On Saturday evening, while she and her father rode their ATV's along the railbed between Tulameen and Coalmont, the girl lost control of her ATV and went over an embankment where she was thrown onto a pile of rocks. RCMP credit her lack of serious injury to wearing her helmet. Tulameen residents helped rescue her.

PXA looks at problems

Problems were the order of business at the Princeton Exhibition Association meeting on May 13. The question of constructing showers for the grounds was raised again. John Bey said it would cost \$20,000 to do the job properly. The ATV group is willing to put up \$1,000 toward the project, but the PXA does not have the remainder to spend, and is not permitted to borrow money. Members decided to look at renting portable showers for the ATV Jamboree.

Jody Woodford spoke of a matter she had heard indicating some group had approached Town

Council with a business proposition to take over one of the facilities on the fairgrounds. She expressed concern that such a group would not have approached the PXA as the management organization responsible for all of the facilities at the fairgrounds. Coun-cillor Spencer Coyne informed the meeting the matter had been dealt with by advising the persons to go to the PXA.

Ed Nault requested permission to hold another fun gymkhana day for local youngsters with horses, probably in June. His request was approved.

On July 4 and 5, a cattle penning event will take place at the Maverick Saloon. The PXA was asked whether stables would be available for competitors. There are 66 stalls available to the competitors. They will phone the PXA office to reserve space.

John Bey reported he is working on obtaining a designation for the PXA for charitable donation receipts. He requested letters from organizations such as 4-H, Lions, New Beginnings, Fall Fair etc. which would indicate the PXA is giving them free access to storage and other facilities.

Boyd came from the Cariboo where he and his donkey did a trek from Barkerville to Quesnel every year to commemorate the gold rush days of the Cariboo, when thousands flocked to Barkerville to sluice the precious metal from the gravel bars.

Artists steal the weekend show

Vermilion Artists presented their best ever May long weekend show at Princeton Cultural Centre. The talent on display was amazing!

Saturday morning was a great occasion for the Cultural Centre. Mayor Keith Olsen was on hand to commend two people who have contributed art to the community.

The first presentation was made to Linda Anderson, who painted the mural for the Cultural Centre. (See photo below). Anderson explained the significance of the variety of images included in the mural, which depicts life in the upper Similkameen area. There

are deer, grasslands, forest, the old Allenby pumphouse, a gold panner, and the river.

The next item was a presentation to the Town of a project begun as a millennium project. Diane Huey explained the four quilted wall hangings which contain three squares each. Twelve women made one square each for the wall hangings, then Barbara Milde put them together to quilt them. Each square uses a different technique, and the quilting is different on each hanging.

Scenes done in the squares depict the Cenotaph, the first courthouse, horse logging, Stellar jay, the wooden bridge, gold panning,

Amber Ski Hill, Peter Pine, St. Paul's United Church, a cowboy, deer in the mountains and Red Bluffs.

The twelve women who contributed the artistic squares were Floralee Stewart, Trish Reid, Norma Kraetor, Willie Riske, Marilyn Bishop, Marilee Waldron, Maureen Turner, Corinne Plunkett, Charlene O'Byrne, Ruth Kavanaugh, Jackie Chaston and Myrna Leard. Mayor Olsen presented a flowering potted plant to both Anderson and Huey.

Special praise goes to Mary Bedford for organizing the event and to the artists for their show.

Competitors will be back in July

There were 24 competitors at Princeton Airport last weekend to test their skills at flying remote controlled model airplanes. This sounds like kid stuff to some people, but there are five different levels of competition, and many different levels of aircraft. Some of the aircraft used in the top class of fliers cost more than \$5,000. This is serious skill, even though the pilots are young at heart.

The competitions held in Princeton were in precision aerobatics. Chad Northeast was on site. He is one of the pilots who will be travelling to Poland this year as part of the team representing Canada in the World Precision Aerobatics competitions.

The five classes are Sportsman (for anybody, but especially beginners), Intermediate, Advanced, Expert, and the top class, FAI. Pilots at Princeton Airport were offered competitions in these classes.

