

# Drug traffic hits gridlock

## Gunfire scares neighbours

An entire neighbourhood was terrorized on the long weekend by a person or persons firing a rifle. At least 70 rounds were fired in a neighbourhood located 27 km. north of Princeton on the Princeton-Summerland Road.

One resident called Princeton RCMP to report the ongoing onslaught of bullets being fired toward her property. She felt her livestock was endangered. RCMP said they were too busy to attend and suggested she remove her animals from the pasture.

Other neighbours expressed concern about people being hit. One man said he was frightened when something whizzed past his head as he was doing a chore outdoors, and he ran to his house. Others were concerned about possible injuries to persons using the Trans Canada Trail and people driving past on the road, as the shots were being fired across the road.

When the RCMP refused to come, residents discussed the problem and contacted Regional Director Gerri Logan and Mayor Keith Olsen. Mayor Olsen said it was not his jurisdiction, but he would speak to police. Director Logan said she was appalled and would bring it up at the next meeting of Regional District to find out whether there are bylaws covering these situations.

Police did attend the neighbourhood the following day, but the people who live in the house from which the firing had come were not at home. An officer left a note on the door of the residence.

Residents of the area, who live on five acre parcels, say they intend to pursue the matter to discover what their rights are should such an incident occur again.

## Undercover operation targets local dope dealers

"Princeton RCMP has completed an extensive undercover operation in a continuing effort to curtail the drug trade in this small community," Sgt. Kurt Lozinski stated.

A number of Princeton area people face charges of trafficking as a result of a Joint Force Operation involving "E" Division Headquarters, South East District Headquarters, Kelowna Detachment and Princeton Detachment.

The undercover operation was an extension of the ongoing drug enforcement activity in which Princeton RCMP have been involved. Prior to the undercover operation, RCMP had executed nine search warrants within a two-month period, resulting in 14 community members facing charges of Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking.

Sgt. Lozinski noted, "The primary concern of this community is drug enforcement. The RCMP is focussing its efforts upon those who deal in illicit drugs. These suspects make a profit, destroying lives, homes and communities at the same time. The RCMP recognizes the critical role of enforcement within Canada's Drug Strategy which is designed to reduce the availability of illicit drugs. A reduction of drugs will then foster an environment in

which drug abuse prevention programs may flourish."

Sgt. Lozinski went on to say the objectives of this operation is to prevent drugs from reaching the street and the hands of children, to apprehend those responsible for trafficking and make it more difficult for them to carry on their criminal activity in our community. Sgt. Lozinski sees another benefit to the drug trafficking crackdown - to educate the public on the dangers on illegal drugs in the community and neighbourhood and to enlist the help of the public in reporting suspected illegal drug activity.

"Information from the public is critical in helping the police keep our communities and neighbourhood safe. The public is a vital partner in our fight against organized crime," Sgt. Lozinski said.

The local RCMP Detachment would like to see the community talking to the courts about the drug problems.

### Public needs to tell courts

"It is time the community voices their concerns to the courts to ensure that a strong message is sent to the traffickers that this type of activity will not be welcome nor condoned in this community," Sgt. Lozinski stated.

## Police nab robbers after highway pursuit

A lone man entered the service station and demanded cash and cigarettes, showing the clerk a firearm. When he got what he wanted, he left in a truck and headed east.

A citizen alerted police that the truck was on Old Hedley Road. Police from Princeton and Keremeos converged on the vehicle 33 km. east of Princeton on Highway 3. Three Penticton men, two adults and one young offender, were taken into custody.

The small amount of cash and cig-

arettes taken from Chevron were recovered.

A shotgun was seized from the truck.

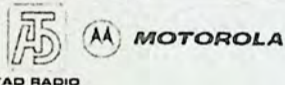

Princeton RCMP have concerns about the rapidly increasing threat to public safety caused by the escalation of drug trafficking in the community.

"We are very concerned for the safety of our neighbourhoods and the people living in them," Sgt. Lozinski said. "It is important for the public to understand that this type of police activity takes place on a daily basis and not just during

these targeted enforcement operations."

He gives credit to dedicated police officers who spent many hours, in addition to their regular duties, investigating these offenses.

The investigation into drug trafficking has not stopped. Sgt. Lozinski urges anyone with knowledge of the drug trade around Princeton to contact RCMP at 295-6911 or call Crimestoppers.

