## Cut more trees, says Forest Society

### Council hears plan

Local loggers could cut 14,477 more truckloads of timber every year in Merritt Timber Supply Area. That was the message to Council on June 2 from Rod de Boice, Rob Marshall and Hans de Visser, who represented Nicola Similkameen Innovative Forest Society.

The Society has submitted a request to the Chief Forester to cut an estimated 549,000 cubic metres of timber per year. According to research done by the society and others, managed forests grow faster and produce more timber than the "natural" stands of timber.

Despite excluding old growth reserves, and considering wildlife habitat, the study indicated the feasibility of such a request. The goal of the society has always been to increase productivity of a healthy, resilient forest, and research was spread over five years. They found a potentially higher yield of timber due to increased growth potential.

Small diameter wood has been factored into the increase as liquidation of small diameter timber is planned. These stands will be replaced with a managed forest.

The Regional Manager will make a decision in August this year.

If the increase is allowed, fifty percent will go to First Nations, who have a corporation in place to take advantage of the opportunities it offers. Large licensees, such as Weyerhaeuser and Tolko, can work cooperatively with First Nations and buy logs. The major licensees are cut back 20 per cent, and this percentage will be allocated to Small Business, BC Timber Sales, woodlots and eight percent goes to First Nations.

## Accident claims life of valley rancher

In a bizarre incident while building a road in the Bradshaw Creek area, 82 year old cattle rancher George Lawrence was killed. Lawrence, a well-known longtime rancher, owned a ranch located between Hedley and Keremeos.

Lawrence was working on expanding a trail in the hillside area when a boulder rolled off the hill above him and struck him. A family member nearby called for help immediately, but Lawrence was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident.

RCMP, Workers Compensation Board and Farm and Ranch Safety and Health Association have been investigating the incident.

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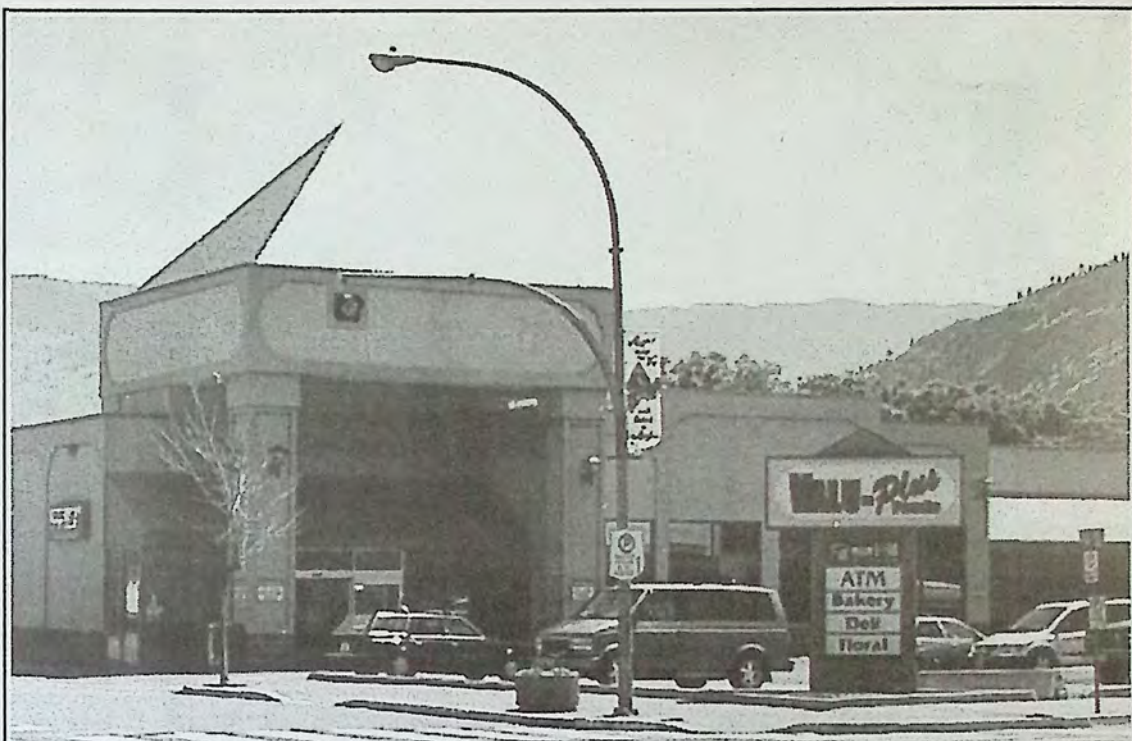
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A local landmark in downtown Keremeos changed its name this month. The former Keremeos IGA Plus grocery store is now Valu-Plus Foods. A huge change which took a year to complete.

