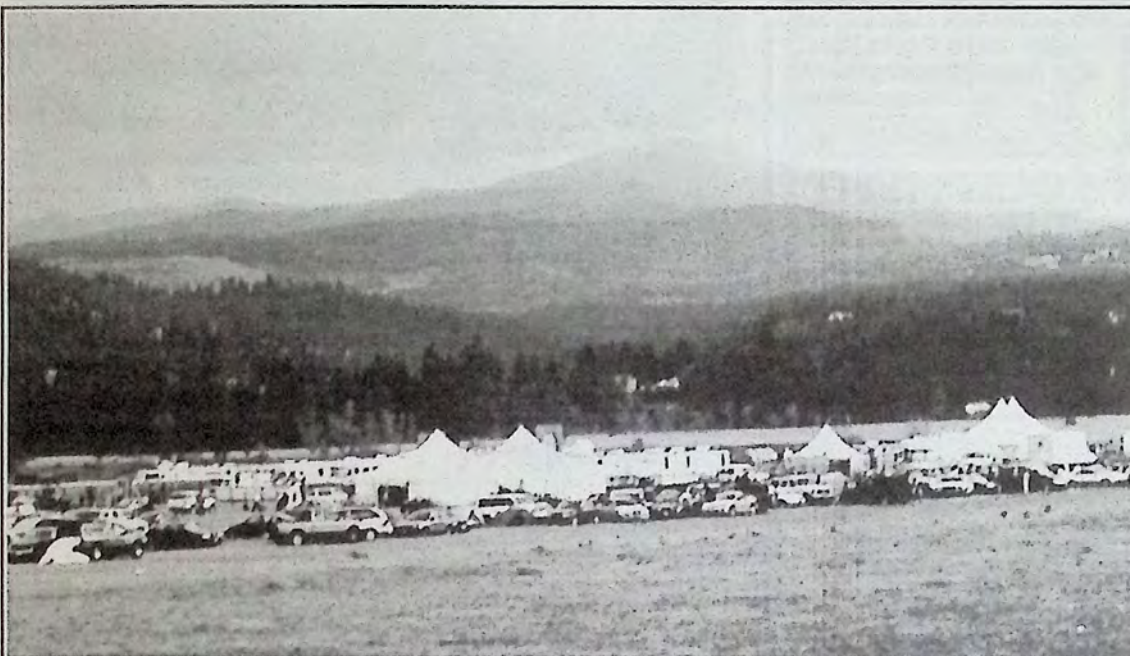

Concert raises issues

- local citizens complain



If anyone had any complaints, it should have been the people who suffered through the cold wind that blew across the airport all night, raised the dust and overturned tents. This photo, taken Sunday morning, shows rain on the way as a steady stream of vehicles left the site. The rain never fell.

The Civilization Project concert brought a lot of complaints to Town Hall last week. Some local citizens heard it was a "rave" and had a lot of concerns about it. Others were concerned about it being at the airport and having the airport closed. Some were concerned the noise would keep them awake all night, or the security for the area would be inadequate.

The real issue appeared to stem from Town Council not making a public presentation about the event and telling residents what to expect.

The concert went well, so far as all of the issues went. Security was good, the noise level was not extreme, and the airport was not closed.

The promoters may have been disappointed at the estimated 1,500 who came to the all night show. Some of those who attended were disappointed with the wind raising the dust and tipping over tents, but all in all, everything went well.

Many vendors will be at the Fall Fair

Ross Chaston, manager of the vendors booking for the Fall Fair this weekend, says there are more than 30 booked. Closing date for bookings was August 28, and he had to turn away a couple of potential bookings due to lack of suitable space.

Chaston says there is a wide variety of vendors. There are food vendors, in addition to the Fall Fair concession, and Overwaitea is selling corn on the cob as a fundraiser for Princeton General Hospital.

There will be sales of jewelry, hats, shirts, western wear, bird houses, books, jams and jellies, woodwork, blankets, honey, hair-dressing products, spas, water treatment, portable fire pits, small trailers, music products, farm equipment, magnetic products, water filter and treatment products and donuts.

Similco may be sold soon

Some of the Similco Mine property may have a new owner in mid-October. Imperial Metals has reached an agreement to sell the mine workings on both sides of the Similkameen River and the mill site for \$450,000.

Pierre Lebel, President of Imperial Metals, said he could not, at this time, divulge the name of the company making the offer as the sale is in the "due diligence" stage, and there is still the possibility the sale will not be completed.

