Crash teaches lessons

As part of a drinking and driving education campaign, Princeton RCMP staged a drunk driver crash near Princeton Secondary School last Thursday morning. The event required cooperation between RCMP, BC Ambulance Service, Princeton Highway Rescue, the Fire Department, Abba Towing service and Princeton Auto Wreckers (for the wrecked car). The entire exercise was done very well, with the three student victims wearing "blood".

The event included a lesson on wearing seat belts, as the "dead" victim was thrown from the vehicle causing death. Students flocked to the scene as the sounds of sirens drew them. Not all of the students thought the accident was "real" but they understood the meaning of the accident and the lessons it was meant to teach. CHBC-TV was on hand to film the event for broadcasting on the news hour.

RCMP arrest four in drug bust

Princeton RCMP executed a search warrant under the Controlled Substance Act on the evening of Thursday, May 22. Four persons, two males and two females, were arrested at a residence on Angela Avenue in Princeton.

Police seized cocaine, marijuana, other drugs and associated paraphernalia.

Princeton RCMP believe those arrested are involved in trafficking of the drugs seized. Charges and court appearances are pending.

Students win at B.C. film festival

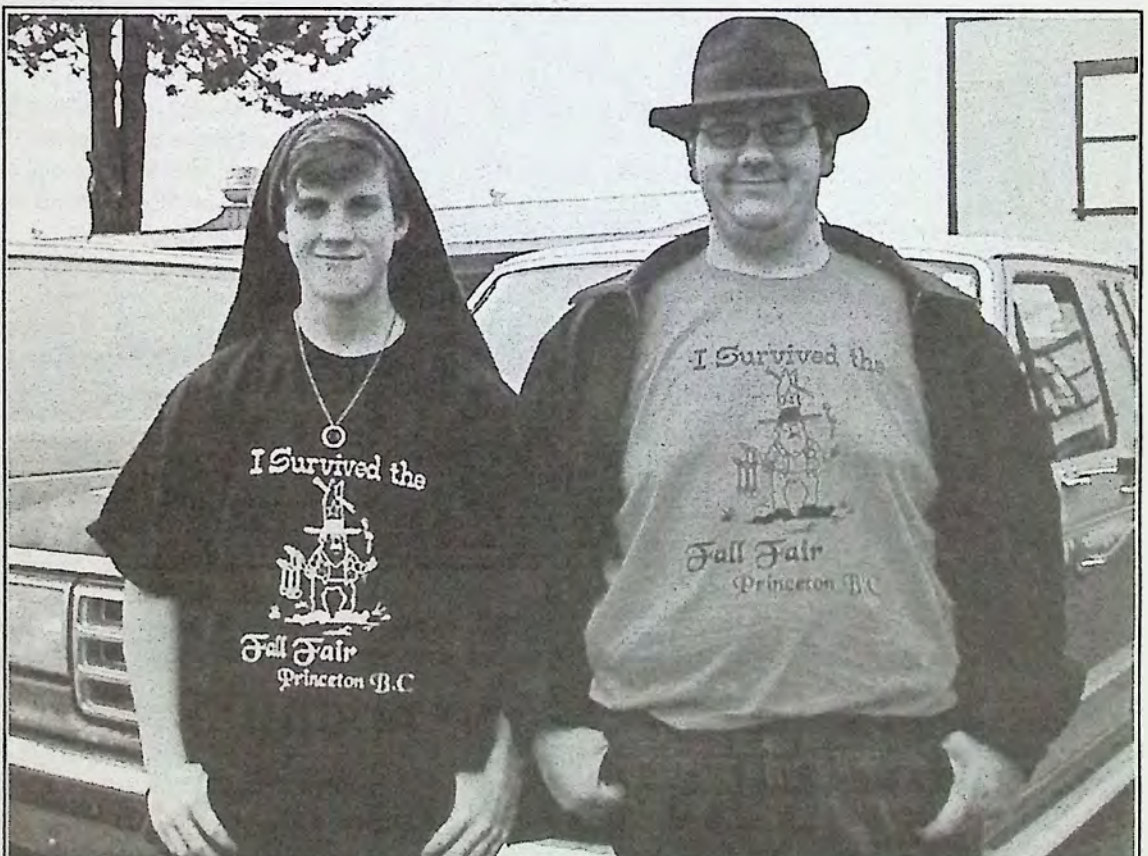

Want a job? Listen to employers!

