Look who's running now!

Municipal and school district elections are going to be interesting this year!

Three candidates are running for the mayor's seat on Town Council: incumbent Mayor Randy McLean, present Councillor Keith Olsen, and Allan Nigul, who works at Princeton Post Office.

Vying for a seat on Council are newcomers Jaymie Atkinson, Spencer Coyne, Ray Jarvis, and Fred Leard, along with incumbent Councillors Lorne Esselink, Kathy Clement, and Dan

Sulentich.

For the position of trustee for Nicola-Similkameen School District #58, Princeton area, there are six candidates running for three seats. The incumbent trustees are Gordon Comeau and Ken Heuser. In addition, there are first-time candidates Carol Bertrand, Ken Brown, Susan Patry and Dina Slowikowski - Campbell.

There was only one nominee for the position of Area H Director for Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen. The

incumbent, Gerri Logan, will likely be declared elected by acclamation.

Election Officer Jim Riederer made the announcement of candidates for the Town and school district on Friday afternoon, following close of nominations. There is a period during which candidates can be challenged as to their eligibility or they may choose to withdraw. The formal election announcement will be October 21.

Keremeos will have an exciting race for every seat open. See page 4 for Keremeos candidates.

Opportunity knocks, nobody hears it

Local businesses complain a great deal about the economy and poor profits, but when opportunity knocked, nobody paid any attention.

The request by BC Gas for businesses to submit a list of goods and services they could supply during pipeline construction was largely ignored. The request was advertised in both local newspa-

pers, and an article was written in this newspaper about the opportunity. The forms to be filled out were at the Skills Centre.

At the October 9 meeting of Princeton Area Business Enhancement Association (BEA), the matter of BC Gas was raised again, and members learned that only one business person completed the forms.

Philippe Batini, manager for Upper Similkameen Indian Band, once again stressed how important it is for businesses to make the effort. He is on the provincial group doing environmental impact assessment, and told BEA members the company will put a construction camp at Granite Mountain unless Princeton can

PXA moves ahead with plans

Building a roofed area in the licensed part of the concession at the fairgrounds has received approval of the building inspector. The Posse has agreed to assist with construction, and it is simply a matter now of setting a date and doing the work.

Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) met on October 8 at the fairgrounds to discuss a number of items to do with buildings and grounds.

The need for showers at the grounds may take two forms - either inclusion in the washrooms or a separate mobile shower unit. Plans have been sent to six local contractors for an estimate, and proposals received for mobile units. The mobile units are very expensive and include a lot more items than the PXA requires.

Princeton Lions Club attended the meeting to discuss storage of their goods in building #3. The question had arisen as to whether they could store their auction goods under the grandstand, but it is difficult to put large items in that area, and Lions had had problems with rodent invasion of upholstered items when they had

previously used the area under the grandstand.

The Lions Club had been given permission to use building #3 by the Town clerk, and had been paying rent at the Town office for several years. This was surprising news to PXA members.

Lions Club members George Judd and Gerry Vinthers gave a brief review of the history of Lions involvement with the PXA and their contributions, such as paving and equipping the concession kitchen, to the present PXA

Police arrest Hedley man

On Wednesday, October 9, at approximately 6.36 p.m., Princeton RCMP were called to a residence on Highway 3 near Hedley. Officers were following a complaint that a 19 year old man with a knife had threatened another man.

When police arrived at the residence, they learned the man with the knife had followed the threat by entering a camper he used as his sleeping quarters, where he set fire to the camper. He remained in

Council invites ambulance paramedics to tell story

Princeton Town Council received a request from Ambulance Paramedics of B.C. to support a resolution they had drawn up. The resolution states Council's support for "maintaining a province-wide integrated BC Ambulance Service that is adequately funded and that provides the best possible training for emergency paramedics". The paramedics are concerned about

a core review and potential changes.

Town Council members felt they did not know enough about the background to the resolutions and could not support it as presented in the letter to Council.

At the suggestion of Mayor Randy McLean, Council will invite representatives of Ambulance Paramedics of B.C. to make a presentation to Council at a meeting.

Trail will receive gravel

The TransCanada Trail between Tri Valley Construction and the tunnel has been a matter for complaints for more than a year. Residents of the Similkameen Avenue area have gone to Town Hall to demand something be done about the dust coming from the trail, and the noisy motorized vehicles causing the dust.

At the October 7 Town Council meeting, Councillor Lorne Esselink advised Council the trail

could be covered with gravel, but Vermilion Trails Society did not have enough money to cover the \$4,000 cost of the gravel. The society needed another \$2,200. Town Council agreed to provide the needed funds.

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Council commends citizens

Two Princeton citizens were honoured at the October 7 Town Council meeting.

Mayor Randy McLean presented Joyce Fraser and Russ Pederson with certificates of appreciation to recognize the work they have done for the people of Princeton.

Bottenfield requested there be garbage cans available on these dates, and that the grass be cut well in advance, rather than a day or two before the vehicles arrive. PXA agreed this would be done.

Paul Bedard reported the big barn is being used more due to the change in the weather.

