

# Hear and see your candidates

## Lost hunter suffered no harm in mountains

On Saturday evening, at approximately 8:00 p.m., Princeton RCMP received a call informing them a hunter was overdue at a rendezvous he had arranged with a friend. The friend had dropped off the 27 year old Penticton man at a location 25 km up Stemwidener Road, 30 km. east of Princeton. When the friend went to pick him up, he did not appear as scheduled.

The friend launched his own search, but could not find the hunter.

RCMP notified Princeton Search and Rescue about the missing man, and the search began. It went on all night by Princeton Search and Rescue and an RCMP dog handler from Penticton. The next morning, the Princeton search team was joined by members of the Oliver and Penticton search teams.

At approximately 11:00 a.m. Sunday, the search teams located the man. He was unharmed,

despite having spent the night in the mountains.

"The man was a seasoned hunter," says Cst. Darren Kakuno of Princeton RCMP Detachment. "Yet he still became disoriented."

RCMP remind outdoor enthusiasts and hunters to ensure someone is aware of their travel plans, to dress appropriately, and pack necessary safety equipment.

The resurfacing was needed badly, and the improvements are worth the delays. The huge machines above lift the old asphalt, heat it, add some new material, and lay it down again, where rollers flatten and compress it.

## Forest Minister defines market strategy

Minister of Forests Michael de Jong has outlined a \$3 million strategy to establish a Market Outreach Network dedicated to giving international customers the facts about B.C.'s sustainable forest practices and policy. The funding is part of the government's \$20 million commitment for international marketing and product development.

De Jong stated, "The softwood lumber dispute has reinforced the need to strengthen and expand out international markets."

The Market Outreach Network will receive strategic guidance from a board including representatives from industry, resource communities, First Nations and government. Industry will cost-share in addition to the govern-

ment's \$3 million budgeted for 2002-03.

Members of the board are Gordon Steele, Riverside Forest Products, Duncan Davies, International Forest Products, Hank Ketcham, West Fraser Timber, Colin Kinsley, Mayor of Prince George, Gerry Furney, Mayor of Port McNeill, Donna Barnett, Mayor of 100 Mile House, First Nations representatives yet to be appointed, Ken Dobell, Office of the Premier, and

Don Wright, deputy minister, Ministry of Forests.

A further \$3.8 million will promote marketing activities and access in China, Taiwan, Korea and India, as well as Coastal forest products in both emerging and existing markets.

Projects supported include development of wood construction codes for China, Taiwan and Korea, and training for Chinese instructors and building inspectors.

## US citizens group looks at Columbia salmon problem

US decisions and ideas about Columbia Basin fish stock management relate to the conservation steps being taken in Canada. A group called Citizens' Forum in Portland, Oregon, publicly introduced itself and presented its "White Paper on Hatcheries and Salmon Recovery" to Bob Lohn, director of the National Marine Fisheries Service on October 16.

The White Paper describes genetic issues as the "single greatest roadblock to the use of hatcheries as a recovery and mitigation tool" for the salmon population in the

Columbia Basin. The paper's authors say salmon recovery efforts have "become mired in the continuing debate regarding the relative merits of hatchery vs. wild".

"Extinction is not an option that we will accept," the White Paper says. "Living museum remnants of once great salmon runs are not an option we will accept. Continued degradation of the economic and spiritual quality of salmon dependent communities is not an option. Valuable tools designed to prevent extinction and provide abundance must not be eliminated."

## Hope stops Mercedes thief

Shortly after midnight on October 16, Hope RCMP were involved in a chase with a 2000 grey Mercedes SUV. The vehicle had been the subject of a broadcast warning RCMP to look for this vehicle and use caution. It had been stolen from North Vancouver and was believed to be involved in an attempted abduction or carjacking of a female the day before.

Hope RCMP, along with other detachments, was watching for this vehicle. They spotted it on Highway #1 near Hope and pulled it over. When RCMP officers approached the vehicle, it sped away, reaching over 100 kmph as it headed east. It exited into Hope, then took the Old Hope Princeton Highway. Police were able to put down a spike belt and flattened all four tires. It drove into Turner Street in Hope before it stopped. The driver fled on foot and the three passengers were arrested.

A police dog was called from Chilliwack and after about two hours of tracking, the suspect was arrested in Hope.

Two adult males, one from North Vancouver and one from Port Coquitlam, and two teenage females from North Vancouver, were arrested.