In front of an audience of people looking for jobs, four local employers told what they look for before they hire an employee.

On May 21, Princeton & District Skills Centre hosted the first of four Employer Panels to help unemployed people know what to expect when they go job-hunting.

This first panel was made up of Rob Marshall of Weyerhaeuser, Blair Noel of Princeton Wood Preservers, Keith Later of Princeton Post and Rail, and Lorne Esselink, of Cool Creek. All of these businesses are involved in the forest industry.

Other panels will involve people from Health Services, tourism, and retail services. Employer panels are planned for September, December, and sometime next spring.

Lorne Esselink told students he judges prospective employees on their attitude toward the job and on their appearance. Experience is not so important.

"If you've got a great attitude, we can teach you," he said.

Showing up on time every day, and being a good team player will help keep the job. An honest resumé is critical because he checks refer-

ences. He employs 10-15 people and will refer them to other business interests if they have potential.

Keith Later employs 10-15 people, and teaches them on the job. He prefers Grade 12 education but will accept a lower level if other factors are right. He wants a person with a valid driver's license, who is honest, work-orientated, follows safety rules, learns quickly, and is reliable. Appearance and attitude are important in the first contact. He checks references.

Blair Noel stated PWP employs 15-24 employees. First impressions are the key. He said one fellow stayed in the car and had his wife drop his resumé on the counter. That told him something negative about the fellow.

Noel likes to see a typed resumé one page long and honest. He checks references.

PWP looks for a self-confident person interested in the business, good communication skills and good math skills. When hired, the employee has a 30-day probation period. To keep the job, the employee will have to show up every working day and on time, ready and willing to work, willing to learn, good

safety and work habits. Advancement is possible, Noel said, but an employee must be patient.

Rob Marshall from Weyerhaeuser said attitude is everything. He wants to see people interested in the work, willing to learn, able to work well with others, and who don't have to be told every minute of the day what to do. Grade 12 is required. He encouraged people in the audience to be serious about the job, do some homework on the company, practice interview skills, be honest and sincere and show you have a desire to work. He said advancement is possible, but employees must be patient.

All of the employers said they prefer short resúmes, and give out application forms when they are interested in hiring.

One of the interesting statements all of them agreed on was that volunteer work in the community should be on the resumé. All respect volunteer workers because it shows the person's values and commitment.

Council awards contracts

Aardvark Paint Marking Services of Kelowna was awarded a \$7,464.78 contract to paint lines in the Town of Princeton. Town Council made the decision on May 20 at the regular meeting.

Premium Canada of Kamloops was awarded a dust control contract for unpaved roadways in Princeton. Town clerk Cornie Froese said an average of \$3,000 is spent on dust control.

Flood potential is low

Oldtimers in the Princeton area have been expressing concerns about cool spring temperatures and low river levels. Their concern stems from past experience when a long, cool spring was capped with a spike in temperature and all of the snow melted at once.

Reports on snowpack levels and temperatures for the Similkameen watershed indicate normal run-off levels this year. The potential for

