





Dive team finds truck

A motorist who saw lights under the ice at Gulliford Lake called Princeton RCMP at approximately 8:00 a.m. Wednesday, December 4, 2002. Two constables and BC Ambulance responded, traveling to the lake 36 km. north of Princeton on Highway 5A. The lake, also known as Summit Lake, had approximately 5 cm. of clear ice over the water, and the ice was smashed quite near the shore.

Due to the time lapse between the report and the arrival of personnel, RCMP concluded it was unlikely there were any survivors. They called for a dive team which arrived from Kamloops around 11:30 a.m. A tow truck arrived at the scene at about the same time.

The diver located a 2002 white Ford pick-up truck in fairly shallow water. Tow truck operator Wayne Landriault worked in cooperation with RCMP and the diver to pull the vehicle out of the lake. A lone male occupant was discovered in the truck. The man, 57 year old David Norman Hallatt of Mission, B.C. was pronounced dead at the scene by Coroner Larry Catlin. An autopsy and mechanical inspection have not been completed. The accident is still under investigation by South Okanagan Traffic Services.

Council introduces recycling and tipping fees

Tipping fees and recycling advice were outlined at a public meeting held December 3 at the Legion Hall. Mayor Keith Olsen chaired the meeting and explained the contents of brochures handed to each person who attended.

Garbage bag stickers will be given only to those who live in Area H. Each household will receive 104 free, additional stickers will cost \$2.00 each. People residing in town will not be given stickers, but bags in excess of two per house-

hold will not be picked up in the regular service, and residents taking them to the landfill will be charged a tipping fee.

A garbage bag is a standard 30 inches wide and 38 inches deep. Those using smaller shopping bags for garbage will be allowed a volume comparable to the volume of the standard garbage bags.

There will be no charge for recyclables, but residents are encouraged to take recyclables to other

Terbasket fears for Similkameen

Dixon Terbasket, Councillor for Lower Similkameen Indian Band, expressed grave concerns about the Similkameen watershed to Okanagan Similkameen Boundary Fisheries Partnership (OSBFP).

Similkameen River has seen some poor fishing and low water during the past summer and autumn.

"Snehumption Creek is going underground before it even reaches the Similkameen, and it is one of the area's least developed watersheds," Terbasket pointed out.

Terbasket is a member of the Board of Directors for the volunteer OSBFP.

Snehumption Creek is normally

one of the most productive fish streams in the area. Terbasket thinks there could be big problems if dry weather continues, not only for water supplies, but for fish.

"We need to all be more aware of our surroundings. Water management is getting to be a big issue for everyone," Terbasket said.

Concerned citizens like Terbasket sit on the OSBFP board as a way to make a personal contribution to maintaining and improving our waterways.

Foundation needs members

Local people appear to have lost interest in Princeton General Hospital and Ridgewood Lodge Foundation. The Foundation is down to very few members, and is advertising for new members.

Every cent donated to the Foundation is reserved for local health care needs. The money is used to buy equipment, provide training seminars for nursing staff, and to offer a bursary to a local student entering the health care field.

Both bag stickers and pamphlets are available at Town Hall. Stickers are available at the landfill for the convenience of Area H residents.

There were a lot of questions levelled at Council, including the question of what did it cost to run the landfill per year (\$120,000) and what was the cost of the landfill contract (\$78,000). Council was asked if printing the stickers cost \$50,000, and the actual cost was \$8,000.

One of the major unresolved issues is commercial garbage. Tipping fees are currently charged for construction refuse, but no fees have been established for commercial operations.

A number of people were concerned that people who do not drive have no place in town to drop off recyclables.

Concerns were expressed that people would dump garbage at the side of roads rather than pay tipping fees. Most people wanted to know who would receive the fees, and those fees will go to the Town.

Approximately 40 people, from both town and Area H, attended the meeting.

Tipping fees will be implemented beginning January 3, 2003.

