

USIB brings bonus to Similkameen

Victoria grants \$303,000 for Hedley and Princeton

High above Hedley, at the Mascot Mine Heritage site, two government Ministers announced economic grants to Upper Similkameen Indian Band (USIB) and their partners totalling \$303,000.

Chief Richard Holmes welcomed Stan Hagen, Minister of Sustainable Resource Management, Geoff Plant, Minister Responsible for Treaty Negotiations, and Dave Chutter, MLA for Yale-Lillooet, to the Similkameen Valley. The ministers and Chutter were flown to the site by helicopter to make the announcements about economic development grants for Hedley and Princeton.

Continuing development of the Mascot Mine Heritage Site will be carried out with a \$178,000 grant. As Chief Holmes pointed out, First Nations people have been extracting minerals, ochre and chert, in the Similkameen Valley for thousands of years. Although gold is no longer mined at Hedley, Chief Holmes said the heritage site has the potential "to bring the gold back to the Similkameen" through tourism.

The Mascot Mine project will take three years to complete with a total budget of \$6.5 million dollars with fundraising and other activities to provide the money. The site is not open to the public, although the first phase of public safety modifications has been done. Ministers Hagen and Plant, and MLA Chutter, received jars containing ochre, along with arrowhead necklaces.

Additional grants are \$80,000 for infrastructure development of the USIB industrial park near Princeton, and \$45,000 to determine the viability of a cogeneration plant using wood waste from the value-added plant planned for the industrial park. The funding allows USIB to pursue a partnership for the plant. The industrial park is expected to lead to eight new jobs and two new businesses.

The industrial park plans were covered by the News Leader in the May 6 Forestry Week issue.

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Unique site will bring tourist boom

Hedley should prepare for an influx of tourists in three years. There is no doubt that the Hedley Mascot Mine Heritage Site will be a major attraction. There is no other site like it in Canada. Clinging to the cliff face high above Hedley, the old buildings, the actual mine shaft and skip tram rails are there to be seen and appreciated when the site is fully developed.

The old buildings were slated for destruction as a public hazard when Bill Barlee, then Minister of Tourism, demanded the site must remain as a heritage site. Mascot Mine received this designation, but little was done with the site. Upper Similkameen Indian Band acquired the site in 1996, and began the long, expensive process of restoring the site and making it safe for the public. Darrell Brewer put a "road" into the site. Further work was done using ropes to lower people to the site (one story tells of a Deputy Minister who lost his footing and tumbled right to the edge of the sheer drop down to Hedley).

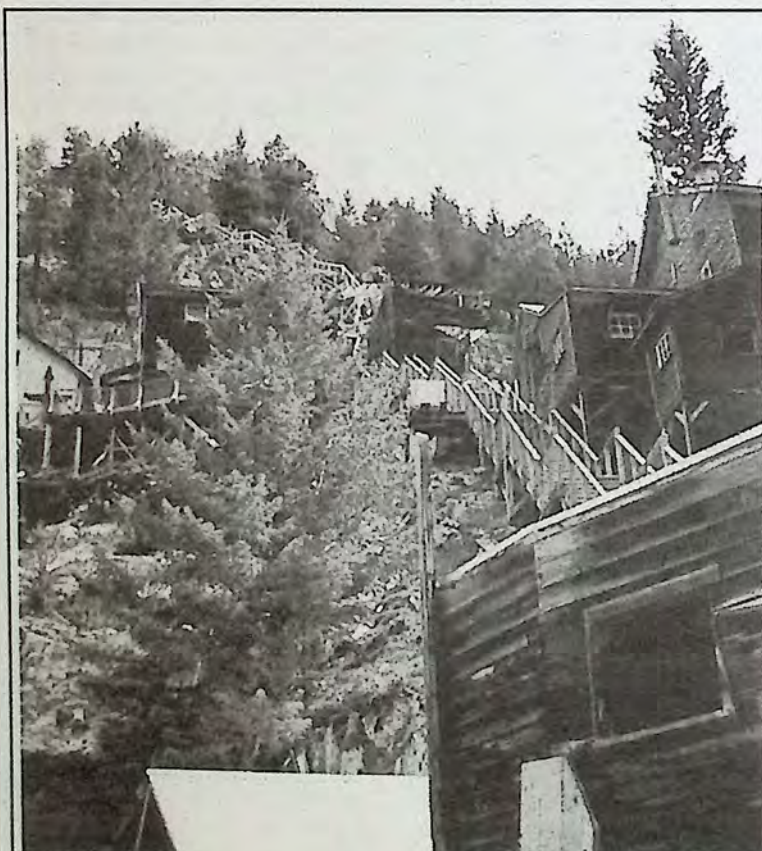
Last October, Grayback Construction was hired to put a stairway into the site. Chief Richard Holmes publicly acknowledged the courage of the workers, with good reason. They cleared rubble from the bedrock all the way down and every supporting post is