Charges of possession of stolen property, causing a police pursuit, and dangerous driving are being considered.

Investment Tips For Single Parents

When it comes to investing, single parents share basically the same concerns with two-parent families. They want to provide opportunities - especially educational opportunities - for their children, and they want their own retirement to be comfortable.

Single parents, however, face many unique challenges, especially financial challenges. Although that wouldn't cover his entire college expenses, with student loans and her son working to pay some of his own bills, it would be a big help.

**DON'T PUT OFF UNTIL TOMORROW** - One of the biggest investment mistakes made by both single parents and two-parent families is putting their children's financial future before their own. Many parents delay investing for their retirement and wait for "the perfect time" to invest. This is usually some landmark event, such as paying off the car or home, changing jobs, or the children leaving home.

Unfortunately, there are two problems with this approach. First, people often adopt goals that take years to achieve, or worse, once they achieve their goals, they simply replace them with others, such as taking that dream vacation. The other problem with this approach is that waiting to invest costs you money.


If our 35 year-old mother waits until her son enters college to start investing \$100 a month in a Registered Retirement Savings Plan earning 8 percent annually, she'll have accumulated less than \$45,000 when she turns 65.

**A LITTLE NOW CAN MEAN A LOT LATER** - If, however, she starts investing now and invests \$100 a month in an RRSP earning 8 percent annually, she'll accumulate more than \$130,000 by the time she reaches age 65. That's \$85,000 more than if she waits! In addition she may qualify for fully or partially tax-deductible RRSP contributions, and she doesn't have to pay taxes on the earnings on her RRSP until she withdraws them at retirement.

**TAKE THE FIRST STEP TOWARDS A BRIGHTER FUTURE** - Although the rates and time periods in the examples above aren't intended to reflect the performance of any specific investment, they do illustrate the importance of starting an investment plan early and sticking with it. Time and discipline are an investor's most valuable assets. In addition, when choosing an investment, make sure you select one that's appropriate for your investment risks and that can meet your specific investment needs.

Whether you're a single parent or part of a household with two working parents, remember the best time to start investing is now. Don't be intimidated by how little you have to invest or how little you know about investing. Begin reading about investing and seek the investment advice of a professional. Together you can determine the best strategy for ensuring a bright financial future for both you and your children.

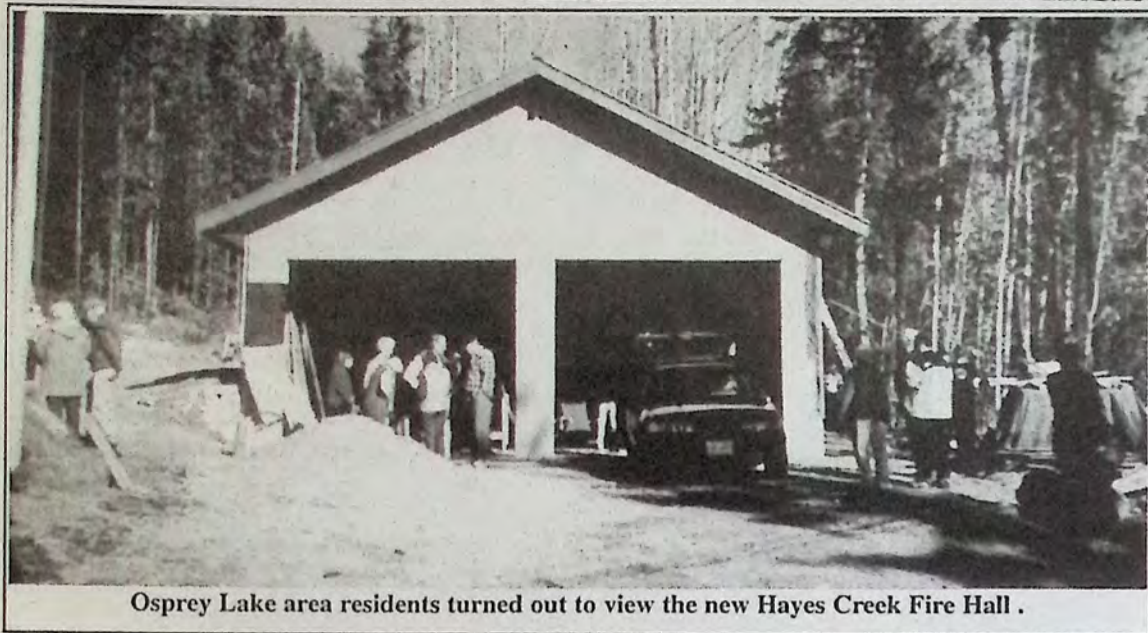

## Leisurely Personality Type: "I demand the right to do my own thing"

People with a dominant Leisurely personality type are interesting because they play by the rules and meet their obligations, but they also demand the right to enjoy themselves as they please. They do what is expected of them, but not one thing more.

