

PXA approves major concert

Sno-X picked great place!

The airport proved to be a great venue for snowmobile racing. Spectators were up close and could see all the action. By clearing snow from the airport runway, Timberline Cruisers Snowmobile Club, hosts for the meet, built a really challenging course for the racers.

Despite the mild weather in the afternoon, which turned much of the spectator area into a mud bog, the races continued to be as exciting as anyone could ask for.

In terms of levels of participation, this Sno-X lacked the numbers local fans have come to expect. There were about half the usual number of competitors, down to 25 on Saturday. Nonetheless they were keen on winning.

The big race of the weekend was a new "dash for the cash" all-out race. The winner received a new "Similkameen Cup". This race promises to bring them back year after year for the huge silver cup.

Racing Days ends era

Princeton Racing Days Association met February 4 and decided to dissolve its charter as a society. Racing Days Association, which hosted horse racing for 36 consecutive years, has been unable to hold a race meet for the past two years due to a lack of horses. Members dispersed the remaining funds to other groups in the community. Princeton Exhibition Association received \$4,000, as well as the water tank and diamond harrows. The Posse Junior B hockey team received \$1,000, Search and Rescue and Highway Rescue received \$500 each, and the remaining \$1,000 goes to a scholarship for a local student (yet to be awarded). A small amount has been retained for filing dissolution papers.

Cawston cowboy enters Hall of Fame

Bud Sharpe, a Cawston resident, has been inducted into the B.C. Cowboy Hall of Fame.

Born in Battleford, Saskatchewan, in 1927, he owned his own horses from age 10, and by age 15 had nearly a dozen.

In his first rodeos, he started with cow riding and bareback riding, then switched to saddle broncs. He traveled to rodeos throughout the United States and Canada.

Bud Sharpe worked as a cowboy in Alberta for a year in his

youth, and later worked for Douglas Lake Cattle Company. The ranch had a lot of young colts to ride and Bud was sent out to the Springfield corral to break them. These corrals were a long way out and there was nobody around, so Bud and his partner flanked these colts and bucked them out.

"We needed the practice!" says Bud. "I don't think management ever did hear about it."

In 1950/51, he rode in the Cody, Wyoming, Buffalo Bill Show.

"This was after Buffalo Bill ran

Local business invests in talent

Planning for the concert includes off-site camping, and parking on the Town's business park area.

A local office will be established so Princeton residents can purchase tickets, ask questions and see the line-up. Local groups will have fundraising opportunities during the concert.

It was clear to PXA members that Town Council is in favour of the concert, and Mayor Olsen appeared prepared to go on at length promoting it, but he was interrupted and a motion made, seconded and passed in short order.

A new local company has been formed to produce a big-name concert to draw crowds to Princeton on the last weekend in June. Cheryl Kuhn, Lynn Holland and John Babiak

are the company principals who have invested their money in bringing 12 famous groups to Princeton. While they were not in a position to name the groups due to needing a few more confirmations of contract, they have made arrangements with Ticketmaster to sell the tickets. Weekend tickets will be in line with other concerts of this magnitude, but they gave assurances local residents will have first chance at reduced prices.

Sandi Gabor, President of Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA), opened last Tuesday night's meeting with an endorsement for signing a five-year contract with the company.

"It's a win-win for everybody," Gabor said. She turned the meeting over to Mayor Keith Olsen, who explained the concept of the concert, and said the Town had guaranteed the PXA the \$1,500 rental even if the business does not make a profit. However, the deal is that 40 percent of the profits will go to the community - 20 percent would go to the Town, to be split with the PXA and 20 percent would go to a community project fund. The arrangements for the concert will include hired security people and a fence to prevent the crowd from wandering into the Fall Fair buildings and Agricultural Barn.

The concert is part of the Canada Day weekend celebrations which

School District receives grant

A one-time grant of \$50 million for school districts across the province will help school boards meet local needs, says MLA Dave Chutter.

"It is up to local school boards to determine where this money should be spent," says Chutter. "Students are a top priority for this government. This additional money is a result of sound fiscal management of taxpayers' dollars."

