Mid-air smash-up wrecks two

Five planes crash in weekend meet

Five planes were lost in the Canadian National Precision Aerobatics (Pattern Flying) competition held last weekend at Princeton Airport. Two were lost in a mid-air collision and three due to technical problems.

The aircraft were propeller driven planes specifically designed for flying patterns. Some of the pilots build their own planes, which cost about \$500 to make (not including motor and remote control set). Planes are valued up to \$5,000. A plane for sale at the competition was selling for \$2,700.

The event drew 31 competitors from B.C., Alberta, and Saskatchewan, who braved the merciless heat and increasing smoke during the two-day competition. Local Girl Guides provided refreshments and canopies helped with shade.

The competition involves flying remote controlled aircraft in patterns specified for the event. Each pilot flies his plane six times, and the best four out of six determine the winner.

Trophies were awarded in five different levels of skills – Sportsman,

Intermediate, Advanced, Expert, and Federation Aeronautics International (ready for world competitions). The meet was considered a success.

One dies in Keremeos plane crash

One person died when a light plane crashed in a residential area in Keremeos on Saturday morning. The plane went down near the corner of Vanderlinde and Second, near Similkameen Elementary Secondary School, narrowly missing a house. Keremeos Fire Department attended. The name of the deceased has not been released at press time.

Keremeos faces fire danger

Keremeos residents can expect more fallout from the fire burning south of the border. Residents of Keremeos have already experienced fly ash dropping into the Similkameen Valley from this fire. The problem is likely to become much worse.

Village of Keremeos officials, Mayor Walter Despot and Regional Directors from Areas B and G met with officials from Kamloops Fire Centre on Wednesday, July 23, to discuss plans for setting up an Emergency Information Centre and an Emergency Response team. The fire south of the border is eating up 5,000 acres a day and is heading for Cathedral Park. By Monday morning, it covered nearly 70,000

acres. Fire Centre personnel estimate the fire will cover 200,000 acres by September.

Bob Lafleur learned "trees are literally exploding out of the ground" from the intense heat in the burning forest.

Ranchers in the Keremeos area have been warned to assemble cattle ranging on the plateau south of the Similkameen River in preparation for a likely evacuation notice. Notices were posted warning hikers and campers of the probability of smoke hazard in the Ashnola Valley and Cathedral Park areas.

American firefighting authorities say there is no way they can stop the fire. Water bombers will be used to prevent loss of build-

ings, but that is the best they can do due to the ferocity and velocity of the fire.

Preparations were begun in Keremeos to locate a fire camp in next few weeks if needed.

Provincial Emergency Program headquarters will be used for an information center, and Bob Stanley is in charge of organizing for the emergency. Currently, Stanley is looking at two locations, one along the highway and the other at the rodeo grounds.

An additional concern has arisen. **Continued on Page 4**

RCMP promise "zero tolerance" during Tulameen Family Days weekend

The annual Tulameen Family Fun Days happens this weekend. This event features the Tulameen Triathlon, a ball tournament, a parade, barbecue, horseshoe tournament and lots of fun for kids.

Sgt. Kurt Lozinski of Princeton RCMP Detachment says police will take a "zero tolerance" approach toward public drunkenness and/or persons consuming alcohol in non-licensed public places. Offenders will be charged and all alcohol seized as per the rules and regulations of the Liquor Control and Licensing Act.

In addition to monitoring alcohol consumption, RCMP will be conducting road checks throughout the weekend on all roads around Tulameen. All vehicle owners are advised the policy of police will be "click it or ticket" as pertains to wearing seatbelts. Police

remind drivers they are responsible for seat belt compliance for anyone under age 16 in the vehicle. All drivers stopped will be checked for alcohol and drug consumption and offenders will be charged.

Tulameen Days creates a higher than usual demand for policing services in the Tulameen area and extra personnel will come in from "E" Division Headquarters, South East District Headquarters, Kelowna Detachment and South Okanagan Traffic Services. The additional personnel will ensure a satisfactory level of service is provided to the entire Princeton Detachment area. Some members may be utilizing all-terrain vehicles, water craft, bicycles and other transportation during their patrols in the area.

"Tulameen Days has been extremely successful in previous years with very minimal policing

concerns being addressed," Sgt. Lozinski stated. "It is anticipated that this year's event will once again be a successful family event."

The weekend begins on Friday evening with a cake decorating contest and the slow pitch tournament. The tournament continues through Monday. The triathlon begins early Saturday morning, with presentation of awards at 1:00 p.m. behind Community Hall while the barbecue is in progress. The horseshoe tournament is on Saturday at noon, behind Community Hall.

