Crash kills three

Three people were pronounced dead at the scene following a bizarre crash 11 km. east of Princeton on Highway 3 at approximately 9:00 p.m. Friday, September 6.

The highway was bare and dry when an eastbound car hit a westbound semi truck and trailer. Investigation indicated the car struck the front left corner of the

truck. It burst into flame. Residents of the area heard a loud bang and an explosive sound, and saw trees ignite near the highway. Princeton Fire Department was called to the scene and fought the fire for a couple of hours.

An Australian couple from Queensland was in the car, dead, and the 61 year old truck driver, from Vancouver, was dead when crews arrived. In addition to the Fire Department and RCMP, BC Ambulance and Highway Rescue attended.

People viewing the scene said diesel fuel was spilled on the highway and damage was done to the Donovan's fence where the truck left the highway, resulting in horses running loose. The crash site was dangerous and chaotic.

Traffic was tied up all night, and much of it re-routed down Old Hedley Road.

Council praises concert promoter

Princeton Town Council was unanimously pleased with the Civilization Project concert held August 31 - September 1 at Princeton airport.

At the September 3 Council meeting, Councillor Kathy Clement reported several business people said the concert was "very beneficial to the community". She felt the security was good at the concert. Councillor Clement complimented administrator Cornie Froese for the way he handled both the promoter and the complaints.

Councillor Keith Olsen said he had heard many complaints at his business, but when the concert was over, people came in to say it was great and were pleased the town did not suffer any "ill effects".

RCMP seize 200 pot plants

Garden plots in the bush yielded a good crop of marijuana but the grower never had the opportunity to harvest it. Members of Princeton RCMP Detachment did the job for the grower. On September 6, they went to several locations in the Osprey Lake area 35 km north of

Princeton on Princeton-Summerland Road. Cst. Chris Newel said the plants were growing outdoors on Crown land in makeshift gardens well hidden by surrounding bush. Police seized approximately 200 plants averaging 1.6 metres in height. They filled several garbage

bags. Currently, one man is under investigation for production of a controlled drug and charges are pending. Princeton RCMP believe one person tended all of the plots, and due to the large number of plants they doubt the production was for personal use only.

Trail dust still bothers tunnel area residents

One year from his first complaint to Town Council, Don Fleming was back on September 3 to make the same complaint. Nothing had been done about the motorcycles and dirt bikes using the TransCanada Trail and raising horrific amounts of dust, which Fleming and his neighbours had to suffer.

As Fleming explained the situation, and what had not yet been

done, it was soon apparent some members of Council believed the matter had been solved, and dust was no longer a problem.

Dust and noise from the motorbikes has been an ongoing problem all summer, Fleming told Council. Not only are motorbikes not supposed to be on the trail, and could be dangerous to others, the dust is a lung hazard for many older residents in the area.

The motorbikes roar up and down the trail between the tunnel and Tri Valley Construction. There is a jurisdiction problem for RCMP, as the trail is not within the definition of highway. That matter must be resolved by government.

In the meantime, Council will meet with Vermilion Trails society to discuss the issue to plan a way to control the situation.

for his remarks quoted in a local newspaper. He said he had had no experience with this size concert, and a few people echoed the concerns he had expressed when he said he was scared. In his view, the people attending the concert were well-behaved and did not detract from the community. Mayor McLean said it was additional business. He expects

the promoter to return to Princeton next year, when it will be as good or better than this year. RCMP Sgt. Warren Dosko attended the meeting, and spoke of the concert. He told Council there were "Three or four minor calls for service". He informed Council there had been five undercover officers at the concert, two from DEA (Minnesota and

Washington) and three RCMP. They had seen little drug use. Sgt. Dosko said concert security was "first class". He appreciated concerns people had about a "rave" but assured Council there was minimal resemblance to a rave.

In terms of benefits to the community, about 20 people were employed, and the price of drinks was boosted, with the additional money going to a local charitable organization.

Council charged the concert promoter \$1.00 for use of the airstrip boundary land and a \$20,000 security deposit for clean-up and extra insurance required. The promoter will receive money left over.



Second weekend fatality

A man was killed in this small grey pick-up just west of Princeton near Wright Road. He was eastbound on Highway 3 when he crossed the center line and crashed head on into a Bronco in the west-bound passing lane. The pick-up rebounded back across the east-bound lane. The driver was removed from the truck by Highway Rescue. Occupants of the Bronco were not seriously injured. The driver of the pick-up died of head injuries. The highway was closed for a short time.

Princeton Highland Dancers are always good, and Glen Esdale was welcome as a piper for them and on his own.

