

# Rescue truck crashes on way to fatality

It was "hell morning" for Princeton police, ambulance crew and especially the Highway Rescue crew.

Icy roads contributed to four crashes in the Princeton area on November 7., the last crash being the rescue truck.

The crashing scenario began just before 6:00 a.m. when a 21 year old woman lost control of her vehicle on Highway 5A about 5 km north of Princeton. Her vehicle went off the highway and overturned. The driver was taken to Princeton General Hospital where she was treated for minor injuries.

The second crash was a head-on collision on Darcy Mountain Road at 7:33 a.m. The 49 year old woman driving one of the vehicles was taken to Princeton General Hospital where she was treated for neck injuries. The

other driver was not injured.

The third crash occurred at 11:12 a.m. when a 1990 Chevrolet Blazer went off Summers Creek Road and overturned. The driver, 72 year old Jim Sanderson, and his 76 year old brother, were not seriously injured, but Jim's wife, Joanne Sanderson, died at the scene from injuries sustained in the crash. The couple owned a cottage at Missezula Lake for decades, and were well-known in the Princeton area, where they have family connections as well as many friends.

Princeton Highway Rescue hurried to this crash, and went off Summers Creek Road. The crew was not injured, but the rescue truck sustained a lot of damage.

People residing along Summers Creek Road say it was glare ice in many areas.

## BEA elects executive

After a long process of becoming established as a society and developing 30 paid members, Princeton Area Business Enhancement Association held its first annual general meeting. John Babiak reported the fibre-board plant had a November 15 deadline for looking at Princeton and would look elsewhere if the necessary amount of fibre was not available in the Princeton area. Babiak said they were able to identify only half of the amount required and are now looking at Williams Lake as a candidate for the plant.

There will be prizes for business decorations, such as windows and interiors of businesses. Santa Claus will arrive to greet the children in the park and Legion Hall as in previous years, and Moonlight Madness will go on during the evening.

In Princeton, approximately 500 people gathered at the Cenotaph to hear prayers and words of remembrance, and for the laying of wreaths. Legion member Maria Sadegur was Mistress of Ceremonies at the Cenotaph as well as at the gathering at Legion Hall following the Remembrance Day parade. Pastor Chris Haugland said the prayers at both. Sadegur thanked all of those who participated in the ceremonies outdoors, as well as those who took wreaths around to stores and arranged to have them laid during the ceremonies. Special thanks went to Glen Esdale and Patrick LePoidevin, the pipers.

Following lunch, Sadegur read the Prime Minister's letter which ended, "Let us rededicate ourselves to our values of peace and freedom."

Mayor Randy McLean began by commending the Legion Ladies Auxiliary for being of great assistance with his parents' funeral teas, and for sharing their money from Civilization Project concert with the community. Then he said he had asked students to write what Remembrance Day means to them, and selected an essay by Kyle Markin. It was excellent. The 13 year old Grade 8 student said it was "a time to think what could have happened" if the soldiers had not made their sacrifice, and a time of "remembrance of all that was lost" and "a time for

weapons to be lowered and flags to be raised."

Mayor McLean's reading drew a round of applause, but when he called Kyle Markin to the podium, the applause was extremely enthusiastic. In appreciation for the excellent essay, Mayor McLean presented Markin with a ticket to the remainder of the Posse hockey games.

Legion President Bob Paterson spoke of the 1,000 peacekeepers still in Bosnia. He reminded the audience there are only 200 World War I veterans in Canada, whose average age is 101 years. He spoke of World War II veterans' "decades of service to their communities" since they returned.

