to parents and encourage them to spend more 'quality time' with their children and take a more active role in their child's learning.

What better time to start than now – during the summer months when things traditionally slow down.

What can you do with your children to keep their minds active?

At home:

* Cook and bake with your children and use the experience to teach them about doing first things first, measuring and fractions.

* Recruit your children to help with gardening and point out stages in a plant's life cycle, types of plants, and the impact of soil, water, insects, disease and temperature.

* Read picture books with young children, enroll them in a summer reading program at your local library, and encourage older children to read newspapers.

* Have some workbooks or educational games for times when they seem bored.

* Write e-mail letters to relatives, and teach your child to use Internet.

In the community:

* Enroll your child in local summer recreation programs in which they can learn new skills or reinforce previous learning.

* Take your children grocery

shopping and use it as well-spent time to teach them about money, math, nutrition and even organizational skills. Coupon-clipping and comparison shopping are particularly good for fine-tuning math skills.

* Visit museums, art galleries, theme parks, zoos, sea aquariums, waterfronts, cultural centres, historic sites and ethnic festivals to create learning experiences for the whole family.

On trips:

* Listen to "talking books" from a cassette tape or CD during long car rides. This will broaden your child's vocabulary, reinforce grammatical skills and expand his or her knowledge.

* When driving, teach your children directions (north, south, east, west), names of towns, capitals, provinces, and states. Engage in word and memory games to reinforce learning.

* Plan camping excursions to national and provincial parks and sign up for nature hikes, canoeing trips, walking tours and sur-

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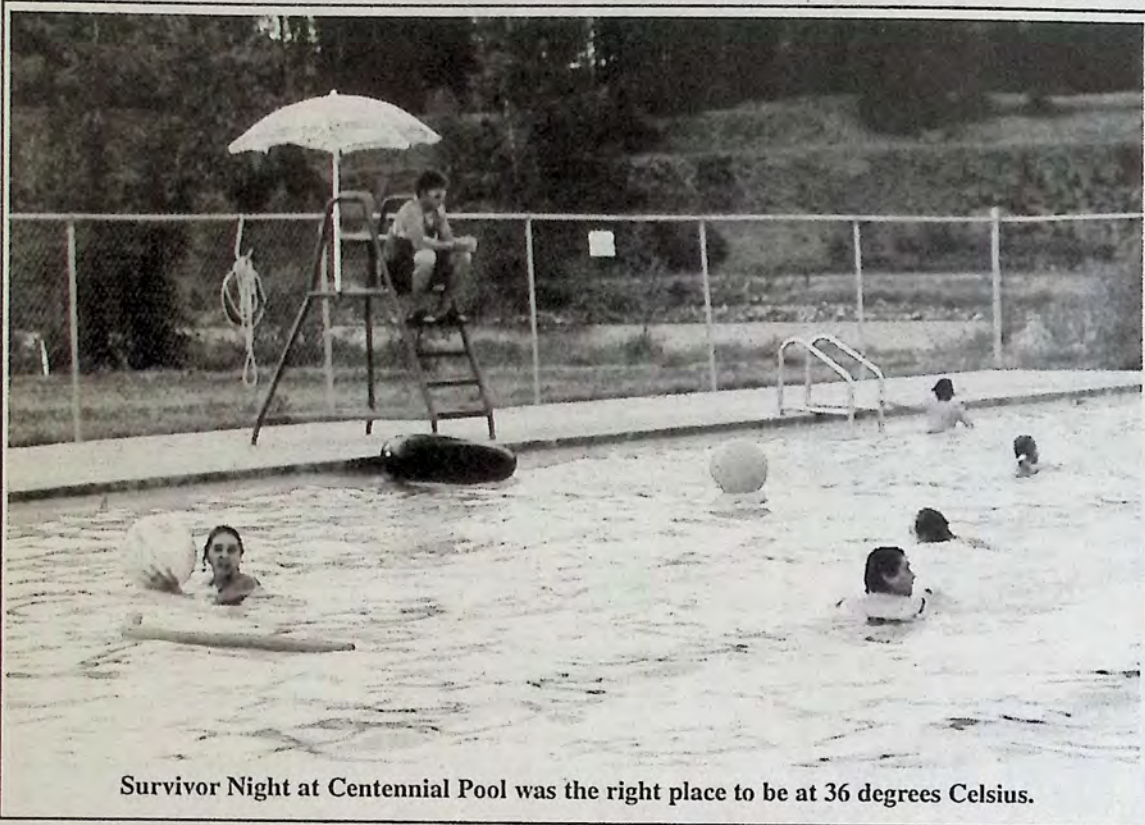

What democracy? local citizen asks

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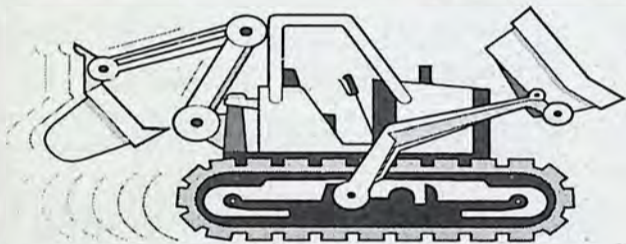
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Was your tax cut worth it?

