How Princeton voters cast their ballots

Princeton Town Council will take on a whole new look when the new Council is sworn in on December 2. The present Council has its final meeting November 18.

School Trustees will be sworn into office in December, probably on the second Wednesday of the month, in Princeton.

There was a good turnout of voters in all of the races. At one point, voters were lined up outside the Legion Hall waiting for their turn to cast their ballots.

In the Mayor's race, Keith Olsen topped the polls with 469 votes, followed by Randy McLean with 435, and Allan Nigul with 75.

In the race for a seat on Town Council, Kathy Clement topped the polls with 636 votes, followed by Lorne Esselink with 599, Ray Jarvis won 489 votes, and Spencer Coyne won 478 votes. Fred Leard won 402 votes, followed by Dan Sulentich with 378 votes and Jaymie Atkinson with 349 votes.

In the School Trustee election for Princeton area, Gordon Comeau topped the polls with 791 votes, followed by Ken Heuser with 619 votes, and Dina Slowikowski-Campbell with 502 votes. Ken Brown received 453 votes, Carol Bertrand won 453 votes and Susan Patry won 429 votes.

The total number of voters in Princeton for Mayor and Councillors was 871. For School Trustee, 112 voters cast their ballots in Tulameen, and 1239 in Princeton.

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Car smashes bridge

At approximately 2:12 a.m., Wednesday, November 13, RCMP closed the wooden bridge across the Tulameen River in Princeton. A car lost control on the bridge, smashed into the side of the bridge, and became lodged between the upright support beams.

The occupants had fled the scene when the RCMP arrived. RCMP continued to investigate the whereabouts of the occupants. The vehicle's license plate was at the bottom of the Tulameen River.

Town Works Foreman Henry Rykers left the bridge closed pending an inspection to discover whether there was serious structural

damage to the beams supporting the top of the bridge. A structural engineer arrived to evaluate the damage and found one of the upright beams had been cracked. Temporary repairs have been done so the bridge could be re-opened, but permanent repairs must be made by persons qualified to do this type of work. At this time, Town of Princeton has requested an estimate from Argo Road Maintenance.

There is no current estimate of what the total bill for the bridge will be, but common sense says it is going to be a substantial piece of change.

Princeton enjoys low crime rate

Princeton's crime rate is below the average for B.C. Serious crime, which is classified in the Canada Criminal Code, involves crimes such as assault, mischief, theft, and so on.

Cpl. McVicar, of Princeton RCMP Detachment, with Staff Sgt. Greg Tomash, presented the facts and figures about police activity in Princeton when they visited Town Council on Monday, November 4.

Despite the low crime rate, RCMP keep busy with calls for service related to non-criminal matters. Many calls are related to lost and found property, bears in the back yard, barking dogs, and traffic violations.

Total calls for service dropped slightly in 2001 when compared with the year before, although Criminal Code calls increased slightly.

The total population of 6,058 residing in Princeton Detachment service area is served by seven RCMP officers, responding to 340 calls each in 2001. The crime rate per 1,000 people is 83 in E Division and 13 in Princeton area.

Area H voters defeat Library Referendum

Despite a lot of campaigning by Okanagan Regional Library in an attempt to persuade Area H voters to join the Regional Library system, and pay taxes to support the system, the Library Referendum was soundly defeated.

At the Princeton polls, 399 voters cast their ballots. In Tulameen, 114 voters turned out to the polls to vote on the question.

There were a total of 178 votes in favour of joining Okanagan Regional Library and 375 votes against.

This referendum leaves Area H out of Okanagan Regional Library system, echoing the results of a referendum held over a decade ago on the same question. Area H residents will still pay \$75.00 per year to join the library, which gives them access to all services.

Maryanne Woodford and Keith Olsen – opted to retire from those positions, four Directors were elected to serve the remaining year of those terms. The new Directors are Sherri Thompson, Sue Derkson, Sondra Cherot and Doug Grigg.

In other PXA business, a representative from ATV Canada inspected the fairgrounds and was pleased with the facility. He is looking forward to the ATV Jamboree next summer.

Members voted to allow Princeton Fire Department to store the Spook

House equipment under the grandstand at no charge.

The power to operate heaters for livestock water was set at \$10 a month.

Don Mare asked if the PXA would share the cost and give approval to having a PA tower between the demolition derby pit and the Tuff Truck track. The PXA gave approval for the tower and improvements to the PA system, but not for sharing in the cost. Mare was asked to give a rough estimate at the next meeting, which will be held January 14 at Town Hall.

Katimavik youth are added value

Bonnie Jesten, Principal at John Allison Elementary School, introduced Alicia Jung to the Board of School Trustees at the November 6 meeting. Jung is one of the Katimavik group currently in Princeton.