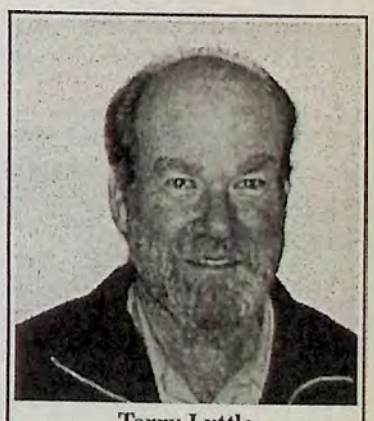
Edna Carleton

## Good curling!

The rinks are alive with the cracking of stones. This week I replaced my golf shoes with curling shoes, golf clubs with curling broom and bike shorts with thermal underwear. Yes, it is curling season once again. Curling is a popular sport whose historical roots date back to 16th century Scotland. It has thrived in northern climates such as Canada's, where rocks and cold weather are plentiful. The sport is appealing to many people because it is a team game which can be played by all

ages, sizes and genders.

Curling does require a significant amount of balance and flexibility, and care must be taken to prevent injury. The most significant injuries in curling revolve around falling on the ice and muscle strains. While throwing rocks last week, I noticed that the off season had not been kind to the flexibility of my muscles. Looking around, I surmised that this shortened state of muscularity could predispose one to injury if not careful.

Therefore, the answer is stretching! Slow down! The answer to this problem is not quite that simple. One problem is the cold environment. Colder temperatures cause you to conserve body heat by altering blood flow patterns to more central locations. There is less blood flow in the extremities, resulting in lower muscle temperature and reduced flexibility.

One answer is to warm up your body prior to curling, similar to warming the car in the morning. Rather than driving to the rink, plan ahead and walk. Walking, even in cooler temperatures, allows your body to use muscles throughout the body. The increase in metabolic activity in the muscle during walking results in heat generation and increased muscle temperature. Furthermore, active movement exercises the joints of the body, allowing them to move more freely through a full range of motion. Stretching should only be completed after the body has had sufficient warm-up activity. It is

my opinion that failing to warm up will significantly increase the chance of injury while stretching. In fact, my advice is to not stretch prior to activity if you have not warmed up your body.

Another factor to consider is using proper form to stretch a specific soft tissue. Isolating the major muscle groups in curling is very important. Muscles commonly used with curling include the flexor/extensor groups of the arm and thigh, hip flexors, back muscles, posterior groups of the lower leg and gluteal muscles. Stretching each group before and after a curling game is beneficial to your musculoskeletal health. Good stretching habits will increase your ability to curl, reduce injury and extend the age to which you are able to curl. The following are more useful curling advice.

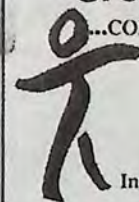
- \* Warm up prior to curling match.
- \* Stretch mentioned muscle groups before match. Stretches are available online at [www.merittchiro.com](http://www.merittchiro.com) or contact the office.
- \* Isolate, relax, increase tension (mild/moderate) and hold until the muscle releases. You should not feel pain or bounce during a stretch. If you feel pain, reduce the tension, you are exerting too much strain.
- \* Practice delivery.
- \* Stretch again after the match.