The parade begins at 11:15, and anyone planning to enter the parade should go to Strathcona Avenue to line up.

At 1:15 p.m. there will be a Fire Safety concert.

Expect water shortages

A warning was issued in June by Water, Land and Air Protection Ministry stating unless the summer is wetter than normal, water users in the Similkameen may expect water shortages. It is now apparent the summer is not wet at all, and we are advised to use water conservation measures. The Similkameen River dropped to its mid-August depth by July 20.

Snowpacks were far less than normal by mid-June, and due to warmer than normal June temperatures, the snowpack was melting faster than normal.

At the June 21 Town Council meeting, the News Leader asked Councillor Lorne Esselink what contingency plans the Town has if one of the wells fails. He said there are enough wells to ensure a good water supply and there is

always the Tulameen River intake to turn to if there is a water shortage due to wells failing. He appeared confident the Town would not have problems. July 22, Princeton recorded the highest temperature in Canada, and the following day was hotter. Although the official high was 35 degrees Celcius, many residents said they had readings up to 41 degrees on home thermometers.

The fire hazard is extreme in all of the Kamloops fire protection region and a campfire ban was issued for midnight July 23. On

A slight cooling trend on Thursday offered a few clouds and a few degrees lower, but no rain. The long range forecast for this week suggests continuing high temperatures and no rain.

Council endorses 'Christian Churches for Kids Week'

Pastor Esther Donovan, wearing a Love Princeton tee shirt, appeared before Council at the June 21 meeting to tell them about Love Princeton Day - August 9.

Donovan said local churches would, for the second year, sponsor free hot dogs, car washes and face painting at Princeton Plaza for "Love Princeton Day".

"This is the churches' way of saying we're proud to be part of this community," Donovan told Council.

During the week following Love Princeton Day, the churches would again sponsor Vacation Bible School. She asked Council to proclaim the week Christian Churches for Kids Week. Council granted her request.

This is the second year for both these events. Last year, Love Princeton Day was highly successful, with lots of participants, and lots of Love Princeton tee shirts sold. The adventure theme of last year's Bible School drew 80 youngsters from the community. This year, the school will have a country fair theme and will be held at the Country Chapel.

Town honours COPS

The Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General of B.C. sent a request to Town Council for nominations for Crime Prevent Awards.

The Town was invited to nominate any individual, group or program making an outstand-

ing contribution to crime prevention and community safety.

Town Council decided, at the June 21 meeting, to nominate Princeton Citizens on Patrol Society (COPS) for a Crime Prevention Award.

Council rejects Lang park name

George Elliott appeared before Town Council at the June 21 meeting to ask for Council's approval of the name "Karl Lang Memorial Peace Park."

Elliott explained the background of the park, which is planned for the space between Highway 3 and Mayne Avenue near the highway condition overhead sign. Karl Lang saw this area as an eyesore giving a poor impression of Princeton to travellers coming from the west. On the anniversary of the World Trade Towers terrorist attack, he

came up with the idea of a peace park at the corner. The park would offer not only an improved first impression for travellers, but a pleasant place for people to sit or stroll.

Lang died in December 2002, but his plan had been approved by both Council and the Ministry of Transportation. Following his death, friends and people who associated with Lang in various groups decided to carry out his plan. A fund was established, and volunteer work pledged. Princeton

Lions Club offered benches and shrubs.

Elliott concluded his presentation with, "It was his concept and should have his name."

Councillor Kathy Clement voiced opposition. She said she had heard from several citizens who thought the park should be commemorative of people who had been residents of Princeton much longer.

Councillor Ray Jarvis agreed.

Comments were made to the effect that Lang resided in Princeton only five years, and there were others who had been in Princeton much longer who deserved recognition.

Elliott said those longtime residents could be remembered with a bench or fountain in the park. This suggestion did not resolve the issue of the name of the park.

Finally, when Council would not move to approve the name, Councillor Lorne Esselink moved to table the issue and suggested Councillors Jarvis and Clement meet with Elliott to reach a name satisfactory to both. The matter is tabled until Council's next meeting on August 18.

Nishihara's team enters Canada's Hall of Fame

Longtime Princeton resident Harold (Nag) Nishihara, who passed away early this year, did not live to see his baseball team entered into Canada's Baseball Hall of Fame. Nishihara pitched for the Asahi baseball team in Vancouver. This team won all kinds of trophies and honours.

The team roster was made up of young Japanese Canadians. After Pearl Harbour was bombed, the

young men went to prison camps in the Interior of B.C. The Asahi never played as a team again, but the record of this team remains unmatched and it deserves the recognition it has finally received.