Town insurance rate jumps



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Enjoy a fire-safe Christmas

The last thing you want to happen at Christmas is to spend it in a motel because your house caught fire. Princeton volunteer firemen (who would like to stay home at Christmas, too) offer the following safety tips.

Natural Christmas trees:

Before you buy a tree, test for freshness by tapping the base of the tree on the ground, or pulling lightly on a branch. If many needles fall off or needles can be easily pulled off, the tree is too dry.

Keep your tree as fresh as possible by placing the cut end of the tree in a bucket of water outdoors until you are ready to decorate. Before setting up the tree inside the house, trim two inches off the stem diagonally so it can absorb water. Mount the tree securely in a large, wide-based reservoir stand and add water each day.

Choose a safe location for your tree, well away from heating sources and clear of all exits.

Artificial trees.

Always read the manufacturer's

instructions before buying an artificial tree.

Decorations and presents:

Christmas wrappings and decorations can be highly combustible, and should be kept away from heat sources such as candles, lamps, heaters, fireplaces and woodburning stoves. Gift wrap and boxes should be collected as soon as gifts are opened. If they can be recycled, put them away immediately. If not, put them in the garbage. Do not burn gift wrap in a woodburning stove as it may cause a chimney fire due to chemicals in the paper.

Indoor lights and electrical decorations:

Buy only those lights which meet Canadian standards for safety. If re-using old lights, examine the cords, plugs and receptacles before using. Discard any that have frayed cords, cracks in the holders, or loose connections.

Do not overload electrical circuits or extension cords, and follow instructions on cord labels (overloaded electrical plugs, plug-ins or power bars will begin to melt and will catch fire).

Avoid using timers with indoor lights. Tree lights might turn on when nobody is at home. Always turn off the tree lights when leaving home or going to sleep.

Holiday parties:

Decorate with flame-retardant materials. Have large, fire-proof ashtrays for guests who smoke and make sure the ashtrays are

emptied into a metal container. Check for smouldering butts in sofas or armchairs after guests leave.

Outdoor lighting:

Use only approved outdoor lights. Turn off the electricity to the supply outlet before working on outdoor wiring.

Keep electrical connections off the ground and clear of metal objects. Use insulated tape, not metal nails or tacks, to hold strings of outdoor lights in place. Be careful not to tape the cords either over, under or along metal eaves troughs.

Run cords above ground, keeping them out of puddles and snow.

Tape all plug connections with plastic electrical tape to make them as watertight as possible. To prevent moisture from entering bulb sockets, bulbs should face the ground.

Indoor floodlights should never be used outdoors. When using spotlights or floodlights to light your home or trees, ensure they are marked for outdoor use to withstand snow and rain.

Candles:

Never use lit candles as decorations on Christmas trees. Place candles in non-tip candle holders and ensure they are well away from combustible materials. Never leave candles unattended. Make sure candles are out of the reach of children. Store matches and lighters where children cannot reach them.

Free flu shots are still available from Princeton Health Unit. Two more drop-in clinics are scheduled for Friday, December 13 at the Post Office from 10:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and Tuesday, December 17 at the hospital lobby from 10:00 a.m. to noon.

Flu shots are free if you are 65 or older, if you have a chronic health problem or live with someone who does, or if you work in health care or emergency services.

Each year, one in six Canadians will get flu. It is the sixth leading cause of death in Canada - 7,000 people die from flu each winter, and 70 to 90 percent of those who die will be seniors.

Living past 100**Keep well for Christmas**

One of the most distressing things about these dark and dreary days is the high probability of catching a cold or flu. Most people take the opportunity to have a flu shot, but beyond immunization, there is still a chance to catch a cold or some other respiratory infection, such as bronchitis or sinusitis. Nothing spoils holiday fun as much as illness.

Keeping well in winter is more difficult due to the weather and lack of sunlight. Although being chilled will not give you a cold, it will reduce your ability to fight off infections. The lack of sunlight contributes to reduction in immune defenses, as well as providing a good environment for viruses. The ultra-violet rays of the sun kills off viruses, so when there is less UV, there are better conditions for the germs.

