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Goldcliff resumes search for gold near old mine

The 2002 Panorama Ridge exploration in the area near Nickel Plate, above Hedley, is in progress for the third year. The field work in progress on the Panorama and Epic gold targets consists of detailed grid soil geochemical and geophysical surveying, trenching and geological mapping.

The Panorama target was discovered in 2000 along new logging roads. It includes the York, Spar and Nordic prospects that occur in the Hedley Formation siltstone and limestone. The prospects contain gold skarn mineralization and alteration similar to the Nickel Plate mine.

The prospects contain all the important pathfinder elements associated with gold skarn mineralization at Nickel Plate: arsenic, bismuth, cobalt, nickel and antimony. The target area contains a strong gold soil geochemical anomaly.

Drilling is planned for later in the field season as a follow-up to the detail work required to establish drill targets. Drilling companies have been contacted for tenders. The analytical work is being conducted by Eco-Tech Laboratories Ltd. in Kamloops. A field office and warehouse have been established in Keremeos.

Goldcliff has sufficient funds to carry the pre-drilling exploration work.

Current working capital is approximately \$225,000 in cash for exploration and corporate purposes. Additional financing will be required to conduct the drilling program.

Bogus money alert

Princeton RCMP were alerted last week by Valley First Credit Union that a counterfeit \$10 bill had been turned in by a local business. RCMP want all business people in the area to look out for counterfeit money.

Counterfeit bills are most easily recognized by the lack of the shiny surface located near the center of all new bills. This shiny area is usually in maple leaf form. Lack of water spots, which are little blue dots found at random on the surface of all legitimate paper money is a good indicator the bill is fake.

It is not known if the \$10 bill was produced locally or originated from another area and found its way to Princeton at random.

BC Gas sets back pipeline project

The BC Gas pipeline project slated to begin construction in the Similkameen Valley in 2004 has been set back to 2006. Philippe Batini, a member of the Environmental Assessment Committee for that project, made the announcement at the July 30 meeting of Princeton Area Business Enhancement Association (BEA).

The announcement was part of a summary Batini presented regarding development specifications for the pipeline construction. One of the items in the BC

Gas proposal was to establish a construction camp. In the specifications, BC Gas would have to find out the availability of housing in the Princeton area before constructing a camp.

The proposal Upper Similkameen Indian Band plans to make to the government regarding protection of the ochre bluffs and pictographs will be a long time in preparation, Batini said, indicating with his hands a tall stack of paper to be pulled together. This proposal, if accepted would be the first of its kind in Canada, as

it involves numerous different locations. Batini stressed it will not affect property owners. The application for heritage protection will likely not go to government before 2003.

The BEA approved a meeting on August 13 to accept membership dues and elect a Chair, Vice-Chair and Secretary-Treasurer. The meeting will be at the Skills Centre at 6:30 p.m. This meeting will elect an interim board only. In 90 to 120 days after the inaugural meeting, an AGM will be called to elect the board.

Many Vancouver groups are coming through every week, very enthusiastic about the fossil and mineral display.

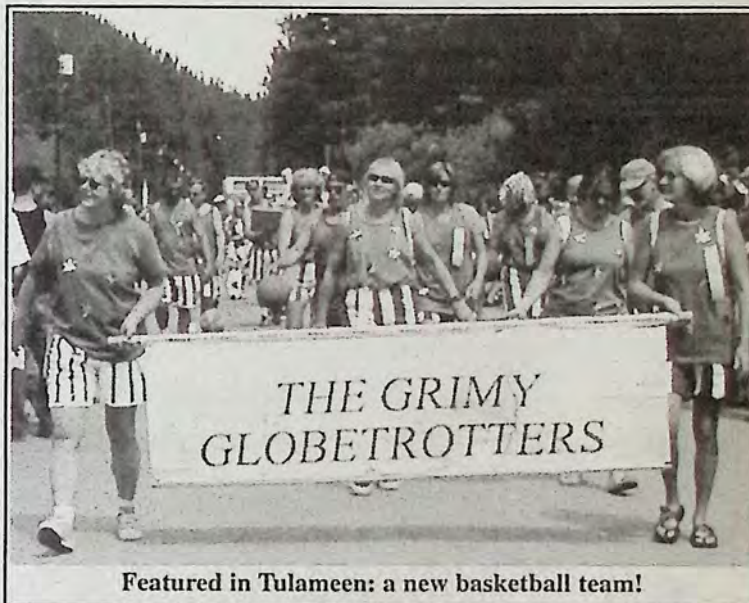
Many local people visited the museum and archives for the first time and have been surprised and pleased with local history displays and the work and effort that has gone into the museum.