There was some discussion about renting building #2 for winter storage of vehicles. Past President George Elliott and Director Jody Woodford stated the insurance would be null and void if anything happened to the vehicles, the building or anyone who might access the building and do something with the vehicles causing personal injury, as vehicle storage was not covered by PXA insurance.

Bedard made the motion, "Due to liability concerns of this present day, we can no longer accommodate the storage of vehicles."

This motion passed unanimously. There was considerable discussion on the topic of creating a portable stage using the one John Babiak donated to PXA. Babiak said he would need the donated stage, and perhaps double its size, for music groups with whom he is negotiating for next Racing Days. He wanted to know if the dates would be available. President Sandi Gabor said she would have to check with Racing Days Association and would give him an answer when she knows what their plans are.

The next meeting will be the AGM on November 12, to be held at Town Hall. Paul Bedard volunteered to be nominations chair.

Judge jails driver

In Penticton Provincial Court on October 7, Peter Langlois of Princeton was ordered to serve seven days in jail, intermittent, for driving while prohibited. In addition, he was ordered to pay a \$300 fine and a \$45 victim surcharge.

Assault brings jail

As a result of a charge of assault causing bodily harm, Gary Losch was convicted in Penticton Provincial Court on October 2. He was ordered to serve a day in jail, and a three-year probation with a 10-year firearms prohibition. He was ordered to pay a \$50 victim surcharge.

"I don't know where to start with my comments about what Joyce Fraser has done," Mayor McLean began, as he presented her with the certificate.

He read from a prepared document some of the highlights of her career, noting Community Services Society has 50 staff members and runs 14 programs.

"For the work she's done and the love she's given, I can't think of any community more blessed," Mayor McLean concluded, adding his favourite statement about Fraser "She's Princeton's own Mother Teresa."

Fraser responded to the remarks by saying, "Community Services is successful because of all the sup-

port of Town Councils. Thank you. It's been a tremendous partnership."

Russ Pederson, who has been Corporal Pederson of Princeton RCMP Detachment for many years, has recently retired. In presenting his certificate, Mayor McLean described him as having high involvement and a low profile. He commented on all the work Pederson has done for the community, making special note of Pederson's spearheading the stick horse production and races.

Pederson thanked Council for their continuing support of projects in which he was involved.

"This is a great community and a great place to live," Pederson said.

ORL promotes Area H "yes" vote

Don Nettleton, an Okanagan Regional Library senior staff person, attended the October 7 Town Council meeting. The purpose of his presentation to Council was to bring them up to date on Regional Library planning, but Nettleton took the opportunity to express the benefits to Princeton if Area H votes "yes" on the upcoming referendum. Nettleton said the present library is

very small and might have to be expanded in a couple of years. Certainly, the hours of operation would be expanded, and the addition of \$50,000 in books and materials within the system would be of great benefit to everyone.

There are 3.4 million books borrowed every year in the region, and many more books are needed. The book collection has actually shrunk

a bit, Nettleton said, due to losses and the increasing cost of replacing books.

The Regional Library is trying out an "express" check-out machine which may be installed in larger centers if it is efficient.

Use of internet at libraries has doubled, and there is an increased use of the library website by people who order books from their home computers.

Plans for library expansion in a few locations is going to be necessary in coming years, but Nettleton assured Council any increases to taxes must be kept to a minimum, so any expansion will be carefully planned and sequenced to stay within reasonable tax increases. Previous increases have been kept to under one dollar throughout the region.

Museum brochures are in high demand

Kathy Clement had some surprising news to tell members at the October 8 meeting of Princeton Museum and Archives Society. She informed them she had requests for more museum brochures. The brochures, developed by Nick Mills, have been going quickly. Originally the museum had 2,000 printed. They will go to a reprint of 5,000 copies in preparation for the next tourist season.

The Women's Institute toured the museum on October 4, and gave a generous \$40 donation.

Princeton History Book Committee asked permission to use the museum's charitable donation number in order to qualify for grants for the second family history book. The matter is tabled to the next museum meeting to allow members time to see if it is permissible under government rules.

The provincial government is going to put historic sites into private hands. The BC Heritage Society and BC Historical Society are proposing to the government that money from the BC Lottery

(BC/49) be used to establish a Heritage Foundation to provide money to societies to maintain historic sites such as Barkerville and other similar locations.

Members were advised there would be paleontologists coming to the Princeton area to do some digging. Rosemary Doughty said she would assist them.

Members agreed to write a letter to the Town of Princeton in support of Harvard University student Bruce Archibald's request to explore and remove fossils from the old "hospital hill" area. Any fossils he finds will remain the property of the museum.

The Museum Society plans a flea market for November 23 and will be advertising the availability of tables. Kathy Clement and Freda Schroeder are donating prizes.

September was a surprisingly busy month with 220 visitors touring the museum. A part-time student will work at the museum on Saturdays, funded by the money remaining from Weyerheuser's generous grant.

