Along with BTO are a Latino band - de la terra, Rick Tippe, Ken McCoy and Cruzeros. Every performer has won at least one music award.

Kuhn told Council she faces a challenge - to deposit \$30,000 risk capital by March 15, and a total of \$50,000. She requires 10 investors at \$5,000 each, and has secured two already.

“Summer Idols” is the name of a competition to be held at the fairgrounds on Saturday, June 28. This competition is for upcoming new artists, and the winner will open for the headliner on Sunday. This is a great item for a new group to put on their promo sheets “opened for BTO”.

The Sunday concert begins with an interdenominational church service featuring a Christian band.

Confirmed sponsors are Tin Whistle Brewing and Standard Broadcasting.

The local company, ToKN

Productions, is working with agent Darrin Buchanan of Noteable Entertainment, staging and consulting company KiAN Concert Sound Services, and ICL Services for food and refreshment garden. Penticton Security has been engaged and advertising will be done through Standard Radio and local tourist brochures.

The weekend will begin with the Rotary Summer Heat parade. Fun events shaping up include a softball tournament of 24 teams, bed races on Saturday, Rotary Polio Eradication campaign, Lions Club Pancake Breakfast, Lions Club Duck Race, a skateboard demonstration by the Young Life skateboard team, and the Legion Dance Saturday Night. During the weekend, there will be an art show and art walk and a woodcarvers display.

The concert will be on Sunday and Monday, and Similkameen Christian Riders have volunteered to run a pancake breakfast at the fairgrounds for those days.

Kuhn is having a problem finding anyone to do a stick horse rodeo. There are lots of stick horses, but no organizer.

The weekend could include a major shopping extravaganza, and the Chamber of Commerce will be asked to contact local business people to see if they would like to participate, along with decorating their businesses in “summer heat” colours - red, orange and yellow.

Similkameen Valley Planning Committee met February 19 to continue a process begun in January. The Committee is comprised of representatives from Lower and Upper Similkameen Indian Bands, Areas A, B and G of Regional District, and the mayors of both Keremeos and Princeton. The current project is working on obtaining an Economic Development Officer to serve both Keremeos and Princeton.

Mayor Keith Olsen told the News Leader they are looking into the cost of an EDO, who would likely be asked during the first year to “brand” the Similkameen Valley, so everybody would know where the Similkameen is and what it offers.

Ranchers, hunters oppose Mt. Kobau National Park

Ernie Marven, representing Keremeos-Cawston Sportsmen Association, attended the March 3 Village Council meeting to speak out against the proposed Mt. Kobau grasslands national park. This park would extend (roughly) from the international border north to Oliver and consumer most of the east side of the Similkameen Valley all the way to Keremeos.

Marven told Council local people sat through four years of the LRMP process and proposed areas to be set aside.

“I am afraid that by supporting this proposed National Park you may be betraying the locals who have looked after this land for many years.”

Katimavik helps Museum

Councillor Kathy Clement reported to Council on March 3 that Katimavik members currently in Princeton had volunteered to do a share of the work party efforts at Princeton Museum.

“They were a tremendous help,” Councillor Clement stated. “They are a great asset to our community.”

Katimavik members are working at a number of locations around town on a daily basis. The work party at the museum was an “extra” effort.

Feds go after kids’ hot dog sales for GST

Trustee Marguerite Kempin exploded in anger.

“This is bull----!” she stated at the March 5 School Board meeting.

The issue was the collection of the Goods and Service Tax from school sales. Each school had been reporting individually for fundraisers such as cupcake sales, fund days, and hot dog sales. Federal agents told school districts this was not the correct way to report. All of the proceeds from every school in the district must be reported in total.

By reporting on a district-wide basis, the amount goes up to a level on which GST must be paid. Secretary Treasurer Bruce Tisdale said one school district was looking at around \$50,000 in GST remittances.

Trustee Kempin had plenty to say about what she considered a violation of common sense.