There were not many spectators out to see the planes on Saturday, due to the nasty weather. A chill wind swept across the airport and occasionally brought hail or rain. The competitors were thankful the hail was not hard enough to dam-

age their planes. Competitors came from B.C., Alberta and Washington State. This summer, in July, these com-

petitors will be back, along with many more, as Princeton will host the Canadian championships.

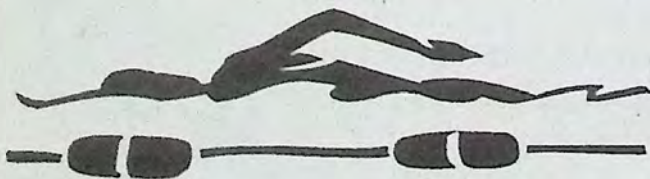

Living Past 100

Essential for life: those incredible amino acids

If you want to live a long time, you need to have sufficient levels of amino acids. Amino acids are components of protein. Protein provides the structure for all living things. Every one of our cells is built with protein. Protein substances form muscles, organs, glands, nails, hair and most body fluids except bile and urine. Proteins are essential for bone growth. Enzymes, hormones and genes are made of protein. Nerve tissue is made of protein.

Now you can see how important amino acids are to good health, especially the health of the nervous system.

In order for a protein to be complete, it must contain all of its particular amino acids. Each protein is composed of different amino acids. Each meets a specific need. They are not interchangeable.

Our nervous system cannot function without amino acids. Without amino acids, no messages flow to and from the brain. In short, you are dead without amino acids.

There are 29 amino acids. The liver produces 80 percent of the amino acids we need. The remaining 20 percent comes from what we eat. Experts in health and nutrition emphasize the importance of eating the right combinations of foods so as to obtain the right combinations of amino acids. The most common sources of amino acids is meat, fish and eggs, but to have complete amino acids, it is important to eat nuts, seeds, beans and peas. Traditional food combinations, such as chili con carne and French Canadian pea soup have complete combinations of amino acids because they contain both meat and seeds (beans and peas are basically seeds). Whole grains and milk contain amino acids. Anyone contemplating a vegetarian diet may have to take certain amino acid supplements to compensate for lack of meat.

We will have more next week on specific amino acids and what they do.

Hedley archivist reports on newspaper clean-up job

Anne Jensen, an archivist from Hedley, was hired early this year to repair damage done to archive newspapers in the basement of Princeton Museum. In December, a leak in the roof of the building caused water to flow down the wall and flood the basement. The newspapers became damp and mold began to form. Jensen went on a rescue mission.

On May 14, at the regular Museum Society meeting, Jensen gave a full report. She had been hired to do 50 hours of work, and then she volunteered 50 hours! She repaired all of the newspapers, put them in order according to date, placed them in protective archive boxes, and labelled them according to year, indicating whether or not the year's collection was complete.

Jensen said she found many duplicates, and these have been filed separately for use for clippings for scrapbooks.

There was some discussion about what to do with newspapers from outside the valley, particularly the Manchurian newspapers saved by Dave Taylor, who owned a newspaper called the Similkameen Star. Members decided to make photocopies of the Manchurian newspapers for display purposes for Chinese visitors.

Jensen told members she had cleaned the archive room and the rock collection room.

Vice-President Nick Mills, who chaired the meeting, commended Jensen for her excellent work on behalf of Princeton Museum Society.

Friends will remember Walter

A special memorial will be held at Princeton OAP Hall on May 24 at 2:00 p.m. as friends and members celebrate the life of Walter Wiese. A formal service was held for him last week, when he was buried at Princeton Cemetery.

Walter died at age 93, and left behind an interesting life of service to his community. He was born at Holstein, Germany on May 27, 1909. He came to Canada in the 1930's, and worked in greenhouses in the lower mainland.

When World War II began, Walter was classified as an "alien". He came to Princeton and worked in the Lynn Mine (now the Lynnwood area). He was 31 years old.

He went on to build greenhouses for Martin and Jean Pepper. They divorced and moved away, and Walter had the greenhouses. He

Walter married Irma, a Hungarian, and when she passed away, he took her ashes back to Hungary.

