Panel looks for public input in building a charter for public education

What do you think public education should be? Are you in favour of free public education, or do you think we should go back to pay-for-service education in private schools?

A panel which will visit 30 B.C. communities is coming to Princeton on December 10 at Princeton Secondary School Library to hear what students, par-

ents, teachers, business people and others think about public education. What principles should be incorporated into a Charter for Public Education?

The panel is chaired by The Reverend Margaret Marquardt, an Anglican priest, with Dr. John C. Moss, former superintendent of schools and Board member at Malaspina College, Kathy

Whittam, step-parent of a child with special needs, George Watts, former president of Nuuchahnulth Tribal Council, and David Chudnovsky, past president of B.C. Teachers' Federation.

The first portion of the scheduled public input will be from 2:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. and will be devoted to hearing what students want to see in the charter. The second portion will be for everyone else.

Fall Fair plans for coming year

Sue Coyne conducted the election of the Board of Directors for the Fall Fair Association annual general meeting held at Town Hall on November 28.

Jody Woodford continues as Fall Fair President for 2003, with former Director Tophy Hanna as a new Vice-President. Diane Schneider stepped down as Treasurer, and Ruby Bey now fills those shoes. Secretary is Dawn Johnson. Directors are Diane Schneider, Barb Ryan, Marianne Woodford, Andrew Nordquist, Glen Scott, Lane Carter and Wade Nordquist. One position remains open for Director.

Diane Schneider presented the audited financial statement for the past year. It showed a total income of \$31,082.56 and expenditures of \$28,300.98, leaving a balance of \$2,781.58. Added to

the balance on November 1, 2001, the current balance stands at \$6,549.60, leaving the Fall Fair Association in a healthy condition to prepare for Fall Fair 2003.

Following the AGM, Fall Fair members went into a regular meeting. They took the first steps in planning for Fall Fair 2003.

The first item of business was the steel tower for the demolition derby and Tuff Truck announcer. The Association will request of Town Council that it be moved from near the airport to the demolition derby area on the fairgrounds. The tower belongs to the Town of Princeton. A committee was appointed to take care of the details of moving it and making alterations as needed if the Town will give Fall Fair the tower. The committee is comprised Continued on page 2

Council goes to Victoria

Mayor Randy McLean reported on November 18 that he and Administrator Cornie Froese had gone to Victoria to plead the case for more small diameter wood sales. Mayor McLean said there will be more sales available in about one year. Council will receive updates on wood availability.

While in Victoria, they talked to BC Energy and Mines, regarding coal methane permits in the Princeton area. They learned Connaught Energy of Calgary had invested \$2.5 to \$3 million in a property south of Princeton. Mayor McLean speculated it is likely, with that kind of investment, the company will go ahead with some kind of development.

Vavenby will close

Third shift means more jobs at mill

Bad news for Vavenby is good news for Princeton.

Weyerhaeuser is going to close its Vavenby sawmill March 22, 2003, dislocating 90 employees. These employees will go to three other Weyerhaeuser mills - Princeton, Okanagan Falls and Kamloops, where third shifts will begin, thus expanding the capacity of those mills.

For Princeton's sawmill, where there is a partial third shift now, the full shift will mean anywhere from 10 to 20 new jobs. The good news is that the workers will move to Princeton, increasing population and the number of families.

For Weyerhaeuser, according to Ben Henzler, Area Manager for Interior sawmills, the third shift at the expanded mills will make Weyerhaeuser more competitive with high-volume, low-cost mills. At the same time, employees at the three surviving mills will have increased job security.

The actual numbers of employees moving are still being worked out, and the Vavenby employees are receiving out-placement counselling, transition assistance, education and relocation assistance, and severance packages.

The Vavenby mill was constructed by Weyerhaeuser in 1971. It employs 180 people now, and only half will be relocated to other mills.

A November without snow! Is this really odd?

A November without snow seems really odd to a lot of people, but this sort of thing does happen in Princeton. There are those who claim global warming is the cause, but snowfall records indicate global warming was unlikely when "no snow" Novembers occurred, because global warming did not seem to be a problem in 1908, 1909, 1918, 1920, and 1936.

Some other years in which there was three centimetres or less during the entire month of November include 1906, 1917, 1922, 1929, 1932, 1935, 1969, 1972, 1989, and 1997.

