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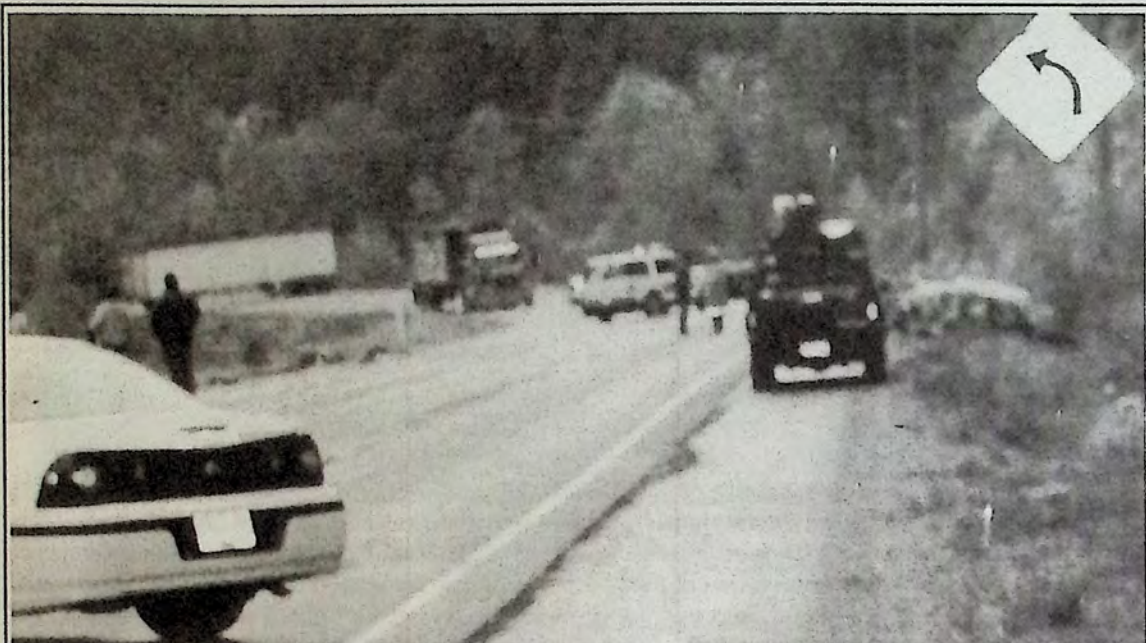

A fatal rainy afternoon crash brought traffic to a standstill on Highway 3 east of Princeton.

Two die in crash

Two people from England were killed in a two-vehicle collision on Highway 3 approximately 20 km. east of Princeton, across from Ilcoola Reserve. The crash occurred on Wednesday, October 2, 2002, during moderate rain. The highway was wet, and the driver of a westbound Honda Accord lost control and collided with an eastbound Ford Focus. Both vehicles ended in the ditch on the side of the eastbound lane, against the bottom of the hill. Debris in the form of vehicle parts littered both lanes of the highway.

Princeton RCMP, BC Ambulance, Princeton Highway Rescue, and eventually the coroner and RCMP accident reconstruction experts attended the scene. The highway was closed until the investigation was complete, and traffic re-routed down Old Hedley Road.

The driver and lone occupant of the Honda, a Nelson, B.C. resident, was taken to Princeton General Hospital and transferred to Penticton Regional Hospital with serious injuries which were not life-threatening.

Area H will vote on library

During the civic elections in November, Area H residents will vote on a referendum regarding joining Okanagan Regional Library service area.

Area H Director Gerri Logan has been in talks with Lesley Dieno, Executive Director of Okanagan Regional Library, and states that if Area H residents vote "yes" on the referendum, Princeton Library will see the immediate benefits of longer hours by an additional \$11,000 allocated to Princeton Library, and an additional \$50,000 allocated for improving Princeton Library materials budget. An information flyer will be circulated to Area H residents in coming weeks.

The crash is still under investigation.

This is the second crash to close Highway 3 east of Princeton in approximately a month. On September 6, a crash 11 km. east of Princeton killed three people and closed the highway overnight.

Victoria names rural ed. task force

A rural education task force was appointed last week. Its mandate is to ensure all B.C. students, regardless of where they live, have access to quality education.

Jim Imrich is Chair of the task force. He is a former superintendent with Prince George School District. He has extensive experience educating students in rural and remote communities.