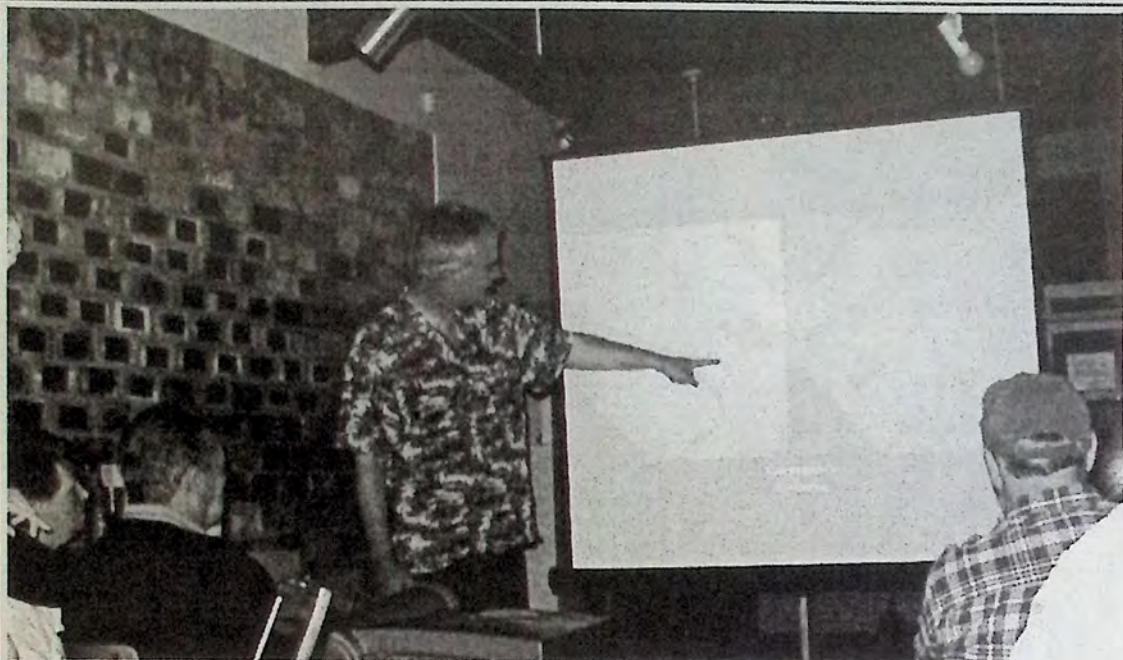
flooding is low. The snowpack level is average, and the weather forecast indicates a gradual increase in daily high temperatures.

This report does not mean there will be no flooding. Everything depends on temperature. Similkameen Valley residents living near water should watch the level. Any sudden increase is indicative of possible problems in basements or in low-lying fields.

Bugs tell a story about our past

Bruce Archibald, a graduate student of Simon Fraser University, is studying fossilized insects of the BC Interior. In the area known as the Okanagan Highlands, stretching from Republic, Washington to Smithers, B.C., Archibald has gathered fossils. He emphasizes the importance of the Princeton fossils.

On Monday, May 19, Archibald gave a lecture at Princeton Museum. He showed slides of the

fossils, and described the relationship between the insects and the plants of 48-50 million years ago.

The Okanagan Highlands are the result of land lifting and cracking millions of years ago. Lakes formed in the cracked areas and sediment gathered in the lakes, often trapping leaves, twigs, insects and fish. These became today's fossils. There was a lot of volcanic activity in those days, and Archibald has gathered volcanic ash samples to assist in dating the fossils.

Archibald looks at the mix of insects and plants in the fossils and notes the climate appeared to be more moderate then than now. Some of the insect fossils resemble tropical insects and others are like the insects found further north. There are lots of palm tree fossils here, indicating a warmer climate, with fewer extremes in temperature between seasons. Forests grew clear up to the Arctic. Due to the warmth and moderation of temperatures, the climate was more like the regulated environment of a greenhouse.

What is a Rebekah?

The Rebekah Lodge was founded by Shyler Colfax 151 years ago as a sister lodge of the Oddfellows. The Oddfellows had been formed by Thomas Wildey 184 years ago in the United States with the purpose of members helping one another in difficult times. The Rebekah Lodge was formed so that husbands and wives could accompany each other to celebrations.

These lodges became popular and spread into Canada. Their aim is to elevate the character of man - no drinking, no smoking and no swearing during meetings.

The species of insects in the fossils can be compared to insect fossils of other areas of the world. Some were like insects found in southeast Asia and Polynesia, others like fossils found in the area of Vladivostok in Siberia, and another species like fossils found in Denmark.

Archibald has found many species of scorpion flies and lacewings, and a new genus of fly he calls Holcorpa. This latter group is found in B.C. and Colorado.

Archibald will continue to collect fossils locally and will do more research on insect fossils. When he first began to gather fossils, he became so fascinated he decided to return to university and study paleontology. He found there was little information about insects, and determined to make that his field of specialization.

If anyone has insect fossils in their possession, contact Rosemary Doughty at the museum and make arrangements to have Archibald look at the find. We may learn more about the paleontology of our area.