Living indoors means living in air that is not really fresh. In our efforts to keep warm, we heat our homes and try to keep out draughts. This means a better environment for the spread of infections, especially when somebody sneezes or coughs.

How can you fight off disease under these conditions?

First, take Vitamin C. You can take the artificial kind, or you can eat a lot of oranges, but keep in mind you will have to eat 10 or 12 oranges a day to really fight the germs. Taking a tablet is easier, and may cost less.

Second, air out your home, especially if the sun is shining.

Third, clean out your home. Most people do spring and fall cleaning, but cleaning your home in winter is a good way to rid your home of a lot of things that may contribute to illness. However, do NOT fill the air your home with a lot of fumes from heavy-duty cleaning products!

Fourth, go out into the fresh air for a walk. Even if the sun is not shining, there will be rays filtering through the clouds.

Finally, make sure you take your Vitamin D, which comes in the form of cod or halibut liver oil. Not only will this vitamin help fight off infections, it will stop winter "blahs". Happier means healthier.

RCMP asks Council to set priorities

Sgt. Warren Dosko wants Princeton's Town Council to give some direction to the RCMP Detachment on policing priorities. Sgt. Dosko appeared before Council at the December 2 meeting to outline what the RCMP sees as national priorities, but Council is asked to identify local priorities.

Sgt. Dosko noted the previous Council had identified drugs and youth concerns as their priorities for 2002. He pointed out that Princeton RCMP have a Youth Strategy, which includes input from Citizens on Patrol, and identifies opportunities through the B.C. Youth -Police Network which offers camps, and has supported self-defense for youth, drug-free zones, school visits (one police officer visits one school every day), the Grad/RCMP hockey game, bike rodeos, youth employment and work experience with the RCMP in which six students worked 30 hours each and one student worked 120 hours.

National RCMP priorities are safe communities and safe homes., as well as ongoing efforts to combat organized crime and terrorist activities, along with a commitment to world-wide peacekeeping activities.

Integrated policing at the community level is necessary, because "there is no way seven officers can cover it all." This is why Citizens on Patrol and auxiliary volunteer officers are needed.

Councillor Ray Jarvis asked what the drug situation is now in the Princeton area.

Sgt. Dosko replied, "I would like to say there is none."

He said local RCMP continue to work on the problem, and the number of charges have increased from 41 in 2001 to 69 this year. He noted this sounded like there are more drugs, but in fact there is more focus on discovering those involved with drugs, therefore there are more charges.

"Drug investigations are lengthy," Sgt. Dosko told Council. "There's no quick fix. We don't have the resources to deal with all the drug problems."

Cutting Christmas trees free of charge is strictly for **PERSONAL USE ONLY** and you are not allowed to sell them. You are allowed to cut one tree per family. It is the permit holder's responsibility to ensure that he/she is cutting on **Vacant Crown Land**. Do not transport your tree outside the province.

This authorization is only for the **MERRITT FOREST DISTRICT** within the Kamloops Forest Region.

Please fill in the blanks, sign the Permit and carry it with you in case you are asked to show it.

This Free Use Permit authorizes _____ under section 48(1)(a.1) of the *Forest Act* to cut one (1) Christmas tree (*less than 5 metres in height*) and transport it to: _____

This Free Use Permit is valid until **DECEMBER 25, 2002**, subject to the following conditions:

1. Subject to paragraph 2 below, the Christmas tree may only be cut from areas of Crown land
 - (a) identified on the attached map, or
 - (b) on power line rights-of-way or forest road rights-of-way.
 Note: Power line rights-of-way are defined by the cleared area immediately under the power line itself. Road rights-of-way are defined as three metres (10 feet) beyond the edge of the ditch or excavated portion of the road bank or fill slope.
2. **NO CUTTING** of Christmas trees is permitted in the following areas:
 - (a) forest plantations in harvested areas, or

