## Tulameen plans school reunion

There is good news and bad news for Tulameen. The bad news is Tulameen Elementary School, which started life in a log cabin in 1908, will close indefinitely in June 2003. Next September, the seven students in Grades 1 to 3 will have to take a bus to bigger schools in Princeton, 29 km. from Tulameen. The option of kindergarten is taken away unless parents are prepared to drive the 29 kilometres and wait half a day. A 95 year tradition of closeness and intimacy in attending a school with one teacher and no more

than 25 students is gone forever. The good news is the school closing merits a reunion, an excellent excuse for a party – and Tulameen loves a party. Already well-known for its annual B.C. Day weekend bash in August, once known as Tulameen Daze and now called Tulameen Family Days, this resort, retirement and bedroom community (yes, there are a few people who work in the Lower Mainland and commute) uses its popular parties to raise money to benefit the town. Its annual sold-out New Year's Eve dance, for

example, is earmarked for whatever the current cause (i.e. rebuilding the skating rink). Tulameen has a permanent population of around 200, but during the years its active, serious community association has, among other things, built a fire hall and equipped it with two rigs, constructed and now rebuilt a hockey-sized skating rink and found a Zamboni to keep the ice in good shape, and set up a library, staffed by volunteers, that boasts 6,000 books and two computers linked to Internet. Behind the library is the original one-room schoolhouse, restored and rebuilt and now a handsome little one-room museum. The school district Board of Trustees has offered Tulameen the

## More air races are coming to Princeton

Steve Kovacs spoke to Town Council on January 20 to outline three events taking place in Princeton this year. Through his connections, Kovacs has managed to secure remote control aircraft competitions for Princeton. On May 17 & 18, the first competition will take place. This will be a regional event. The big feather in Kovacs' cap, and Princeton's, is the Canadian National Championship. Toronto and Edmonton were among those bidding to have this competition, but Princeton won the bid. The winner of this competition will go to the World Championship competi-

tion next year. This event will be held July 24 through 28. There will be a television crew here filming the competitions. The third weekend in September (12th to 15th) a Jet Rally will take place in Princeton. This event has used Princeton airport for four years. Kovacs told Council he estimates approximately \$160,000 has been spent in Princeton during the four years he has brought the competitions to the local airport. Council thanked him for the information. Kovacs assured Council he will be back with more information and some requests in coming months.

## Police arrest East Princeton woman

A 44 year old woman residing in East Princeton was arrested for possession of a controlled substance for the purpose of trafficking. On January 22, Princeton RCMP executed a search warrant at a house located in East Princeton. The search warrant was the result of a lengthy investigation which dealt with trafficking of illegal narcotics in the Princeton area.

As a result of surveillance of the residence, police stopped several vehicles occupied by people suspected of purchasing narcotics at the residence. As a result of the stops, police found narcotics in the possession of vehicle occupants. Police then executed the search warrant and found more narcotics and other materials related to drug trafficking. The investigation is continuing.

## Posse finds lots of support

“The Posse is the best thing to happen to Princeton since they put a bridge across the river.” This remark by Bob Coyne drew a round of laughter at the meeting held last Thursday to give the public more information about the deal to buy the Junior B hockey franchise for Princeton. The question, expressed by both Stan Turner and Clayton Hamilton, was whether Princeton can sustain the Posse in such a small community. An agreement to buy the franchise from owner Jim Harrison was struck earlier this month, and deadline for payment is January 31, 2003. Turner said Harrison was given a \$5,000 deposit and a commitment to pay the remainder by the end of the month. The non-profit society buying the franchise was short \$18,000. “We can't go past the date,” Hamilton told the audience. The annual budget is \$90,000, with approximately one-third coming from game tickets. Hamilton advised Posse players (the team attended the meeting), “We could sure use a couple of play-off games.” Hamilton made an effort to have people understand clearly that the franchise needs fundraising throughout the year to make it viable. He did not like the idea of the society starting out in debt for

for the purchase of the franchise, because the annual budget is so tight. He said the society must raise \$25,000 every year in addition to ticket sales.

"It's risky. I don't know if it can survive in this community," Hamilton stated.

Turner related the value of the franchise to the community, saying it brings a lot of money to local businesses, and it has been a unifying community venture.

"It's a tremendous asset," Turner said, "so even if it's risky, we're going ahead."

