## ToKN cancels concert

Princeton Fire Department was called to a grass fire near John Allison Elementary School on Friday afternoon. Three fire trucks attacked the fire, which was burning in the area between the school grounds and Tulameen River. This area has been the scene of grass fires on many occasions. Often, the fires are associated with a deposit of surface coal from an old mine.

## Health Authority prepares for SARS

One suspected SARS case is being investigated in the Interior region reports Dr. Bill Moorehead, Medical Health Officer for Interior Health Authority. Follow-up shows there is no cause for public concern.

"The concern is for people who have returned from Hong Kong, Hanoi, Vietnam, Singapore or Guandong Province in China," says Dr. Moorehead.

Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS) symptoms are a temperature greater than 38 degrees Celsius or 100.4 degrees Fahrenheit, and one or more of: cough, shortness of breath and difficulty breathing.

Quarantines are being imposed in Vancouver and Toronto where SARS has killed patients.

Dr. Moorehead advises people with these symptoms not to go

to the doctor's office or clinic or emergency room, but call a doctor or hospital and arrangements will be made to see the person. The best defense against SARS is to wash your hands frequently thoroughly and frequently.

## Fall Fair faces big bill

The Spring Motor Sports Extravaganza sponsored by Princeton and District Fall Fair Association has hit a snag.

At the March 25 meeting, Fall Fair President Jody Woodford told members she had approached one insurance agency for a policy to cover the Tuff Truck and demolition derby event, and they could find only one broker who would cover it, but the cost would be \$5,000 for the week-

end. The policy would not cover competitors, only public liability. Woodford said she will contact other insurance agencies, but the news left members wondering if the event could go ahead.

Despite this news, Gordon Schneider and John Bey will continue working on an announcer's tower. Princeton Light and Power has delivered used power poles for the tower construction.

## Carp are coming to the Similkameen

Plans to put European carp into the Similkameen Watershed will undoubtedly be met with a lot of opposition from local anglers and a number of stewardship agencies, but the government has decided the carp will improve the local fishery. The absence of decent sized trout in the Similkameen and Tulameen rivers means an absence of tourist attraction in the area.

European carp eat vegetation and grow to an enormous size. It is not unusual to hook a 40 pounder. The vegetarian habits of this carp will not endanger the existing trout, or so the propaganda about the fish would lead one to believe. In fact,

the fish not only eat all of the vegetation in the water, they have been known to leap out of the water, grab leaves or plants, and slither back into the water with their catch. Experts say this will keep the riverbanks and creeks free of vegetation obstructing the water flow.

The anticipated date for the introduction of the carp into the Similkameen is around June 1, 2003, when the freshet has receded. The fish will be introduced as fingerlings, but the rate of growth of these fish is such that they will be a viable sport fish by 2004.

A special screen is to be built at Enloe Dam to prevent the carp having access to the Okanagan system. Although the carp could be effective in combating the spread of milfoil weed, biologists will assess the impact of the carp on the Similkameen system before deciding whether to let them loose in the Okanagan.

An official spokesperson for the DFO gives the carp fingerling experiment thumbs up.

"This should be one of the best alternatives to the lack of sport fishing in the Similkameen," stated Roger Shaw, biologist assigned

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## Victoria loosens purse to develop regional tourism initiatives

The B.C. government is providing \$75,000 to the Thompson-Okanagan Tourism Association to market tourism products, facilities and services. Rick Thorpe, Minister of Competition, Science and Enterprise, made the announcement on March 25.

"Our government made a throne speech commitment to double our tourism industry by 2010," Thorpe said. "Tourism in British Columbia is a \$9 billion industry, and creating new opportunities in tourism is a key component of our Heartlands Economic Strategy."

Thorpe went on to say, "The funding we're announcing today will enable our tourism industry to respond to emerging local and global trends, enhance our competitiveness and and develop the potential and create jobs in our Heartlands communities."

The Aboriginal Tourism

Association of British Columbia and six regional associations are each receiving funding.

"This is a time of great challenge and opportunity for tourism in the Thompson-Okanagan," said Deanna Rainey, Executive Director of the Thompson-Okanagan Tourism Association. "We appreciate the contribution by the Ministry of Competition, Science and Enterprise that enables us to compete of an increased market share. Our world-class facilities and natural beauty draw visitors from around the world and this funding

helps us increase awareness in Canada and afar."

Yale-Lillooet MLA Dave Chutter said, "We are looking for ways to diversify our economy and tourism continues to play a big part of achieving that objective. This region has enormous potential and this funding will help us achieve this potential."

The tourism associations will have matching funding for activities such as marketing, product development, capacity building, skills and knowledge development, and project feasibility analyses.