At the same time, Lebel said, "If it goes through, I think it will be positive for Princeton."

He indicated the company would not be re-opening the mine but would be engaged in other activities.

Imperial Metals will not be selling land holdings suitable for development for residential or rural smallholdings.

Worthington passes away

Theodore (Ted) Worthington, well-known for his charitable work in Princeton, passed away on Wednesday, August 28, in Penticton Regional Hospital at the age of 73.

Worthington moved to Princeton during the 1970's, and worked at the mine and sawmill before retiring. He met his wife, Katie, at the mine, and settled down on her family's ranch, where he spent his retirement years.

Joyce Fraser retires

Pelly takes charge of Community Services

Joyce Fraser, Executive Director of Princeton and District Community Services Society, begins her first week of retirement this week. She will be replaced by Lynn Pelly, who has been employed at Community Services for the past 15 years, and has been Assistant Executive Director for the past two years.

In making the announcement of Fraser's retirement, the Board of Directors of Community Services said Fraser's 29 years as administrator were "exemplary and dedicated service". The Board went on to say, "Joyce has worked tirelessly on behalf of the elderly and disabled throughout her illustrious career. Her vision of a continuum of care for the most vulnerable of our population has resulted in a

level of care within our community that is unparalleled."

The Board credits Fraser's leadership for bringing Community Services from "humble beginnings" to a "major non-profit organization employing 50 staff and more than 14 different programs".

Programs run by Community Services at this time include Home Support, Meals on Wheels, Adult Day Centre, subsidized housing, New Beginnings Day Program, Mary Anne Apartments. In the past, Community Services ran the Mini Chef Restaurant, purchased by BelAire Restaurant. The programs and housing developed by Community Services have become models

for other communities, and the Board gives credit to Fraser for her vision in meeting the needs of the elderly and disabled. She has agreed to continue as an advocate for this segment of Princeton area residents. The Board is pleased she will continue in this role as her knowledge and expertise will be invaluable in assisting the Board with changes taking place in health and social services.

The board wishes Fraser good health, peace and happiness in her retirement.

On September 1, Lynn Pelly officially begins her job as Executive Director. Pelly began working for Community Services in 1987 as a bookkeeper.

"It's a great organization," Pelly says.

In her new position, Pelly has no plans for any changes. She keeps accounts for 14 programs, and is well-versed in the activities of the organizations and the financial structuring of the programs. She feels changes will take place as a result of government policies, but feels Community Services will find ways to adapt.

Pelly's major concern is the need to find suitable housing downtown for aging disabled clients. The need for this type of housing prompted Community Services to submit a proposal to government late last year, but there has been no response to date.

Pelly has resided in Princeton for 40 years, and raised her family here. She is well-acquainted with people in the Princeton area.

unusual on the part of the Ontario government to take this step."

He is referring to the appointment of supervisors to three Ontario school districts to see the district budget is balanced.

"That's good if all you care about is money," Comeau told the News Leader. "If dollars are driving the system, then student achievement is on the back burner."

Comeau feels sure the Ontario school trustees placed student achievement first, and were willing to risk losing their power.

"The school boards still exist, but they have no spending authority."

Comeau believes the Ontario government is making a mistake. He points out that New Brunswick went through a similar situation, and it resulted in voters replacing

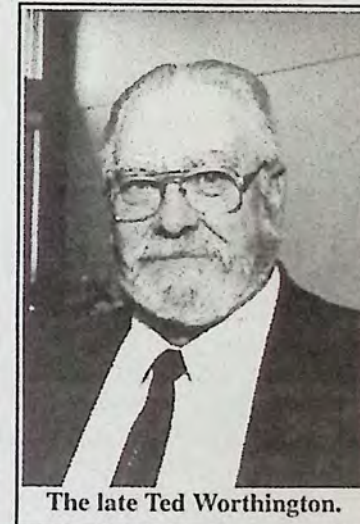
the provincial government.

"School boards are the oldest form of elected government in Canada," Comeau recalls. "School boards were formed by local people to see their children were educated, and this was before Confederation."

B.C. faces "phenomenal short-falls" in the next three years, but Comeau is convinced local people are best suited to meet local needs. The provincial government must be responsible for the cuts to budgets, but local boards can keep the impact minimal, Comeau believes.