Jesten began by telling trustees about Katimavik, an Inuit word meaning "a meeting place". She told trustees more than 22,000 Canadian youths have participated in Katimavik since its inception, and more than \$1 billion worth of volunteer hours have been contributed to host communities.

Jung has worked at John Allison Elementary and participated in cross-country racing, soccer, French class, kindergarten play, and has read to students and listened to them.

The current Katimavik contingent leaves at the end of this week. They are going to a small Mennonite community in Ontario, where they will learn how things were done before electricity and other modern devices became commonplace.

Princeton's next contingent will come from New Brunswick, arriving next week.

Katimavik youth have been a great asset in both Princeton and Keremeos.

B.C. trade mission to China made deals for wood products

Team BC has confirmed the market potential for British Columbia's wood products in China, but success in Asia will be the result of patience, persistence and a lot of hard work, according to Forests Minister Michael de Jong.

De Jong was in China for a seven-day visit. He led a delegation of more than 30 leaders from B.C.'s forest industry, First Nations and labour organizations.

Shanghai

Shanghai city officials have invited B.C. to take part in planning and building a massive urban redevelopment project in Shanghai. Land has been set aside for the project. The city is building nine satellite communities using different international construction techniques. Plans are for one of the villages to feature North American style homes.

In another agreement in Shanghai, a memorandum was signed for B.C.'s International Holdings to provide spruce, pine and fir lumber for use in China's construction, furniture and packaging industries.

Beijing

Another agreement signed during the trip will give B.C. a share of a 900-unit housing development near

Beijing, slated to start construction in February 2003. The project, called Vancouver Gardens, aims to take advantage of Vancouver's international reputation as a desirable place to live and will feature styles of homes like those in the lower mainland. At least 40 of the homes will be constructed with wood.

While in Beijing, de Jong met with organizers of the 2008 Beijing Summer Olympics to promote the use of B.C. wood products in facilities construction. Beijing has 22 sites to build or renovate for the Olympics, and B.C. is interested in providing building products that will meet the environmental requirements of the International Olympic Committee.

China, with its population of 1.2 billion, has the potential to help B.C. diversify its wood products markets.

Last year, B.C. sold \$23 million worth of forest products to China. China had approximately 10 million housing starts last year, the largest number in the world. While most buildings are made of concrete and brick, demand is increasing for cost-effective, environmentally friendly and renewable products like wood.

Kick sleds are akin to scooters on runners and are a normal form of transportation for people of all ages in the Scandinavian countries where roads are left covered with packed snow so kick sleds can be used. Kick sleds can be used on ice, on ski trails, snowmobile trails, or any

other packed snow or ice.

The person moving the sled stands on the runners, and the seat in front is for a passenger. The sled can be pulled by a dog, too.

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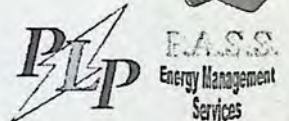

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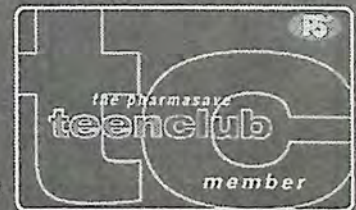
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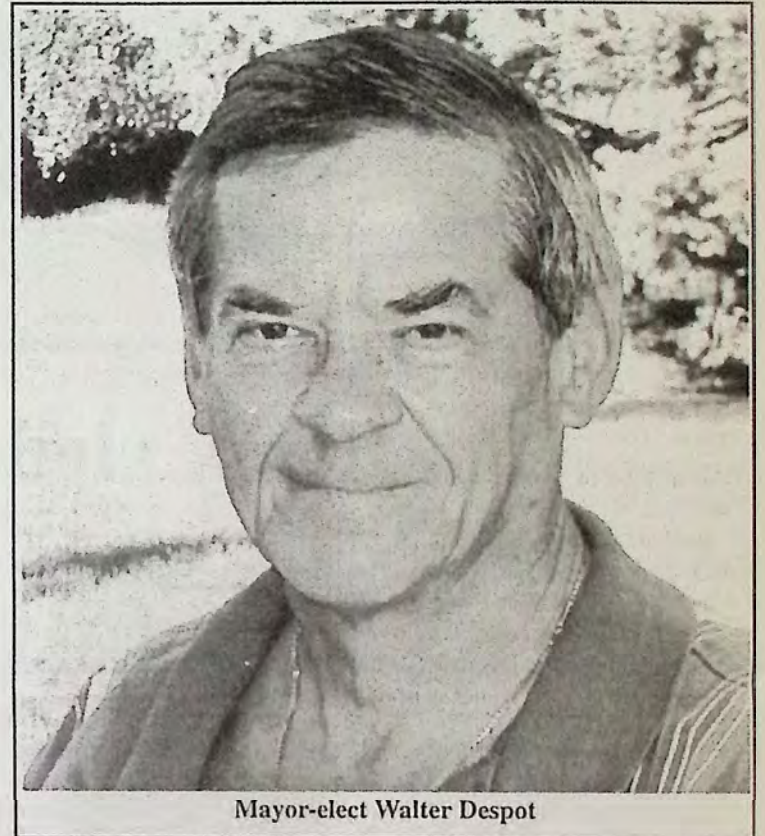

