RCMP seek death witness

Princeton RCMP are asking for witnesses to come forward who may have seen a light blue Chevrolet pick-up truck driving along Tulameen Avenue between 1:00 a.m. and 2:00 a.m. on August 8. The pick-up truck has Ontario licence plates bearing the number 4651KS. Police are not seeking the whereabouts of the truck as they know its location.

The pick-up truck is related to the sudden death of Princeton resident Ruby Jalbert, age 37. An incident occurred near the junction of Tulameen Avenue and Snowpatch Road shortly after 1:00 a.m. on Thursday, August 8, 2002. A person living in the area called 911 and the BC Ambulance Service attended. Jalbert was taken to Princeton General Hospital where she was pronounced dead.

Anyone who may have seen the light blue pick-up driving anywhere along Tulameen Avenue near the time of this incident is asked to contact Princeton RCMP at 295 - 6911.

Council opposes sale of BC Hydro

Princeton Town Council supports resolutions to be introduced at the Union of BC Municipalities in September regarding BC Hydro rates and any proposal to sell BC Hydro assets. The resolutions were drawn up by North Central Municipal Association.

The first resolution states "Low cost electricity produced by the major dams on the Peace and Columbia Rivers and other dams in BC were developed by public investments guaranteed by the citizens of BC will be regarded as an entitlement in perpetuity for the benefit of all British Columbians."

The next resolutions continue to state that rates charged for electricity to customers in BC will continue to be based on the cost of production, and BC Hydro will continue to hold an obligation to serve throughout its service area. The resolutions call for a recognition that BC Hydro "electrical generation, transmission and distribution system is an enormous strategic and profitable asset which can be used to achieve economic objectives that benefit all British Columbians and will not be sold or privatized."

The resolutions include a request for an energy policy putting BC's needs first, and marketing outside the province second.

Union calls for support

The Office & Professional Employees' International Union Local 378 sent a letter to Council asking for support for the union's opposition to "privatize, deregulate and break up BC Hydro".

The union's resolution states "BC Hydro is owned by the people of

Town sets tipping fee schedule

Mayor Randy McLean says the new waste disposal Bylaw #743 is a "working document", meaning it is subject to adjustment, but it received first, second and third reading at the August 6 Town Council meeting. Council plans to hold a public meeting in September for input from local residents.

Princeton area residents will pay tipping fees for all wastes disposed of at the landfill site, but

will not be charged for recyclable materials. Free items (recyclables) include yard and garden waste, wood waste, scrap metal, small tires, clean soil, noxious weeds, infested vegetation, corrugated cardboard, glass, and paper.

To dispose of "white goods", i.e. appliances, there is no charge unless the item has freon, in which case there is a \$10 fee.

To dispose of a mattress or box

spring, you will pay \$5.00 each.

The fee schedule is lengthy and should be read carefully. Ordinary household garbage will be picked up at the residence in town and the limit is two bags per household. No bag limit has been set for commercial ventures such as stores and restaurants. Council needs to work on the commercial category.

Okanagan newspaper ridicules Similkameen Valley

In an article by Ron Seymour of The Daily Courier, a Kelowna newspaper, the Similkameen took a real beating last week. Along with Peachland Mayor George Waldo, Seymour complains about a sign at the Okanagan end of the Connector which says "Welcome to the Okanagan Similkameen".

Seymour claims nobody knows where the Similkameen is located. He surely does not, as he identifies it as being "east" of Penticton. In any case, here is how he describes the Similkameen - "a remote dog-patch home to a few hundred farmers, retirees and unemployed people. StatsCan says the town of Keremeos, centre of the Similkameen, is one of the poorest places in the country."

Seymour claims the Similkameen is not a vacation destination but probably has "accidental tourists" due to misleading signs in the Okanagan.

Seymour reckons the signage was put in place "because merchants in the Similkameen Valley and in Princeton were worried that they'd lose a lot of traffic with the opening of the Okanagan Connector."

He adds few people would willingly drive the Hope-Princeton route to Vancouver because it would take 90 minutes longer.

Reaction from Similkameen Country (Keremeos' economic development and business group) was definitely negative.

Princeton Chamber of Commerce manager Lori Thomas says she does not like

it and thinks something should be done about it.

In her view, the whole idea of tourism is to sell all of British Columbia.

"Tourists come to BC to see versatility. Each place has something different to offer. If we want to attract people from around the world, we have to work together," Thomas said.

The Chamber of Commerce may have an official position following their meeting this Thursday.

Comments from other media sources in the Okanagan say Peachland's mayor was complaining tongue in cheek, but the column in The Daily Courier goes beyond funny in the eyes of Similkameen Valley people who have worked so hard to promote the entire region.