The amount of snowfall in November was no indication of how much snow would fall during the winter, but there is a trend of less accumulated snow if there is no snow in November. However, even within the trend, there are no guarantees, because December and January are the months which appear to determine snowfall accumulations throughout all years.

only to discover the horrifying truth – the Croats had been resisting in order to give them time to kill off Serbs in the area, destroy their homes, livestock and drinking water.

It was left to the Canadians to gather evidence of ethnic cleansing, and to enforce the peace. The Canadians had fought their way into the area and had proven they would shoot back if peace was not maintained. This action was a "watershed" in the development of United Nations peacekeeping operational tactics which showed fast military action by peacekeepers combined with highly skilled trained soldiers with the right equipment could enforce peace. This was the tactic for Kosovo.

Woodford, who has been a civilian for many years, does not see his medal, awarded in Ottawa last weekend, as his personal medal. He feels it was given as a tribute to the efforts of all of the Canadian peacekeepers in that conflict. He feels honoured to have been selected to represent those troops who made the advance and will never forget what they found.

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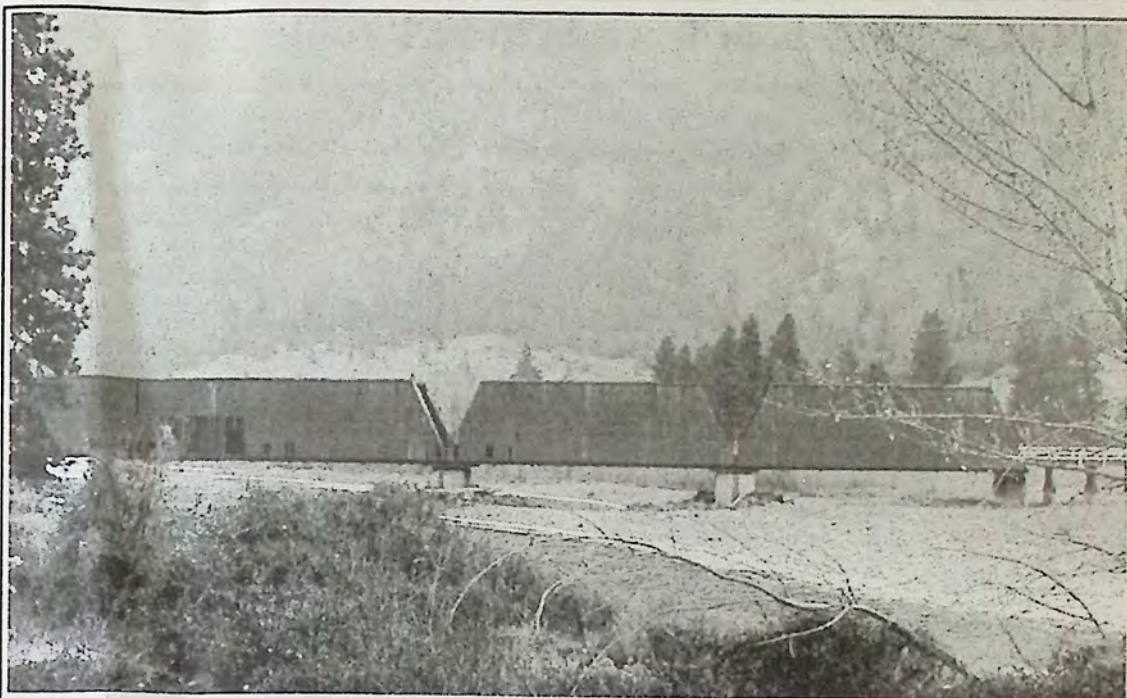

New Directors are Richard Schmidt, June Fletcher, Marion Tew and Roy Stewart. They will officially begin their duties in January.

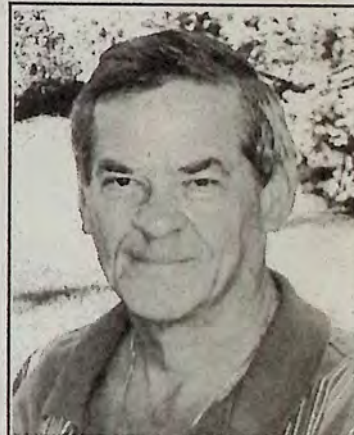
Past President Alex McBride has had four years as President

"Spirit of the Volunteer" is the theme this year for Similkameen Country's annual Christmas parade, light-up and other festivities.