## Osoyoos welcomes new resort

Osoyoos Indian Band lands will see major construction go ahead this fall on a 92-unit resort. Bellstar Hotels & Resorts, which developed and manages resorts such as Poet's Cove on Pender Island and Mystic Springs Chalets & Hot Springs in Canmore, Alberta, plans villa and suite style resort accommodation with spa, restaurant, meeting and retreat facilities, a large pool with water features throughout the site, beach access, and water sports centre on a site overlooking Lake Osoyoos, vineyards and desert. Guest will have access to a "desert links" style nine-hole executive golf course immediately adjacent to the resort.

The new resort will be named Spirit Ridge Vineyard Resort & Spa. It is adjacent to Nk'mip Cellars and Desert Heritage Visitor Centre.

A referendum among Osoyoos

Indian Band members in May gave a positive response to the project, which could eventually see 300 accommodation units. A long-term land lease and resort development agreement paves the way for the \$12.5 resort.

Chief Clarence Louie of Osoyoos Indian Band stated, "The lands upon which Spirit Ridge Vineyard Resort & Spa will be built are some of the most beautiful lands in the entire Okanagan. We are proud of this development on the Osoyoos Band's lands and look forward to working with Bellstar to make this resort one of the most successful in the Okanagan."

The resort is expected to have 20,000 visitors a year and generate 50 new jobs.

Vacation property ownerships will be available at Spirit Ridge one a quarter-share basis starting at less than \$40,000.

### UNDERSTANDING RISK INVESTING - Part 1

Risk is one of those four-letter words that most investors try to avoid, particularly when it comes to their portfolios. Because although risk does not necessarily mean that you're going to lose all your money, it's this image that often springs to mind when the subject is first broached. Having said that, it's impossible to completely eliminate risk since all investments carry some degree of it. The key to being a successful investor is to determine the level of risk that you are prepared to tolerate, and then invest accordingly. But before doing this, you need to understand risk and the various forms in which it can appear. Broadly speaking, risk is the possibility that the expected return on your investment may not be fully realized. This includes the possibility that you may lose some principal.

However, there are five categories of risk you need to consider when assessing an investment:

- **Inflation Risk:** The danger that rising prices will reduce the purchasing power and real rate of return on your investment over time.
- **Interest Rate Risk:** The possibility that a rise in interest rates may dictate a drop in the value of your investments.
- **Economic Risk:** The danger that a downturn in the economy, or other significant economic event, will depress the value of your investments by reducing earnings capabilities.

"The games will include a Pepper Toss and a Pepper Race."

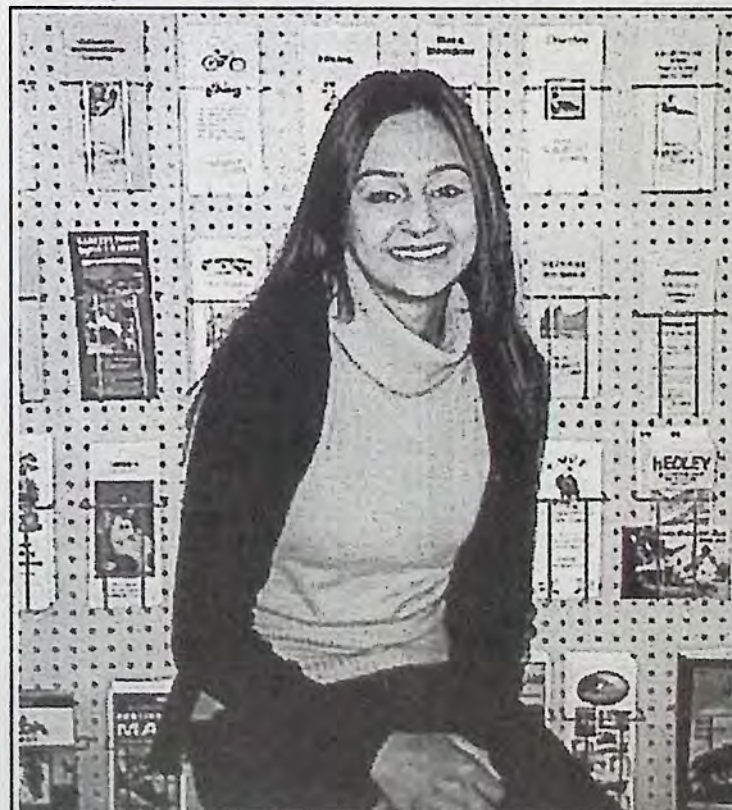
Vendors and artisans are invited to display their wares throughout the day and Egli says Princeton area vendors are included in the invitation to participate.