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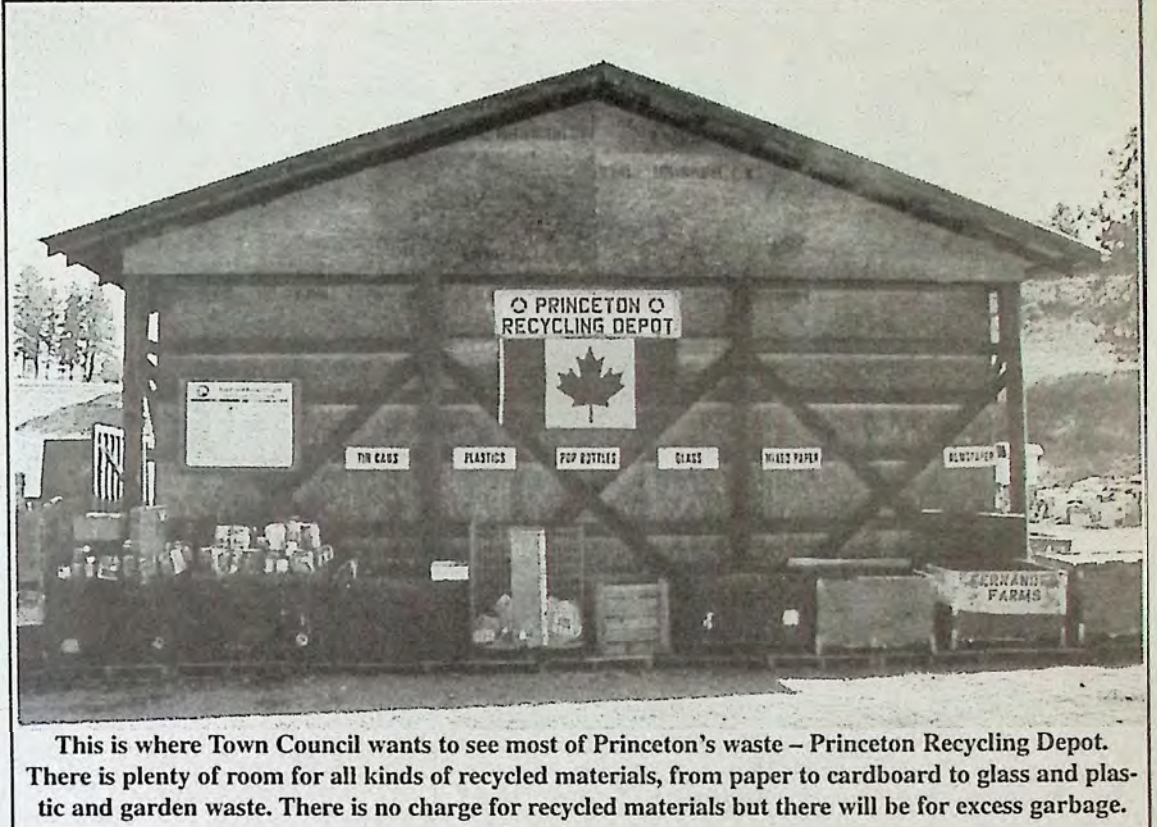

unbagged refuse will pay between \$7 per small pick-up load to \$180 for a five ton truckload, with varying rates in between. Any amount over the top of the box of the pick-up would add an additional fee.

At some point, Council may pass a bylaw disallowing landfill disposal of recyclables. For example, Council may decide no cardboard is to go into the landfill because it is recyclable. Anyone dumping cardboard after that bylaw came into effect would pay double the usual fee.

Household garbage exceeding the number of bags allowed will not be picked up by the town service, and when these extra bags are taken to the landfill, each bag will cost \$2.00 for disposal.

Recycle and reuse

There is no intent by Town Council or Regional District to refuse the waste removal service to anyone, but the service will no

longer be unlimited. The effort being made now is legislated by the provincial government and the local landfill must reduce the amount of garbage being dumped. The answer is, of course, to recycle. By limiting the amount of waste allowed per household, Council hopes people will take recycling seriously. Most house-

holds, when recycling is done consistently, can easily reduce waste to one-third of previous levels. Paper, tins, glass, plastic and compostables removed from household garbage does not leave a lot to go into the landfill.

Council and Regional District will provide more education on recycling in the near future.

Sponsors give big prizes for pie contest

This year, thanks to the efforts of Ron White and Princeton Bakery, the Fall Fair offers \$100 (or more) in prize money for pies. White's huckleberry pies have been frequent winners at the Fall Fair, but his biggest complaint is lack of competition. That is why he is turning it into a contest in a special category.

The pie-baking contest is for fruit or berry pies only – no custards, creams, chiffons or meringues. The entry fee for each pie is \$2.00 (fees go to the Fall Fair) and the recipe must be included. This

means no fruit or berry fillings from a can.

Competitors may enter more than one pie. Entries must be registered before noon on Friday, September 6, 2002, and judging will be done by a judge assigned by the Fall Fair. Points will be awarded for colour, texture and presentation (appearance of pie and plate or dish).

Council denies hostel permit

A public hearing into the rezoning of a lot on Burton Avenue raised some issues with local motel owners. The rezoning to multi-family residential was approved at the August 6 Town Council meeting, but the request for a hostel permit was denied.

Marv Carlson, who made the application for rezoning and for the hostel permit, was given an explanation. Hostels are not a permitted use under the rezoning Carlson requested.