anchored in bedrock and fastened to a steel saddle on a concrete base. Every bit of material was carried down the cliff face on the workers backs, often in slippery winter conditions. The 588 steps in the stairway are the equivalent of building a 13 storey building without lifts, platforms or electricity!

There is a lot of reconstruction work to be done at the site, but on June 11, USIB showed the

potential of the site. Ministers Stan Hagen and Geoff Plant, MLA Dave Chutter, Mayors Walter Despot and Keith Olsen, and Area G Director Roger Mayer, along with media and others, will testify to the spectacular view and the authenticity of the work done on the buildings.

It is hard to imagine people living in bunkhouses perched precariously above the valley. The miners **Continued on page 2** ...

PXA plans to update barn rules

New barn rules and a new entrance to the grounds are part of the ongoing improvements to Princeton's exhibition grounds.

At the June 10 meeting of Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA), members heard reports from barn users about problems they encounter. Barn boss Paul Bedard said he needed help to prepare the stables for rentals for the long weekend at the end of the month. He said so many people had left the stalls dirty he could not keep up with the work of cleaning. Members voted to hire some help for him, but went on to address the real problem. Members voted to charge for stall cleaning as part of the rental cost, and doubled the rent from \$10 to \$20 a day. This new rate is just for out-of-town stall rentals. Local stall renters are part of the user group and they do a lot of volunteer work.

There were a number of other issues related to the use of the big barn. The group will meet informally to propose policy and rule changes for the approval of PXA.

The PXA is still looking for shower rentals for the August ATV Jamboree. Other items of repairs included the concession kitchen equipment upgrades.

who dug the gold out of Nickel Plate Mountain risked life and limb just living at the site. To prove the viability of having the heritage site as a tourist attraction, hardy chefs from Hedley carried the makings of a gourmet lunch down the stairs and set up plank tables on which to prepare

the food. They fed approximately 40 people in this makeshift environment and everyone was comfortable. The most difficult part of the trip was leaving the site. Climbing 588 steps to reach the road, then walking uphill for several hundred metres to the staging area,

was a real effort. Puffing, sweating, enduring cramps in backs, legs and feet, the guests laboured to the top. Any tourists visiting the site should be physically fit and should practice climbing 100 stairs every day to prepare to leave the site.

There are hopes of someday having an aerial tramway to access the site, but the cost of such a project would be astronomical, and there are no plans for it yet. Still, USIB dreams of the day when Mascot Mine Heritage Site will be one of the biggest tourist attractions in Canada.

To give an idea of the height of the buildings, Herman Edward stood on one of the balconies played his flute to an eagle circling just below him.

Several members said they would like a new gate for the grounds, as the old one is in poor condition. They received a lot of support, and a steel gate on wheels was proposed. The PXA will look into the cost of steel gates. Another issue with the gate was the sign above it, which says "Sunflower Downs". It was pointed out that "Sunflower Downs" no longer has any meaning and all of the highway signs giving directions say "Exhibition Grounds". Members said a big sign on the fence should read "Exhibition Grounds" so people would know they had arrived at the right place.

Jody Woodford reported metal soffits had been stolen from a Fall Fair animal shelter. These did not belong to the PXA but had been stored there by the security person. Nobody was able to shed any light on what had become of them, although they had been in place the week before the rodeo.

The PXA received favourable feedback regarding the combined use of the grounds on the May long weekend, when the Bus Nuts and team ropers used different parts of the grounds. The two groups got along well. Other

favourable reports were received regarding the new roofed area of the refreshment garden.