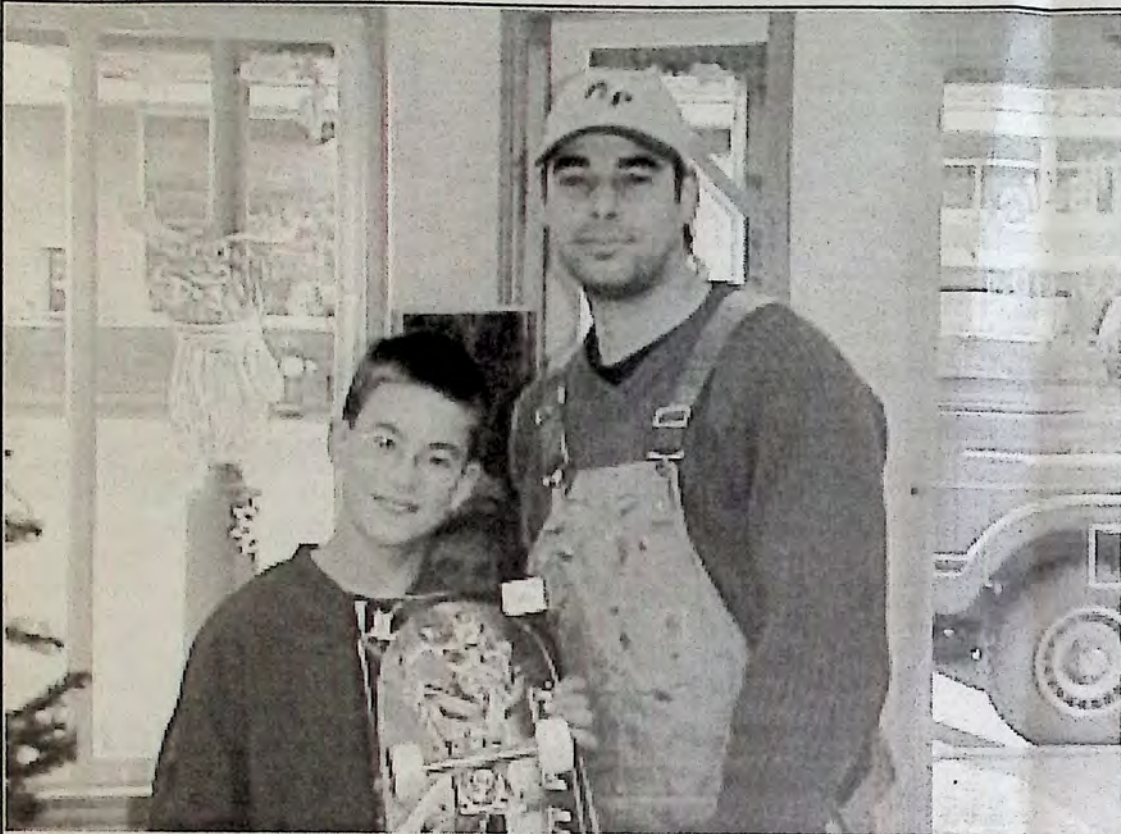

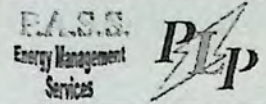

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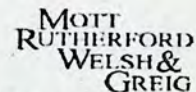

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Survey finds more youths using marijuana and alcohol

The results of a Lower Mainland Youth Drug Use Survey shows an increase in alcohol and marijuana use among youth aged 12 - 24. Rates of use for all drugs appear to be on the rise and the age of first use of alcohol and drugs is low. This survey says the age at which youth first try using alcohol and drugs is between 13 and 15 years old, consistent with other recent surveys. The accessibility of alcohol and drugs is also high. The survey says 81 percent of youth are able to purchase marijuana within 24 hours and 84 percent are able to purchase alcohol within 24 hours.

Pacific Community Resources (formerly Nisha Family and Children's Services Society)

undertook this survey to provide information to those planning and delivering addictions services to youth in the Lower Mainland. The results are intended to assist with more effective planning for alcohol and drug education, prevention and intervention.

Highlights of survey results:

* The survey shows disturbing rates of use. For example, when asked what drugs had been used in the past 30 days, 58 percent of youth indicated they had used alcohol and 42 percent indicated they had used marijuana. Males tended to have a higher rate of marijuana use, and females a higher rate of alcohol use.