In addition, motel owners complained that Carlson would be providing overnight accommodation just like motels provide but would not be paying the higher

property taxes motels pay. Motels are zoned commercial, and pay much higher property taxes.

Councillor Loren Esselink told Carlson the residential zoning does not go with the commercial use.

Mayor Randy McLean referred to another issue raised by residents of the area in the past, in which they requested the area be preserved as a residential area. To change the zoning to commercial would raise the issue again.

At the same time, Mayor McLean stated, "I'm not elected to restrict business."

Carlson asked if he could come back to Council and appeal the ruling. Council said he could, but suggested he should think of other options. One suggestion was that Carlson serve breakfasts, as bed and breakfast businesses are zoned residential. Carlson did not appear interested in serving breakfasts, and made a counter-suggestion that he be allowed to try the hostel for a year and come back to Council with an appeal. His request was not approved.

British Columbia and provides affordable, reliable and clean power. In order to preserve this valuable asset, the province must retain BC Hydro as a complete entity within a regulated pricing structure. Its integrated systems and services are critical to Hydro's ability to provide reliable power at affordable pricing that does not discriminate against rural customers."

Council had no problem supporting this resolution.

Council okays delegation on privatization


Council will invite representatives from Office & Professional Employees' International Union local 378 to attend a Council meeting and state the union's position regarding the preservation of publicly owned auto insurance.

The union notes the Insurance Corporation of BC was founded

in 1973 as a direct result of the Wooten Royal Commission investigating shoddy practices of private insurance companies, and is mandated to provide fair rating which does not discriminate on the basis of age, gender, marital status nor postal code. The union states ICBC's policies decrease uninsured motorists and provide road safety initiatives.

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A big crowd turned out to see the vehicles displayed at Kars Under the K on August 11.

A lot of people look for employment

People seeking employment in the Keremeos area are signing in at Similkameen Country Employment Access Centre. There are many people seeking jobs - 99 new members signed up in July, bringing the total number of members to 410 since the Centre opened on February 15, 2002.

During July, 273 people visited the Employment Access Centre looking for work. They are people who utilize the services offered at the Centre. Since the Centre opened, there have been approxi-

mately 1,200 work-oriented visits. In addition, approximately 550 people have visited the Centre just to see what is there and take a tour. These visits are kept separate because they do not involve using the Centre.

The majority of people seeking work in July were farm labourers. One of the services the Centre has been able to offer is linking agricultural enterprises with people seeking agricultural work. This is a benefit to both employers and prospective employees. For the unemployed, the Centre is a boon.

Rules To Live By When Investing In Equities

If you believed everything you heard, the stock market would be a magical place where double-digit returns are just waiting for you. In reality, however, investing requires discipline and patience, with your focus steady on your long-term objective.

- 7) Remember your original goals. Investing in the stock market is much more than proving you can time the market. You are in the market to protect and, if possible, increase your capital.

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Fair sets playground fees

The Fall Fair Association has rented an inflatable playground for the fair weekend at a cost of \$3,000. Because Fall Fair controls the playground through its rental agreement, the Fair Board is able to set the rates.

At the August 8 meeting, members agreed to set a full-day fee. For a single day, the fee per child will be \$6.00, and for the entire weekend, the fee will be \$10.00 per child. Each child for whom the fee is paid will receive a wristband, and will be allowed to come and go into the playground as the child wishes. This eliminates the problems parents have had with other children's amusements at the fair in which there is a con-

stant demand for more money for rides or activities.

The inflatable playground includes slides, air-filled "bounce" structures, and other activities in a safe environment.

Other activities for children include a pet show where they can bring their pets for judging for prizes such as longest tail, biggest feet, best-dressed, and so on.

All children are encouraged to participate in the Junior Fair, where children enter art work, collections, baking, garden produce, pottery, and writing projects. Exhibits are judged according to age of the child. Entry fees are minimal and prizes are awarded in all categories.

