

House fire injures couple

- fierce winds are suspect in loss of home

As a frighteningly strong wind fanned the blaze, a Princeton couple was lucky to escape with their lives.

Princeton RCMP, Princeton Fire Department, Ministry of Forests Fire Suppression crew and BC Ambulance were called to the scene at 1:00 a.m. Friday, August 16. The fire was at the first property on East Similkameen Road (old Allenby Road) south of Princeton.

When the crews arrived, the 100 year old log house was totally engulfed in flames and spot forest fires were developing. Princeton Fire Department crew tackled the structure fire and small fires adjacent to the buildings. A shed caught fire near the house, and a pick-up truck parked near the house caught fire.

Ministry of Forest personnel fought the fires spreading throughout the area. Four neighbours were alerted to the possibility of the forest fire spreading.

Considering the fierce wind at the time, Cst. Chris Newel credits the fast action of all crews involved for preventing a much worse situation. The couple, Ed Billon and Tammy Fribance, were taken to Princeton General Hospital for treatment. Fribance was transferred to Vancouver General Hospital.

The couple's horses were pasturing at another property at the time of the fire, and were in no danger.

RCMP continue arson investigation

The Fenchurch Avenue apartment block fire, which occurred in November 2001, has been officially labelled "arson". RCMP continue to look for the person or persons who set the fire. The building is now derelict and the town building inspector and owner will determine what happens to it next.

The fire in the former Internet Cafe is not believed to be arson. The cause of the fire is likely electrical or spontaneous.

Burning groceries close highway


A truckload of burning groceries closed Highway 3 just east of Bromley Provincial Park in the late evening hours of Wednesday, August 14. A semi trailer on fire was reported just after 11:00 p.m. The fire started after a tire blew out and ignited the trailer and its contents, which consisted of typical grocery store goods such as canned and packaged foods and cleaning products. The goods were headed for Penticton.

The Ministry of Forests Fire Suppression crew was called immediately and were able to prevent the blaze from spreading beyond the trailer, although flames did burn some grass growing on the gravel embankment.

The driver was able to detach the truck unit before it sustained any damage.

From the time when the fire began to approximately 2:00

a.m., Highway #3 between Princeton and Hedley was closed. The highway was opened to only one lane of traffic for many hours, until mid-day as the fire continued to smolder well into the morning. Tin cans and other debris littered the highway around the fire area and the road surface had to be cleared after the burnt-out trailer was removed. The trailer and contents were totally destroyed.

BC Gas stays on plan

Roger Young, of BC Gas, contacted the News Leader last week in regard to an article in the August 6 issue in which we reported BC Gas has set its deadline back to 2006 for construction of the pipeline to be built south of Princeton.

In addition, he stated BC Gas will be making a public presentation to Town Council and the Business Enhancement Association regarding plans for construction in the Princeton area. He expects the presentation to take place sometime in the next few weeks.

Princeton Area Business Enhancement Association (BEA) met August 13 to elect an interim executive. Jim Manion is Chair, George Elliott is Vice-Chair, John Babiak is Treasurer and Dawn Johnson is Secretary. This executive will stay in place until November 7, 2002, when an annual general meeting will be held. In the meantime, BEA is opening an account and beginning a membership drive. The next meeting is at the call of the Chair.

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

High wind fanned fire, flattened trees

The wind storm fanning the flames at the Billon-Fribance residence on Thursday night caused a lot of damage throughout the Similkameen Valley and Okanagan Valley. The winds came from gale force winds blowing down Georgia Strait on the coast.

Trees were down throughout the Princeton area. The News Leader reporter counted 40 trees blown down between Princeton and Hedley. Trees were blown down from Manning Park to Whipsaw Creek on the Hope-Princeton Highway.

In Keremeos, the wind howled through, but did not seem to cause the damage there that it did in other places. Maybe Keremeos trees are adapted to the wind?

Wind speeds at the north end of the Similkameen Valley, in the Princeton area, were up to 70 km/h, and approximately 90

km/h at the south end near the U.S.-Canada border.