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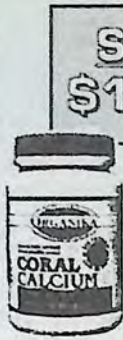

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**ROYALTY AND INCOME TRUST - Part 2**

In the previous article "Royalty And Income Trust - Part 1" tax implications and Tax Deferral - Return of Capital were discussed. This section continues on with Tax-Deferral - Return Of Capital explanations.

It is important to note that these tax-deferred distributions are considered a return of capital for income tax purposes, thereby reducing the adjusted cost base (ACB) of the related trust units. Essentially, this means that investors will face a greater capital gains tax payable, if and when the royalty trust units are ultimately sold. We therefore refer to the tax-sheltered distribution as "Tax-deferred," as opposed to "tax free."

For those income trusts that have distributed taxable income in 1999, investors will receive a T3 Supplementary Slip indicating the portion of cash distributions received that is to be reported as taxable income. The cash distributions received by holders of royalty and income trusts fall into three different categories: other income, dividend income and return of capital. If 100 percent of a royalty trust's income is tax-deferred, it is treated as a return of capital, reducing the adjusted cost base of the units held. In this case, a T3 Supplementary Slip would not be issued.

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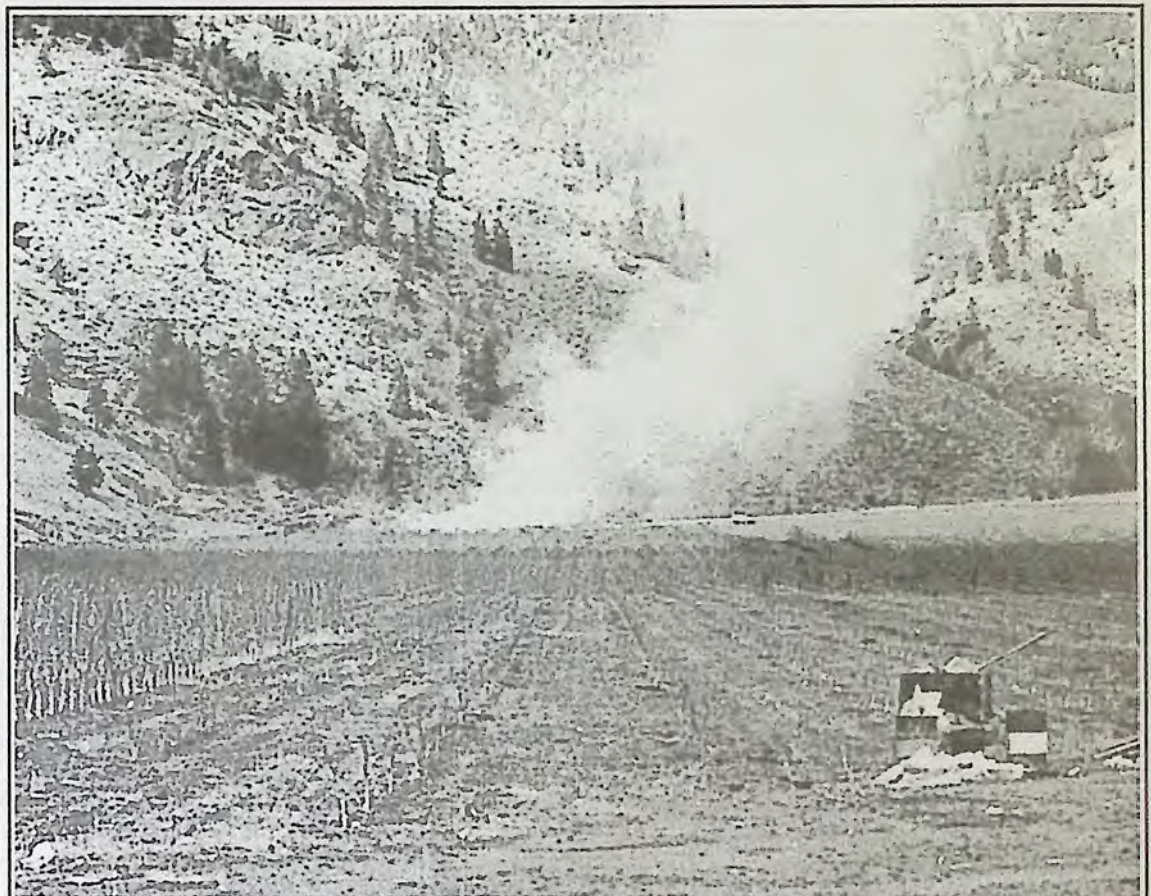

**Keremeos pool 'past it's due date'**

Plans are in place to examine what steps may be taken to address the swimming pool situation in Keremeos.

