Drug crackdown!

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Court holds one in jail

Princeton Town Council has stated its top policing priority this year is a crackdown on drug dealers, the same as it was last year. The new local Officer in Charge, Sgt. Kurt Lozinski, and his staff, are taking Council seriously.

On May 28, Princeton RCMP executed a search warrant on a residence on Luard Avenue in Princeton. Two men were arrested following the discovery of cocaine and marijuana in their possession. William Macey MacDonald of Princeton and Cordell Moore of Christina Lake appeared in Penticton Provincial Court to deal with charges of possession of a controlled substance for the purpose of trafficking. MacDonald has been remanded in custody to appear on Monday, June 2. Moore was released with a condition to reside at his permanent address in Christina Lake.

Also on Thursday, Princeton RCMP executed another search warrant authorizing entry into an apartment on Bridge Street in Princeton. A quantity of cocaine and marijuana was seized during the search. A 32 year old male was arrested and faces charges of possession for the purpose of trafficking. He will appear in court on August 14, 2003.

On Friday, May 30, RCMP executed a warrant at a residence on Westridge Drive in Princeton. Inside police located a marijuana grow operation containing 280 mature plants. Police believe the operation was going on since last fall. Nobody was in the residence but police have the names of several suspects.

School sales will be taxed

Hot dog sales, funds raised for student activities, and any other money raised by students and school projects, will be taxed beginning now.

At the May 28 meeting of the Board of School Trustees, Secretary Treasurer Bruce Tisdale told the board he has received the guidelines for General Acceptable Accounting Principles (GAAP), which is really the guidelines for the payment of the Goods and Services Tax (GST) on every nickel flowing into schools from sources other than government.

However, Prince George School District has appealed a number of GST charges, and has won some appeals on certain items. The BC School Trustees Association is waiting for the entire appeals process to be completed before making up a checklist for schools to follow regarding sales.

For example, it appears now that volunteers donating goods such as in the Family Fair may be exempt from GST, but bringing in tee shirts to sell for a profit may require collecting GST and reimbursing the government.

In any case, the GST constitutes another accounting burden for schools and school districts.


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Petrobank employees provided detailed information, answered questions and gave out baseball caps to interested members of the public during last week's open house.

Petrobank hosts sneak preview

Petrobank Energy and Resources Ltd., an Alberta company doing exploration for coal beds in the Princeton area, hosted a public information open house on May 27 at the Legion Hall. Petrobank employees were on hand to explain the work done last year and their plans for the coming year.

Seismic testing and drilling last year revealed coal seams alternating with sedimentary layers down to several hundred metres. Test drilling and laboratory analysis of cores removed last year indicated an average coal thickness of 137 feet (approximately five to 10 times greater than the average coal thickness in Alberta's gas-bearing coal seams) This year they plan to spend approximately four million dollars in more seismic testing and more drill holes to ascertain whether or not coalbed methane extraction in the Princeton area is feasible. In a pilot project this summer, the company plans to drill five gas-

producing wells with pilot-scale operations commencing this fall.

Petrobank rates the coalbed reservoir as "high quality" with the added benefit of fresh water to be extracted. The water is both drinkable and warm, giving it the potential for other uses. In some extraction programs, water from the test holes is of poor quality, meaning an added expense to the company of disposal of unpotable water.

If this year's project proves the

feasibility of the larger project, Petrobank plans to launch a commercial -scale drilling program next spring. Gas from the operation would be piped into the existing gas transmission pipes running through the Princeton area.

Planners meeting the public in Princeton stated they intend to use as much local labour, equipment and services as possible. Only specialized equipment and operators will be hired from outside the area.

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These arrests followed the arrests of two males and two females the previous week.

On Saturday, while conducting a road check on Highway 3 in Princeton, police checked a rental vehicle from Alberta. When questioned, the occupants produced a small amount of marihuana and more than \$1,000 cash on the driver's person and more than \$6,000 in his personal belongings. He could not provide a reasonable explanation of where the money came from and \$7340 was seized under Proceeds of Crime Act. The matter is still under investigation.

In total, during an eight-day period, Princeton RCMP arrested seven males and two females, and charged seven with drug trafficking, and two with production of a controlled substance.