## Grocery store breaks away from chain

Jeff Rowe has been associated with the Keremeos grocery store for over thirty years.

He had previously spent years bouncing around the province from store to store while working for a large grocery chain.

It was while managing the Overwaitea in Hope when he discovered the Super Valu in Keremeos was for sale.

Rowe had decided, by this time, he wanted to own his own store and moved his family to the Similkameen.

The Keremeos Super Valu became an IGA Plus in 1992 and the newer, present building was constructed the following Spring.

Rowe's daughter, Shannon Forner, says the family has always been part of the operation in one form or other.

This month the grocery store in the centre of town took a bold step into the future by shedding its franchise connections.

"The biggest complaint we

kept getting from customers was to lower the prices," says Forner.

Obligations as part of a franchise are sometimes very restrictive and it got to a point where Rowe said he no longer wanted to be, "married to a franchise."

The quest for independence took over a year with the overall goal of passing savings on to the consumer.

"He wanted the freedom to buy wherever he wanted," Forner explains.

The name Valu-Plus Foods pays homage to the Super Valu and IGA Plus incarnations of the store in the past.

Forner says the change means the introduction of new house brands including Harmonie, West Best, Co-Op and Co-Op Gold which bring greater selection and better pricing.

"We have customers from Princeton to Osoyoos, even from Penticton and Kaleden."

As the store is a member of the Canadian Federation of

Independent Grocers, it has won many awards based on a strict criteria including customer service and cleanliness.

Three years ago it was awarded the Diamond Award, which signified ten consecutive years of placement in the category the store is judged under.

Local non-profit organizations are also aware of the commitment Rowe has made to being a good corporate citizen. The store regularly sponsors activities throughout the community.

Staffing is another sign of how the store operates from within with many long time employees. There are also some employees who return after years in other communities.

"Keremeos is extremely lucky to have such a wonderful store," says Forner.

Valu-Plus Foods celebrates its grand opening all this week with daily giveaways, in-store demos, and the introduction of many new items.

### THE BASICS ON INTEREST - Part 1

We may not always realize it, but interest rates play an important role in our every day lives. Whether you are in the market for a car, a home, or a personal loan at the bank, interest rates can greatly affect your buying power. As an investor, you should keep a close eye on the overall trend of interest rates because these trends can have a major effect on your investments.

Major shifts in direction, be they up or down, should cause you to review present investments as well as point towards potential opportunities. Staying informed of general interest rate trends doesn't require much time. In fact, it just takes a few minutes a week. Key rates that are important to the investor are published daily in such papers as The Globe and Mail, The Financial Post, and the financial pages of The Province. Regular review of these key indicators may often give you mixed signals.

Once a consistent trend emerges however, the following guidelines can help you assess the impact on your investments and also help direct future investment decisions. The first thing to remember when assessing the impact of interest rates upon your investments is that there is an inverse relationship between interest rates and bond prices.

As interest rates go up, bond prices go down because the bond's fixed coupon is less attractive than market rates. If a bond's price has dropped below its face value because prevailing interest rates for that particular maturity are above its coupon, the bond is said to be trading at a discount. Conversely, if rates have declined below the coupon rate, the bond is trading at a premium above its stated value. If interest rates are going down and you have long-term bonds that were purchased when rates were higher, you may want to consider holding those bonds in hope of future gain. On the other hand, you may decide to sell the bond in order to reduce exposure if rates begin to climb again.

## Swimming is great exercise

The swimming pool is open, the water is warm. It is a great place for exercise for children, adults and seniors, but especially for seniors.

Most seniors have back problems, joint problems, muscle problems and a whole lot of aches and pains caused by the effects of gravity during a lifetime. The great thing about swimming is that the water holds up the swimmer and takes the pressure off those aching joints. Swimming is the kind of exercise called "low impact". Unlike running, jazzercise and a whole lot of other activities, swimming has no impact on the joints other than to relieve the stress.