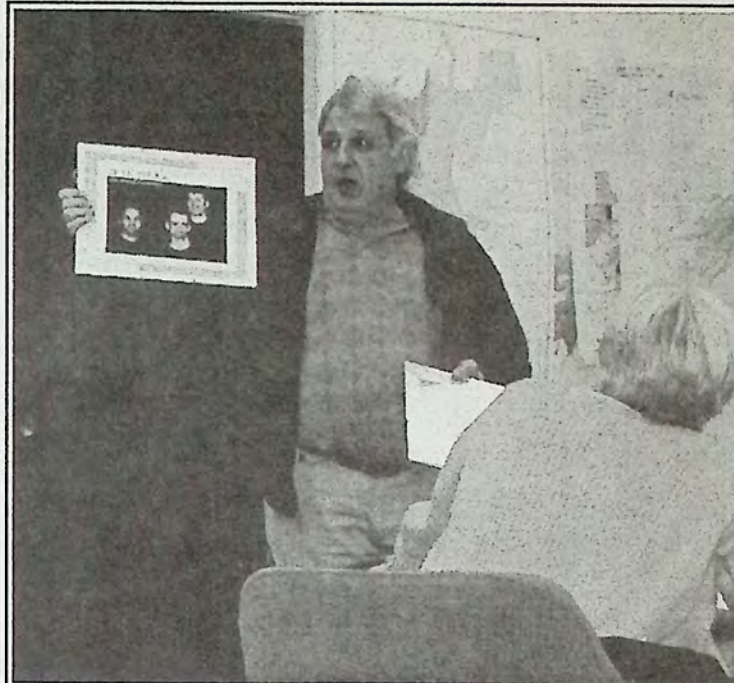

Mayor talks about Economic Development

Mayor Keith Olsen attended the March 6 meeting of Princeton Area Business Enhancement Association and updated the group on what is currently happening in economic development. He outlined the plan to share an Economic Development Officer with Keremeos, and "branding" and marketing the Similkameen Valley. He said the consensus was that the Similkameen is not getting its fair share from Regional District.

A process initiated at a workshop at the Skills Centre in February has Skills Centre staff looking at what worked and what did not in

the past in order to prevent failures in the future when it comes to economic development.

A committee meeting March 10 will determine what the structure of a economic development committee should be.

Mayor Olsen outlined some of what is available under the softwood lumber initiative. Projects for funding consideration will go to Community Futures, then to a regional committee and finally to Western Diversification, which is the funding agency.

Projects must have entrepreneurship, be sustainable without further government funding, be supported by the community, and have measurable objectives.

The scope of the funding is broad, but any project must have benefits for the community.

Hall praises workshop

At the March 6 meeting of Princeton Area Business Enhancement Association, John Hall praised the February 13 workshop he attended at the Skills Centre. He said some people had not appreciated the value of going through the process of establishing a strategy but the process was worthwhile. The group concluded by making three recommendations: 1) that local government, Area H, and Upper Similkameen Indian Band get together and create an economic development function for the longer term and the softwood lumber initiative; 2) that the Skills Centre act as a resource and 3) that the Skills Centre synthesize old strategic plans and present a report to local government.

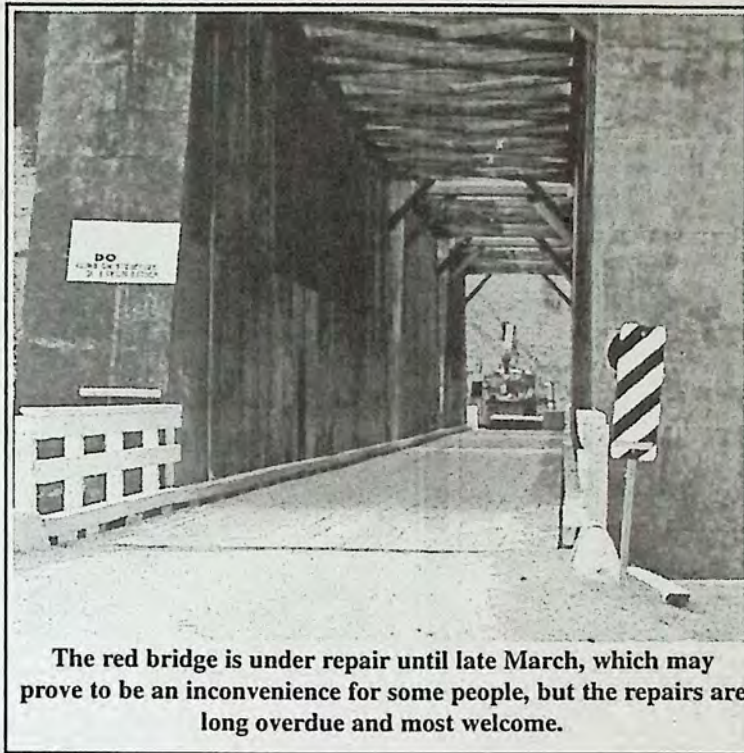

Quaedvlieg told Council he had learned there are claims that existing protection is not adequate, and that cattle grazing is not acceptable or sustainable. Further, the proposal would stop all cattle grazing within the proposed area and thereby extinguish a number of ranching operations. A letter was added from Agnes Jackson, President of the BC Cattlemen's Association, was addressed to Premier Gordon Campbell and points out there was no consultation with the cattle industry prior to the announcement of a proposed park.

Village Council voted to oppose the park, but it was a split vote.