Former mayor Randy McLean challenged Hamilton's view, saying Hamilton "doesn't paint a really rosy picture of this team. McLean dealt with the worst-case scenario, saying, "What happens if we can't afford it in the long run? We still have something of value, an asset to the community."

McLean later told the News Leader he knows Hamilton was one of the strongest supporters of bringing the franchise to Princeton.

So, what happens if, by the end of this week, the society cannot pay Harrison in full?

Turner says there are people in the community who he is sure will sign a promissory note to fill the gap in funds.

Jim Harrison, who has the franchise for sale to Princeton since September, 2002, told the News Leader that, now that there is a formal agreement in place, he

would honour it. He added he had been assured he would receive his money on the due date. He really wants to see Princeton retain the franchise.

"It's got the best community support in the league, and the players love playing in Princeton. I've been to games over there and I've seen the kind of support they get," Harrison said.

At the same time, Harrison said he wanted to have an agreement and "get it done". He has continually received calls from people wanting to buy the franchise and move it somewhere else.

"This hockey franchise is in big demand," he told the News

Leader. "but I gave my word to Princeton and I'm going to stick by it."

Dean Johnston summed up the situation when he commented, "It's not whether we can keep the team, it's how do we keep the team?"

Two groups are going to start the "how" rolling.

Dr. Douglas Reid, the Posse's physician, told the meeting the doctors will put on their show in the spring to raise money for the Posse.

Tip Anderson, representing Princeton Curling Club, said the club would put on a fundraiser bonspiel. (see details page 9)

Judge Sinclair sentenced Cox to one year probation, mandatory counselling for substance abuse and anger management and that he is no longer able to have any contact, directly or indirectly, with Doris Cox, Kathy Cranston or Jim Cranston and he is not to have any weapons of any kind on his person.



### Investing In Internet Stocks: Buyer Beware

The Internet is here to stay and, according to many thinkers, its social and economic impact will likely be comparable to the Industrial Revolution. As a result, interest in Internet stocks has bordered on a buying frenzy not unlike the gold rush of 1849, when normally sensible people dropped everything to chase gold with reckless abandon. In the Internet rush, some normally sensible investors abandoned tried-and-true approaches in the hopes of "hitting the big one" with an Internet stock.

This frenzy created market valuations for many Internet stocks that were astronomical by traditional measures - and consequently very risky. Part of the frenzy was the result of too many dollars chasing too few stocks. When 30 or 40 multibillion-dollar mutual funds buy or sell shares of a relatively few Internet companies, the price swings can be dramatic. This results in tremendous volatility, as shown in the daily price movement of individual Internet stocks. Often, the market price of a stock changed significantly by the time a quote was displayed or an order entered.

#### Evaluate The Levels Of Risk

Internet-related companies generally comprise three tiers, each with different levels of risk. In the first - and least speculative - tier are established companies that supply the hardware and software infrastructure components needed for the Internet to function. These firms tend to be more diversified and are not totally dependent on the Internet for their success.

Companies that are a "pure play" comprise the second tier. These are in the early stages of their corporate life cycle and many are not expected to be profitable for some time.

The third tier is comprised of companies that can be described as "Internet wannabes." These are the most risky, as they jumped on the Internet bandwagon as a means to try to jumpstart an otherwise ailing business. In some cases the Internet might be a company's salvation, but it's unlikely to cure problems that are a result of fundamentally poor management.

#### Look To Established, Healthy Companies

Traditional buy-and-hold investors who wish to participate in the growth of the Internet are well-advised to seek established companies in the first tier. These companies would be similar to the miners' merchants who sold pickaxes, shovels and pans to the eager prospectors in 1849.

Likewise, pay attention to traditional, healthy companies that use the Internet as an additional channel to deliver their products. Notwithstanding all of the hype about net-related stocks, the Internet allows traditional companies to offer dimensions of convenience, speed and pricing that can contribute to their core growth rate.

#### Investing Basics For Long-Term Rewards

Don't be tempted to abandon the tried-and-true investing basics, such as diversification. By allocating your investment dollars among a variety of investment types, industries and companies, you'll reduce the risk of owning too much of any single investment.

Dollar cost averaging can help smooth out the ups and downs caused by market volatility. Dollar cost averaging allows investors to buy more shares when prices are low and fewer when prices are high. Although it doesn't guarantee a profit or eliminate the chance of a loss, dollar cost averaging generally lowers the average cost to investors.