Measuring An Investment For Success

If you invest in stocks, it's simple enough to determine whether a particular stock has performed well. Measuring the performance of a group of stocks, however, is more difficult.

One of the most common yardsticks used to measure stock performance in the U.S. is the Dow Jones Industrial Average (DJIA). The goal of many professional money managers is to meet or beat the performance of the Dow. What exactly is the Dow? The DJIA is an average of the prices of 30 major companies that are stocks listed on the New York Stock Exchange. The Dow used a weighted number that takes into account stock splits and dividends when determining the index's movement. Companies currently listed on the Dow Jones Industrial Average include McDonald's, SBC Communications, Johnson & Johnson, Microsoft, Home Depot, Exxon Mobil and Disney.

Unfortunately, matching the performance of the DJIA is easier said than done. Although many money managers spend endless hours researching and painstakingly selecting stocks, they still often fail to meet or exceed the Dow.

There is, however, an investment strategy that historically has outperformed the Dow Jones Average more often than not. Best of all, this strategy is simple enough to be followed by any investor. Here's how it works.

STEP ONE: Prepare a portfolio planning worksheet by listing all 30 stocks included in the Dow Jones Industrial Average. List them from highest to lowest in terms of dividend yield. This information can be obtained from the financial page of the newspaper.

STEP TWO: Build on the Growth & Income section of your portfolio. From this list, select the 10 stocks with the highest dividend yield, and invest an equal amount of money in each. Now congratulate yourself; you've just bought some of the biggest and most well-established corporations in the world at a value price! Usually, stocks that have a high dividend relative to their prices are either out of favour or undervalued.

STEP THREE: Repeat the process each year at a set time. Adjust the stocks in your portfolio as necessary, looking for the stocks that have the highest dividend relative to their prices.

How well does this strategy work? History has shown the 10 highest dividend yielding stocks have typically provided investors with above average total returns. In fact, this strategy has outperformed the Dow Jones Industrial Average 14 of the past 20 years. For example, a hypothetical \$10,000 investment made January 1, 1975 and held through December 31, 1994 would have grown to \$293,153. This investment assumes that all dividends and other appreciation during a year were reinvested at the end of the year. Also, the cost of commissions, custodial fees and income tax are not included in the end value of this investment.

Why is this strategy so successful? It works well for several reasons.

First, the companies listed on the Dow are well-established and financially sound. This gives them stability and staying power even during economic downturns. Thus, it is unlikely the companies in which you invest using this strategy will go out of business.


Secondly, the 10 highest yielding stocks may be companies that have been temporarily undervalued by the marketplace. Therefore, if these companies rebound, they are likely to provide you with an above-average total return.

Thirdly, this strategy buys quality stocks that are out of favour. This 'contrarian' discipline has historically yielded above average returns for equity investors.

Although this strategy is not infallible, historically it has been quite successful, and it appears this strategy will work with other indexes as well. If you're considering investing in Canadian or other markets, this strategy provides a simple way to add global diversification to your portfolio.

*Beating the Dow, a book written by Michael O'Higgins and published by Harper Collins can provide more information on this strategy. If you prefer, your investment representative will be able to recommend an investment plan based on this disciplined equity-selection strategy.

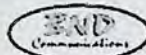

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The Canadian diabetes connection

There is a diabetes epidemic in Canada!

Experts estimate there are two million Canadians affected by diabetes. Among First Nations people, the rate is three to five times the national average, but diabetes does not respect any race of people. Anybody may be a candidate for diabetes.

Diabetes is a dangerous disease caused by lack of insulin production (Type 1) or inadequate insulin (Type 2). Insulin is produced by the body to deal with the sugars we consume.

Among Canadians, 90 percent of all diabetes cases are Type 2, often called adult-onset diabetes, because it usually shows up in adulthood. However, among aboriginal people, Type 2 is now being diagnosed among children.

Diabetes is a major cause of heart disease, adult blindness, kidney failure, and limb amputations. Among Canadians, diabetes is the seventh leading cause of death. Nobody wants to have diabetes.

Breast screening unit arrives in December

Book your mammography appointment now. The Screening Mammography Program is coming to Princeton December 2, 3 and 4. The unit will be located at Princeton General Hospital. Appointments for mammograms are still available.