## Zero interest may not be the best deal

The Better Business Bureau of Mainland BC has some advice about zero-percent financing. They are not always the best deal. The Bureau suggests you check offers carefully.

Zero-percent financing means you pay no interest for the entire term of the loan. For some consumers that might be true, but most buyers may not even be eligible to take advantage of the offer. Often, in order to qualify for the offer, customers must have impeccable credit and sometimes the offer is restricted to a particular models, brand or style and with limited terms. Often, zero-percent financing is only good for short loan terms, which increases the monthly payment, making the offer unaffordable for some buyers.

\*Plan ahead. Take a careful look at your personal financial situation - your income, expenses and debts - to determine whether you can afford to make the monthly payments without putting too much stress on your budget.

\*Do some homework. Compare prices and quality of the merchandise. Make sure you are getting the best possible price.

\*Read the fine print. At some stores, zero interest may apply to certain products but not others, and for different periods. Merchants sometimes require the purchases to be placed on their credit card. Be sure to read the sales agreement and make sure you understand and agree

with all items before you sign. \* Check out the company with Better Business Bureau.

Keep in mind that credit costs money. While delayed payment plans allow you to purchase what you need or want when you do not have the cash up

front, you usually end up paying more for the merchandise when you buy on time.

## Living Past 100

### Chrome is not just for cars

Would you believe you need a little chrome in your body? We are not talking artificial limbs, we are talking about the essential nutrient "chromium". Research suggests this essential mineral plays a critical role in maintaining blood sugar levels, which may reduce the risk of diabetes. For at least 35 years, chromium levels have been linked to heart disease and diabetes. It is estimated that approximately 90 percent of us do not consume enough of this mineral found in broccoli, mushrooms, Brewer's yeast, raisins, apples, whole grains, prunes, oranges and grape juice.

Several years ago, an American researcher, Dr. Richard Anderson, stated chromium deficiency may be partly responsible for the rising rates of adult-onset diabetes. Anderson says 80 to 90 percent of people who have mild difficulty regulating their blood sugar improve after taking 200 mcg. of chromium daily. Chromium forms part of a compound called Glucose Tolerance Factor, which seems to make insulin more efficient at moving sugar from the blood to the cells where it is used for energy.

In several studies done in the United States, chromium deficiency was associated with the build-up of plaque that clogs blood vessels. Studies indicated adequate chromium may help lower cholesterol levels. A study of people with high cholesterol found that after just one month on 200 mcg. of chromium per day, the "bad" LDL cholesterol reduced and the heart-protective "good" HDL cholesterol increased.

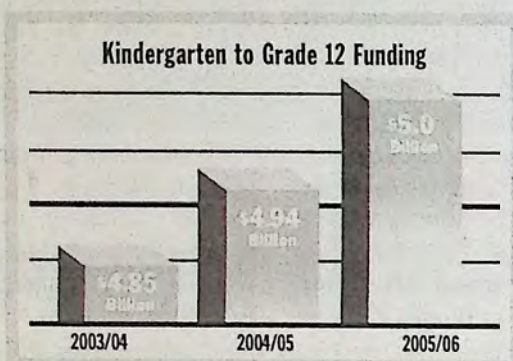
In other studies, adequate chromium appeared to increase muscle mass and promoted loss of body fat. While muscle mass and strength increased, those on the 72 day study also lost an average of four pounds of body fat.

Warning: high sugar consumption depletes the amount of chromium in the body. So, the apple a day does keep the doctor away, especially if you back up the apple with broccoli, mushrooms, raisins, grape juice, oranges, and Brewer's yeast.