The RCMP have seized 282 marihuana plants, growing equipment, 51 grams of cocaine, six marihuana joints, 59 grams of marihuana and associated trafficking items.

At one residence in Princeton, the electrical power was shut off due to the "unsafe" modification of the electrical system.

More arrests may be forthcoming, say Princeton RCMP, as they have further information about additional subjects involved in the marihuana grow operation.

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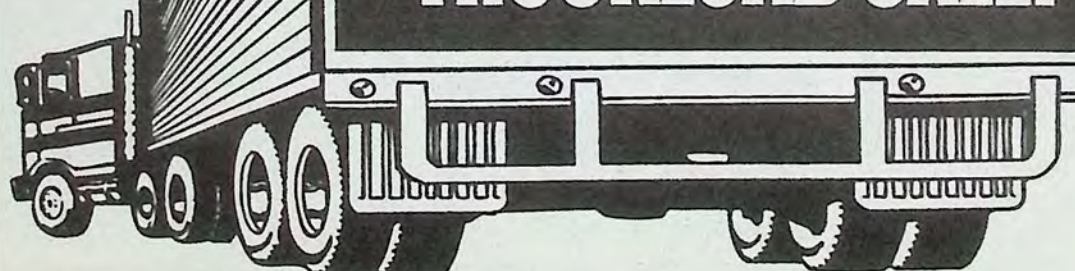
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Projections for the future cost of a post-secondary education indicate that a university education is forecast to cost \$96,000 20 years from now. Fortunately, there are ways to begin saving for that goal now.

Many Canadians open registered education savings plans (RESPs), for their children or relatives. An RESP allows you to put away up to \$4,000 a year toward a child's post-secondary education. Contributions can be made until the child turns 21 for family plans, and until the end of the 22nd year of existence for individual plans. Although contributions are not tax deductible, the contributions grow tax-sheltered. The money becomes taxable as it is withdrawn by the beneficiary, but since many students have limited income this is not likely to be significant.

The federal government offers an incentive, known as the Canada Education Savings Grant (CESG). The grant equals 20% of the first \$2,000 contributed annually, with the funding capped at \$400 a year. If you don't receive the full grant amount in a given year, it can be carried forward to future years. If the beneficiary was born in 1998 or later years you can earn grants for those years even if the RESP was not established yet. You must open an RESP and contribute in order to collect any grant for these years.

The restrictions placed on RESPs prompt some people to save for a child's education using an in-trust account instead. With an in-trust account, funds are vested for the child as soon as they are deposited. While the income and dividends from in-trust accounts are taxed in the hands of the donor, capital gains may be taxed in the hands of the child. The contributed education savings could be frittered away by the recipient on less important items.

Some investors use a mix of an RESP and an in-trust account to save for their children's future plans. The child has the growth and grants of the RESP, with other money set aside in the in-trust account should a post-secondary education not be an option.

Local residents should pray for a great rodeo weekend next year.

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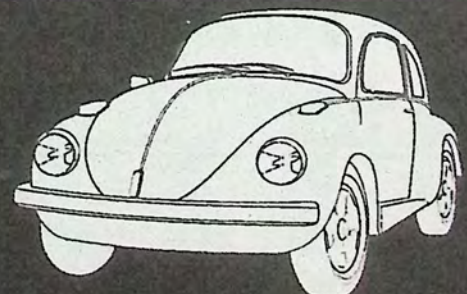
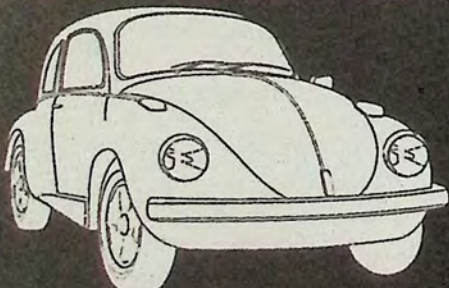
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Arthritis supplementation needs patience!