Should spousal assault law change?

A discussion paper has been released containing proposed revisions to the Crown policy on spousal assault. According to Attorney General Geoff Plant, the revisions are aimed at improving protection for victims as well as gaining treatment for offenders.

Current policy stresses cases of spousal abuse should proceed to court regardless of the wishes of the victims. A concern has been expressed about the difficulty of prosecuting cases in which the victim is reluctant or hostile about giving testimony, which has resulted in spousal assault cases being dropped before going to trial, leaving victims at risk of further abuse.

Revisions suggest the case be pursued only when available evidence continues to support a substantial likelihood of conviction and that prosecution continues to be in the public interest.

If the evidence does not support a substantial likelihood of conviction, but does establish the victim has reasonable grounds to fear the accused, Crown counsel may consider approving an application for a peace bond with terms addressing the safety issues in the case.

If Crown counsel believes, on the basis of a report prepared by a probation officer, that there is low risk of future violence, Crown counsel may consider the use of alternative measures provisions in the Criminal Code. This means the accused could admit to the crime by consenting to participate in a program with conditions addressing the circumstances of the offence, the accused and the victim.

Crown counsel will have greater

ability to use prosecutorial discretion as to whether a particular case should proceed to court or whether there are other ways of addressing the issue more effectively.

Boat operators need PCO card soon

Local boaters have until September 15 to obtain their Pleasure Craft Operator Card. Training to pass the exam is available at Princeton's public swimming pool (see advertisement). Any person operating a boat of four metres or less is required to have the PCO Card by September 15, and anyone born after April 1, 1983, is required to have it now when operating any pleasure craft on any waterway.

For years, concerned Canadians pushed for mandatory boater edu-

cation to save the 200 lives lost and reduce the 6,000 non-fatal boating incidents on Canadian waterways annually. Previously, any person of any age could operate any type of boat with no training or education of any kind.

Three years ago, the law changed. However, many boaters have not obtained their PCO Card to date. Princeton swimming pool staff have the manuals available and offer training. The cost is \$26, and includes the cost of the exam.

This is an international infection, and although it is a short-lived illness, lasting 48 hours in healthy adults, it can be serious for the elderly and very young, as it causes dehydration.

The Health Authority is asking for help from everyone in every community: unwell people must not go to care facilities or hospitals to visit.

Anyone experiencing gastroenteritis symptoms (nausea, vomiting, cramps, diarrhea) must not visit people in hospital or long term care facilities until 48 hours after symptoms disappear.

Control the spread – WASH YOUR HANDS!

Washing your hands carefully (for at least 20 seconds) with soap and warm water after going to the bathroom, before preparing and eating meals, and before providing care for others.

THE BASICS ON INTEREST

We may not always realize it, but interest rates play an important role in our every day lives. Whether you are in the market for a car, a home, or a personal loan at the bank, interest rates can greatly affect your buying power. As an investor, you should keep a close eye on the overall trend of interest rates because these trends can have a major effect on your investments. Major shifts in direction, be they up or down, should cause you to review present investments as well as point towards potential opportunities.

Staying informed of general interest rate trends doesn't require much time. In fact, it just takes a few minutes a week. Key rates that are important to the investor are published daily in such papers as The Globe and Mail, The Financial Post, and probably the financial pages of your local newspaper. Regular review of these key indicators may often give you mixed signals.

Once a consistent trend emerges however, the following guidelines can help you assess the impact on your investments and also help direct future investment decisions. The first thing to remember when assessing the impact of interest rates upon your investments is that there is an inverse relationship between interest rates and bond prices. As interest rates go up, bond prices go down because the bond's price has dropped below its face value because prevailing interest rates for that particular maturity are above its stated value.

