## Costs mount due to new laws

Residents of East Princeton, which is located just east of Weyerhaeuser sawmill, have a raging headache that began with the provincial government. Thirty residences are part of East Princeton Waterworks District, which was incorporated in 1959, when the well and water delivery system was first established. The well and system were upgraded in 1982. Water records dating back to 1983 show there has been no problem with the water.

Despite the absence of any sort of contaminant in the water, East Princeton is under a permanent boil advisory. The reason for the advisory is a change in legislation for both the location of wells and government inspection.

The legislation states there must be 100 feet between the well and the nearest septic tank. The well in East Princeton is too close to septic tanks in the area.

The other change made by the provincial government is the removal of water testing service. The residents, in order to have their water tested, must take their own sample and pay a \$100 fee to have it tested. Last fall, Shannon Martindale, Secretary of the Waterworks District, paid over \$300 to have samples tested. The laboratory analysis found no coliform of any kind, no contaminants, and said the only problem with the water was a higher than normal level of calcium (meaning East Princeton has "hard" water).

East Princeton Waterworks District has talked to everybody they can think of in an effort to

## Rodeo Club complains to Exhibition Association

Stan Thompson, President of Princeton Rodeo Club, made complaints to Princeton Exhibition Association on January 14. Thompson said the area by the demolition derby pit is a mess and he does not like the exposed tires. He wants to see gravel all around the area between the rodeo arena and the demolition derby pit.

Two of the people involved in the demolition derby reminded Thompson the tires are an essential safety feature of the demolition derby, but Thompson was adamant there must be improvements. He wants to see piles of rock and other debris removed before the rodeo, which is scheduled for May 10 and 11. He offered machinery to help remove these piles, which were built up by Katimavik volunteers working for the PXA last fall. He was assured something would be done as soon as the snow melts.

Thompson said he wants it to look good for the professional athletes coming to the rodeo.

Fall Fair President Jody Woodford said Fall Fair members will look at the area when the snow melts.

Vermilion 4-Wheelers received PXA approval to hold a Tuff Truck competition on the weekend of May 31/June 1.

Discussion arose regarding the announcer tower, which was approved last fall, and would be moved by the Fall Fair. It is very tall, and would be cut down for use by the Fall Fair.

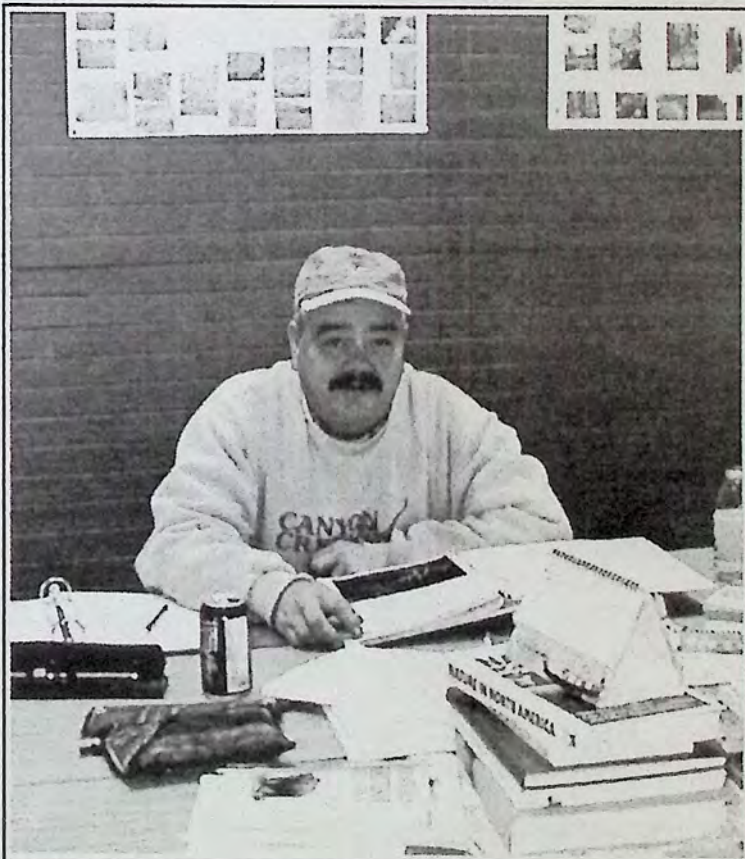
meeting with his report of the past year's achievements and problems. One of the achievements was being able to have more student time and keep the museum open longer, thanks to a student employment grant from Weyerhaeuser. The federal government paid for other student time.

This year, members plan to hire a student to keep the museum open from May 15 through June, hoping a federal grant will cover part of the costs for June and July.

