Legion awards highest honour

Surprise birthday party honours Maria Sadegur

The highest honour any Legion member can receive is the Meritorious Service Medal. On July 19, Maria Sadegur received this medal.

The occasion was a surprise 60th birthday party arranged by her husband, Bud, and kept secret by more than 80 local residents (a rare thing in a small town). Maria's family and friends gathered to wish her well, and to see her presented with the medal.

BC & Yukon Honours and Awards Chair, Ed Finlater, pinned the medal on Sadegur after reading the commendation from Pacific Command and from Royal Canadian Legion Branch #56.

Prior to the presentation, Bud

Sadegur gave a power point presentation of Maria's life, from her birth in Holland to the present. The memorabilia covered many of the things Maria had done to earn the Meritorious Service Award. This prestigious medal is given in recognition of service to the Legion and to the community. A 30-year member of the Legion, Maria Sadegur served on the Executive Committee, chaired many committees, organized bonspiels, barbecues, golf tournaments, Remembrance Day services, floats in the Racing Days parades, and carried the flag in Legion marches on many occasions. She served as Legion President three times.

New season for bow hunting

The new hunting regulations have been published and one of the changes for Princeton area is a late season for bow hunting. Archery hunting will be permitted from November 25 to December 10 for mule deer bucks (any) and white tailed deer, either sex.

The combined bag limit for deer, including the regular rifle season and the archery season, is two

deer. The deer may be one mule deer and one white-tailed, or two white-tailed, one of each sex.

Bow hunters may begin on September 1 through September 9. Then rifle season begins on September 10 through November 10 for all deer.

The moose hunting season is

September 10 - October 31.

Elk season (six point or better) is September 25 - October 20.

Bear hunting is permitted September 1 - November 30. The bag limit is two bears.

The cost of big game hunting licences has increased this year to \$34.24. The price of tags remains the same.

Hunting regulations and licences are available at Princeton Outdoor Supply and the Government Agent office in the Court House.

Tophey Hanna, who contacted the companies providing the entertainment equipment, was pleased to be able to make a contract with the companies.

The chuckwagons are coming for chuckwagon races, and the Fall Fair will be looking for sponsors. Any company willing to sponsor a chuckwagon should be aware the sponsor signs that go on the chuckwagons are the responsibility of the sponsor.

There will be a demolition derby, mud bog demonstrations and Tuff

Live music in the form of bands will be featured in the evening.

Some people have Fall Fair tee

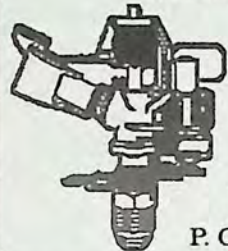

Don Mare told members he will do a portable sawmill demonstration in front of the grandstand. He wondered if anyone with a chainsaw would join the demonstration.

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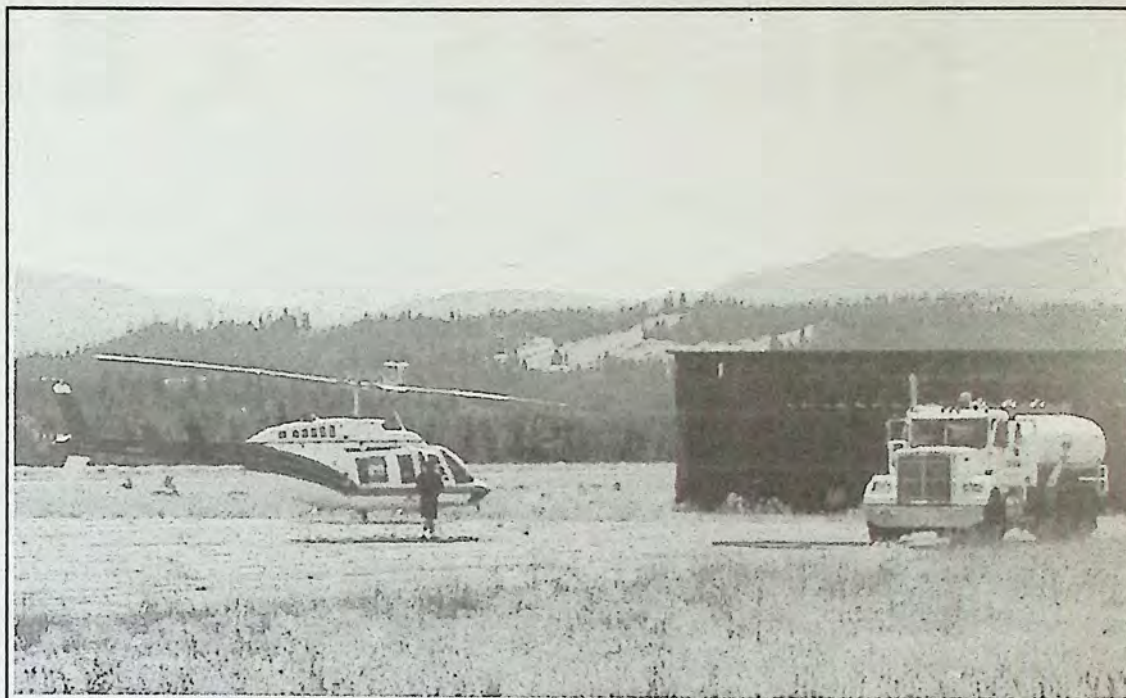