Princeton youngsters benefited from Nishihara's skills in baseball as he coached for years in Princeton. He would be so proud today to see "his" beloved team in the Hall of Fame.

On a separate matter, Golovin asked that a street light be installed on Clark Street on a power pole. Council did not approve this request as they felt the light would shine right into a resident's dwelling.

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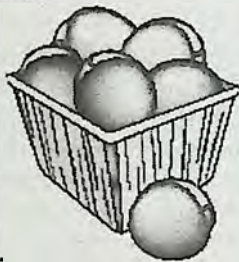


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Respiratory problems?

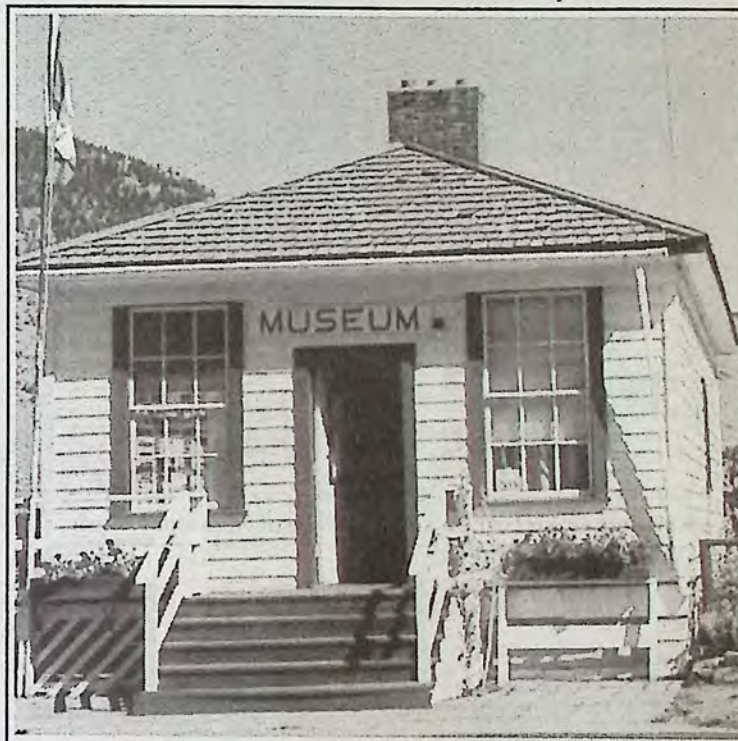

Water problem goes back to Victoria

Village Council and the Board of Directors of Keremeos Irrigation District (KID) are no closer to a deal on who will supply water to whom. At a meeting July 23, Council and KID discussed the two options given them by Victoria and decided they could not work with either option. The two options are for the Village to take over KID in the Village only, or to take over the entire irrigation district.

The meeting ended with a request for Victoria to expand the options available. In the meantime, they will go ahead with an expanded governance study. The two parties want to explore a partnership arrangement as both the Village and KID are now responsible for providing water.

"We're between a rock and a hard place," Village Administrator Bob Lafleur stated, referring to the two options. "It's going to be a long drawn-

out process. There are still lots of questions that have to be answered."

Victoria will have to provide the answers.

Council backs Trail

At the request of the City of Trail, Princeton Town Council has joined the campaign to have Highway 3 designated part of the national highway system. This would make Highway 3 eligible for federal funding. The support of Highway 3 communities will be used to petition the Minister of Transport to bring the matter to the federal government.

Council approves request by Community Services

New housing for aging developmentally disabled adults is top priority for Community Services Society. They have had some difficulty finding a viable location. The most cost effective option for Community Services is to demolish Mary Anne Apartments and build a family-style residence on one level to house five people.

The zoning of the lot and its size (33' X 100') is a problem. To solve the problem, Community services asked for relaxation of the setback requirements and incorporation of a designated alleyway into the lot.

Town Council agreed to deed the

lane adjacent to Lot 1 to Community Services. Relaxation of the setback will allow the adjacent lots to be utilized most effectively and will allow for an access ramp.

The proposed project will not impact on any other residents in the area. The area presently in use by Community Services will be much the same. The request is primarily a matter of titles on paper, lot lines on paper, and setback bylaws.

Council's agreement permits Community Services to move ahead with its plans, but no construction date has been set.

Judge sends two to jail

On July 21, in Provincial Court in Penticton, William Macey MacDonald of Princeton was sentenced to eight months in jail after pleading guilty to possession of a firearm while prohibited and unsafe storage of a firearm.