Above all, avoid becoming a short-term trader, relying upon volatile price swings to compensate for the inevitable timing mistakes. Investors who try to play this game are merely throwing the dice with their hard-earned money.

The Internet is here to stay, and investing in the sector will be around for a long time. There is no reason for cautious investors to feel compelled to act immediately or risk missing the boat.

## Tax cut shortchanges Keremeos

The tax cuts promised to British Columbians did little for Keremeos. The lowest average tax cut in the entire province went to Keremeos residents, whose average personal income tax cut was \$335. The much-trumpeted cut by the BC Liberal government turned into a deficit after the increases to provincial medical insurance.

The Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives, BC office, did a study called *Bleeding the Hinterland: a regional analysis of B.C.'s tax and spending cuts*. The study examines how the recent provincial tax and spend-

### Council says 'no' to Legion

Royal Canadian Legion Branch #192 requested a grant in aid at the January 20 Village Council meeting, but Council said "no". The reason was due to the fact that Council may give a grant in aid only to a non-profit organization, and the Legion operates a business. However, Council could give some kind of tax relief.

The Legion will have to wait until March, when the Village is advised of what the assessment is and can determine what the tax rate will be. Then Council may consider a tax break.

ing cuts have affected B.C.'s "two economies" - the Lower Mainland and "hinterland".

The study shows that only 29 percent of BC's personal income tax cut went outside the Lower Mainland and Victoria, despite the fact that 34 percent of taxpayers live in the hinterland. People residing in the Greater Vancouver area received 58 percent of the tax cut compared with 51 percent of the population. Inequalities at the municipal level were more stark - West Vancouver had an average tax cut of \$2,085 per taxpayer, the highest in B.C. and three times higher than the average tax cut for the province as a whole.

The smallest average tax cuts were in the Okanagan Similkameen, with Keremeos taxpayers receiving the least at \$335, Oliver with \$391 and Osoyoos at \$397. Princeton was slightly higher than the South Okanagan Similkameen average.

The lack of advantage to Keremeos was no surprise to Council and Mayor Walter Despot gave his opinion loud and clear on television last week. The study's author, economist Marc

Lee, says communities outside the Lower Mainland are getting the short end of the stick.

"To the limited extent the tax cuts have stimulated the economy, they've done so more in the Lower Mainland than outside it," says Lee. "But spending cuts have disproportionately hurt smaller communities, as services have been cut, lost altogether or centralized in regional hubs."

Lee could come to talk to Keremeos and Princeton Councils, faced with provincial downloading of police costs, diking costs, and removal of services from the community.

Lee went on to say, "In the wake of the softwood lumber dispute and a global economic slowdown, B.C. needs a comprehensive economic development strategy that focuses on the needs of resource dependent communities. Tax cuts, spending cuts and the Olympics aren't up to the task."

Lee says he hopes the government will use the coming provincial budget as an opportunity to begin tackling the growing gap between the Lower Mainland and B.C.'s resource and rural communities.

## Water rates increase

Water rates in Keremeos will go up seven percent this year. The average homeowner will pay an

additional \$8.00 per year for water. Commercial enterprises will pay an additional seven percent depending on their category of water usage. For example, restaurants and bars pay more than a residence, a car wash pays more, but businesses with little water demand pay according to the number of employees.

### Council okays hall use free

Similkameen Country will be able to enjoy their annual general meeting dinner and dance in Victory Hall without having to pay rent. The event is planned for February 15, and Council received an invitation to attend and enjoy an evening with Similkameen Country.

Keremeos Council has applied to amalgamate with Keremeos Irrigation District, partially for liability reasons, and partly because municipalities have access to federal water improvement grants which are not available to water districts. The provincial government is doing a






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# B.C. produces Health Guide with First Nations perspective

Yale-Lillooet MLA is encouraging First Nations constituents to review the information and resources available in the new BC First Nations Health Handbook.

The handbook, a companion to the BC Health Guide, is being mailed to First Nations households, Band Council offices and friendship centres in a province-wide initiative by the Ministry of Health Planning and the First Nations Chiefs' Health Committee.

"First Nations have unique health care programs and services to draw on, as well as traditional healing knowledge - this handbook recognizes that all these resources will help improve

the well-being of First Nations people," says Chutter.