"Each community is unique," Comeau observes. "Local governments can meet the exceptions. Accountants can't do that."

Coalmont, Hedley and many rural locations.

For many years, Worthington was Chair of the Board of Directors of Princeton and District Community Services Society and was a consistent advocate for those in need.

Worthington was too young to join Canadian forces when World War 2 began, and made his way to the United States, where few questions were asked of the 15 year old from Greenwood, B.C. who wanted to join the Navy. He served in World War 2 and the Korean War in the Air Division of the U.S. Navy. He received three Purple Heart medals, one Meritorious Service medal, one Military Merit medal, and one Navy Air Service Star.

Following his distinguished military service, he went to work for Boeing Aircraft in Seattle, then returned to Canada, where he had a florist shop in Harrison Hot Springs before moving to Princeton.

As she retires Fraser looks at past and future careers

Joyce Fraser says her career with Princeton and District Community Services began at her kitchen table. Her initial planning took place there, along with writing her application for a Local Initiatives Program grant.

Thirty years have passed.

"Developing Community Services was much like writing a book," Fraser told the News Leader. "Each chapter had a life of its own, with the characters, trials, and struggles, the bad guys and the good guys."

She recalls "many special people who crossed our path at exactly the right time were there by divine appointment. Each program had a humble beginning, but the goodness of people shone through with money, time and talents."

What started so humbly in a renovated broom closet in the Court House would become a model for the rest of British Columbia. Fraser likes to laugh about how Community Services moved from the broom closet to the former jail and then to the old mine rescue building.

A local magistrate, who was also the local mortician, stormed into Fraser's office when she applied to lease the mine rescue building. He wanted it torn down and made into a parking lot.

"Over my dead body!" Fraser said to the mortician.

The mine rescue building is still in place. It became a drop-in centre, then The Achievement Centre, then Mini Chef Restaurant, and was sold to Dave Anderson for his Belaire Restaurant.

Leading the way was no problem for Fraser or Community Services but it did have its drawbacks. There are no guidelines for leaders. Ten years before the closure of a facility in Kamloops, Fraser urged the Board of Directors to take people out of the facility and put them back into the community. They began with Mary Anne Apartments, where six people found a new home and flourished despite being developmentally disabled.

Fraser insisted they be educated, and they have learned to read and write, as adults, as well as learning life skills. More came when Mary Anne Court was built, and once again, Princeton's Community Services became the model.

Fraser had been an unemployed beautician when she began. She decided to study Social Work and attended classes, and studied through distance education. As well, she and the Board made it possible for local people employed by Community Services to earn certificates to qualify for better positions.

As time went on, concern for the plight of the elderly became a priority project called supported housing. Again, Community Services led the way, and it took

10 years to convince the various government ministries they could work together. The result was Vermilion Court, which is a model for the entire province.

The winds of change are blowing through Community Service, not only because Joyce Fraser is retiring, but because government changes are taking place.

"I pray that Community Services will weather the changes and remain the sanctuary of hope for those who need it," Fraser says.

Would Fraser do it all over again? "You bet! In a heartbeat!"

Fraser credits the success of Community Services to the fact it

was motivated by love.

"Love embraces all times and places."

She offers some advice to anyone undertaking a big project, "Think big. We are only limited by our own vision of what we can accomplish. Aim high and believe."

Fraser looks forward to continuing as a volunteer advocate for the elderly and disabled.

"Who knows what may come? I can't wait to see what's next!"

For now, she is pleased to have the time to spend with her husband, Austin, and do family and neighbourhood things.

WHAT KIND OF INVESTOR ARE YOU?

To invest with confidence, you need to understand what makes sense to you when buying stocks. What's a fair price? What's value? What strategy best fits your nature? Let's take a quick tour of three strategies you've probably heard about: value, growth and price momentum.

Determining which one best suits you may help you make the best choice next time we talk about a stock or mutual fund. Value investors try to find the stocks selling at less than they're worth. Warren Buffett is probably the best-known value investor. Value investors dig through a company's assets looking for value that's not captured in its official measure of assets. In recent times, value investors have had a hard time sticking to their beliefs when the "technology" trend took the headlines and the investment dollars. That's because value managers tend to buy stocks when no one else wants them and sell them when everyone else is enthusiastic. Value investing takes time, patience and lots of digging because value stocks can languish for months, and even years. But value investing does reward patience because research indicates that this strategy slightly outperforms the growth style over time.