Problems stemmed from water in the basement, where archives became wet from water running down the wall from a leaking roof. Mold set in and the room had to be sprayed. Ann Jennesen, from Hedley Museum Society, has been hired for 50 hours to trim of the moldy edges of the newspapers and spray the pages with anti-fungal chemicals.

The museum continues to be a major attraction, and is well-known. The Society has received a request from B.C. Cattlemen's Association for photographs and articles about the history of ranching and farming in the Princeton area. The deadline for submissions is the end of the month, and Megan Ostrosser said she would try to find suitable documents to share with the cattlemen's convention.

The Museum Society welcomes new members. Meetings are on the second Tuesday of the month at 2:30 p.m.

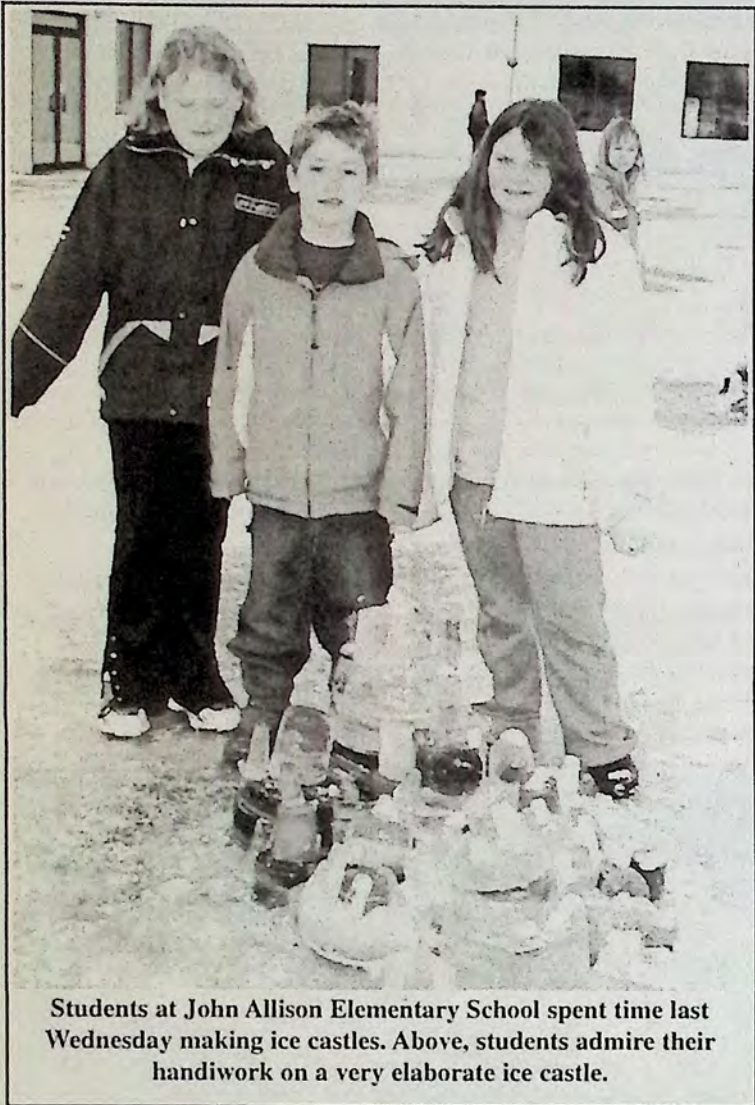
tion and PXA insurance. The issue of the integrity of the steel in the tower was raised, and Sue Derkson said her husband is qualified to test the steel.

laws, any refreshment garden without a roof must be shut down by 10:00 p.m. The Fall Fair had purchased trusses at a cost of \$4,000 and offered them for the construction of such a roof. The PXA accepted and approved the construction of a roofed area. However, only one contractor was contacted and he was not available. Members wondered why no other contractor was consulted. The physical work can be done by anybody, but the number and size of posts and beams must be determined by a person in the building trade. The PXA will contact other contractors.