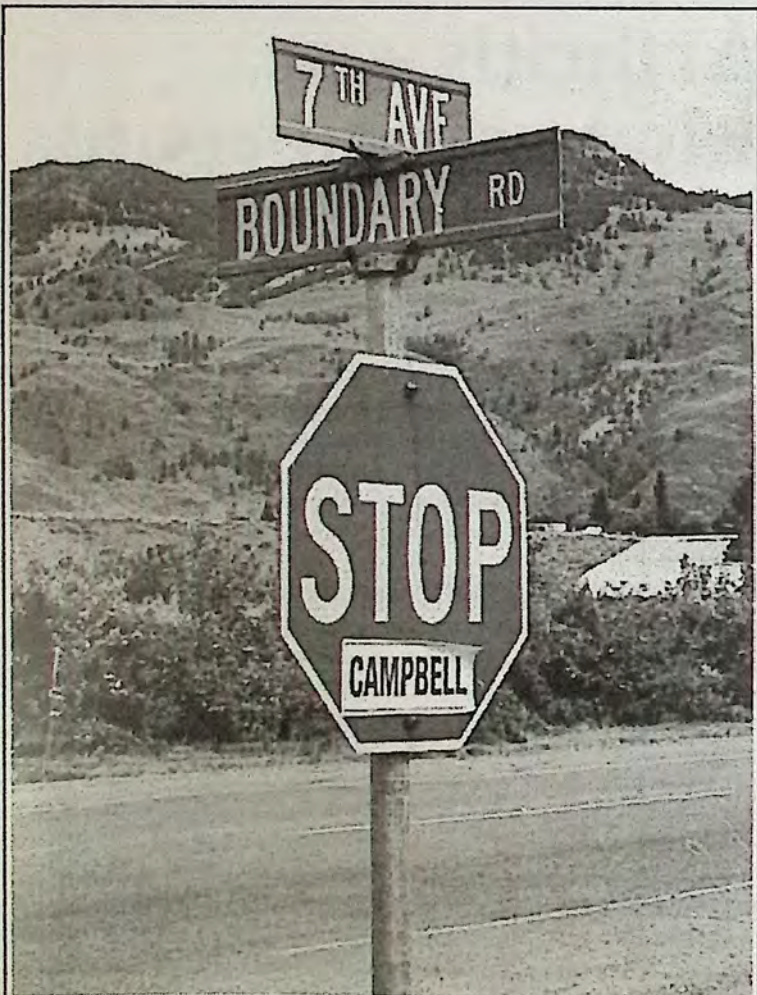

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The effect of the golf swing on the spine

Golf is now the fastest growing sport in North America and for good reason. Nothing compares to spending a sunny day on the links with friends. Similarly, more golfers are turning to chiropractic care as an effective means to improve their swing dynamics and lower their handicap. In fact, most PGA, WPGA and CPGA events have chiropractors on staff as part of the medical team.

The golf swing is centered around the spine and body core. It is the spine and associated muscles of the trunk that generate the majority of the force needed to drive the ball. A biomechanically correct setup and swing is a thing of beauty and a good example is the relaxed swing of Ernie Els. Most golf swing problems result from a poor understanding of proper setup and swing mechanics. This is often further complicated by previous injuries which restrict proper swing mechanics. So, to help improve your game, here are some golf tips.

1. FYI: Chiropractic and golf? The golf swing depends on muscles and joints of the body working properly. Chiropractors assess the function of the musculoskeletal system. Problems in the muscles and joints of the body can severely impeded proper golf swing mechanics. Therefore chiropractic is well-placed to assess and treat many golf-related injuries and related musculoskeletal conditions.

2. The golf swing is a coupled motion, meaning the energy in one plane of motion (spine and body rotation) is transferred to another plane (arc of the club head) as the ball is hit and propelled forward. A proper setup position is essential to a correct and efficient swing. Contact your local CPGA professional for more information on the golf setup and swing. They will set you on the right footing with proper fitting equipment and lessons.

3. Always do a warm-up activity followed by light stretching prior to a round. A good pre-game routine starts 30-45 minutes prior to tee-off time. Warm up the body by walking to the driving range or until a light sweat is reached. Do some



light stretching only after your body is warm. Then, start hitting balls with an easy, relaxed swing. Work through your clubs, starting with the wedges and working to the distance clubs. Now you're ready for a fantastic, injury free round of golf!

4. By bending the knees slightly while addressing the ball, you can more easily trigger the abdominal muscles to contract. This will improve the body trunk control during the swing.

5. Develop a relaxed and rhythmic golf swing instead of one that incorporates intense muscular contractions. Remember, hitting the sweet spot on the club head will give you greater distance than

missing the sweet spot with a higher club speed. Furthermore, you will reduce the risk of musculoskeletal injury.

6. Consider walking the round rather than taking a cart. It is great exercise, keeps you young, and allows you time to think about your next shot.

7. Make sure you have proper shoes with adequate biomechanical support!

8. Remember: it is more important to relax and play golf than to play golf to relax!

Living past 100

Arthritis – what you eat counts

For a long time, doctors did not believe arthritis was influenced by what people eat, but times have changed. What you eat, and especially what you don't eat, can play a major role in how much you suffer from arthritis. The most common form of arthritis is osteoarthritis, caused by deterioration of cartilage, the material in joints that cushions the shock of joint action. Rheumatoid arthritis is caused when the body's own immune system begins attacking the body, causing swelling of the membrane lining the joints. Rheumatoid arthritis is most affected by what you eat.

In countries where people stick to a natural diet, mostly unprocessed fruits, vegetables and grain, rheumatoid arthritis is extremely rare. Some foods, such as wheat, eggs, corn, tomatoes and citrus fruits, will trigger inflammation. In Norway, rheumatoid arthritis research found that a vegetarian diet relieved symptoms. The avoidance of wheat products, refined sugar, salt, alcohol and caffeine helped.