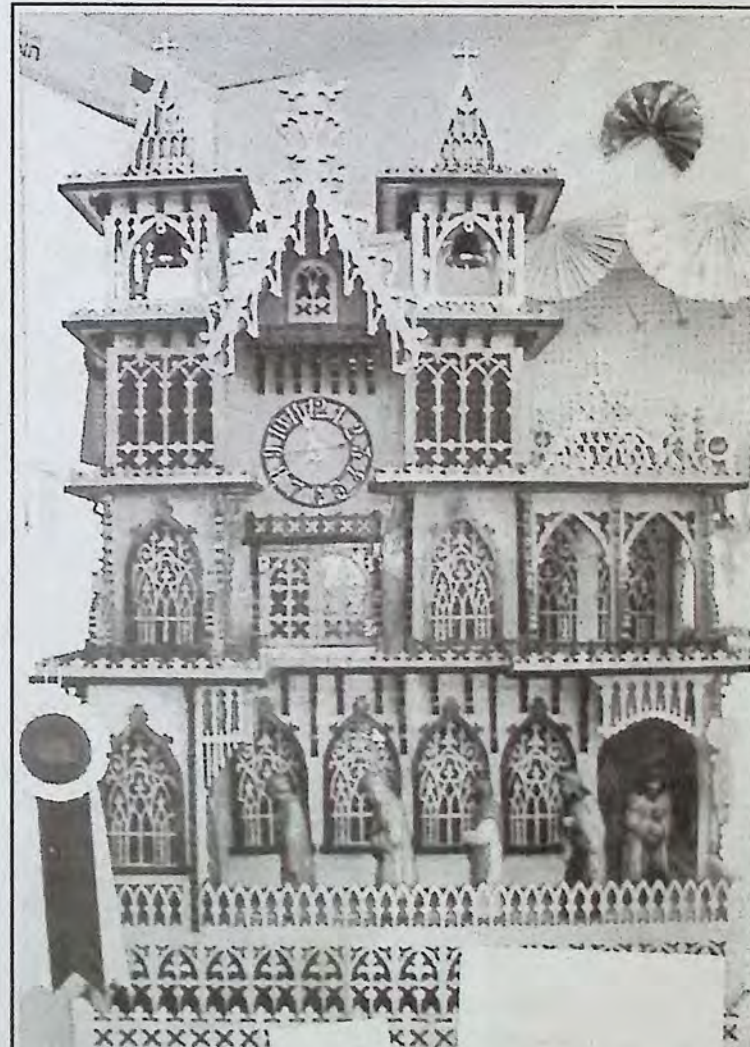
The horseshoe tournament went well (Jack will give us the details for next week's paper).

Youth goes to jail

A Princeton youth was sentenced to 60 days in jail, 60 days open custody, and 18 months probation for crimes ranging from mischief to breach of undertaking.

A second youth was ordered to serve 50 hours of community service work, serve a 14 month probation and make restitution of \$150 for mischief.

Mellow is the only word that adequately describes Fall Apple Day at Keremeos Grist Mill. Apples are the theme, and anything to do with apples is welcome.

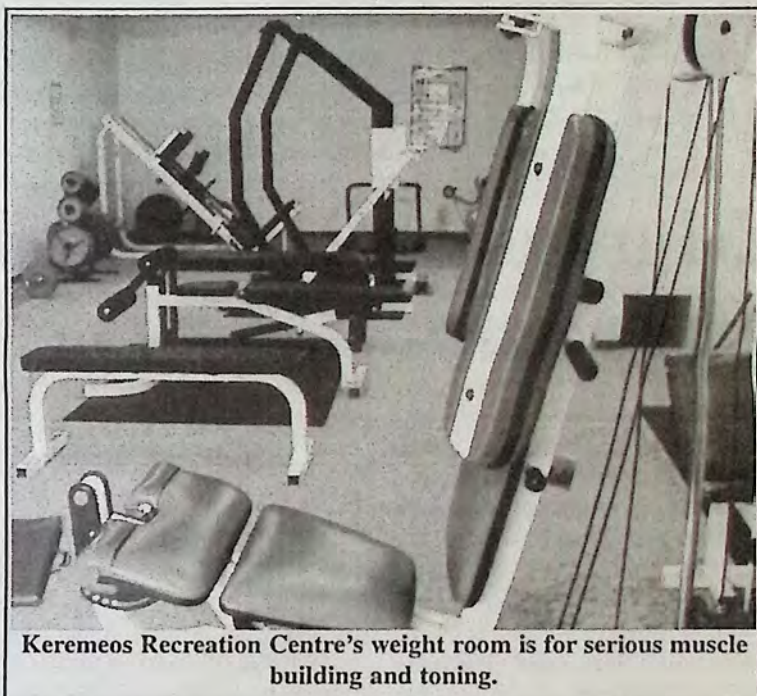

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Solitary Personality type: normal alone

The people who least need anybody else in their lives have a strong element of Solitary in their personality type. What may seem abnormal to a Dramatic type seems perfectly normal to a Solitary type. Living past 100

Pears - the answer to high cholesterol

Most of us eat pears because they taste good, but they are good medicine for people who have high cholesterol. Pears are a good source of the kind of fibre that lowers cholesterol.