Anyone afraid of slipping and falling at the pool may ask for assistance from a lifeguard (there are both male and female lifeguards on duty). Even people who cannot walk can get into the swimming pool in Princeton, with a little help from the staff.

Afraid of sinking or tiring out? Tell the lifeguard. There are flotation devices available to prevent you from sinking even if you are too tired to do more swimming.

Swimming is good for all ages, and there is no safer place to do it than in a public swimming pool where

there are lifeguards and all sorts of people and things to make it interesting.

Small children should be taught to swim. Even toddlers can learn to swim! Youngsters can develop

strong muscles and good skills, as well as learn water safety, by joining a swim club or taking lessons.

## Living Past 100

### More on amino acids

When we study the effects of amino acids in our bodies, it seems like there is an amino acid to address every problem.

Gamma-Aminobutyric Acid (GABA) can be taken to calm the body in much the same way as valium librium and other tranquilizers, and GABA will not be addictive. Combined with niacinamide and inositol, GABA prevents anxiety and stress-related messages from reaching the brain. GABA decreases nerve activity. Precisely the opposite effect comes from the amino acid called L-Glutamic acid, or glutamate. It increases nerve action. As well, it burns sugars and fats. This amino acid has been known to correct personality disorders. In addition to glucose, glutamic acid is the only compound used for brain fuel. The brain changes glutamic acid into a compound that regulates brain cell activity.

L-Glutamine, which sounds somewhat the same as L-Glutamic acid, is not the same at all. If it is combined with L-glutamic acid, it detoxifies the body of ammonia. On its own, it helps stop the craving for sugar, improves mental ability, is effective in counter-acting impotence, reduces fatigue, has a beneficial effect on epilepsy, senility, alcoholism, peptic ulcers and schizophrenia. It is essential for a healthy digestive tract. This amino acid is converted to glutamic acid in the brain.

Two other amino acids which sound much alike are L-Isoleucine and L-Leucine. L-Isoleucine is required for the formation of hemoglobin as well as regulation blood sugar and energy levels. It is metabolized in muscle tissue. A shortage of this amino acid will give symptoms similar to hypoglycemia. L-Leucine lowers elevated blood sugar levels, and it must be taken in balance with isoleucine and valine. L-Valine has a beneficial effect on muscle metabolism, tissue repair and nitrogen balance. This amino acid promotes healing of bones, skin and muscle tissue, and is recommended for those who have undergone surgery. However, it must be taken in moderation or hypoglycemia will result.

Amino acids are remarkable, and do many different jobs, but should not be taken as supplements without consulting a health care professional.

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You've likely heard about West Nile Virus, but you may not know that the risk in BC is very low. In fact, there is no evidence of the virus in any region of the province. However, we're taking preventative steps now and recommending simple precautions you can take to protect yourself and your family.

## Know The Risks

West Nile is transmitted to humans through bites by infected mosquitoes. Mosquitoes can become carriers after biting infected birds. The virus is not spread by direct person-to-person contact, nor from animal to human, and **most people bitten by an infected mosquito will not even become ill.**

About one in five people infected develop mild, flu-like symptoms lasting less than a week. Fewer than 1% develop serious health problems such as encephalitis or meningitis (inflammation of the brain or its lining).

Those few who do develop symptoms may experience headache, fever, skin rash, body aches and/or swollen lymph glands. These symptoms may develop from three to 14 days after being bitten by an infected mosquito.

Although West Nile virus can be transmitted through blood transfusions and organ transplants, the risk of contracting the virus through these procedures is considered to be very low. People scheduled to receive transfusions or transplants should discuss any concerns they may have with their doctor or surgeon.

## Steps You Can Take

### 1. Protect yourself and your family against mosquito bites

Some precautions you can take include covering up with light-coloured clothing, staying indoors at times when mosquitoes are out or using mosquito repellent (those with DEET are most effective).

When using an insect repellent, make sure the percentage of DEET does not exceed 30% for adults and 10% for children under 12 years old. Insect repellents containing DEET should not be used on children six months and younger. Closely follow the instructions on the label of all insect repellents for the appropriate precautions.