He stated he had been given permission by a band member, although the Lower Similkameen Indian Band never gave permission. Consequently, he dumped 12 head of cattle killed by pneumonia.

The Conservation Officer from Penticton phoned the band office to ask whether the band would like to press charges, but the band declined in favour of working with the individual who dumped the cattle and having him clean up the mess.

"It was a misunderstanding," said Ron Mitchell, Band Manager.

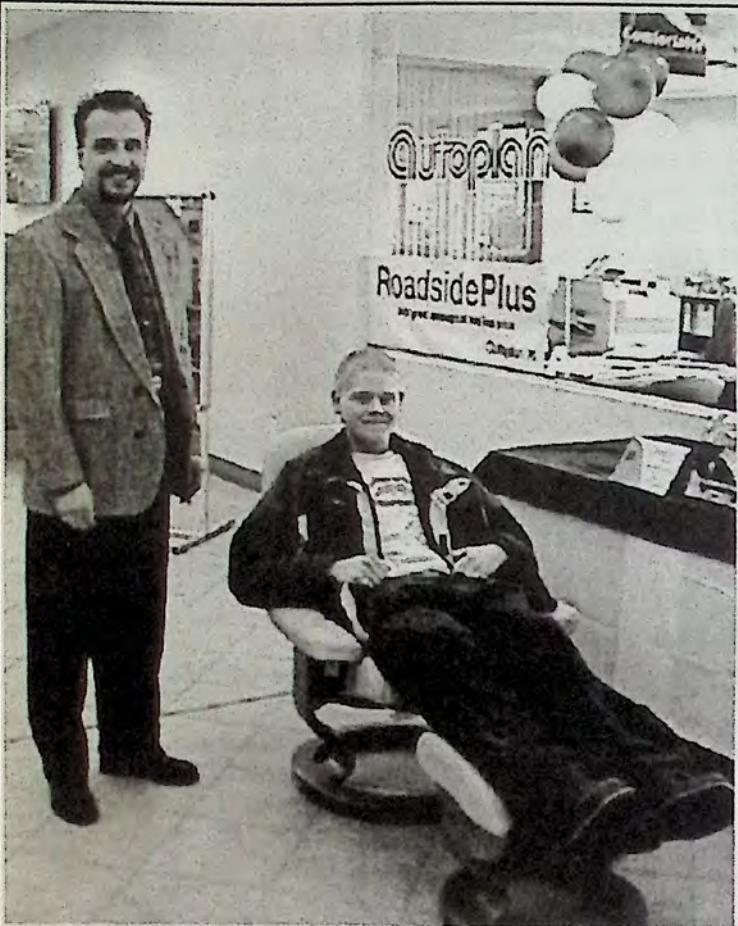
Day visits Village Council

Teachers develop program

Georgina Tarswell, Anne Elliott and Jean Haugland have developed a program at Riverside Intermediate to assist students in learning. At the March 5 School Board meeting, Elliott explained the system to trustees.

Some of the 54 students in Grade 7 needed extra support in reading, others in writing, and others in Math. The teachers divided the students in groups ranging from those most in need of help to those least in need. Each of the three teachers takes one of the groups. As students grasp concepts, they may move from one group to another. Students are pre-tested to determine their strengths and

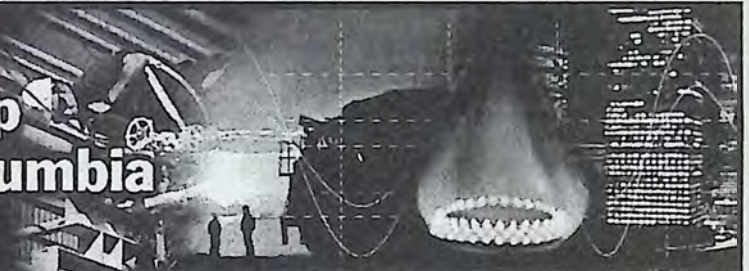
weaknesses. As each segment of the program begins, lists of students are posted on bulletin boards, and students find out which teacher they will be with for reading, writing or Math.

Some students have participated in a corrective reading program, some needed to learn to express themselves well, and some needed a lot of work in Math.

This program was developed by the teachers, and Board Chair Gordon Comeau complimented them on their work.

Trustees expressed some concern over the heavy workload of record keeping and suggestions were made for a computerized system to make record keeping easier.

Administrator reports on hospital

Similkameen Area Health Administrator Marilyn Harkness reported to Town Council on March 3 regarding conditions at Princeton General Hospital.

Harkness told Council the monthly averages for occupancy for December, January and February were 5.097, 3.71 and 3.96. She added there have been times when the count exceeded the six beds, but at other times there have been no patients. This figure does not include outpatient numbers.