If a Leisurely person feels there are too many demands on them, or that the demands are unreasonable, they will become as difficult to move as a stubborn donkey. They may display serious anger at anyone trying to push them.

These people are ideally suited to a nine-to-five job with no overtime, and all weekends off. They can put in their time and have the rest of the day, or weekend, to themselves to do as they please.

Leisurely people are relaxed about time. The push to meet deadlines upsets them, or they ignore the deadlines (which may have them in trouble). These are the people who refuse to be controlled by the clock or the calendar. Things will get done - eventually.

Leisurely people believe they are entitled to the best life has to offer, but they also believe they need to

be free, so they often miss out on the best things of life because of their unwillingness to put in that extra time and effort which moves people up the promotional ladder.

Leisurely types do not like authority figures, perhaps because authority figures may make demands on them. However, Leisurely types like to be looked after in their relationships even while they demand personal freedom. They will not make any commitments in a relationship until they are sure the other person will not make "unreasonable" demands on them, but will take care of them. Leisurely types are least likely to change, and will sacrifice the relationship rather than change.

It is this characteristic that makes

life difficult for a Leisurely type, not only in spousal relationships, but in any kind of work relationship. Leisurely types will not give more than their job description requires, and they will be the first to say, "That's not in my job description."

This will apply to home life, too. The Leisurely type will be the type to expect the other person to do the household chores, because when the Leisurely type is finished the nine to five, that's all the work for the day.

You won't find the Leisurely types out in the community volunteering their time for the betterment of others, but you may find them out enjoying a pastime or a sport. You will not find them running for an elected office (too many obligations) nor will you find them doing a lot of home improvements (cuts into leisure time!). They do what they must do and no more.

If this type becomes extreme, it can be real trouble, and may fight back in subtle ways, such as "forgetting" things need doing, or sabotaging the situation. They become increasingly difficult because they seem to see others as having the real problem, while they are simply being used, or victimized. They appear to defy solutions to their problems with answers that begin "Yes, but....."

Well-motivated, highly responsible people should avoid the Leisurely type, and vice-versa.

## Pregnancy has possible bone problems

In the old days, every woman knew she would lose a tooth or two with each child. It was not fully understood that her baby was receiving the calcium in her food, and she was not. Any lack of calcium put the baby at risk, too. Calcium is essential to strong, healthy bones in a newborn.

Canadian women were surveyed and most did not know how much calcium a pregnant woman requires daily. The answer is 1200 to 1500 milligrams (mg). To meet that requirement, women must focus on what foods they need to eat daily.

One cup of milk equals 300 mg of calcium intake. Five full cups of milk are required. Other sources equal to 300 mg include one cup of yogurt, one and a half cups of ice cream, three tablespoons of Parmesan cheese, a piece of Cheddar cheese the size of two adult fingers, one cup of soy milk. Other sources are broccoli, white beans, almonds, dried figs, sesame seeds, canned salmon with bones, sardines, and the antacid TUMS.

Not only is this good for baby, it is good for the mother, who will not lose calcium during pregnancy. When the baby is born, this intake must continue or increase if the mother is breast feeding.

Older women need this much calcium too, to prevent osteoporosis.

## Living past 100

### Keep your muscles healthy to avoid cramps

One of the most common difficulties with aging is muscle cramping. This occurs as a result of a malfunction of messages from the brain, due to a malfunction of electrolytes which carry the messages from the brain. This sounds very complex, which it is, but all of it boils down to insufficient minerals, and we can do something about the mineral intake in our diets.

Young people can have muscle cramps for exactly the same reason, especially when they have over-worked or exercised and have sweated out the minerals. The minerals you need are magnesium, calcium and potassium. Magnesium is especially important, because it is the one mineral that allows the electrolytes to do their job. Even when you have plenty of calcium and potassium, a lack of magnesium will stop the messages to the muscles.