Problems were discussed regarding silly people racing motorized vehicles on the racetrack and tuff truck area when not authorized to do so. Members agreed the racetrack is reserved for horse use and vehicles may use the infield only in daylight hours and only with PXA permission. The back gate will be locked to prevent access.

The Fire Department requested use of part of the grounds to store their fire demonstration structures. Some members voiced opposition, but finally agreed to see if there is a suitable location on the grounds.

The increased use of the exhibition grounds involves more and more groups, all of whom have to work cooperatively to meet everybody's needs and wishes. This has meant a lot of work for PXA volunteers, and ongoing expense. The Fall Fair and PXA will split the cost of the new lighting and power outlets for the refreshment area and announcer tower.

The next meeting of the PXA will be at the grounds on July 8.

Douglas Lake. Monday's activities included paddling down Chaperone Lake, and some storytelling. Tuesday's itinerary took the canoes to Pikes and Salmon Lakes, then on to Glimpse, Peter Hope and Stump Lakes on Wednesday.

Thursday, June 19, was a rest day spent at N'Kwala (Nicola)

Beach in preparation for paddling Nicola Lake on Friday.

This Saturday, June 21, is Aboriginal Day, and the paddlers, and anyone who wants to join the celebration, will enjoy the day at Monck Park.

Anyone joining the celebration is requested to bring food or soft drinks.

Lions say skateboard park is not a "dead issue"

"It's not a dead issue yet," says Tony Stansfield-Jones.

Threshing Bee is set for August

The annual Oldtime Threshing Bee will be held August 16 and 17 at the Rolly Bilodeau farm in Cawston. This is a great event for anyone interested in old methods of harvesting and the equipment used. There is always a great array of antique tractors whose owners are happy to parade them around the field.

The antique threshing machine is operated by a big belt attached to a drive wheel on a tractor.

Rolly grows and harvests the grain, which is cut with a scythe and placed in sheaves (bundles of stalks of grain). A mule team and hay wagon bring the sheaves to the thresher, where they are fed into a hopper where straw and grain are separated. The straw goes one direction and the grain goes into a bin.

Rolly says he could use some help with the harvesting. Anyone who knows how to scythe and sheaf grain and would like to help can call Rolly at 499-5891.

During the threshing bee, cold drinks and eats are available. This is more than just a work party - it's a get-together for fun.

Princeton woman receives medal as top nursing student

Each year, the top student in each degree program at The University College of the Cariboo, located in Kamloops, B.C., is awarded a medal to mark the achievement. This year, UCC awarded the Medal in Nursing to Chelsea Fraser-Beswick, who is also this year's valedictorian. The medal was presented on June 14 at the UCC Convocation ceremonies.

Princeton born and raised, Chelsea Fraser-Beswick was youth liaison for Princeton Youth Action Force Committee. Her experiences volunteering at the UBC Hospital while earning a Bachelor of Science degree sparked her interest in health care, so after travelling in Europe for eight months, she enrolled in the UCC Nursing degree program.

During her time at UCC, she had the opportunity to complete one of her practicum experiences in Dhulikhel, Nepal. After spending some time at the hospital, she recognized a need for more accurate and legitimate information regarding pain and pain management, whereupon she created and presented a Pain Management Seminar for physicians, nurses and students. Upon her return to Canada, she participated in a research project related to Nepalese health worker development, and co-produced a documentary on her practicum experience.

Fraser-Beswick was an active volunteer while studying in UCC's Bachelor of Science in Nursing program. She was one of eight nursing students who developed a book of inspirational stories, poems and quotes, entitled *Vicissitude*. She was student representative on the Nursing Dean Selection Committee, the Nursing Undergraduate President, and Treasurer of the 2003 Nursing Grad Committee.

