### Princeton boils with action

Starting this Friday Princeton will begin to boil with activity as the town pushes open the door to Summer Heat weekend.

Friday will feature the first day of the Group of 10 Plus Friends art show at the old photo shop at the corner of Bridge Street and Harold Avenue. In Town Hall, local wood carvers will display their work, and Vermilion Artists have a show at the Cultural Centre on Veterans Avenue. Art and wood carver shows go on all weekend.

At 6:30 p.m., the Summer Heat parade begins, winding its way down Vermilion Avenue, up Bridge Street, and on to the arena.

At 7:30 p.m. the Youth Ambassador candidates begin their big night when the 2003-04 ambassadors are selected, and take over their duties. This event takes place at the arena, and there is an admission charge.

Across the street, at the Baptist Church, an evening of music begins at 8:00 p.m. This will be a presentation of local musical talent, which is excellent.

The following day, starting at 7:00 a.m., the Lions Club will be cooking breakfast at Rotary Park on Lime Street, by the river. They will hold their duck race, and it might just be in Tulameen River, if the water level drops sufficiently. The winners will be chosen at 11:00 a.m. when

breakfast ends.

In the meantime, at 9:00 a.m., a hidden team golf tournament starts and the ball tournament starts.

The Skateboard Jam takes place from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., followed by the bed races downtown at 2:00 p.m. Right after the bed races, the stick horse rodeo begins downtown, and there are plenty of horses in the stable for sale or rent.

During all of this, there will be a big flea market at Princeton Plaza parking lot, and look for a street entertainer to keep you laughing.

Everyone can take a break after the stick-horse rodeo to get ready for the big dance at the arena, featuring XLR8.

Sunday At the golf course, Sunday features the Princeton Mixed Open tournament where golfers tee off at 9:00 a.m. for 18 holes.

Church services will be held as usual Sunday.

Ball players, artists, wood carvers will continue their efforts Sunday. Fall Fair members will have plenty to do as Fall Fair is roasting a very large pig and a couple of turkeys (no names). Tickets should be purchased in advance, says Tophy Hanna, as you take your chances at the fairgrounds concession. Gates open at 4:00 p.m. and dinner is between 6:00 and 9:00 p.m. There will be a DJ and lots of good tunes.

On Monday, The ball tournament finals take place. Be sure

to go to Memorial Park to see who wins the 24-team fastball tourney.

Tuesday is Canada Day, and there is more fun scheduled, especially for families. There will be a big cake, flags, games and a barbecue at Cenotaph Park (town square) beginning at 11:00 a.m.

This is quite a weekend! Go out and enjoy as much of it as you can - it is Princeton's first Summer Heat. Let's make it a success.

## Council agrees on booze issue

The B.C. Government Employees' Union (BCGEU) is bothered by the government's plan to privatize liquor distribution. In a letter to Town Council, dealt with at Council's June 16 meeting, BCGEU asked for Council's support once again to stop the proliferation of privately owned liquor retail stores.

Although the government's plan to divest itself of liquor stores is

now 'on hold', the union points out there are currently 229 rural liquor agencies, 328 licensed retail stores and 221 government liquor stores.

The letter states, "This huge growth in the availability of liquor, with its inherent potential for abuse and harm, is occurring without meaningful community consultation."

Citing the Alberta model, where

almost anybody can have a license to sell liquor, the union points out "Liquor Act offences have tripled since privatization."

Statistics accompanying the letter show liquor sales in B.C. have increased every year for the past five years with increasing revenue to government.

Town Council supported the position of the union and will write to Minister Rich Coleman to say no final decisions on retail liquor distribution should be made without community consultation.

## Council votes to share EDO for one year only

Princeton Town Council made a commitment earlier this year to share an Economic Development Officer with Keremeos. At the June 16 Council meeting, Mayor Keith Olsen told Council the Similkameen Valley Planning Committee met on June 11, and Keremeos is looking for a written agreement from Princeton to share the cost of a Similkameen Valley Economic Development Officer for 2003 and 2004.

Councillor Lorne Esselink said he was not prepared to make a commitment for both years, and made a motion to agree to it for one year only.

There has been no public announcement regarding the date the two municipalities would hire an Economic Development Officer, although economic development was high on the list of priorities for both mayors when they campaigned for office last November.

## Homes are selling well

BC real estate sales continued strong through May, although slightly below the figures (under two percent) for May 2002. The majority of sales are residential units, and this was not surprising to agents in view of the five percent interest rate on a fixed, five-year term mortgage.