Traditional medicine taught that osteoarthritis was a natural part of aging. This notion is long gone. Researchers learned that people consuming more than 200 milligrams of Vitamin C daily did not have their arthritis worsen with age. Vitamin C generates the production of collagen, which helps repair cartilage. Foods rich in Vitamin C should be a regular part of the diet of anyone with arthritis. These foods are oranges, strawberries, cantaloupe, broccoli, peppers and cranberries.

If you are overweight, you have a far higher likelihood of developing osteoarthritis than if you keep your weight down. This is simple common sense when it comes to knee joints, but what is surprising is that overweight people are more likely to develop arthritis in joints in the hands or other joints that do not bear weights.

A healthy diet, low in sugar and fat, with a lower intake of protein, and plenty of Vitamin C, will keep your joints healthy.

Sunlight fights virus

With only a month and a half left of bright sunny weather, think about cleaning viruses out of your house with sunshine. Although UV rays are not good for people, they are deadly for viruses. The end of summer is a good time to make sure you have cleaned viruses out of your house by exposing rooms to as much sunlight as possible. Your plants will appreciate some sunlight for the same reason (plants can carry viruses that harm them). When it comes to cleaning, you might consider hanging bedding out in the sunlight, too.

Community law offices close next week

The Penticton Community Law Office will be closed to the public effective August 19, 2002.

The office closure, according to the Legal Services Society head office in Vancouver, is due to a major restructuring of the Legal Services Society which became necessary when the provincial government announced severe cuts to legal aid funding over the next three years.

Penticton area residents who need to apply for legal aid can now do so by calling (toll free) the LSS Provincial Call Centre at 1-866-577-2525.

The Penticton office, which

has served the South Okanagan and Similkameen, is one of 14 community law offices funded by Legal Services Society. It has provided legal aid and information services since June, 1975.

The Penticton Community Law Office educated and informed people of the legal system and their rights and responsibilities as citizens. As well, the office monitored and alerted the community to events, practises, situations and legislation in which human rights and/or civil liberties were eroded or threatened.

All offices currently operated or funded solely by Legal Services Society will be shut

down by August 30. Most will close to the public before that date to give staff time to wind down their operations. By September 3, seven regional centres, the toll-free call centre, and local agents in communities across BC, will provide legal aid services. At that time, Penticton's service area residents will be able to apply for legal aid at the Kelowna Regional Centre, as well as through the provincial Call Centre. Details about regional centre, local agent, and legal information services will be available next week. Check www.lss.bc.ca

Health advisory

How to control mosquitoes and prevent West Nile disease

West Nile virus has everyone concerned about mosquitoes, particularly as West Nile virus has been identified in Washington State. As West Nile virus is spread from birds to humans through mosquito bites, and as West Nile virus can kill, health authorities and government agencies are concerned about mosquito control.

Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen has a mosquito control program in place to monitor and control mosquitoes in natural wetlands (program does not include Area H).

Residents are advised to do their utmost to control mosquitoes around their property. The first step is to empty containers which may hold rainwater in which mosquitoes can lay their eggs. Drain and cover old tires, clean out plugged eavestroughs, empty buckets, boats, unused swimming pools and tarps where water may have collected.

Encourage habitat for natural

predators, such as lizards, dragonflies, swallows, bats and frogs. Do not kill any of these creatures who eat mosquitoes.

Flooded fields, shallow marshes and temporary ponds attract mosquitoes to lay eggs in them, thus increasing the number of mosquitoes.

For personal protection, open no windows that lack screens, and wear repellent on exposed skin (including scalp if you are not wearing a hat). There are hats equipped with netting for those unable to use insect repellent.

Marv Carlson, who attended the meeting, told Council the railings on the trestle west of the tunnel have never been finished. He said 90 percent of the compression washers and nuts were never put on, making the railings potentially unstable. Council members expressed alarm, and the matter will be taken up with the Trails Society.