The Okanagan was hit hard. Fallen trees damaged property, and at Gallagher Lake, near Oliver, a man was killed when a tree fell on the tent in which he

was sleeping. A woman sleeping beside him was not hurt.

Tree fruit crops in the Okanagan were blown off the trees, and some orchardists found as much as half their crop on the ground.

Earthquake startles Similkameen residents

Residents throughout the Similkameen Valley were startled when they felt a sudden jolt at 9:06 a.m. Saturday, August 17. Most ran outside to see if a vehicle had hit the building or whether there had been a nearby explosion.


In fact, the jolt was a 4.5 earthquake centered near Aspen Grove, north of Princeton on Highway 5A. The location was defined as 60 kilometres west of Kelowna by air.

Nobody felt the 2.5 aftershock

that followed the initial jolt.

Earthquake activity in the B.C. Interior is generally mild and infrequent. However, during the two weeks preceding the Aspen Grove quake, Spokane area experienced two earthquakes of the same magnitude as the Aspen Grove quake. Although

these quakes are mild, seismologists watch quake patterns of the plateau as these are often forerunners of a major coastal quake.

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PUBLIC COMMENT INVITED ON DRAFT PROJECT REPORT SPECIFICATIONS FOR THE INLAND PACIFIC CONNECTOR (IPC) PROJECT

Prior to completion of the review, under the *Environmental Assessment Act* (Act), of the proposed BC Gas IPC Project - a 237 km natural gas pipeline between Oliver and Huntingdon and four new compressor stations - the proponent must submit a project report with further information. The additional information requirements are documented in draft project report specifications available for public comment.

The application and draft project report specifications can be viewed at: Environmental Assessment Office (EAO) Project Registry on the 2nd Floor, 836 Yates Street, Victoria, BC; on the EAO Web site at www.eao.gov.bc.ca; and at local satellite repositories identified on the Web site. A public workshop to discuss the specifications is being planned for the evening of September 10, 2002 in Abbotsford. Watch for details on the EAO Web site.

To ensure that public issues are considered during the environmental assessment review process, the public is invited to submit comments on the draft specifications between August 20, 2002 and September 19, 2002. As required by the Act, all comments will be available to the general public through the EAO Project Registry and Web site as originally submitted, unless a request is made to keep personal addresses and phone numbers in confidence.

EARLY RETIREMENT PENSION PLAN OPTIONS

A matter you'll need to address if you decide to retire early is your company pension plan. You generally have two options upon termination: you can remain with the pension plan and receive a pension at retirement, or you can have the funds transferred to a "Locked-in" RRSP plan, i.e. opt for the lump sum commuted value. By staying with the pension plan, among other benefits, you'll be guaranteed a lifetime income and need not worry about the management of the funds. Your pension will usually provide a lifetime survivor benefit for your spouse, and may provide inflation protection. By transferring the funds to a locked-in plan, you have the ability to postpone receiving your retirement income until age 69.

Furthermore, you will be able to control the management of the funds and select appropriate investments. With this option, the spouse can roll the entire value of the locked-in plan to his or her own RRSP at the plan holder's death. It should be noted however that opting out of the pension plan might mean that you forfeit group benefits such as dental, health and life insurance coverage. Council reacts to Courier "Dogpatch" label

A recent article in the Kelowna Daily Courier referring to the Similkameen Valley as a "remote dogpatch" has generated a strongly worded response from Keremeos Council.

"We've started with registering a formal complaint with the BC Press Council," says CAO Bob Lafleur, "then with the Tourism Ministry."

The letter to the Press Council, a copy of which will go to the Courier, states in part, "the article defecates our community specifically with remarks that are total-

ly unnecessary and insulting."

A letter to Honourable Stan Hagen of the Ministry of Sustainable Resources (Tourism) says the article "is damaging to tourism in B. C."

Both letters are signed by Mayor Robin Lee.

Lafleur says Keremeos Council will likely attempt to form an alliance with Princeton Town Council to combat the problem.