If interest rates are going down and you have long-term bonds that were purchased when rates were higher, you may want to consider holding those bonds in hope of future gain. On the other hand, you may decide to sell the bond in order to reduce exposure if rates begin to climb again. Stocks also react to interest rate changes.

In general, if the yields on virtually risk-free short term Treasuries are attractive, investors may become reluctant to put their money into stocks, where the short-term risks could be higher. Certain stocks such as bank and utilities are particularly sensitive to interest rate changes. Banks in particular, make much of their profit on the difference between what it costs them to borrow money and the rate at which they lend it (also called the spread).

As interest rates begin to fall, the banks will lower their lending rate at a slower pace than the rate at which they borrow. This contributes to an increase in the spread and ultimately profitability, as their stocks and earnings increase.

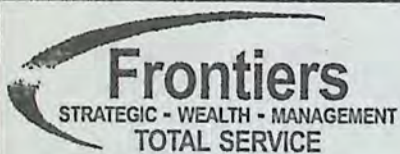

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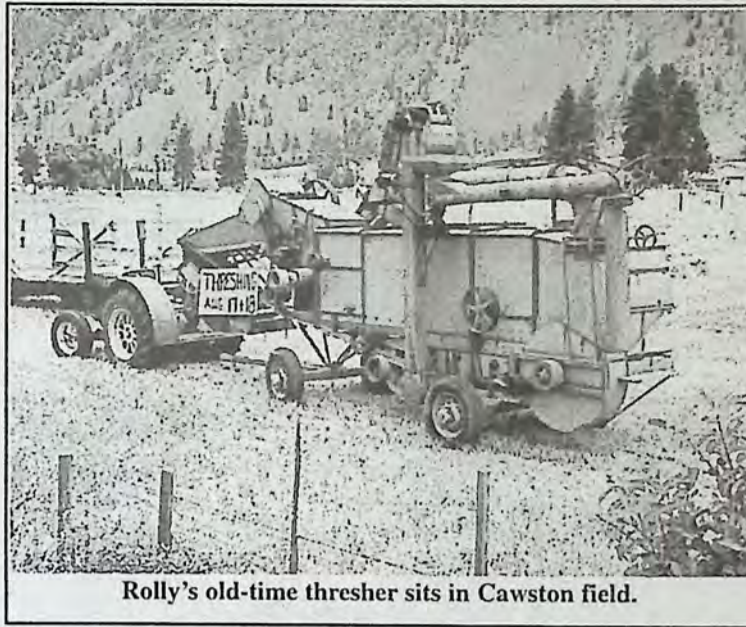
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Rolly's old-time thresher sits in Cawston field.

Grist Mill hosts night of stars

The Community Astronomy Program is a travelling classroom featuring a variety of telescopes, including the largest portable telescope in Canada. This telescope has a diameter of 61 centimetres and stands four metres high. The program includes a slide presentation on astronomy, space, or the night sky, followed by an actual hands-on observing session.

BC Hydro's contribution is through the Power Smart initiative. Lucy Komori, Director of Development and Marketing for

the H.R. MacMillan Space Centre, says the program illustrates the effects of light pollution and reinforces the Power Smart message of using energy and lighting wisely.

Power Smart is a cost-effective initiative assisting customers in conserving electricity, thereby saving them money and reducing further impact on the environment. 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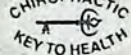
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Allergies can affect children's behaviour

Even the best of children can behave badly at times, but children with severe allergies may be especially at risk of emotional and behavioural problems. These can include anxiety, depression, and hyperactivity.

There are three main reasons for the emotional and behavioural problems you child may be experiencing. They are as follows: the fact they are coping with a chronic illness, the role their allergy symptoms play and potential side effects of medication.

Coping with a chronic illness

Living with a chronic illness can be challenging for children. Your child may feel different from peers and awkward or embarrassed when experiencing symptoms in public. Having a long-term health problem can also make your child feel insecure.

The role of allergy symptoms

Asthma and allergy symptoms are not only uncomfortable, they may make your child feel anxious and fearful. These feelings may then affect relationships with others. When children feel sick, they are more likely to be short-tempered. Sleepless nights from symptoms can cause fatigue and short attention spans.