Later, Marie Sloan became his companion, and Walter outlived her, too.

Walter was proud of his age, claiming his diet of raw fruit and vegetables kept him alive for so long, and he encouraged others to follow his example.

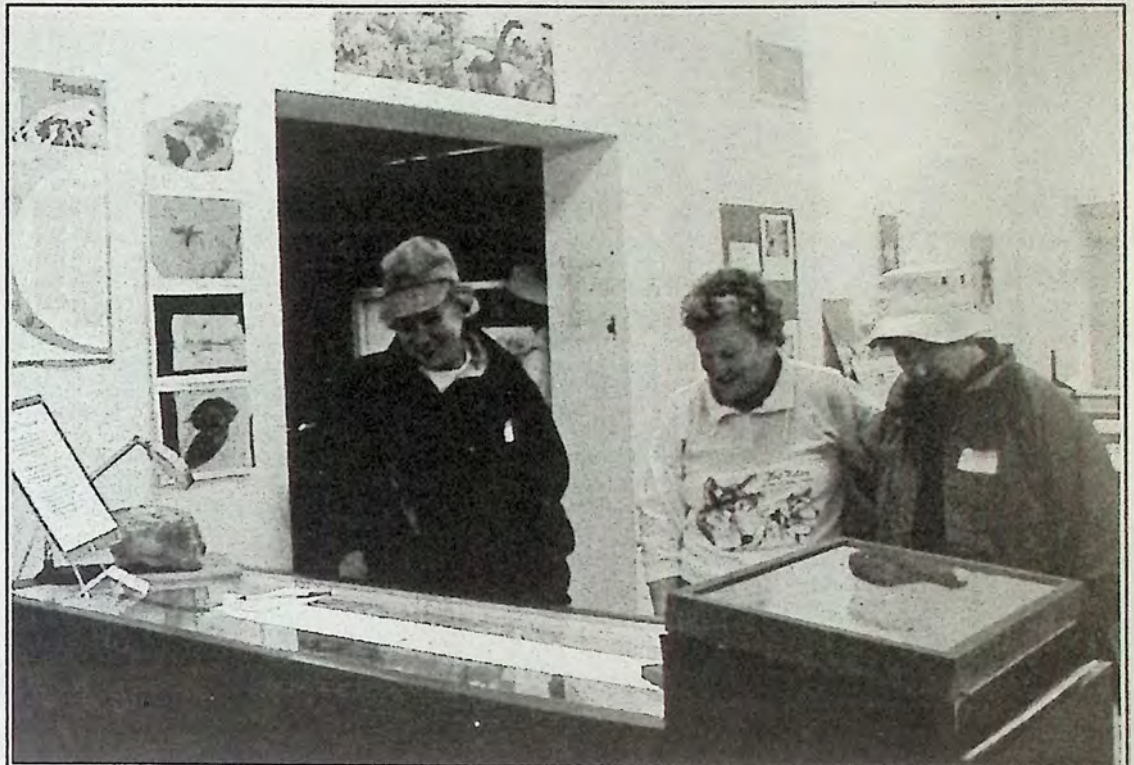

USIB begins land use survey

A survey of Princeton area land use prior to the coming of European immigrants begins this week. Charlene Allison presented the plan to members of Princeton's Museum Society on May 14 at the regular meeting.

Upper Similkameen Indian Band has received a grant to cover the cost of the survey, which is primarily interviewing people and identifying sites where artifacts have been found.

Allison emphasized there will be no archaeological "digs" and

nobody need fear having their property designated for future digs. In addition to interviews, the team will go through the archives at the museum to record any information which may describe land use by the indigenous people of this area. (See ad this page)

Museum members gave permission for Allison and Brenda Gould, and their assistants, to use the archives at their own discretion. Members of the Upper Similkameen Indian Band hold

memberships in the Museum Society and the museum is the official repository of the Band's artifacts.

The archaeological team is hoping to have full cooperation of Princeton area residents in gathering the survey information. The deadline for completion is March 31, 2004, and the museum and Town Council will receive a full report. Allison said the archaeology team has a list of contacts now, and are advertising for more.