In Nicola Similkameen District #58 (Princeton and Merritt), the grant is \$252,052. In Okanagan Similkameen (Hedley, Keremeos, Cawston and South Okanagan), the grant is \$265,743.

Gordon Comeau, Chair of the Board of School Trustees for School District #58, told the News Leader the Board would like to know more about the \$100 million for education

announced by Premier Campbell on Wednesday.

"Is the \$50 million part of the \$100 million?" Comeau wonders.

The grant announced earlier takes some of the pressure off the district, Comeau says. The Board was looking at \$800,000 reduction, and planned to take \$300,000 out of reserves. That, added to the grant and compensation for declining enrolment, puts the district in a better position. If the new money (\$100 million) comes through it will give the district what Comeau calls "predictability" as well as cover legislated union wage settlements.

In that case, Comeau says, "We can probably manage."

The additional money will not mean reductions in teaching staff will not take place, Comeau says, but they will be because of declining enrolment, not because there is not enough money.

The February meeting of Princeton Museum Society was lively, with a lot of business covered and plans for the future in progress.

Ranching history will be shared with B.C. Cattlemen's Association. Eric Jacobson, Carl Stenvold and Gloria Stout will look for photos and other information, and Ruby Bey will assist.

A letter of support will go to Similkameen Country, in Keremeos, for their application to have the red bridge declared a historic site.

Margaret Stoneberg has been honoured by having a second fossil named after her. It will be in a display at a paleontology museum in Washington State. This fossil was discovered at Coalmont Bluffs.

Decisions will be made soon about the theme of this year's museum display. One of the displays will be about a pioneer family, the Schislars. Volunteers are needed for Saturday work parties to remove some items and put other items in place. The first work party is on February 21, at 10:00 a.m.

Brenda Gould has produced 60 brochures to go to the Chamber of Commerce to take to the GO Show at Abbotsford Tradex Centre. Gould will print 3,000 brochures if the museum wishes but made recommendations for

the museum to upgrade their own equipment rather than spend a lot of money on printing. She is going to make a proposal to the provincial government for funding for scanning equipment and new computer equipment as well as money to hire a person to put all of the archives and collection into CD's and on the world-wide web. There is money available this year to digitize museum collections.

Tom Stout will have the logging arch moved to his residence to do repairs on it. The logging arch belongs to the museum and needs to be repaired, then needs to be permanently housed out of the weather. There was some confusion as many people did not know what a logging arch is nor how it was used.

Nick Mills reported he has completed transferring cemetery information onto floppy disk. He received a lot of appreciation from members for his many weeks of work. Mills said the information will be available soon on CD. The information he has compiled does not include private cemeteries in the rural area.

Mills suggested members consider having evening meetings for part of the year, as many people who might consider joining the museum society cannot do so because they are at work.

B.C. children are at risk for heart attacks

Imagine finding plaque in the blood vessels of pre-school children! Diego Marchesi, Director of Research and Health Promotion for the BC & Yukon Heart & Stroke Foundation, told the 100 people at the Heart Fund Volunteer Dinner about increasing heart and stroke risks. He emphasized heart disease is preventable, but the risks are increasing due to lifestyle.

Maps showed the way risks had increased during the past 20 years throughout North America. B.C. is one of the better provinces, but it is slipping yearly.

The reasons for the increasing risks are best described as "eating problems". People eat too much of the wrong foods and too little of the good foods. Worse, they feed their children the same way. There is too much fat and too little fruit and vegetables in the daily menu, leading to overweight and

obesity. An increasing lack of exercise is contributing to the eating problem.

The Heart Fund Volunteer Dinner is an annual event to heighten awareness and to reward volunteers. Maria Sadegur, Heart Fund campaign Chair, asked canvassers to stand, and they received generous applause.

Regional Director, Gayle Moody, and her assistant, Diane Barker, added their thanks to the canvassers. There was a door prize for every person who attended, and one big prize, a one-day stay at Manning Park Lodge with a pass for either skiing or canoeing. Pastor Chris Haugland won this prize, along with his new collection plate.

Mayor Keith Olsen thanked the volunteers, wished them the most successful year, and gave them a \$100 personal cheque in memory of his late mother.