The other two appointees are Harry Clarke, mayor of Fort Nelson, and Nancy Wells, superintendent of Mission school district.

The task force will consult with people living in rural and remote communities, address and identify the unique challenges faced by students, parents and school boards, and review successful models of rural education in B.C. and other jurisdictions.

Election campaigns begin

All members of Princeton Town Council have signified their intention to run in the upcoming election scheduled for November 16. They will have competition. Ray Jarvis and Fred Leard have declared their intention to run for the position of Councillor. Leard is actively

campaigning with posters. As we go to press, Mayor Randy McLean is running unopposed. School Trustees Gordon Comeau and Ken Heuser have indicated they will seek re-election, but Bob Westran will not. No public declaration of other candidates for school trustee has been made

at this time.

The position of Regional Director for Area H is open for election. Incumbent Gerri Logan stated she filed her nomination papers at Regional District office last week.

Nominations must be in by 4:00 p.m. this Friday, October 11.

Chamber awards contract

Princeton and District Chamber of Commerce has awarded the contract for its new Tourist Information Centre. The contract has gone to Copper Mountain Construction, owned by Chris Rowe of Princeton.

Last week, the site-plan for utilities and parking was drawn up, and construction should begin very soon. Chamber of Commerce President Otto Coers says construction should be complete in approximately nine weeks after the start date.

There is no change to the Tourist Information Centre plans appeared in the News Leader more than a month ago. The building will go where the paved circle is located, in the same area as the former Tourist Information Centre, which was torn down as part of bridge construction.

Coers says the return to the former location is a good thing for Princeton, as the present temporary location did not host as many visitors as the previous location.

"The numbers are really down," Coers told the News Leader.

In fact, the number of visitors welcomed at the present site

dropped by approximately 10,000 during the first year after the Tourist Information Centre was moved. This year the numbers dropped even more, and as Coers points out, "This isn't doing Princeton any good."

The main floor of the new building will be almost entirely Tourist Information Centre. The Chamber of Commerce portion of the building will be in the basement.

The return to the previous site will involve more than just the

building. The grounds around the building will require landscaping and general clean-up, but those chores will have to wait until spring. As the Chamber of Commerce is now renting the Tourist Information premises, Coers sees the need for a move to their own building a matter of financial urgency.

The area where the Tourist Information Centre is to be built is slated for additional development.

OSHRD requests adequate care facilities

Joan Bush, Chair of Okanagan-Similkameen Regional Hospital District, has announced a resolution passed requesting that the Interior Health Authority maintain all existing health facilities and current service level standards in the region.

The reason behind the resolution is the ongoing promotion of the region as a tourist destination and a place for economic development. The Board of Directors of

the Hospital District anticipate health care demands will increase as a result of initiatives in tourism and business development. Health care must be available for residents and visitors.

Bush stated, "The District must meet the needs of its increasing number of tourists, short and long-term visitors, seniors and retirees, families with children, as well as the needs of existing and new residents."

Valley turns to fishy fun

Salmon is on the menu in the Okanagan Valley this month.

The fishy fun begins in Tonasket on Thanksgiving weekend, with the Tonasket Salmon Octoberfest. This event features a jalopy jamboree car show, with an "ugliest rig" contest. The event starts with a parade at 11:00 a.m. October 12. There is going to be a salmon bake, music, dancing and fun all day.

Princeton Town Council has been invited to attend and enter the parade.

The next event is international. Okanagan Nation Alliance is inviting everyone to International Okanagan River Salmon Festival. It begins Friday, October 18, at 6:30 p.m. in Sen'pok'chin School

gym in Oliver area. There will be open house talks and displays, and refreshments.

The following day, Saturday, October 19, there will be streamside habitat tours starting from Oliver Recreation Centre and Park. A 50 ft. salmon tent will be set up, theatre, games, prizes, displays, barbecue lunch available, and a free salmon bake in Oroville, Washington. Oroville hosts activities all day Sunday with their salmon festival.

The purpose of this international event is to raise awareness of the importance of maintaining the integrity of the Okanagan River basin. The Okanagan River supports 50 percent of the remaining wild sockeye production in the entire Columbia Basin. The South Okanagan-Similkameen is one of the four most endangered ecosystems in Canada, and contains over 15 species of exotic fish and aquatic plants.