The handbook was developed to make the BC Health Guide more culturally appropriate, and to improve access to the BC NurseLine and First Nations health programs and services. A video summarizing the handbook is also being distributed to nearly 200 Band Councils.

First Nations families who have not received their copies by month-end should call their Band

Office.

The BC NurseLine is staffed 24 hours a day by registered nurses with translation services in 130 languages, including 17 First Nations languages, and can be reached toll-free at 1-866-215-4700.

Chutter stated, "This is another step our government has taken to improve the quality of life, education and health care for First Nations people, both on and off reserve."

The cooks in Vernon prepare the entrées fresh, then blast-freeze it and it is transported to the location where it will be eaten. The rest of the meal is prepared in the hospital or facility kitchen.

## Living past 100

### Why exercise keeps us young and healthy

Many people scoff at the notion that exercise will help keep us young and healthy. They will take any number of prescription pills, but they will not get off the couch.

Exercise has a lot of bad things about it. First, if you are not used to it, it will cause pain - sore muscles, sore feet, maybe even a sore back. Secondly, exercise interferes with watching television, playing cards, or having another coffee break. Third, good exercise may require going out in nasty weather, or when it is too hot or too cold, so it will make us uncomfortable. Fourth: exercise is a lot like work.

That's the bad side of exercise. The good side is this: if you want to fight aging, you need to "use it or lose it". Exercise is good for the heart, lungs and brains, the three things most likely to quit and cause an early death. Exercise tones the muscles, takes you outdoors in the sunshine which helps build your bones. Exercise helps your bowels move (constipation is a real problem for most of the elderly). Exercise helps your circulation, thereby preventing strokes.

Think about ways you can exercise indoors when the weather is bad. You could buy a walking machine, or you could dance. You could walk up and down some stairs. You could do some housecleaning.

Some people save a lot of money by exercising in a garden and growing food. Others save money by cutting their lawns with a hand mower. Some people repair and paint their own houses. Yes, it sounds like work, but it is good exercise, and it is outdoors.

Some people walk their dogs, others take hikes and study nature. Some go hunting, others golf without a cart, and still others go out dancing or swimming. It is all exercise, and it is good for you (and your dog!)

The most important thing about exercise is doing it every day, day after day. After all, your heart beats all day every day, your lungs breathe in and out all day every day, and your brains and bowels are on the job 24 seven, too. It's time the rest of your body had a workout.

Your first big exercise is lifting yourself off the couch and taking that first step.

## Princeton, Keremeos view change

Meetings held in Princeton and Keremeos on January 21 dealt with proposed changes for children, youth and family services. The Ministry of Children and Family Development will transfer its responsibilities to a local Authority similar to Interior Health Authority. Retired Youth and Family Advocate Joyce Preston was facilitator, asking questions about community strengths, and the desire of the community to be involved with the Authority.

The morning session held in Princeton drew more than 25 people, including three members of Town Council – Spencer Coyne, Kathy Clement and Ray Jarvis. The Child and Youth Committee was represented, along with Community Services.

This was the largest number of people Preston had seen in one of these sessions.

Princeton people saw a lot of strengths in the community. Their point was that people believe in Princeton and live here because they want to be here. They are proud of how safe their community is. The local people want to be involved in good programs for children and youth.

Princeton people talked about their experience with Interior Health Authority and requested that they be allowed to do some of the decision-making and have local people involved in program development.

"Give us a fair share," was the message.

In Keremeos, that afternoon, there was a smaller gathering, most of whom are involved with Lower Similkameen Community Services Society. They listed community strengths as volunteers, friendly people, good water, good outdoor recreation, a close-knit community, safe, and people who are generous in caring for other community members.

Keremeos wants some kind of social services office in the com-

munity, as there was a few years ago. Residents have a problem finding out what services are available, and in crisis situations, they are directed to go to Penticton or Oliver, which involves travel and often they must wait a long time to receive any service. There is really no help within the community in crisis situations.

### Moon remains in police custody

Clarence Moon appeared in custody before Judge Sinclair in Provincial Court in Princeton, January 23. Clarence Moon has been in custody since January 7, charged with mischief and uttering threats to cause death or bodily harm. He was remanded to custody until his next court appearance February 13.