"Screening mammograms detect breast cancers early, when they are less likely to have grown or spread to other parts of the body," says Dr. Ivo Olivotto, Professor and breast cancer expert at BC Cancer Agency in Victoria.

Women should have a screening mammogram if they fit into the following criteria:

- * now 40 years old
- * not pregnant at this time
- * not breastfeeding at this time
- * no breast implants
- * has not had breast cancer
- * has no current breast problems (such as a lump or nipple discharge)
- * has not had a mammogram in the past year
- * is a B.C. resident
- * has a B.C. doctor

This service is provided free by the BC Ministry of Health and the BC Cancer Agency.

It is a disease that inevitably leads to death, sometimes an early death. Type 2 diabetes can be prevented, or postponed indefinitely by good health practices.

The obesity connection:

Obesity is among the primary predictors of adult-onset diabetes. People who are overweight are at greater risk of developing Type 2 diabetes, especially if their excess weight is concentrated around the mid-section.

The nutrition connection:

An unhealthy diet can influence the development of Type 2 diabetes. Every person with diabetes must go on a healthy diet, meaning major changes in their eating habits. They give up a lot of things they enjoyed, like soft drinks, candy, high cholesterol foods, and their intake of food is limited.

Preventing Type 2 diabetes:**EXERCISE:**

Exercise is the key to preventing Type 2 diabetes.

Canadians, especially Canadian children, are not exercising enough. To prevent problems associated with the development of disease, researchers found that people need the amount of exercise equivalent to walking 12 miles a week. The average person walks at a speed of 2.5 to 3 miles per hour. To do enough walking to reach the required level of exercise, a person would

have to walk 1.7 miles every day or walk for 55 minutes a day. (If you walk more slowly, you would have to walk even longer).

You could engage in other activities, such as dancing for an hour a day, go skiing, play basketball, do aerobics, stretch, do gymnastics, skate, bowl, swim or ride a bike. It is not what you do, but how long you do it that makes the difference. Exercise for one hour a day.

NUTRITION:

A healthy diet is not so much what you eat today or tomorrow, it is the total effect of what you eat over a long period of time. You need a wide variety of foods each week, every week of the year. The key is balance. You need lean meats, hardly any fried foods, plenty of whole grains (such as whole-grain breads and cereals), dark green and orange vegetables and orange fruit, low-fat milk products, beans, and plenty of fibre.

Foods especially good for preventing diabetes are those containing chromium and magnesium, which are found in broccoli, oysters, buckwheat, grapefruit, halibut, turkey, and long grain brown rice and barley. Barley is actually preferable to rice and can be used in soups and as a substitute for rice. Avoid white rice.

Regulating blood sugar is important, too, and beans are excellent for that purpose. Baked beans are cheap but extremely healthy food.

Living past 100**Kids go hungry in Canada**

Canada is a landscape of contrasts when it comes to feeding children. A large percentage of children are over-fed and overweight, while others go hungry because they come from a family where there is little money for food. In children, both the overfed and underfed children face a riskier future, and possibly a shorter life.

Fat kids may contract diabetes, or suffer from heart or circulation problems due to being overly fat, because fat kids tend to become fatter adults.

The underfed child can suffer some ill effects as a result of improper nourishment. In poor families, children may be fed foods that "fill" but offer little real nourishment. For example, a bowl of cheap soup, plus a lot of crackers, may fill the child, but offers little in the way of real nourishment. For a child who lacks sufficient milk, the result may be poorly developed bones and bad teeth.

Many poor families are parented by people who do not know what good nutrition is, and may feed the child relatively expensive foods that lack nutrients. Cheaper food might be better for them. An example would be expensive dry breakfast cereal as compared with inexpensive rolled oats. The rolled oats with milk costs less per serving and yield good nutrition. Macaroni and cheese in prepared form is not expensive, and is made with milk, making it nutritionally sound and filling.

Perhaps the worst thing about Canadian children going hungry is that we live in one of the best food-producing countries in the world, and a lot of food goes to waste. Some children think nothing of smashing pumpkins and eggs at Halloween, while some families cannot afford to buy these nutritious foods. Homemade stew and soups are relatively inexpensive and wholesome.

The health care system may feel the burden in the future of children who have not had enough to eat. There is nothing medicine can do for the adult who was not properly fed as a child, because the basic structure has not developed properly.