Make sure window screens have no holes or gaps. If you don't have screens, keep windows and doors closed at dusk and dawn, when mosquitoes are most active.

### 2. Prevent mosquito breeding around your home and yard

Mosquitoes only need a tablespoon of water in which to breed. To keep mosquitoes from breeding, empty all outside sources of standing water regularly (at least weekly). These include flower pot saucers, tin cans, plastic containers, tires, tarps, pool covers and trampolines. In addition:

- Change water in bird baths and pet dishes regularly and empty wading pools.
- Install a pump in ornamental ponds, stock them with fish or change water weekly.
- Unclog rain gutters and drainage ditches.
- Use fine mesh to cover rain barrels and containers that cannot be dumped.
- Keep your lawn short.

## British Columbia Is Well Prepared

British Columbia is taking a coordinated approach to West Nile Virus, and planning has been underway for its arrival since last year. SARS has further emphasized the importance of working together to successfully control disease outbreaks.

The province's strategy includes:

- Active testing of mosquitoes and dead crows for West Nile infection.
- Available West Nile testing for patients through the BC Centre for Disease Control laboratory.
- Educating the public on preventing mosquito bites and eliminating breeding areas in yards.
- Planning appropriate municipal mosquito-control measures using integrated pest management.

The investigation continues into the suspected puppy mill case at a residence located on Princeton-Summerland Road and more evidence is being gathered. Robert Busch Interior Regional Manager of SPCA, does not expect charges to be laid for another couple of weeks. If the evidence warrants charging the owners, they can be charged

with cruelty to animals. If found guilty the owner could face a jail term of six months, a fine of \$2,000, and could be prohibited from owning animals for a period of time.

At the time the animals were seized, seven of the dogs were rushed into medical attention for treatment of ear and eye infections and fractured limbs. Five of the dogs were found to be pregnant.

The dogs are not available for adoption pending a court decision on permanent custody.

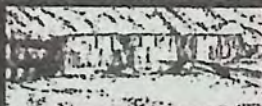

### Are you wasting BC Medical money?

Almost anyone we talk to these days knows the health care budget is stretched to the limit, and almost anyone we talk to agrees there are people in doctor's offices who are there to have their hands held and are wasting time and money.

Just how many people go to a doctor's office or to the hospital emergency room with ailments that can be treated at home? How many are going in for more pills, when prescriptions could easily be renewed without a visit?

These are valid concerns. We have heard from doctors they see too many patients who really do not need to visit a doctor. Doctors complain, because they receive little time off.

If it is happening here, it is happening elsewhere. We know we have heard many complaints from physicians about being overworked. The old joke about finding your doctor on the golf course does not seem to apply anymore. Some physicians would like to retire but know they are needed and cannot find anyone to take their place.

In the larger scheme of things, patients who waste a doctor's time, patients who do not really need to see a physician, are an expense to all of us. The extra we pay on our Medical Services Plan premiums, the extra taxes we pay to keep our health care system funded, the extra we do without because of cutbacks for the sake of health care costs, are part of the picture of today's stressed health care system. There are enough legitimate cases of illness and distress to keep medical practitioners, hospitals, and pharmacists in business. We do not need the extra costs of people going to a doctor's office or medical clinic for no good reason. We suspect some people are going because they are old and afraid of illness, or they are lonely and in need of comfort, or they are desperate for something to talk about at coffee. These people can see a counsellor or a shrink, or become involved in some kind of productive activity. Then we can all benefit by the savings.

### Federation says cutbacks endanger kids

Dear Editor;

"Government has an obligation to properly protect and provide for those most vulnerable in our society - especially children at risk and those in foster care."

With those words, Premier Campbell outlined his party's election promises to improve services for children and families in BC. It's a mighty sentiment. But the question now is, will he fulfill it?

BC's services to children and families have been in turmoil for the better part of a decade. In 1992, the tragedy of five year old Matthew Vaudreuil's death launched a wholesale review of government's role in protecting children and serving families. The review questioned everything from the government's philosophy of care to the resources available for child protection.

Government was found wanting in almost all areas. Finally, in 1995 the Gove Report recommended sweeping changes to government ministries to bring new resources and a new child-centered approach to bear on the problem of children and families in crisis.