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Princeton Airport was the refueling and repair site during the fire at Garrison Lakes.

Local fire did not cause all of the smoke

The forest fire that began July 14 is believed to be the result of an abandoned campfire which was not properly extinguished. The blaze covered 20 hectares Monday evening and expanded to more than 50 hectares by Tuesday afternoon.

The fire was located near Garrison Lakes, in the upper Whipsaw area west of Sunday Summit. Due to prevailing winds, it expanded northeast, fed by old spruce and bug killed trees. There was a lot of fuel on the ground as well as the standing dead trees. It had a lot of potential for rapid expansion.

Helicopter crews filled water buckets at Garrison Lakes, between refueling stops as Princeton airport. Initially, BC Forest Service hoped to contain the fire through bucket drops.

Air tankers became involved early in the fire spread and continued the following day. A ground crew of 25 firefighters on Monday at the outbreak of the fire climbed to 61 by Tuesday. Heavy equipment and four helicopters were on the job Tuesday morning supporting the air tankers.

By Wednesday afternoon, the fire was 90 percent contained. At the same time, smoke from a fire in Washington, just eight kilometres south of Manning Park, sent clouds of smoke past the Copper Mountain area, and it looked like another local fire. A large fire burning in Osoyoos and a fire near Omak added to the smoke clouds. Some Osoyoos residents were evacuated for a day due to fast-moving fire pushed by wind.

Interior Health issued a smoke warning for those with respiratory problems.

- * if conditions are expected to become worse, or remain poor a long time, consider relocating until the smoke clears.

She served as Deputy Zone Commander, and joined the contingent of Legion members who went to Holland on the 50th anniversary of VE Day. She served as Poppy Fund Chair, and on many occasions, helped the Ladies Auxiliary with catering.

In addition to the many years of service to the Legion, Sadegur gave generously of her time and energy to the community. One of the projects she is devoted to is the BC & Yukon Heart and Stroke Foundation. She has been Chair of

the Heart Month campaign for many years, organizing volunteers and a Heart Fund Dinner. She represented Princeton at Heart & Stroke Foundation conferences. She was instrumental in bringing the Big Bike to Princeton to raise funds, and it was successful. In 1996, she received the Heart of Gold award as top BC Heart & Stroke Foundation volunteer of the year.

Sadegur chaired the Youth Ambassador program with Arlene Marsel (also a Heart Fund volunteer).

Hope RCMP nab growers

Princeton's small war on drugs appears to have spread to Hope. Hope RCMP are busy slowing the drug traffic in their area. A week after nabbing a vehicle and driver transporting marijuana on the Coquihalla Highway, they entered a large property north of Hope to do a search. On July 15, they arrested two men and a woman operating a grow operation in a large warehouse. The warehouse contained three industrial trailers

and from inside these trailers, police seized 1447 marijuana plants in three stages of growth. Numerous grow equipment items were seized and the arrested persons were held in custody pending a court appearance in Chilliwack the following day.

Those arrested were Dennis Castillo, age 25, of no fixed address, Carol Mae Robio, age 32, of Hope, and Milton Bernhard, age 62, of Vancouver.