According to Recreation Director Karl Donoghue, the thirty year pool is, "old and not to current standards. It's past it's due date."

The pool has an estimated life span of one to five years, which has the Recreation Commission preparing itself for the reality of what to do in the future.

Donoghue states the Keremeos Recreation Centre will be paid off in 2008, which gives the group time to work out a plan.

Preliminary costing figures are already in place which will form the starting point for further exploration into the issue.

Donoghue explains the figures are only a guideline because costs will increase as each year passes before a project of any kind begins.

The next step will be to develop and distribute a survey for public input, a document Donoghue says will, "form a recreation development plan for the area."

It is hoped the data collected will provide the Recreation Commission with a direction to follow with it's overall future plans.

Although old and only 25 yards in length, the existing pool facility meets a need in the community as it provides Red Cross Lessons and many swim programs when in operation.

The Recreation Commission will ask public input to provide the direction desired on a new pool facility.

Donoghue says the new facili-

ty option being explored at this time is a complete replacement of the current pool, with public input determining the location and pool design.

Project costs will fluctuate based on what features are desired to be included in the design.

There is also the possibility

public input may point to not replacing the pool either.

Donoghue says it's important to gauge the feeling of the community.

With a timeline of nearly five years in place, Donoghue says, "It's always best to do this slowly and methodically as you could be in trouble if you rush it."

**Travel InfoCentre slated to open soon**

Keremeos Travel InfoCentre, operated by Similkameen Country, will soon greet visitors.

The facility, located in the heart of downtown Keremeos in Memorial Park, will be open limited hours to start with more regular hours added during summer months.

Similkameen Country relies on a dedicated core of volunteers who keep it operational.

Students add to the manpower once funding for the Summer Student Employment Program begins.

The small InfoCentre is well stocked with information on local and regional points of interest, attractions and accommodations.

The staff is also knowledgeable on matters of interest to the travelling public.

**Paving project set to begin next week**

A lengthy section of Highway 3 through Keremeos will be repaved.

The project, set to begin April 7th, will cover a stretch of the highway from where the 4-lanes start west of Keremeos, through downtown to just south of Cawston.

Peters Brothers Construction of Penticton was awarded the contract by the Ministry of Transportation.

Village of Keremeos CAO Bob LaFleur says motorists should

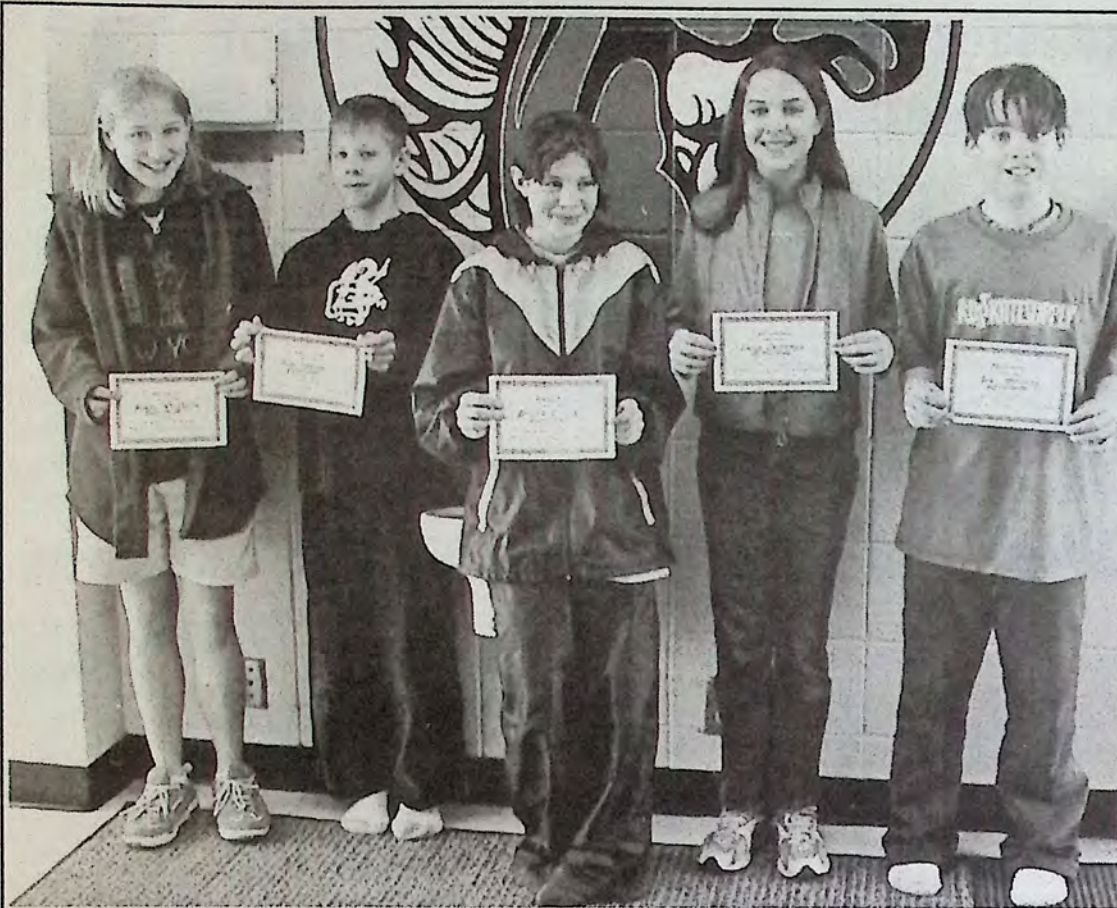
expect minor traffic disruptions during the project, which would most likely include single lane traffic.