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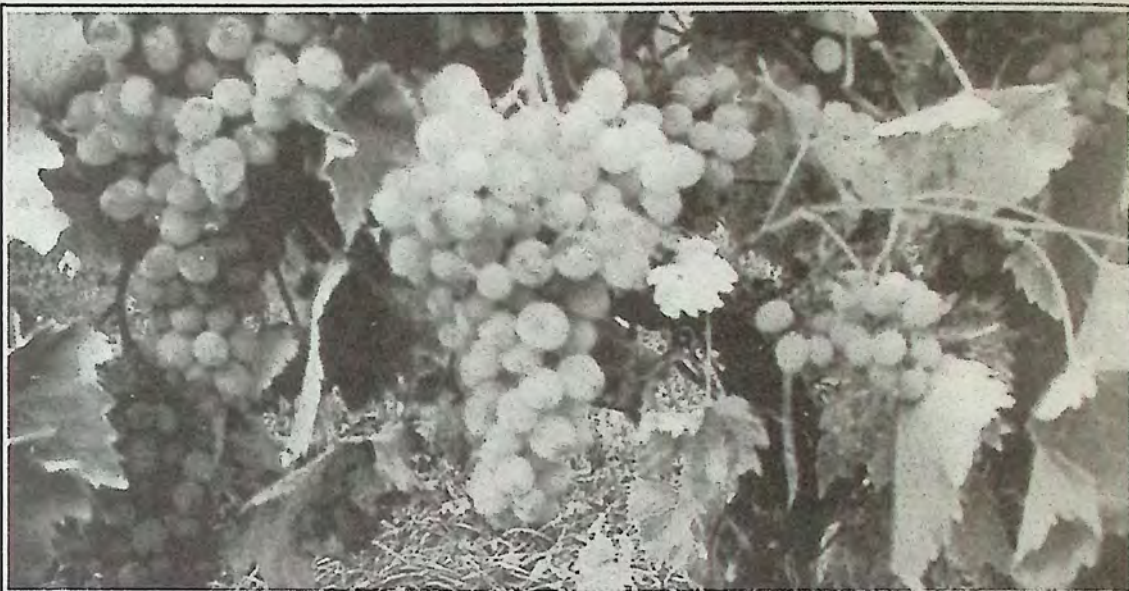
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Most of the Similkameen Valley grapes have been harvested and it looks like a good year. These are at St. Laszlo's Estate Winery located in Keremeos.

Guinness World Record becomes a waiting game

A package went in the mail to England this week containing all the required documentation to earn Princeton's Steve Kovacs his Guinness World Record.

Kovacs ate a total of five jalapeno peppers in sixty seconds as part of last month's 'Similkameen Sizzle' Pepper Festival.

Event Coordinator Bernice Power says the package contained witness papers, photographs, a video tape and newspaper clippings of the record setting attempt.

Once Guinness official approve the record, Kovacs will receive confirmation in the form

of a certificate, but that could take up to six months to happen.

"That's because they get so many," says Power.

The record set by Kovacs will likely stand as, "there's been no one else to do it since ours as I keep checking the internet."

Power says the International World Record, not to be confused with the Guinness World Records, is 152 jalapeno peppers consumed in 15 minutes.

There is no documented record for the number of jalapeno peppers eaten in sixty seconds, which is why that category was chosen for the 'Similkameen Sizzle' Pepper Eating Contest.

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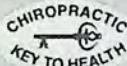
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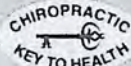

The Self-sacrificing type: "I need to give to feel worthwhile"

Perhaps you have been reading all of the personality types from the American DSMIV and you have not seen a type you feel relates to you. Perhaps you will see it in this week's Self-Sacrificing Type.

Those who fit into this personality type give service through love, and show love by giving service. They are the volunteers of the world, the selfless family members, the most generous of friends, the most ethical, caring, honest and trustworthy people in our society.

You will never hear a Self-sacrificing type boasting, or being intolerant, nor being harshly critical. They carry burdens without complaint. They are patient, helpful, and do not complain about the load they carry.

These people are not ambitious and do not compete. They will happily let others take the lead roles in life and even help them achieve.

The Self-sacrificing types seem saintly, but if they have flaws, even the flaws are saintly. They are naive, innocent and never suspect others of being crooked or downright mean-spirited. They seem to believe everybody's motives are as

pure as their own, and suffer a lot of disappointment when they learn somebody has betrayed their trust. The other flaw is their willingness to set aside their own needs to meet those of a loved one. This can lead to health problems, exhaustion, or prolonged neglect of personal care.

Most people of this type are full of energy, but they can overdo their good deeds. They must beware of doing for others what others could do for themselves. They must guard against being taken advantage of by leeches who see them as an easy mark.

Arthritis drug may prevent bowel cancer

Canadians living with a pre-cancerous disease called familial adenomatous polyposis (FAP) recently received some good news when Health Canada granted a conditional approval for the arthritis medicine called Celebrex for the treatment of this disease. People suffering from FAP have a hereditary condition in which polyps form along the lining of the colon. These polyps are often a precursor to colon cancer, and if left untreated, nearly always become colon cancer.

Celebrex is the first, and only, drug in Canada to reduce the size and number of colon polyps in people with FAP. This drug has proven effective as a treatment for intestinal polyps because it affects the process by which tumors create new blood vessels needed to obtain nutrients for their growth and spread.

Hereditary polyp formation affects men and women equally, and is usually first detected when a person is teenaged. Some young adults have had their entire colons surgically removed to prevent the spread of the polyps.