## RCMP hit drug house

Princeton RCMP executed another search warrant on June 14 at a residence in Hedley. A quantity of marijuana, drug paraphernalia and firearms were seized at the residence. The matter is still under investigation.

During the drug crackdown, 14 people from Princeton and surrounding area have been charged for possession of illegal drugs for the purpose of trafficking and are scheduled to appear in court in coming months.

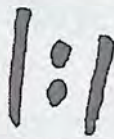

**THE BASICS ON INTEREST - Part 2**

The last "Investment Insights" article, The Basics on Interest - Part 1, covered the effect interest rate changes can have on bond prices.

Stocks also react to interest rate changes. In general, if the yields on virtually risk-free short term Treasuries are attractive, investors may become reluctant to put their money into stocks, where the short-term risks could be higher. Certain stocks such as bank and utilities are particularly sensitive to interest rate changes.

Banks, in particular, make much of their profit on the difference between what it costs them to borrow money and the rate at which they lend it (also called the spread). As interest rates begin to fall, the banks will lower their lending rate at a slower pace than the rate at which they borrow. This contributes to an increase in the spread and ultimately profitability, as their stocks and earnings increase.

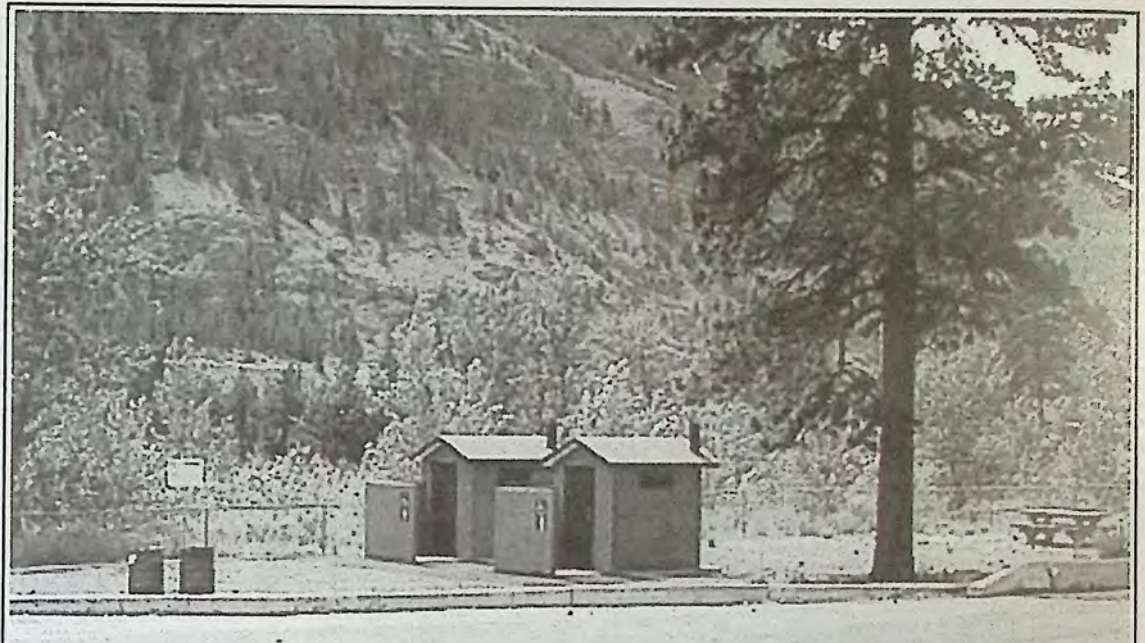

**Tourist InfoCentre now open**

Similkameen Country's Tourist InfoCentre opened for the season on Monday.

Typically the facility is in operation by May long weekend, but provincial funding cutbacks has severely affected the level of service provided.

Two local students, Charanjit Gill and Melissa Terbasket, will be employed to operate the InfoCentre.

Gill has been hired by funding provided through Human

Resources Development Canada and Terbasket will be paid from a grant received through Weyerhaeuser's Jobs For Youth Program.

The second source of funding is welcomed by Similkameen Country.

"We get to keep the InfoCentre open every day now that we have the second student," says Lisa Fraser.

The InfoCentre, located in the centre of downtown Keremeos in

Memorial Park, will be open 9am to 5pm daily until the end of August.

Volunteers will take over the operation once the grant funding ends to greet visitors only on weekdays until the end of tourist season.