A new nurse's station is under construction to modernize it.

Harkness stated the hospital needs more Licensed Practical

Nurses.

Planning continues toward moving the Health Unit to the hospital. Harkness told Council she has submitted a capital project proposal to do renovations at the hospital to accommodate the Health Unit. The space to be used for the Health Unit includes unused acute care rooms, the old labour and delivery suite, and the old recovery room. The proposal adds a request to open the Operating Room suite to the Emergency Room to create a "trauma" room.

A digital Holter monitor project is being funded by the Hospital Auxiliary. It will be a pilot pro-

ject for the Okanagan Health Services Area. The 24 hour EKG tracing will be downloaded through Internet to Penticton rather than having tapes take four days to go through the mail to the same lab in Penticton. The Auxiliary is funding a new EKG machine and partnering with the Lions Club for a new transport ventilator.

The Foundation will partner with Rotary to put on a fall gala called "Putting on the Ritz" to raise funds. The date is October 18.

Couple heads for Australia

Princeton has lost a really great couple. Alex Smith, maintenance superintendent at Princeton General Hospital, and his wife, Lynn, a home care and long term care nurse, retired in February after many years of working in local health care. They raised their family here.

Staff at Princeton Health Unit and Princeton General Hospital held a retirement party for the couple and expressed regret at losing them. They will leave an empty place in the community.

The couple sold their home on Old Hedley Road, packed their bags, and headed for Australia, their nation of origin.

Beware the wood tick

Perhaps we should call this issue of the News Leader the bug issue, but it is that time of year again and we must remind you to watch out for wood ticks. These small, flat, crab-like insects are commonly found in the grass on sunny slopes in springtime on days when the temperature climbs to 15 degrees. These ticks will crawl up legs and find a place on your skin, or your pet's skin, which is tender enough for them to dig in and suck blood. They will not let go until they are full of blood, and that may take awhile. In the meantime, they may be infecting you with Lyme disease, which is dangerous and can have long-lasting effects.

If you are bitten by a wood tick, go to a hospital to have it

The perfect way to lose

You will hear and see plenty of advertisements about how to lose the extra pounds you put on in winter. Canadians take it for granted they will gain weight in winter. Most Canadians experience a boost in hunger pangs when the cold weather comes.

At the University of Manitoba, scientific research is being conducted about what cold does to humans. Much of the research is about the effects of hypothermia but some of their findings can help those Canadians who gain weight in winter (and sometimes cannot lose those extra pounds!)

Researchers have discovered you can lose a lot of weight while hiking in the winter. In order not to lose weight, you would have to eat double the calories you eat on a regular basis. Their hikers had to make a real effort to consume enough calories to prevent weight loss. Apparently, the body consumes huge amounts of energy just keeping warm. Add to that the exercise involved in walking in the snow, and the body has trouble NOT losing weight!

removed. Every tick should be completely removed and should be tested for Lyme disease. Do not delay removing the tick. There are many old-fashioned methods of removing ticks and they are not 100 percent effective.

Check your pets for ticks, especially in the soft underbelly area around the genitals on a male and the teats on a female. If possible, have your vet remove any tick attached to your pet. The biggest reason to check your pet is to find any tick that may drop off the pet and stay in your house. That is the tick that may bite you!

The West Nile threat

There have been a number of warnings about the spread of West Nile fever from the east to the west. Indeed, it may occur, but it is most important for every one of us to understand what West Nile fever is about, and how we prevent catching it.

Many people know West Nile fever kills birds. A dead bird, particularly if it is a crow or raven, may have died of West Nile fever. However, no cases of West Nile fever have been discovered in B.C. yet.

Most people believe West Nile fever does not kill humans. This is incorrect - it will kill humans. Perhaps it will not kill every human who contracts the disease, but it has been known to kill humans.

West Nile fever is spread by mosquitoes. The mosquitoes do not seem to die from the disease, but then, mosquitoes spread lots of diseases and do not die from them. What happens is this: a mosquito bites an infected bird, then bites a human, and transfers the virus from the bird to the human. Mosquitoes are the link in the chain between dead birds and infected humans. If it were not for mosquitoes, we would have little to fear from West Nile fever.

The key element is to prevent mosquitoes from biting us. If they do not bite us, we need not worry about who or what else they have bitten. The best defense against mosquito bites is mosquito repellent, and the best mosquito repellent is the kind thoroughly covering all exposed skin and hair, as well as any thinly woven clothing. Yes, spray your clothing, too.

There are mosquito netting hats which can be obtained through backwoods outfitters' shops, and these may be preferable to some people who do not choose to smell like mosquito repellent. However, on warm summer evenings, you may have to cover up and wear gloves.