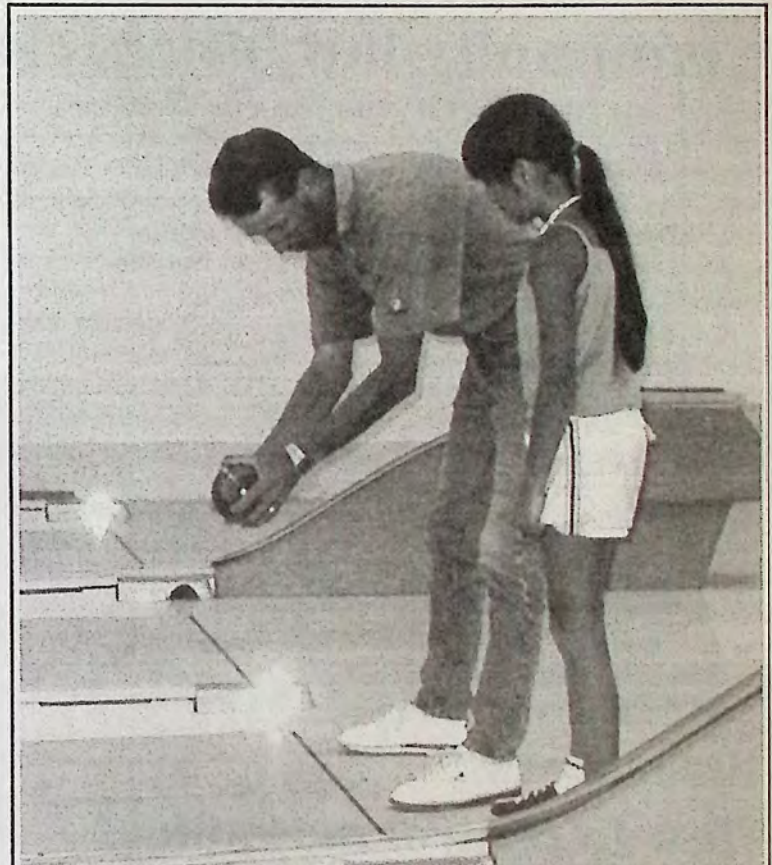

Council opposes parks cuts

In response to a letter from Western Canada Wilderness Committee, Princeton Town Council decided to write a letter to the provincial government opposing cutbacks in parks staffing.

Mayor Randy McLean expressed concern about Manning Park, saying it is a "tinderbox". He noted

the effects on the economy last year during the forest fire. If Manning Park were to catch fire, he said, "Our main tourist artery would be closed."

Council would not go so far as to support the remainder of the requests made by the Committee, which was to prevent mining and logging from occurring in parks.

Resident identifies traffic hazard

Paul Doré, who resides in the Burton Avenue area, has requested the Town of Princeton install two stop signs and two stop lines on accesses into Burton Avenue. In addition, he requested barriers be installed along Burton Avenue from Princeton Hydraulic to the old Highway 3 access. He says traffic coming onto Burton Avenue from side streets and

businesses are not yielding to pedestrians and cyclists who have the right of way.

Councillor Kathy Clement was unsure about the stop signs but thought barriers would be a good idea. The Town crew will look at the area and decide how to proceed with a barrier as well as designated entrance and exits clearly marked.

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Buoyant real estate market continues

All indicators point to an active summer market in real estate. South Okanagan Real Estate Board reports MLS sales increased 22 percent to 193 units sold in July 2002 compared with 157 during the same period in 2001.

Year to date sales are up 33 percent over last year. Low mortgage interest rates and affordable housing prices continue to encourage buyers.

In the Similkameen, Princeton sales are up 48 percent, whereas Keremeos sales are down one percent. Oliver and Osoyoos saw increases of 74 percent and 85 percent respectively. Penticton sales are up 22 percent, and Naramata's sales are up 52 percent.

However, the number of places for sale is down slightly this year. There is definitely a demand for more properties on the market in all communities. Residential sales prices are up five percent over last year, with the average selling price at \$146,577.

The Real Estate Board report covers 189 realtors and 26 real estate offices in the South Okanagan and Similkameen.

Permitted uses with the M2 (Heavy Industrial) designation include processing, manufacturing, fabricating, assembling, storing, transporting, distributing, wholesaling, testing, servicing, repairing or salvaging goods, materials including mining; service industries, including rental, repair, sales and servicing of vehicles, machinery, and equipment including auto body repairs, electronic equipment and components manufacturing and repair, plumbing, heating, air conditioning and refrigeration shops, wood working shops, tool and die shops, tire and wheel sales and repairs, sign painting and fabricating shops, upholstery shops, window and glass shops, automobile and truck washes; bulk fuel depot; recycling depots; passenger and freight terminals, depots and distribution facilities; wrecking and salvaging yards; and office buildings and structures auxiliary to the uses permitted, including one single family dwelling or mobile home for the proprietor of the permitted industrial use, residential security/operator unit.

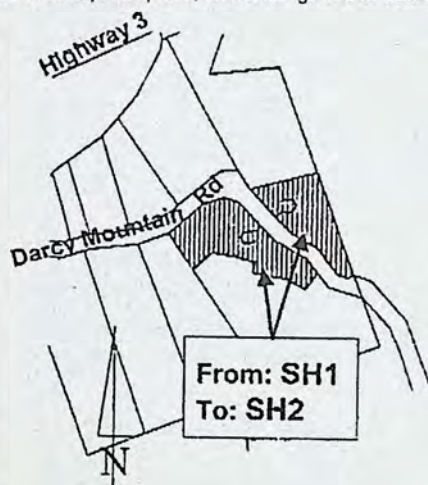

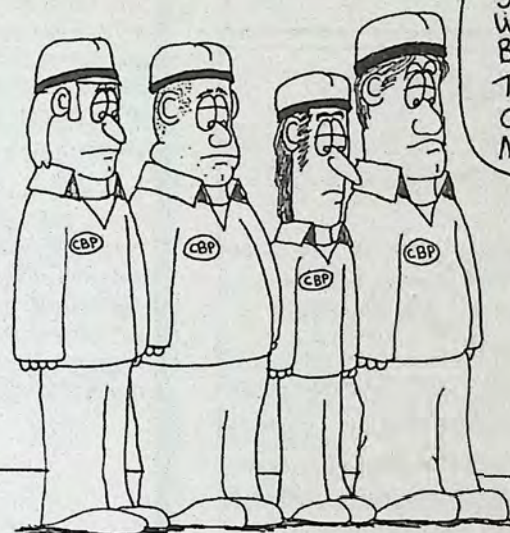

Will competitive insurance save money?