### Man agrees to peace bond

Kevin Date appeared in the Provincial Court in Princeton on January 23 before Judge Sinclair, where he entered into a peace bond for a period of six months. The conditions of the bond state that Date will have no contact with his estranged spouse, except through legal counsel and he is not allowed any weapons in his possession during this time.

### Judge allows 'time served'

James Winter appeared in custody before Judge Sinclair in Provincial Court in Princeton, January 23. Winter had been apprehended for breach of probation and held in custody. Judge Sinclair allowed time served in custody as penalty for the breach and released Winter to finish probation.

People in Keremeos echoed Princeton's desire to be involved in decision-making and in having programs delivered locally.

In both communities, people hope their message will carry some weight when the new system is in place.





# It is a poor exchange for a life

I watched an item on American TV where the wife of a deceased man was handed a folded American flag at the end of his funeral. All of this was done with great solemnity and tradition. The thought leaped into my mind, "It's a damned poor exchange."

Through the years, whether in real life reports or movies, I have seen

this flag thing. Mothers receiving the flag for lost sons, daughters receiving the flag for lost fathers, and wives receiving the flag for lost husbands.

From my perspective, a flag is a damned poor substitute for a life.

Then I thought of all of the women in this world who have given up fathers, sons, husbands, and other family men for the sake of politics, power, or patriotism. I wonder why women do not rise up, world-wide, and refuse to give one more man to any kind of cause. On the other hand, women have never really had much influence over politics, power, and patriotism.

I suppose American women are as indoctrinated to patriotism as the men. I wonder if any of them have been angry enough to take that flag and burn it on the steps of the capitol. I could do a thing like that. What if all of the women who have been given flags just take them to a public place and set them afire? Would that make a point?

At the same time, men engage in warfare as if it were a legitimate activity, when it is merely part of the game of power and politics.

War is a primitive guy thing. I see the same kind of aggressiveness and territorial control in wild animals. The female animals fight over who has rights to the male, but the males fight over collecting females and cornering territory. Warfare appears to me to be one of those uncivilized behaviours glossed over with a veneer of political or religious justification.

The terrorists justify their actions in the same way, and they have the reaction of people who are indoctrinated into the "us against them" view of the world. It is never about the number of people killed by terrorists. The loss of life is secondary to the political and territorial priority.

For example, if it were really about loss of life, consider this: more than 17,000 Americans die every year of AIDS, and HIV infection continues to spread among people under 20 years old. Loss of life annually from AIDS is eight times more than the number who died in the World Trade towers attack, yet we have not seen the same kind of news coverage given to AIDS as we did to the terrorist attack.

If loss of life were really the motive for fighting Iraq, then why is there so little news coverage of the number of Americans killed in motor vehicle accidents each year? In Spokane, during their elections last fall, a highway safety initiative was defeated because it would have cost taxpayers an extra few dollars a year. At the same time, they are willing to spend billions of tax dollars on a war which will kill more people and cause more pollution, and they are willing to spend money on a lot more flags to take the place of lost family members.

This whole syndrome of who gets the power and control seems to be a world-wide disease, causing tremendous loss of life, but it seems to be a disease nobody wants to name, or cure.

## Health care is a human right

The Commission on the Future of Health Care in Canada, headed by Roy Romanow, came to three basic conclusions: (a) the people of Canada want to retain and improve our publicly funded national health care system that provides needed health care services to all, based on need and not on ability to pay, (b) Canadians believe health care is a human right, not a commodity to be sold on the marketplace to the highest bidder, and "it is a perversion of Canadian values to accept a system where money, rather than need, determines who get access to care", (c) major improvements need to be made in our health care system.

Romanow challenged the claims by the advocates of private-for-profit care that our public health care is in a crisis and on the brink of collapse, that it is not sustainable and that it is not affordable.

"Health spending in Canada is not out of line with wealthier countries of the world and substantially below that of the United States," he said to the Canadian Club in Winnipeg on November 20, 2002. "In fact, we are actually spending less on health care as a percentage of our Gross National Product than we did a decade ago."

He recommended patent laws be reviewed to reduce drug costs, special help to people in rural and remote areas, steps to make all governments publicly accountable for how they spend health money. Should we not demand that Ottawa and the Premiers adopt it? Ben Swankey,

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

won the women's division.


The tournament is never just hockey. There was a dance Saturday night at the arena mezzanine, with a good turn-out and a lot of fun.