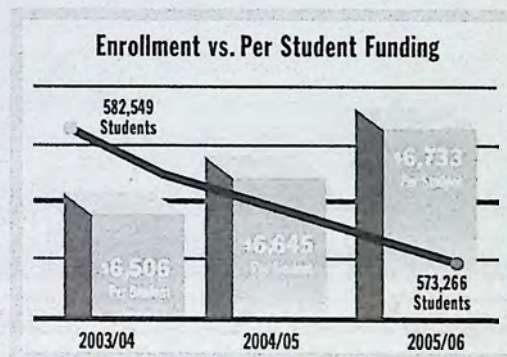

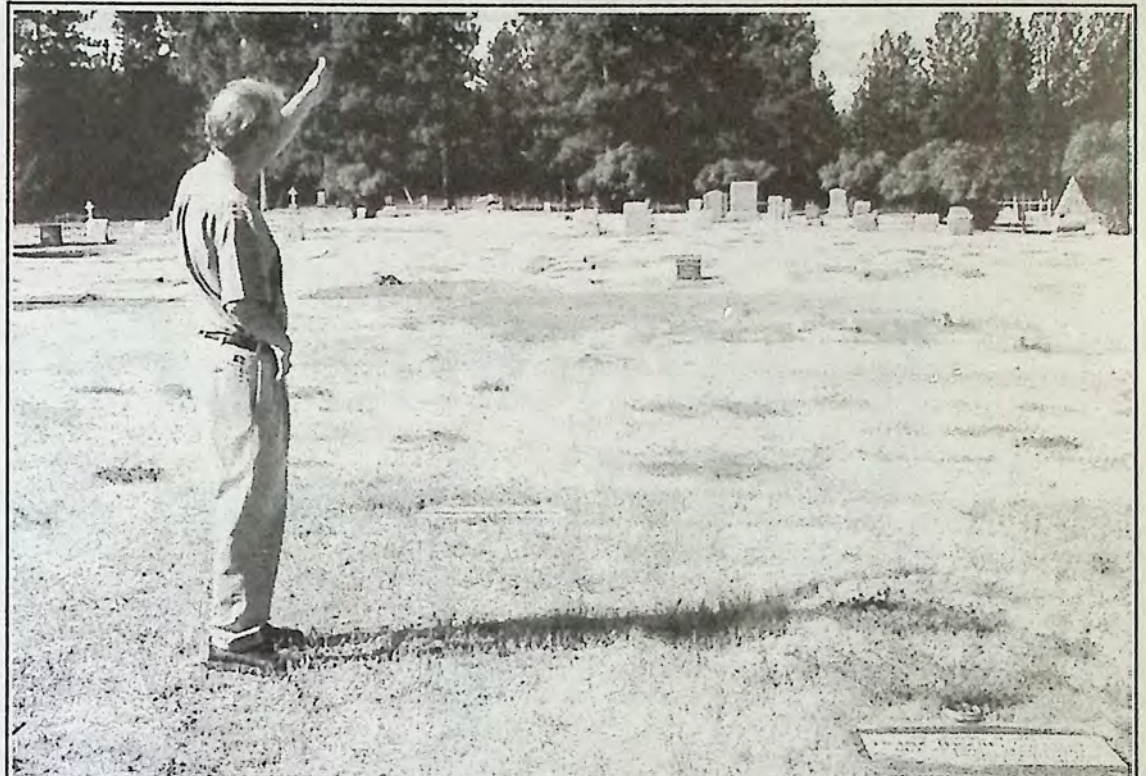

## Nick Mills faces grave situation

When Nick Mills joined Princeton Museum and Archives Society last year, he had no idea he would become the man who knows Princeton's graveyard better than anybody else. He is now a cemetery resource person and archives researcher.

Mills, an immigrant from England, discovered there were a lot of museum visitors who wanted to know where their ancestors or other family members were buried. The archives had no quick reference database with which their questions could be answered.

Working with the cooperation of Town of Princeton, Mills began to compile the needed database. When it was completed, he put his information into the museum's computer so it is readily accessible. His next step was to obtain the records from the mortuary and cross-reference. To his dismay, he discovered there are names missing. With the help of Alexandria Smith, the cross-referencing is being done and information verified on both lists. In addition, he is compiling a database of people who lived and died in Princeton and were buried elsewhere.

Nick Mills has maps of the cemetery. As we went through Princeton Cemetery, (most of

Mills is a volunteer, and chuckles about how he became so involved in researching. At the same time, he finds the project quite demanding, despite his dedication. ## Washington and B.C. agree to save watershed

The Similkameen Valley will be affected by an agreement signed between to environmental groups. On June 24, Byron Louis of the Okanagan Nation Alliance and Joe Peone of the Confederated Tribes of Colville Reservation announced an agreement between their organizations to collaborate on recovery of fish and wildlife across the US-Canada border. Recovery of sockeye, Chinook and steelhead, in particular, will provide the basis for restoring their salmon fishing rights and the public fishing economy derived from the Okanagan and the Upper Columbia River watersheds.

