Fall Fair goes this weekend

The 38th annual Princeton Fall Fair is this weekend.

Members of Princeton Agricultural Fall Fair Association met Tuesday, August 26, to review all of the arrangements for the fair.

Treasurer Ruby Bey announced a \$1,500 grant from Regional District Area H Director Gerri Logan, gratefully received by members.

Tophy Hanna announced an \$800 donation from A & W to go toward the chuckwagons, climb-

ing wall and mechanical bull. He said more sponsorships are on the way. The bake sale and car wash to raise money for the children's playground equipment at Princeton Plaza was highly successful, and Plaza owner Ron Harkness gave a \$200 donation toward the children's playground.

Overwaita is donating 150 pounds of Canadian beef and 50 flats of pop for the beef on a bun dinner. Members were very impressed. The dinner will be

sold at \$5.00 per plate.

Sharon and Trevor Rupert generously volunteered to put on a supper for the chuckwagon and chariot contestants on the Friday evening before the fair. This dinner is a tradition wherever chuckwagon racers go.

Backcountry travel ban affects hunters, hikers

The Ministry of Forests announced backcountry travel restrictions beginning Friday morning, August 29, and extending to Sunday, September 14, when the fire hazard will be reviewed. The restriction includes all backcountry travel except in areas such as supervised campgrounds and day-use areas designated as "open".

The restriction order covers Crown land in the southern one-third of B.C., from Clearwater south to the U.S. border and from south Vancouver Island to the Alberta border. This travel restriction does not include the Cariboo, as the forest fire risk has been downgraded there.

Under section 84 of Forest Practices Code, the restriction order covers all Crown land and Forest Service roads within the restricted area. In other words, there will be no access on Forest Service roads. Private, municipal and First Nations reserve land are exempt

from the order. Anyone wishing access to First Nations land must have a permit issued by the Indian Band responsible for the reserve.

Forest Service Roads accessing private property and commercial lodges will remain open. Some roads into provincial parks will remain open. Closed roads will be marked with signs. The **TransCanada Trail is closed.**

Violators may face penalties of \$10,000 and six months imprisonment. To report suspicious activity call 1-800-663-555 or *5555 or Crimestoppers at 1-800-222-TIPS (8477).

A reward of up to \$50,000 is offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone involved in deliberately setting wildfires.

BC Interior hits mortgage, insurance crisis

Anyone seeking a mortgage on a house located in the southern Interior east of Hope, B.C. can expect problems. Home insurers have placed a temporary freeze on issuing fire insurance until the Interior fire hazard levels drop from extreme. Forest fires have burnt 303 homes in southern B.C. and insurance companies have the jitters.

Without insurance, purchasers of homes seeking policies to cover the new home are likely to be refused. If refused, the mortgage will not go through, as banks will not lend money on an unprotected asset.

For those who have made an agreement which is binding, it means they somehow have to come up with the money even if they cannot obtain a mortgage. It

is an unfortunate situation which may result in court cases or heavy personal losses.

Real estate companies can still sell property, and insurance companies can still write policies, but there are restrictions.

The News Leader questioned people involved in these transactions, from real estate agencies to insurance agencies to bank officials, and the upshot is an apparent freeze on home fire insurance. Some insurance companies do not want to take the risk. At the same time, there may be some companies which will consider all information on a property, then take the risk. The only solution is to go to insurance agents and ask them to secure home insurance, then wait for the answer.

Woman survives Coalmont Road rollover

A 58 year old woman was north-bound on the Coalmont Road when she swerved to avoid some rocks on the road. It appears, police say, that she over-corrected and braked.

The vehicle's momentum carried it across the road to the opposite side where it went down the ditch, flipped and rolled down the steep

embankment approximately 250 feet (80 metres), and about 15 metres before she reached the major cliff.

Witnesses following the vehicle quickly assisted in helping the woman. A 15 year old youth is credited with turning off the engine after noticing gas fumes coming from the car and helping the woman out of the vehicle to safety. The accident occurred on Wednesday, August 27, at approximately 5:30 p.m. RCMP, Fire Department and the ambulance attend at the scene.

Emergency Fire Rescue extricated the woman and brought her up the steep bank using ropes and stretcher.

Emergency Mdicl Services (EMS) transported her to Princeton General Hospital where she was treated for minor injuries and released.

At 11:00 p.m. August 26, RCMP and EMS responded to a two-vehicle collision on Granby Way at the Burton Avenue and Bar Street intersection.