Osteoarthritis (OA) is the most common form of arthritis. It is often referred to as the "wear and tear" arthritis. OA is a progressive disorder which significantly affects one in 10 people in Canada. It is characterized by the degeneration cartilage that lines the weight bearing joints of the body, commonly involving the knee, hip, feet, hands and spine. There are a number of treatment options, including spinal manipulative therapy, nutritional recommendations, medications, lifestyle modifications and sup-

plementation. Today I will focus on a common supplement called glucosamine.

If you've taken a geology course, you know that changes to the earth, such as the formation of mountains, take a very long time. Likewise, our bodies, while not as slow, sometimes take a considerable amount of time to regenerate certain tissues. Glucosamine, a dietary supplement, may help relieve arthritis symptoms and regenerate cartilage; this supplement appears to do its work gradually, however.

Knee osteoarthritis, caused by joint degeneration or "wear and tear" of cartilage, occurs primarily in people who have suffered severe cartilage injury; obesity and aging also add to degeneration. In this study, 50 volunteers with regular knee pain (most likely from damage or osteoarthritis) were divided into two groups to take either 2,000 milligrams per day of glucosamine or a daily placebo. Over 12 weeks, four clinical testing sessions recorded changes in knee pain and function.

On self-report evaluations over the 12-week period, 88 percent of those taking glucosamine reported some degree of pain improvement in their knees, compared with only 17 percent of those taking a placebo. Both groups had improved scores over time, indicating that even the placebo pills had some positive effect, yet quality of life scores were also significantly higher for the glucosamine group than those taking a placebo.

Glucosamine was slow action, though. At the dosage of glucosamine taken in this study, most improvements did not appear until after eight weeks of supplementation. The message here is to be patient if you're trying out glucosamine - it might not work at first, but eventually may come around. The authors of this study in the *British Journal of Sports Medicine* note that this may be the first study to evaluate the effects of glucosamine vs. placebo beyond eight weeks, so over time, supplementation may prove even more effective. Further research is required. I will be re-addressing this issue in the future as new research appears.

In closing, osteoarthritis is a significant health concern for most people at some point in their lives. It is important to consult with a health care practitioner, such as a chiropractic or medical physician, to fully explore your condition and treatment options.

Supplementation is only one treatment choice - lifestyle, diet, chiropractic and medications are other choices. Some or all may be appropriate for you, so consult a health care professional before taking any supplementation. Future articles will explore these treatment options in more depth.

Living Past 100

Stay wet all summer

Stay wet all summer? What kind of silly advice is this? How would that help anybody live longer?

Dehydration kills, and it kills most often in summer. One of the reasons dehydration is a summer problem is due to our being outdoors in the heat enjoying some kind of activity. We need to be especially conscious of the dehydration potential of sports in summer.

Perhaps you never think about what happens to your body as you sweat. If you recognize the symptoms, you may see you have suffered from mild dehydration at some time. Any level of dehydration is serious, because your body loses not only water but minerals when you sweat.

Mild symptoms of dehydration include dry lips and mouth, flushed skin, fatigue, irritability, headache and dark urine.

As dehydration progresses, you may experience cramps, stiff joints and sunken eyes as well.

Severe dehydration results in blue lips, blotchy skin, confusion, cold hands and feet, increased breathing rate, faintness, and inability to urinate. It is unlikely you will go to the severe stage, but you should be aware of any dehydration.

Drink a little bit, often. Thirst is the first sign of dehydration. Carry water or a sports beverage such as POWERADE TXL (contains potassium and sodium). The body needs salt (sodium). Be sure you drink before, after and during exercise and sports activity (or chasing after the kids).

Parents need to be aware of possible dehydration in their children and any other children who may be visiting during the hot weather. If children look flushed, or appear suddenly tired, they may be suffering from dehydration. Children will need more drinks more frequently than adults. The three students who came to Princeton gave lessons in science which involved the students in the activity. For example, a lesson in

genetics had students putting beads (genes) on pipe cleaners (chromosomes) to show how genes are transferred from parent to child. They teach subject matter related to biology, chemistry, physics and animal adaptation. Their speciality is making it fun and games.

School district plans building improvements during summer

The school district likes to do improvement projects at local schools during the summer recess. This year, a number of minor capital expenditures will be made to improve Princeton schools.

Princeton Secondary will have a roof replacement. The school is 22 years old, and the \$400,000 project will save problems in the future.