Hours of operation may vary at that time depending on the support available from local volunteers.

**Canada Day full of activity**

When the Village of Keremeos chose to organize Canada Day celebrations, Melanie Bagley was hired as coordinator.

In the three weeks she's been working on the project, a full day of activities has been developed involving a number of local community groups.

Bagley's role is clearly defined, "To ensure the Village has a Canada Day Celebration and to help many local community organizations."

The day starts at 7am with a Lions Pancake Breakfast. Keremeos Community Church will provide Face Painting from 9:30am and Vendors will open their tables.

Childrens Games will start at 12noon with a Dunk Tank set up with many local dignitaries scheduled to get dunked.

Other events planned include a free swim at the pool, a Frisbee Catching Record Attempt, Fireworks and Entertainment throughout the day.

Bagley sees the celebration as a family event with obvious leanings towards parents.

"The Tug o' war will draw a lot of adults," she says.

The involvement of many community groups and the donations received from residents and businesses has made the celebration possible.

"These groups are giving of their time and energy, which I think is great."

Although there is potential for the non-profit organizations to gain a little through fund raising during Canada Day, the main thrust of the event is to turn it into a community-driven celebration.

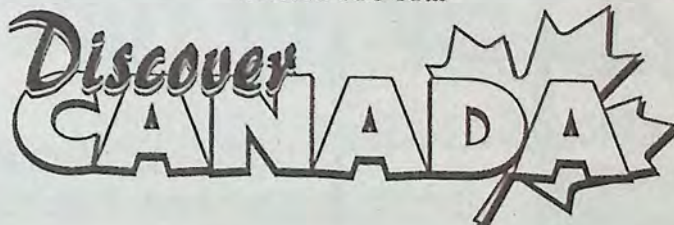
Bagley says the event will cost about \$2,000 to put on with most of it covered by donations and a grant from Municipal Finance Authority and the Village of Keremeos.

## New bylaw will cost owners

Town Council gave first, second and third reading to a new water bylaw. At the June 16 Council meeting, the three readings of the bylaw passed with no discussion.

The bylaw, called Town of Princeton Water Rates and Regulations Amendment No. 749, 2003, requires owners at all commercial, industrial and institutional premises connected to Town water supply to install a back flow device at the property owner's expense.

This bylaw will apply to private property owners in which water is "connected to a body of contaminated water such as a swimming pool/hot tub."

This bylaw comes into effect after fourth reading has been passed by Council. For more information, talk to the clerk at Town Hall.