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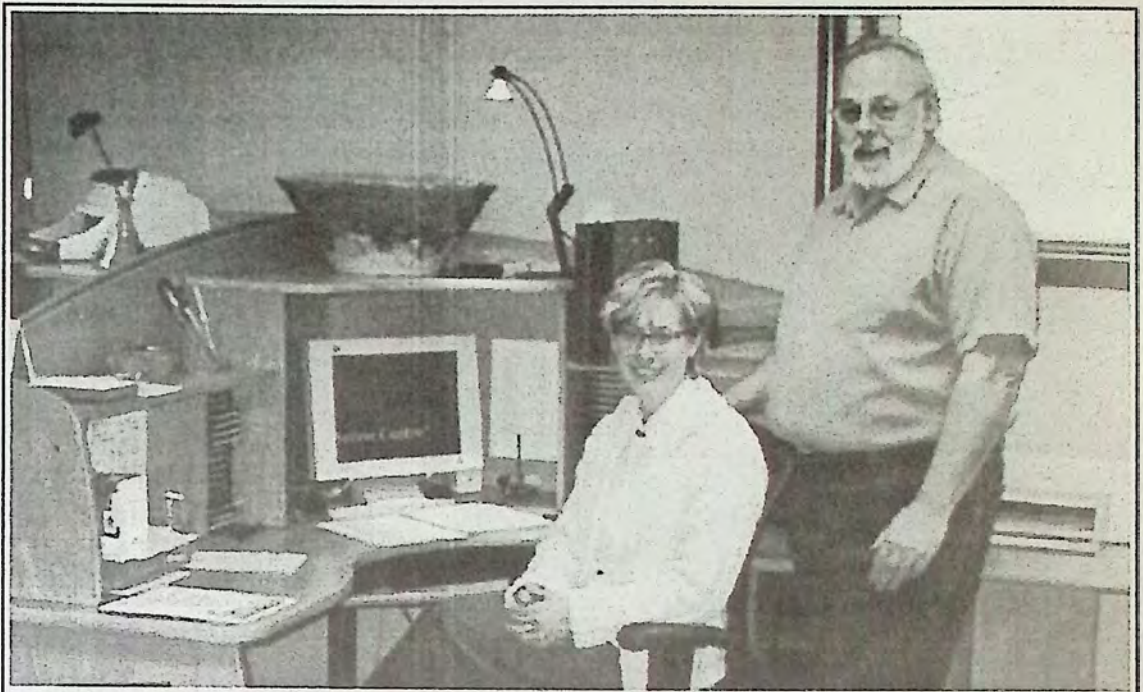

Similkameen Country Employment Access Centre celebrates anniversary

The first anniversary of Similkameen Country's Employment Access Centre was last week.

After one year in business, the numbers are impressive. A total of 733 people have signed up to use the facility, with 577 of those remaining active. In January alone, a total of 53 people joined the membership.

In addition to providing a number of employment services, the centre hosts four workshops a month. The workshops focus on everything from how to write a resume or cover letter to how to conduct an internet job search.

"This is a facility where local residents can come in, do job searches, work on their resumes and a variety of job readiness tasks without having to go out of town for the same services," says Manager Ken Randle.

out of buffalo," Sharpe says.

In 1958, Sharpe won the bronc riding in Coffeerville, Kansas, and it paid \$710. With \$700 of that win, he bought his five acres in Cawston.

Bud Sharpe turned from bronc riding to judging bucking horses as a PRCA judge.

One year, in the U.S., Bud needed a saddle for the next weekend. He ordered the saddle tree, collected on a debt a friend owed him, bought the leather, and made the saddle in time. When he needed money to build his house, he sold it for \$500, later buying it back. He sold, and bought back, that saddle four times! One year, he made \$11,000 on the circuit, so it was a lucky saddle. Sharpe has made around 1200 saddles. Bud Sharpe's photos from the Los Angeles Coliseum, Madison Square Gardens, and from many rodeos highlight his impressive career as a rodeo cowboy, judge, and saddlemaker.

"It's here to enable the unemployed in the community, or new entrepreneurs or students access to important employment links."