Pears contain lignin, an insoluble fibre that helps sweep cholesterol out of the digestive system, so it cannot enter the blood.

This fibre absorbs a lot of water, which helps prevent constipation as well as lowering cholesterol. Pears help prevent colon cancer and hemorrhoids.

With all that good fibre going for it, a pear adds another fibre - pectin. This is what cooks add to jellies and jams to keep them jelled. Pectin is a soluble fibre which forms a coating in the intestines and binds the cholesterol, preventing it from reaching the bloodstream.

Pears have so much fibre they beat a bowl of oat bran cereal!

Pears have something more going for them. They contain boron, a mineral essential to keeping bones strong. It works with calcium and helps prevent bone density loss in older people. Boron does more than keep bones strong, it keeps the nervous system in good condition. This means it keeps the brain functioning well, too. Research done in the United States indicated boron helps people hang onto their memory, be alert, and improves reflexes.

We need the good stuff pears have to offer. Pears are better for you if they are fresh, and they should be eaten peel and all. Wash them well before eating.

You may enjoy canned pears, but they will not be so nutritious. However, if you make pear butter leaving the skin on the pear, and use it as a spread on toast, you will receive much more good nutrition than canned pears that have been peeled. Pears keep well, so there really is no reason to be without fresh pears now and during the winter.

Food can affect learning

Good nutrition is essential for proper growth and development in Children. As the new school year begins, parents become concerned about what their children may or may not be eating during the day. Unfortunately, it is nearly impossible for parents to supervise their children's diet once they leave the house. The following tips may help parents ensure their children's nutritional needs are met during the school year.

* Eat breakfast of eggs, fruit, and whole grain cereals and bread.

* Follow Canada's Food Guide - pack a lunch for your child with something from each food group.

* Provide balanced meals - offer a wide range of tastes and textures your child will enjoy.

Communication is key to healthy family life

Positive family communication is Asset #2. Youth are more likely to grow up healthy when they and their parents communicate positively, and they are willing to seek parents’ advice and counsel.

Lawrence Kutner, Ph.D., psychologist and author of Parent and Child, wrote, “Communicating effectively with a child often requires a parent to combine the deductive skills of Sherlock Holmes with the boundless tact and patience of an ambassador.”

A conversation starts. Your child is upset. You’re tired. Soon, the conversation heats to an argument. Just as it escalates to boiling point, somebody backs away. A door slams. There is silence.

Arguments – we’ve all had them with our children. Sometimes it may feel like most conversations end with a slammed door.

Though it can be challenging to develop the skills, being available for frequent, in-depth conversa-

tions is an important role we play in our child’s life from the time he or she learns to talk up to adulthood. What we have to do is create an atmosphere of communication, an open door.

The trick to open-door communication is that we do not realize we create invisible closed doors. We are preoccupied and don’t pay attention. We’re exhausted, and we nod off in the child’s mid-sentence. We jump to conclusions before the child says things. We assume the worst. We attack our kids for what they tell us, so they close the door next time out of fear or resentment.

Having an open door means having an open mind, an open attitude. It means listening to understand, not to advocate our position. It means being available so that when our children want to talk, we have open ears and an open heart.

A quick tip to remember is to listen more than you talk. Reveal yourself and honestly tell others your thoughts, ideas, goals and feelings. Jump in and actively start a conver-

sation. Don’t wait for others to talk first. Be responsible and take control of your thoughts, feelings and actions. Take responsibility for your behaviour without blaming or shaming others. Be human and share your weaknesses in addition to your strengths to develop trust and closeness.

Talking to your child after a disagreement can be hard, but remember it is okay to disagree. It may be easier to acknowledge disagreement and validate your child’s feelings by naming them. Don’t contradict what you say by doing the opposite.

Watch for hints – a child who hangs around wants to talk. Be available, be open, be willing to drop what you’re doing in order to talk.

One of the best ideas I’ve heard is to date your kids. Schedule time to go out for dinner, go for a bike ride, walk, play basketball in the driveway, watch a movie together, learn a new skill. This is a great time to talk, catch up, and share.

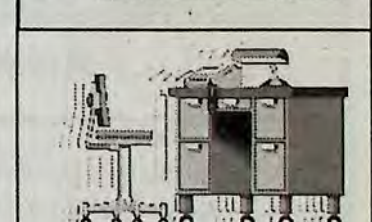
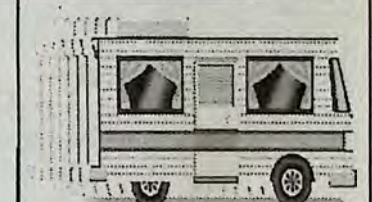

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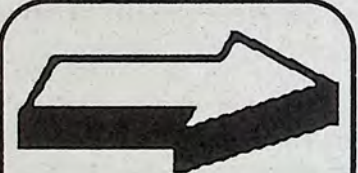

Anniversary inspires media extravaganza

This week is the first anniversary of the Al Qaeda attack on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon. Few of us will forget the images on our television screens as we watched the towers come tumbling down, but this week we will have another dose of it. One channel is running a five hour special!