Victoria reports on B.C. health care

A report released last week by Health Planning Minister Sindi Hawkins gives British Columbians information on the state of their health and the performance of the public health care system. The report is called "How Healthy Are We?" It provides information on everything from life expectancy and infant mortality to surgery waiting times and teen smoking. All provinces released a similar report the same day, and follow-up reports will be done every two years.

British Columbians live longer. The average life expectancy is 80 years, Canada's best. B.C. has the lowest rate of infant mortality and among the best cancer survival rates in Canada. Challenging areas in B.C. include the increasing rate of lung cancer among women and an increase in the number of positive HIV test results.

Home sales show new residents are arriving

Princeton units sold are up 65 percent (from 81 units last year to 134 this year).

South Okanagan Real Estate Board President Janice Barclay, of Re/Max Princeton, states, in her monthly news letter, "In light of events in the financial world, real estate investments are becoming more and more attractive. With low mortgage interest rates, the low cost of housing and continued consumer confidence, we are experiencing a very active fall market."

Oliver and Osoyoos sales are up 60 and 61 percent respectively over last year.

The market value of real estate sold has increased 42 percent. The average selling price of a residential unit in Princeton is \$108,845, and in Keremeos it is \$113,333.

The impact of these sales in terms of population change is yet to be determined, but the indications are that at least 100 homes have new owners and are an indication of new people moving into the area.

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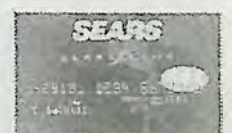

Protecting Your Assets

When considering the possibility of an untimely death, there are many philosophical and emotional aspects to come to terms with. Once these issues are addressed, there are even more considerations from a practical standpoint.

- 2) **CREATE A LIST OF YOUR ASSETS** - In order for professional advisors to assist you in designing an effective estate plan, they will need an accurate list of the assets you own. Your investment representative can provide you with a "Personal Financial Inventory" sheet, a comprehensive checklist you can use when creating an inventory of your assets.
- 3) **MINIMIZE ADMINISTRATIVE DETAILS** - When settling your estate, your family members may find themselves swamped by paperwork. Keeping your list of assets up to date will help, so consolidate your assets and keep a detailed inventory of your securities.
- 4) **DRAFT A WILL** - A will is a written document that provides for the distribution of your property when you die. Wills are important because they allow you to determine how and to whom your assets will be distributed. If you die without a will, the distribution of your estate will be governed by the laws of the province you live in. A will is also important if you have minor children, because it allows you to designate a guardian. Your will needs to be reviewed and updated periodically.

You can avoid probate by passing assets to a beneficiary by contract, such as a life insurance policy, segregated funds or assets that are owned jointly with another person. With proper planning, you can keep the majority of your estate from probate and simplify the process for your heirs.
- 6) **PLAN FOR INCAPACITY** - We've talked about planning for your survivors upon your death, but what if you are unable to manage your affairs while you are alive? A power of attorney for property allows you to designate someone to manage your financial affairs. A power of attorney for personal care allows someone to make certain health care decisions for you if you should be unable to do so for yourself.
- 7) **PROTECT YOUR ASSETS WITH INSURANCE** - Medical expenses in your later years can devour the estate you've worked so hard to accumulate. Even worse, you may end up drawing on your children's or family's resources as you struggle to pay for nursing home care. Critical illness, long term care insurance and life insurance can help. For example, life insurance can protect your survivors from the loss of your earnings capacity and can provide cash for your family to help pay taxes and/or expenses when settling your estate, such as final expenses, capital gains and the taxes on registered assets.

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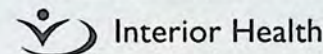