Dear Editor;

Now that we are well on the way to privatization and we find that some elements of BC Hydro have been sold to American bidders, we can look forward to the selling of ICBC to friends of the present government. Reading the rhetoric in the media, we can tell that, at the present time, the way to privatization is being paved by the global insurance industry.

In order to get people to think about some of that industry's claims, I have compiled a short list of my insurance-related experiences in BC over the past 50 years. From personal experience, let me tell you why I think their assault on the minds of the voters will lead to the same kind of competition that we experience when we buy fuel for our vehicles. This is my own BC insurance experience.

I was a young licensed driver in 1953 when our newly elected Social Credit government legislated compulsory auto insurance. We quickly found that the fox was looking after the chicken house. Our US-based insurance companies soon doubled the rates for many drivers who were now forced to buy insurance. One very memorable statistic they used to justify rate increases was that the average driver has an accident every 13 years and that the insured was now in her/his twelfth accident-free year. This is from actual experience, no urban legend or third-

hand story – but if you wish to verify what I say, you will have to ask drivers who are 80 years of age or older.

Being a fairly typical youth, I had a minor collision where I was found to be at fault. My insurer dropped me like a hot potato and my name went into a hat. I was now an "assigned risk". My newly "assigned" insurer would only insure me at triple my original premium and I would have to pay that increased premium for five years until I reached the age of 21. As I remained claim-free, my privately owned multi-national insurance company made a lot of money at my expense. This is first-hand experience.

After ICBC's inception in the early 70's, I had several sad experiences with that monopoly. Each time I was seeking redress for hit and run. I was treated as if I was the offending driver rather than the victim. When they reluctantly settled my claims, I had to supply my own transportation while my vehicle was repaired. I cannot prove it but I remain convinced that ICBC's attitude reflected the wishes of the Socrated government of the day. This is also first-hand experience.

Ten years ago (New Democrat administration) my car upholstery had been ruined. I took it to ICBC and they couldn't do enough for me, providing me with a courtesy car for two weeks, profusely apologizing when the work was not finished on time and then extending the use of my loaned vehicle for another week. I believe that the corporation was reflecting the attitude of their political bosses. Again, this is not a second or third hand story

but actual experience.

In the early 80's, as a small business owner and contractor, I needed to have public liability insurance. For three consecutive years at ICBC, I was covered for \$1 million worth of liability at an annual premium of \$300. Alas, that is when Mr. Vander Zalm decided ICBC would only insure automobiles. To make a long story short, my next year's privatized premium was \$1,000, putting my business on the verge of bankruptcy. My third year's liability premium went to \$10,000 (no claims against me) and I could no longer afford to keep a privately owned American insurer in business. I went belly-up. Private insurance is good? You decide!

What I have found during the past 50 years in BC is the insurance business is a political football, simply reflecting the ideologies of their masters.

What I believe we need is a cooperative people's insurance business to serve all our insurance needs – owned by the people through their government, backed by legislation but free from political interference. Competition would be welcome but would likely stay away in droves. We do not need multi-national insurers to reap the profits that will forever keep our country in economic servitude.

Surely there is a place for private enterprise in our country, but it is not in medical care, education, highways, energy utilities, and/or most types of insurance.

Buddy the young vets with the old vets

They're home. Our troops. The dedicated people who put themselves in harm's way for us, for our children, for our future.
 And make no mistake about it, history will record that Canadian soldiers were a part of a larger army which broke the back of a terrorist network whose plans were for more death and destruction.
 It's true the war on terrorism will never be over. But our brave soldiers, along with others, have shown we are willing to take up the torch and let terrorists know their course will not triumph.
 With this, a disturbing dimension of the effects of war upon our soldiers seems to be emerging. We've all seen and heard the interviews. Reports on the severity of post-combat stress and its effects on an individual. At this point, we have no way of determining the breadth of the problem.
 We do know that a number of our faithful protectors of freedom feel practically disabled as they re-

enter civilian life. What can be done?
 Along with many counselling sessions psychologists and other therapists will be offering, I suggest two things: first, we must evaluate how fully informed our new recruits are when they first sign up and when they go through their combat training. Is everything being done to prepare them for the pressures they will face in the harshness of wartime?
 We who have not been there have no idea what it must be like. Though our soldiers are under-equipped with the tools of war because of federal government neglect, there is no excuse for not making sure they are equipped mentally and emotionally.
 I had the honour of bidding farewell to our troops last year as the ship left from Halifax for their mission in Afghanistan. I vividly recall a brief and exciting encounter I had with three cadets. They wanted to meet me to let me know they could hardly wait until they were old enough to sign up.
 As I looked into their wide, hopeful eyes, I thought about how young these boys were. And how old they would become after actually being in the theatre of death and destruction that is war.
 And I wondered how thorough the preparation is for what their minds and hearts will have to face and endure. So, let's make sure no expense is spared in that preparation.
 Further, how do we deal with those retuning from the front? I offer a suggestion which would complement the other things considered.
 Why not develop an informal but personal buddy system between