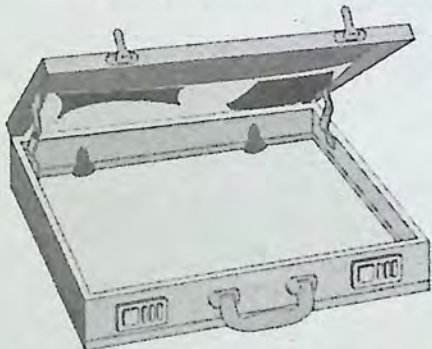
The two vehicles had been travelling the same direction when the lead vehicle swerved at the intersection and was struck by the other vehicle.

At this time, anyone who has insurance may be wise to consider what steps they can take if they run into problems in the future when it comes time to renew. Nobody seems to know if the rules about rural or interface property insurance will change. (Interface properties are those adjacent to wild lands.)

There are no laws in place governing development of property in the interface areas. There are

guidelines recommended by the Ministry of Forests. However, insurance companies may develop guidelines of their own in the future regarding interface properties due to the higher perceived insurance risk during forest fire season.

In some communities, municipal officials are assessing fringe area fire hazard and are closing parks or blocking wooded areas. Penticton's race track is closed.

Sizzle turns on the Fear Factor

What do you get when you put contestants, who have paid an entry fee, through three different elimination-round stunts involving peppers?

Fear Factor, Keremeos-style.

Borrowing from a popular American reality television show, Similkameen Sizzle organizers have designed a series of stunts that will both entertain and amaze spectators during the Second Annual Pepper Festival, set for September 20th.

For those who have seen the television show, please note the Sizzle version of Fear Factor will not involve extreme stunts.

There will be three challenging stunts, with only those who can complete a stunt allowed to move on to the next one.

The first stunt will see contestants digging through an inflatable kiddie pool full of tomatoes. Their goal is to find Thai peppers buried in the mix.

They have to find at least 5 to move on to the second round. If they cannot find at least 5 of the peppers, they are eliminated.

With a 2 minute time limit to complete this stunt, it will likely get a little messy.

The second stunt involves a total of 10 peppers, starting with the mildest (#1) and moving up

the Heat Scale to the hottest, (#10, the searing habanero). Contestants will be required to eat them one at a time and will have a total of ten minutes to finish them all.

Those who can complete this stunt, including the hottest pepper, will advance to the final round.

The third and final stunt will see contestants given a total of four habanero peppers to eat. Each contestant will be required to eat them as fast as they can with the fastest time determining the winner.

Maybe it should actually be called Sear Factor!

Organizers are still finalizing the prize structure for the event as donations continue to come in.

The Fear Factor pepper eating event will take place at 4:00 pm in Memorial Park.

A Pig Roast Dinner, prepared by Keremeos and District Volunteer Fire Department and the Branding Iron Steakhouse will follow at 6:00 pm in Victory Hall.

A Dance, featuring the Caribbean Rhythms of "Tropical Heat," will run from 8:00 pm to 12 Midnight, also in Victory Hall.

Visitor numbers strong at InfoCentre

Similkameen Country's Tourist InfoCentre, located in the centre of downtown Keremeos, was a busy place during the Summer.

A total of 791 parties or 1,804 people were recorded as entering the facility during the period of June 23rd to August 26th.

Charan Gill, who was born and raised in the area, worked at the InfoCentre during the Summer.

"I met a lot of interesting people."

The forest fire situation was a major concern of most travellers, "They would call and ask if it was safe to come here and whether or not it was smokey,"

Gill says.

The InfoCentre records the origin of the visitors and Gill says most travellers were from the Vancouver area with travel destinations mostly to the Okanagan and other parts of the province.

Many locals also used the facility for reference purposes.

"Overseas travellers came from Barbados, Germany and Holland," Gill explains, "There were a lot of people here from Germany."

Similkameen Country annually records vehicle numbers over the B. C. Day August Long Weekend.

This year a total of 6,715 vehicles passed the InfoCentre going East with Westbound traffic totalling 6,847 vehicles.

The totals are broken down to include daily numbers of transport trucks, passenger vehicles, RV's and campers, motorcycles and bicycles.

If possible, out-of-province vehicles are also noted in the survey.

Gill says the data is collected to show area residents and businesses that the Similkameen Country InfoCentre is providing a valuable service to the community.