The centre provides daily updated job boards, computer access, a resource library and a farm labour posting board.

Randle says the facility is community driven as Similkameen Country identified a need and addressed it. Funding is covered entirely by the Government of

Canada.

A total of \$159,006 was spent last year in establishing the centre including the renovations to Victory Hall and equipment purchases. The 2003 budget is \$124,000 and includes wages for two full-time staff and a contracted relief person.

Weekly surveys of the users indicate a 96% satisfaction rate. Input from the surveys determines the direction of the facility.

The centre is open 9:00am to 4:00pm weekdays, but closes Wednesdays at noon.

Sportsman's Club posts warning signs on highway

The Keremeos / Cawston Sportsman's Association funded two new highway signs.

The signs, posted earlier this month along Highway 3 at the West entrance to Keremeos, warn motorists of the possible appearance of mountain sheep.

President Paul McLean says the signs are part of an ongoing conservation initiative supported by the group. "Although the members are mostly hunters, we believe in supporting the renewable resource."

To that end, the group has dropped a nutritional supplement feed by helicopter in the hills for the sheep. This has been an annual project for

the past 28 years.

This year's feed drop took place earlier this month. A total of 4,000 pounds of the supplement went to the Ewart Creek area. Other sources of food are currently at short supply this time of year, when the animals need it most because, as McLean states, "the lambs are coming."

"We have also put salt licks out along the highway, but back from the road," McLean says, to discourage the sheep from licking highway salt.

The warning signs are meant as part of an educational element in the group's mountain-sheep conservation project.

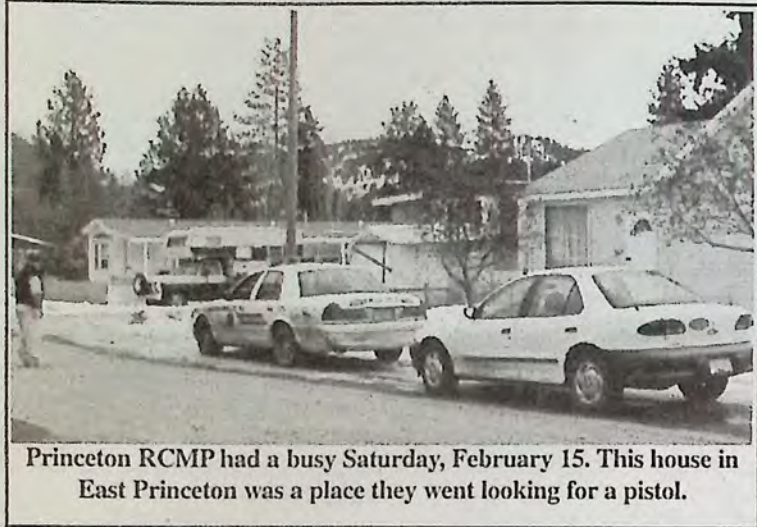

Skills Centre explores ideas

Thirty-five people attended an Innovative Strategy session on February 13 hosted by Princeton Community Skills Centre.

During the first segment of this day-long discussion, the facilitator, Victor Cumming, spoke of Economic Development, specifically the foundation needed for this development.

Mary Ellen Heidt, representing Community Futures Corporation, did her best to explain Western Diversification Canada (WD) program and how funds will be distributed through partnership with Community Futures.

The federal government will direct \$110 million dollars toward forest dependent communities that can demonstrate a negative impact on local employment from the softwood lumber tariff.

WD assistance will be targeted to support community capacity-building and projects that support diversification and development of new economic opportunities.

Princeton is one of the communities eligible for funding. The next phase will be Princeton's prepara-

tion and submission of community-based proposals for funding by the program.

Projects submitted for consideration should not be resource-based. After lunch, Cummings discussed the phases of the Innovative Strategy process: 1) laying down the foundation 2) strategic development 3) project identification 4) project development and funding.

At the end of the day, the recommendations were to have a gathering of local government representatives (Area H, Town and Upper Similkameen Indian Band) to create an economic development function for both long term and short term federal funding. A steering committee would be formed as an Economic Development Group.

It was further recommended that the Skills Centre review past project proposals to Council and synthesize old strategies, then present this to local government.