* The percentage of youth using alcohol and marijuana increases to 77 percent and 62 percent respec-

tively when they were asked to report what they had used, to date, in their lives. Lifetime use of ecstasy was reported at 25 percent, cocaine at 20 percent, methamphetamine (speed, crystal meth) at 19 percent and heroin at seven percent.

Age of first use:

The survey shows alcohol and marijuana are typically the first drugs used with the most frequently reported age of first use at 13 years, followed by cocaine at 14 years, and heroin, meth, and ecstasy at 15 years.

Youth attending school regularly had a lower rate of alcohol and drug use than youth not attending or seldom attending school - this was the case with all drugs except ecstasy.

Alcohol-Drug Service launches new Grade 4 program

Alcohol-Drug Education Service is launching a new drug prevention program for Grade 4 students: *Making Decisions: Grade 4*, the latest in the service's popular and effective *Making Decisions* drug education prevention series. *Making Decisions: Grade 4* targets every grade 4 student, and their teachers and parents, throughout British Columbia.

This new drug prevention program for Grade 4 students, recommended by the BC Ministry of Education, expands the existing curriculum for Grades 6 and 7. *Making Decisions* for Grades 8 and 9 is under development.

Making Decisions: Grade 4 includes:

1. Teacher manual complete with four lessons, student activity sheets, a parent handout, a list of web resources and more.
2. Student storybook, *Mission RAD (Research about Drugs)*.

Research shows the vast majority of students in Grade 4 have not used drugs other than medicines. The *Making Decisions: Grade 4* provides students with problem-solving, independent thinking, and resisting persuasion skills that need to be fostered before young people face drug-related choices.

During the implementation phase, an information package will be sent to every school and school district in B.C. Displays will be manned at various education and teachers' conferences. Materials will be promoted on the Alcohol-Drug Education Service website and through the Power Choices newspaper series.

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Is irradiated food good?

Canada's Ministry of Health has approved irradiation of food. The question we need to ask is this: "Is food exposed to radiation good for us?"

Basically, irradiated foods are hit with a low dose of radiation during processing. This would be along the idea of treating cancer patients with a dose of radiation to get rid of cancer cells. Food treated with radiation would not have bugs in it - it would be sterilized.

Health Canada has told people it will be a good thing. Irradiated food will not contain E-coli and other kinds of bacteria. The normal rotting process will not take place.

There have been vocal opponents of radiated foods since the concept was first introduced. Potatoes are irradiated to prevent them from sprouting, giving them a longer shelf life. Nobody has answered the question as to whether the potato is really still alive and good for you after it has been irradiated.

Workers at Health Canada have heard both sides of the story of irradiation of foods, and they are not sure it is a good thing. They will not say the food treated with a small dose of radiation is good for people. They have said it was pressure from food processing industry that brought the issue forward.

When we talk about the value of fresh food in our diets when compared with processed and refined foods, where does radiation fit in? There is a simple answer to that question. If a food will not rot, will our bodies see it as real food, or will it be something else? Will our digestive system be able to recognize it as food and extract nutrients from it?

Those people who strongly oppose radiation of foods will undoubtedly avoid those foods, and let's hope our government insists on foods being labeled "irradiated" so we will know which food is which.

If irradiated food is not good for us, it may take years for this to be proven. In the meantime, we must make up our own minds what we eat.

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How to run a meeting

Dear Nephew:

In my last letter I described how a chairman can help a member with the wording of a motion. Keep it firmly in mind, though, that the chairman never proposes a motion himself.

If there is a topic you feel strongly about and want to express an opinion, ask the Vice-President to act as chairman temporarily while you act as an ordinary member. In a small group this rather formal sift is not necessary, but keep in mind, dear, that although you may be president, you cannot impose your ideas. Your task is to enable the group to arrive at decisions.

Once in awhile you'll encounter a member who fancies himself as an expert. He will try to use his limited knowledge to disrupt a meeting by claiming that the chairman hasn't handled some matter according to the rules. Don't let such people upset you. Remember this: if you have followed the basic principles, made sure that members have had a chance to express their views, and you've conducted the voting in a business-like way, their carping is not contributing to getting things done.