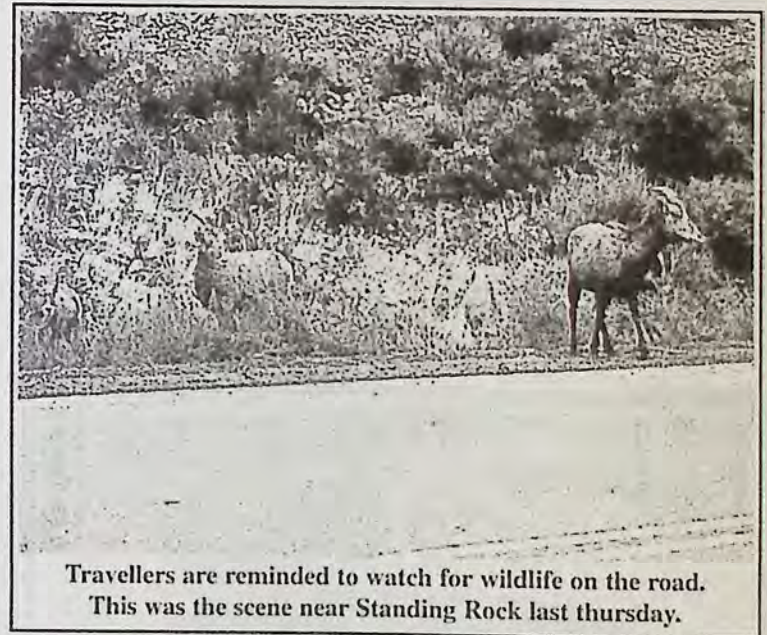

solve the problem. The solution is to move the well and put in a chlorination system, but there is nobody who wants to help them foot the bill.

"Most of our residents are on fixed incomes," says Dale Gallagher, President of the Waterworks District. "They can't come up with that kind of money."

They were told to go to Regional District and turn it over to them, but Regional District wants \$10,000 up front for a feasibility study which will tell Regional District whether it is feasible for them to take it over. That sum is the entire annual operating budget for the Waterworks District.

There used to be government grants to assist small communities with water systems, but those grants have dried up faster than the wells.

Martindale has spent hours talking to various levels and departments of government, but one department or level refers her to another.

"I feel we just get the runaround," says Gallagher. "They just keep passing the buck."

So what is the next step for the Waterworks District?

"We are seeking legal advice before doing anything," Gallagher told the News Leader.

## Weedless Wednesday: January 22

The campaign against smoking began a long time ago, and concerns now are with the number of young people who start smoking. Studies show it is not the nicotine that causes the damage, but the smoke itself. However, it is the nicotine that is addictive. To try to counteract smoking, health care providers came up with the idea of Weedless Wednesday in January.

The idea of Weedless Wednesday was to encourage people to stop smoking for 24 hours. If smokers could give up cigarettes for one day, then perhaps they could give them up for a lifetime.

As any smoker will tell you, this does not work. Smokers on long airline flights, or who have been in hospital for a long time, will begin smoking just as soon as the restriction is lifted. It is as if they

can endure the deprivation as long as they know they can start again at a particular time.

Smokers are hard-core addicts, and there is no cure for smoking except quitting. Some smokers have tried all sorts of treatments on the belief that hypnosis, drugs or tobacco substitutes would work. Unless the smoker's mind is made up and the smoker is determined to quit, none of these appear to be permanent cures for the addiction.

There is nothing wrong with Weedless Wednesday if the smoker truly is determined to make that date the day he or she quits. Without that resolve and determination, going without a smoke for one day is not going to make much difference.

Like other addictions, smoking is a social habit. Because smoking is legal, smokers feel no

qualms about getting together with other smokers and enjoying the habit together. Now that they cannot smoke in restaurants and other public places, we can see them gathering outdoors even in the most adverse weather.

Much of the camaraderie of smoking began a very long time ago, when smoking was acceptable. Even twenty years ago, smoking was still permitted in most public buildings, restaurants, pubs and in some provinces, even in movie theatres. Times have changed drastically, and now smoking is considered a lower class activity and people who want to be seen as socially acceptable either do not smoke, or conceal their habit from nearly everyone.

So, if this is your year to quit, then Weedless Wednesday is a good time for you to begin life without tobacco, one day at a time.

## Health experts warn obesity will significantly shorten life

Obesity has been identified as the Number One health problem in North America. Recently, experts announced that obesity will significantly shorten life.

Obesity has been linked to heart disease, cancer, diabetes and asthma. Being fat is bad for your health.

How fat is too fat?

There are all kinds of ways people can tell if they are too fat. Most of these are simple ways. For example, a man with a pot belly is too fat. A woman whose waistline is nearly as big as her bustline is too fat.

Doctors warn that men with pot bellies are heading into heart attack country, and fat women are on their way to cancer. Anybody who is fat, and whose family has a history of diabetes, is likely to develop diabetes. Fat people are most likely to suffer from asthma. The list goes on and on.

What none of the experts are telling us is how to go about losing weight, and there are dozens of diets out there. What does an obese person do?

There are two simple rules recognized by all health care providers: 1. eat sensibly 2. exercise.

All of this sounds easier than it is. What does it really mean to eat sensibly?

What it means is eating an apple instead of a cookie or a sandwich. It means eating a salad instead of fries. It means counting calories, but more than that, it means eating a whole lot of vegetables and fruit, and cutting back on meats, bread, and pastries.

What does it mean to exercise? Does it mean joining a fitness club or running a mile?