UNDERSTANDING RISK

Risk is one of those four-letter words that people try to avoid, particularly when it comes to investing their hard-earned dollars. Because although risk does not necessarily mean that you're going to lose all your money, it's this image that often springs to mind when the subject is first broached.

Having said that, it's impossible to completely eliminate risk since all investments carry some degree of it. The key to being a successful investor is to determine the level of risk that you are prepared to tolerate, and then invest accordingly. But before doing this, you need to understand risk and the various forms in which it can appear.

Broadly speaking, risk is the possibility that the expected return on your investment may not be fully realized. This includes the possibility that you may lose some principal. However, there are in fact five categories of risk you need to consider when assessing an investment:

- **Inflation Risk:** The danger that rising prices will reduce the purchasing power and real rate of return on your investment over time.
- **Interest Rate Risk:** The possibility that a rise in interest rates may dictate a drop in the value of your investments. For example, rising rates can make dividend yields on current investments less attractive.
- **Economic Risk:** The danger that a downturn in the economy, or other significant economic event, will depress the value of your investments by reducing earnings capabilities.
- **Market Risk:** The possibility that events in the market itself may have an adverse effect on the value of your investments.

Specific Risk: Relates more directly to the individual investment itself. It covers such elements as new technology making a certain firm's products obsolete, or greater competition reducing earning capabilities.

With a greater understanding of the various forms of risk, you'll be in a better position to find ways to help reduce risk.

Council saves Canada Day celebration

Village Council has stepped in to keep a local celebration alive, following the cancellation of Canada Day celebrations by Similkameen Country.

The cancellation had been the result of financial limitations.

Village CAO Bob Lafleur says the decision to take action was

obvious.

"We decided Canada Day was an important celebration and that it should go on."

The event used to cost Similkameen Country around \$2,500, with the majority of the expense to insurance coverage.

Lafleur says council has not

taken over the event, but has hired a coordinator to facilitate with local non-profit organizations to share responsibilities for Canada Day celebrations.

This would mean different elements of the celebration would be planned by different groups with funding to come for corporate sponsorships and fundraising activities.

"We're going to try to make it a fun day, mostly for kids, and try to get everyone involved," Lafleur points out.

Council has already committed \$500 to the celebration and has encouraged the introduction of newer, fun events to take place as part of the annual event.

Lafleur says the concept is to keep it a fun day with a fresh approach by adding activities such as a rubber duck race in the Similkameen River and a pancake breakfast in Memorial Park.

Come to Cenotaph Park to join the Canada Day celebration and enjoy a barbecue, cake and games for the whole family. Sing Happy Birthday to Canada.



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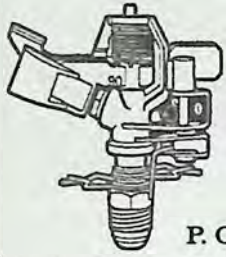
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Interior Health puts the bite on West Nile

Interior Health has hired three surveillance officers, one each for Thompson Cariboo Shuswap, Kootenays and Okanagan to monitor dead crows for West Nile Virus in the southern Interior of British Columbia. Although no West Nile has been detected yet, this surveillance team is working to collect dead crows across Interior Health area. Each team member carries a cell phone which has a toll free number. If anyone finds a dead crows, or has questions and concerns about West Nile, they can call 1-866-300-0520.

The surveillance team is part of Interior Health's West Nile Virus detection and prevention strategy called "Put the Bite on West Nile Virus". The campaign is part of a bigger program spearheaded by the BC Centre for Disease Control.

West Nile Virus can cause mild to severe illness, which can result in permanent disability or death in rare cases. The disease is passed between birds by mosquitoes. Humans can be infected when mosquitoes that are carrying the virus bite them. Fortunately, in most cases, there are no symptoms.

To address the issue of West Nile, and its expected arrival in BC this year, Interior Health is embarking on a four-part strategy - surveillance, review of local mosquito control programs; advocating habitat control and personal protection and communicating risks and test results to the public and health professionals.

Surveillance includes sending dead "crow family" (crows, ravens, magpies and jays) specimens to the Animal Health Centre in Abbotsford to see if West Nile Virus is present. It also includes

trapping and submitting mosquitoes to determine their species and whether they are carrying the virus.