The next best way to avoid being bitten by mosquitoes is to keep your environment dry as possible. Maybe you love having a lot of leafy shrubbery, but if you prune it high enough so the sun touches the ground around it, you will ruin a home for mosquitoes. Fishponds, garden fountains and wading pools attract mosquitoes, who will lay their eggs and hatch more mosquitoes. For more information, check with your library and learn more than you ever wanted to know about mosquitoes. They are coming.

Asset Development

Young people need to feel valuable

"Each child deserves to be acknowledged and cherished for the qualities that make her or him unique." (Lee Salk, Ph. D., author of Familyhood)

Everyone wants to feel valued and be valuable, but it is easy for children and teenagers to feel as if they have little to contribute. In society today, it is often easier to do things for young people instead of doing things with young people to help them learn and master their own skills.

Young people need meaningful, valuable roles at home, at school, in the community and in all the places where they spend time. They also need to feel safe. When children and young people feel safe and valued, they are more apt to bond with their families, their schools, and their communities. They then become even more valuable because they want to contribute.

Empowerment – the sense that you can make a difference and that you have a valued place or role – starts at home, school and in the community, and it starts

slowly. What makes a child feel valued? What unique skill or talent do they possess? What meaningful role do they have in your family, school and community?

Even if you don't have the answers to the questions, begin today with one thing you do know about empowerment. Start small. You can help a child or young person feel valued and valuable today.

How? Encourage a young person to help out at home, school or community, such as collecting for

the food bank. Ask them what they would like to do and support them in their endeavours. Ask children's opinions about what they like and dislike about their daily routines. Make some changes based on their comments.

Encourage activities that allow young people to feel empowered, that they have choices, they are safe and their ideas are welcomed. The more a young person or child is valued and feels valuable, the more likely they are to grow up healthy.

There is profit potential in health

Can you identify the richest sector of our economy?

If you know your stuff, you know it is FIRE, an acronym for Finance, Insurance and Real Estate. Finance is banks and credit unions, many of whom want to merge with insurance companies, who are busy merging with each other. We would recommend against such a move, because a really big disaster, like a major earthquake in any coastal city, or a tidal wave, would wipe out banks, finance companies and insurance companies along with credit card companies (hey – maybe it's not such a bad idea after all!)

Back to basic economics – we average citizens working hard every day to make a living continue to grow poorer while the rich grow richer. If you do not know who the rich are, then read the first paragraph again.

They would like to grow even richer yet, and consequently meddle in politics. Right now, we can suspect it is the insurance companies who look so fondly on eradicating medicare and privatizing everything they can, from hospitals to old folks homes to mortuary services.

Why would we say such a thing?

First, we note it is the only area of our economy in which the insurance companies have not yet achieved a toehold, let alone the stranglehold they have on the rest of the economy. Secondly, we can see how, in our neighbour to the south, health care turns a very tidy profit for insurance companies covering medical, dental, hospital, long term care, and prescriptions. They turn a tidy profit because they have numerous escape clauses in case of really horrendous expenses.

The United States has often spoken of some kind of universal medicare program like we have, but has always backed away. Money talks, especially in Washington at election time. There is no profit in what the public funds.