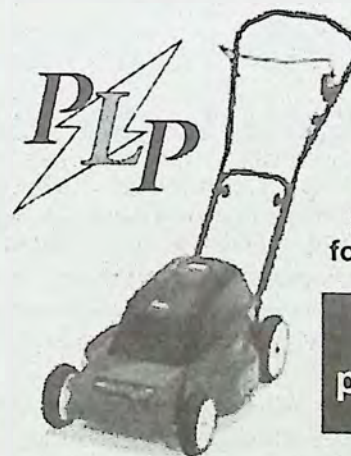

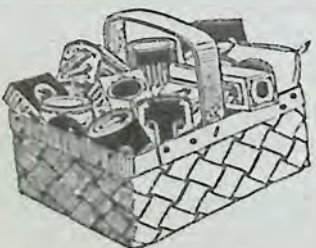

What's going on?

If you can understand our Canadian government's actions, you are doing better than the majority of Canadians.

When my friend becomes older, she will be on medicare, and will not have to pay these premiums. In the meantime, can you imagine the burden on this couple? They became unemployed at the same

time then had to buy this health insurance.

Young Canadians should take note of the direction our government is heading with its privatization policies. Do not ever let the politicians convince you that private health insurance will be better than what we have now. The American way is NOT better. The American way is a way of making money for rich people investing in insurance companies. No wonder they would like a piece of the action in Canada!

Young Canadians should work as hard as seniors to protect the health care system from any further erosion, and especially protect health insurance from privatization. Imagine trying to raise a family with huge health insurance costs tying your hands.

Understanding the Coquihalla agreement

When we made the decision to propose a new operating and maintenance agreement for the Coquihalla Highway, there was much to consider. I know how important the highway is for the Interior and for the entire province. Good transportation is critical to our economic prosperity. I wanted to be sure the pros outweighed the cons. I've reviewed the plan extensively, had numerous discussions with Transportation Minister Judith Reid and I know the new arrangement is the best thing we can do for the Coquihalla and for the other transportation infrastructure throughout the province. Let me explain.

It's important to consider the transportation demands around the province and right here at home. No one can argue our highways have been deteriorating for many years. Increasing volumes and a lack of commitment from previous governments has put us behind the eight ball. Anyone who has travelled the Trans-Canada between Kamloops and the Alberta border knows exactly what I'm talking about. As a result, we have hundreds of millions of dollars worth of improvements and upgrades to make. In the Southern Interior alone we've already committed \$300 million for improvements.

The next question we have to ask ourselves is, how do we pay for such massive projects. We could borrow the money. However, that means our children have to pay

our debts and the interest costs alone mean they would have to make sacrifices of other services government provides, possibly health and education. That's not the right thing to do. The money we receive upfront for the right to operate the highway will be dedicated to transportation improvements.

Despite what many believe, the highway is not paid for. It cost \$955 million to build and it has also cost \$225 million to operate since 1986. We've collected \$550 million to date. We collected \$42.9 million in tolls in 2001-02 to offset original capital costs. Of that, \$21 million was used for maintenance, operations and rehabilitation.

There's no question a new operator will collect a considerable amount in tolls over the proposed 55 year period. Before doing so, they will have to give us a lump sum that we will use to invest in our highways. I cannot speculate on how much that will be because it will have to be negotiated. However, if it's not enough to make the deal worthwhile, there will be no agreement. The operator will also pay for all future maintenance and upgrades of the highway. These costs are climbing every year. The cost to replace just one of the bridge decks on Phase one is \$500,000. Over the life of the contract, we estimate they will have to fork out more than \$800 million to keep the highway in tip-top condition. The operator will have to assume all future rehabilitation risks and be required to meet service and

safety standards through a legally binding contract. That is one of the reasons the tolls will increase modestly by \$3, the first increase since 1988. It makes the deal enticing enough that we will get a good return for taxpayers through the upfront fee. The toll increase does not apply to commercial users and will not take effect until after an operator is found.

Improvements will be made sooner under a private operator because they will want to encourage more traffic. They only get paid if people are using the highway. Eighty-one percent of users are from outside the Interior. If a private operator can increase that, our local economies benefit.