Side effects of medications

Medications can be an important part of treating asthma and allergies. Be aware, however, that medications may affect how your child feels and behaves. For example, some first generation antihistamines can cause drowsiness and limit your child's alertness and concentration at school and at home.

What you can do

If you think your child has emotional or behavioural symptoms related to allergies, you may want to discuss this with your family doctor. Here are some other steps you can take.

- * Educate your child about allergies to help relieve his or her anxieties and fears.

- * Choose the allergy medications with the fewest side effects and best results for your child. For example, newer, learning-friendly antihistamines like Claritin Syrup for children, can relieve allergy symptoms

Babies can have allergies

It is possible for infants to be born with allergies, but most allergy symptoms will develop over time. The most common allergy early in life is food allergy. Young children can often suffer from eczema or asthma as well. Many children will develop allergy symptoms in predictable order. This is referred to as the "allergic march". These children will typically have eczema and food allergy, then develop asthma and allergic nasal symptoms. Although allergy symptoms are often felt to start in early childhood, the problems often start in the early teens.



A child's allergy may not be obvious but can affect behaviour.

- * inform your child's teachers about your child's allergies so he or she will get the right care at school.

- * Reduce indoor allergy triggers by keeping your home dust-free and smoke-free.

- * Work toward helping your child understand and cope with allergies.

Detecting allergy behaviours

Here are some common allergy symptoms parents should look for:

- * a runny or stuffy nose and fre-

- quent sneezing (the child seems to have a constant cold)

- * breathing through the mouth or snoring, caused by a stuffy nose

- * itchy eyes, nose or skin

- * watery eyes or dark circles under the eyes

- * headaches, earaches, or hearing problems

- * irritable or hyperactive behaviour

- * hives, rashes, scratching, complaining of itching, red patches on skin

- * very serious allergy reactions include coughing, choking, gasping for breath, rapid heartbeat and vomiting - such symptoms require immediate medical attention as they can be life-threatening.

Living past 100

Go for a good night's sleep to heal

A lifetime of having a good night's sleep means a healthy lifetime, and if you are going to live to be more than 100 years old, you want a healthy life. Many people find it is difficult to fall asleep and stay asleep. On these hot summer nights, almost everyone finds sleep may be hard to find, but look at your sleep patterns over the year. Do you fall asleep easily? Do you stay asleep? Do you awake feeling refreshed and eager to start the day?

A major culprit in sleeplessness is caffeine. Coffee is the usual source, but cola soft drinks, tea and chocolate contain caffeine, too. If you are adversely affected by the caffeine in coffee, you will have the same reaction to the other caffeine sources. To clear caffeine from your body, you have to be free of caffeine products for eight hours or more! For a good night's sleep, make your hot drink a herbal tea - camomile is a soother.

Alcohol is notorious for robbing people of a good night's sleep. Although alcohol may make you feel drowsy, when you do sleep, you will not have the truly restful sleep you need.

Magnesium is a mineral essential for a good night's sleep. Good sources of magnesium are pinto beans and navy beans (these are pork and beans type of beans), as well as spinach and Swiss chard. Pumpkin seeds, wheat germ and almonds provide magnesium, too.

Dairy products, turkey and chicken contain high levels of a sleep aid called tryptophan. A glass of milk an hour before bedtime encourages a good night's sleep. If you want proof, think of how drowsy you feel after you stuff yourself with turkey at Christmas dinner!

B vitamins, especially niacin, will help your body fall into a restful sleep. Tuna and lean meats are a good source of these vitamins. Iron helps you sleep, too, and is found in clam chowder, nuts and whole grain products. Finally, a good day of exercise will help you sleep well.

stuffed with small treasures. We used a baseball bat on the target suspended in the air, then when the target opened, the treasures came out and were distributed to everyone present.

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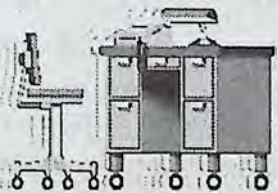

Attorney General sends letter to treaty negotiators

The following is a letter sent by Attorney General Geoff Plant to Philip Steenkamp, Deputy Minister, Treaty Negotiations Office. This letter has been made public.