Beswick was an active promoter of university community health through a radio show and newspaper column on campus, dealing with such issues as sexual health, substance use, depression, body image, nutrition and relationships. 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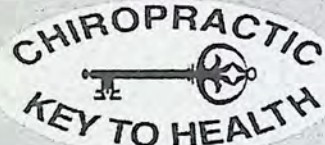
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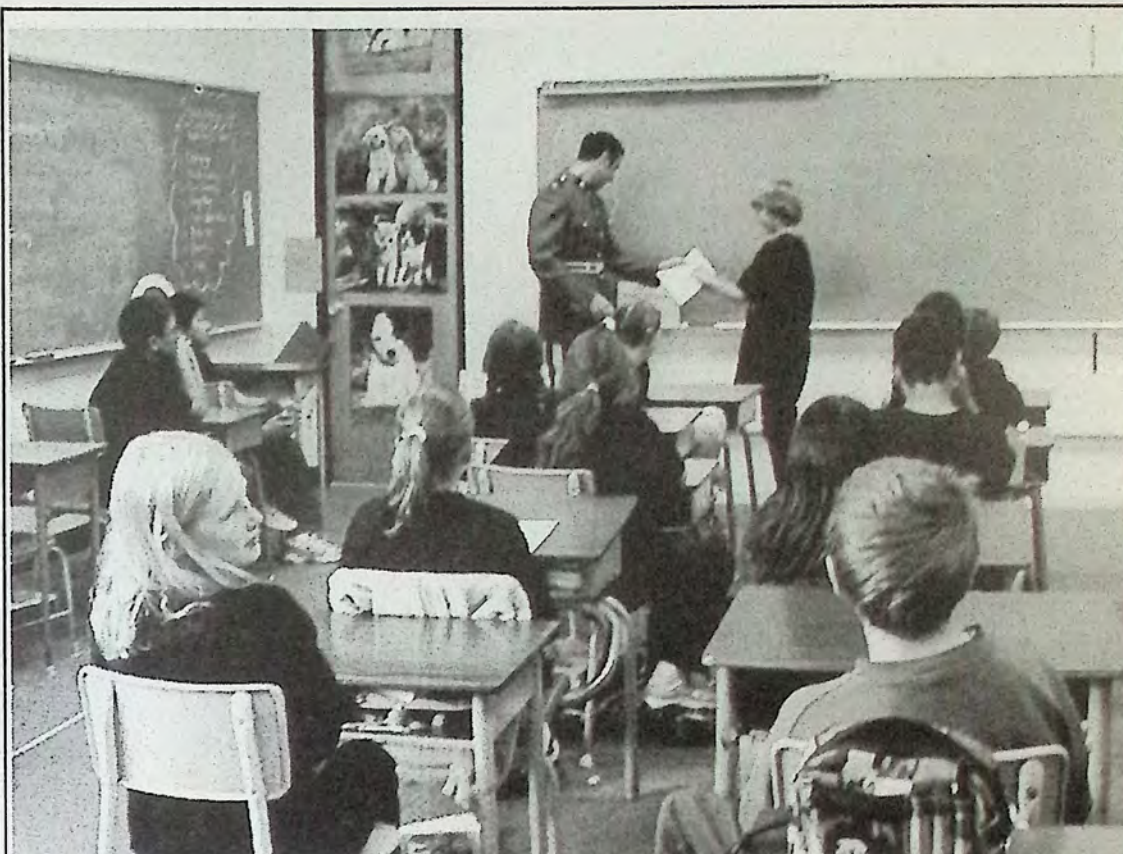

Cherries contain substantial amounts of Vitamins A, C and E. They also contain quercetin, a compound which attacks free radicals, those nasty little things that cause arterial blockages leading to heart attacks and strokes.

So, eat your strawberries! Eat your cherries! They're good for you!



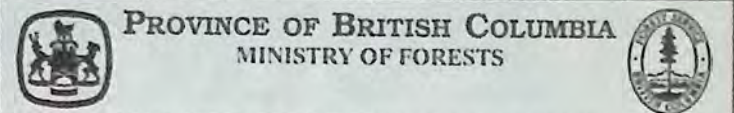

Americans change forest management

Ten days ago, The United States Congress passed a bill which upset environmentalists. The arguments in favour of the forestry bill echoed what British Columbians, and local residents, have been saying for years – we cannot let the forests just burn. The resource is too valuable.

The American policy on forest fires was to allow the forest to burn while protecting human dwellings at the edge of the forest. This policy has been scrapped.

One congressman said the United States cannot afford to lose millions of acres of national forests every year. The cost is too high.

He went on to say forests will be “managed” from now on – forest productivity will be increased through reforestation, thinning, and spacing. In other words, the innovative forestry practices begun more than a decade ago in B.C. are now forestry policy in the United States.