There are a number of things the public can do to reduce the risk of mosquito exposure:

- * eliminate standing water on property by draining or filling in depressions in the ground and emptying containers of water (including tires, saucers under flower pots, wheelbarrows, eaves and pool covers)
- * change bird baths twice weekly

and add fish or aerators to ornamental ponds

- * put screens on doors and windows
- * stay indoors during the dusk and dawn and staying out of marshy or forested areas in the day
- * wear light-coloured, tightly woven, loose fitting clothes with long sleeves and pants
- * wear insect repellent containing DEET (30 percent for adults, 10 percent for children and not on infants)

Living Past 100

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Amino acids are protein substances used to create all life. They are found in many different foods, but mainly in meat, fish, eggs and seeds (including peas, beans, lentils, nuts and grains).

L-Alanine aids in the metabolism of glucose, a simple carbohydrate the body uses as an energy source.

L-Arginine will retard the growth of cancers and tumors. It detoxifies the liver and helps the release of growth hormones. It is important to maintaining a healthy immune system, increases sperm count, and helps with kidney disorders and forming scar tissue on wounds. This amino acid is required by the body for synthesizing protein and for growth. When L-Arginine is present in adequate amounts, it increases muscle mass and reduces body fat. L-Arginine supplements should not be taken by women who are pregnant or lactating. L-Arginine is present in chicken, turkey and milk products.

L-Asparagine maintains balance in the central nervous system.

L-Aspartic acid increases stamina and prevents fatigue. It improves cell function and the formation of healthy RNA/DNA. Chronic fatigue is one of the symptoms of lack of L-aspartic acid.

L-Carnitine prevents build-up of fatty tissues, thereby assisting in weight loss and decreases the risk of heart and circulation diseases. Carnitine can be manufactured in the body if there is enough Vitamin B, lysine and iron present. This amino acid enhances the effects of Vitamins E and C. Vegetarians may suffer deficiency of this amino acid. Research at the Pittsburgh School of Medicine showed L-Carnitine slows the progress of Alzheimer's disease. The foods listed above, plus clams and mussels, can provide good sources of this amino acid.

Do not take any amino acids as supplements until you have consulted a medical professional.

Council reacts to Tourist Information Centre closure on long weekend

Councillor Kathy Clement told Council at the May 20 meeting that tourists and local residents were upset that the Tourist Information Centre was closed on the long weekend.

She said the RCMP were annoyed at tourists going to their office trying to find information about the local area and asking when the Tourist Information Centre would open.

"It must be open weekends and something must be done to keep it open," Councillor Clement stated.

She recognized that Chamber manager Lori Thomas is entitled to days off, but a solution must be found to keep the Tourist Information Centre open when tourists are travelling, and weekends are the most important times.

"I want to see a committee struck to find a way to keep it open," Councillor Clement stated.

ed. Councillor Clement said volunteers may be needed.

"The whole community has to be involved," she told Council. Mayor Keith Olsen noted there was a lot of traffic going to and from the closed Tourist Information Centre.

Cst. Kate Anderson said many who left the closed Centre went to the RCMP station for information.

"It was very embarrassing," Councillor Clement said.

No committee was struck during the meeting.

Town taxpayers provide a large grant to the Chamber of Commerce each year. The major reason for the grant is keeping a Tourist Information Centre open to draw business into the community.

Council noted the lack of directional signage for the turn-off to the Centre and said this must be corrected as soon as possible.

As a community we promise to prepare learners for a socially responsible life in a free and democratic society, to participate in a world which each generation will shape and build. We promise a public education system which provides learners with knowledge and wisdom, protects and nurtures their natural joy of learning, encourages them to become persons of character, strength and integrity, infuses them with hope and with

spirit, and guides them to resolute and thoughtful action.

Everyone has a right to a free, quality public education. Each First Nation has the right to be recognized and respected by those within the educational institutions located in their traditional territory.

We promise:
 To recognize that the learner is at the centre of public education.
 To offer learners a broad-based education which includes aesthetic, artistic, cultural, emotional, social, intellectual, academic, physical and vocational development in order that they can find and follow their hopes, dreams and passions.
 To nurture and value critical thinking so that learners are equipped to be reflective and analytical global citizens.
 To respect, encourage and foster the learner's role as a full participant, together with others in the educational community, in developing their own goals, learning activities and curricula.
 To create an environment in which each learner can reach their greatest potential, each learning style is affirmed, and the achievements of each learner are

measured and assessed accordingly.