Families with a pattern of colon cancer should have regular colon cancer screening, and should follow a diet rich in vegetables, fruit, whole grains and legumes.

Celebrex is not a substitute for other care and treatment, but it does offer hope for prevention of cancer.

Living past 100

Good health depends on your body at work

Many people die soon after retiring from their regular employment. Others seem to age rapidly in retirement, and put it down to old age. If there is no illness present, the reason for aging may be lack of work. It may be the very act of retirement that triggers the aging.

Most people, but especially men, feel retirement is a time to sit back and take life easy. Retirement may mean long hours of travel in a vehicle, seeing places never visited before. Long hours sitting in a fishing boat may be the ideal pastime of some people. Neither of these are active - they are not work. One of the reasons women tend to live longer than men may be due to the fact that a woman's work is never done! A woman is still doing laundry, cooking, washing dishes, washing floors, and so on, week after week.

Ranchers tend to live to ripe old ages, too. They continue to work even while collecting old age pension. They work in the fresh air and do a multitude of different tasks every day.

Work - we all complain about it, we all want it to end. Yet work may be what keeps us healthy and living long lives. The longest lived people in the world are in the Tashkent, an area of Russia. They commonly live to be over 100 years of age, and they work every single day of their lives. They do basic farming, basic tasks such as cutting wood and cutting grass. They are never idle.

Basic work, such as gardening and housework, requires that we move our bodies in many different ways. Walking, one of the favoured exercises for older folk, is good for anyone, but it does not involve lifting any weight nor moving in ways that keep the body flexible.

Many retirees drift into aimlessness and laziness. Nothing will kill faster than laziness and lack of schedule. During our work years, we have a schedule. We eat, rest, work on a routine. It keeps us alive.

Day talks to Town Council

Stockwell Day visited Princeton Town Council's October 7 meeting to talk about proposed electoral boundary changes.

He began by saying he brought greetings from Her Majesty, with whom he had lunch that day. "I and about 500 other people!"

Day explained electoral boundaries are changed every 10 years based on census figures for various regions. The proposed changes this year add two more seats for British Columbia, going from 34 to 36. However, the coast gains three

seats because the Interior loses one seat.

There will be no change of riding for Princeton - it will remain within Okanagan-Coquihalla. The change proposed is to remove Pentiction from Okanagan-Coquihalla and include part of Kamloops in Okanagan-Coquihalla.

A hearing will be held in Kelowna, and the mayor of Pentiction will attend to say he does not want Pentiction removed from its present riding and placed into a Kootenay riding. At the same time, Kamloops is not pleased to be

divided so that part of Kamloops goes into a different riding.

If there is no election called before June 2004, that is when the changed boundaries would become official, Day told Council. If an election is called before that date, the present electoral boundaries will remain in effect.

Mayor Randy McLean said Princeton is opposed because it breaks up a good working relationship with Regional District.

Councillor Keith Olsen said the present boundary makes more sense. Council agreed.

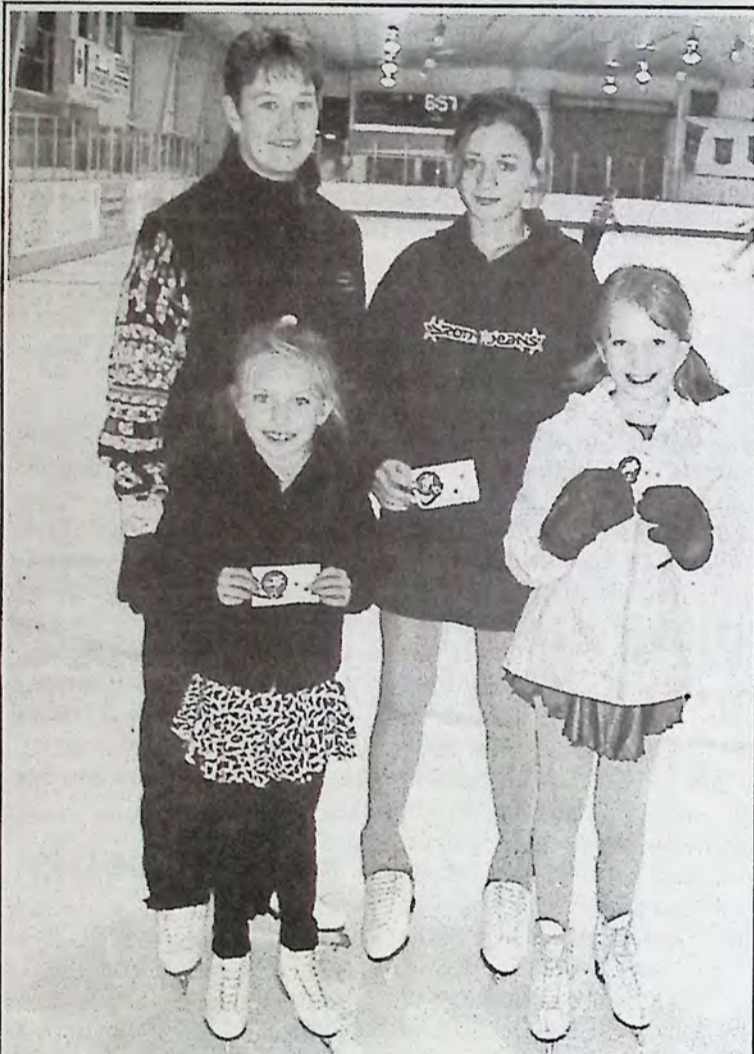
Peachland mayor receives special tee-shirt

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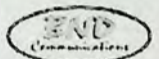

Reading is pleasure

Jim Trelease, author of a number of books about reading, once said, "If you hook a child with reading, you influence not only that child's future but also that of the next generation."