Re: Instructions to Negotiators

This letter contains government's instructions to provincial negotiators following the referendum on principles for treaty negotiations.

The government of British Columbia is committed to negotiating treaties and will dedicate resources to reach agreements with First Nations within the coming year. It is important that provincial negotiators demonstrate flexibility and creativity in developing agreements that can be supported by all negotiating parties.

In June 2001 provincial negotiators were issued instructions that removed some issues from the table pending the outcome of the referendum. On July 3, 2002, the voting public provided government with an overwhelming endorsement of the referendum principles for treaty-making.

Now that the referendum is complete, the government of British Columbia is prepared to discuss all issues. Provincial negotiators have the authority to negotiate and make commitments on topics that are consistent with the referendum principles and for which current policies exist.

Since March, 2002, the British Columbia Treaty Commission has been leading high-level tripartite talks to explore certain policy issues. Topics such as revenue sharing, co-operative management and certainty have been explored. Discussions are anticipated in the areas of governance, compensation and land status.

Negotiators may have exploratory discussions on areas outlined in these B.C. Treaty Commission talks and on topics for which there is no established policy. I encourage them to use these discussions to inform internal policy development and to bring forward innovative and thoughtful ideas for consideration.

Exploratory discussions will require prior approval to ensure that they do not result in commitments that exceed existing authorities. Provincial negotiators must make it clear that they cannot commit to finalizing topics where the province has no established policy.

I am committed to taking the results of discussions forward to my cabinet colleagues for review and decision. Negotiators will receive additional instructions once these processes are complete.

We must recognize that this is a negotiation among three parties and as such some measure of compromise is inevitable. British Columbians have given government a strong mandate to move

forward with a clear set of principles and you are to be guided by these principles. We will be held to account for adherence to them but we have been consistent in stating that we cannot guarantee outcomes.

During your negotiations and discussions, keep in sight opportunities to advance practical agreements such as interim measures, in subject areas that benefit First Nations. I want to reiterate government's desire to see substantial progress at treaty tables in the near term and to accelerate negotiations where agreements can be reached.

Why put prairie farmers on welfare?

The agony of prairie farmers with dry bare fields, and prairie beef producers selling their herds, makes me very angry. I spent nine years on the prairies, and I watched them go through drought years, and I was angry then, too. This time, I am more angry than ever before. They are in their fourth year of drought. I recall visiting Terry, Montana, after it had suffered 10 years of

drought. The town was nearly dead, and farmers and ranchers had lost their cattle and land. I felt angry about what happened to them, too.

I guess I become angry because I grew up here, in the desert country, on a farm. In our area, if you want a crop, you must irrigate. We are extremely disadvantaged agriculturally in the Similkameen Valley, especially when compared with the prairies. Do you know you can dig down a metre in most places on the prairies and it is soil all the way? Around here, dig down half a metre and you are guaranteed to hit gravel. In a lot of places, we grow our crops in gravel because it is all we have to work with.

Our river is big about one month a year. You should see those prairie rivers – they are big most of the year.

The prairies are meant for farming, and yet, when it is a drought year, they sit back and ask for money. Why don't they ask for water? Rather than sell of their herds and watch their crops die,

why don't they demand a major irrigation system, especially in a world desperate for beef?

The Peace River, the Saskatchewan River, the Bow River, and a few others, run downhill all the way to the Great Lakes. Huge amounts of water are confined behind Bennett Dam, and Great Slave Lake is full of water. There is lots of water on the prairies, and Canada is a nation filled with experts in building pipelines.

I am angry that Canadian taxpayers are shelling out to prairie farmers every time they have a year without rain. As a taxpayer, I would rather see bushels of money go into pipelines and reservoirs and irrigation systems, and let the prairie farmers pay to tap into the system with the money from the many more, and better, crops they could grow if they had a steady supply of water.

With a the rhetoric politicians waste on other issues, why is it they want to keep prairie farmers on welfare, when the solution is so obvious if you live in a desert?