"The article in question gives out a bad impression," Lafleur says.

Council hears zoning concerns


A Public Hearing on a zoning amendment application was conducted during the August 12th meeting of Village Council.

Three residents spoke against the amendment, mostly citing parking and traffic concerns. Another resident supported the application.

A special meeting of Council held August 14th saw the zoning amendment receive third reading. Another special meeting will be held this week to give the amendment final adoption.



Pick the right backpack

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

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Model friendship for your child

Susan Polis Schutz, a poet, once wrote, "A friend is an extension of yourself, without which you are not complete." We often think of "peer pressure" only as a negative influence, but we can also think of time spent with friends who model healthy behaviour as peer pressure. Our kids may need our guidance in choosing friends who model responsible behaviour, but remember to examine your own friendships before you examine your child's.

The best way to encourage children to choose positive, healthy relationships is to model them ourselves. Take out an old yearbook or photo album. Look at pictures of the friends you had as a teenager. Think about the friends who acted in ways you admired. Most people can remember at least one person who always sensed when things weren't going well and called, sent a

note or showed up to find out what was wrong. Often, these people turned out to be lifelong friends.

How about people who weren't such true friends? Those who rumoured or talked behind your back? Did you have a friend who tried to get you to do things you weren't comfortable with and did not want to do? The pain of these experiences often teaches young people a lot about how they want to be treated by others.

No one forced you to like people who were good to you, or feel angry about people who hurt you. You had to make your own choices about who your friends were. In the same way, we cannot control who our kids choose as friends. They are exploring their world, themselves, and the people around them. Sometimes they're attracted to people we don't approve of (and deep inside, they probably don't approve either).

If we model responsible relationships, talk to our children about how others act, and are involved in their lives, gradual-

ly they'll see that friends who act, talk, and think in positive ways will bring out the best in them.

Get to know your child's friends and their families. Point out what you like about them. Include them in family activities. Share your values with them and ask them about theirs. Don't jump to conclusions based on what friends look like. Be honest with your child when you are concerned about a relationship. Talk about your childhood friends and why some friendships ended.

Do not be afraid to discuss with your child which friends they most want to be like and why. What bothers them about some of their friends and why? How do they feel when you are with your friends? Do they bring out the best in them?

Remember - young people are more likely to grow up healthy when their best friends model responsible behaviour.


New Principal takes charge at John Allison

Sponsored by local Christian churches, SonCanyon River Adventure involved primarily lay people in presenting chil-


dren with an opportunity to learn the lessons taught in the Bible.

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

What type of personality do you have?

If you paid a professional counsellor to give you advice, one of the first things the counsellor would try to determine is your personality type. A widely accepted way of determining personality is the American DSMIV, a book counsellors use to determine which of the 16 personality types influences you most. The are descriptions such as "Conscientious", "Aggressive", "Devoted" and so on.

In coming weeks, the News Leader will describe these for you, and you can decide for yourself which of these categories fits your personality type. Remember, each individual is made up of several types, with one of the types dominant. So you could be a Dramatic type with a strong influence of Conscientious and Aggressive. The other thing you should remember, when reading these descriptions, is personality can change, character is less changeable. For example, you may be an Aggressive type and a habitual liar, but although you could change to an Idiosyncratic type, you would still be a habitual liar until that character flaw is treated.

No personality is without its problems, and if taken to extremes, or not modified by other personality types, can enter an area called "personality disorder".

Let's take a look at Conscientious Personality Type.

Anytime you meet an achiever, you can count on their having a strong streak of Conscientious personality type. Conscientious people take pride, pleasure and comfort in achieving. They like work. When they go to extremes, they are called workaholics. Stress, for them, is having nothing to do, no goals in life, and a feeling of being useless.

If any personality type could be said to be programmed for success, it is the Conscientious type, simply because their lives are organized, scheduled, goal-directed, and achievement oriented. They make great providers for a family, whether male or female. You can depend on them to do their duty, and to be morally upright and ethical, because Conscientious people have a conscience.