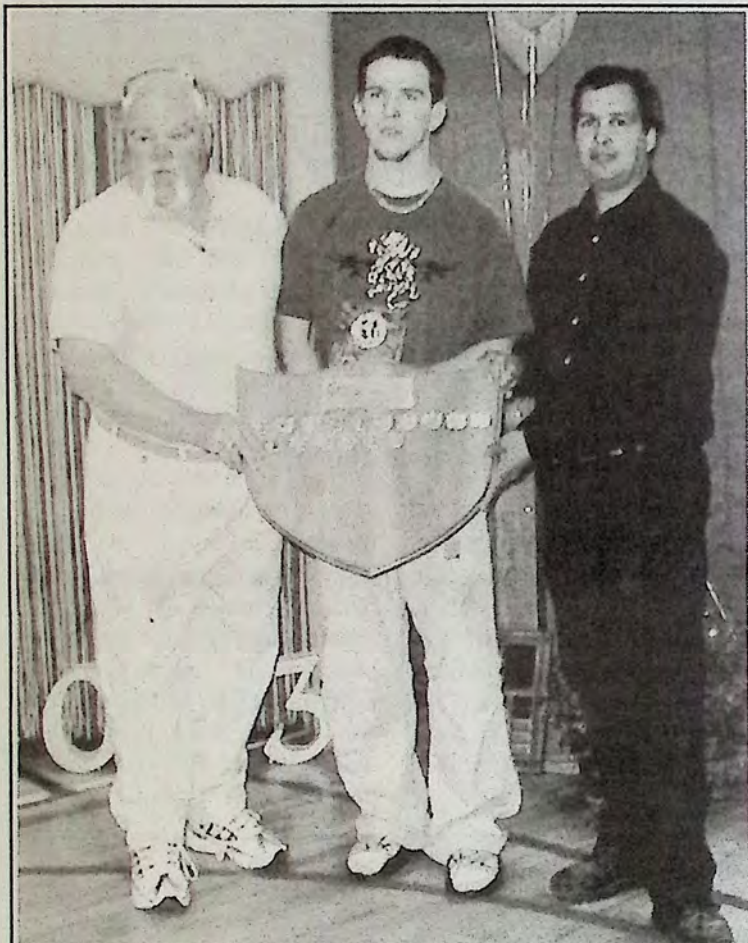

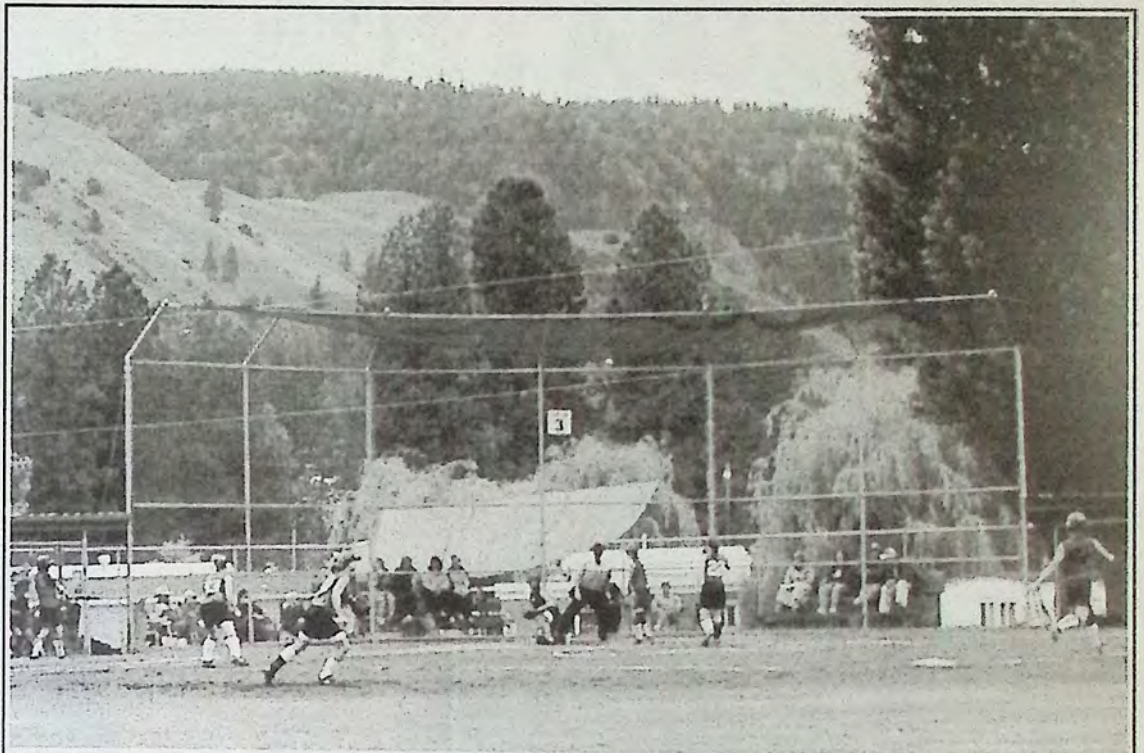

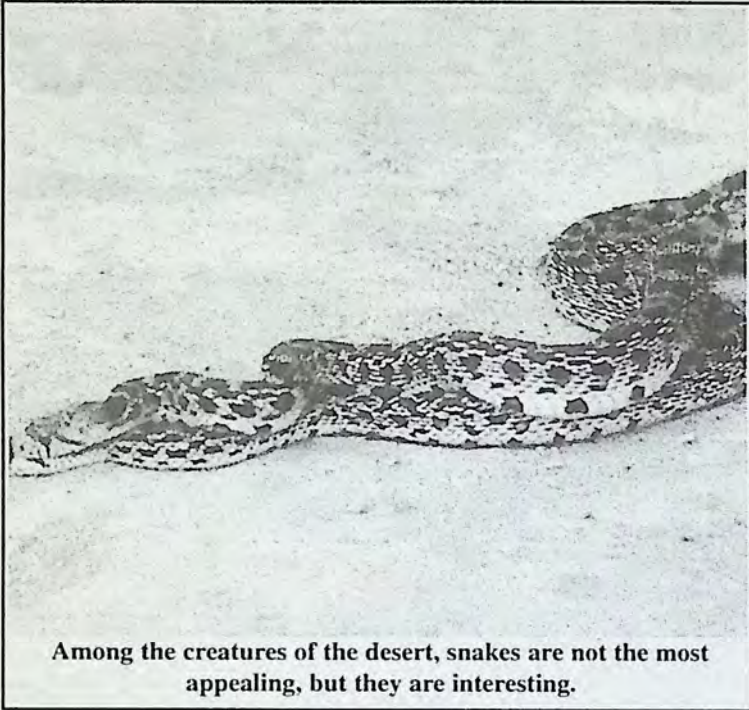

## The land, the people and the legends



Among the creatures of the desert, snakes are not the most appealing, but they are interesting.