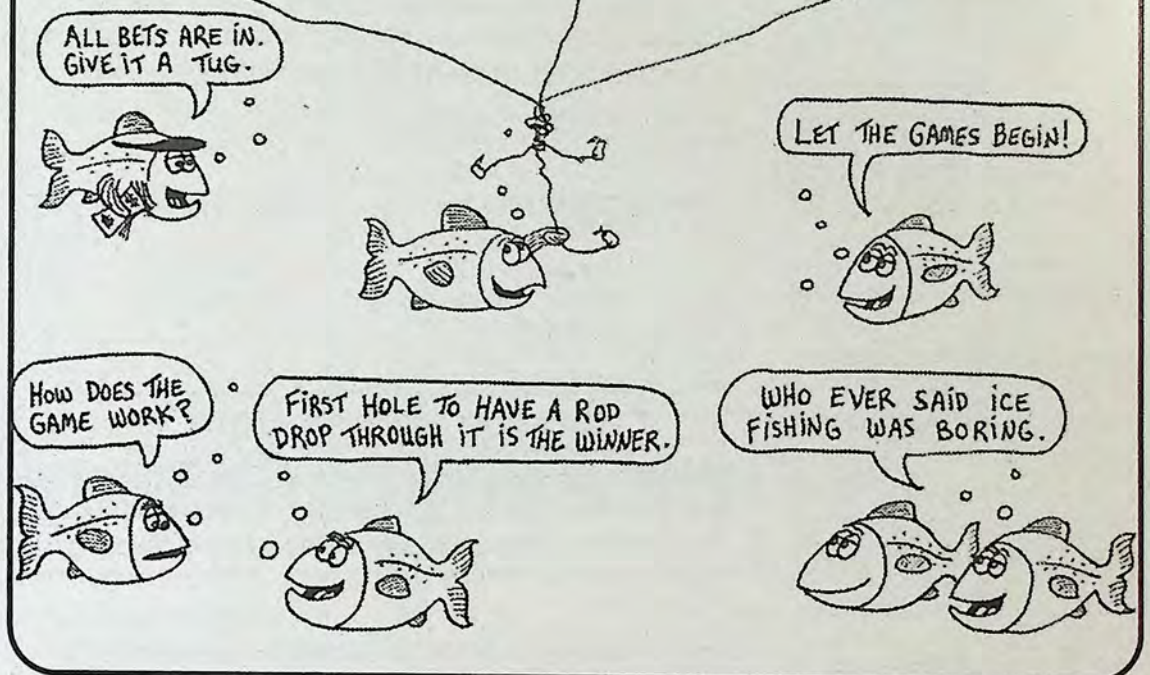

What is the future of Medicare?

Dear Editor;

Late in November, the Romanow Report on the future of Health Care was tabled in the House of Commons. Early in November, a meeting of the provincial premiers and the Prime Minister produced an Accord on Health Care Renewal. Then, on February 11, Finance Minister John Manley outlined his federal "legacy" budget. The same day, the B.C. government revealed its budget.

After all this, just what is the future of health care?

The vast majority of Canadians, including all major seniors' organizations, welcomed the Romanow Report while expressing some reservations. It came out squarely for the maintenance and expansion of our publicly funded health care system which provides care for all regardless of income. It provided detailed recommendation for extra federal funding to achieve this aim.

The first ministers, in their Accord, agreed that new federal dollars must be provided for health care and that some system of accountability should be introduced, but incredibly the issue of privatization was not even discussed by the Accord participants, even though it had been exposed and denounced in the hundreds of hearings held by the Romanow Commission.

The February 11 budget, fol-

lowing closely on the Accord, implemented its proposals regarding funding for health care. The increases include \$25 billion for health services covered by the Canada Health Act over a five year period, leaving federal contributions for health care still far short of the 25 percent recommended by Romanow.

The Canadian Health Coalition welcomed the new funding for health care even though it was "fairly modest". It also noted the significant fact that the new money did not come with provisions "to ensure that public funding isn't being used to finance the privatization of the public system" as it is in Ontario, Alberta and British Columbia.

So where do all of these developments leave health care?

Ottawa is still under-funding health care. Finance Minister Manley has declared that the next new government or leader could abandon even the new spending advanced in his budget.

The BC government continues to cut health care services and is actively encouraging private clinics, private hospitals and private long term care facilities.

Conclusion: we must now fight harder than ever to save and improve our publicly funded health care system.

How long does it take to prove sustainability?

The issue of Mt. Kobau National Park has ranchers and hunters in strong opposition, much of it based on the fact that they were never consulted about what it would mean to them. I noted, in the letter from Keremeos Stockbreeders Association, support for the park proposal claims the existing protection is not adequate, and cattle grazing is not acceptable or sustain-

able. My question regarding these remarks is: based on what?

I am now of an age, and enough generations down the line locally, to be considered an oldtimer, and in this instance, being an oldtimer is a good thing. Much of my family's history is the history of the Similkameen Valley and its people. I know there have been cattle herds grazing in the Similkameen Valley since John Fall Allison first brought his herd to the Similkameen back around 1870. What is even less well documented (and for good reason!) is the fact there have been cattle in the valley since the Similkameens first stole cattle from Fort Okanagan and brought them north. As my grandmother used to say, "Our people had ranches here before the white people came."

There is the foundation of an excellent argument in favour of sustainability. If the area is still so desirable that certain groups see it as suitable for parkland, and if cattle having been grazing the area for more than 100 years, then it is bloody well sustainable!

My second issue is with the statement that cattle grazing is not acceptable. According to whom? Who made this judgement? Was it a vegetarian who never wore leather or used penicillin? Does the beef industry now have to go out and prove it is acceptable, just the way the loggers had to prove

cutting down trees is acceptable?

I become really hostile over these crackpot judgements made in order to shut down some kind of land use. At the same time, I have been through this kind of thing before, in 1994, when a coalition of groups north and south of the border wanted to make a park out of the entire Cascades side of the Similkameen River, thereby shutting down our forest industry.

When I ran the Mt. Kobau plan past George Elliott, our ad manager, he immediately responded, "Sounds like that Cascade thing all over."

Yes, it sure does.