## Fisheries Partnership provides information

Only three people showed up at the March 24 public presentation on Similkameen River fishing. A representative from Otter Valley Fish and Game Club and Princeton Fish and Game Club was able to gain a lot of information to take back to the clubs. Jillian Tamblin and Fabian Alexis, representing Okanagan Similkameen Boundary Fisheries Partnership, set up the meeting to hear local concerns about fishing in the Similkameen River.

The major focus of fishing in the upper Similkameen area appears to be the lakes, but there is a lot of pressure on the river from anglers, and the river is not stocked like the lakes have been.

There was a lot of discussion about the damage done by floods and ice jams to both the Tulameen River and the Similkameen River. Jillian Tamblin, who works for Okanagan Nation Alliance Fisheries Department, was surprised to learn the history of the Tulameen and Similkameen

Rivers during the past 20 years. As local people described these events, and the consequences to the river, she made notes.

Possible solutions to the problems in the Similkameen were discussed. The increasing size and number of sandbars, and the loss of riverbank catch basin areas was pointed out, and the benefits of dredging were discussed. Everyone agreed that, without money and special permits to allow machinery into the river, little could be done to enhance river fishing.

Tamblin brought a great deal of excellent material about the river, reports that have been done during the past few years. She agreed to see what could be done to place the reports in Princeton Public Library as reference material so it would be accessible to those wishing to read the information.

All in all, it was an excellent meeting and it was a pity more local anglers did not attend.

**Interior Health plans residential construction for seniors in City of Trail**

Interior Health has signed a contract with Golden Life Management to build and operate a new residential care facility in Trail. The new facility will provide 30 residential care rooms, each with their own ensuite bathroom and is wheelchair and walker accessible. The facility is specifically designed for residents with complex care needs that require 24

hour professional nursing care.

In addition to improvements to residential care, Interior Health is expanding other options such as Adult Day Programs and Respite Care to help seniors remain as independent as possible. In addition, Interior Health is partnering with BC Housing to develop new housing options for seniors, such as the recently announced com-

plex with 30 independent living apartments in Trail.

Through the Interior Health Authority region, more than 700 affordable, independent living apartments will be developed during the next few years.

The Trail project is just one of 10 new residential care facilities being built in the Interior Health region during the next two years.