The sharp, menacing rattle, the coiled position, left no doubt in the trespasser's mind – the message: "Stop right now, or I'll strike!"

This encounter did not take place in the outdoors, but is part of the display and museum in the NK'Mip Desert and Heritage Centre, operated by the Osoyoos Indian Band.

This is a new facility, located in what is the most northern part of the Sonoran Desert, a unique habitat which stretches from Mexico, California, Oregon, Washington, and into the South Okanagan. The Centre seeks to promote respect and understanding of the culture and lands of the Okanagan people.

Members of Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists spent a fascinating and instructive day at the Centre, learning about the Western Rattlesnake, the Gopher Snake and other animals, the plants and trees which inhabit this area.

A two kilometre trail led from the Centre into the desert, meandering across the Lone Pine Bridge, where one can see the slither markings of lizards and snakes, the footprints of Nuttall's Cotton tail, deer and coyote.

At the Chief's Lookout, a cooling breeze invited a short break to look at the view. The land certainly does not look like the day when the Okanagan People moved here, followed by European settlers – vineyards, housing developments,

highways, shopping centres now fill the South Okanagan, yet sitting at the lookout, with bird song all around, the scent of sage and pine wafting around us, it seemed we were still in true wilderness.

Along the trails, the various plants are identified and their various uses described. The loose shaggy bark of the Big Sagebrush was used for ropes, baskets and as a firestarter. Antelope Brush and Common Rabbitbrush displayed their contrasting greens providing backdrops for the beautiful Mariposa lily, its pale purple and lavender blooms delighting the eye. Longleafed Phlox, Thread-leafed Daisy, White Clematis, Mock Orange added to the colourful picture. A Saskatoon bush already had ripe, sweet fruit, a fact discovered by a black bear.

Following the Rocky Ridge trail, we arrived at the "village" where models of a sweat lodge, a summer tipi, a winter residence and a smokehut showed how the Okanagan People used what the land provided. Bark was used for ropes and baskets, willow twigs and branches for a fishtrap, a bed frame, reeds of tule to make a curtain to close a door opening.

Forty-four species of birds were seen and heard, though not all at the Centre. Lark Sparrow, Sage thrasher (here at its most northerly range), Gray Catbird, Bobolink, are all unusual for Princetonians, added to the perfection of the day.

The NK'MIP Centre conducts guided tours, a small museum gives a pictorial history and by pushing a green button, one can hear some of the legends.

The Centre conducts research, a long term project to study the Western Rattlesnake, endangered and red-listed due to the destruction of its habitat and relentless human persecution.

The trails are well marked with signs warning visitors that rattlers live in the area, but the only one seen was in the display unit.

After its initial fierce sounding warning it went to sleep after having ingested a small mouse. The Gopher Snake was more restless and glided around its enclosure displaying its beautiful colours. Occasionally it raised its tail as a threat, copying its neighbour the rattler. Despite the fact it does not make a sound, the posture is often enough to warn off a potential predator.

The Centre is well worth a visit for both adults and children. There is a small charge and memberships are available. Throughout the summer and early fall, guided tours, demonstrations and lectures are given. One can even adopt a rattlesnake for a donation and receive a picture of the individual and its life history. Our group agreed the day had been outstanding, both as a learning and a recreational experience.

## Camp safely: be cautious with propane

At the start of, and throughout, the camping season, campers are urged to use portable propane appliances properly to prevent accidents or carbon monoxide poisoning, which can lead to serious injuries or death.

The Gas Safety Program has the following tips:

\* Use propane appliances only for purposes for which they are designed. Propane stoves are designed for cooking and should never be used as space heaters.

\* Only use portable appliances, like lanterns and barbecues, outside in freely ventilated areas. Never use them in enclosed spaces like tents, recreational vehicles, campers, trailers or cabins. Tents are not freely ventilated.