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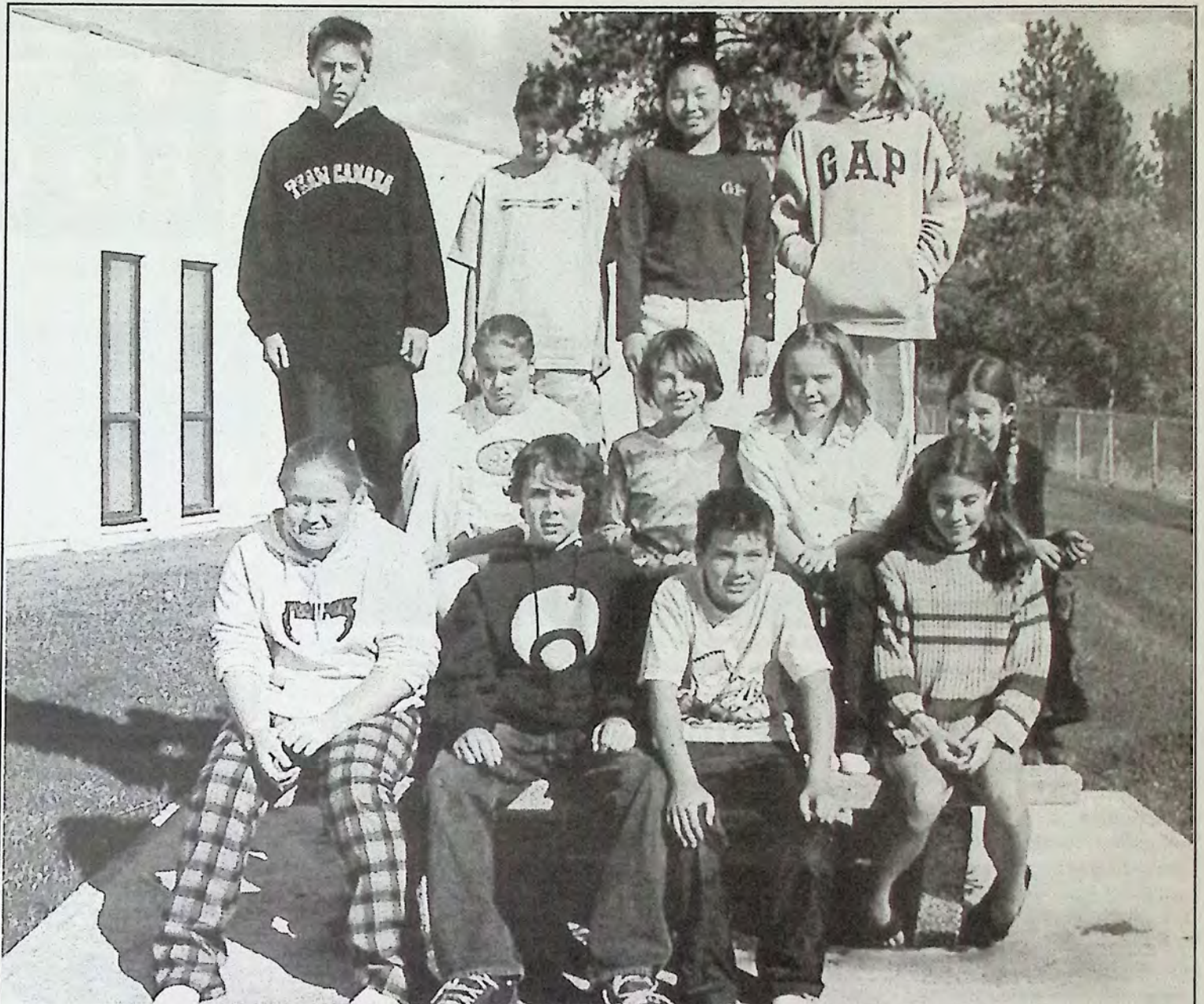

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How safe is your child's backpack?

For many student's, "hitting the books" leads to academic achievement. Students who carry those books in overloaded backpacks may unknowingly predispose themselves to serious health problems.

An increasing body of scientific research reveals an alarming danger associated with improper childhood backpack use. This research stems from the increasing number of reports of childhood back pain in recent decades. The US Consumer Product Safety Commission estimates 7,277 emergency room visits each year result from injuries related to book bags. The CPSC also reports that backpack-related injuries are up 330 percent since 1996. By the end of their teen years, close to 60 percent of youths experience at least one low-back pain episode. New research indicates this may be due, at least in part, to the improper use of backpacks on young spines.

Watch children in any schoolyard struggle to walk while bent sideways under the weight of an overloaded backpack on one shoulder. You will quickly realize the potential danger of this commonplace item. How exactly does carrying a

backpack affect the spine? Common sense tells us a load distributed improperly or unevenly, day after day, causes stress to a growing spinal column. The old adage, "As the twig bends, so grows the tree" comes to mind. There is a growing concern about the improper use of backpacks and the relatively scarce amount of instructional and preventative information available to young people. It is not the pack's fault that kids have not been given the guidelines.