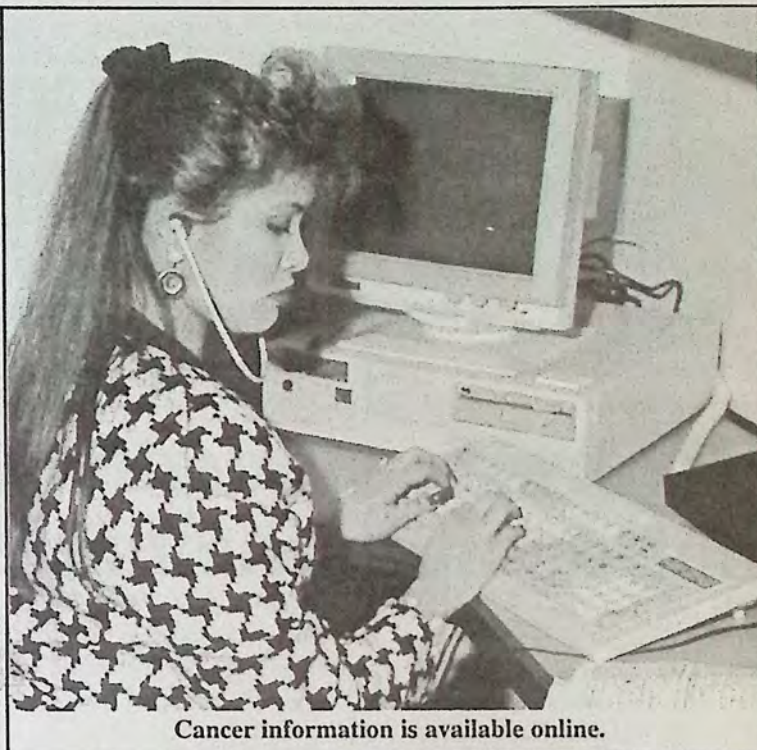

**Living past 100****Boost your immunity**

When we hear news broadcasts about a "deadly" pneumonia coming from Asia, most of us cringe. The current scare is about a disease caused by a virus, and there are a lot of things we can take to fight a virus. The first is selenium, and next is aspirin. Vitamin C is great, too. After all, colds and flu are caused by viruses, and we can fight them.

The key to fighting off any disease is having a good immune system. Your immune system depends on you eating enough of all of the things you need. If you are lacking in anything, your immune system will be weakened. This is why many people take multivitamins — they want to be certain they are getting enough of everything.

While vitamin supplements are good, the best way to guard your health is to eat enough vegetables and fruit. The Canada Food Guide recommends for or five servings of vegetables daily and two or three servings of fruit. The best immune system boosters are the foods containing beta-carotene, Vitamin C and Vitamin E.

Beta-carotene is found in winter squash, cantaloupe, carrots, broccoli, spinach, and sweet potatoes. Fruit such as apricots and plums are good sources of beta-carotene.

Vitamin C is found in citrus fruits, strawberries, cantaloupe, and rutabagas (Swede turnips).

Vitamin E is found in all green leafy vegetables and all yellow vegetables. The great thing about Vitamin E is that it fights bacteria. While a virus infection may produce sudden and severe symptoms, a bacterial infection starts slow and tends to gain ground gradually, then suddenly takes over. It is much harder to get rid of, and before the days of antibiotics, bacterial infections were a major killer.

Next to Vitamin E, garlic is a great fighter of bacteria, and a daily dose of garlic will help keep the bacteria from gaining ground. Garlic will block fungus infections too (should we rub garlic oil on athlete's foot?).


Garlic does its best for the body when it is eaten raw. Many people fear they will be socially unacceptable if they eat raw garlic, but if you can convince everybody else to eat it, nobody will notice!

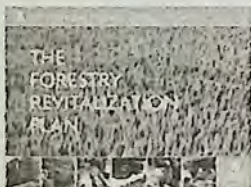

Companies must achieve measurable and enforceable results set out in forest stewardship plans or face fines of up to \$1 million or time in jail. The code, along with the BC industry's world-class forestry practices and leadership in independent certification, will ensure the province's renewable forest resources are there for future generations.

- ▲ Last year the forest industry paid \$2 billion to the province and its municipalities, enough to fund 390,000 of BC's students in grades 1 to 12
- ▲ Close to 600 mills, large and small, provide jobs in well over 150 BC communities
- ▲ The average salary and benefits for a forest worker exceeded \$67,000 in 1999
- ▲ Secondary manufacturing from timber or lumber employs 20,000 British Columbians and produces an estimated \$4.6 billion in annual sales
- ▲ Forest product exports in 2001 totaled \$14.2 billion — half of all BC exports
- ▲ Every year we plant 200 million trees, for a total of five billion by May 2002 — every time we cut a tree we replace it with another
- ▲ Less than one-third of one per cent of the total area of BC's forests is logged each year, producing a quarter of all the province's goods and services

## Victoria decides who owns methane rights

Recent legislation solves the problem of who owns coalbed methane gas. Prior to the Coalbed Gas Act, passed last week, there was uncertainty about whether coalbed gas rights were legally owned by the owner of the coal rights or whether investors could gain access to the gas as a separate resource. The provincial policy established 20 years ago stated coalbed gas is a natural gas owned by the holder of natural gas rights. The Coalbed Gas Act enshrines that policy in legislation, providing the legal certainty needed to open up new investment and exploration opportunities.

Richard Neufeld, Minister of Energy and Mines, stated, "These

legislative changes will unleash the potential of our vast coalbed gas resources by creating the stability needed for this industry to develop and succeed in bringing economic prosperity and opportunity to every region of our province. Our service plan commitment to generate \$20 billion of cumulative investment in the oil and gas sector by 2008 is on track. Energy demand is rising and new sources like coalbed gas have the potential to diversify B.C.'s energy supply."