In 1986, Sadegur spearheaded a campaign Princeton has never forgotten. She worked at Overweitea, and saw a youngster with a facial disfigurement. The two-year-old had hemangioma, as disorder that is not only disfiguring, but dangerous. He needed surgery which could be performed only in Toronto. His young parents had no assets to speak of and did not know how they would cover the cost of the family going to Toronto. Maria stepped in to solve the problem. Working with George Elliott of the radio station, she launched a campaign that raised over \$100,000, and Christopher Carter had his surgery.

In 1993, Maria (Walman) Sadegur received Princeton's highest award when she was designated Woman of the Year by the Chamber of Commerce.

Legion Branch #56 President Bob Paterson expressed everyone's feelings when he gave congratulations on behalf of the Branch, and said, "Nobody deserves it more."

Visitor numbers climb this year

The Visitor Information Centre is in a new location this year – the new Chamber of Commerce building just east of the bridge on Highway 3. It opened March 1, and visitor information statistics showed an immediate increase over last year. March 2003 showed 539 visitors compared with 331 in 2002. In April, the same trend showed again – 788 in 2003 compared with 407 in 2002. May's numbers jumped to 1,398 compared with 836 the previous year, and June's numbers were definitely double – 2,387 compared with 1,139.

There is a great selection of informational brochures on local businesses, especially on those pertaining to recreational facilities and accommodation.

Most people come into the Visitor Information Centre looking for maps or travel information, but there are a large number looking for things to do, places to hike, and places to see. The couple shown in the photo above have four children, and they like to go camping. They wanted information on the location of lakes along Highway 5A, where campsites were located, and which were good for family camping.

Although the visitor numbers are increasing, they are still not comparable to the peak year, 1994, when a total of 40,688 visitors were recorded at the local centre.

Any local person who has visitors coming is welcome to go to the Visitors Information Centre

to pick up maps of the local area, discover accommodation information, find details on local attractions, local activities, and information on the Trans Canada Trail, other hiking trails, local lakes, and historical sites.

If you know anyone planning to visit the area, and you would like to give them a preview, and perhaps help them plan what they would like to do when they arrive here, the staff at the Visitor Information Centre can give you advice on what your visitors may enjoy seeing or doing.

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UNDERSTANDING RISK INVESTING - Part 2

Risk is one of those four-letter words that most investors try to avoid, particularly when it comes to their portfolios. Because although risk does not necessarily mean that you're going to lose all your money, it's this image that often springs to mind when the subject is first broached. Having said that, it's impossible to completely eliminate risk since all investments carry some degree of it. The key to being a successful investor is to determine the level of risk that you are prepared to tolerate, and then invest accordingly. But before doing this, you need to understand risk and the various forms in which it can appear. Broadly speaking, risk is the possibility that the expected return on your investment may not be fully realized. This includes the possibility that you may lose some principal.

In "Understanding Risk Investing - Part 1" Inflation Risk, Interest Risk and Economic Risk were discussed. Here are the remaining two categories:

- **Market Risk:** The possibility that events in the market itself may have an adverse effect on the value of your investments.
- **Specific Risk:** Relates more directly to the individual investment itself. It covers such elements as new technology making a certain firm's products obsolete, or greater competition reducing earning capabilities.