A representative of Greenpeace was on television to say why it was a bad new law, but his argument seemed weak in comparison with the economic arguments presented by the congressman.

Anyone can prove to themselves why managed forests are better. Go out into one of the mature forests along the Hope-Princeton Highway. Hardly anything grows on the forest floor, and a lot of trees are dead or dying. You will not see wildlife. Then go to a managed forest. The biodiversity on the ground is amazing. There is a huge variety of plants, there is evidence of wildlife, both on the ground and in the trees. The trees are healthy (which is why they grow faster). The managed forest smells good, too, because it is producing oxygen at top speed (dead trees do nothing for air quality).

Yes, a managed forest is a capital investment and an economic asset, but it is healthy, too, and good for air quality, biodiversity, and wildlife – the intangible assets of forests.

New welfare policies spell hardship

Dear Editor;

B.C.'s provincial government received a warning today from researchers who say its package of new welfare rules is radical and unprecedented, and will cause unacceptable hardship and upheaval in communities across B.C.

The Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives (CCPA) and the Social Planning and Research Council of BC (SPARC BC) joined with anti-poverty advocates at a news conference last week to release *A Bad Time to be Poor: an analysis of British Columbia's new welfare policies*. It is the first comprehensive review of the full package of policy changes.

This study sounds the alarm about the government's changes to social assistance in B.C. We are deeply concerned that the cuts to welfare rates and eligibility, combined with cuts to employment supports and an economic slowdown, could be a social catastrophe in the making. We are particularly concerned about the toxic mix of time limits, the two-year independence test, and the three-week wait.

The government has imported many policies from the US welfare restructuring of the 1990s. However, it has selectively imported the punitive policies that push and keep people on welfare – such as time limits – but not the supports that help people make the transition to paid employment.”

This is clearly an exercise in budget-cutting, not good social poli-

cy. When the US implemented tough welfare rules in the 1990s, there was also an increase in spending on programs for low-income people. In BC, many new policies actually discourage work re-entry. The government has cut child car, eliminated earnings exemptions, introduced a \$6/hr. “training” wage, reduced training and educational opportunities, and cut transition-to-work assistance.”

The Ministry of Human Resources has taken the biggest budget cut of any ministry. In a very concrete way, we are seeing a transfer of income from the poorest among us – who need social assistance – to the wealthiest among us – who received the lion's share of BC's recent tax cuts.

The cuts are forcing people off welfare despite the fact that the provincial government is not anticipating a drop in the unemployment rate. It is normal for welfare rolls to decline during economic good times – that happened in

Canada and the US during the 1990s. But it is quite another thing to plan for a reduction in welfare rolls when unemployment is stagnant.

Already, the new rules are causing increased despair and hardship for many. There are early reports of an increase in homelessness in Vancouver, and the cuts are hitting at a time when workers in resource-dependent communities are struggling with the impacts of the softwood lumber dispute and exhausting their EI coverage.

The government should compassionately rethink its welfare policies. BC should not abandon welfare when in need as a basic human right.

In his book *The Psychology of Peak experience*, Chicago University professor Mihalyi Csikszentmihalyi explains the findings of the researchers. All of them discovered happiness comes from achievement.

We spend a lot of money on programs for youth to ensure they stay out of trouble but there is always a percentage who find trouble and even make excuses for being in trouble, like their parents don't care, they come from an impoverished environment, or any other excuse. The fact is this: they are not happy people because they feel they have achieved nothing.

As our grads end their years at school, they can begin a path to happiness, because they have marked years of achievement. Those students who win athletic awards have trophies to prove they achieved something. Those who receive awards of any sort can feel they have achieved something.

There are many clues in this study of achievement leading to happiness which indicate it is not

necessary to win the Nobel Prize to feel this sense of achievement, but it is instead the feeling of doing something worthwhile and pleasurable, developing skills to a high level, and taking pride in the products of one's efforts.

How can we ensure that all of our young people feel this sense of accomplishment?

Life gives us markers like graduation day to reflect on our achievements, but achieving once is not enough. We need it to happen regularly, and in most areas of our lives.

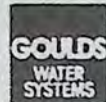