While value investors count assets, growth investors study how fast a company is growing and don't care how much they pay for growth. They care about earnings momentum. They analyze a company's quarterly growth looking for those that are higher than last year's and in the early stages of a trend. They try to beat the analysts' estimates and outthink value investors. The danger with growth is that investors sometimes get caught up in the belief that it will last forever and get into dangerous territory when earnings start slowing down. The fall can be quite steep. You need to be disciplined enough not to pay too much for a stock, or quick enough to get out at the first signs of trouble.

Price momentum investors care neither about earnings nor about assets. They study the movement of a stock's price over time to discover patterns that will predict the future. They look for stocks rising faster - or about to rise faster - than the market, sometimes through technical analysis. This strategy doesn't work very well in "trendless" markets when the best thing is to sit it out.

If this seems too complicated, that's why I'm here. My role as your Investment Advisor is to help you find your own investment style, to take advantage of the markets and the best investment for those markets. 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Harker's grow hot stuff!

With names like 'cherry bomb,' 'tequila sunrise' and 'hot portugal' it's not easy to tell the difference between a hot pepper and a really hot pepper without tasting them.

That is, unless you know Kathy and Bruce Harker of Cawston.

They have been operating Harker's Fruit Ranch since 1974, the third generation to be involved in the family business. They are also the official suppliers of the jalapeno peppers to be used in the Guinness Book of World Records pepper eating contest during Similkameen Sizzle.

The Harker farm contains about 100 different varieties of hot peppers and 20 different sweet peppers.

When asked why the interest in peppers, Bruce Harker is quick to reply, "They come from all over the world, are available in different sizes and shapes and I love hot!"

Although the habanero is considered the hottest of the peppers, Harker says they grow the birdseye pepper, a gift brought back from the Amazon by a friend who had been doing missionary work there.

Taste tests conducted by staff at the Harker Fruit Ranch claim the

birdseye has the habanero beat. One must bear in mind these unofficial testers eat hot peppers like candy.

If you've ever asked yourself why anyone would subject themselves to such a level of self-inflicted torture with food, Harker explains what fuels the desire.

"The endorphin high from the pain generated by the peppers, creates a rush for many."

In keeping with the theme of Similkameen Sizzle, Harker has transformed his business to high-light peppers. Spices and sauces, spreads and dried peppers are on display.

Similkameen sizzles!

Keremeos Community Event Coordinator Bernice Power has praised area residents for their support of the First Annual Pepper Festival.

"If they can't give money, they give of their time or provide a service that we can profit from," she says, "It's truly becoming a community event."

For example, all raffle prizes have been donated. They range in size from prize packages of product samples provided by sponsor suppliers to \$1000 worth of wood from TL Timber and a carved Honey Bear from artist Earl Martin.

Souvenir t-shirts will also be available. They carry the Similkameen Sizzle logo and theme designed by Power and will be silk-screened at Memorial Park during the event. Cost is \$10.00 each with proceeds to cover some of the costs associated with the Pepperfest.

Vendors from throughout the Valley are invited to participate,

with local artisans already indicating interest.

Power hopes to see local gardeners and canners displaying their peppers, spreads and jellies in categories for judging. She also would like volunteers to step forward to help create pinatas for

children.

"I think the festival will really draw attention to Keremeos. It's going to be an all-out fiesta."

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Dramatic personality type: excitement!

If you have ever watched the television series "Roseanne", then you have seen the Dramatic Personality Type in full bloom. Functioning from emotions and relationships, these people make life seem more exciting than any other type. They can take an ordinary incident of life and turn it into a front page story at the drop of a hat!

Dramatic people are affectionate and demonstrative. Whether male or female, they love to flirt and they demand attention. They need to be noticed, and are full-fledged party animals. Dramatic Personality Types are very conscious of their own image, and consequently put a lot of time and effort into being well-groomed, well-dressed and are often leaders in fashion (it helps them be noticed).

Because they are inspired by emotions, they make friends easily and often move rapidly into relationships.

Dramatic people trust their feelings more than reason, and they are sentimental. They also enjoy scheming and gossip - it makes life more interesting.

It is often difficult to keep up with the emotional shifting of Dramatic types. They can run the gamut of emotions in a single day, which may make them difficult to live with for some other personality types. The Dramatic person's temper may flare, and they may say some really hurtful things, but they will have forgotten about it the next day, although the person at whom their words were aimed may remember the hurt for years.