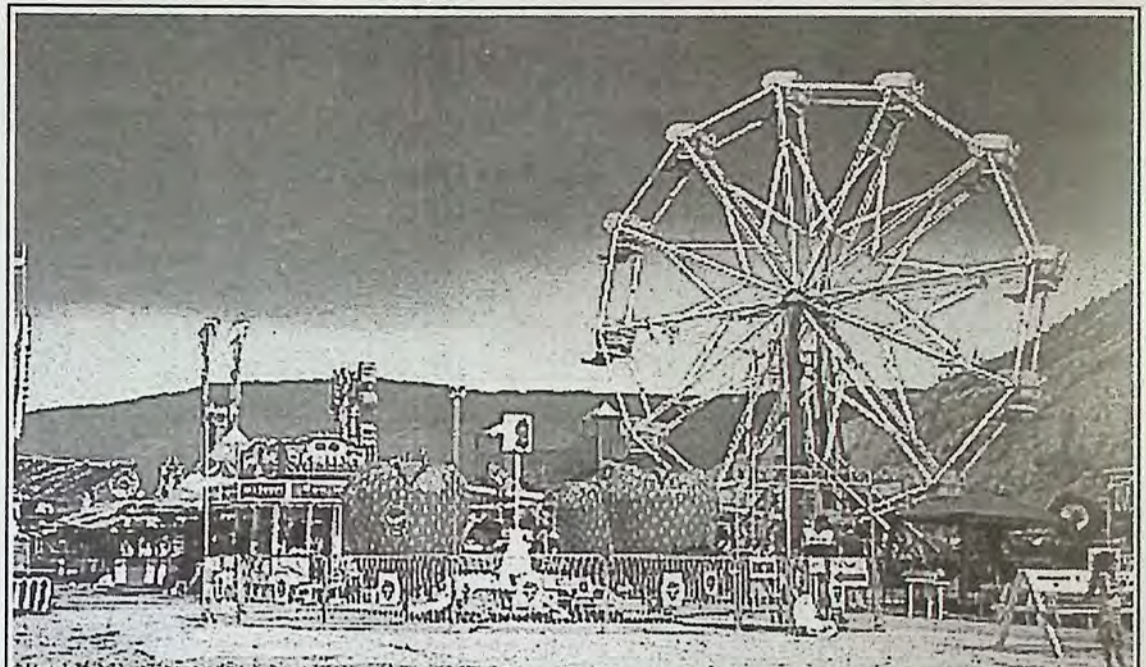

Parking lot becomes campsite

What was once a large gravel parking lot is now Miller's Retreat, an 11-site RV and tenting campground.

The site officially opened quietly on Canada Day weekend and business has been good.

"It's picking up," says Grist Mill Manager Gwen Coates. "We think it'll get better."

The campground, which does not have a sani-dump, has full water hook-ups and 15 or 30 amp electrical service.

There are also on-site hosts Joan and Doug Ritchie, who will provide information and security for visitors.

"They will provide a visible presence, particularly in the evening."

The location of the campground, alongside Keremeos Creek, has its advantages says Coates. "It's off the highway, which to me is the key."

Provisions have been made to provide access to washroom facilities

at the Grist Mill after regular business hours with separate entrances.

Rates are \$15 for tenting, \$21 and \$24 for 15 amp or 30 amp power.

Coates says the campground is part of the plan to make the his-

toric site more multi-use in nature without spoiling local heritage.

It also enhances the experience for travellers, "Here you will hear the creek not highway traffic and if I'm travelling that's what I'm looking for after a long day on the road."

The Tourist InfoCentre located in Memorial Park, and operated by Similkameen Country, has been a very busy place.

Charanjit Gill, one of the summer students greeting visitors at the InfoCentre, says just over 700 enquires have been made to date.

From the period between June 23rd and July 16th, there were 723 parties recorded with 72 the most recorded in a single day.

Provincial Parks information, local attractions and winery tours

are the top interests of visitors.

"Hiking is very big this year," adds Gill.

The reputation of Similkameen Valley fruit and vegetables is also an attraction for out-of-town visitors.

"A lot of people from Vancouver are looking for u-picks."

Gill says she has seen everything from single travellers and small families up to large busloads already at the tiny InfoCentre.

In an effort to aid travellers in learning more about the area, Similkameen Country is current-

ly developing a members directory on it's 58 members. It will feature accommodations, restaurants and attractions providing contact information and rates.

Gill believes the directory will become an important document, not only for her use during the summer, but for Similkameen Country to attract more members.

The InfoCentre is currently open 9am to 5pm five days a week and will expand it's hours of operation to seven days a week before the end of the month.

For Canadians, Saturday night on the long weekend in August is a great time for a barbecue, and beef is the meat of choice for most Canadians. Here's the recipe for the beer-soaked roast:

combine 1 1/2 cups of ale or lager, 3 cloves of minced garlic, 3/4 cup ketchup, 1/3 cup each of balsamic vinegar and brown sugar, 3 tsp. each Dijon mustard and chili powder. Pour into sealable freezer bag. Pierce meat all over with a fork and put the meat in the bag and refrigerate for 12 to 24 hours. Take the meat out and discard the marinade before grilling or roasting on a rotisserie.

There is a current over-supply of some beef cuts suitable for marinating - marinating and simmering steaks, rotisserie roasts, oven and pot roasts. Buy these cheaper cuts, and try the recipe above, while you join the cross-Canada barbecue.