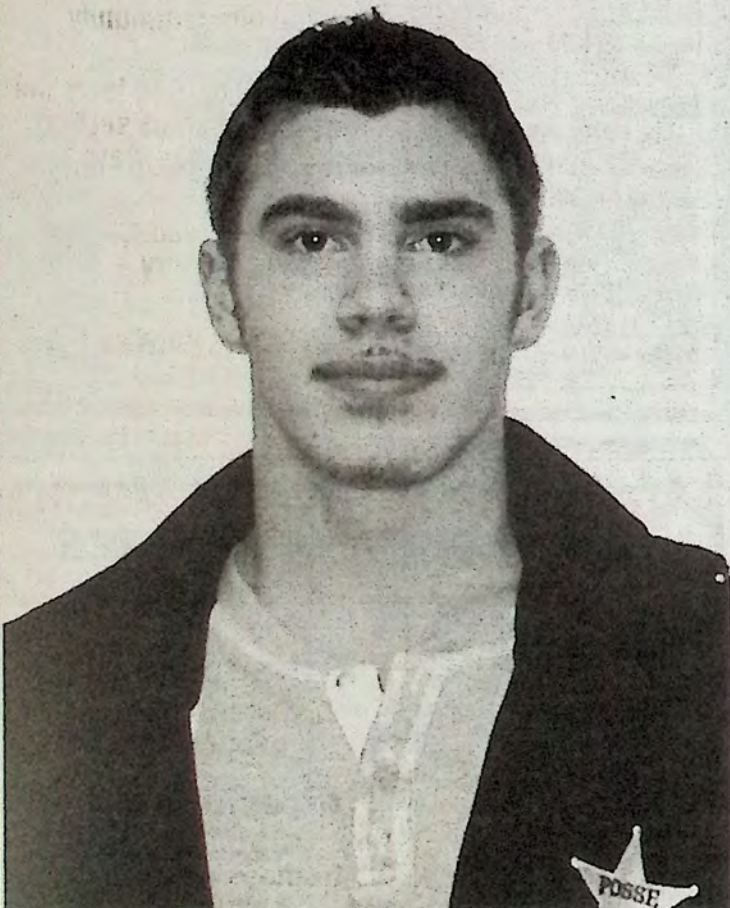

  - a) Cutting any trees marked by the Ministry of Water, Land and Air Protection for the preservation of wildlife.
  - b) Cutting snags over 49cm (16 inches) in diameter. These are to be left for wildlife and birds.
6. REFRAIN from cutting any live, green trees or removing any Forest Company's coniferous or deciduous log decks for firewood as doing so is an infraction against the "FORESTACT" and subject to penalty charges; and
7. Assume responsibility for any damage, injury claim, or expense that the Crown faces as a result, directly or indirectly, of the activities carried out in connection with this permit.

### Decisions, decisions

Yesterday, we honoured the memory of those who died to protect our way of life. During the past weeks, we have received information that makes us wonder if we have, as a nation, honoured what they sacrificed for.

We tend to forget the tremendous social improvements veterans made after they came home. They brought us advantages like unemployment insurance, old age pensions, Canada Pensions, worker's compensation, and a host of other excellent social welfare programs. Their vision of a good nation was created by their generation and was a priceless legacy to all of us.

The information we received begs the question of whether we have honoured their vision of what Canada should be. We learned there are hundreds of thousands of Canadian children going hungry because our nation chooses to leave single parent families in poverty. We learned there are four-thousand Canadians who are homeless.

Did those soldiers die so we could live in a nation that tolerates children going hungry and people living in shelters or on the streets? No, these soldiers had lived through the Great Depression, and they never wanted to see that sort of thing happen again.

Perhaps the worst dishonouring of what they fought for is the Supreme Court ruling allowing prisoners in federal penitentiaries the right to vote. The vote is a right of freedom, and one of the fundamental principles of our society is that those who cannot handle freedom must be denied freedom, so we put them behind bars. The rights we enjoy carry responsibilities, too, and we put the least responsible people behind bars.

At the same time, many of us do not honour our freedom when it is time to vote, and those people do not share the responsibility for deciding what kind of community we will create. Every vote makes a statement about who and what we believe in. We have the freedom to choose our future as a community.

On Saturday, exercise your right and responsibility. Vote.

be used on a mass scale because it is too expensive to produce. The least expensive stuff could easily be produced, and would be easy to disperse.