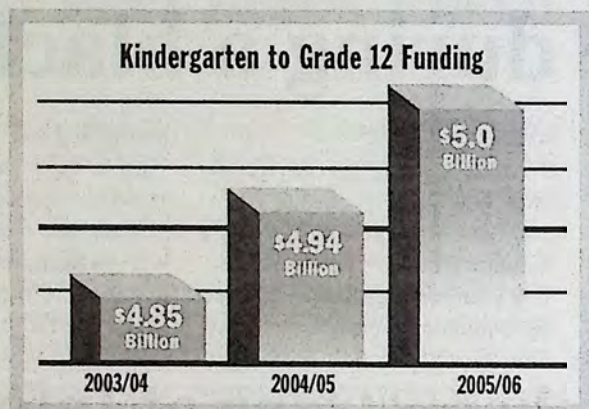

Increasing Education Funding

- Over the next three years, funding for B.C.'s Kindergarten to Grade 12 education system will increase by \$143 million to \$5 billion.

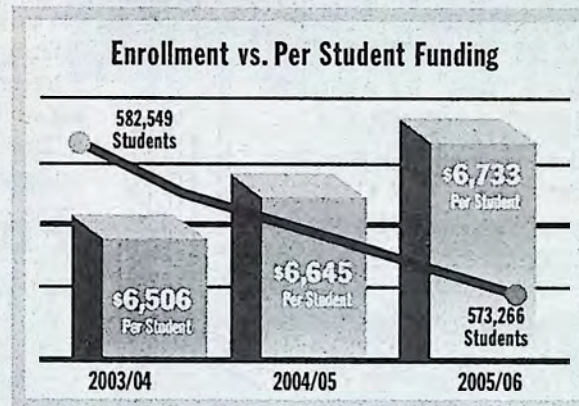


- Over the next three years, total education funding, including post-secondary spending, will rise by \$173 million to \$7.11 billion.
- Over the last two years, school districts received \$92.8 million in new, one-time funding to address cost pressures.
- This year, school boards received \$117 million more than in 2000/2001.

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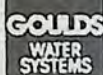
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MUSEUM LOGO CONTEST

Victoria permits mosquito attack

As part of the province's coordinated West Nile virus strategy, the Minister of Health Services has obtained a permit under the Pesticide Control Act to control mosquitoes should they pose a public health risk due to the virus. The permit provides a legal mechanism to allow pesticide application if health officials determine the virus poses a public health threat.

Although there is no evidence of West Nile in any region of B.C., the virus has spread across North America since 1999. Human cases have been reported as close as Alberta.

Under the permit issued by the Ministry of Water, Land and Air Protection, local governments or other agencies acting on the advice from the local medical health officer may request authorization to apply larvicides and/or adulticides by ground or air in their areas.

To determine if pesticide use is warranted to control the spread of the disease, provincial and local health officials would evaluate:

- * the extent of the virus confirmed locally in mosquitoes, birds, animals or people.
- * how populated the area is.
- * what level of public risk West Nile poses in the area
- * whether other options would be effective in reducing the risk.

Pesticides covered under the permit include the larvicides Bacillus thuringiensis var. israelensis, or Bti, and methoprene, and the adulticides malathion and pyrethrum. The permit does not allow wide-scale, unnecessary application of pesticides and is not a means to control nuisance mosquitoes.

All pesticides approved for use under the permit have been evaluated by the federal Pesticide

Management Regulatory Agency, including scientific assessments of risks to human health and the environment, and deemed safe when used as directed. To ensure pesticides are applied properly and in a manner that protects public health and safety, only certified pesticide applicators may use pesticides under this permit.

The B.C. Centre for Disease Control, health authorities and municipalities are monitoring all regions of the province for the virus. B.C.'s extensive surveillance program includes testing mosquitoes and dead crows, ravens, magpies and jays – the only bird family most susceptible to the disease. Public announcements by municipal or health authorities will inform area residents if health officials recommend pesticide use to protect the public from the threat of West Nile.

Stay safe during a blackout

During forest fires and any natural disaster, such as severe snow storms, floods and landslides, electrical power may be lost for one or several days. During the Ontario blackout, many people lost their homes due to fires. It is better to understand that a power blackout is more than just an inconvenience if you are not prepared.

Safety tips for a blackout:

- * Never use candles due to fire hazard. Use a flashlight.
- * Turn off electrical equipment you were using when the power

Firefighters must be certified

Many people who wanted to assist in fighting forest fires were not hired because they did not have the appropriate training. The Provincial Fire Commissioner advises that all individuals who volunteer for fire fighting duty in the province must have some specific training.

To assist with wildland fire fighting:

- * Individuals must have a current \$100 certificate in wildland fire fighting. To obtain such a certificate, apply to the Justice Institute of BC for the one-week course or apply to your local adult training facility to have the course brought to your area.

To assist with structural fire fighting:

- * Individuals must be members of a fire department.
- * They should submit their name through their fire chief. The Office of the Fire Commissioner cannot accept individuals showing up at the fire scene.