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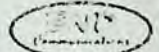

PUBLIC NOTICE

REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE

Commencing October 1, 2002 a new garbage and waste reduction program will begin at the Princeton & District Landfill site affecting all residents in Princeton and Area "H". It will introduce tipping fees, consequently, the user pay concept for all items that are non-recyclable.

We are encouraging the three "R's", **Reduce, Reuse, Recycle**, which will extend the life of the Landfill and reduce our long term garbage disposal costs.

The existing Landfill has a life expectancy of 15-20 years (if we continue to dispose of material without further recycling). Closure costs, new site location and preparation far exceed the additional cost of recycling. (Closure alone is approximately \$500,000.00).

Princeton Residents - 2 bags of household garbage a week will still be collected. Additional bags will require a sticker at \$2.00/bag. Stickers will be made available for purchase at the Town Office and the Landfill during hours of operation (cash only).

Area "H" Residents - Each household will receive a punch card that will work on the same principle as the 2 garbage bag limit per week. Each bag of garbage taken to the Landfill will equate to one number punched on the card. Once residents have filled their punch card, they will be required to pay for extra disposal.

Again, the intent of this program is to recycle. Did you know recycling can reduce household waste by up to 30%? Free drop off is available at the Princeton Landfill for food cans, glass jars, plastic milk jugs, corrugated cardboard, cereal boxes, magazines, catalogues, junk mail, phone books, paper towel cores, paper egg cartons, newspapers, flyers, other paper products, paint products and compostable yard waste.

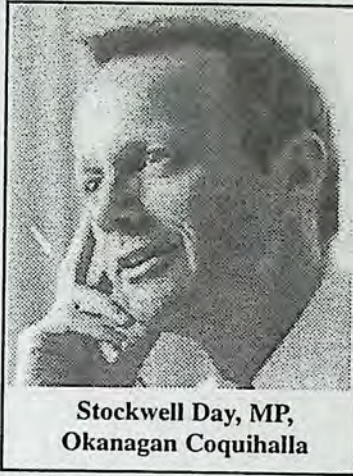
We live in a beautiful area. Managing our waste in an effective way is an important part of the healthy environment that we all want to pass on to our children and future generations.

What can we do about crime?

What would you do if your next door neighbours were dangerous drug dealers and it looked like nothing could be done about it?

Or, how would you feel if you had to meet secretly with a dealer of stolen goods to buy back a precious family treasure, thieved by young thugs who had broken into your home?

These are not hypothetical questions. They are examples of real episodes, which go on right here in our region. They were topics of discussion at a recent public meeting in one of our communities. I hear similar stories around the constituency.

Some realities became evident throughout that evening.

1. People in our communities

care. That was clear by the good attendance of elected representatives, police officers, counsellors, the concerned neighbours, people demanding answers and others offering solutions.

2. Nobody present expressed much in the way of support for the latest version of the Young Offenders Act.

3. Many people were angry and frustrated. There is a real perception that the system puts more emphasis on the rights of law-breakers than on the rights of law-abiding citizens.

4. Everybody recognized we have pretty good communities overall.

5. Everybody was committed to making each community a better place.

With those realities before us, a number of pro-active measures to deal with the problems were brought forward. It was agreed that each of us, in our own areas of influence, can do something.

For my part, as a federal representative, I presented the painful and woeful lack of any real progress by the federal government in developing an Act that really works.

After nine years of promises, we have a Young Offenders Act which is much longer and far more complex than the legislation it replaced.

Police are frustrated with it, judges have testified that they do not understand it, citizens are not well-served by it, and many young offenders themselves say its consequences are a joke.

What can we do? The federal responsibility is to build legislation on a framework of common sense principles brought forward by common citizens who want common decency and are prepared to do their part.

Things we heard that evening, if listened to by the federal government, would form a workable platform.

First, people said, "Give kids a chance, some have never had a break in life. But that doesn't

mean ignoring the wrongdoing." Some first-time offences, especially if they are non-violent, can be handled informally, keeping young people out of court and out of the system.

Second, get tough on serious and repeat offenders. "No nonsense" is the only message some understand. Serious crime should mean serious time.