I strongly suspect the same people may be involved, because they seem to pop up all over the place when it comes to parks. I further suspect Premier Campbell and Senator Fitzpatrick do not know the terrain, and are being manipulated by people who know just how to sway politicians.

As for strengthening the local economy, I have my doubts. Just how many tourists will want to trek through these grasslands filled with prickly pear cactus, rattlesnakes, black widow spiders and the occasional scorpion or trapdoor spider? If anybody believes the federal government is going to employ 1150 people and generate \$70 million a year for the local economy, then Brooklyn has a bridge they can buy.

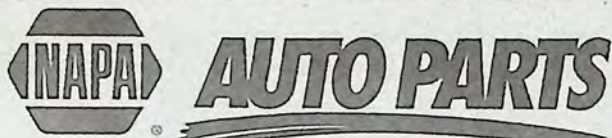

Tulameen celebrates its school and its history

Members of Tulameen Community Club were scheduled to make a presentation to the School Board on March 5, but were unable to attend due to the snow storm. Principal Bonnie Jesten did the presentation on their behalf.

Jesten began by saying how impressed she is with the people of Tulameen. Instead of being angry that their school is closing, they have chosen to celebrate the 100 years of having a school in Tulameen. They are hosting a school reunion on the May long weekend. Anyone who ever attended school in Tulameen is

invited to join the reunion fun.

Jesten outlined the weekend activities, which include registration at the community hall, a display of mementoes and photos in the hall, a barbecue on Saturday, a pancake breakfast on Sunday morning and an old-fashioned picnic on Sunday afternoon with fun and games for kids of all ages. School tours will be fitted into the program.

Board Chair Gordon Comeau noted the school closure and reunion had been a feature on CHBC-TV, and remarked on the positive spin Tulameen residents had given the closure.

Council awards contract

At the March 3 Town Council, bids were presented for a three-year cemetery maintenance contract for Princeton Cemetery. Seven bids were received.

Bids ranged from \$1219.56 per month to \$4,500 per month, and from \$43,904 over the three-year term to \$162,000 over three years. Opening and closing graves were

a separate bid, with costs ranging from \$338 per grave to \$400 per grave. Placing of plaques on grave sites was bid separately as well, and bids ranged from \$60 to \$150 per plaque.

Wayne Crimmon, who submitted the low bids in all categories, was awarded the contract.

Council makes decisions on wide variety of items

At the March 3 meeting of Town Council, the following decisions were made:

- * Mayor Keith Olsen and any other available Councillors will attend Penticton Peach Festival Parade on August 9 and will enter the antique fire truck.
- * Molson Local Heroes program,

which assists in maintaining, refurbishing or upgrading recreational facilities, was referred to the Recreation Commission.

- * The Town will donate the 1995 GM truck to Princeton Exhibition Association for use on the fairgrounds, but will not pay for any maintenance.

Film industry worker looks for jobs for Similkameen

Dale Floyd, who is employed in the film industry in Vancouver, lives in Princeton. He wants to see more film-making in the Similkameen Valley and is willing to spearhead the formation of a local promotional group to attract film makers to the Similkameen.

Floyd was a guest speaker at the March 6 Business Enhancement meeting. He explained to members his 25 years of experience in the industry as a fight choreographer and stunt man.

Floyd believes it is feasible to promote the Similkameen Valley, as there are many attractions here for film makers. He was not referring only to locations, but to the lack of permits required here, good accommodations at reasonable prices, and the availability of transportation, tradespeople, such as crane operators, carpenters and construction contractors, and the availability of movie "extras".

The biggest single drawback for the Similkameen is the lack of promotional resource materials such as photographs, listings for tradespeople and extras, listings for accommodations, and any other services.

Floyd said he had wanted to open a Film Commission for the Similkameen, but it would have taken years to have a new region established. Instead, he is now looking for an endorsement from the Okanagan Film Commission to be the Princeton liaison person. At the same time, he will need some people to help him assemble the information, put it on disk, and create a resource library.