Reading is the cornerstone for a child's success in school and in life. When a young person reads for fun, he or she is more likely to ask questions when they do not understand something, or go to a dictionary for words they did not know, and take notes on what they were reading. According to the Search Institute, those who have the reading asset in their lives will read for pleasure for three or more hours per week. That equals 26 minutes a day.

How can you encourage your family to take time to read for pleasure? Transform a corner of a room into a cozy reading area. Place pillows and blankets in the area along with baskets full of reading material. Have reading challenges. Find books that seem challenging and read them as a family.

Create a book of the month club. Have everyone in the family read the same book and then discuss it. Set aside a family reading time once a week. With younger children, read aloud with them. With older children, read different books

while hanging out together. Have books, magazines, newspapers, and other reading materials lying around the house.

So turn off the TV and computer in the house and pick up something to read. Remember - reading sparks the imagination.

Naturalists hike across Flat-top Mountain

We started off by visiting the pond made famous by the Williamson's sapsucker, and we spotted more birds than expected. Mallards had gathered near the far edge, and numerous smaller birds were seen in the bushes and trees nearby.

Those identified were Dark-eyed Juncos, Song Sparrows, American Robin, Gray Jay, Stellar's Jay, and Hairy Woodpecker. High overhead soared a Red-tailed Hawk and a Sharp-shinned Hawk.

When we headed into the forest, we identified the tell-tale signs of the pine bark beetle, and spruce budworm, the latter which affects both spruce and fir.

We wound our way up an animal trail to a ridge overlooking Copper Mountain Road, with Red Bluffs in the distance. We explored an old homestead before returning via Flat-top Mountain Road to Myrna's place, where we identified numerous Shaggy Mane mushrooms growing in the gravel of the driveway. Nobody chose to pick any of them. Instead, we relaxed with muffins and a cup of tea.

A couple of months ago, we wrote about the need to put your money where your mouth is when you have a lot of complaints about local government. It is once more time to put our money where our mouths are. We need to pay attention to who is running, find out what they are all about, then go out and campaign for the people we feel will do the best job for us for the next three years.

Organizations have the opportunity to invite these candidates to a meeting to discuss goals. Individuals have the opportunity to evaluate the person's stated objectives, look at past records, and make an informed decision.

If you have questions, you can ask the candidates to give you a straight answer. You do not need to rely on the rumour mill or what Joe Blow says about Jane Doe. Go directly to the candidates and find out what they are about.

If any organization in your community holds an all-candidates forum, make the time to attend and listen closely to what they say. What do they see as the most important issues facing your community? Voters have a responsibility to make sure their names are on the voters' list, but this will not prevent anyone from voting. If you qualify in age, citizenship and residency requirements, you can register at the polls and cast your ballot.

Most important is the last act in the election – going out to vote. There will be plenty of opportunities to cast your ballot for the representatives you want. There will be an advance poll and a full day of opportunity on the final voting day. If you do not go out to the polls and cast your vote, then you are a hypocrite if you complain about who won and how they handle your tax dollars.

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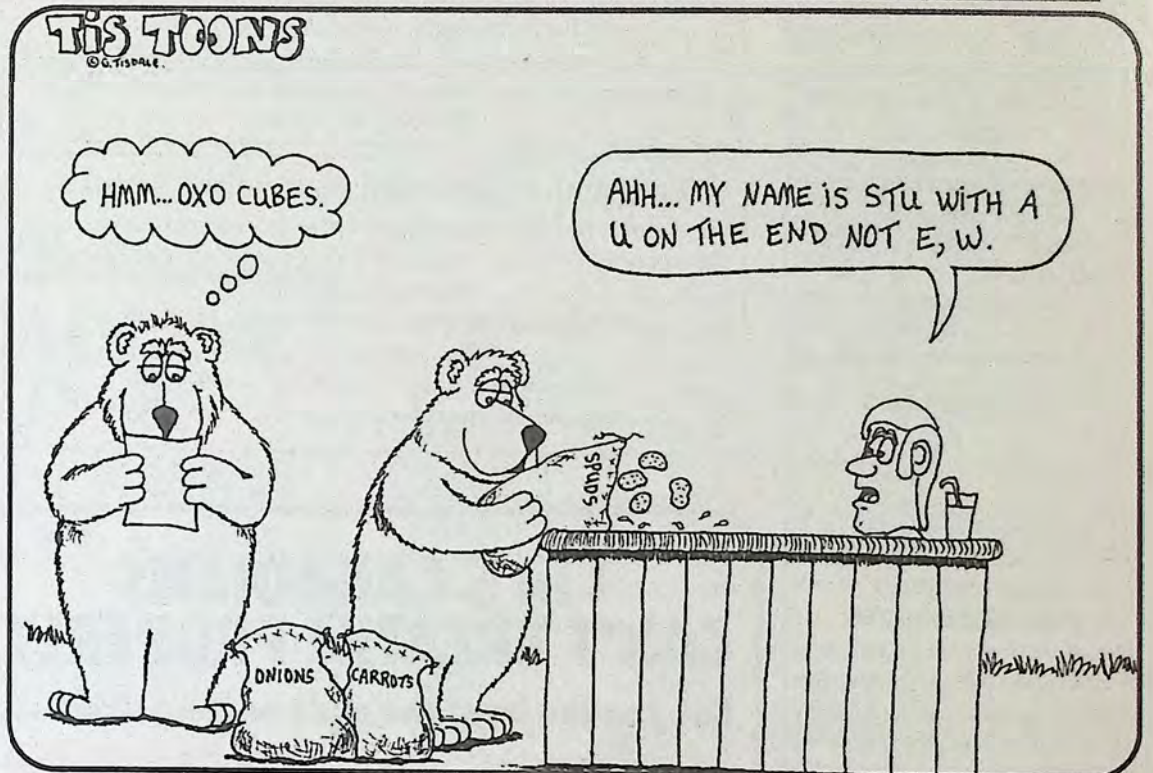