If at some point you feel you are getting bogged down, call a halt. The purpose of a meeting is to make progress and if the only progress you've made is to get hung up, your best move is to make a fresh start.

One pitfall lies in handling amendments. Motions in general are subject to amendment. If, after a motion is made, someone gets

an idea that would improve it, he must move to amend. This can be done by adding, inserting, or striking out words - sometimes until it looks like anything but the original motion. The changes, however, must NOT result in the motion having the opposite of its original meaning.

Let's use the following example: a member may say "I move we have a picnic on November 25" and this motion is duly seconded.

In the ensuing discussion it may be pointed out that the whole place will be under a foot of snow by November 25. Before the motion is voted on, a member could say "I move the word 'picnic' be deleted and the words 'potluck supper' be put in its place." This amending motion must be seconded.

Now - you being a bright lad, will see you have two motions to deal with, the original and the amendment. Deal with the amendment first, with the usual "those in favour" and "those opposed". If this motion carries, the original motion has therefore been amended to read "I move we have a potluck supper on November 25" and you now proceed to conduct the vote on the amended original motion.

An amendment can itself be amended, but that's as far as it goes.

Make sure the secretary keeps a careful record. You may need to refer to it.

See what I mean by getting bogged down? Just keep your cool, be methodical and fair. Aunt Em.

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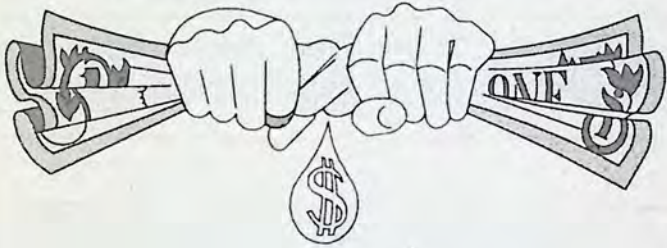

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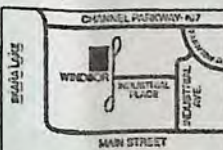

OUR VIEW

What do you think is an educated person?

This is something we really need to think about because we are being asked to provide input into a Charter for Public Education for British Columbia. A panel is coming to Princeton on December 10, and students, parents, teachers, seniors, business people, and any interested persons are invited to attend and say what the charter ought to read.

Princeton will be one of thirty communities selected for public hearings. The panel will be trying to create a charter from a consensus on fundamental principles to guide public education. When we define fundamental principles for anything, it is no easy task, so the News Leader is going to give an opinion on what those principles ought to be, based on past history in education.

First, every child must be respected, regardless of race, religion, ethnic origin or the economic or social status of the parents. We put this first, because students will tell you, and surveys have proven it, that teachers discriminate in favour of certain groups, especially in regard to local social or economic status of the family.

Secondly, every child should have a safe, healthy school environment in which no abuse or injustice is permitted, regardless of source.

Third, academic achievement records should not be subjected to alteration due to the teacher's perception of a child's behaviour or attitude. This is especially important in secondary school, where many cases have occurred in which a student scored high but was given a lower mark due to "attitude". Students' academic achievement must be based on objective evaluation of what they know, not whether the teacher approves of attitude or behaviour.

There are three principles to chew on. There are many more we could add, such as ensuring every child has knowledge of and access to proper nutrition at school, or no school board should meet out justice for student crime (let the justice system deal with crime). Think about it. Then speak out.