our returning young soldiers and our veterans from the Second World War and other campaigns?
 These veterans, now senior citizens, also went through the hell and heartbreak of war. Many were overseas for a number of years. They experienced the horror of seeing buddies slaughtered all around them. They all discovered the high price to be paid for freedom.
 Many of us are fortunate enough to not know what that feels like. But they know. And so do our newest returning troops. These older veterans who live in every community of our nation are within arm's reach of our newest vets. They could get together and share with them as only fellow soldiers can. They could tell them what it took to come back, to build homes, to build families, and to build a nation which has become the best place on earth.
 The effect on our young soldiers would be encouraging and profound. And consider the effect on our senior vets, who sometimes wonder if we really care that they put their lives on the line for us.
 I've talked to some of our vets about this. It made them feel that once again they could give of themselves in a way that would keep our country strong and free. It's what they fought for.
 Our young troops deserve the best. I'll ask our Minister of Veteran Affairs to consider this plan as a way of giving them the best. We owe it to all our veterans.

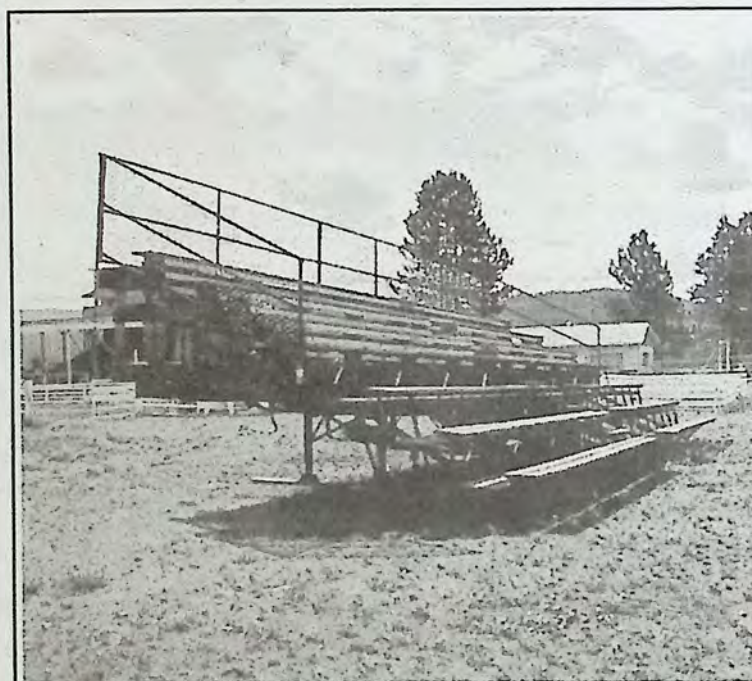

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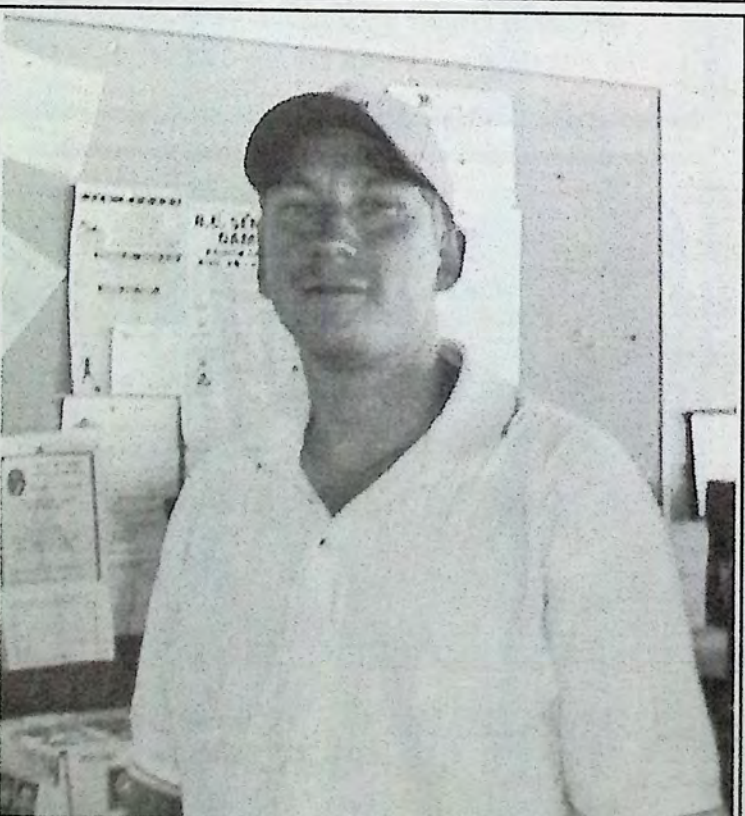
Princeton Men's Open set a new course record