Get set for more bad news from Victoria

Dear Editor;

The Campbell government has decided to institute a means test for pharmacare beginning January 1, 2003. It was intended to be kept secret until some time later this year, but some of its main features have leaked out and now are admitted by the government.

They include

- * an income tax of 3-4 percent on about half of B.C.'s 550,000 seniors. It will cost seniors \$395 million.

- * all seniors on pharmacare will have to sign a legal document authorizing the B.C. government to gain access to their personal income tax records. Apparently Ottawa has agreed. Seniors who refuse to give this authorization will be cut of pharmacare.

Drugs have become an essential feature of health care. Placing a means test on pharmacare violates the main concept of our health care system which is that health care should be available to all regardless of income and not just a privilege for the well-to-do.

This government received no mandate from voters to force a means test on us.

The government claims it cannot afford to pay the costs of pharmacare which are currently at \$720 million a year. Why then did it give \$800 million in tax breaks to big corporations? Why did it cut income tax by \$1.5 billion when most of the benefits went to the wealthy? If it is so hard up, why is it planning to spend \$6 billion on the Olympics?

The government claims, again falsely, that seniors can well afford to pay for their prescription

drugs. The facts are that 50 percent of B.C. seniors have an annual income of less than \$18,000, while 75 percent have incomes of less than \$29,869. These seniors simply cannot afford to pay for their drugs.

This harsh means test would compel many of them to choose between food, clothing and shelter on the one hand, and pills on the other. Of necessity, some will cut down on their needed medications and end up in emergency wards or hospitals. This will add more costs to the health system. Should they die, it would, of course, be a plus for this government – fewer seniors on pharmacare!

The reason why B.C. and other provinces have to spend so much money on drugs is not due to seniors. It's the result of profiteering by the big multinational drug giants.

- * The average price of prescription drugs in the past 15 years went up from \$12.34 to \$39.89.

- * Drug prices in Canada are not based on their cost but on what the big multinational drug producers can get away with. Our drug price control system in Canada is a sham.

The Campbell government should be tackling this problem instead of placing new burdens on seniors.

There is an alternative:

- * drop the proposed discriminatory means test for pharmacare drugs.

- * End the subsidies and tax breaks for big corporations and divert these funds to health care and pharmacare. Do not privatize BC Hydro – use its profits for social programs.

- * Take decisive action to end over-prescribing of drugs by doctors.

- * Expand the reference-based drug pricing program established by the previous provincial government which saved B.C. \$25 million annually.

- * The B.C. government should join the growing demand across Canada that the federal government establish its long-promised national pharmacare program, take action to end the 20-year monopoly on brand name drugs by international drug corporations and revamp the drug prices review board so that it will protect Canadians from exorbitant drug prices.

We need to re-think productivity

Something has gone very wrong with our world economy. During the past decade, poor countries have become even poorer. World trade has focused on the rich countries, like ours.

At the same time, the American economy has peaked and gone downhill, largely due to its focus on electronic media growth and decline, and on the surge in the communications industry and the ensuing decline.

What is missing in our world economy is an understanding of the need for balance between sectors for investment. The shift of capital into computerization of all industries marked a major expense to all industries. Going to automation has been terribly expensive. To make matters worse, the companies who re-tooled in the 1980's

had to re-tool in the 1990's to keep up with the changes in computer technology. This exceedingly expensive computer money pit was guaranteed to yield reduction in earnings for shareholders.

Add corporate dishonesty to this mess and shareholders, and stock purchasers in general, became leery and did not know what to buy for security. Millions of people have lost money in the decline of hi-tech stocks.

What does not seem to be happening is a recognition by governments and economists of the necessity to create a reasonable balance between all of the elements of production.