By the time we finish this week, we will wish we could forget all about September 11. After all of the coverage last year, month after month, and the continuing analysis of why the buildings collapsed, who trained whom to do what, you would think the media had had enough.

Let's face it: this is not about the people who died, it is about American politics. If it were about the people who died, you would see ongoing coverage of the numbers of people who died during the past year on American highways, or the number of people who died in violent street wars, or the number of women who died as a result of domestic violence. Each of these would total more, in numbers of dead Americans, than the number killed by the Al Qaeda attack. However, the ordinary citizens who died on the highway or in neighbourhood or domestic violence is not political, and does not involve an international political stance.

Somehow, in politics, all of this seems to tie into attacking Iraq, which, if it occurs, will surely make the Muslim world adore North Americans and Europeans, right? Could it be that there is something else driving all of this, like the price of crude oil and who has it and who has not? What else might be worth fighting for – what other kind of profit is to be made in the Middle East? Is Iraq standing in the way of something else that means a lot of money to somebody with power? If so, what is it? We need to look beyond the surface of maudlin emotions over September 11 and ask what motivates politics today.

Senators and marijuana what's the connection?

Well, neither is elected both are selected.

Senators are patronage appointees as friends of the Prime Minister, and marijuana is chosen by the people themselves. This could be interpreted as meaning the weed is more democratic than the Senate!

The Senate push for pot decriminalization this week actually reveals one of the great needs for reform in Canada's parliamentary system. Why should a group of unelected, unaccountable political patronage appointees be allowed to foist upon Parliament a question as controversial as this one?

The question, by the way, is an important one. However, it is so important it should be debated and decided by Canadians themselves and their elected representatives in the House of Commons.

And where was the Senate on issues like protecting kids from

pedophiles on the Internet? Or demanding the federal Liberals fix their broken election promise and put an Ethics Commissioner in place in the House of Commons? Or how about finally having a Young Offenders Act that actually works?

One of the more bizarre senatorial suggestions on legalization was that 16 year olds should be given the go-ahead to toké up. Really? It's against the law to sell regular tobacco to anybody under 18, but it should be okay for minors to light up wacky tobaccy? Go figure!

At any rate, the whole question is important, and for that reason, I will do a full constituency survey in the coming weeks to find out what you, the people, would like to see happen.

So far, what I generally hear on the

street is that marijuana for prescribed medical use has support, and that people shouldn't go to jail for simple possession. However, most people, at least to this point, are saying it should not be completely legal. There should be a realistic fine for possession, but put the drug dealers in jail, not the simple users.

And then there are questions like: how do you test drivers for being under the influence of marijuana? And what about the questions be raised by the police associations across the country?

These are the issues on which I need your guidance. I'll be sending everyone a survey or, as with any federal issue, call my office and share your views.

Together, we can come up with solutions for the good of the country. And we'll do it democratically.

A subscriber greets me lately with ideas for my column. He wants me to write about "useless organizations". His first choice was the monarchy.

Government after government fell. When our House of Commons called it quits on a vote of confidence, the news went out around the world. An Italian friend was extremely dis-

tressed and asked what would happen to our country with no government. Would there be revolution? Military coup?

I was astonished - a coup in Canada? Good grief! At that time, my husband was the military and had no plans to take over anything other than his dinner.

A revolution? In Canada? Not likely! The reason none of this was going to happen was due to the fact we still had a government - we had Queen Elizabeth and her right arm in Canada, the Governor General.

For this reason, I am partial to the monarchy and even if we had to pay a lot for it, I would feel the security was worth it. However, we do not have to pay much for the Governor General and nothing for the Queen, except when she visits.

Queen Elizabeth is among the 10 richest people in the world. When she was crowned, she agreed to give all of her possessions to the government of England in return for an annual allowance. The allowance is \$50 million a year, from which she pays a troupe of employees and maintenance costs on Buckingham Palace, Windsor Castle, Balmoral and a couple of houses in downtown London. The main mill is over 100 years old. The water wheel outside the building was turned on and it was thrilling to watch.

Leaving the mill, the group returned to the picnic tables located near the entrance. We were served a good lunch. In the cafe was a gift shop of some interest where some of us bought souvenirs. We then proceeded to Mariposa fruit stand where some got off the bus to buy fresh fruit.

On the way back to Princeton, our helpers started to sing and almost everyone joined in the well-known old songs with pleasant melodies.