On the same date in Penticton Provincial Court, the man accused of robbing Princeton Chevron, Michael Semchyshyn, of Penticton, was sentenced to five years in jail after he pled guilty to charges of robbery, possession of a dangerous weapon, and carrying a concealed weapon.

Two other males involved in the Chevron robbery will appear in court at a later date.

Twelve apply for EDO

At Similkameen Valley Management Committee meeting, 12 applications were received for the position of Economic Development Officer for Keremeos and Princeton. The two communities have entered into a cost-sharing agreement to hire an EDO to promote the valley and its communities. Members are reviewing the applications and will recommend a short list.

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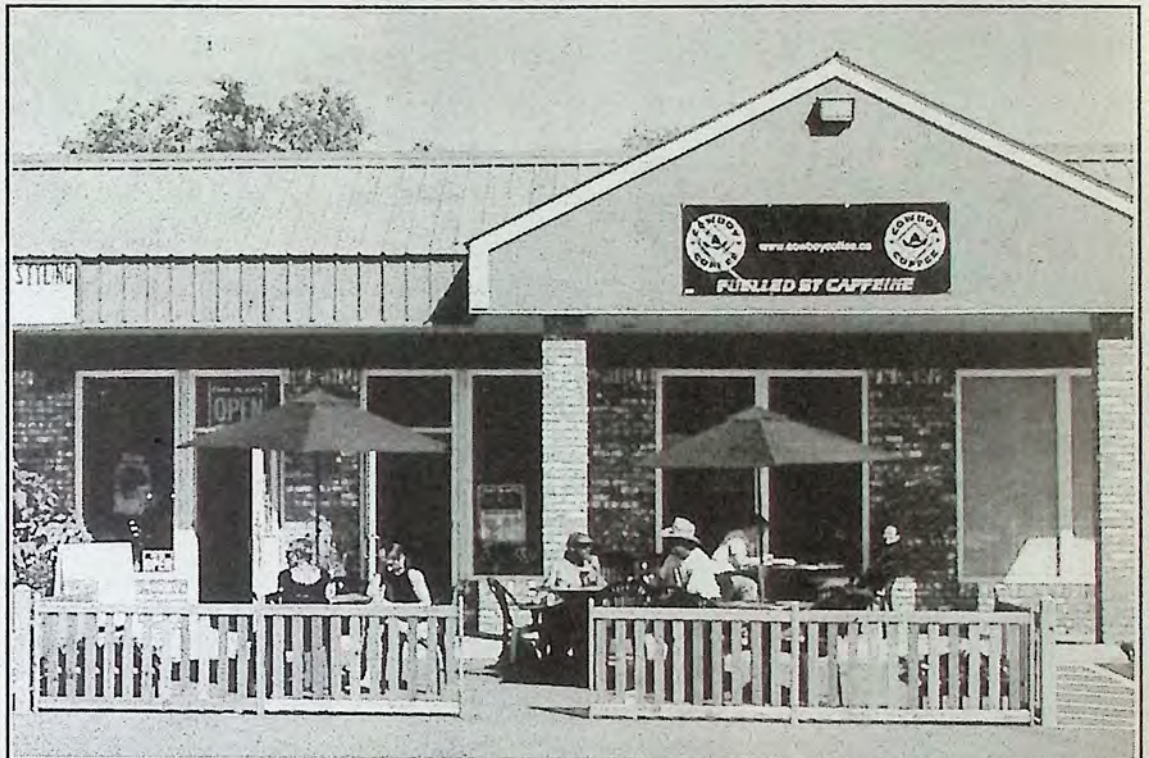

Princeton Castle Resort expands fun

During the 1970's, an entrepreneur decided to build a castle near Rainbow Lake in Princeton. It was a costly project which never became a money-maker. Some improvements were made during the 1980's, again at great expense and little return. In 1990, Eli Wong, who had immigrated from Hong Kong in 1979, saw the potential in the property. She has been building it ever since.

Her first addition to the 150 acre

property was a two-storey log bed and breakfast lodge beside Allison Creek. Then came a campsite, some little cabins, a laundry building, a barbecue building and four chalets, as well as a campground. Never one to stand still, Eli Wong keeps adding attractions – a stable, teepees, more little camping cabins, a tiny church (where real weddings take place), a physical fitness building, a new office, a gift shop and water enter-

tainment equipment for Rainbow Lake.

Although she is the first to admit the property has been a money pit, she loves what she has built and intends to go on building the business and enhancing the property.