Some countertops will be replaced at this school, there will be some painting and a carpet will be replaced.

At Vermilion Forks Elementary, there will be a roof repair on the 32 year old building, one set of entrance doors will be replaced and two carpets will be replaced.

Riverside Intermediate

School will have one carpet replaces and some painting and door replacement.

John Allison Elementary will have repairs done to walls and windows where painting is required and a fresh coat of

paint will follow. Boot and coat racks will be painted, and some carpets will be replaced. New entrances are planned.

Various schools will have lighting upgrades, which are already in progress.

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Asset Development

Kids should be taught to say NO! Restraint: a key asset

Sex, alcohol, and illicit drugs are topics many adults would prefer to avoid, but an important foundation for their healthy development is shaping our kid's perspectives on these issues. Not only do their values influence their behaviour, but these same values can have a lot of influence on the many choices they make.

The Search Institute of Minneapolis research has found that valuing restraint is an important asset for reducing involvement in many different risky behaviours. In fact, researchers found that ninth and twelfth graders who abstain from sexual

intercourse while they are teenagers are less likely to

- * frequently use alcohol
- * use drugs like marihuana
- * chew tobacco or smoke cigarettes
- * fight, get into trouble with the police, use a weapon, or steal
- * feel depressed and consider suicide
- * drive a car after drinking or ride with someone who has been drinking.

How do you encourage young people to value abstaining from sex, alcohol and other drugs? - by keeping them informed and being open to their questions.

Many teenagers who abstained from negative behaviour did so

because they expected negative consequences to happen, such as becoming pregnant, hurting their reputation, or thought it was unhealthy for their ages. These teenagers are far from social misfits. Many are considered attractive, are socially successful, and date regularly.

Three ways to improve communication about sexuality and drug use with your child:

1. Together choose a book on sexuality, alcohol or drugs, read it separately, then discuss it together later.
2. Be clear about boundaries, your values and your reasons. Most young people are relieved to hear their parents say, "We expect you not to have sex or drink as a teenager," then explain why.
3. Look for opportunities in the media to bring up these difficult topics that don't directly involve your child or child's friends. Discuss your reaction and ask for your child's opinion.

Remember, young people are more likely to grow up healthy when they believe it is important not to be sexually active or to use alcohol or other drugs.

Will insurance costs kill community building?

The recent experience of the Fall Fair Association with obtaining insurance coverage for their motorsports event should make all of us stop and wonder what it means to our community.

When a non-profit group such as the Fall Fair Association undertakes the work and risk of a major event, they are helping to build our community and its assets. For example, members of Fall Fair Association, Princeton Exhibition Association, Vermilion 4-Wheelers and Princeton Rodeo Club put in countless hours of volunteer labour and volunteered equipment or skills at their own expense to build up the fairgrounds, a community asset owned by all of us. These community groups, whether they are in Tulameen, Hedley, Keremeos, Cawston or anywhere else, build assets for their communities. In addition, they ensure a tax base by bringing people to the community. The visitors spend money in local businesses, which helps these businesses stay in business and pay their taxes.

When insurance coverage escalates to the point where these groups feel they can no longer take the risk of losing money, or where they feel their volunteer hours serve no purpose but to build the assets of insurance companies, these groups will stop doing the work required to hold events. They will stop building their communities, not because they no longer love their communities, but because they cannot afford the insurance.

Ever since the attack on the World Trade building in New York, we have heard the sob stories of insurance companies as they raised their rates. Just how long do they expect us to continue putting up with their problems? If we watch the stock market reports, we soon see the dividends from the big insurance brokerages are pretty healthy, despite 9/11. The old adage of "it's an ill wind that doesn't blow somebody some good" seems to apply here.

In the meantime, community groups need to ask themselves whether they are contributing more to their communities or are they contributing more to insurance companies? If the answer is the latter, we may see a dearth of events.