If you want to keep your magnesium balance at an ideal state, you can take vitamin and mineral supplements, but you should be aware that you need to eat foods rich in magnesium. Spinach is one of the best sources of magnesium, along with nuts, seeds, and ready to eat breakfast cereals (read the nutritional contents on the cereal box). Brown rice, halibut, and oysters are good sources of magnesium, too.

Sometimes muscle cramps are partly caused by lack of carbohydrates (found in grains, squash and fruit).

Dairy products are the best source of calcium, along with broccoli. Potassium is found in most fruits and vegetables, but bananas and potatoes are excellent sources of potassium.

Keeping your magnesium intake at the proper level has other benefits. It helps regulate glucose levels (blood sugar) and helps prevent damage to the retina of the eyes. This is especially true for people who have diabetes.

Muscle cramps can be your first signal of magnesium deficiency.

## Forest industry bails out Stock Day

Stockwell Day, Member of Parliament for Okanagan-Coquihalla, found himself on the wrong side of the law in Merritt on Thursday, October 10. While in the Nicola Valley on constituency business, Day was arrested by Merritt RCMP, handcuffed, and put behind bars in a wooden cell located inside a local supermarket.

Although Day continued to plead his innocence to the charge of "improper use of a jetski", the appointed Justice set bail at \$2,500 and instructed the Sheriff to place the Member of Parliament behind bars until such time as the bail money could be arranged.

The whole event was part of a fundraising effort for the Kidney Foundation and Day was pleased that he was required to spend less than an hour in jail before his constituents stepped forward with the \$2,500 to have the M.P. released.

"Much of the credit should go to those in the forest industry," said Day, "and the organizers appreciate companies such as Aspen Planers and HMV Forest Products for their generosity in raising money for this worthwhile cause, and bailing out a number of convicts in Merritt."

Day noted that even though forest workers and communities are being devastated by the softwood lumber dispute, these citizens stepped forward and sowed true community spirit and kindness by opening their wallets and contributing so generously.


"I and other convicts are thankful for their support, but more importantly, we are all overwhelmed with their willingness to help others in their community while facing and uncertain future themselves," Day concluded.

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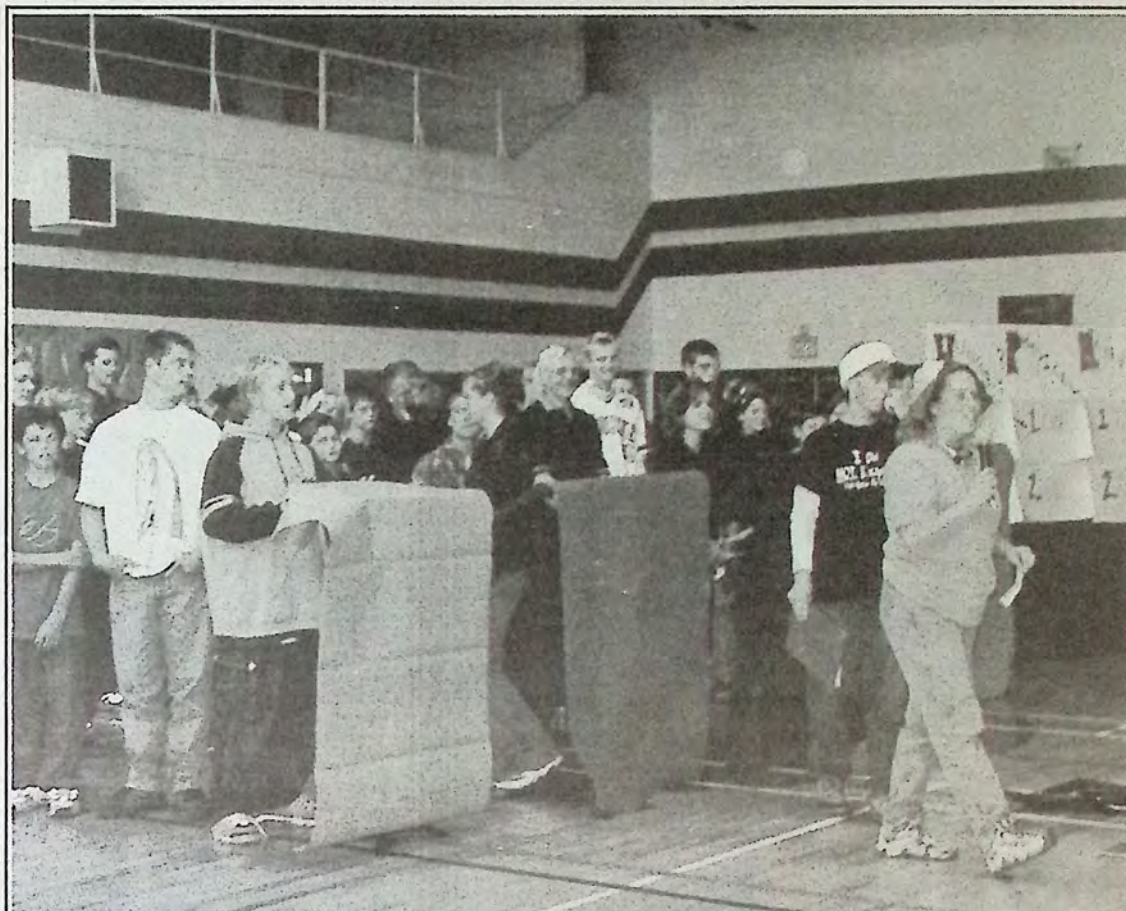