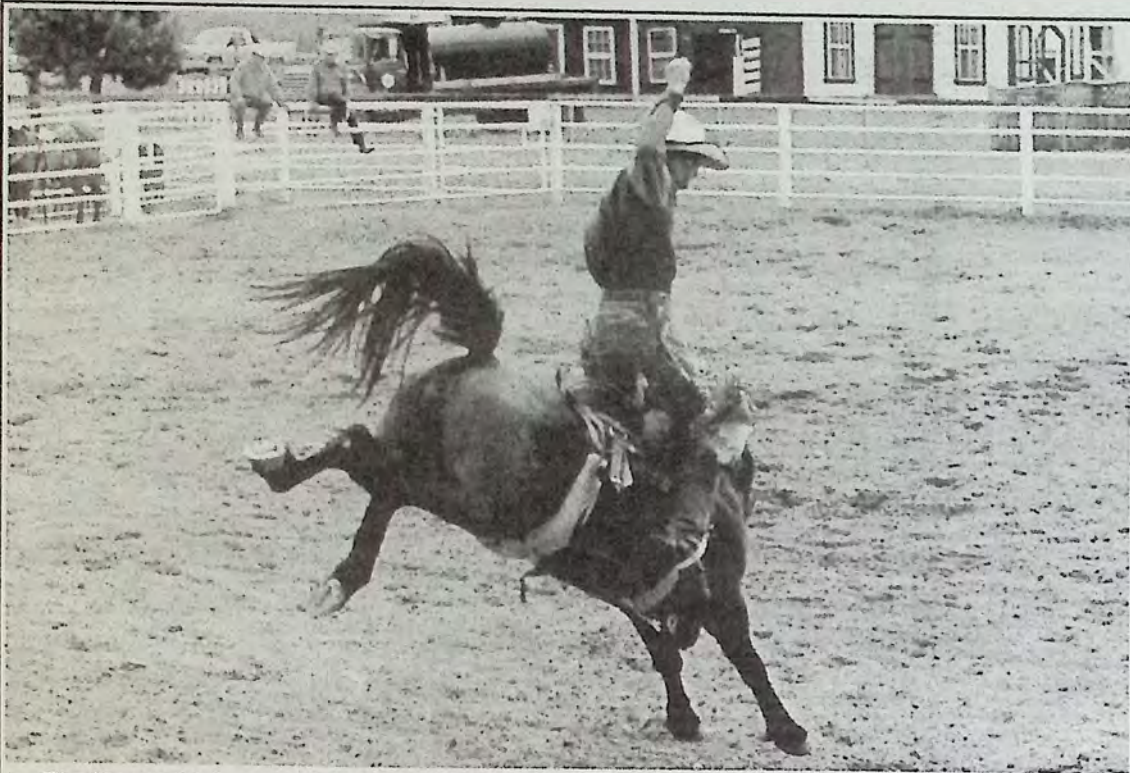
He explained the Similkameen Valley is on the edge of two major film regions - Okanagan and Thompson. If the Similkameen does not have representation, we will not have films coming here. He knows of two independent film makers who have expressed interest in making low budget films here, but if the Similkameen is to have a bigger share of the market, it needs to promote itself.

Floyd said, "The squeaky wheel gets the grease. I'm willing to be the squeaky wheel."

Mayor Keith Olsen was asked if Town Council would appoint Floyd to perform that function, and Mayor Olsen said Council would be "100 percent in favour of such as project".

Floyd said he would like Okanagan Film Commission to endorse him before he goes to Council.

There was some discussion of where money could be obtained for this project, and Western Diversification funding may be available.

Kenny McLean will be honoured by a new rodeo series called the "Kenny McLean Legends of Rodeo Saddle Bronc Tour 2003". Princeton will be included in this tour series as part of the Canadian Pro Rodeo to be held here on May 10 and 11. Other venues are Falkland, B.C., Maple Creek Saskatchewan, Marwayne, Alberta, Cranbrook, B.C., Jasper Alberta, and Oliver and Kamloops B.C. and ending with the the Interior Provincial Exhibition and Stampede in Armstrong, B.C.

Jeff Bryde, of Inside Pro Rodeo based out of Kelowna, made the announcement last week. The format includes a minimum \$5,000 pay-out with hopes of increasing that to \$10,000. The saddle bronc rider who has the highest total score on 10 head will be declared the 2003 champion. Adding the 10 scores is considered appropriate, as McLean rode in the National Finals Rodeo (World Champion) nine times and collected a cheque

in the average (aggregate) every time.

Kenny McLean died suddenly at a rodeo in Taber, Alberta, last July. He was 63 years old. His lifetime achievement in rodeo was phenomenal, winning World Saddle

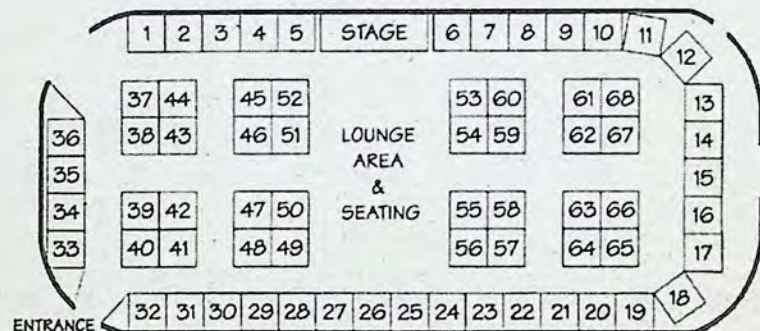