Most of her guests are Chinese Canadians from the lower mainland. They like the combination Wong provides – quality accommodation out in the country at a reasonable price. Some of her chalets house up to 10 people and include a hot tub, kitchen facilities, television and VCR. The camping cabins are tiny, and guests cook outdoors, but the mattresses on the beds are good quality. The same is true for the four beds in the teepees.

The new "honeymoon" chalets are compact versions of the larger chalets and offer high quality accommodation.

One of Eli Wong's pet peeves is the lack of promotion for the Princeton area outside the area. With her access to the Chinese population from the coast, she believes she is probably the only one doing Princeton promotion in that market area.

"We need to do more," Eli Wong says. "We have everything here in our back yard, and we need to market it."

At Princeton Castle Resort, she does her bit to encourage people to tour the area. She provides them with a map to show them some of the interesting things around town – the museum, the Court House, driller's rock, the portrait of Mrs. Allison, the ochre, murals, Princeton Hotel and the wooden bridge. She promotes the fossils, too, and has some on site dating back 210 million years. However, she believes there is a lot more that could be done.

Certainly, Eli Wong has made Princeton Castle Resort a destination, and will continue her efforts. She has her own house at Rainbow Lake where she can sit on her porch and look over the water, enjoying the view and the peace. Her love of the location inspires her to bring more people to Princeton.

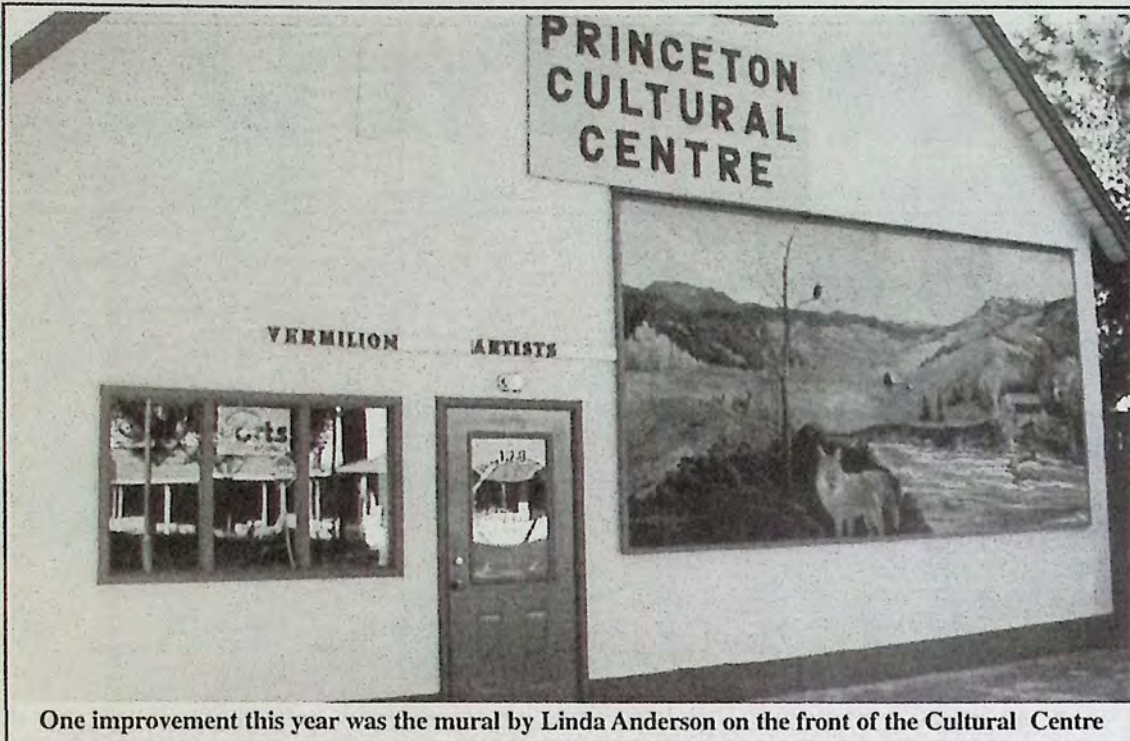

New businesses on Bridge Street include a new cold beer and wine store in Princeton Hotel, Bugnut Toys at the corner of Bridge Street and Vermilion Avenue, and Lordco at the corner of Bridge Street and Halliford Avenue. A laundromat opened across the street. Heritage Motors moved out and On Time Auto Service moved into the mechanical repair shop next to NAPA Auto Parts.

The artists of Princeton area (and Hedley) improved the facade of the Cultural Centre with a large mural painted by Linda Anderson of Hedley. Vermilion Artists and individual artists have held a number of shows in the Centre, which has done a great deal to attract visitors.