Dramatic types do not care for details, routines, organizing, planning and accountability. They are not impressed with serious, factual conversation. Highly social creatures, they are gifted with an ability to read other people's feelings.

Romantically, Dramatic types have a natural sensuality and are very charming. However, they do best at the beginning of a relationship, and may believe there is far more to a relationship than is actually there. Another problem is their habit of becoming bored when the initial heat cools down. The need to flirt, to be the center of admiring attention, may lead them into affairs. On the other hand, to keep life more interesting, they may plan parties, holidays, and activities for fun and excitement.

Stress, for the Dramatic type, comes when they do not receive enough attention, admiration or demonstrative affection from their mate. Great stress occurs when a mate or friends demand more responsible behaviour.

Dramatic types experience more stress than other types when left alone. They tend to lack the strong inner sense of self required to sustain being alone, and depend heavily on feedback from others to define who they are. If you ask them to define themselves, they will tell you what other people say about them,

but not how they see themselves.

Problems come to Dramatic types because they have limited self-control. They tend to be impulsive and impatient, they want what they want and they want it now! They have trouble sticking to a diet, a budget, or a schedule.

Jobs Dramatic people do well are jobs in which hunches, emotions, spontaneity, and creativity are assets. On the job, they need a lot of positive feedback, encouragement and emotional support. The creative and performing arts are a natural field of work for this personality type. Social work is a good field too, or any caregiver kind of work, because they respond emotionally to people and like to make people feel better. They must avoid routine, repetitive, assembly-line kinds of work, and anything to do with

details, planning ahead, or managing a budget.

In terms of what society generally calls "maturity", Dramatic types are the least mature of all 16 types. Their difficulty with planning, organizing, and managing, combined with their impulsiveness and lack of self-discipline and self-control, as well as their lack of self-understanding, and their emotional response to all situations, leads them into what is described as "immature" behaviour. They need somebody to depend on, because they are unable or unwilling to be independent enough to successfully manage life on their own. They are "needy" people who may spend a lifetime on earth without ever growing up.

Dramatic types may not want to admit any of this, because, deep down, they are fragile and cannot deal with negative feedback even if it is meant as constructive criticism. We often hear people talk about the "inner child". With the Dramatic type, there is no "inner" child, the child is right out in the open for everyone to see.

Dramatic types really need to develop an "inner adult". With strong influences from the Conscientious or Devoted personality types, the Dramatic type may be toned down enough to maintain successful jobs and relationships. Without these, Dramatic-type lives will be in constant uproar (but they will not be bored!)

Living past 100

Heal faster with the right foods

When we experience a cut, burn, infection, or injury of any kind, our bodies react to the wound in an effort to repair the damage. Eating healing foods can help.

The first thing the body needs to heal any flesh wound is protein. There are many different kinds of protein, and most of them come from fish or meat, but the lowly dried bean is an excellent source of another kind of protein, as are nuts and whole grains. Ideally, a person who wants to heal fast should consume meat, fish and beans. How much should you eat every day? A small steak will provide half the amount you need, and you can make up the rest with other protein-rich foods. When you want to speed up a healing process, you may need double your usual daily intake of protein.

Vitamin C is another essential in healing of flesh wounds. Vitamin C may be obtained from many natural sources. Oranges, strawberries, and sweet peppers are excellent sources. Vitamin C tablets are a good supplement for healing. Older people, and those who smoke, are most in need of a Vitamin C boost.

If the injury includes broken bones, then dairy products should be consumed, especially milk. The milk provides the body with calcium, and the body requires a lot of calcium every day, with extra for healing bone injuries. People who cannot digest milk can take a pill to help. Milk is a good source of protein, too.

Zinc is a mineral that helps tissue grow and repair itself, and although there is some zinc in many foods. Turn to oysters and wheat germ.

For burns and scrapes, plain Vitamin E is a healing boon. Take a capsule of Vitamin E, puncture it and spread the contents on the burn or scrape. This will prevent infection and speed healing. It will help reduce scarring, too.

Randy and Michelle Jensen live on 8th Avenue in East Princeton, and their house was surrounded, in fact, caged, by pine trees. When they bought the house, they realized those trees were going to cause trouble.