\* Never use portable gas heaters when sleeping in a tent, camper or RV, even if a window is open. Store refillable propane cylinders outdoors. Make sure they are properly capped, plugged or sealed.

\* Check propane appliances

installed in RVs and cabins every year to ensure they are operating correctly and have no propane leaks. Before being resold, all recreational vehicles must be safety inspected by a bonded recreational vehicle shop that holds an annual permit issued by the Gas Safety Program. RVs that have passed a safety inspection will display a valid safety decal.

Although propane is considered a safe energy source, it is highly combustible. Propane appliances can produce dangerous amounts of carbon monoxide when not properly maintained or not used in the approved manner. Carbon monoxide is a colourless, odourless gas that is highly toxic when inhaled in large amounts.

Symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning include headache, nausea, drowsiness, dizziness, vomiting and shortness of breath. Victims should be moved into a well-ventilated area, and if not breathing, given mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. Seek medical help immediately.

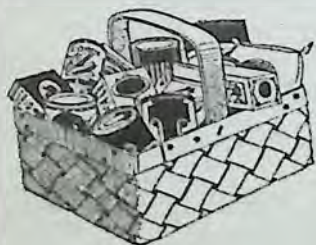

**RECREATION NOTICE  
CASCADES FOREST DISTRICT**

MERRITT - The Ministry of Forests has taken steps to ensure recreation sites and trails in the new Cascades Forest District remain available for the pleasure of outdoor enthusiasts for years to come.

The ministry is presently building multi-year partnership agreements with recreation groups, community organizations, First Nations, private citizens, local governments and forest companies for the management and maintenance of Forest Service recreational campsites and trails.

Some sites and or trails will now be managed under "Enhanced" agreements where scheduled maintenance and repairs will be completed by agreement holders. At these enhanced sites a \$10.00 overnight fee or a \$5.00 fee for seniors and the disabled will be collected by the agreement holders. A receipt will be issued to you upon payment. Firewood may also be purchased. Presently there is no day use fee, provided you do not occupy a camping site or block access to facilities.

The ministry is also building multi-year agreements for Forest Service recreation sites and trails to be managed and maintained under "Regular" agreements. Agreement holders will also do maintenance and repairs to the area under agreement but there is no overnight camping fee, although a donation to the group may be requested but is not mandatory.

Where partnership agreements are not established, sites and trails will remain open as "user-maintained" with no fee. Like in other wilderness areas, campers are asked to respect the forest environment and pack out whatever garbage they pack in at these user-maintained sites. Not all user maintain recreation sites and trails will receive regular maintenance, but the facilities and hazards will be tended to when necessary.

Recreation maps will no longer be available at the district office, but in the near future may be available at local vendors. You may also phone the Office Products Centre at 1-800-282-7955, or by email at [OPCCustomer@gemsl.gov.bc.ca](mailto:OPCCustomer@gemsl.gov.bc.ca) for purchase (\$2.95 plus taxes). However, due to the changing status of the recreation sites, trails and forest service roads, the public is encouraged to confirm the accuracy of map information by contacting the district office.

For many years, our secondary school students have had the opportunity, if their parents could afford it, to take a trip to Europe during spring break. I do not believe this is a good field trip for students.

I believe students should see Canada before they see other countries. Visiting old churches, museums and other famous sites is interesting and perhaps educational, but seeing Canada is seeing the place they will inhabit most of their lives. They should know Canada first.

Some idiot decided to have "spring" break in the middle of March, when most of Canada is covered with snow. Have you noticed the high cost of camping?

Dear Editor:

Has anyone sat down and figured out how much camping is going to cost this year. I have heard people say that \$10 a night isn't a bad price. Maybe it is not a bad price for some, but what about low or fixed income families. Camping used to be something that was a whole family activity that everyone enjoyed. I am a single mom with three children ages 4, 6 and 8, and I can no longer afford to take them camping. When you sit down and figure out the costs it becomes very clear. Let me show you.

If you go camping five weekends this summer that will give you 10 nights. You can buy a bundle of firewood for \$5.00, which will do you for a night so you would need 10 bundles. If you want to fish, you will need a license – that is another \$38. If you want to troll, you are now required to have a licence to drive the boat – that is another \$50. So let's add up all this:

10 nights of camping at \$10 a night is \$100. Ten bundles of wood at \$5.00 a bundle is \$50.

Fishing licence, \$38 plus boat licence, \$50, equals the total for camping this year – \$238!