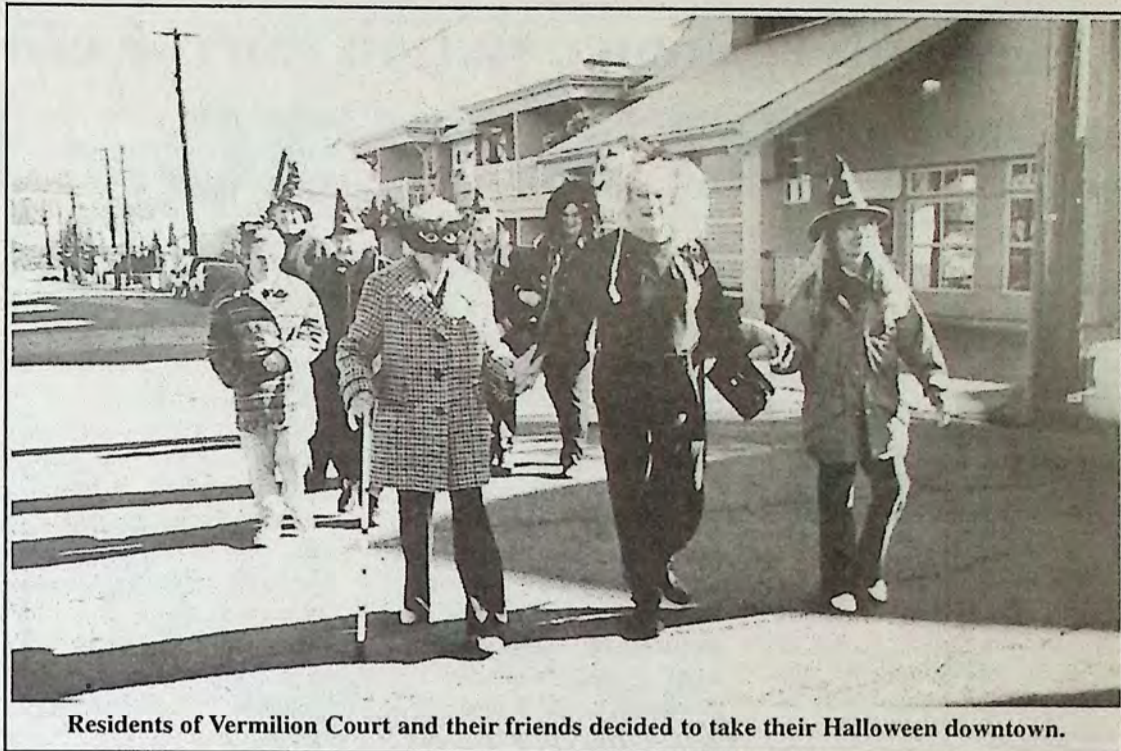

**Market continues strong**

South Okanagan Real Estate Board reports MLS sales increased one percent in October, continuing the trend seen in earlier months. Year to date figures indicated sales units are up 29 percent above last year, with 1,829 sales to the end of October 2002, compared with 1,410 in 2001. Sales in Princeton are up 52 percent, from 95 units last year to 145 this year (to October 31). Keremeos sales are down 11 percent.

Dramatic increases in sales volume are again recorded with a 40 percent increase this year for the entire area. Princeton per average residential property value dropped this year by 12 percent to 91,054. Keremeos sales value increase by nine percent to \$117,641. Both are lower than Okanagan prices, where Kaleden, Okanagan Falls and Naramata prices are over \$200,000 per average unit, and Penticton's average is \$142,316 per residential unit.