Finally, those attending suggested the Skills Centre host further economic development discussions.

The stamps should be cut from the envelopes, leaving one-half inch to three-quarters inch around the stamp where possible. If the envelopes are opened from the side opposite the stamp area, we are then assured of a good collectible stamp.

During the fiscal year ending April 30, 2002, the efforts of our faithful supporters in B.C. and Yukon collected sufficient stamps

to provide our Chapters with \$15,182.07 for bandage material.

We appreciate all of the businesses, private citizens and school children for their efforts on our behalf. Without such support we could not continue our work to help "Stamp Out Cancer". We appreciate those people who donate their time to assist Sister

Ann Mandich in making bandages for cancer patients.

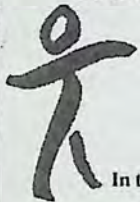
We welcomed a new member who has come back after a few years out of the Auxiliary. Betty Gauvin was Vice-President back in 1998 and is a member once again.

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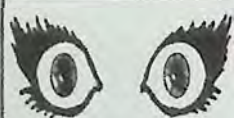

Health is a mental thing

We tend to think of health as the physical absence of disease, but any experienced physician will tell you health is more than not being ill. Health is a state of mind. Doctors have experienced the patient who has so many things wrong with him or her that the doctor wonders why this person is still alive. They have experienced the opposite, too, the person who could have recovered from a disease, yet died. Doctors know there is something else affecting health, something connected to the mind and spirit of the person.

A world-wide study done during the span of 30 years into what makes people happy (and happiness brings health!) reveals a pattern. Those people who are actively involved in life are healthiest. People who have goals, participate in the community, do their best at whatever they do for a living, and appreciate the small blessings of life as well as the larger blessings – these are the happy people.

There are numerous examples of people who retire from their everyday jobs and begin to fall apart physically. Part of the reason for this is the absence of goals, the absence of participation in the social environment and physical activity of the job. For many, it seems they can find no real motivation to get out of bed in the morning. They may feel disoriented, or feel they are just going to "hang around" until it is time to die. To counteract this tendency in the elderly, they have established organizations which offer meaning, socializing, and often offer physical activity, arts and crafts, and projects of interest. However, it is not just older folk who need this. Younger people need the same things. They need to be involved in physical and social activity that gives meaning to their lives. Perhaps the most vulnerable group are the middle-aged people who are jobless, the family has grown up, and they have no real purpose in their daily lives. They need to find new meaning in order to stay healthy. Spring is coming. What will you be involved in to keep yourself healthy?

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WHAT IS THE ENVIRONMENTAL MIND GRIND?

1. Background on "Environmental Mind Grind"

- * "Environmental Mind Grind" is a trivia contest that tests the knowledge of students in the South Okanagan and Similkameen on local environmental issues. The contest is hosted as a celebration of Earth Day.
- * Teachers are supplied study packages during the week of February 24 so students may prepare themselves for the contest. Environmental issues addressed include air quality, watershed health, waste reduction, water conservation, endangered species, pond ecosystems and forestry. The study package contains sample questions on each of the issues.

2. Game format

- * A mandatory prep meeting will be held in early April to familiarize everyone with the game format.

The team with the most points at the end of seven questions advances to the next round. After seven questions if the teams are tied, a tie-breaking question will be asked to determine the winner of that game.
- * Each participating team is guaranteed to play a minimum of two games at the event. The games will be played "double knock-out" style. When a team has lost twice, they are out of the competition.
- * First and second place teams of each of the categories are invited to play in the "Interior Play-offs" against the North and Central Okanagan on Saturday, May 10 at Performance Centre, 1379 Ellis Street, Kelowna.
- * Contest organizers will be responsible for the compilation of the questions and regulations for the contest.

3. Eligible contestants

- * Any school in the South Okanagan and Similkameen (both public and private) may enter one team for each category. A team is comprised of three student contestants and a support teacher. Your school may host its own Environmental Mind Grind contest to determine players or simply select students on the basis of merit or interest.
- * Schools can register one team per category by Friday, February 21, 2003.