That total is more than my monthly loan payment for my home. And just about 400 percent increase from last year when all you had to pay for was a fishing licence at \$36 and maybe a camping pass at \$28 for at total of \$64.

So who will pay for my children to

go camping? I can't afford it. Maybe Mr. Campbell and the others in government who allowed this privatization of the campground to go through will each send me a dollar so I could take my kids. After all, it's not like I want to go to Hawaii for two weeks, just out to a lake near my home and get back to nature.

I always heard that a child's joy was priceless, and Mr. Campbell and his cohorts put a price on it. Not fair, Mr. Campbell. What's next? A fee to look at the trees in the forests?

## Dorcas Circle worked for the future

St. Paul's United Church was built in 1920. The Dorcas Circle was formed for the purpose of building adequate housing for a growing Sunday School. A handful of hard-working ladies undertook to set that plan in motion, hence the Dorcas was established March 10, 1948, with Mrs. E.H. (Jean) Cook as President, Mrs. T.H. Cunliffe (Vi) as Vice President, Mrs. J. (Mae) Fairley as Secretary and Mrs. W.S. Ford as Treasurer.

A building committee was struck with Mrs. J. (Helen) Corrie, Mrs. R. (Gladys) Scott and Miss Grace

Wright who was Matron at Princeton Hospital at the time. In due time, through the efforts of this group, another classroom to house Sunday School classes was constructed helping to relieve some of the pressure of the crowded existing building.

The Dorcas Circle ladies decided there was a need in Princeton for a reliable catering service and this is where it all started. These dedicated women worked under most difficult circumstances. Having no kitchen supplies belonging to the church, they were required to lend these items from their own

kitchens. "Can you bring eight dinner plates and eight sets of cutlery for a banquet?" became a well-known question to all of them and they willingly loaned these items.

There were no modern coffee urns in those days and the coffee was brewed in large (usually borrowed) pots. As there was not much money to begin with, most food items were donated by members or other willing people not able to actively participate in the operation.

The Dorcas Circle prepared the best quality catering in Princeton and eventually, after many years of diligent work, were able to purchase some of the dishes, cutlery, pots and pans needed for such an operation.

By the early 1960's, the classrooms the Dorcas Circle had worked so hard to provide were no longer adequate and on February 20, 1965, they were torn down to make room for the construction of the new Christian Education Building which stands now. Construction was completed on July 23, 1965, and the building was officially opened on September 22, 1965, with the dedicated ceremony at a pot luck supper held in the new structure on October 21.

Reverend Russell Reid was the presiding minister at that time. Dr. J.C. Goodfellow, who had served from 1927 until his retirement in 1958, was in attendance, remembering the long, arduous struggle to achieve this important milestone in the history of St. Paul's.

The completion of the building provided a permanent home for the catering group who, by this time, had managed to purchase most of the items necessary for a full-fledged topnotch catering operation which continued until the mid- or late 1970's.

# Paramedic takes skills to Honduras

Danielle Johnson, grand-daughter of Isabella and Marshall Johnson of Princeton, took part of her paramedic training in Princeton. Along with other paramedics, Danielle visited an orphanage in Honduras earlier this year. This was her second visit to Honduras. The following is an account of her experience as she wrote it.

"The Honduras people were so warm and friendly. Even though many don't have what we are accustomed to in Canada, it amazed me to see how happy and thankful they were.

We were met in San Pedro Sula by Rod Ward, who had organized a school bus to transport us and our kaziion bags to the orphanage in Pena Blanca. The drive was about an hour and a half.

Pena Blanca is a small town with one main street located in the mountains. The street is lined with small stores, butcher shops, fruit stands and dogs and chickens everywhere. People there are extremely laid back. We adjusted with some difficulty to 'Honduran Time' which really means nothing is on time. As we passed along the street, we noticed people standing around or sitting on porch steps watching the world go by. Within half an hour, word spread through the entire town that the 'Gringos' were in town and there would be a clinic.

The children at the orphanage were so excited as we pulled up. Most who were there two years ago are still there. We are the first group to pay them a visit in the last year so they were very eager for hugs.

The orphanage is run by the Youngberg family of Texas. Dr. Stephen Youngberg opened the Pan American Health Service orphanage and hospital for sick children back in 1965. Since then, many kids have spent their entire lives growing up in the orphanage. Not all the kids are orphans. In fact, many have families. They are given to the orphanage either on a temporary basis because they are sick and malnourished, or on a long-term basis because their families can't afford to care for them.