When the Liberals took power in B.C., the first order of business was a massive tax cut. Promising to revitalize the economy by putting more money in consumers' pockets, the government slashed corporate and personal income taxes by over \$2 billion. With the promise they would pay for themselves, making spending cuts unnecessary, the tax cuts sounded like a good deal.

Just over a year later, the tune has changed. Faced with a large hole in revenues caused by the tax cuts, the Liberals have been busy searching for ways to cut spending and increase revenues. This combination of tax and spending cuts has set in motion a dynamic of "cost sifting", the transfer of costs off the government's books and onto individuals, families, and in some cases, employers. Fees are going up, and access to services is going down.

Most British Columbians didn't get

a very big tax cut to begin with: about half receive an income tax cut of \$425 or less, and about three-quarters receive savings of \$869 or less. Because women, on average, earn less than men, women's tax cuts are smaller: almost six in 10 women receive a tax cut of \$425 or less, and three-quarters would receive less than \$634.

For most people, it doesn't take much to erode the value of the income tax cut. A course of physiotherapy, a child entering college, or a baby in daycare, can mean the difference between breaking even and falling deeply into the red. For some people, the MSP increase alone wiped out their tax cut savings.

Last week, the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives released a study that profiles in detail the financial bottom line of different individuals and families with a variety of income and cost profiles. It finds the gains of most British Columbians are either small or have already been wiped out.

But we've only just started paying for the tax cuts. We can expect more spending cuts over the next couple

of years as the government strives to re-balance the provincial budget. And we can expect other tax increases, such as property tax hikes, as municipalities struggle to deal with downloaded services and costs. These calculations don't take into account the many other cost shifts, like cuts to legal aid funding, increases in user fees for camping and hospital services.....

Of course, there's much more to the story than these kinds of narrow financial calculations. Overall, income tax cuts make our taxation system less progressive (by giving upper income earners a larger benefit) and the cost shifts magnify this trend by piling disproportionate burdens on the shoulders of the poor and sick. Taken as a whole, the new tax and spending regime makes B.C. a much more unequal place.

Many British Columbians, even those who still hold on to modest tax cuts, need to ask: were the tax cuts worth the price?

Election Act changes

Amendments to the B.C. Elections Act and the Recall and Initiative Act:

a) services provided by campaign workers during an election campaign be considered a political contribution if the workers are paid by another employer. This change means the fair market value of donated labour must be included in a party's statement of election revenues and expenses. The amendment does not apply to unpaid volunteers or donations of professional services made by self-employed people.

b) prevents charitable organizations from making donations to political parties. This prevents charities from using donated or grant money for political purposes.

c) This amendment applies only to charitable agencies (defined by federal law as doing work that is charitable in nature and beneficial to the community), not to non-profit organizations such as labour unions.

c) removes the financial limit of \$5,000 on third-party advertising during election campaigns and deletes the requirement to publish detailed information about political opinion surveys. This information includes sample size, margin of error and who commissioned the survey. The amended law stifled freedom of expression and has been declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court of British Columbia.