Chief George Saddleman was elected July 11 as the Chair and spokesperson of Okanagan Nation Alliance. Chief Saddleman is Chief of Upper Nicola Indian Band and replaces Chief Stuart Phillip of Penticton Indian Band as Chair.

Chief Phillip stated, "I have full confidence in Chief Saddleman being entrusted with representing our organization's mandate, including asserting our title and rights and interest on behalf of the Okanagan people."

Chief Saddleman has served as Chief or Council member of Upper Nicola Indian Band from 1972-1996, and was re-elected in 2002, presently serving a two-year term as Chief. He served as Chair of the Nicola Tribal Association from 1990 to 2002. At present he

is a representative on several Boards, and is President of the Interior Salish Employment & Training Society. He serves on the Boards of AHRDA, Shuswap Nation Tribal Council, Fraser Basin Council, Stuwix Resources Ltd. and is associated with several committees with the above-mentioned institutions.

Chief Saddleman balances his political life with being involved with Okanagan Ancestral Beliefs, Values and Instructions, and most importantly, his family. He is the first to admit he has much more to learn from the elders, especially the special relationship to the land.

He is committed to the long hard struggle to bring about fairness, justice and better understanding to others of the Okanagan way of life, culture and love for the land.

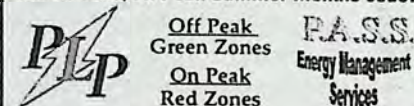

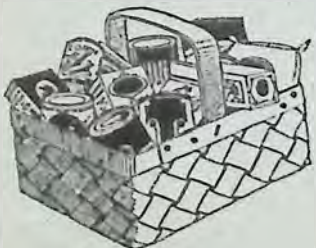

Demon rum and effects of privatization

Dear Editor;

In a largely symbolic act – a harbinger of privatization efforts to come – Ralph Klein's newly elected government in September 1993 announced it was selling off Alberta's lucrative liquor retailing industry. The announcement came without warning, indeed without much thought. Yet, within a year, the roughly 200 red brick Alberta government liquor stores were gone, replaced today by nearly 1,000 private stores, some large, many small, some clean, and far too many run down and seedy.

I was one of four academics who first studied the results of liquor privatization in Alberta. Our report, released in 1994, showed booze was more available, but retail costs and a host of problems related to illegal drinking and criminal activities, mainly break-ins, had increased. Our report also predicted that, in the long run, the Alberta government would lose revenue, consumers would pay more, and that (in effect) the government had sacrificed an efficient public enterprise for a less efficient quasi-monopoly.

In 1995, University of Alberta economist Douglas West released a study, conducted for the Fraser Institute. Though placing greater emphasis on such things as the increased number of liquor items available and the creation of a large number of minimum wage jobs, it was surprisingly congruent with our findings.

More recently, on June 4, the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives and Parkland Institute released *Sobering Result: The Alberta Liquor Retailing Industry*

Ten Years After Privatization. Public finance economist Greg Flanagan provides a comprehensive statistical analysis of the social and economic impacts of liquor privatization. In brief, Flanagan's report shows, despite some increased convenience to consumer, privatization has corresponded (since 1997) with increased liquor consumption by Albertans and a loss of effective control by the government over the industry. The report also argues there are too many liquor stores, leading directly to higher retailing costs and higher prices. Finally, though privatization has resulted throughout the province

in more brands, the number of products available in most stores is actually less than at the previous government stores. This is because most private owners cannot afford to carry anything but the mainstream products – and few in quantity at that. Flanagan's key point is about government revenues. When the Alberta government announced privatization in 1993, it said the process would be "revenue neutral" – the government would continue to bring in the same amount of revenue as in the past. The problem is, it never factored in

Pay attention to federal politics now

Some major changes will take place in Canadian politics in the near future. New leaders in three major parties will be vying to make their party the next government. inflation, population growth, and growth in sales. Moreover, in order to keep consumer prices in Alberta comparable to those in other provinces, the Tories have significantly reduced the province's tax share of the final retail price. In effect, the government has supported and subsidized privatization by foregoing (through reduced revenues) about a half billion dollars since 1994.

What has been the Alberta government's response to Flanagan's report? Caught on camera, Premier Klein simply dismissed it as being the spawn of government critics and suggested the report's writer(s) had spent too much time in liquor stores. Such is the nature of public debate in Alberta.