Coalbed methane gas exploration activities continued south of Princeton. An Alberta company, Petrobank, did initial drilling last year, and is continuing its program this summer. If the coalbeds yield enough methane gas, the company will put it into production next year. Coal production from Blakeburn continues.

Some existing businesses did new things. Esso added its Coffee Shack for the convenience of its customers. Upper Similkameen Indian Band and partner Charlie Brooks continued to expand the log sorting yard west of Princeton. A new post and rail company was established in the tunnel area and continues its operation. Princeton

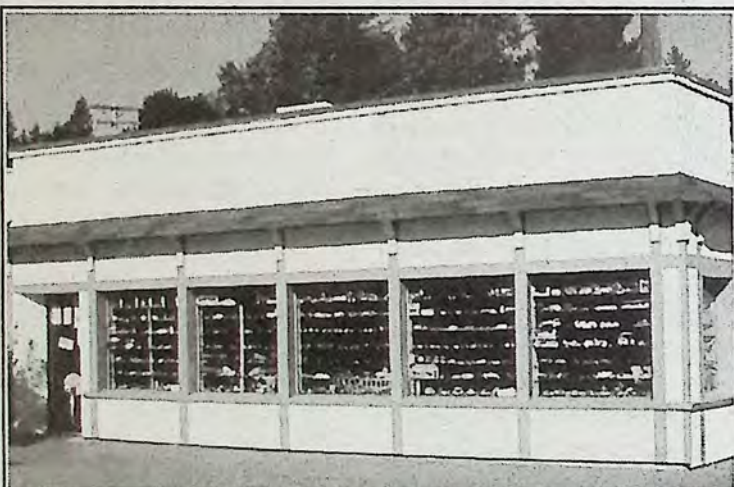
Golf Club enhanced its entrance along the highway making a beautiful welcome to the golf course. The number of RV sites expanded at the golf course.

Argo Road Maintenance moved from the old Highways Department lot to a new location in the business park.

MacPhail comments on Coquihalla backdown

Speaking of Premier Campbell's announcement July 23 that the government would not proceed with privatization of the Coquihalla Highway, Opposition Leader Joy MacPhail called the change of plan on the Coquihalla Highway sell-off "Gordon Campbell's sudden U-turn". She added "the government's privatization agenda is in disarray."

"Gordon Campbell, Kevin Kruger, and every MLA from the Okanagan spent a tremendous amount of political capital and taxpayers money lying to British Columbians about the benefits of privatization," MacPhail said. "But now that their jobs are on the line, they want us to believe they've had an honest change of heart. It's simply not credible. And it shows they will do and say anything to save their political skins."

"All of the credit for the government's decision goes to the people of Kamloops and the Okanagan who fought back and stood up for their rights. It proves the Liberals can be defeated when British

Columbians say 'enough is enough'", MacPhail stated.

MacPhail warned British Columbians to remain alert, despite the people's success on the Coquihalla issue.

"But it's only one battle," MacPhail said. "The government continues to break promises and attack communities with the sell-off of BC Rail, the break-up of BC Hydro and the privatization of health services."

MacPhail wants an accounting of the money spent on advertising the "benefits" of the Coquihalla privatization.

"Every dime should be paid back out of BC Liberal party coffer," MacPhail insisted.

The decision to privatize the Coquihalla and then to back off has cost BC taxpayers thousands of dollars," MacPhail emphasized. "And it may end up costing thousands more in cost-recovery lawsuits filed by private companies that were bidding on the project. If the Liberals had just listened to the people from the start, taxpayers would not be on the hook for this botched attempt to sell off a critical public asset."

In time, kids' lives are kids' responsibility

There is a lot of emphasis on parenting and all the things parents can and should do to help their children grow up self-confident and ready to face life's challenges and succeed. I wonder if we are moving to the finer points of parenting when we should be focusing on some of the basic essentials.

There appear to be a lot of people who do not do the basics. Parents are a child's first teachers. Parents instruct children on how to live,

what to eat, how to speak to other people, whether or not to respect the property and rights of others, and how to handle money. That is a lot of teaching of information essential to survive and thrive in our world. Most parents teach these things very well.

At the same time, parents today have little time to carry out this job. The youngsters go to school at age five and stay in school for 13 years. During those years, weekends are about the only time parents can take the time to teach their children. Sometimes, parents are trying to undo some of what their children learned from other children at school, or trying to undo what their children have learned from television or movies or Internet.