The first step will lead watershed planning in cooperation with Northwest Power and Conservation Council, fisheries agencies and the public in BC

and Washington. The Okanagan watershed or sub-basin plans will include fish, wildlife and their ecosystems, encompassing the entire watershed and community values on both sides of the border. A public sub-basin plan will be completed by May 2004, and will be updated regularly with partners. In addition, formal salmon recovery planning will begin next year, linking the US Endangered Species Act with the new Canadian Species at Risk Act to formulate cooperative recovery plans for endangered and threatened species that live in the Okanagan in both BC and Washington.

A vision of Colville-Okanagan sub-basin planning effort is to make the Okanagan a *model international watershed* to Continued next page .....

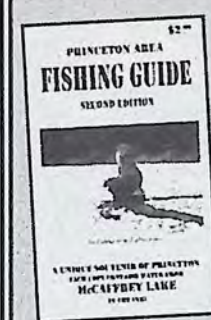

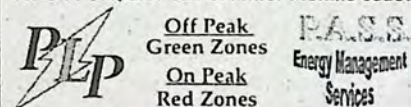

demonstrate successful cooperation among and between US and Canadian agencies in trans-boundary watershed planning in the Pacific Northwest. The results would include:

- \* creating a legacy project including a permanent fish and wildlife data clearing-house among US and Canadian scientists, interests and local stewardship groups working in the Okanagan River by 2004;

- \* building cooperative salmon recovery plans, focusing on Okanagan salmon habitat restoration, into the Pacific Salmon Treaty by 2009, and

- \* developing tools and policies for normalizing fish flows in the Okanagan River through the International Joint Commission by 2013.

### Background for Similkameen

There have been no salmon in the Similkameen watershed in hun-

dreds of years, but Similkameen River water is essential to the amount of water flowing into the Okanagan River in Washington, the temperature of the water in the Okanagan River, and the characteristics of the Similkameen River water (salmon returning to spawn detect correct location through specific differences in the kind of water in a location they are seek-

ing). The Similkameen River flows into the Okanagan River at Tonasket, Washington.

The Okanagan River system is part of the greater Columbia River Basin. Prior to 1900, the number of salmon in the Columbia fed hundreds of thousands of people year round. Today, the number would sustain less than 1/25 of that number.

### Olympics, ho!

So ..... British Columbia is going to host Winter Olympics 2010. While thousands cheered in Vancouver, people in the Interior of the province were noticeably unimpressed with the news. We naturally wonder what it will do for us. Northern communities will see the Olympics as just one more plum for the south coast, with good reason. It is doubtful northern communities will enjoy either tourism or other benefits as the world flocks to southern B.C. for the Olympics.

One of the great things about the announcement as to who will host the 2010 Winter Olympics was the news coverage putting British Columbia at the top of the news around the world. Free publicity and international endorsement is always a good thing.

We have seven years to prepare for the event, and there is no doubt we taxpayers will pay the way right up to the last moment. One television station was quick to point out how Montreal lost money on the Summer Olympics and is still paying for facilities. At the same time, this station reported the profit-making when Calgary hosted the Winter Olympics in 1988 and has enjoyed the great new winter sports facilities for the past fifteen years.

The Winter Olympics in 2010 may turn out to be a great thing for southern British Columbia, and especially for the Vancouver area. Let's hope we can see the money spread around "liberally" in the Legacy Now program so all of us benefit in the future.

One of the other things we would like to see is more support for minor sports so minor ball, minor hockey and figure skating clubs do not have to scramble for donations so they can give our youngest athletes their first step on the road to future Olympics. We were, at one time, led to believe BC/49 was going to provide a lot of money for youth sports, but we have yet to see much cash in local coffers. Let's make noises about the cash flow now.