These regulations are in place to protect willing but inexperienced volunteers from possible injury or death.

went out.

- * Avoid opening the refrigerator or freezer.
- * Do not run a generator inside a home or garage.
- * If you use a generator, connect the equipment you want to power directly to the outlets on the generator. Do not connect a generator to a home's electrical system.
- * Listen to local radio for updated information.

Prepare for a blackout before it happens. Assemble essential supplies, including:

- * flashlight
- * batteries
- * portable radio (with batteries)
- * at least one gallon of drinking water
- * a small supply of food (with a manual can opener handy)

(People tend to forget they cannot

go out and buy these things when there is no power to run cash registers or bank card machines.)

If you use medication requiring refrigeration, most can be kept in a closed refrigerator for several hours without a problem. If unsure, check with your physician or pharmacist.

During a blackout, limit your use of telephones and cell phones to ensure open lines are available for emergency officials.

Conserve energy whenever possible. Often, when electricity is restored, it fails again due to too heavy a load on the system suddenly. When power is restored, do not immediately turn on everything. Allow several hours to pass before using any appliances that draw a lot of energy.

Living Past 100

Feeling stress? Try this!

All of us are well enough educated in health matters to know stress is a killer. During the forest fire situation in the Okanagan and Thompson areas, Interior Health was sending information regarding stress reduction for fire victims and for frightened children.

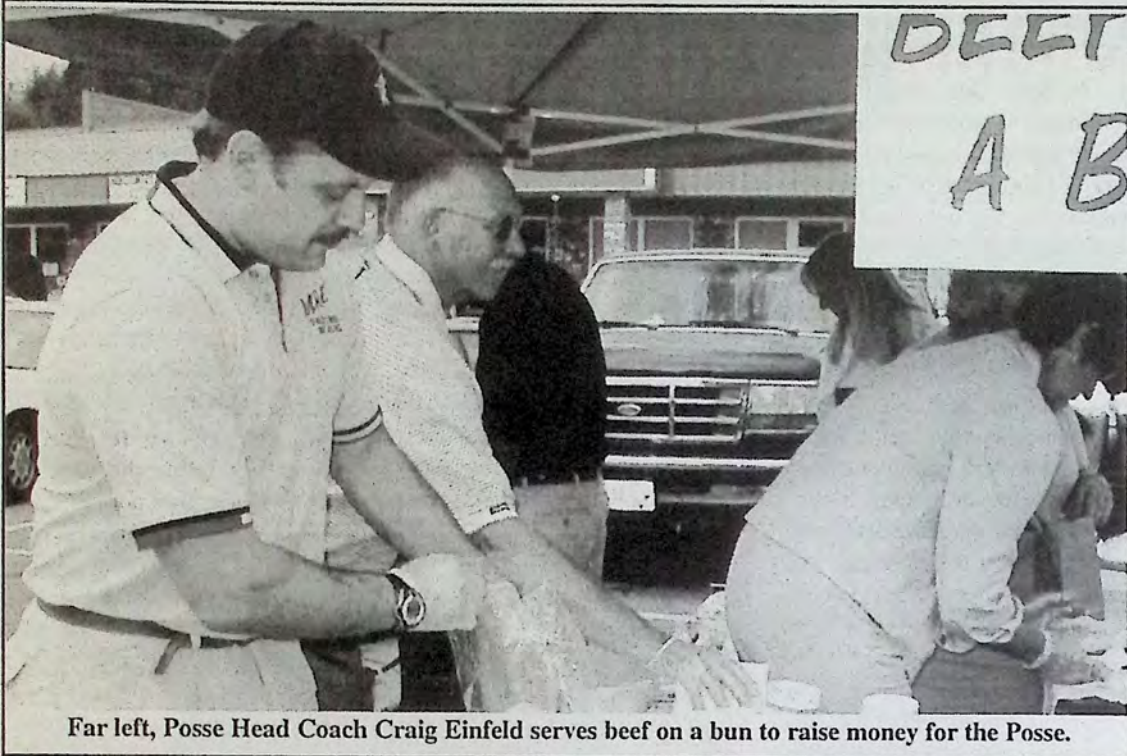
Most of us will become irritable, unable to sleep well, and somewhat exhausted when faced with continuing stress. There are ways to protect yourself.

Carbohydrates help us fight the effects of stress. Researchers have found high carbohydrate foods create changes in the brain that make us feel better. The brain uses up its supply of serotonin in stressful situations. Serotonin is a brain chemical that makes us feel happy. When serotonin levels drop, we start feeling unhappy. When serotonin levels rise, your appetite decreases, so you do not need to worry about becoming obese when you eat carbohydrates.