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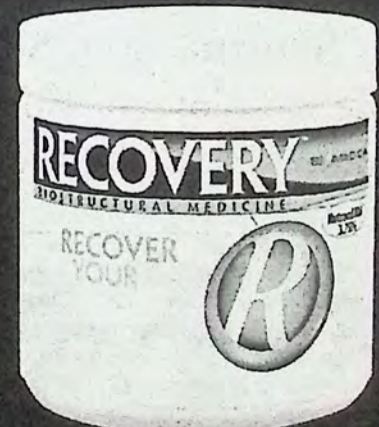

On Sunday, November 10, Princeton's Mac Lind Logging Pee Wee Flyers hosted the match against the Westside Chaos.

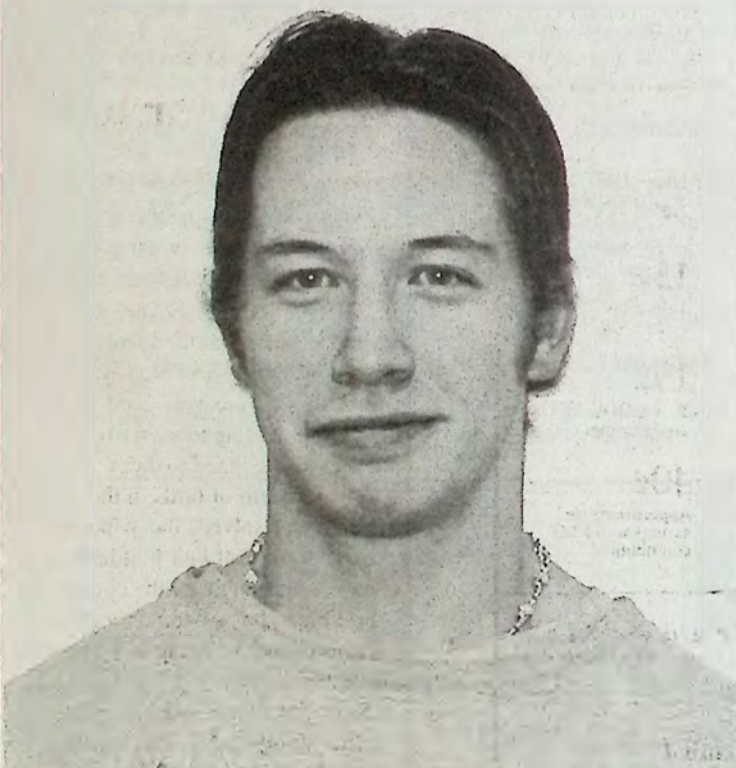

One of the first things to occur after an election is a review, in most people's minds, of the new municipal or school district or regional district people who won. Some people will be pleased, of course, because those for whom they voted will be in office. Others will be disappointed because those for whom they voted will not be in office. This is the way of all elections. This is what a democracy is all about.

The disappointed people should take a good hard look at themselves before pooh-poohing those who won. We must live with those we elected, and we ought to do it with respect and with a will to work with the people elected by the majority. If we want positive results, we have to have a positive attitude.

During all of the recent campaigning, we heard a great deal about lack of openness and accessibility to various elected officials. Because it is the job of a community newspaper to go to meetings, we can tell you honestly that most of the complaints are not justified.

Councils meet and see few citizens in the gallery unless there is a hot issue and they want to protest to Council.

School boards meet in public, but few attend unless they are there to criticize. Most of the time, only a handful of people attend any of these meetings.

At these meetings, there is a question period during which those attending the meeting can ask questions and make comments.

In Regional District, Directors make themselves accessible to those they represent. Any responsible Director can be reached by telephone, fax and email, whether through their home or through Regional District office.

Rather than griping about access and openness, take a proactive role and go and visit some of the people you are tempted to gripe about. Citizenship means more than the right to gripe.