Backpack safety tips:
 * Make sure the backpack is sturdy and appropriately sized. Some manufacturers offer special child-sized versions for children ages 5-10. These packs weigh less than a pound and have shorter back lengths and widths so they do not slip around on the back.

* Consider more than looks when choosing a backpack. An ill-fitting pack can cause back pain, muscle strain, or nerve impingement. You want to have padded shoulder straps to avoid pressure on the nerves around the neck and shoulder. Some backpacks have waist straps designed to stabilize the load. These should be used whenever possible.

* The proper maximum weight for loaded backpacks should not exceed 15 percent of the child's body

weight. For example, an 80 pound child should not carry more than 12 pounds in a pack. If the pack forces the carrier to bend forward, it is overloaded.

* In loading, it is obvious that excessive backpack weight can cause problems. Prioritizing the pack's contents is important. Avoid loading unnecessary items.

Lifting the pack:

1. Face the backpack before you lift it.
2. Bend at the knees.
3. Using both hands, check the weight of the pack.
4. Lift with your legs, not your back.
5. Carefully put on one shoulder strap at a time. Never sling the pack onto one shoulder.
6. Use both shoulder straps. Make them snug but not too tight. Carrying the backpack on one shoulder may be fashionable but can cause long-term neck, shoulder, back and posture problems.
7. Use the stabilizing waist strap around the waist.

One final note, similar to adults, children should be checked by their family chiropractor periodically for spine and joint problems. If your child complains of neck or back problems, have it checked by your family chiropractor.

Auditor commends "solid balance sheet"

Auditor Derek Schreurs, of Cunliffe Schreurs Tupper, gave the financial report for Community Services Society at their September 30 annual general meeting. He commended the society on their "solid balance sheet", and recommended the society "maintain a strong balance sheet" considering changes in government and program funding.

Princeton and District Community Services Society has been in operation for 29 years, and has capital assets totaling nearly \$800,000 and a budget for 2001/02 fiscal year of \$2,822,310.

There were 24 people in attendance at the meeting, and President Joann Gabriel gave a brief history of the society for those who were relatively new to

the Princeton area. She reviewed the early beginnings, when the office was in a small room in the Court House where it was referred to as "the broom closet", to the renovation of the old Mine Rescue Building, and through all of the steps toward an umbrella society providing services and care for the elderly and disabled. She ended by thanking all of the staff, Board members, volunteers and clients, and commented, "It shows what great team building can do!"

Retired Executive Director Joyce Fraser reviewed the highlights of her last year. She advised, "It is very important that we keep abreast of the government changes to services. Rumours are flying, and much of the informa-

tion being passed on is notable for its lack of accuracy. As parents, advocates and concerned members we have an obligation to keep informed about the changing opportunities for our disabled persons."

She suggested a website with up to date information. Community Services will give interested persons the website address (call 295-6666).

It is our combined strength that gives the community substance and our united efforts that make us strong and successful. Each segment of the population is an integral part of the whole.

Each person contributes in his or her own way to the best of his or her ability. One lady keeps an eye on her neighbourhood, knows when someone is away and acts as an informal (but effective) "citizen on patrol". Their stature in the community is such that they would be missed if they were not there.

Princeton and District Community Services Society commends residents of Princeton area who have gone out of their way to make this group so welcome and appreciated, so much a part of the community.

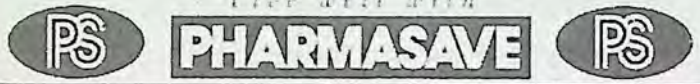
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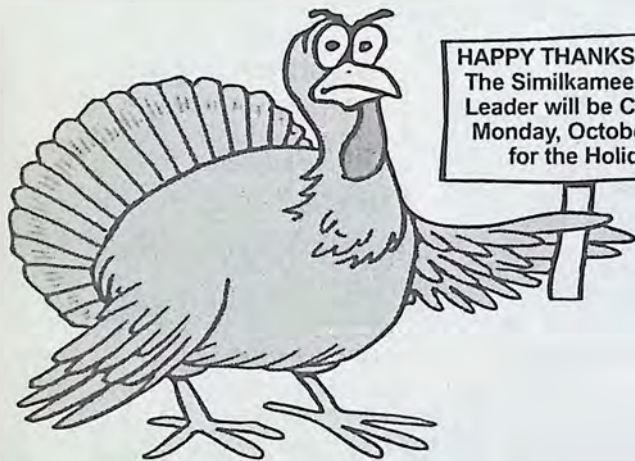

World Food Day lesson: pumpkins grow in farmer's fields

Pumpkins start from seeds and grow in fields.