3. This permit authorizes the permittee to cut one and only one Christmas tree for their own personal use. Make sure it is the tree you want before you cut it.
4. A Christmas tree cut under this Free Use Permit must not be offered for sale.
5. The Permittee agrees to indemnify the Crown against and save it harmless from all claims, demands, suits, actions, causes of action, costs, expenses and losses faced, incurred or suffered by the Crown as a result, directly or indirectly, or any act or omission of
 - (a) the permittee, or
 - (b) any other person who on behalf of or with the consent of the Permittee engages in any activity under or associated with this Permit.
6. The Permittee must carry this Permit while harvesting and transporting the Christmas tree and must produce the Permit at the request of a Forest Officer, a Forest Official, a Conservation Officer or Peace Officer. Failure to have this permit in your possession, the possession of more than one tree per permit, or harvesting in areas other than those outlined in paragraph 1 of this permit may result in the tree(s) being seized and enforcement actions being taken.

We who live in the Similkameen Valley are very fortunate. Our local elected officials are open to presentations by the public and will make room on the agenda for that purpose. In both Princeton and Keremeos, Council has a question period, during which members of the public may ask any questions and present ideas. Surprisingly, few people take advantage of these opportunities.

Further to the question of citizen participation, we citizens have the right to gather together, create organizations, and lobby our Councils to do what we want. Generally, the records of Councils in both Keremeos and Princeton show a willingness to listen, and to accommodate plans whenever possible. If the budget allows, these Councils will put some money into the pot to help out.

Citizens who want to see change, who want to see new paths followed, must be prepared to go to Council and say what they want. In addition, they must be prepared to enter into the action, and pay the price.

Democracy is not about sitting back on our butts and letting somebody else do what needs doing. On the contrary, what makes democracy so difficult, and so good, is the obligation, as well as the right, of every citizen to take responsibility for the direction government goes.

“Mad as hell” seniors demonstrate in Victoria

Dear Editor;

Victoria, the scene of many anti-government demonstrations, witnessed something new on Tuesday, November 26, 2002, when some 3,000 seniors demonstrated in front of the Legislature.

It was the biggest senior protest in B.C. history and it was organized in less than a month. It involved 28 bus loads and scores of cars.

They came for one specific purpose, outlined on the hundreds of signs and banners they carried – rescind the proposed new Means Test for pharmacare which would impose a new income tax costing seniors \$400 million a year, effective January 1, 2003.

Adding insult to injury, the government ruled that every senior must sign a legal document giving the government access to their personal income tax records. Any senior refusing to submit to this invasion of privacy would be cut off pharmacare.

Apparently the government's intention was not to release it publicly until near the end of the year so that, with Christmas coming, senior organizations would not have time to mobilize their forces to expose and defeat this unfair attack on their welfare.

But information about it leaked out and senior responded with indignation and anger.

For the first time in history, they united all their key advocacy organizations that speak for B.C.'s seniors.

Under the slogans “Mad as Hell: Grey Power On the Move to Victoria” they took their case direct to the government. The government tried to undermine the senior protest by announcing a day before the November 26 protest that the Means Test would be delayed for several months. It had the opposite effect.

Seniors learned some lessons from their November 26 protest:

1. They can unite and speak with one voice on issues of common concern. Involved were the Seniors Network B.C., B.C. Old Age Pensioners Organizations, Seniors for Medicare, Council of Senior Citizen Organizations, and B.C. Forum, representing 100,000 senior citizens. United, they

become a powerful political force that can't be ignored.

Seniors enjoy wide public support. The people of B.C. want the elders who helped build this province treated with respect and dignity and their basic needs attended to.

3. This government seems intent on taking away the rights seniors have won over the years, including public health care, pharmacare, and adequate residential and home care. On November 26, seniors vowed they would be back to resist any further attacks.

4. If seniors are to survive they must stand up and speak out for themselves and be prepared to engage in whatever action is necessary to defend their rights against attacks by heartless and unfeeling governments at all levels.