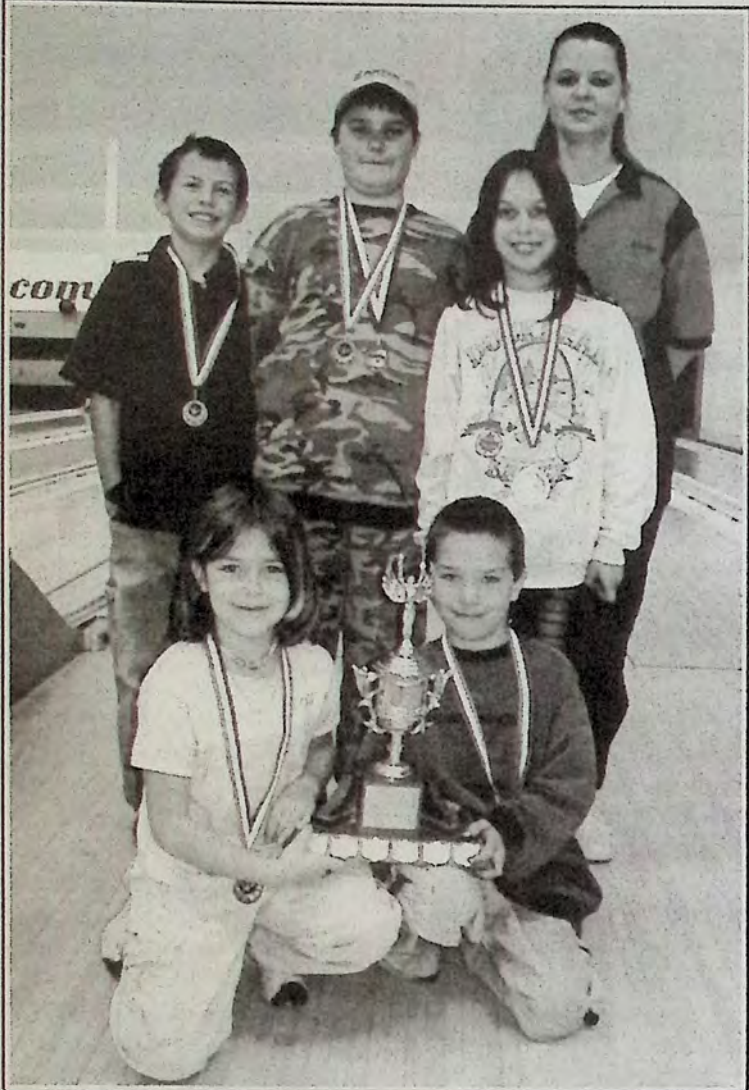

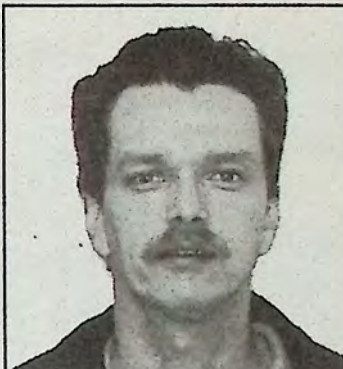

## How to run a good meeting: Part 2

Presented by Princeton Toastmaster's Club

Dear Nephew;

Now, where were we? Oh, yes, the Treasurer's report.

In some clubs, depending on how the money is handled, the chairman can ask for a motion that bills be paid. In other clubs the treasurer goes ahead and pays the bills, knowing these expenses have already been approved by the members.

In this and many other matters, what has become customary in the club's way of handling business is of great importance. If a system works, and the members are happy with it, and it doesn't break

any laws, keep on using it.

Now that the minutes and treasurer's report are dealt with, turn your attention to committee reports. A special committee is often appointed by the chairman to study a proposition and formulate a plan. Much work can be done by committees; it saves time at your regular meeting. The chairman must be sure to ask for their reports and to deal with them like this:

- if they simply report but have no recommendations, say "the report is received and will be placed on file."

- if their work is incomplete, say "report is received and the com-

mittee is continued"

- if this is their final report, announce that the committee is discharged - and be sure to thank them!

If the committee has made recommendations, these should be acted on by vote.

Now you can turn to "unfinished business" - sometimes called "business arising from the minutes" because it is something held over from a previous meeting. We'll deal with actual techniques when we come to "New business".

And that's a whole subject in itself. More next week.

# Highways approves beautification project

The Ministry of Transportation has approved the beautification project proposed by Karl Lang. The project will improve the triangular strip between Highway 3 and Mayne Avenue at the top of the hill across from the curling rink. Lang made the proposal to Town Council in September, and received Council's approval.

Lang told the News Leader his committee will proceed with the drawings and planning during the winter and the construction will go ahead in spring.

Lang must abide by specifications from the District

Development Technician of the Ministry of Transportation, which states:

\* the landscaping shall not inhibit the sight distance of drivers using any of the surrounding roads and intersections.

\* permission to landscape the area does not grant any right, title or

interest in or to the land  
\* utilities may still want to install works in or through the area

\* if and when the land is required for road purposes, the landscaping may be removed without compensation.

Lang has no problem with these conditions.