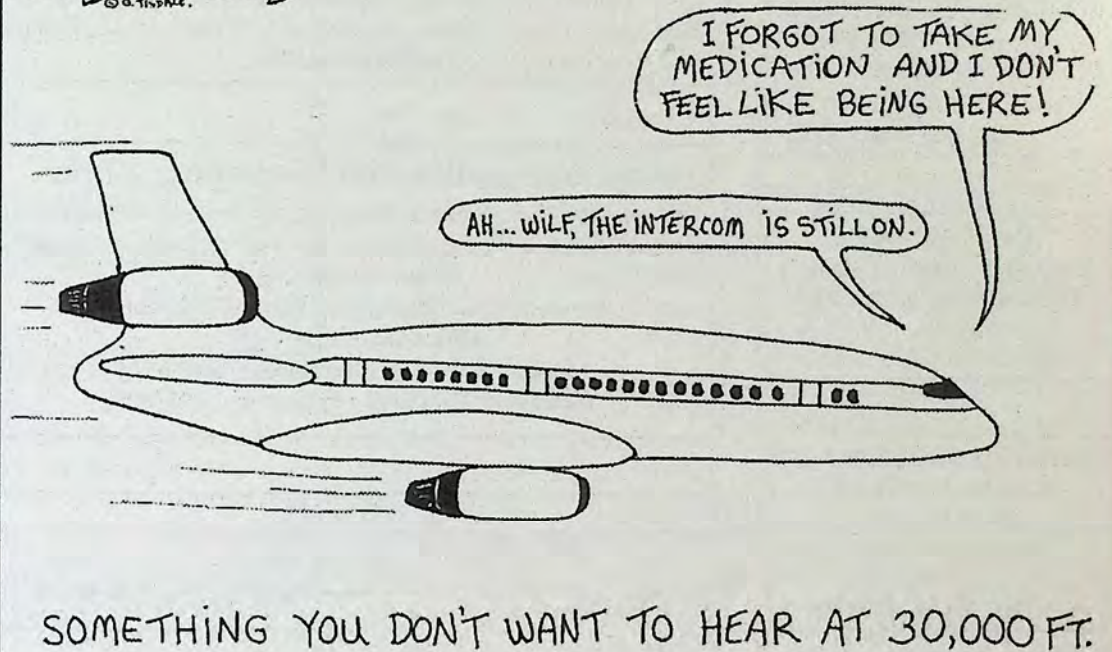

# I believe we could do some improvements

A few weeks ago, I wrote in this column about an idea from a friend of mine. She suggested people write to me and give positive, constructive changes they would like to see in Princeton. As nobody responded, I feel

sure everybody must be quite satisfied with things as they are.

I am not as satisfied as they. For one thing, I would like to see some big improvements made in Cenotaph Park. It looks shabbier every year. I would like to see some planters with benches attached so people had more seating. The bed race and stick horse spectators would have appreciated a few more places to sit.

Younger trees should be planted in the park. Those big old trees are wonderful, but they are now nearly 80 years old. It is time to plant a new crop.

My other positive suggestion is that local drivers review a driver's test. Nearly every day, somebody makes an illegal left turn into Vermilion Avenue from Bridge Street. These drivers have

forgotten the meaning of the "no left turn" glyph on the sign.

When I learned to drive, the book said a driver should stop the vehicle before the stop sign. Nearly every day, I see drivers approaching the stop sign on Tulameen Avenue leading to the wooden bridge. It is amazing how many of them roll right past the stop sign. It is strange, too, because one's view of traffic approaching the bridge from Bridge Street is much better from behind the stop sign than past it.

Another really annoying habit of local drivers (and others) is their bad habit when coming off the bridge on Highway 3 and waiting until the last minute before putting on their turn signal to show they are going into Bridge Street. Can't they make up their minds sooner, or are they hoping for other options?

Finally, in the way of a positive suggestion for all businesses and the town in general, I would like to see fewer weeds growing out of the sidewalks. You can say it is the Town's responsibility, or the landlord's, but the weeds reflect on all of us. It does not take much to get rid of them, a couple of minutes with a pen knife, but it makes a difference. Why buy expensive flower baskets to hang, and then let the weeds grow? It doesn't make sense.

So there are my positive suggestions - a nicer park, better drivers, and no weeds.

Surely other people notice other things?

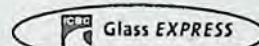

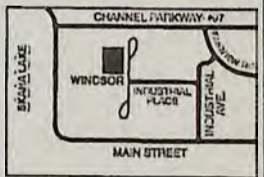