Princeton area is not the only area of British Columbia where coalbed methane gas production is being explored. Coal seams in almost every coalfield in British Columbia are being explored for

production potential. There are an estimated 90 trillion cubic feet of coalbed gas in B.C. In northern B.C., nine experimental projects are underway, and exploratory work is being done on Vancouver Island.

Coalbed methane gas is a natural addition to existing sources of petroleum source natural gas, and is cleaner.

Neufeld says, "Coalbed gas is an important new resource that offers tremendous economic potential for our province and will help ensure a secure, reliable energy supply for the future."

The Coalbed Gas Act is part of the Heartlands Economic Strategy introduced by the B.C. government in the 2003 Throne Speech.

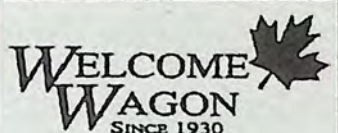

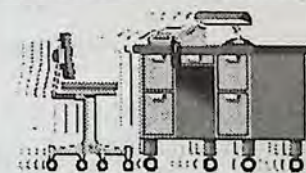

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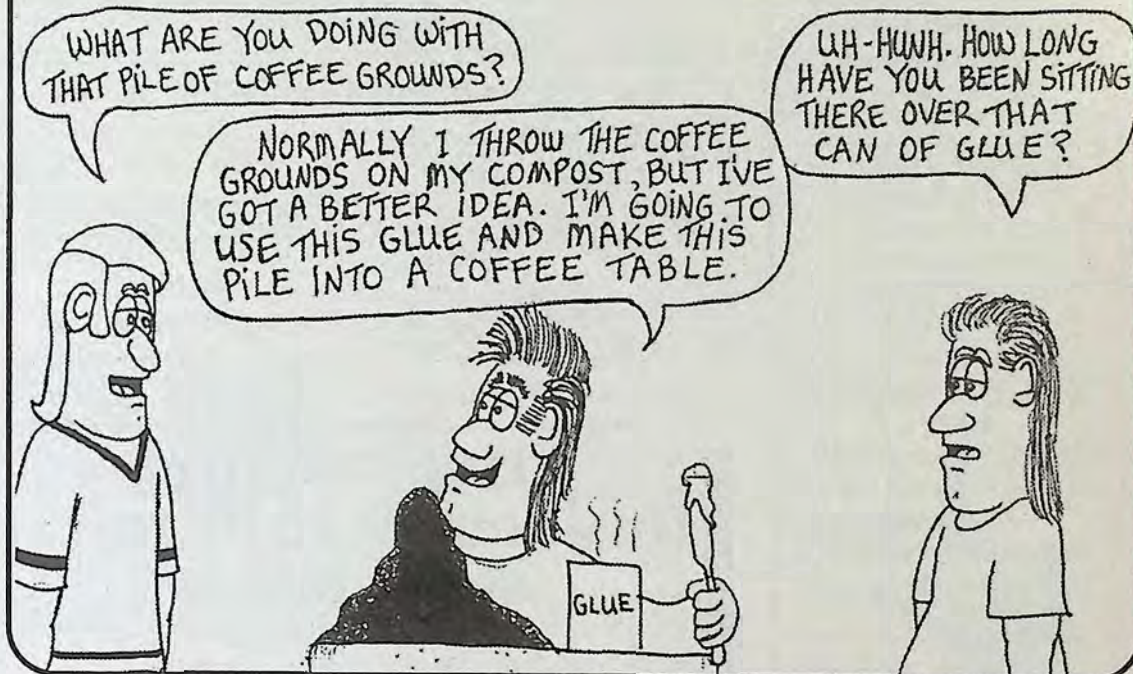

### Education Minister abandons "heartland" says Opposition Leader

Editor:

Recently, Advanced Education Minister Shirley Bond announced \$12 million in "new" money for post-secondary education. Ms. Bond claimed this money would create 3100 new student spaces and enhance quality. But like so much Liberal spin, on close inspection reality and rhetoric don't match up.

First, the money Ms. Bond announced for new spaces does not come close to paying for them. Each new student space costs approximately \$8,000. Ms. Bond only allocated \$3,900 per space, leaving institutions with a

huge budget shortfall. Moreover, more than 80 percent of the new money was allocated to B.C.'s big universities, leaving colleges in small communities out in the cold.

Second, Ms. Bond's announcement does nothing to stem huge tuition fee increases that are putting education out of reach for many average families, particularly in small communities where young British Columbians have to leave home to go to school.