As the successive NDP governments rebuilt services to children and families, the Liberal Opposition became an effective critic of lack of resources and delay - especially lack of resources. In the years leading up to the 2001 election, Gordon Campbell and his Liberals were relentless in demanding more funding for children and families in need in this province.

That voice in BC's legislature was critical because in the area of child protection the consequences of a

mistake are not minor. All the good intentions in the world mean nothing if you don't have the resources and the system to back you up. A mistake can mean a child dies.

There are other consequences - the kind statisticians measure over time. Poorly delivered services to children and families in crisis can mean more kids end up wards of the state. It can mean more kids in trouble with the law. It can mean fewer kids graduating from high school and higher welfare rates. But it all comes home when you read about the kid who should have survived but didn't.

The Liberal Opposition raised all these issues as they argued for more money for children and families in need. Now the Liberal Opposition is the government and Gordon Campbell is the Premier. And the question is, are they the champions for children and families they said they'd be? After a good beginning, the evidence is turning.

The Liberals promised an end to bureaucratic restructuring and then launched the largest reorganization ever. But it's one most experts and workers in the field support, because it promises to make the system more relevant to families in their communities, support kids in their families and provide protection for kids in communities when families break down.

It's a massive undertaking and government promised to maintain funding until the new system was in place and working. But now that's changed. The government has ordered cuts even though the new system isn't close to being in place, let alone working, and many

of the agencies which are supposed to deliver the services in the community are first on the chopping block. The situation is so bad outsiders have been brought in to figure out what's gone wrong.

That shouldn't be difficult. The Premier identified the problem himself when he was leader of the Opposition. You can't undertake a massive reorganization and cut services at the same time. That way lies disaster.

Reorganization is a full-time project in itself. It takes extra money and staff and at the best of time draws attention away from protecting kids and supporting families. Add budget cuts of up to 40 per cent **Continued next page .....**

A good father is the family's unsung hero

Father's Day is this Sunday. My father passed away more than 20 years ago, but each year, on Father's Day, I think of him fondly. Most of all, I remember his hands as they were when he was an old man. I would look at his hands, gnarled and rough from years of hard work, and I would think of all the things those hands had done for me.

I remember those hands holding reins of a team of work horses or the reins of a saddle horse. I remember those hands on the steering wheel of truck and tractor. Those hands wielded shovels, hammers, saws, rakes, hoes, pitchforks, paintbrushes, wrenches, and ropes. Those hands carried sacks of produce and livestock feed, buckets of mash, a lunch pail, buckets of water, and

on top of that and we'll be lucky if some services don't collapse. Down the line, kids in need or a family in crisis will pay the price.

There is a solution. The government can stick to its promises. They are good ones. They made sense during the election and they make sense now. Child welfare experts support the community-based approach. They believe it may be more cost-effective in the long run, but they also believe it will fail if cuts are made before the system is in place. That's why the Liberal Party's promise to provide the resources necessary was so important and must be kept.

After a decade of turmoil, BC's child welfare system is at a critical turning point. There's hope that it is finally turning around. There's agreement on where we should go to fulfill the Premier's pledge to protect vulnerable kids, but there's increasing concern that the promise will prove empty in the face of budget cuts.

If that's the case, we'll be back to where we started, waiting for the next Matthew Vaudreuil.

Let's keep kids safe.

They carried newborn calves, kittens, day-old chicks, babies, and often, a bouquet of wildflowers for my mother. Those hands often held a pen, and he left us a legacy of a book of poetry and his memoirs of his youth in Australia and Vancouver Island.

My father's hands did the one thing all good father's hands do - they earned a living for the family. Most children do not appreciate the effort it takes to support a family, to go to work every day, to make sure there is a job to go to by being on time and showing up ready to put in a full day's work, day after day, year after year.

I remember my father being so weary or frightened of the future we could hardly talk to him because he seemed so angry, but I know now that feeling of fear when the future of the family's survival seems in doubt.

I'm sure my experience is not much different from that of others. I never thought of my father as per-

fect. In fact, we argued a lot and often refused to speak to each other (not for long, he was a great talker). In these days of blaming parents for all sorts of things, I can say honestly I'm glad my father goaded me into doing things I did not want to do. I am sure he wanted me to be as prepared to survive as he was, and I am grateful for the discipline and determination he instilled in me.