## What is Asset Development all about?

Many of us don't even realize we are providing assets to our young people. When we provide the right environment in which young people flourish then we are providing them assets. We all know that a loving environment works better than a hostile one, that respect works better than contempt, that education works better than ignorance.

The building blocks of asset development are relationships, experiences, values, attitudes and attributes that all young people need for success in life. When young people receive love and support in a family they receive assets, when they are given useful roles in the community they receive assets, when they model responsible behaviours they receive assets, when they spend time in creative activities they receive assets, when they are motivated to do well in school they receive assets, when the value helping others they receive assets, when they know how to plan ahead and make choices they receive values, and when they are optimistic about their personal futures they receive assets.

This seems like common sense, right? But when the Princeton & District CYC conducted the Search Institute research in January 2000 on all our grade 9 to 12 students measuring the extent to which our young people have the 40 developmental assets, we found our young people have 17.2 percent of assets. The national average in the United States at the time was 18 percent. These numbers are significant when we look at the

relationship between levels of assets and high-risk behaviours. The data is clear: more assets mean more success and less trouble.

It is also clear where young people can receive, or not receive, these assets: school, home and the community. Building assets begins with caring, mutually respectful relationships between a young person and adult. It makes all the difference in the world to a young person if they know that an adult thinks he or she is special, thinks the young person is a good human being. The relationship is the basis for building assets. Young people have someone to learn from, to lean on, and to strive for.

Young people strive to do their best when they are in a positive environment. That environment can be physical - a school or home, or it can be the people - other young people or adults. What if the physical building we owned had a welcoming feeling

to young people? What if the "Come on in" sign really meant common in? What message do we send our young people when we adopt the "not my kid, not my problem" attitude? What if we adopted the "all kids are our kids" attitude? Which type of environment would motivate you to do your best, enjoy yourself and stay out of trouble?

Another strategy to building assets is to implement programs and practices that give young people opportunities to thrive. In our community, we have a variety of programs and activities already in place for our young people. We need only learn more about the assets building language and intentionally recognize the value of the developmental assets framework. The steps of the asset-building journey for and with our young people are important.

# Okanagan Nation sets salmon as a priority

The Okanagan Nation Fisheries Commission has some deep concerns about the salmon run in the Okanagan this year. While some rivers in B.C. expect record-breaking returns of sockeye salmon, the Okanagan River sockeye returns this year are near critical levels.

The fish have serious problems. They must migrate past nine major hydro-electric facilities only to find their home has been engineered without them in mind. Today, these salmon are Canada's last Columbia River salmon stock. Fifty percent of these are lost between Wells Dam in the United States and the spawning grounds in Canada. The remainder spawn in the river near Oliver in the last seven kilometers left of original Okanagan River.

Byron Louis, Chair of Okanagan Nation Fisheries Commission, states, "The Okanagan Nation is calling upon the responsible Ministers to restore a home for our river's wild fish. Healthy Okanagan River salmon once ranged from Oroville Washington through to Vernon, B.C. Our salmon have been engineered nearly to extinction. The Okanagan River has been dammed,

diked and denuded and followed by an invasion of exotic species. This makes recovery of our salmon and critically depressed resident stocks in the Okanagan an ecosystem problem second only in complexity to the Great Lakes."