To provide a safe and respectful environment for life-long learning which celebrates diversity, embraces the physical, spiritual, emotional and intellectual integrity of each individual, recognizes and acknowledges differences and prevents discrimination in all of its forms.

We expect:
 Government to be responsible for fully funding all aspects of a quality education.

The public education system to guarantee each First Nations learner the right to an education respectful of their history, language and culture.

Learners, parents, early childhood educators, teachers, support staff, administrators, school boards, post-secondary educators, the Government of British Columbia and communities to work in partnership to meet the needs of all learners.

Strong local democratic governance within the provincial education system.

Equitable access for communities to programs, resources, experiences and opportunities for learners, regardless of geographic location or socio-economic status.

German cyclists enjoy local trail

German tourists enjoyed their tour of the Trans Canada Trail in the Princeton area last week. Their tour, called Jubilee Bicycle Adventure Tour, took them from Jellicoe Station Inn, to Princeton Castle Resort, and on to Tulameen Retreat. This was the 25th group of German-speaking Europeans to experience a tour through B.C.'s wilderness. The group was hosted by West Canada Bike Tours and tour guide Klaus Gattner.

The tour began on May 5 at Castlegar. Bicyclists followed the abandoned Nakusp and Slocan, Columbia and Western and Kettle Valley Railway lines. After biking 750 km., the tour ended in Hope. More than 220 German-speaking cyclists have taken the tour with Gattner, who is a German immigrant. He markets his tours in the media in Germany, and has taken several German journalists on his tour, which resulted in great photo stories in big outdoor mag-

azines and newspapers in Europe, and a film documentary of the tour on the Bavarian Broadcasting Station.

USIB wins bid on forestry campsites

After volunteering to maintain the forestry campsites on Old Hedley Road last year, this year the Upper Similkameen Indian Band (USIB) is collecting fee. Cascade Forest District advertised the call to tender in the February 25, 2003 issue of the News Leader. USIB was the successful

bidder and began collecting camping fees this month.

The fees are standard for British Columbia's forestry campsites - \$10 per day regular, \$5 per day for seniors. The fees go into maintenance of the campsites. Both campsites were well-used during the long weekend this month.

Government gives grants for stewardship

The Ministry of Water, Land and Air Protection has delivered \$382,600 to Okanagan organizations to work on environmental stewardship. Some of the projects receiving major funding include:

- * OUC research in South Okanagan
- * Nature Trust for weed management
- * Land Conservancy for SOSCP activities
- * Okanagan Region Wildlife Heritage Fund ecosystem mapping.

The Okanagan Nation Alliance (ONA) secured funding to begin watershed planning for Okanagan Basin. ONA will work closely with provincial and federal agencies. They will also work with interested parties to

identify scientific, historic and indigenous knowledge that will help determine restoration priorities.

This is an important step toward the ONA fisheries goal to restore the Okanagan and its fishery for the Okanagan people. It will also benefit Okanagan residents as a whole.

Keeping open communication with major planning processes in the rest of the Columbia Basin will ensure that restoration planning in both portions of the watershed are complimentary.

Al Qaeda fights for purity

Three weddings and a funeral: BC

Dear Editor;

The provincial government has embarked on a massive redesign of BC's electricity system. Throughout this process of radical restructuring it has repeatedly downplayed the extent of the changes and continues its mantra that BC Hydro will remain in the public sector. This is literally true, but it is a carefully crafted message. In truth, the government's new energy plan will result in "three weddings and a funeral" for BC Hydro, and by the time the ceremonies are over, the utility that has served the BC public so well will be left a shell of its former self.

The funeral is obvious: it refers to the demise of the critical role BC Hydro has played in this province. The restructured electricity system puts the future of electricity in BC in the hands of the private sector, thereby putting at risk all the public advantages that derive from the collective ownership of electricity resources. These advantages are considerable: BC has among the lowest electricity rates in North America; it is a very clean source of energy because it is hydro-based; and it is an extraordinarily reliable system because meeting future electricity needs has been the planned responsibility of BC Hydro.