The increase will be offset for many in this region with the frequent traveller's pass. For \$50, drivers can purchase a 90-day pass and drive the highway as many times as they like. Someone who makes a round trip every two weeks will save \$280 a year.

It's important to remember having a private company operate the highway isn't a new concept. This has been done successfully in many other jurisdictions, here in Canada and around the world. Right here in B.C. we already have private companies who clear snow and maintain our roads. Our proposal ensures the Coquihalla will remain publicly owned.

The next step in this process is to set up a Mayor's council so community input is part of the process. The request for proposals will go out later this summer and a new operator will be selected by December.

BC incomes decline

Census data released last week by Statistics Canada shows B.C. families' median income dropped from \$56,146 in 1995 to \$54,840 in 2000 after adjusting for inflation. Median income in the rest of Canada remained unchanged.

During the same period, the gap between rich and poor in B.C. widened. Those among the top 10 percent in income levels averaged \$176,762. Those in the bottom 10 percent averaged \$9,727 per year. For every dollar of income in the lowest income bracket, those in

the top bracket earned \$18.20. British Columbia had the second most unequal distribution of wealth in Canada, with Ontario in top spot.

Employed lone parents with children averaged 74 percent nationwide, but in B.C. the number of employed lone parents was 71.1 percent.

Seniors age 65 and over showed a three percent decline in the number with low income. The majority with low incomes are women (71 percent).

Religion is ignored in British Columbia

People in B.C. are not religious. Data from the 2001 Census shows British Columbia had the highest proportion of people reporting no religion (35 percent).

The number of Roman Catholics in B.C. increased by 12 percent to just over 666,900 in the past decade, B.C. had the lowest proportion of Roman Catholics of all of the provinces (17 percent).

The number of Protestants declined 11 percent to just over 1.2 million, which represented 31 percent of B.C.'s popula-

tion.

Nationally, there was substantial growth in the number of people reporting Sikh, Buddhist and Muslim religions. In 2001, 3.5 percent of B.C.'s population reported Sikh as their religion, accounting for one-half (135,300) of the Sikh population in Canada.

The census counted 85,500 Buddhists in B.C., or 2.2 percent of the population.

The number of Muslims in B.C. more than doubled in a decade to 56,200 people, or 1.5 percent of the population.

On Friday evening, people registered and enjoyed a tea. On Saturday morning, more people gathered at Tulameen Community Hall to look at old class photos and

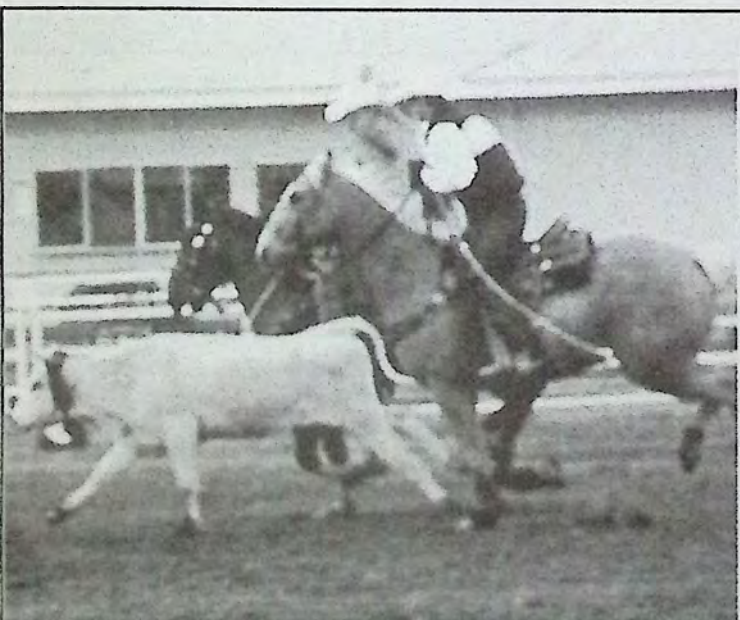
meet old friends, remembering school days in Tulameen.