I notice some of the best-behaved kids with the best scholastic achievement come from homes located in the rural area where television is not on the list of things to do around home. Furthermore, these youngsters have chores, raise livestock or care for pets, learn about safety, and learn to work hard

and be responsible for their actions.

Parents have come in for a lot of blame from adult children who may feel they could have done better if only their parents had done better. As one Australian visitor commented a few years ago, "Americans spend a lot of time looking for their inner child when they should be looking for their inner adult."

My point is: parents' can't do everything, even if they have the best intentions. There should come a time when the child uses his or her own mind, and the essential basics must be in place by that time. If they are not, then the child will have to learn them, somehow, often by bad experience. Even when parents have taught their children well, and the parents' teachings have been reinforced by the culture at large, some children will ignore all of it and do as they please. At that point, they must be reminded they are, and must be, responsible for their own actions. That's what it means to grow up.

Learn more about your child's friends

Summer is a great time to get to know your child's friends. For young children, get in there and play with them. For Tweens or Pre-teens, host and afternoon BBQ. For youth, invite a few to dinner and a movie. It's not a time to drill questions at them but to just be there to share your experiences, ideas and learn more about them.

Susan Schutz, a poet, once wrote, "A friend is an extension of yourself, without which you are not complete." We often think of 'peer pressure' as a negative influence, but we can think of time spent with friends who model healthy behaviour as peer pressure, too. Our kids may need our guidance in choosing friends who model responsible behaviour, but remember to examine your own friendships before you examine your child's.

The best way to encourage children to choose positive, healthy relationships is to model them ourselves. Take out an old yearbook or photo album. Look at pictures of the friends you had as a teenager. Think about the friends who acted in ways you admired. Most people can remember at least one person who always sensed when things weren't going well and called, sent a note or showed up to find out what was wrong. Often these people became lifelong friends.

No one forced you to like people who were good to you or feel angry toward people who hurt you. You had to make your own choices about who your friends were. In the same way, we cannot

control who our kids choose as friends. They are exploring their world, themselves, and people around them. Sometimes they choose friends we don't approve of. If we model responsible relationships, talk to our children

about how others act, and are involved in their lives, gradually they'll see that friends who act, talk and think in positive ways will bring out the best in them.

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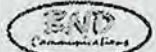
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
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Court honours Carter

Interior Health changes budget

The revised Health Service and Budget Management Plan was approved by the Interior Health Board at the July meeting in Williams Lake. The new plan reflects the federal funding allocation IH received in June. The plan awaits Ministry of Health approval before it is finalized.

The zoning of the lot and its size (33' X 100') is a problem. To solve the problem, Community services asked for relaxation of the setback requirements and incorporation of a designated alleyway into the lot.

The proposed project will not impact on any other residents in the area. The area presently in use by Community Services will be much the same. The request is primarily a matter of titles on paper, lot lines on paper, and setback bylaws.

Town Council agreed to deed the lane adjacent to Lot 1 to Community Services. Relaxation

Council's agreement permits Community Services to move ahead with its plans, but no construction date has been set.

What is Human Growth Hormone?

There is a product on the market called HGH, which stands for human growth hormone. It is advertised as an anti-aging compound, but most people have no idea what it is. It sounds far-fetched.

Human growth hormone is produced by our own bodies. In its pure form, it promotes growth and healing, keeps our skin young and healthy, repairs our body cells, reduces hair loss, and improves memory. It is produced by the pituitary gland in the first 90 minutes after we fall asleep.

As people age, they produce less and less of this hormone. by age 60, the pituitary gland releases only a trace of human growth hormone. If you ever wondered why people deteriorate so quickly after reaching age 60, this is the reason.

Smoking and drinking alcohol and caffeine interfere with the production of human growth hormone.

The product being sold is not really human growth hormone. The pure hormone is not available except for use by medical professionals in carefully controlled situations for specific growth problems.

The product for sale in the marketplace contains what is known as "precursors", combinations of amino acids which stimulate the pituitary gland to produce our own human growth hormone.

The HGH booster should be taken before going to bed, and the person taking it should not be smoking, or drinking alcohol or caffeine that evening.

Anyone concerned that this booster will somehow encourage unwanted growths can be reassured that this product will boost the immune system. HGH booster contains amino acids, ginseng, plant steroids, and pituitary protein. None of these is banned for human consumption.

Anyone having doubts about taking this product should speak to a medical professional.