As obvious as this seems, some children who are totally removed from farms have grown up thinking pumpkins come directly from the big bins at the supermarket.

This fall, a new "Feeding Frenzy" video will help teachers inform children about where their food comes from. It is a fast-paced video produced for elementary school children by the Open Learning Agency. The scene opens in Granville Market, filled with people buying and eating food of all kinds. This sets up the key concept of "How do we provide enough food for all these people?" The young host heads out to local farms to find out what it takes to grow food and to introduce concerns about sustainability and the use of technology.

Viewers see how the choices they make - even buying pumpkins - are a big part of the whole system. BC produces three million pounds of pumpkins (1.4 million kilograms) valued at almost \$400,000 per year.

World Food Day is October 16. It is a time to look at where our food comes from and whether BC farms are sustainable. This video is an excellent classroom resource. To order, call AgAware BC at 1-604-924-4804.

They make the kind of friend you can trust, depend on to help in rough times, to be steady, and to be there. They will not be disappointing because they are unpredictable or flighty or not to be trusted.

Serious Types make good mates. They know the meaning of A "commitment" and do not expect relationships or people to be perfect. They are good providers and responsible parents to their children. They can last a lifetime of trouble and problems, and if you were to ask them how they endured life with so little fun, they will tell you they did not expect it to be fun.

After all of the above, it is worth noting that Serious Types are not unhappy. They may undergo a lot of stress if others try to change them, or push them to be different. In a troubled world where so many people refuse to be responsible, or to honour their commitments, why would anyone want to change a Serious Type?

The answer to that question lies in the need most people have for having a good time, for experiencing emotional peaks, for seeking adventure and so forth. Serious Types are content with work, duty and an orderly life.

Living past 100

Vegetables fight fat

If you are among the millions of Canadians who are overweight or obese, you may feel you have no hope of ridding yourself of your pot belly or your thunder thighs, but you may be surprised to learn you do not have to starve to lose weight. Furthermore, you can be doing some other great things for your health in addition to losing weight.

Gaining weight is not about how much food you consume, it is about the kinds of food you consume. The fat you eat will be the fat your wear. There is another truth about fat: in the process of storing the fat you eat, only three percent of the calories are burned off during the process. If you compare storage burn-off rates, you will discover that 23 percent of the calories in vegetable carbohydrates are burned off in the process of trying to store it as fat.

What this means is that vegetables are a lot less likely to become fat stored in your body. Most vegetables contain few calories per serving. In some types of vegetables, such as cucumbers and lettuce, you actually burn off more calories in digesting them than are in the vegetables! Vegetables provide other food value you need. Vegetables are our primary source of most vitamins and minerals we need. Meat, fish and dairy products provide us with B vitamins, but there are B vitamins in many vegetables.

While we talk about becoming lean on vegetables, we are not talking about vegetables loaded with butter, sauce or cheese. It is what you add to vegetables that put on pounds. Any dieter will tell you mashed or baked potatoes are outcasts, but this is due to the butter or sour cream used on them. Try some of the fat-free sour cream and enjoy potatoes.

Changing the way you prepare vegetables cuts calories. Steamed vegetables are the most nutritious, and taste best. Give up potatoes au gratin, French fries and broccoli with cheese sauce - they are loaded with fat, and the fat you eat is the fat you wear.

Last but not least - you can leave the table feeling full when you eat a lot of vegetables. It is the feeling of starvation that defeats dieters.

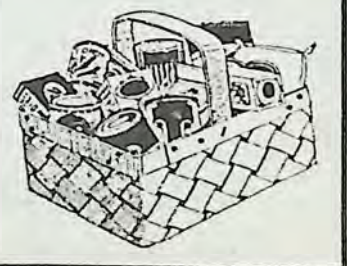

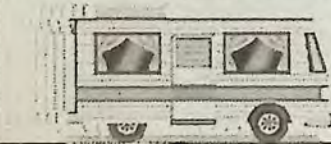

Thanksgiving brings murder to mind

Thanksgiving weekend is our last kick at a summer-like long weekend, and is a time for family celebrations before the long winter begins.