When father's day rolls around, it is worth remembering what being a father is all about. Most fathers are really the heroes of the family. They go out to work, they work around home, they try to keep up with all of the needs of the family, from paying the mortgage, the taxes, grocery bills, clothing bills, insurance bills, telephone and power bills, heating bills, gasoline bills, and at the same time, try to provide a few luxuries, like a vacation, skateboard or movie.

A good father is a dedicated, long-time worker. For one day of the year, he deserves to have the day off just to play. Most of all, he deserves to have his day to be honoured by those he serves.

# Chutter named to task force on mining

Yale-Lillooet MLA Dave Chutter has been appointed to a Task Force on Mining by energy and Mines Minister Richard Neufeld.

The Task Force consists of 15 MLAs and is chaired by West Vancouver-Capilano MLA Ralph Sultan. The MLAs will gather information, work with the mining industry and recommend possible changes to mining laws, regulations or policies that can revitalize the mining sector. Chutter is part of the task force advisory panel that will critique findings and recommendations made by the MLA research team.

"Mining was once a much stronger

industry in our province," says Chutter. "It not only generates tax revenue that pays for public services, it also puts food on the table for families throughout the heartlands."

Chutter says tax relief and a reduction of red tape resulted in a 25 percent increase in mineral exploration last year, but more needs to be done to develop mines.

"Our government has stated loud and clear. B.C. is open for business," says Chutter. "This is a great start, but we can do more. We can

help BC compete in a global marketplace by identifying successful mining practices in the province and around the world."

Last month, Premier Gordon Campbell announced a \$2.1 million Rocks to Riches initiative that will be used to enhance mineral exploration.

"After a decade of seeing mines close it is really exciting to watch this industry rebound," says Chutter. "Revitalizing the mining industry will create high-paying jobs and help boost the provincial economy."

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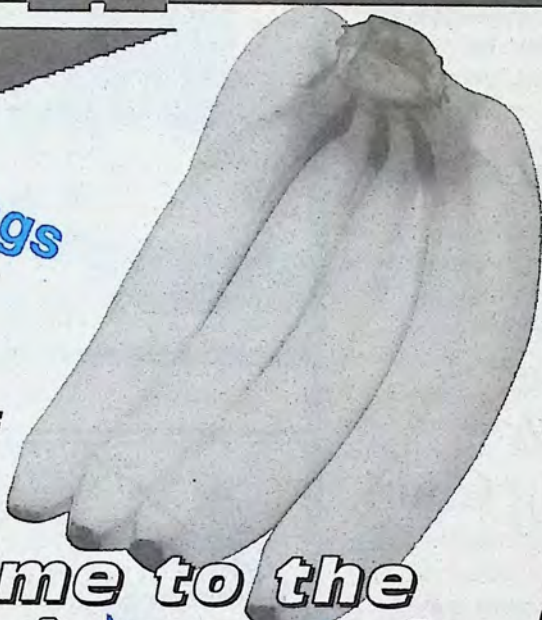
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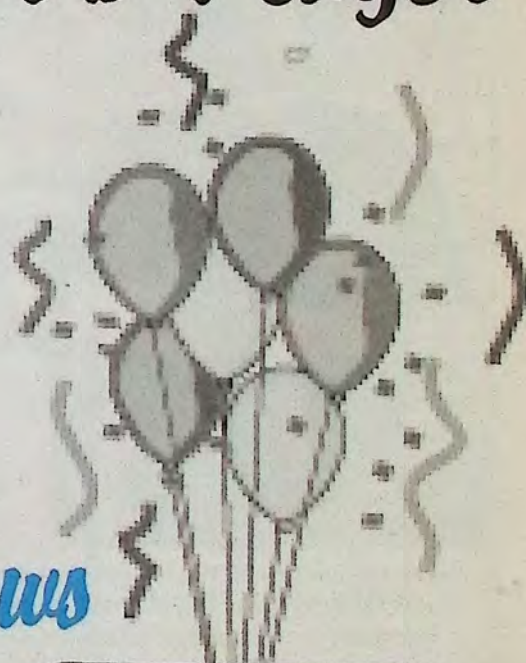
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