No, not if you are obese. If you are unaccustomed to regular exercise, you are going to have to start slow

and gradually work up to things like running a mile. You can do serious damage to knees, ankles and feet if you try to do any of the bouncing, jogging or running exercises at the beginning. Start with simple exercises like stretching, doing leg lifts, arm exercises, and easy things. The point is to do enough to work up a sweat.

When you have lost weight, and have improved your muscle tone, a fitness club is a good place to

go. Start with the easy stuff and not too much of it. It is not how much effort each exercise requires that counts, it is the repetition. For example, you will do more good lifting one kilo weights 20 times than trying to lift 20 kilos a single time.

Weigh yourself every other day, and keep a record. Give yourself a goal, and stick to the program. Next year, you will be healthier for the effort you make this year.

## Living past 100

### How to become younger

Winter is a time when many people seem to age a whole year. Much of this is due to staying indoors and being less active. Part of it is due to poor nutrition - a lack of fresh fruit and vegetables.

Aging tends to accelerate. It is like the process of putting on fat: if you start with a little, it soon becomes a lot. If you don't wish to age so fast, you have to fight back, and winter is the time you should be battling the aging process.

There are many anti-aging substances, and the most important is Vitamin B. The complex B, which is made up of a huge variety of amino acids, is essential to the nervous system. It is what feeds the nucleus of your cells. When your nervous system ages, the rest of you is in big trouble.

The entire nervous system is an extension of the brain. The brain, the spinal cord and the major nerves, and all the tiny nerves, send and receive messages. Those messages are intended to keep you young and healthy. Within this system, messages may become corrupted due to aging, such as when old people cannot hold a cup steady. In the brain itself, cells may deteriorate, and we know how old people forget what happened two days ago even though they can tell you about an event 40 years ago.

Another factor in aging is lack of proper sleep. Many old people will tell you they cannot sleep the whole night through, and never have a really good sleep. A vitamin in the B group may be lacking. Without good, restful sleep, your body will age more quickly. It is during deep sleep that your body renews itself.

Check on your intake of B vitamins. Are you eating whole grain cereals, beans, lentils, milk, meat and fish? These are the best sources of B vitamins. At the same time, do not be afraid to ask about Vitamin B complex supplements. Maybe you could use a boost. Visit your library to learn more about B vitamins.

## Birders count eagles, swans in a snowstorm

Each January, B.C. birders take part in the annual Eagle and Swan Survey. Hard on the heels of the Christmas Bird Count held January 4, Princeton birders took to the roads again to take part in this province-wide survey. A snowstorm with almost "white-out" conditions made observation quite a challenge!

The purpose of this survey is to establish data and knowledge about wintering populations of these two families of birds. In this area, small numbers of Swans are occasionally seen at Otter Lake, but not this year. More than 400 Tundra Swans were seen in the South Thompson River area, and over 3,000 eagles have been observed at Squamish/Chekamous rivers. Our count, while not as spectacular as the Squamish/Chekamous counts, was still respectable: 10 adult Bald Eagles, three immatures, and two Golden Eagles. Last year we found only one adult Bald Eagle and three immatures, and no snowstorm!

## OUR VIEW

### It is a nasty world

With North Korea rattling its sword at the United States, and the United States and the United Kingdom threatening Iraq while Iraq and many Muslim countries return threats, our world seems to be a very dangerous place to live. Young people may feel a lot of stress about the current situation. September 11, 2001, was the beginning of what, to young people, must seem like the beginning of the end of the world.

The Al Qaeda and the conflict in Afghanistan appear to have escalated into a situation dangerously close to world war, but older people in our society will recall the Cold War, when this kind of threatening behaviour was a daily occurrence and a fact of life. Those who were young, in those days, are now the grandparents of today's youth, and can give them some reassurance. Yes, it is a nasty, dangerous world, but none of this is new. In fact, it is no worse than it has been, and may even be a little bit better than it was.

Keeping the peace world-wide depends on the stability of the secure nations. We are one of the secure nations. We have stability, and so does the United States, Australia, the United Kingdom, and many other nations. It is because we are among the most secure nations we must do the most to keep the peace, because we have the most to lose.

When nations are starving, or when the majority of people are very young and jobless, then tensions mount. When people they have little to lose by war and the possibility of a lot to gain, they will choose war, or terrorism. They may make excuses about religious fervour, or old grudges, but what really motivates them is the chance for gain.

When the secure nations refuse to back down, when they insist on the rule of international law, when they stick together and prepare to defend themselves together, they are assuring unstable nations they have something to lose. Our image, internationally, is that of soft people, lazy people, rich people who will not fight back. Certainly, our media, especially television, may give that impression, especially of our young people.

On the other side of the coin, even while refusing to back down, the secure nations need to look more carefully at helping feed the hungry, sharing the wealth of our nations and teaching the less fortunate nations how to create wealth and stability. A man with a full belly and happy family has a lot to lose.