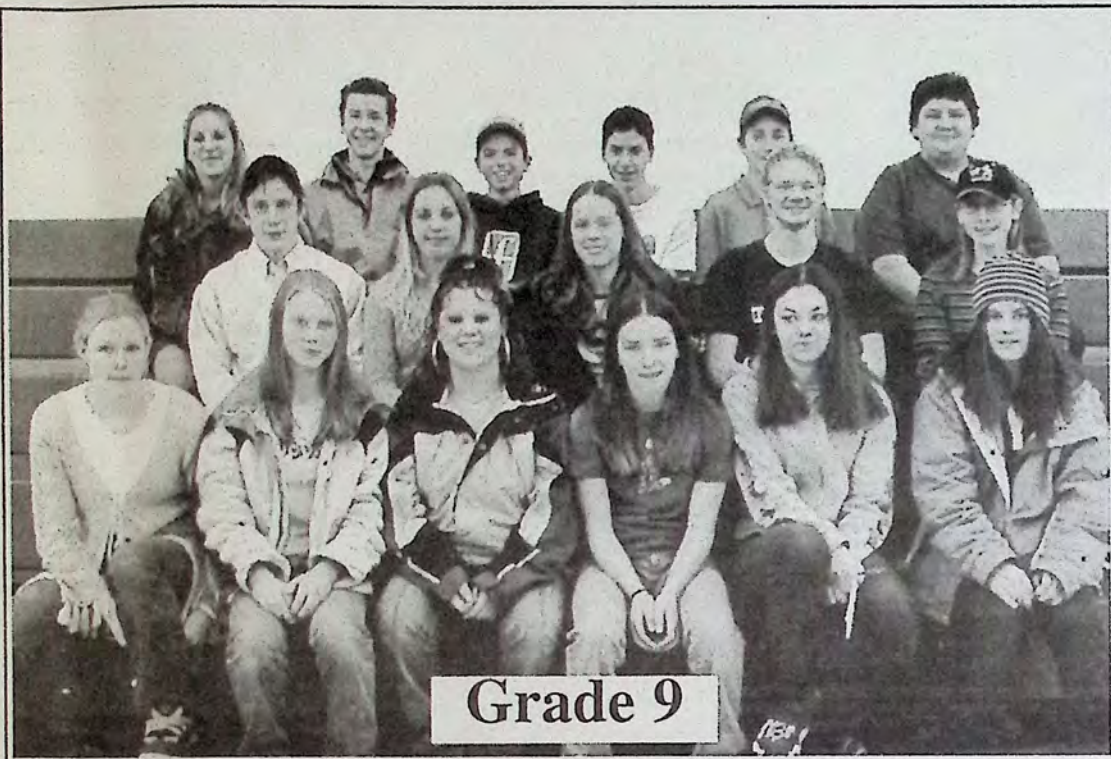
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Valley First hosts great seminar on Wills and Estate Planning

Investments and taxes have a powerful affect on Wills and Estates. Many of them were discussed at a seminar thursday night at the Belaire Restaurant.

Valley First Financial Group Professional Financial Planner Garry Ackerman hosted the informal event which attracted a handful of interested participants.

On the topic of investments, Shannon Constable of Kelowna, who represents the AIC Group of Funds stated, "It's earnings that always drive the market."

He also outlined five laws of Wealth Creation which include, the setting of a goal; using other people's expertise; the use of other people's money; paying yourself first and the importance of taking a long-term investment approach.

"In a bull market you're one type of investor, in a bear market you're a different type of investor," he explained.

Constable was positive about the future and the challenges facing investors in the current market.

"The economy is going to move forward. The current market produces many opportunities."

Chartered Accountant Jon Milligan, of White Kennedy in Penticton, discussed steps to take in planning an estate.

"Estate planning is the accumulation and management of assets during your lifetime and the arrangement for the ultimate transfer of your assets to the next generation."

He briefly touched on the need to take care of these matters now and the many tools available to get the job done.

"Transfer property while you are living," Milligan offered, "Use your Will to distribute your assets to your family when you die."

He also pointed out life insurance will provide liquid assets in your Estate.

"You should choose a business arrangement to minimize tax and make the transfer to family easier."

Princeton Lawyer Bob Wicks took a more casual approach to the evening and allowed questions from participants to direct his presentation.

"The primary instrument for planning an Estate is a Will," Wicks pointed out, "The Will document is extremely important."

He described examples of where Wills have been challenged on the basis of the wording contained in the document.

Wicks explained there is no such thing as a simple Will and what makes a basic one more complicated is when details are left out or presumed to be under-

stood.

"I often ask myself, can this Will be challenged? Can it be varied?"

The subject of inexpensive do-it-yourself Will Kits was brought up and Wicks used the product as an example of where specific language may affect the Will.

In short, when you write yours, take time to consider possibilities and do whatever you can to make your wishes fully understood.

After the presentations, a short question period allowed participants the chance to gather more details or request clarification on matters brought up during the

seminar.

Ackerman took the opportunity to emphasize the close relationship between investment advisors, accountants and lawyers when working on Wills and Estates.

This was not the first time for this type of seminar, nor will it be the last one.

Ackerman says the feedback collected from thursday nights event will help him determine what issues should be focused on in future seminars.

Another Wills and Estates, Taxes and Investments Seminar will likely be presented in the Spring.

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