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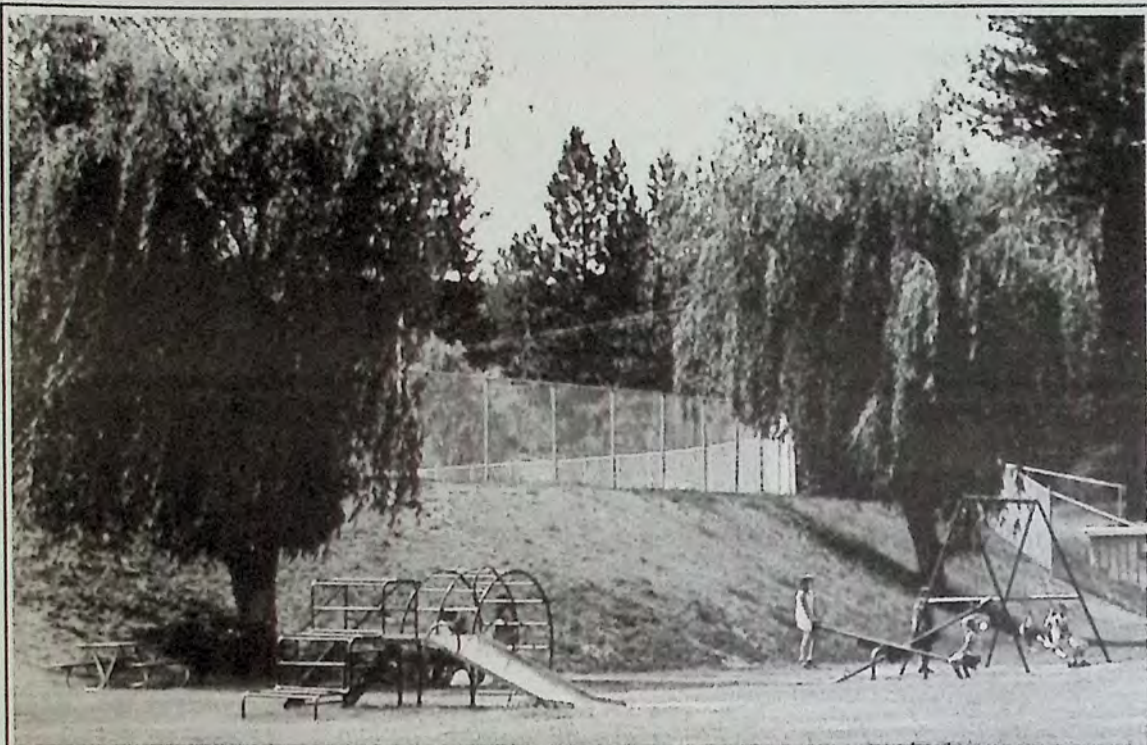

Fall Fair members prepare for tough trucks and demolition derby

According to the number of tickets, 576 people attended. Babiak said the Princeton crowd was having a lot of fun, and the performers at the Ken McCoy concert told him it was a pleasure to perform for Princeton people as the response from the audience was so good.

Round table plans Trout Creek fish project

On July 17, stakeholders in the future of Trout Creek will meet in Summerland. The Trout Creek round table is a multi-stakeholder community group involving all those with an interest in Trout Creek.

Following on recommendations set forth in their recently published report "Trout Creek Watershed – Gap Analysis and Action Plan", partners in the round table are preparing for in-stream works which will provide an additional 4.2 km. of moderate to high quality spawning habitat for kokanee.

The plan, which has been reviewed by provincial and federal authorities, involves the alter-

ation of three natural kokanee barriers. This would allow kokanee access beyond a dyked (channeled) and heavily silted section of Trout Creek where kokanee now have difficulty spawning. Currently, investigation into the possibility of revegetation of the dykes is underway. Initial funding for the barrier removal project has been made possible by a generous donation from the Summerland Sportsman Association. Remaining funds will be sought from other funding sources such as the Wildlife Conservation Fund.

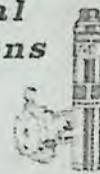

El Nino: a forecast for fall and winter 2002-03

The famous El Nino is officially on this side of the Pacific Ocean now, and moving north. It is not expected to affect the Pacific northwest area until autumn. When it arrives, it always has an impact on weather.

In its two previous manifestations, in 1990 and 1995, the El nino brought us a nice September and a pleasant half of October, followed by a lot of rain and early snow.

In 1990, the early snow was washed away in a warm rain on November 10, created some flooding along Tulameen and Similkameen Rivers. The Remembrance Day ceremonies were held in the warmest weather in years. The El Nino continued to dump snow on Princeton well into January, then capped it with

freezing rain in mid-January.

In 1995, November snows were washed away with a three-day rainstorm, and Tulameen River reached its highest levels on record. More than 200 people were homeless due to flooding in Princeton, Coalmont and Tulameen. The Woodford home in Coalmont was so badly damaged it had to be replaced.

The flood was followed by three days of lovely weather, then December froze everything, and a winter of heavy snows set in just after Christmas. Between Christmas and New Year's, Princeton received more than a metre of snow and some roofs caved in, and canopies fell off the front of a few buildings.

El Nino seems to give us this pattern of weather on a fairly regular basis. Consequently, early warnings of its arrival, and comparisons with past weather experiences, are issued well in advance.

Coastal communities suffer a high incidence in violent storm activity, primarily with rain and freezing rain. In the previous two El Nino winters mentioned above, heavy rain-fall caused flash flooding in both British Columbia's Lower Mainland, and in Seattle area. Freezing rain wiped out power in Seattle for two days. Oregon and California suffered much the same kind of flooding, but not the freezing rain. Watch for further El Nino news.

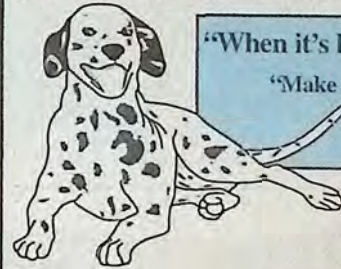