BC's provincial government, however, might want to pay closer attention. Flanagan's findings have been buttressed by another independent study of the costs of liquor in Alberta under privatization.

The Alberta government is unlikely to admit its mistake anytime soon. After all, the Klein government hasn't admitted it made an error with power deregulation either, even though prices for electricity are now the highest in Canada. But it's not too late for BC to take a sober second look at liquor privatization.

have been a better, more reliable world. Certainly, when they were young, there was greater political stability in the world.

Politics, in Canada and elsewhere, has been under the control of big business to a large extent. The fact that we live in a democracy does not alter the instinct of most politicians to feather their own nests first. This trend will no doubt continue unless we elect people of remarkable honesty and ethics.

What will change will be the result of seeing our world in a different light. In recent years, there has been a struggle between Canadian trade interests and American trade interests. To most Canadians, it has been admirable the way Ralph Klein has gone after the United States to open the border once more to Canadian beef. He wasted no time pushing the federal government to act. We can only wish the federal government had acted so swiftly and with such determination on the softwood lumber issue.

There is another aspect of politics that will likely change due to the behaviour of some of the elected representatives of non-ruling government. We see them going back to the people who elected them and finding out what people want. Ottawa is a long way from western Canada, and we have a lot of issues of concern that Ottawa does not seem good at addressing. Softwood lumber is just one example. Salmon stock recovery is another (the feds cut back money in salmon recovery). Yet, due to an outbreak of SARS and lack of

tourism in Toronto, the feds immediately offered relief. This can only lead us to the conclusion that Toronto has a stronger grip on Ottawa's chain and knows how to pull harder. Will this change with a different group in power?

The next federal election will be a turning point for Canada if Canadians make choices that will turn the nation. We have to decide what we want, and we have to pay attention to what politicians are saying and doing. Further, we have to tell them what we want.

Some people do not believe our votes will make any difference, but politicians learned a lot of lessons in the 1990s. Canadian voters clobbered the Conservatives after Mulroney's government. The rise of the Canadian Alliance (Reform Party) was a direct result of anti-Mulroney sentiment.

In British Columbia, we drove Social Credit into the ground, and then did the same thing to NDP. Other provinces experienced similar turnarounds in politics and power, and found out the biggest power in the country still resides in voters' hands (at least until the election is over).

In the good old summertime in Canada, nobody wants to think about politics, but we need to start looking at our options and thinking about what we want. Governments do not give us much time to make up our minds after calling an election. Perhaps they are afraid we might inform ourselves too well if they let us think too long.