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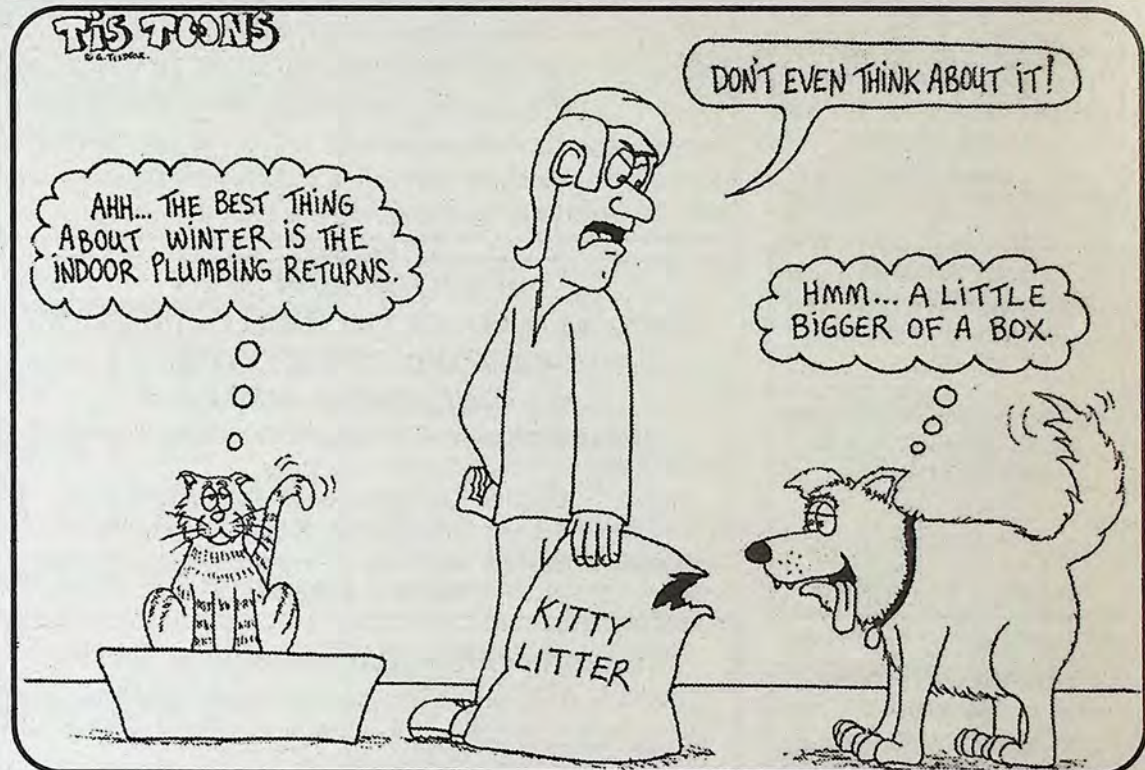

What should an education be?

I went to the most recent Princeton school board meeting and was astonished by the presentation made by the Superintendent, Dr. R. Peacock and his assistant, Earl Hockin. These educators showed all kinds of figures about how Grade 4 students performed on standardized tests for reading, writing and arithmetic.

decreased or abolished. In the Lower Mainland 5,600 seniors are to be "reassessed" with the aim of reducing services to at least 80 percent of them, according to Health Authority spokesmen. They claim this isn't a cost-saving exercise, just an action to transfer help from those who don't need it to those who do.

Even the Vancouver Sun felt compelled to editorially (Oct 30/02) label this excuse as "obvious hypocrisy" as it condemned the government's attack against "the most physically, psychologically and financially vulnerable segments of the population" and the "obvious hypocrisy" used to justify it.

Many of these seniors are now living in fear and under stress and anxiety. They don't know where to turn next. They are told by bureaucrats hired by Gordon Campbell to get their children or neighbours to help them out. In most cases this is quite impractical.

Is this the way to treat our seniors? Is this their reward after a lifetime of work, raising a family, paying their taxes and contributing in countless ways to their communities and country? Is this the "New Era" Gordon Campbell promised?

This is happening not only in the Vancouver Region. It is happening all over the province on the instructions of the Premier and Cabinet. Many of these unfortunate seniors will end up in emergency wards and hospitals with their life spans shortened.

That this could happen in our rich province which plans to spend \$6 billion on the Olympics is almost unbelievable. Why has not one of the 77 Liberal MLAs raised his or her voice in protest?

At the end of the meeting, during question period, I asked, "What is the goal of all this quantifying of student achievement?"

The trustees looked at each other in silence, then Dr. Peacock said there is no way, in the opinion of the Ministry of Education, to find out if student performance is improving unless it is measured from year to year and compared.

I thought about this, and it did not sit well. What is the purpose of education? Will constant improvement in the three R's make better citizens? Will it prepare them for a life in the work force by teaching them how to work? Are our major social problems caused because people do not know how to read, write and do arithmetic?

While thinking about all of this, I recalled some great men of the past century, and wondered if they could have been better if they had had constant measurement of their basic skills. Would Winston Churchill have done better? What about Albert Einstein - could he have been improved upon? Would Nils Bohr have cracked the atom with better measurements of his academic skills?

I thought, too, of Gordon Campbell. Leader of his party and winner of a landslide vote - could he have been Prime Minister with more academic measurements?

The answer, of course, is "NO".

What the famous men of the past century had in common was the ability to see the facts and apply creative thinking. You might even say the same thing of Hitler, but he lacked any real concept of how to relate to others as human beings. None of us wants to produce more Hitlers.

So, what do we want our education system to produce?

Frankly, I believe this question must be asked of every person who pays for the system. All of us pay property taxes, whether we pay it through rent or pay it through direct taxation. All of us have a vested interest in the products of our educational system.

Measuring performance in three areas of achievement does not tell me what kind of citizens we will reap from what we have been paying, and I happen to think the product is really important.