While the federal funding is good news, the Board had to make some tough decisions to deal with extra cost pressures the health authority is facing this fiscal year. For example, the operating dollars for the mobile MRI for the South Okanagan and Kootenays have been deferred to the next fiscal year, which will give IH a chance to work on preparing for the MRI. Money allocated to increasing access to surgery has been deferred. The total amount deferred is \$2.3 million.

Interior Health will continue to monitor the rising costs of delivering health care in the Southern Interior and will make adjustments to the budget to stay within fiscal targets.

common. Your children may discover a new interest in life, especially in this age of space travel. Show them where to look in the southwest sky for orbiting satellites and tell them how satellites send their signals down to earth to be picked up by receivers and enter our television sets and computers. It helps them understand much of the technology we live with.

Do your children really know their own town? Have they ever visited

the museum to look at the fossils and the "great old stuff"? Do they know who Bill Miner was? Have they ever been to the Court House, Town Hall, the hospital, the Health Unit, or Rotary Park? Do they know any of the history of their town? Have you and your children ever taken the historic walk around town?

How about a neighbourhood barbecue in your own back yard? (This might be a good way of getting the

kids to clean up the yard!) Invite your neighbours with children to bring something for a potluck barbecue and for a game afterward.

The most important thing about vacationing at home is planning what you want to do, then making a schedule of when you want to do it. If you do it right, when the children go back to school and their teacher asks them to write a story about what they did last summer, they will have plenty to write about.

Recognize heat stroke and prevent it

In these hot summer days, children and athletes, as well as employees doing outdoor work, must be monitored for heat stroke.

Heat stroke is life-threatening. It usually occurs among athletes doing sports in hot weather. It occurs when body temperature rises far above normal. It can happen to anyone of any age, and it can be fatal.

There are two basic kinds of heat stroke:

* Classic - when the body's temperature control system fails, sweating stops and temperature rises rapidly.

* Exertional - usually the result of demanding physical activity, the body temperature rises quickly though the person is still sweating.

Symptoms of heat stroke

* Body temperature rises uncontrollably and the person is hot to the touch

* Pulse starts off rapid and full but may become weaker as the condition progresses

* Breathing is laboured and noisy

* Skin is hot and may be either wet or dry, depending on the kind of heat stroke

* Person is restless and may have a headache, fatigue, dizziness or nausea

* Person may vomit, suffer convulsions or slip into unconsciousness

First Aid for heat stroke

1. Move the person to a cool, shaded place.

2. Cool the person. Here are some ways:

a) cover with wet sheets

b) use a fan to blow cool air over the person

c) Immerse the person in a cool bath (never leave them unattended)

d) Sponge the person with cool water, particularly the armpits,

neck and groin areas.

3. When the person's body feels cooler to the touch, cover the person loosely with a light sheet and monitor the person closely.

4. Seek immediate medical attention.

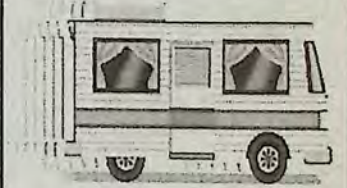

Floralee Stewart reports from China

Floralee Stewart, who retired last year after year of working as a lab tech at Princeton General Hospital, is now teaching English in China. She sent the News Leader a report last week. She has been welcomed well in her new home.

She began teaching, and her students were eager to speak English. Then she had a public speaking engagement arranged by a local businessman. She went to speak to a group of hospital workers then went to dinner with a

group of businessmen.

Floralee says, "It was in a private room at a hotel. We had a massive amount of food that just kept coming. As their guest of honour, I sat beside the highest ranking one and was expected to be the first one to take some food. I had had this honour at the luncheon put on for me by the officials of the Shengli Oil Field Workers College, too."

Floralee teaches at the College.

She goes on, "At the dinner, the

main purpose seemed to be who could propose the most toasts to anything."

She has been shopping.

"I've been to a couple of department stores. They have very stylish clothes, shoes, purses, etc. for men and women. There are two million people in this area, so there is a lot of merchandise. A lot of things are similar to Canada in the grocery department. I haven't had a real good look. I had friends helping me and a list, so we stuck to that. Someday I'll have more time and take a good inventory."

Floralee takes most of her meals in the cafeteria, but eats breakfast in her apartment. One of the items of interest in her apartment is common to most homes - a water cooler that heats the water as well as cools it. She says she has seen these only in businesses in Canada.

"The people are very friendly and kind and anxious to befriend foreigners, to talk English, since it is their official second language. One of my students wrote that she is even more anxious to learn English since she had an opportunity to help a customer in a store where he was having trouble getting information from a clerk who could not speak English. It gave her pleasure to receive his big smile. Small things can be great motivators!"