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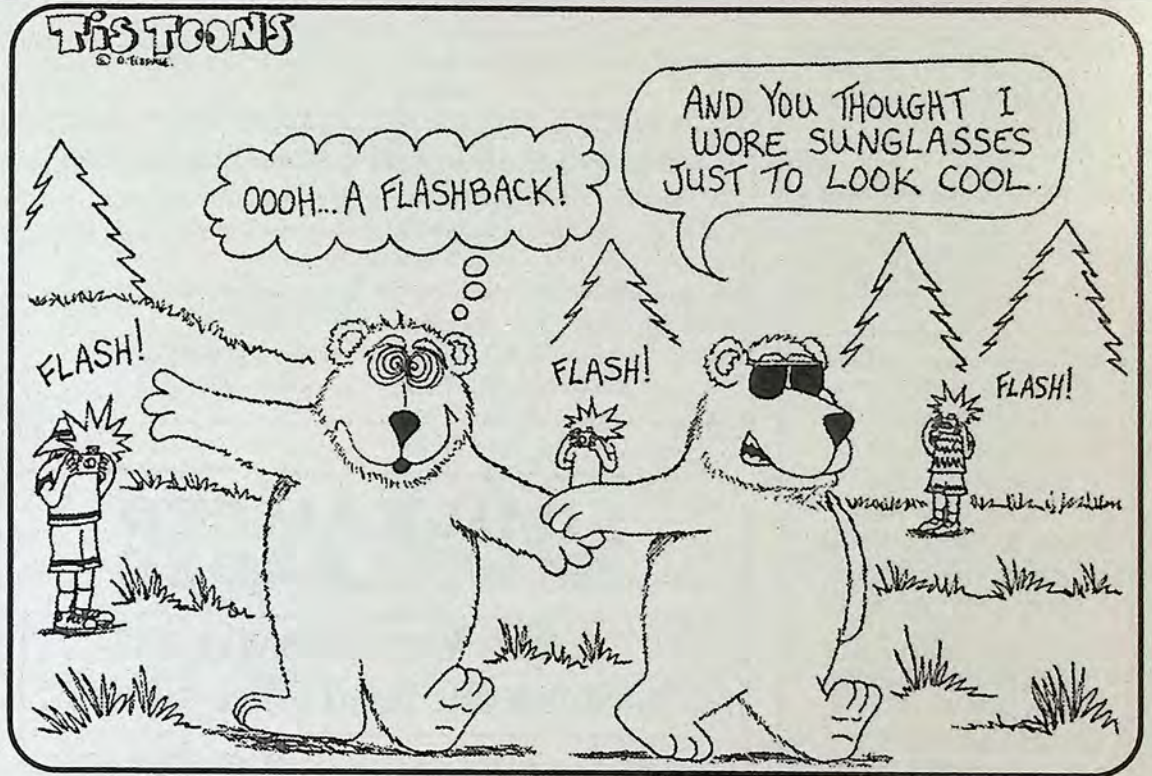

The most important lesson we can learn is this: World War II had been in progress for five years when D-Day occurred. For the first two years, the British Commonwealth and a few other countries had fought on their own, without the Americans. It was only when the Americans threw their resources behind the Commonwealth and allies that progress could be made. It was the American forces who made the difference on D-Day. Without their troops and armaments, it could not have been done. I say this with no disrespect to other allied forces.

Saddam Hussein should have learned this lesson. He should have known the Americans could have done the deed without help from anybody else.

The problem with most of these little countries is that they think they are big. They do not comprehend the size nor the resources of North America, particularly the United States. The little countries play politics as if they are equal to the U.S.A. They think they are David against Goliath.

In another respect, smaller countries tend to see the U.S.A. as a bully. The Americans do play hardball, and sometimes to the detriment of their own people,

such as in the softwood lumber dispute, but they should not be seen as bullies. They have been generous in the past, despite the fact they pay more for natural disasters in their own country than any country except China.

General Tanaka told the Japanese military establishment before Pearl Harbor, "Do not wake the sleeping tiger." It was good advice then and it is still good advice.

The Islamic countries can rant and rave about religion all they want, but once a year, on June 6, they really ought to remember D-Day and American resources.

aided by outside experts, are optimistic.
Bride of four months, and two years a local nurse, the tragedy shocked Princeton this Sunday morning.
Returning at 4 a.m. to their home just below Princeton hospital, her husband, a taxi owner, found his bride shot through the head and stabbed in the chest.