The Okanagan Nation is coordinating the interests of government, science and communities to develop a common approach to restoration of the Okanagan River and its native fish. The regional economic benefit is estimated by the Okanagan Nation to be more than \$100 million in the next 25 years, enabling partnerships with a wide range of governments, stewardship and community organizations.

Projects currently underway include assessing the risk of restoring salmon passage separated by dams, fish friendly re-engineering of Okanagan flood controls, and modelling water flow and temperatures to benefit wild salmon and kokanee. One example is a partnership developing with the Okanagan Nation, US hydro-power interests and the Town of Oliver, which should support more than \$1.5 million in irrigation canal improvements.

### REGIONAL DISTRICT OF OKANAGAN-SIMILKAMEEN BYLAW NO. 2159, 2002

A bylaw to amend "Okanagan Regional Library District Participation Establishment Bylaw No. 1533, 1994" to include Electoral Area "H" of the Regional District of the Okanagan-Similkameen.

**WHEREAS** the Board of Directors of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen wishes to proceed under Section 802, of the *Local Government Act*, to amend "Okanagan Regional Library District Participation Establishment Bylaw No. 1533, 1994" to include Electoral Area "H" of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen;

**AND WHEREAS** pursuant to Section 802 of the *Local Government Act*, the Regional Board may amend "Okanagan Regional Library District Participation Establishment Bylaw No. 1533, 1994" in accordance with the requirements applicable to the adoption of the bylaw;

**AND WHEREAS** pursuant to Section 801.2 of the *Local Government Act*, a majority of the votes within Electoral Area "H" of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen, counted as valid, is in favour of the Bylaw.

**NOW THEREFORE** the Board of Directors of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen in open meeting assembled, ENACTS as follows:

#### 1. AMENDMENTS

"Okanagan Regional Library District Participation Establishment Bylaw No. 1533, 1994" is amended as follows:

- In Section 1.2, the words "Princeton Library" and "Electoral Area 'H'" are inserted.
- In Section 2, the words "and 'G'" are deleted and "G", and "H" are inserted.

## ANNUAL TAXATION PROJECTIONS

Based on the draft 2003 Okanagan Regional Library budget, the Regional District estimates the following costs per \$1,000.00 of taxable assessed value of land and improvements:

If you want to calculate how much the library service will cost you, complete the following steps:

1. Find a copy of your most recent tax notice or property assessment notice.
2. Look at the notice and determine the class of your property (for example, Residential, Business, etc.).
3. Multiply the total taxable assessed value of your land and improvements by the "Cost per \$1,000.00" value in the second column and then divide by 1,000.

#### Example

Suppose you own a residential property with a taxable assessed value of land of \$48,000 and a taxable assessed value of an improvement of \$79,000. The total taxable assessed value of the property is \$127,800.

The cost per \$1,000.00 of taxable assessed value of land and improvements for a residential property is \$0.34. Therefore, you will pay about \$43.45 in 2003 to participate in the Okanagan Regional Library District.

## Police warn of cheque fraud

Kelowna RCMP Commercial Crime Section has issued a warning to all businesses in the Okanagan-Similkameen region to be on the alert for a fraudulent cheque writing scam. RCMP say they have several complaints from businesses victimized by this fraud, and businesses in other parts of B.C. and western Canada have been victimized by the same method.

The cheques usually bear the name Treasury Direct or a variation of Treasury Direct. The cheques have a proper account number and bar code, but these belong to a chequing account from

a different, but valid, financial institution. Because the fraudulent cheques have a correct account number and bar code, they may be accepted initially by a financial institution for processing, but they are eventually discovered to be fraudulent.

The term "Treasury Direct" may be incorrectly associated with a system maintained by the United States Treasury Department. Treasury Direct is the name of a method of purchasing securities from the United States Treasury and not deposit accounts held by financial institutions upon which

people use cheques to withdraw funds.

These fraudulent cheques are generally used to purchase merchandise, although it is possible a person may use the same method to purchase a service or pay an outstanding account.

Businesses should use caution when accepting payment by a cheque bearing the name "Treasury Direct". The name may include prefixes such as "Federal Treasury Direct, Private Treasury Direct, etc. Before accepting such a cheque, businesses should inquire with their financial institution to confirm whether or not the cheque is valid.