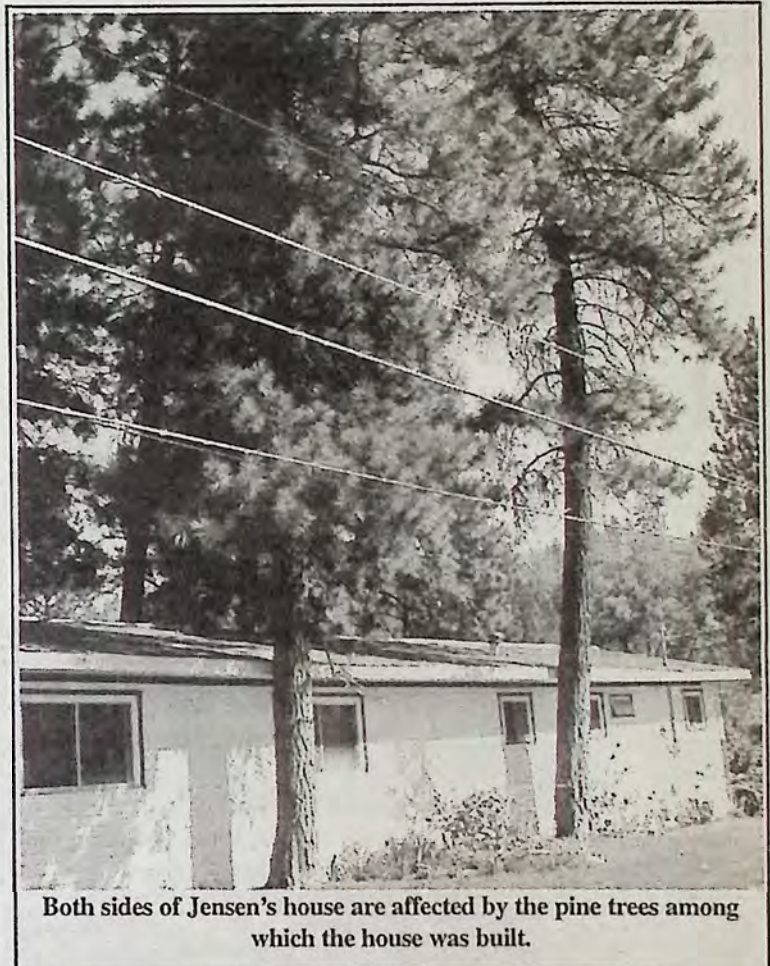
When the house was built by the former owner, he wanted to keep the pine trees, and the house was built within 12 centimeters of the tree trunks. Perhaps he forgot trees grow in width as well as in length. As the trees expanded, the eaves were altered to give the trees space, but this year, the trees were beginning to lift and buckle the roof when they swayed. Present owners faced the challenge of either putting in a new roof or removing the trees, and removing the trees was their favourite option. Not only was removing the trees less expensive (tree removal cost nearly \$3,000), they were free of some of the raking up of needles and cones.

On Tuesday, August 27, Cotter Tree Service arrived to start the job of removing five tall pines right next to the house. Dealing with trees 25 to 30 meters tall was a big job, but by Wednesday evening, it was done, and most of the debris removed.