The weddings refer to three extraordinary events that take crucial components of the electricity system away from BC Hydro. Unlike modern, healthy marriages between equals, these marriages are bad bargains where one partner loses most of what it brings into the marriage and its identity is wiped out. For BC Hydro - and the public which owns the very sizeable electricity assets in BC - these liaisons offer an extremely costly and unstable future.

Marriage #1 - A private Bermuda-based company, Accenture, took over all the major

services activities of BC Hydro on April 1, 2003. These involve customer services, financial services, human resources, information technology and procurement services. Because Accenture is private, the details of transactions are not public, and at no point was a business case made to the public regarding a need for this change.

Marriage #2 - The transmission system (the large system of wires taking electricity from the dams to distribution systems) will be severed from BC Hydro as the first step in turning it over to Regional Transmission Organization West

(RTO West), an American Company. RTO West can then dictate transmission prices.

Marriage #3 - Private power producers will plan new electrical generation facilities and plan future power supply needs. BC Hydro will not be able to initiate new investments in new gas, hydro, wind or solar facilities.

What remains of BC Hydro will be in the public sector but the corporation itself will be near lifeless. The business of electricity in BC is being rapidly privatized, with a shift in focus away from meeting the needs of the people of BC.

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Mining in B.C. shrank in 2003 - again!

Dear Editor:

The mining industry wants to thank PriceWaterhouseCoopers for their efforts again this year in pulling together all of this material. Without their fine work, and without their insight and analysis, it would be difficult indeed to track the year-over-year performance of our industry.

It is on that point – the year-over-year performance of our industry – that I want to begin my remarks.

The cold reality of this report is that our industry in B.C. continues to shrink.

- * There are fewer people working in our industry
- * capital expenditures are down
- * both gross and net revenues are down
- * we shipped less product last year compared to 2001
- * cash flow has declined
- * and there are fewer operating mines left in B.C. and no new mines opened last year – in fact, no new mines have opened in B.C. since 1998.

Despite these worrying trends, mining remains a \$4 billion industry and a significant component of the BC economy.

Our net income increased last year, a tribute to the efficiency of B.C. operators, and we made total payments to government of \$333 million in 2002 and the industry continues to pay the highest salaries and benefits of any industry, increasing payments to employees where they now stand at an average of \$89,000 per year.

Our decline is not dramatic – and that's an important point to keep in mind – it is gradual. But it is constant

and that's what's troubling.

The gradual constant decline is symptomatic of the policies brought in over the 10-year reign of the previous government. British Columbians are continuing to pay the costs associated with those policies. The decline in mining must be stopped. The good news is that it can be stopped, and today's report suggests we are on the road to doing so.

Mineral exploration expenditures, an important component of the overall mining industry, are strengthening. Increased exploration spending will undoubtedly lead to new mineral discoveries and ultimately the building of new mines to replace those that have closed, or will close in the years ahead.

What the report doesn't tell you is the total industry-wide exploration spending forecast for this current year. Current provincial government estimates, which include money spent by junior mining companies as well as the majors, suggest we could see \$60-\$80 million spent on the search for mineral deposits this year 2003. If that does indeed happen this will be a significant increase from \$40 million spent in 2002 and \$30 million spent in 2001.

This is still way short of the \$150-\$200 million per year exploration spending we need to sustain the mining industry in B.C. For example, during the decade of the 80's we averaged over \$200 million in annual spending in today's dollars.

How do we get back to those levels? With responsible, competitive mining regulation and land use policies.

The current government deserves much of the credit for the increase in exploration spending. Investors are showing early signs of confidence in

B.C. because the government has set provincial economic recovery as a priority – they have delivered on progressive tax changes, introduced a new energy policy which reflects the future energy potential energy potential of coal; greatly improved fiscal management and accountability at WCB; shown determination in cutting red tape, and have promised to restore balance and common sense to critical land use policies. The next test for B.C. in advancing the turnaround and recovery of mining will be what happens when a mineral discovery is made. Will construction of a mine be allowed to proceed? If so, how long will it take to get government approvals needed to permit, construct and operate the mine?

We are optimistic that this government, working with industry, will continue to make B.C. more competitive, which will increase mining investment in B.C.