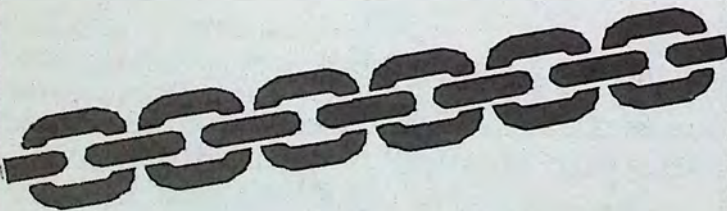

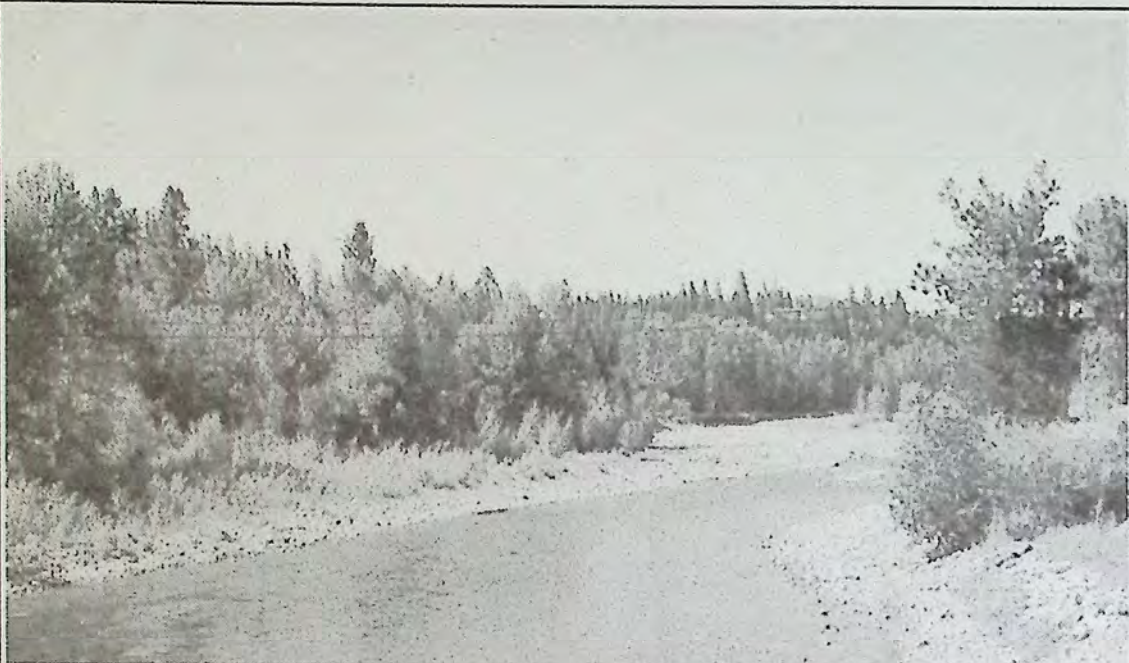

Are we facing water shortage?

All of the water sources in the upper Similkameen Valley are at levels below normal for this time of year. The high country, which is the source of snow-melt water, has little snow left. The Three Brothers Mountains, which are a rough gauge of snow remaining,

are almost totally black now, following our recent weeks of high temperatures.

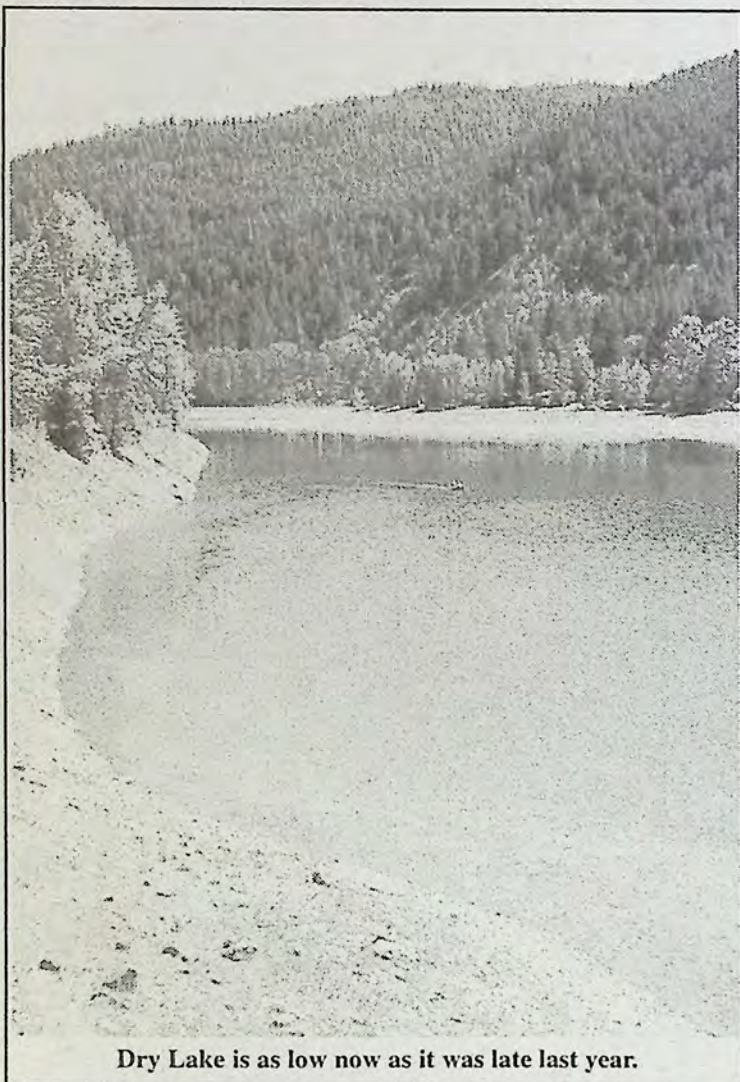
Typically, our two driest months are yet to come. August and September generally have the least rain, and consequently we have the lowest levels of water.