Dr. Youngberg passed away two years ago, but his contributions to this town are evident everywhere. Most recently, in the new vocational school set up in his name. His wife, daughters and grandchildren now continue to run the orphanage. Their website is [www.panamhealth.org](http://www.panamhealth.org)

The Youngbergs, and thus the orphanage, are Seventh Day Adventists. Saturdays are their Sabbath. Therefore our first day was a day to relax and get prepared for the upcoming clinics.

On Sunday, it was a beautiful, hot day. We arranged to take the kids three hours away to the beach for a field trip. Most had

never seen the ocean before. Eighty-five of us piled on a school bus for the very noisy trip there. As we bumped along, the children sang for us. We had a wonderful day. The children were so well-behaved.

On Monday, it was time to work. We set up our first clinic on the grounds of the orphanage. People came from far and wide just for the chance to be assessed by us. Some walked for hours. We had a good team this year. Besides us Canucks, we had a group of RNs and a doctor from Wyoming.

Most of the cases we saw were malnourishment, parasites, and head and body aches from heavy work. I noticed the adults looked much older than they actually were. The men spend all day out in the fields harvesting coffee or cutting down sugar cane with machetes. They wear no eye protection so cataracts and other eye problems are common.

The women carry heavy loads on their heads or spend all day packing their many children around or washing laundry in the river. So for them, back pain and headaches are common. The children are small for their ages and look a lot younger. One young fellow I would have placed at seven years of age, due to his height, was fifteen. We saw a lot of protein deficiency in the children characterized by the puffy round faces. Swollen bellies from worms were apparent in more than half of our patients.

We did our best to explain to them the importance of wearing shoes all the time and of boiling their water.

We started by handing out

dewormer and vitamins to everybody but soon began running out of meds. We then had to be selective and give it out only to the sickest.

Pregnant women were given prenatal vitamins. Some men were given prostate meds. And for those who requested eye glasses, we had them try on a small selection of donated used glasses. What a warm feeling to see an old fella walk away from our clinic with his vitamins in one hand, a new set of glasses and a big smile on his face.

Some cases were more serious. There was the one-year-old boy who was septic. We gave him antibiotic injections over two days and then oral antibiotics for his mom to give at home. Surely this little guy wouldn't have made it much longer.

We had a six month old with pneumonia so bad you could hear the rales just by holding her. She also received antibiotic treatment.

One day, a woman walked in with a little baby about one and a half years old. She was beautiful. Her name was Ashley. Mom said she was there because her baby had a cold, but there was something strangely different about Ashley. Her eyelids were fluttering like little seizures and she had a very difficult time holding her head upright. After more investigation, it was discovered that Ashley had a fall a month ago and hit her head on cement. She had been like this ever since. Mom and Dad never brought her to the local doctor because they couldn't afford it.

There's not much we can do for that problem with our limited resources at the clinic, so we used some of our donated money to arrange for this little girl to travel to San Pedro Sula for a CT scan.

We continued with clinics for the next three days. We travelled to the small town of Zacapa where the people were so warm and welcoming. The mayor greeted us and arranged for us to set up in the community hall. Toothbrushes were a hit there. The word soon spread to five neighbouring villages, so we agreed to return the next day. We had a good chuckle about the three methods of communication: telephone, telegraph and tell-a-Honduran.

These were some of our interesting cases, but there were lots more: the baby with the yeast infection around its neck, ear infections, mouth infections, impetigo, leg ulcers which needed cleaning, etc.

There was one lady who was extremely skinny and malnourished. She had been attempting to breast feed her six month old, but when you have no meat on your body, you can't produce much milk.


We loaded her up with baby formula and vitamins and sent her home with many new outfits for herself and baby, and shoes and toys.


Besides the clinics, we pitched in to do a little labour intensive work around the orphanage. We spend a good part of a day shovelling dirt where a new girls dorm is to be built. Then we painted the baseboards of the church.

After our eight days at the orphanage, we travelled four hours away to the lovely town of Copan Ruinas. This town is very touristy as it houses the incredible Mayan Ruins. Here, we connected with a fellow named Rodger Harrison. He is a former American paramedic who, after travelling to Honduras after Hurricane Mitch, decided to settle there and start a volunteer ambulance and charity service called 'Paramedics for Children'. Rodger arranged for us to travel by horseback into some neighbouring mountain villages to deliver school supplies to the kids.