Businesses victimized by this method should report the matter to Princeton RCMP Detachment.

### Two realities contrast

Some moments define who we are.

For two weeks, our Queen toured Canada amid cheering crowds. South of the border, residents of the American capital lived in fear of being shot by a sniper. These are the two realities side by side in North America.

People are always asking, "Do we need the Royals?"

The answer must be "yes".

On the surface, the Queen was just an old woman dropping a puck at a hockey game, or giving a horse to the RCMP Musical Ride. This is as Canadian as it gets, and she was cheered by thousands, but beneath the surface, the cheers are not only for the old woman we see, but for the Crown governing all of us.

The Queen embodies the rule of law. She is the keeper of the agreements, charters and treaties made in the past to govern us in the present. The history of the Crown's role in our system of governance goes back nearly a thousand years to the first agreement between the monarch and his subjects, when he signed the charter creating the rules of law by which the nation would live.

Our courts, our political arenas, and our society at large recognizes the authority of the Crown and the rule of law. Politicians come and go, behave or misbehave, but the final authority rests with the Crown. That is the rule of law. With the rule of law, any citizen, regardless of race, religion, ethnic origin, political persuasion or language spoken has the right of protection under the law. Without this, we have the rule of money, force and the gun. Nations have withdrawn from the authority of the Crown, and they have fallen into chaos and rule by gun. In a confederation made up of so many diverse groups, it is the recognition and appreciation for a common law that holds us together and keeps us strong. There is not much left in Canada of what is British, but the respect for law remains.

Queen Elizabeth is a reminder there is more to the law than just the law: there is a moral foundation to the law. There is respect for the best of human endeavour, decency and dignity.

It is good she visited Canada and let us celebrate her Jubilee Year. It is good we had our reminder of who we are and what the Crown really means. God save the Queen.

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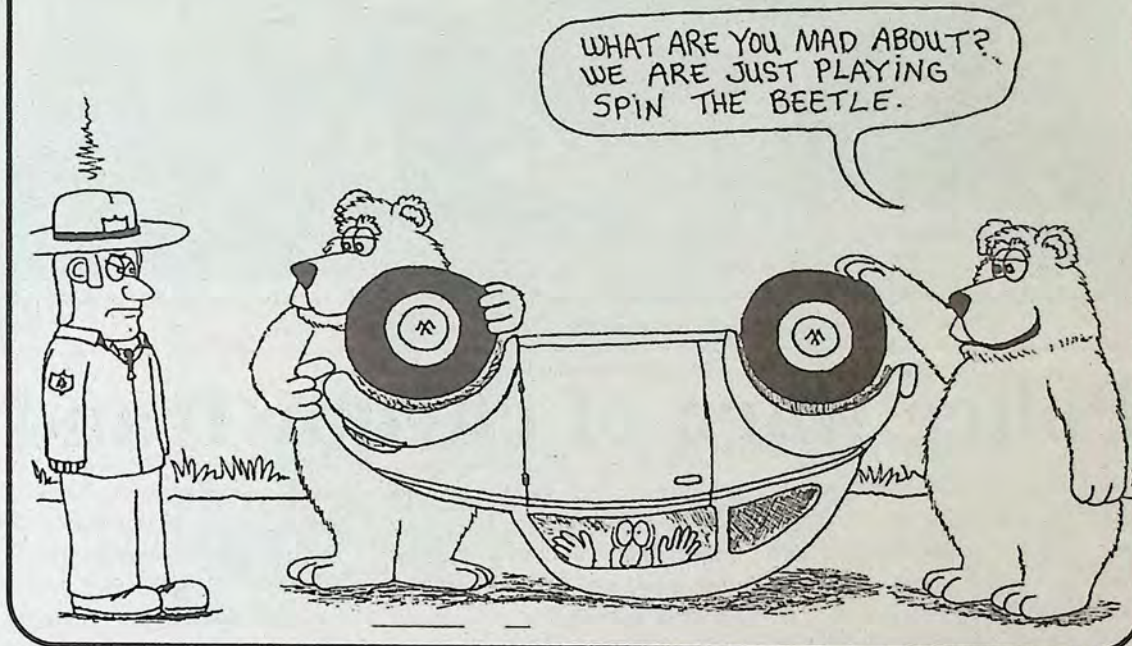

### Co-ordinator praises foster parents

Dear Citizens of Princeton:

October is Foster Parent Appreciation Month in British Columbia. Foster homes are a vital part of our community.