In general terms, the bylaw is intended to establish a service area for a public education program to combat illegal dumping and the provision of assistance to community efforts to clean up illegal dumpsites. The proposed service area comprises every member municipality and electoral area of the Regional District. The estimated costs of the service per \$100,000 of assessed value of land and improvements are as follows:

The Board may proceed to adopt the bylaw unless at least five percent (i.e. 3,000) of the electors of the entire Regional District petition against adopting the bylaw by signing counter petition forms and submitting them to the Regional District no later than March 24, 2003 at 4:30 p.m.

A counter petition must be in the form established by the Regional District. Counter petition forms are available from the Regional District, including by mail, fax, or email, on request. The only persons entitled to sign a counter petition form are the Regional District's electors.

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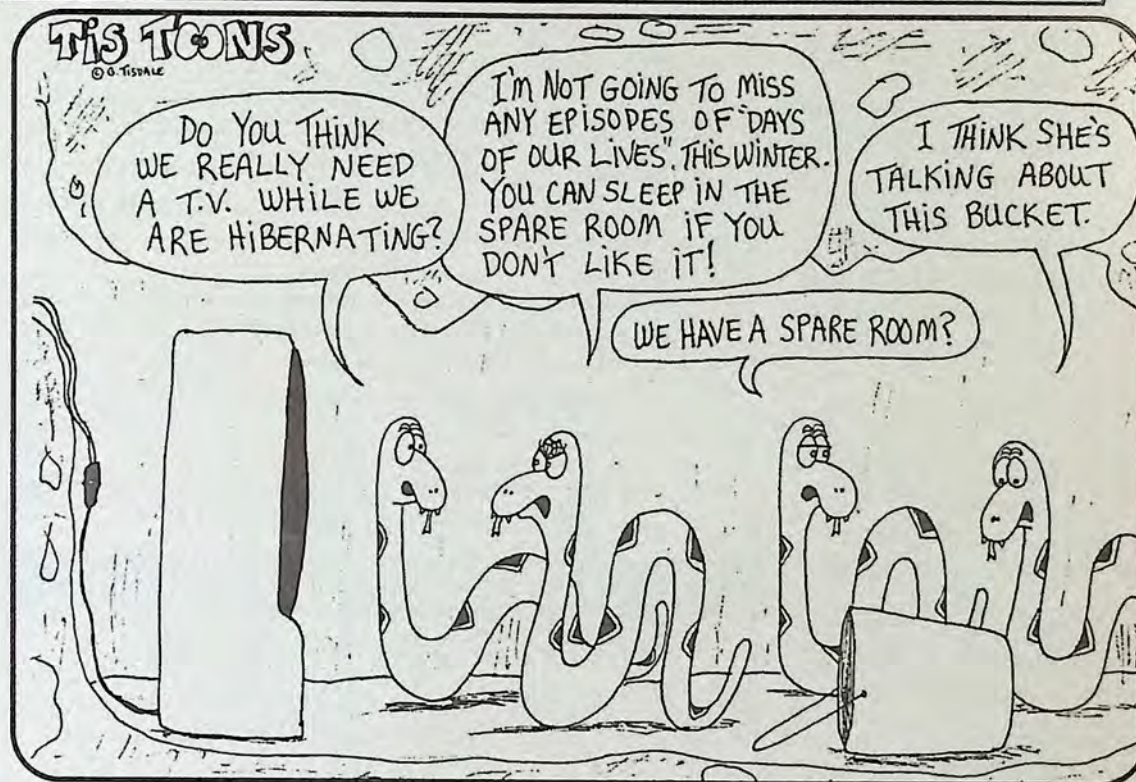

Victoria announces 'heartland' economic strategy

A new Heartlands Economic Strategy will give B. C. the boost it needs to drive the province's economic engine, according to MLA Dave Chutter.

"For far too long, provincial governments have ignored the heartlands of this province without understanding the contributions our small communities make," says Chutter. "Those days are over. We know the resource-based communities provide the majority of the revenues that support our services in this province. The Throne Speech and the Premier's State of the Province Address has given rural B.C. more attention than it's received in years and we plan on taking advantage of that."