For me, and a few others, Thanksgiving reminds us of murder – unsolved murder. I remember two murders.

The most recent Thanksgiving murder was discovered on Thanksgiving weekend, 1994. Twin infant girls were discovered in the pit of an outhouse at the public campsite at Allison Lake. The newborn babies could have survived, but they were dumped like trash. The murders were a shock to the community, and the search for those involved did not stop for years.

The murderer was never found. The leads in the case never led anywhere solid. The case is still open, because murder cases never close.

Princeton buried the babies in a tiny casket at Princeton cemetery, and there was a funeral service attended by many local people. The entire story was repeated time and again on television, but the case was as cold as the grave. Somebody dumped those babies and appears to be getting away with it.

The other murder I remember at Thanksgiving was a murder in Cawston, on Ferko Road. The murder did not happen at Thanksgiving, but the first missing person report we saw in the newspaper was around Thanksgiving 1984. It was a short article with a photo, asking for information about a missing French citizen.

Florence Otilie Defleurs had been enjoying her vacation from San Diego University by visiting her boyfriend in the Cariboo. She travelled to the Keremeos area in late June to visit friends in Cawston.

Her friends were away when she arrived, and somebody allowed her to stay in the home of a family who was away for the sum-

mer. The house was located on Ferko Road.

Defleurs shopped for a bit of food at a whole food store in Keremeos, and the shop owner was probably the last person to see Defleurs alive, other than the murderer.

The missing person situation was passed up as a young person on the move. The Defleurs case was not a priority investigation. When little progress was seen to be made, Defleurs father, who was an executive with a major French media company in Paris, started to shake up the international authorities.

In the meantime, Defleurs boyfriend consulted a psychic, who said Defleurs was still in the Keremeos area. The Nicholson family discovered a bag containing Defleurs wallet, which she put in with the things she had purchased at the Keremeos store. They found a shawl draped on the back of a chair. Defleurs had been there long enough to leave something behind.

The Nicholson place was searched thoroughly in the spring, and the headless corpse of a female was discovered in the orchard.

Although a man went to trial, he was not convicted.

Recently, as part of the "pig farm" investigation, Keremeos RCMP were asked to share the Defleurs case files. Body parts were stored at the pig farm and Defleurs head was never found. Thanksgiving can be murder.

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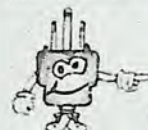
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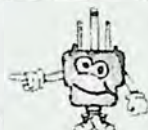
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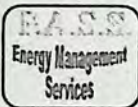

Three cougars sighted in town

Early on the morning of October 3, Gordon and Diane Schneider saw a female cougar and two cubs in their back yard. They reside on a lot along Asp (China) Creek within town boundaries.

The creek is a wildlife corridor, and there is little doubt that the cougars were following deer. Deer have plagued the neighbourhood for several years. Predators will follow the deer into town, and may pose a significant danger to people. For this reason, conservation officers past and present have urged people not to feed the deer, and to discourage the presence of deer whenever possible.

Any further sightings of cougar within residential areas should be reported immediately to Conservation Officer Al Lay at 295-6343. If he is not available, contact Princeton RCMP at 295-6911 or call 911. It is important for the conservation officer to know where the cougars are roaming in the community.

Okanagan sustainability is under review

Progress continues to be made on the "Green Sustainable Economic Development" initiative of Okanagan-Similkameen communities. The three Okanagan Regional Districts, the Okanagan Nation and several economic development agencies have now reviewed a draft strategy document to guide the project.

Several changes and additions were suggested to the overall strategic direction at the recent meeting to discuss the project, including the suggestion of ground economic sustainability principles inside of biological "ecosystem" principles that have been adopted by natural resource managers. This would ensure that economic development was not outpacing the natural world's ability to provide the resources on which that economic development is based. This was also reflected in the statement to which all agreed, that "our environment IS our economy". Next steps of the process will see the development of a compendium of particular economic activities to pursue which fit with the strategic document. These economic initiatives will be turned into a "tactical" plan that will come to public review at a workshop planned for January.