So, if you look behind Ms. Bond's rhetoric, the reality is clear: the Liberals are abandon-

ing post-secondary education - particularly in the "heartland" - at the very moment when increased education opportunities are needed most.

Ms. Bond and her Liberal colleagues don't seem to understand what everyone else knows: education is key to securing long-term economic opportunity. And with high unemployment, record deficits, stagnant investment, and the worst economic growth in the country this year, education is needed now, more than ever.

**“Let’s focus on the certainties of the war”**

As I write this column, we are in the grip of war’s grim reality. It’s uncertain whether hostilities will be over or escalating so let’s focus on some certainties.

First, the history of human existence show that malicious dictators have been restrained and war avoided when those dictators were convinced their devious designs would be opposed by an allied opposition. History is just as painfully clear that dictators who believed they faced weak and divided allies almost always continued their vicious destruction of human life and liberty.

Second, Saddam’s history is clear and exactly reflects the above reality. Over one million people have died under his leadership. This includes over 100,000 Iraqis murdered by his regime since 1991. His rate of killing is estimated at 5,000 Iraqi civilians per month.

Third, neither Dr. Blix, his weapons inspectors or any country in the world has said Hussein is in compliance with destroying his weapons of mass destruction. As a matter of fact, he is firing Scud missiles, missiles he swore he never had.

Fourth, a new global realignment of nations, a new geopolitical divide has now become a reality – nations wanting to disarm Hussein and nations not wanting to. The Prime Minister has placed us in the camp of nations like Syria, Libya, Iran, China, Russia and France. We are now blinking across this chasm at our historic allies on the other side, allies such as Australia, Britain, Spain, the United States and the majority of European nations, especially those new democracies in the new Europe.

Fifth, there are two legal points of view on the question of whether

U.N. Resolution 1441 justifies action. Several hundred eminent lawyers have internationally published their names to the “yes” side of this question. This partly explains why the polls in Australia and Britain moved to supporting the allied action.

Sixth, a number of nations have been hard at work for months with Iraqi exiles and ex-patriots to plan for the construction of a civil society and democratic institutions in a post-conflict Iraq. Canada has not been involved in these plans.

Seventh, Chretien agreed in 1998 to allied bombing raids on Iraq without Security Council approval. He agreed to the Canadian and allied bombing of Kosovo in 1999, also without U.N. Security Council approval. He was right to join our allies in stopping Mad Milosevic. He is wrong not to again join our allies to destroy a deadlier tyrant.

**An Open Letter to Premier Campbell**

Dear Editor;  
Please accept this letter as official notification that effective immediately I will not be paying any more taxes to the Province of British Columbia. After conducting a core review of my financial situation I have had to make some difficult choices. And since you have severely depleted my income, I may be forced to put the names of my creditors in a hat – creating a domino effect, causing them to be remiss in forwarding their taxes.

Today, I have introduced a new bill, “The Personal Choice, Flexibility and Improvement Act”. This bill, #1 PCFI, will exempt me from provincial taxation and allow some flexibility in paying my creditors. are drafting a resolution that will exempt me from legal proceedings. But since you have already been caught, a retroactive clause will be included. 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## B.C.'s top quality forest products must compete worldwide

Marketing our forest industry as having the best products and practices in the world is more important than ever before, says Yale-Lillooet MLA Dave Chutter.

"Our forest industry has never faced stiffer competition than it does today," says Chutter. "Not only is it battling through the softwood lumber dispute but competition from European wood producers is getting stronger. We must market our wood products aggressively so this industry can continue to thrive and create jobs for British Columbians."

Chutter says the \$3 million global marketing network announced recently by Premier Gordon Campbell and Forest Minister Mike de Jong is exactly what the industry needs. The B.C. Market Outreach Network brings together communities, companies and workers to promote B.C.'s forest products and practices.

Part of the government's \$20 million commitment to international marketing and product development, the network's activities will include:

- \* a web site [www.bcforestinformation.com](http://www.bcforestinformation.com) that brings together information about B.C. forests and forest practices, complete with interactive maps and breaking news;
- \* fact sheets and DVDs that highlight B.C.'s sustainable forest

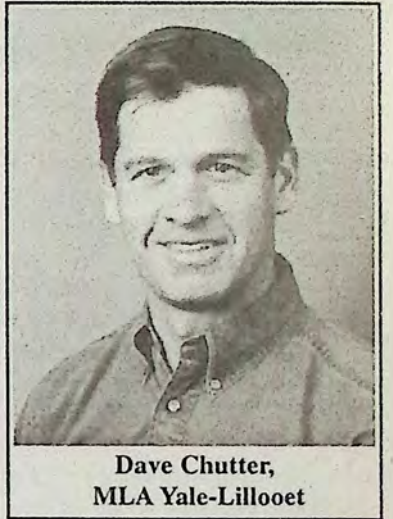
### Health care will be the topic

"The softwood lumber dispute has made it abundantly clear that we need to seek out new markets for our wood products," continued Chutter. "This global marketing network will open new doors for our forest industry and reassure existing customers that the best

wood products in the world come from British Columbia."