The provincial government has developed a three-year transportation plan directing an additional \$650 million to transportation infrastructure. The Premier made specific mention of upgrades needed to Highway 3.

"A strong transportation network is critical to moving our goods and services and is key to opening

up our forest, mining and tourism industries," says Chutter. "We need to create jobs in our rural communities and that will take a combination of new infrastructure, human capital and marketing."

Chutter says government will complete forestry reforms and streamline mining regulations that will lead to investment and job growth.

Chutter was pleased to see an

expression of reconciliation with First Nations in the Throne Speech and the indefinite extension of the three-year \$30 million Economic Measures Fund. The fund, which helps First Nations pursue new economic opportunities, will be given an additional \$10 million a year.

"First Nations play a large role in our economy and it is important that we work with them to the

benefit of all British Columbians," Chutter said.

"We know full well that most of the resources we have for education and health care come from heartland communities, so it's important we develop policies to

drive resource-based industries," Chutter says. "We are determined to invest in the heartlands so we

can create work for working people and create a bright future for our children."

PXA plans improvements

Princeton Exhibition Association met on February 11 to cover a number of issues dealing with improvements to the grounds.

Jody Woodford reported she had met with Gordon Johnson and Keith Later, who have promised to donate materials to grounds improvement. Johnson will donate fence posts to renew the fence around the concession building, and Later will donate wood chips for landscaping. Woodford said she had met with a contractor who was willing to work on putting a roof over part of the concession garden. The new shower rooms would be part of that project. She received

approval to advance with planning.

Doug Grigg asked if the PXA would pay for pipe for a water line extension to supply water for the mud bog. He received approval.

Stan Thompson informed the PXA that the Rodeo Club will screen all of the sand in the rodeo arena before the CPRA rodeo on May 10 and 11.

Two propane tanks will be installed for the concession stand. These will be permanent fixtures and will replace using propane bottles. Groups using the concession will have to pay for the gas they consume as an additional fee over rental.

Foundation receives grant

South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation announced two major grants for cancer research. Thanks to an anonymous donor, the Medical Foundation will be presenting cheques for two cancer research projects in the Okanagan.

The grants are going to Penticton Regional Hospital and the BC Cancer Foundation to support the BC Cancer Agency located in Kelowna.

The \$50,000 to Penticton

Hospital will be used to improve the cancer drug trial program.

The BC Cancer Agency will use \$150,000 to acquire radiation therapy equipment that focuses on research and patient care. The equipment is called Amorphous Silicon Electronic Portal Imaging or HiView for short. This machine photographs a radiation beam passing through a patient

Young people must train for future skilled jobs

According to 2001 Census data released February 11, an increasingly older workforce will affect job growth in the future. The demand for skilled workers is increasing along with immigration as a source of skilled workers. As the population ages and retires, younger Canadians who want good jobs will have to have the training needed to replace the retirees.

Between 1991 and 2001, the workforce increased by 1.3 million workers. Almost one-half of this growth occurred in highly skilled occupations that normally require university qualifications. About 40 percent of the growth in Vancouver's labour force occurred in highly skilled occupations.

At the same time, Canada's workforce is aging, with the average age of workers increasing from age 37 in 1991 to age 39 in 2001. By the end of this decade, 15 percent of the workforce was within 10 years of retirement. By 2011, when almost one-fifth of the baby boom generation will be 61 years old, the potential exists for shortages in certain occupations. In B.C., people age 55 and over represent 13 percent of the workforce.

Fertility rates among Canadian women have remained low for the past 20 years. This means there are fewer young people entering the workforce to replace individuals nearing retirement.

There is a natural opportunity for younger people in this scenario. Those people who make the effort to develop skills or higher education will find employment faster than in the past, and the jobs will be well-paid positions. Training now will be a good long-term investment.

The occupations most likely to experience shortages of qualified workers are in the health sector (including general practitioners, specialists and nurses), university and college professors, and skilled tradespeople - pipefitters, carpenters and bricklayers. There will be continuing demand for child-care workers, financial auditors, accountants and truck drivers.

Teach children to avoid Internet scam

Vancouver's Better Business Bureau (BBB) warns parents to teach their children about an Internet scam. BBB and other consumer organizations are working together to educate consumers on the practical steps they can take to manage and minimize the misuse of their personal and sensitive information when using the Internet.