They can feel guilty about the chores they did not have time to do, and getting them to relax and forget about their obligations is almost impossible.

Conscientious types are emotionally stable, but getting them to say "I love you" frequently is difficult. If they say it once, their mates are supposed to be reassured it will not change. At the same time, they will not leave a mate until pushed away, and this is painful for them. Often, they choose emotionally expressive mates to fill the gap of their own lack of emotional demonstrativeness.

Conscientious people need to be "right" and do things the "right" way, and they will tell you why their way is right - it is more efficient, more appropriate, or some other such definition.

As workers, they often appear more ambitious or smarter than others. This is because they pay attention and do their homework, not because they are more ambitious or more intelligent in !. However, if you measure their "common sense" quotient, you will find they have a lot, and are practical.

If you have a Conscientious boss, this person will expect you to go above and beyond the call of duty, but you may find they have trouble making snap decisions, setting priorities, and delegating responsibility. Their top priority is always "get the job done, and do it right". They hate to be interrupted in their work, and are excellent at completing one task before beginning another. They can stay focused for hours! If you want to make a good

impression, always arrive a little early for work. They hate tardiness!

A Conscientious friend or parent will always be there for you when needed, but will not necessarily give you emotional support, but they will find practical solutions to your problems.

Look for the food fat fighters

Prune plums are on the market now, and are an excellent source of potassium, which is necessary to keep blood pressure down. As well, these plums contain soluble fibre, like apples, helping to reduce cholesterol. Everybody knows prunes keep the bowels regular, but few people know prune plums do the same thing, and are sold in bulk for preserving. They are one of the easiest fruits to preserve. Just wash them in hot water, poke each one with a darning needle, stuff them in a sealer, throw in a little sugar, fill the jar with water, put the lid on, and process until bubble boil from the bottom of the jar. Simple?

Pears are the next big cholesterol fighter. They contain lignin which traps cholesterol molecules in the intestine before they go into the bloodstream. As well, pears improve bowel regularity, preventing constipation and bowel cancer. You can make pear sauce, pear butter, or just preserve pears, but eat as many raw as you can. They are the best cholesterol fighters.





5. In the absence of competition in any class, judges will give awards as they deem worthy. No prizes will be awarded if judges decide an exhibit does not meet standards. Judges' decisions are final. If no category is available, an exhibit may be entered for display only.
6. Every effort will be made to ensure safety and security of exhibits, but Princeton & District Fall Fair Association will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident in connection with exhibitors, exhibits and property.
7. Persons handling livestock do so at their own risk. Exhibitors of animals, machinery and other exhibits likely to cause accident, injury or damage to them-

selves, property or persons shall guard and control their exhibits.

8. Horses are permitted in the paddock, track and infield only.

10. Judges only will be permitted in the exhibits area while judging is done.

11. All classes listed will be judged, and new classes may be established.

12. Exhibits in canning, baking, honey, fruit, egg, and flower divisions will be auctioned at 4:30 p.m.

Livestock Exhibitors**

2. All animals must be in good health, free of all parasites (e.g. lice, keds), free of open sores and wounds. Unhealthy animals will be removed at the owner's expense.
3. All animals will be inspected for infectious disease and/or other contagious and harmful conditions by the Livestock Chairperson and/or appropriate representative. This person has the authority to disqualify any infected animal and demand the immediate removal of the animal from the fairgrounds (this applies to ringworm and unsightly warts as well).
4. Barns, cages and coops will be inspected daily before 10:00 a.m. If any animal or bird has been neglected, the inspector will have the situation corrected at the owner's expense. (\$5.00 per animal or bird).
5. Exhibitors must furnish their own bedding and feed. Exhibitors are responsible for the welfare of their animals and birds at the fairgrounds. Three animals of the same breed are required to make a class. If there are not enough animals to make a class or breed class, they will be combined with a related class.