The goal of the Ministry for Children and Family Development is to provide temporary care for children in a warm, loving family environment for a limited amount of time, until the children can return home.

Foster parents are special people. They deal with a wide array of behaviours and challenges. They have meetings with a large number of professionals, counsellors and social workers. Contrary to what some people may think, foster parents are

not in it for the money. They are compensated only for the child's expenses - food, clothing, school supplies, transportation, etc. Some caregivers have a higher level of skills to handle more challenging behaviours and medical/psychological needs of the children and are compensated on a level system accordingly. All foster parents are in it to help children.

They live their lives in fish-bowls. Everyone watches how they care for the children, and sometimes, without understanding the circumstances, make judgements. Foster parents can't tell you anything about the child, his background, or why

he behaves that way. Confidentiality is taken very seriously.

Many of the children have special needs: some you can see, some you can't. Foster parents take a large number of courses and workshops to enhance their skills and knowledge. They respect a child's cultural heritage and encourage the children to maintain ties with their culture and their extended family.

To be a foster parent, you must have a great deal of patience and a good sense of humour. You'll need both! It is often a challenging job, so if you know someone who is a foster parent, let them know how special they are.

I think every one of them is terrific!

### Imagine going hungry in Okanagan-Similkameen!

Dear Editor,

Thanksgiving is a time to celebrate an abundant harvest and good food. What better place to be than in the Okanagan area, where we see the apple harvest underway, the pumpkins and and squash in the field, the digging of potatoes and the preservation of foods through canning, freezing and dehydrating. We are fortunate to live in a valley where agriculture surrounds us and local farmers sell their fresh, nutritious products to farmers' markets, produce stands and local food businesses. However, in the midst of plenty, there are families that have little to eat and give thanks for. A report by Dietitians of Canada and the

Community Nutritionists Council of BC - *The Cost of Eating in BC - The Challenge of feeding a family on low income* - concludes that families with children, especially single parent families on income assistance, are struggling the most.

The report reveals it costs over \$600 to feed a family of four a healthy diet for a month. However, at current income assistance rates, a family cannot meet the national guidelines for healthy eating. After shelter and other living expenses are paid for (clothing, transportation, utilities, child care, etc.) many families have less than \$100 to spend on food for the whole month! There are lots of great places in our world where we can visit and enjoy a vacation. None of us needs to go to a place with a reputation as being unsafe. Look what happened to Miami and Hawaii, not because of terrorists, but because of criminals. Both are still struggling to attract tourists to the levels they enjoyed in past years.

Perhaps economic penalties are the real punishment for these nations where terrorists feel at home. Maybe this is the language they will understand? I personally doubt it. Iraq has suffered dreadfully under economic sanctions for the past 10 years, and yet the people have not risen up to overthrow Saddam Hussein.

The Al Qaeda recently announced it had blown a hole in a French ship, which makes me wonder if anybody should venture into the Gulf of Arabia. Of course, people will still go there, because that is where the oil is, but it is dangerous sea. If we really want to levy economic sanctions against the militant Muslim nations, we have to give up our dependency on oil, and that is not too likely in the foreseeable future!

In the meantime, we will see a lot more of the kind of thing that happened in Indonesia, and we will have to vacation with care.

We sat one table away from the Queen and Prime Minister. I have to say Mr. Chretien's speech was both eloquent and thoughtful. Her Majesty's fondness for Canada was expressed by more than just the words in front of her. You could feel her sincerity.

Since most people ask us what we were served for lunch, I can say we had a fresh salad followed by Salt Spring lamb - delicious.

Among those seated at our table was Canada's Gold Medal Olympic wrestler, Daniel Igali, along with the United States Consul. So, what is John Manley's problem? Sure, it's fine to debate the Monarchy. However, how about his timing? How would your grandmother react if she dropped in to visit and you told her that as soon as she dies you're going to shut down her side of the family?

If the federal Liberals don't like President Bush musing about regime change in Iraq, why do they tolerate Minister Manley musing about the regime change in Great Britain?

So then, how does our beloved Queen tie in with our beloved Ron McLean of Coach's Corner fame? While some at CBC were talking about canning Her Majesty, it looked like others at CBC were

thinking about canning his Not-SO-Highness - our man Ron.