We have some really well-educated people who excel at math, science, reading and writing. They are engaged in cloning us or producing new ways to kill all of us. These people, and the people who fund their projects, lack the moral foundation necessary to stop and ask themselves whether what they are doing is right.

Today, in Canadian cities, we worry about whether children will be safe at school or whether they will be bullied, have drugs pushed at them, or join a gang involved in crime, drugs and violence. Are these behaviours less serious if they know their three R's?

10. It was an age of great inventions and discoveries. Gutenberg invented removable type and the Bible. Another important invention was the circulation of blood. Sir Walter Raleigh is a historical figure because he invented cigarettes and started smoking. Sir Francis Drake circumcised the world with a 100-foot clipper.

We know that large cars use more fuel than small cars. Well, it's the same for electrical appliances.

A large appliance, such as a refrigerator, uses more electricity than a small appliance, like an iron.

To calculate the amount of electricity an appliance uses, multiply the wattage by the length of time it operates.

For example: If the light bulb in your bathroom used 100 watts and it is on for 10 hours, it consumes:

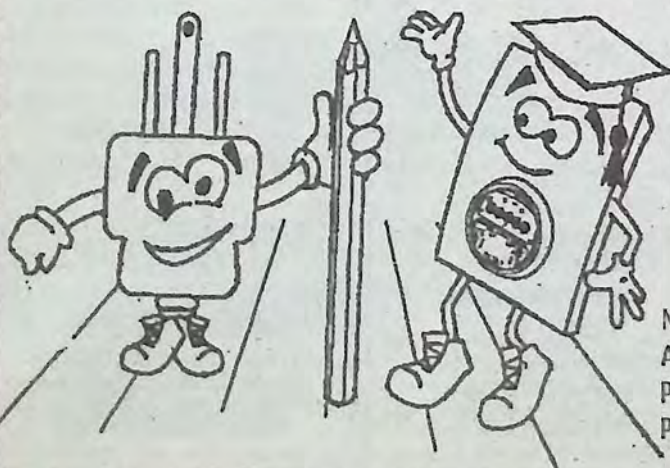
100 watts x 10 hours = 1,000 watt hours of electricity = 1 kilowatt hour (kWh)

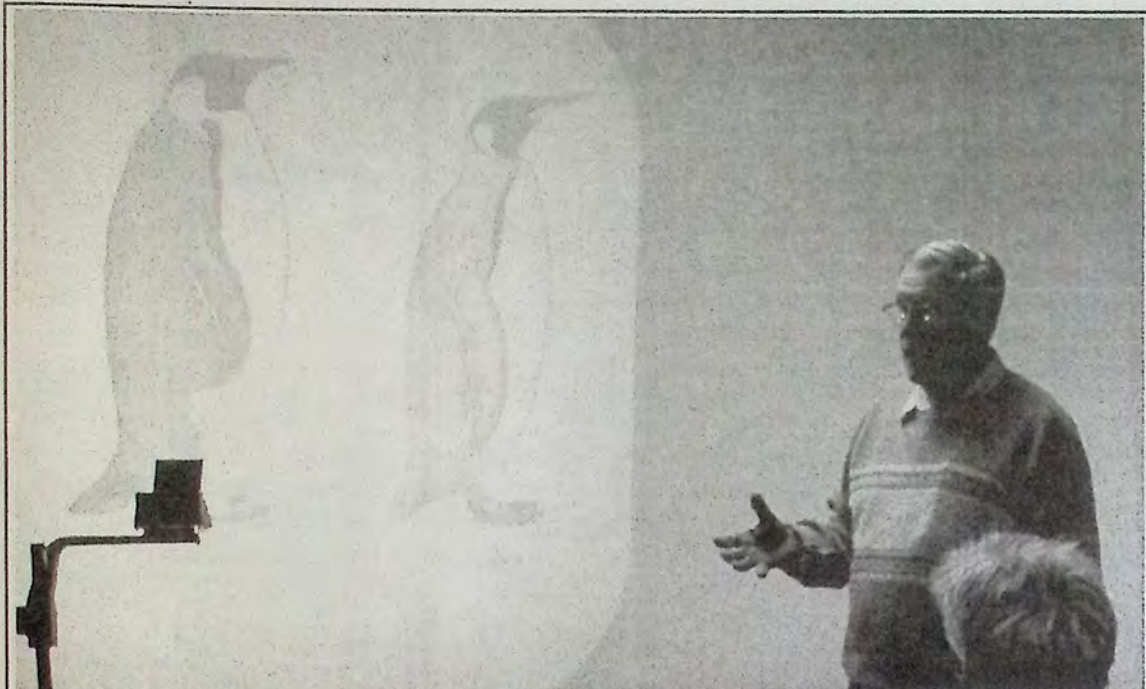
The workshop will include a general understanding of situations which could lead to violence or aggression, types of precautions that can be taken to minimize those threats

Although most of us think of penguins as "cute", Merilees described them as "noisy and stinky". Noisy due to their habit of loud greetings and calls to each other, and stinky as they excrete the remains of the huge amount of food they consume. A penguin can consume more than its body weight in one meal.