Look for long distance charges you did not authorize or approve. Most of us use a local phone number when connecting to the Internet, but what do you do when you discover you have been billed for destinations such as Guyana, Madagascar or Kenya?

Calls such as these can be made through your computer modem without your knowledge or approval!

Some web sites use international dialing to trick consumers into paying to access content. The sites claim to be "free" or advertise that "no credit card is needed" then prompt the user to download a "viewer" or "dialer" program.

Here's the catch: when the program is downloaded to the user's computer, it disconnects the Internet connection and reconnects to an international long-distance phone number at rates of between \$2.00 and \$7.00 per minute.

These scams are typically associated with "adult" (porn) sites and do not require a credit card number for access. That means they are available to children, who can click onto them without their parents' knowledge or permission. Even if parents disable

international calling from their phone lines, many modem dialers are programmed to circumvent the 'block' and initiate international calls using a "10-10 dial around" prefix.

TIPS FOR AVOIDING SCAM

* Beware of any program that enables your modem to re-dial to the Internet. If you see a dialogue box on your computer screen indicating it is dialing when you did not direct it to, cancel the connection and hang up.

* Monitor your children's Internet use. Check the web browser history files and cache.

* Contact BBB if you find you have been a victim of international modem dialing. Save your phone bill, it may help identify the scammers.

Assault brings suspended sentence

In Provincial Court in Princeton on February 13, Richard Gray stood trial on four counts of assault of varying degrees. The charges stemmed from an incident that began on the evening of July 12, 2001.

Raymond Eugene North, a Kelowna resident who lived in Princeton in 2001, testified he had been coming along a downtown street in Princeton when he saw Gray behaving aggressively toward his common-law wife, Alice Zirk. Feeling Zirk was in danger, North has said to Gray, "Keep your hands to yourself."

North said Gray had turned on him and hit him across the side of his head with a broom handle. Then North had tripped over Gray's dog and dropped to the ground. At this point, Gray's dog attacked North, and bit him. North said Gray kicked him in the ribs. North said he suffered bruising and was uncomfortable for a couple of weeks.

North went home, and cleaned up a bleeding earlobe, changed clothes and went back downtown. He said he saw Gray and his dog in Cenotaph Park. North said Gray crossed the street and kicked him, then set the dog on him. The dog was on a leash.

Court recessed after North's testi-

mony, and when it reconvened, Gray pled guilty to assault causing bodily harm.

Judge G. Sinclair ordered a suspended sentence with an 18 month probation. The light sentence was due to a doctor's letter which apparently stated (it was not read to the court) that Gray suffered

Man does second jail term

A 41 year old Princeton man appeared in custody in Provincial Court in Princeton on February 13. Monty McIntyre pled guilty to charges of mischief, breach of probation, and assault.

The incident occurred between January 31 and February 5, and was related to a prior charge dating back to December 19, 2002, when McIntyre was ordered to serve 60 days in jail plus one year on probation. He was ordered to have no contact with Rebecca Christian.

On January 31, 2003, McIntyre was back in Princeton. On February 5, Christian complained to police that McIntyre had held her captive in her motel unit from January 31. She said he had broken in through the back window, and had hit her and at one point threatened her with a knife. She

had bruises and bite marks. When police went to Christian's residence, McIntyre was there and fled out the back window. He refused to stop when police ordered him to do so, and ran away with police in pursuit.

McIntyre denied he had held her captive. He said Christian had asked him to marry her, and he had moved in with her, had done her laundry downtown, and had shopped for groceries. McIntyre said she could have left at any time. He stated she had been drunk and assaulted him.

Crown Counsel recommended 82 days (eight off for time served in custody). McIntyre said it was "a bunch of hogwash". He said the punishment was unfair. He would settle for 60 days.

Judge G. Sinclair called a short recess for McIntyre to speak to his lawyer, and the judge did not want McIntyre to feel he was railroaded. When McIntyre returned to the courtroom, he was sentenced to 30 days for assault, 30 days for the breach, and 22 days for the mischief.