There are three levels to our own economy, and to the world economy in general. First, there are the basic industries such as agriculture, fishing, logging and mining. These are resource industries and they went into decline more than a decade ago. However, these industries are the essential industries. They provide the necessities - food, shelter, and the raw materials from which we make our tools.

The second level of the economy is production of goods and services. The production of goods is the level at which raw materials from resource industries is manufactured into goods we use, such as vehicles, lumber, canned goods, paper products, asphalt, and so on. Services are part of this level, where finished products are utilized in schools, hospitals, grocery stores, and so on.

The third, and most recent level of

the economy is the information economy, the hi-tech computer and communication industry. This "information superhighway", as it was called, promised all kinds of great things for people, but the concept is flawed. On its own, this level of the economy could not, in itself, feed us, manufacture things we need, nor provide care. The machinery of the "information" industry works best as an auxiliary to all other forms of productivity. If anything, we became over-dependent on computer technology, and discovered it has flaws, such as losing valuable information when a system breaks down.

I believe the most important re-tooling needed today is a re-tooling of how we utilize the third level in balance with the first two. We cannot eat, wear, live in, transport goods by, or mend a broken leg with a computer. The hi-tech industry is a great facilitator, but only a facilitator. By itself, it produces nothing, and the excessive flow of capital into that technology robs truly productive industries of basic capital to keep producing.

We need to re-think the correct place of computers in the productivity scenario. The poor farmer in Africa is not much worse off than our prairie farmers whose need for water has not been properly addressed by any government. We consumers will pay the price in the higher cost of potatoes, bread and beef due to this summer's drought. This is because governments have quit building dams and invested in computers and mobile phones.

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

Resident praises Vermilion Court

The residents of Vermilion Court are grateful to Joyce Fraser for her vision to help the disabled and the elderly, making it into reality through the programs/services the Princeton and District Community Services are providing to the people in the community such as Home Support program, Meals on Wheels, Community Bus, Vermilion Court sheltered housing, Mary Anne Court, B.C. Housing, etc.

As a resident of Vermilion Court, I would like to express how happy and thankful I am to be here. Thirty percent rent subsidy is provided to senior or handicapped on fixed income. In the upper floor, each apartment has a balcony where we can grow plants. They keep the place clean, regular safety checks and maintenance. We have a night caretaker who we can call for help when needed.

We get help from the Home Support workers depending on the individual resident needs which are assessed by the Home Care nurses. The RN supervisor visits as the need arises. A foot care nurse comes once a month.

We can make and eat breakfast in the kitchen in our suite. We are served two meals a day in the main dining room where we have very satisfying dinner and supper prepared by the kitchen staff. It is also where the Meals on Wheels are prepared and delivered by Home Support workers to the clients who wish to avail the program.

We have our own bathrooms but there is also a century tub on the main floor.

Twice a week (Tuesday and Thursday) from 10:00 a.m. to 2:30

p.m., we attend Adult Day Center (ADC) program held at the dining room and den/TV room. Other participants from the community are very welcome to attend the program. Right now there are two who attend regularly, and between eight and 13 members altogether. The program is coordinated by Aida Bouvette with the help of volunteers Helen Kendall, Ria Smith and there are times Joyce Fraser, Eileen Plementos and Debbie Thomas helped too.

The following is a list of activities at ADC:

A. Regular activities -

- * current events/horoscopes from our local newspapers and other informative articles from magazines or bulletins

- * inspirational stories/thoughts

- * clean jokes/humorous stories

- * stimulating word guessing games

- * exercises, balloon playing (a form of exercise and fun)

- * sing-along while Ruth Kavanaugh plays the organ

- * bingo, shuffleboard, scrabble and other games

- * arts and crafts such as cake decorating, flower arranging, painting, Christmas ornaments, etc.