- * Remove all glass, plastic, lights, chrome trimming, hubcaps and trailer hitches
- * Remove all upholstery except front seat
- * No reinforcements are allowed to frame, body or bumpers except for driver safety cages.
- * In place of windshield, solid metal brace must be attached from roof to dashboard to prevent the hood from entering driver's compartment. Optional: heavy type screen may be allowed in front of driver to replace windshield
- * Fire extinguisher must be in driver's compartment and fastened securely

Fuel tanks:

- * must be relocated to back seat area and fastened securely
- * shielding must be installed between fuel tank and driver
- * the original fuel tank must be removed
- * a hole may be cut in the floor under fuel tank to allow fuel to run out of the driver's compartment if fuel is spilled
- * metal jerry cans, boat tanks, or snowmobile tanks are acceptable
- * no more than 5 gallons of fuel allowed in car
- * wiring or roping fuel tank is not considered secure

Battery – must be relocated on floor of front passenger side and fastened securely (not roped or wired) and must be covered

Radiator – must remain stock and in original position

Doors

- * all doors must be chained or welded shut
- * driver's door must be painted white (or black if vehicle is white)
- * driver's door must be reinforced (concrete, steel bars or a combination of both - If concrete used, must be 2/3 full. Steel bars must be at least 1/2 inch thick by 6 inches wide and must not extend more than 6 inches past the driver's door
- * number must be on front doors

Bumpers -must be stock, chained to car

Hood - all cars must have hoods and trunk lids, hoods must have an 18 inch hole cut above air filter for fire access, hoods and trunks must be chained but accessible for inspection.

Transmission coolers allowed.

Exhaust can be cut 3 inches from manifold, or re-routed through hood or roof

Tires – no larger than passenger-size stock tire, no studded or snow tires allowed, no sand or fillers in tires allowed.

No passengers are allowed in car.

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Home Canning Division

Rules

1. Any canning jar may be used (jars previously used for brand name products disallowed). Seal & ring must be free of rust and residue and jars must be clean and labeled. **Jars must have new safety seals.**
2. Canning must have been done since Fall Fair 2001.
3. One entry per class per exhibitor

5. Non-acid foods should be labeled as to type of processing (e.g. pressure cooked or not).
6. Tasting will be at judges' discretion. Canned fruit, vegetables, meat and fish will not be tasted.

Raise gasoline taxes? Aren't things bad enough?

One of our members of Parliament introduced the idea of increasing taxes on gasoline. Fortunately, the Minister of Finance decided he was not interested, but we can surely question the wisdom of such a move, and hope nobody else raises the same dumb idea.

There is some kind of blind spot in government when it comes to taxation of essentials like gasoline. The cost is direct and the impact is felt immediately, but as usual, it hits the poor harder than the rich.

First, every increase in the cost of gasoline impacts everyone who drives to work. The increase becomes the cost of going to work and further discourages those whose jobs scarcely cover their living expenses. There are people who would argue that everyone should be using alternative ways of travelling to the job, but the layout of cities, and the required travel in rural areas, makes alternative transport nearly impossible. Few of us live within walking distance of our jobs, many of us need a vehicle as part of our employment qualification, and those who could ride a bicycle to work take their lives in their hands in city or backroad cycling during rush hour. Further, an increase in the cost of taking a bus is another impact of increased gasoline costs.

The second impact of increased cost of gasoline comes with the products we buy that are brought to us from other areas. Whether it is a box of cereal, a litre of milk, a green pepper or a newspaper, the cost of the products will increase with the increased cost of production and transportation.

The third impact of increases in gasoline costs is on tourism. Tourists are on the road, whether in automobiles or buses, and any increase in the cost of gasoline will affect the amount they budget for travel. As most of our tourists are Canadians from other locales, the increases hit their wallets all year, then hit harder when they plan to go somewhere.

We now pay forty percent tax on every litre of gasoline. Is that not a big enough detriment to our economy?

lush meadows, the most north-western section of the Sonora Desert and agricultural land that can be equally compared with any other fertile productive area in Canada.