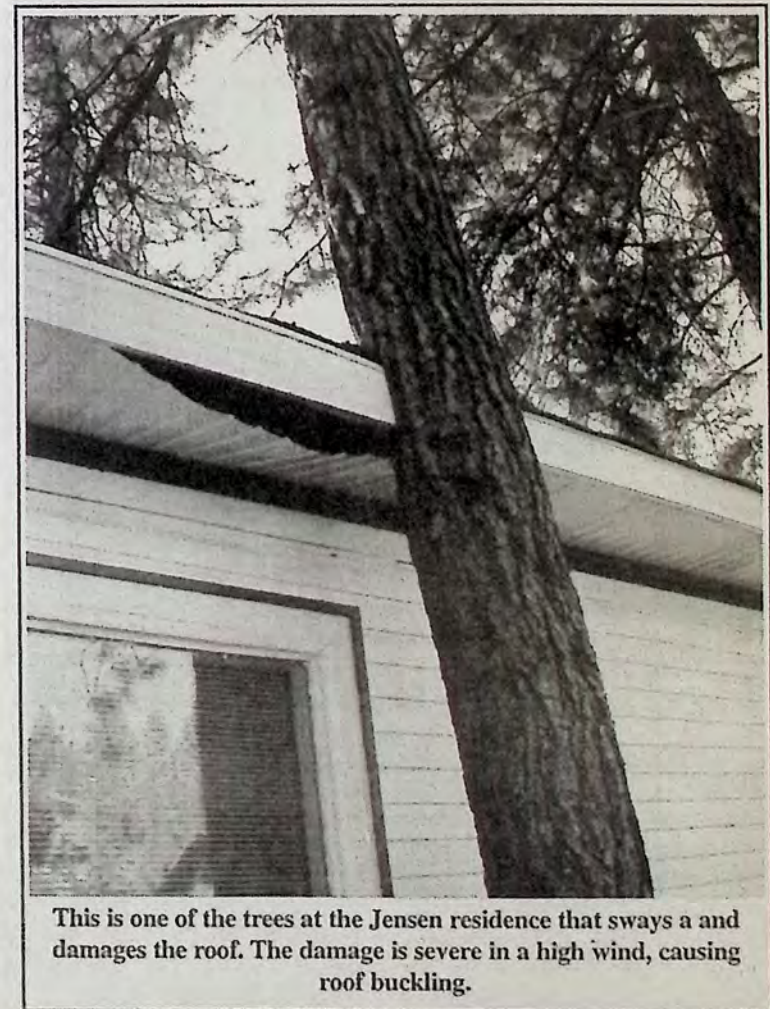
As the tree removal took place, Michelle and neighbours set up lawn chairs in the street and enjoyed being spectators of an interesting event. Some people asked for the tree trunks for firewood, and were encouraged to take them away.

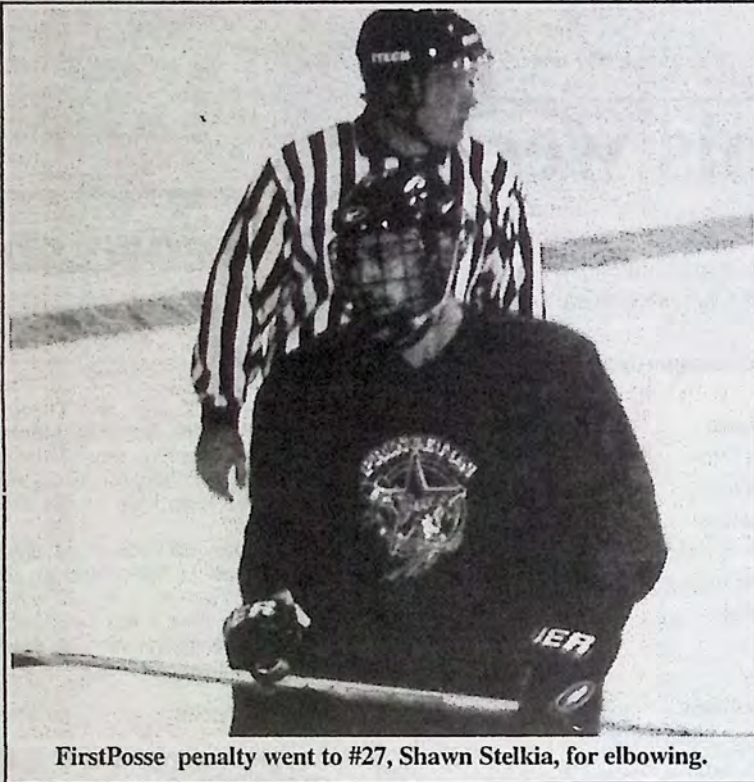

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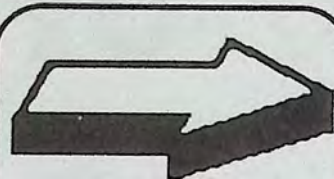

Will supervisors be better than trustees?

As students and teachers go back to class in Ottawa, Hamilton and Toronto, they will do so without a school board keeping an eye on proceedings. The Ontario government has "fired" school trustees in Ottawa-Carleton School District, Toronto School District and Hamilton-Wentworth School District.

The school trustees refused to make any more cuts to the district budget in these locations, and were replaced by supervisors appointed by the provincial government.

In British Columbia, we witnessed the dissolution, by provincial government, of hospital boards. Did replacing these local volunteer board members help keep the budget in line? No, not initially. It took cutting the guts out of health care to bring the budget within the guidelines. Will it take cutting the guts out of public education to bring the provincial education budget within guidelines in Toronto, Ottawa and Hamilton? Is that what school trustees refused to do and why they were "fired"?