- * hair and nail care with Audrey Salter, Aida and volunteers

- * celebration of birthdays and other special occasions

- * blood pressure, pulse, weight monitoring

- * a United Church service the first Sunday of every month

C. Special trips, visits and activities we enjoyed --

- * afternoon tea and treats in Audrey Salter's garden

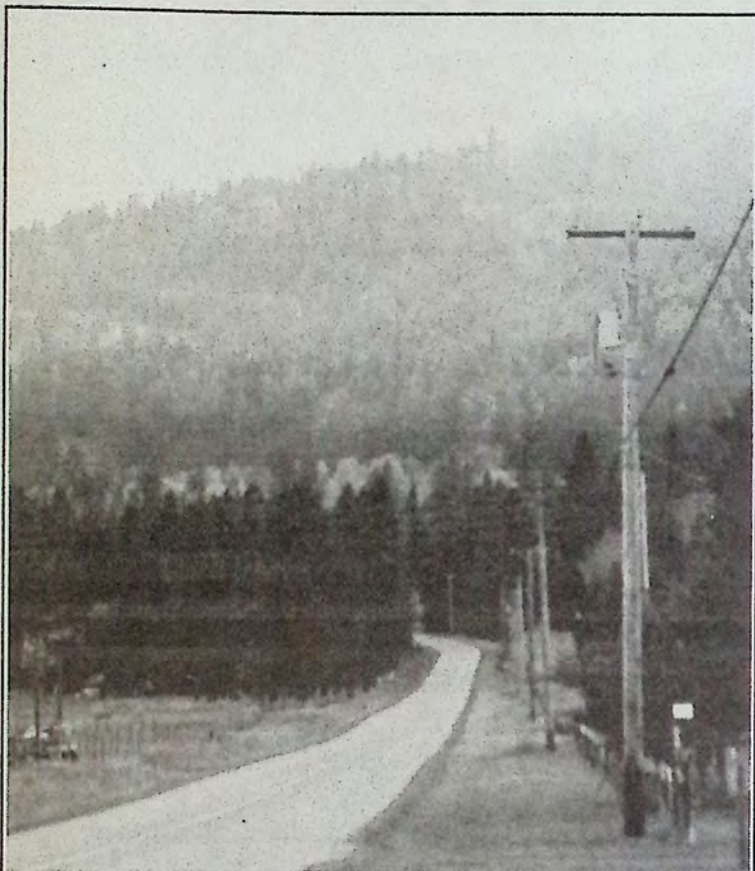
- * a Mexican day fiesta and others

Princeton Co-Gen opposes fibreboard plant

Dean Johnston, a principle in Princeton Co-Gen Corp., made a presentation at the October 9 meeting of Princeton Area Business Enhancement Association (BEA).

Princeton Co-Gen buys shavings and sawdust and turns it into wood pellets used for fuel and animal bedding. The company employs between 24 and 29 employees, and has been operating 24-7 since November 2001. Co-Gen ships to every continent except Africa and Antarctica, Johnson told BEA members.

His presentation was in response to a news article in a local paper saying a fibreboard plant was interested in moving to Princeton. Johnston said the competition for wood fibre would wipe out Princeton Co-Gen, which is obtaining fibre from a wide source area, including Washington.

Should Princeton Co-Gen cease business activity, it would be a loss

of \$2.4 million to Princeton. There would be a lot of competition for supply of fibre.

Johnston said he could see a lot of opportunity in town but there is a shortage of fibre.

John Babiak, chair of the committee appointed to gather information for Fibratex, explained he was in the process of finding out whether the raw materials Fibratex needs are available locally.

Mayor Randy McLean commented he had not known about Princeton Co-Gen's needs and welcomed the information. The following day, Mayor McLean met with a number of local value-added operations and learned there is a shortage of fibre for everyone. Bruno Geiger, from ILMA, attended the Thursday meeting and is in a position to deal with both the Ministry of Forests and the major licensees.

Council supports Whistler Olympic highway project

Princeton Town Council supports the proposed improvements to the Sea-to-Sky Highway. The matter was raised at the October 7 Town Council meeting in response to a letter from the City of Nelson asking for support in opposing the expansion of the highway to Whistler.

Councillor Kathy Clement said every location is entitled to highway upgrades, and she could not

support denying one area that equality.

Mayor Randy McLean pointed out the highway leading to Whistler makes it "A world-class resort with a secondary road to it".

He noted there will be federal money spent if B.C.'s bid for the Olympics is accepted, and it is an excellent way to improve a highway with a lot of problem areas.

Delay and disarray mar softwood

Delay and disarray in the House of Commons this week characterized how the federal Liberals have handled the Softwood Lumber Package.

Remember, the Canadian Alliance warned the federal government more than two years ahead of time that we would get whacked by U.S. countervails when the former softwood agreement ended. The feds didn't listen. We got whacked.

When I met with U.S. Vice-President Dick Cheney last year to express Canadian displeasure with the American approach, it was clear to me that our federal government had done precious little on the ground, failing to make sure the U.S. administration officials understood the issue.

This week's softwood aid package "much delayed", also shows disarray. The much-needed help to workers thrown out of their jobs through no fault of their own appears to be insufficient.

How on earth does a \$34 million promise of a pulp and paper center of excellence in Quebec put groceries on the table for B.C. lumber workers? Or, for that matter, how does it help hard-hit workers in Quebec?

I have visited our B.C. operations, all of which are staffed by hard-

working people who do their best every day. They are proud of their work. They figure they have already created "centers of excellence" right where they are. I agree.

There was little in the package to provide temporary loan support for the businesses themselves. This would help them carry the extra weight at the bank for the costs of the U.S. tariffs until the issue is settled at the trade court. The Canadian companies would then pay out those loans back to our government.

We need to keep in mind the industry and its workers are not asking for subsidies and handouts. If they were losing jobs and investment because they were not competitive or productive, that would be their problem. However, that is simply not the case. It is the result of an unnecessary U.S. trade war, and in a war, if your people get hurt, they should get help.

That's why my colleagues and I are asking the federal Liberals to refocus this package and get the dol-

lars to the people and places that are hurting the most. No more delay. No more disarray. Our people deserve better.

By the way - here's a heartwarming sign of generosity in a tough time.

I was in Merritt last week doing my bit at a fundraising event for kidney research. A lot of money was raised in Merritt for the cause (apparently, more than in Kamloops).

Guess what sector dug the deepest and gave the most? The workers and companies in the lumber industry. Giving is always a blessing. Giving when it hurts is extra special.

I'd like to give a special bouquet to our softwood workers for the soft hearts.