## Forest industry faces sweeping changes

The provincial government approved legislation changing the way the forest industry functions in B.C. The reason given by Forest Minister Mike de Jong for the reforms is to create new jobs and revitalize the forest industry. He notes the forest industry has been hit hard by a changing global market and outdated provincial regulations, resulting in the loss of 27 mills and 13,000 forest industry jobs. Revenue to the Crown (stumpage) have declined by one-third.

To create new opportunities, the government will re-allocate 20 percent of logging rights from major licensees and make them available on the open market, making more timber available for First Nations, community forests, woodlots, the value-added sector and new entrepreneurs.

One-time funding of \$275 million has been set aside for the transition from the old to the new. Forest companies will be compensated for legal harvesting rights removed from their allowable annual cuts - up to \$200 million. Forest workers and contractors will have access to a \$75 million trust fund for transition assistance.

Barriers to regional job creation will be removed by allowing the province's 600 mills to obtain B.C. timber no matter where it was logged.

The First Nation's share of the allowable annual cut will more than double, from three to eight percent, roughly equivalent to the proportion of First Nations people in the rural population. The province will share \$95 million in forest revenues with First Nations during the next three years.

The government will adjust cut control regulations so companies can decide when to log based on market conditions without being penalized for not cutting wood. Forest tenure holders will be

able to subdivide or transfer all or part of their cutting rights to other operators in B.C. without penalty, allowing the industry to diversify.

One percent of all direct forest revenues will be applied to global marketing of B.C.'s world-class forest practices and products (see article at top of page).

A new timber pricing system will begin. Under this system, the price of Crown timber harvested on all tenures will be based on the selling price of Crown timber competitively auctioned through B.C. Timber Sales.

To support the new system, B.C. Timber Sales will increase the amount of timber it auctions to 20 percent of the provincial allowable cut. All cutting licences in the program will be awarded to the highest bidder, and the auction rules will be amended to provide a clear, consistent administrative framework.

More allowable annual cut will be allocated to the B.C. Timber Sales program, First Nations and community forests and woodlots, creating new forest-sector opportunities. The timber processing requirements imposed on major licensees will be removed, providing value-added companies with greater access to wood fibre.

Together, these changes are meant to result in a much greater percentage of the province's timber being sold through open markets of one kind or another.

Government will continue to support development and marketing of new value-added programs through Forest Investment Account activities. For next year, \$7 million has been allocated for Account's product development and secondary manufacturing program.

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# He shaved for his birthday!

Dal McLaughlin planned an outrageous way to celebrate his 65th birthday – he had his head shaved! Furthermore, he wants people to challenge other new Old Age Pensioners to have their heads

Bridge opened." Why shave his head? "At the time I was born I was as bald as a cue ball and I thought now that I am a member of the "over the hill gang" or internationally, the Fraternal Order of Old Farts (F.O.O.F.), it would be nice to start my membership again bald from the neck up. So be it."

Four years ago, Dal was told he has Type 2 diabetes. He was told to exercise. He started walking.

"It was hard at the time because I was very overweight (260 pounds). That was about 20 months ago and I have covered about 6000 km."

He now weighs 205 pounds.

Three months ago, he decided he wanted to do something special for his 65th birthday, in addition to shaving his head. On January 18, he set a goal to cover 500 km. and lose 25 pounds by his birthday. In fact, he walked 500 miles (800 km) and lost 30 pounds. He did this by walking 400 km. and pedaling 400 km. on a stationary bike.

"I think I have accomplished a lot," Dal says. "I deserve to celebrate this birthday."

An afternoon open house at the McLaughlin residence was the official celebration, but on the actual date of his birthday, Dal was in Vancouver to celebrate with his sister, who has the same birth date (not the same year).

As he begins this new phase of his life without a hair on his head, he begins it in better health and with a positive spirit. It is a great way to begin his next 65 years!

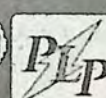

## Prepare for the Coalmont to Princeton race

The fourth annual Peach City Runners Coalmont to Princeton Road Race will be happening on Sunday, April 27. The run is the fifth in the Interior Road Race Series.