River levels depend on lakes during those months. This year, the lakes are lower than normal for this time of year.

Dry Lake, part of the chain of lakes along Highway 5A north of Princeton, has not recovered from last year's extremely low levels. Areas of the lake which showed a red-brown tone of exposed lake bottom are now growing grass, a clear indication the lake level did not recover at all this year.

Other lakes are showing lower than normal water levels, and the creeks flowing from these lakes are showing a rapid decrease in water flow.

People depending on well water have not reported decreases to date, but we may be looking at a declining water table by the end of August, if not sooner, if our normal rainfall pattern holds for the next month.

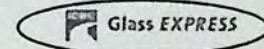
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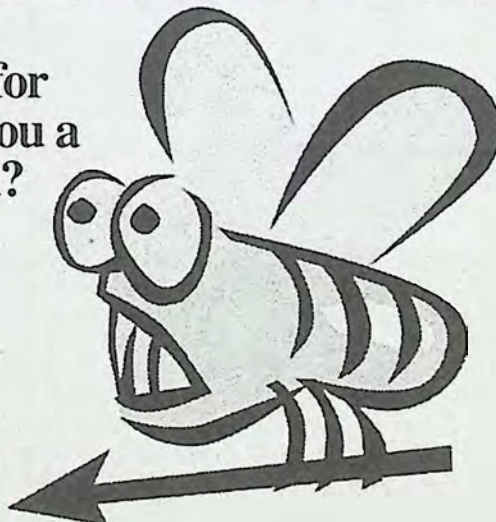
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Interior Health issues rabies warning

Rabies is caused by a virus which can be spread by the bite of an infected animal. It causes severe neurological symptoms, with respiratory failure. Without immunization, rabies is **always fatal**.

In B.C., bats are the only animals known to be potentially infected with rabies. About 1 in 200 bats is positive for rabies. However, if bats get sick with rabies, they are more likely to come into contact with humans and their pets. Up to 1 out of every ten bats sent for testing are positive for rabies.

A person who has been exposed to rabies and **has not yet** shown symptoms can be vaccinated against the disease. When the health unit is made aware of a possible exposure, an investigation is done to find out the details. In Interior Health last year, 163 such investigations were made, involving 83 bats and 80 other animals (including cats and dogs – Interior Health does not take chances that it will not show up in other animals). Of these, 93 recommendations were made to vaccinate! (About 41 were actually vaccinated in Interior Health Region – the rest were vaccinated elsewhere or refused.)

* If you find a bat (or any other dead wildlife) **do not touch it**

* If you are certain that no animals or humans have come in contact

with a dead bat, you can pick it up with a shovel and bury it in two feet of soil, or, wearing thick gardening gloves, invert two plastic bags over your hand, pick up the bat, bag it and put it in the garbage

* If a human or animal has come into contact with the bat, or you have awakened to find one in your bedroom, contact your public health unit immediately

* Keep screens in good condition on your windows and doors

* vaccinate your cat and dog against rabies

* **Teach your children** not to touch bats or any dead animals

* If you have bats in your attic or outbuildings, contact a pest control professional.

In B.C. we have 16 species of bats. There are about 900 species worldwide. Bats are valuable animals and are protected by law. However, they are wild animals and we need to have a healthy respect for them and keep our distance.

Please note: Rodents carry hanta virus, for which there is no vaccine and a 75 percent mortality rate. Avoid any place where dead rodents are found, and do not tolerate rodents in your residence or outbuildings.

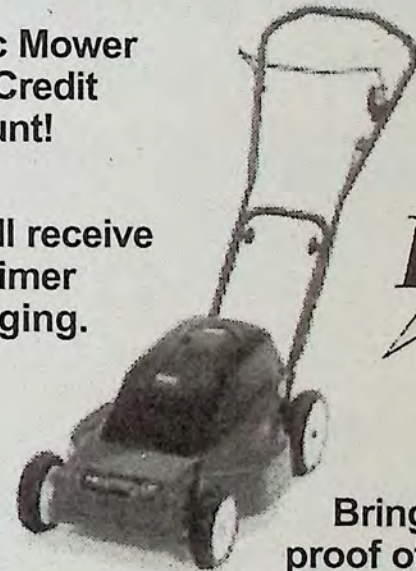