Third, with young (or adult) criminals, don't handcuff the police as they try to handcuff the offenders. This is not to excuse excesses by the police but the number of wrongdoers who walk free because of some technicality shows the balance has tipped in favour of the bad guys.

Fourth, the names of serious, repeat or violent young offenders should be made public to protect the community. The new Act still allows offenders to hide.

Fifth, allow young offenders to fully understand the hurt caused by their actions. A combination of serious custody, restitution, and gradual re-integration into the community is needed.

We all believe in the possibility of rehabilitation. However, true rehabilitation for a serious offender will not happen without that person coming to grips with the reality and the consequences of his actions.

Where do we go from here I will make sure the voices of real people right here where we live are heard in the hallways where the laws and policies are made. If each of us takes our responsibilities in our own spheres of influence, and if the government at the federal level will truly respond to the local level with policies and resources, our communities will become better, safer and healthier places for young and old alike.

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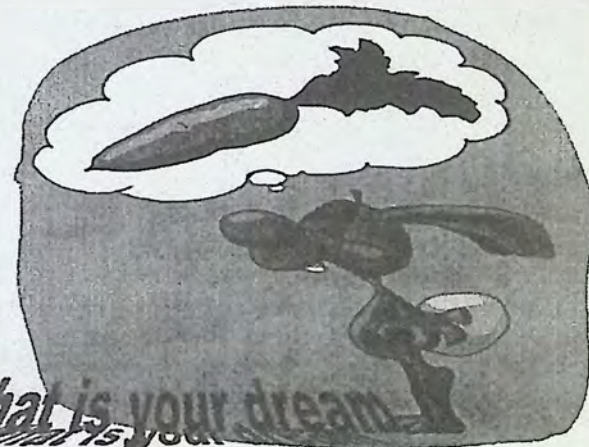

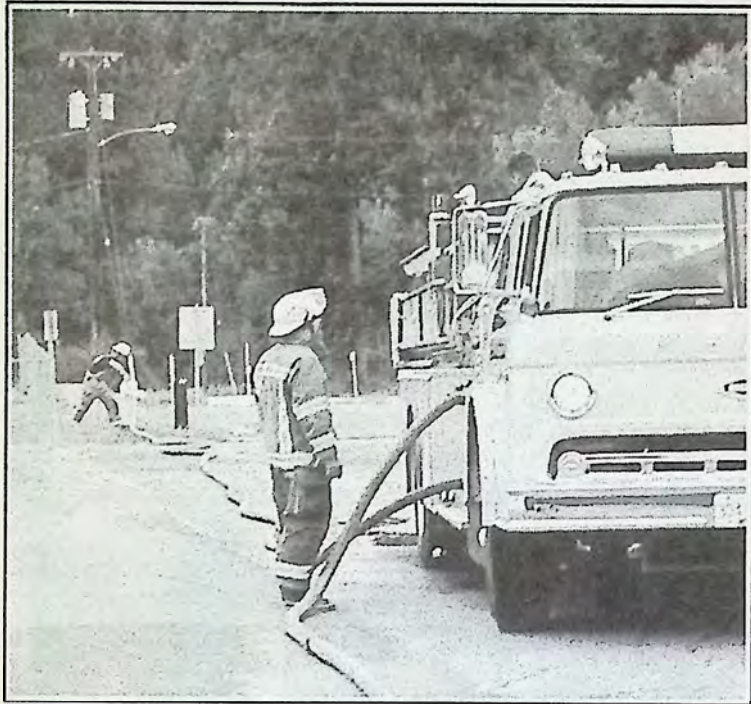

Fire Department volunteers practice double relay attack



In the top left photo, a member of Princeton Fire Department crew connects the hose from one truck to the fire hydrant at the south end of the parking lot at John Allison Elementary School. This truck pumps the water to the second truck (middle photo). The second truck then pumps the water to the third truck located down near the river to the northwest of the second truck. This technique can be used successfully in situations in which one truck and hose cannot reach the fire area. As part of the practice, the crew cut down dangerous trees whose root systems were damaged by underground coal burning. In the area west of John Allison Elementary, there have been problems with coal burning and underground then setting brush fires.