During the meeting, club President Madelon Schouten praised the work of Katimavik members who volunteered to help with the Swan Lake project, building a bird blind and pulling weeds.

The club will be selling calendars, bird books, and Don Burbidge's

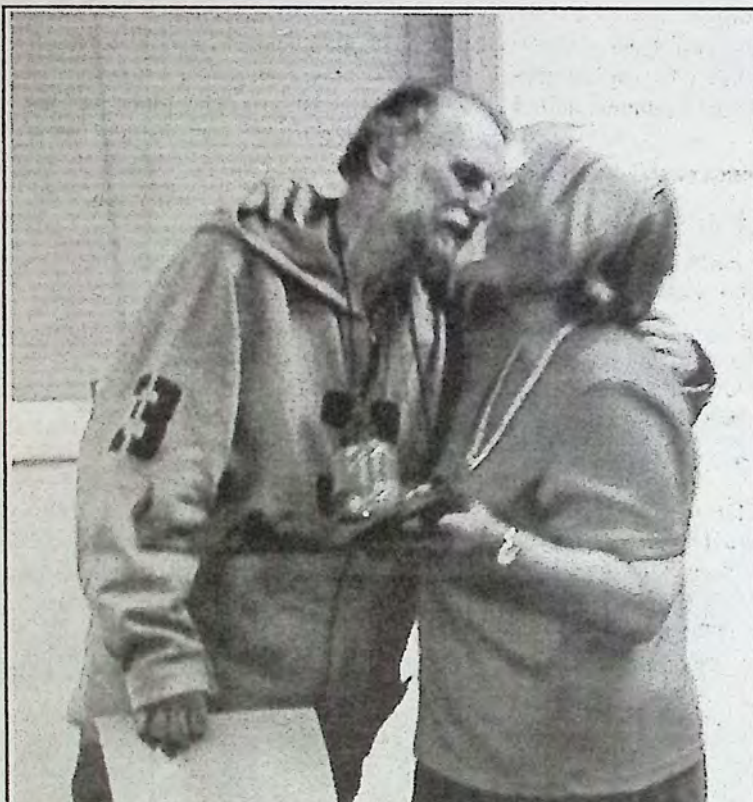
two books (hiking and wildlife in the Similkameen), as well as bird feeders at the Museum flea market this week and the December 1 craft fair at Princeton Secondary.

Princeton welcomes the Pee-wee Quebec Qualifier

For the sixth year, Princeton welcomed the Quebec International Pee-wee Qualifier Hockey Tournament tryouts. This year, the teams were Burnaby Winter Club Bruins, North Shore Winter Club Winterhawks, Kelowna Players Bench Rockets, Squamish Eagles, Langley Eagles, Cranbrook North Star Motors, and the Victoria Racquet Club Kings.

The teams are divided into two divisions and played 16 games to decide the winners. In addition, they had skills competitions in

which individuals showed what they could do. The two winning teams go to Quebec for the International Tournament on February 13 to 23 to compete with teams from Canada, U.S.A. and European countries.

Princeton Minor Hockey Association hosts the tournament which is organized by B.C. Rep Jim Coyle. Coyle began bringing the teams to Princeton after experiencing some problems in other venues. He looked for neutral ice, and contacted Carol Mack, who

was Arena Coordinator and Ice Ambassador for Princeton Minor Hockey Association.

The Quebec Qualifier has been held in Princeton in 1995, 1996, 1997, 2000, 2001, and this year.

The opening ceremonies took place Friday evening. Breann Phillips and Lyn Smart, skaters from Princeton Figure Skating Club, carried Canada's and B.C.'s flags onto the ice and skated around the rink as the Pee-wee teams entered and lined up. They continued to hold up the flags as the ceremonies opened with O Canada. It was refreshing to hear the young hockey players sing the national anthem with such enthusiasm.

Mayor Randy McLean gave the official welcome to Princeton and

expressed the town's pleasure at hosting the event.

The games continued until late Sunday afternoon. The teams playing in the final game were both eligible to go to Quebec, with the third place team as a back-up in case one of the top teams is unable to muster a full roster at the time of the Quebec International.

Many local residents, as well as players and parents from Princeton Minor Hockey Association, joined parents of try-out hockey players in the stands to watch the games and enjoy exceptionally good hockey played by B.C.'s best Pee-wee teams.