The gap is growing wider now

Dear Editor;

The growing gap between the world's haves and have-nots is one of the most pressing issues of our time. Recently, Prime Minister Chrétien acknowledged the perils of the global divide, to the dismay of right-wing commentators, who have responded by denying the problem. Two things in this debate need to be pointed out: global inequality is extremely high and has been rising; and this trend is intimately connected to the laissez faire policies so promoted by those commentators.

The first part of the inequality puzzle is the divergence in the incomes between different countries around the world. While a handful of "economic miracles" have managed to catch up to Western standards of living, for the vast majority the distance to Western levels of income is ever-greater. A detailed historical study of the world economy by economist Angus Madison finds that the rich countries of the West have amassed a growing lead over the poorest, with the exception of the so-called Golden Age period from the end of World War II to mid-1970s.

Inequality is also growing within many countries. Summarizing the results of a large research project on globalization and inequality, economists Giovanni Cornia and Julius Court note that inequality has risen over the past two decades in 48 out of 73 countries for which high quality data are available. Sixteen countries had constant levels of inequality, while only nine experienced falling inequality during this period.

Research by World Bank economist Branko Milanovic attempts to put together a picture of the global gap at the individual level by linking these two aspects of inequality. He finds inequality of jaw-dropping proportions. The top 10 percent of individuals captured over half of world income in 1993, the richest one percent (50 million people) received as much income as the bottom 57 percent (2.7 billion people). And while the global rich have captured a greater share of the world's economic pie, the global poor have gotten fewer of the crumbs.

— that inequality is falling worldwide — draws heavily on the work of economist Xavier Sala-i-Martin. His analysis hinges on the fact that China has experienced rapid growth in recent decades, and because it accounts for one-fifth of the world's population, it is implied that more than a billion people are approaching Western income levels — hence, global inequality is falling.

One problem with this is that while China has experienced rising incomes on average, inequality has grown within the country, a point not accounted for in the study. A full 80 percent of China's population are still peasant farmers, and the benefits of growth have been quite concentrated at the top. Moreover, if China is dropped from the statistical sample, inequality is no longer found to be decreasing.

A major force behind growing global inequality has been the collapse of the middle class in the "transition economies" of Russia and Eastern Europe after the fall of the Soviet Union. Sala-i-Martin does not include the transition economies in his study, a huge omission. The stagnation of countries in Latin America and Africa since 1980 is also a huge driver of

increasing global disparity.

Besides growing inequality, these countries have something else in common: most of them have been coerced by the International Monetary Fund to rapidly liberalize, privatize and deregulate their economies, moves increasingly locked in place by the World Trade Organization. These prescriptions have been dismal failures, leading to growing inequality and weak economic performance. In contrast, China has not followed orthodox free market policies. It has moved slowly towards a more open economy, joining the WTO only after two decades of reforms. China still does not have a convertible currency, only weakly protects property rights, and has a massive state-owned sector.

Historically, no country has become rich by adhering to the free market playbook. It is possible to shrink the growing gap, but we must take a more balanced approach that does not glorify free markets, and that gives countries the flexibility they need to create vibrant domestic economies.

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

Town plans farmers' market bylaw

Princeton Town Council gave first, second and third reading to a bylaw controlling local crafters and farmers' markets. The bylaw readings passed at the December 2 meeting, and will be reconsidered in the future. Any local citizen wishing to have input may make a presentation to Council in person or in writing.

The bylaw defines local crafters as residents of Princeton and Area H only, who cannot have a commercial outlet. Local farmers are those selling home grown vegetables and fruit and not limited to Princeton and Area H, but cannot have a commercial outlet. The market can be open no more than two days per week and must be held on commercial property with sufficient parking. No commercial enterprises are allowed in the market.

Business group plans action

Pushing toward economic development activity is the next step for Princeton Area Business Enhancement Association. The group agreed to make a presentation to Town Council to clarify the group's position, and to determine Council's position in regard to the Business Enhancement Association.