There is a major difference between dissolving hospital boards in B.C. and firing school trustees. School trustees are elected locally by local residents. What part of our Constitution of Canada says one group of elected officials can sack another group of elected officials? Do we elect trustees to be employees of the provincial government? No, we elect them to represent us to provincial government.

Our next question is this: if the Ontario government gets away with this, does it happen here, too?

There is a principle involved in this situation regarding taxation without representation. If we pay property taxes for our school district, and we elect local people to administer those tax dollars, and then the people we elected are replaced by a civil servant, should we have to pay property taxes anymore? It is interesting that we can raise this question in regard to activities in Ontario. It was in Ontario, before Confederation, that people fought the battle against taxation without representation. Where is Canada going with this? Trudeau once made a remark about how people fail to notice the ship has changed course when the wheel is adjusted only a small degree at a time.

As I shook hands in Calgary last week with New York City's former Mayor Rudy Giuliani, the memories of my visit to Ground Zero a year ago returned with full force.

Travelling with our Prime Minister last year, in my capacity as Opposition Leader (at the time) we had no way of preparing ourselves for the shocking impact of what we would experience at Ground Zero.

Words fail to accurately convey the mixed feelings of horror, heartbreak, nausea, and anger that assaulted and overwhelmed the senses. One's view of the world and of humanity itself is forever altered at moments like that. Multiply those feelings a thousand times over and you have a sense of the enormity of the challenge which faced Mayor Giuliani as he (literally at times) carried his people through their darkest of days.

Now, a year later, as I chatted quietly with him for a few brief moments, the unmistakable impression that he has changed forever is clear. In his term as Mayor of New York, he reduced crime by 57 per cent, paid down the city's suffocating debt, streamlined bureaucracy, reduced welfare by half, and used zoning laws and high license fees to wash the porn parlours right out of Times Square.

If I hadn't seen it with my own eyes, I wouldn't have believed it. Doing business there each year as Provincial Finance Minister, I witnessed the marvel of urban transformation first hand.

The price, not the singular use of the word, at the four gas retailers in Princeton has been a contentious issue with residents for a long time. With the passing of summer and the lucrative flow of guzzling cars diminishing along Highway #3, now is the time for residents to focus the attention of the cartel that operates at the expense of this small cash-strapped community by saying they are unwilling to continue the way things are at present and enough is enough!

The first problem: here in Princeton at today's date, Thursday, 29 August, the price at all four gas stations pumps stands at 75.9 per litre of regular. With a long weekend ahead, cynical though it may sound, the prices can only go one way - and that doesn't take into account the world price of crude that always seems to get the blame for the increases! For those with access to the Internet, just take a look at www.gastips.com and you will see how our prices in town compare with other communities.

One of the first excuses the oil companies give for profiteering, from those who can least afford it, is their costs of distribution - over 10 cents a litre difference? My heart bleeds pure crude for them! That's 50 cents a gallon - how many gallons does an individual delivery tanker truck haul? Doing calculations on the differential in delivery costs between Hope and Princeton and the differential in pump price, it seems to suggest

anyone with a little common sense that someone somewhere is dealing Princeton a bad hand.

Second problem: like most centres of population, there is a retailing cartel in Princeton.

I cannot argue about the world prices for a barrel of crude but I have to be convinced: all four gas stations in town carry exactly the same overheads. If they are each having to pay exactly the same price for their particular brand of gas, perhaps, heaven forbid, they are being stitched up too! If it is such a bad business to be in, why are there four Princeton gas stations - as we can see with identical prices, they are hardly in competition! How is it smaller retailers, such as at Twin Lakes and Keremeos, are always way below Princeton prices?

For residents of Princeton to boycott our gas stations en bloc would be "cutting off our noses to spite our faces"

BUT what if the oil companies were picked off one by one? Say, first Chevron, PetroCan, Mohawk, Esso - it doesn't matter; the order can be totally random. If after a number of weeks of minimal local trade, remember seasonal holiday traffic having all but disappeared, would the particular chosen boycotted gas station be so keen to fall in line with the prices being charged by its three competitors? Would one be happy to see the others prospering at their expense, especially if the oil company had been paid already for the unsold gas sitting in that retailer's storage tanks? I suggest not - a drop in price, of say, one cent per litre, and the trade would quickly shift to those particular pumps. The consumer would have control and the exercise could be repeated as and when necessary - it's worth a try, isn't it?