Vitamin B6 helps relieve stress, too. Eat bananas, baked potatoes and chick peas for a natural source of this vitamin.

At the same time, stay away from coffee and sugar. Coffee will help your stress level irritability rise, and sugar will help the process. Sweets with high sugar content make your blood sugar level drop, which makes you feel less happy.

Finally, if you feel you cannot sleep well, be sure to increase your intake of calcium. A glass of warm milk before bed will do wonders for a good night's rest.

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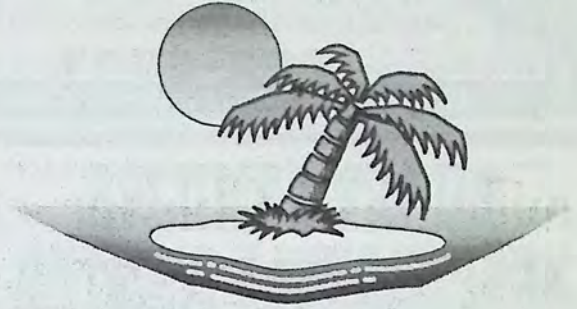

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Learning to do homework is an asset

As school has begun and school work is picking up, it is essential to remember that developing good homework habits now will help encourage a child to do well in school. The most you may hear about homework from your child is that they hate it, doesn't have any, or has too much of it the night before a test, but it is more likely you child is lacking some essential homework skills.

There are three key skills young people need to incorporate into their lives so they are able to do homework well. Young people need to develop ways to ensure homework can be worked on, such as finding a homework site, creating a homework filing system and using visual organizers. Children should set a consistent time to study, eliminate distractions, have proper sleep, take appropriate breaks, and accurately project how long an assignment will take. They need to know and use a variety of learning strategies, such as rewriting, drawing, memorizing aloud, and making flash cards.

It is a good idea for young people to create a homework checklist that includes carefully copying homework assignments from the teacher's instructions and bringing home from school all the materials needed. They should begin study at a set time, putting all their effort into doing the homework well. Study with your child. Help your child break down large assignments into smaller

ones and monitor their progress. Together, set boundaries about interruptions, such as phone calls and visitors who drop in. Place homework near the door to take to school the next day.

When children become accustomed to homework basics, then they can become more creative with their studying strategies. Continue to encourage them to stick with it. Even encourage them to study something, read something, or learn about something

new when they do not have homework.

"Developing a method for recording and prioritizing school work, and scheduling time to complete it, are essential to school success," says Diane Heacox, author of Up from Under-Achievement, a parenting book about helping your child succeed in school.

See a bear? Don't call!

Anyone who sees a bear walking through an area, or sees evidence of a bear having been nearby, should not call the Conservation Officer or RCMP. Call RCMP only in case of dire emergency (e.g. the bear is trying to tear down your door or is running off with your child).

Conservation Officer Al Lay says he will respond only to complaints of an aggressive bear, or of a bear into garbage. "Garbage" bears do not stop going into garbage. Aggressive bears are a danger to the public. These bears will be identified

and killed. Two such bears were killed last week - one aggressive, the other a "garbage" bear.

There are four or five bears roaming in town, and an unspecified number in the fringe areas of town. Lay says the situation may become worse.

The reason for the bears hanging around town is fruit trees and berry bushes. They have nothing to eat in their natural environment, and are ranging far and wide in search of food.

Grizzly recovery issue is not dead

The ongoing saga of the North Cascades Grizzly Bear Taskforce (GBCS) continues to cause concern to Larry Koller, who is a member of that taskforce. Koller lives in Tulameen, where he farms. He has been involved since his appointment in 2002, and faces a level of frustration about how the "recovery" plan is proceeding.

The story begins more than two years ago, when the Ministry of Water, Land and Air Protection decided grizzly bears in the North Cascades were "threatened" and a recovery plan was needed. Many local people attended a public input meeting at the Skills Centre and seriously questioned whether more grizzlies in the Tulameen area is a good idea.

In a letter to all stakeholders and others involved in the review of the recovery plan, a letter from Minister Joyce Murray, dated June 10, 2003, states all of the information from letters and e-mails are posted on the GBCS website.

Koller has written to the minister to tell her these documents are not on the website. Specifically, the information not posted is scientific documentation the taskforce reviewed, letters from individual stakeholders and/or groups, and correspondence from local governments of the North Cascades.

Koller tells Minister Joyce Murray, "Most of this corre-

spondence was in response to the Ministry's stakeholder letter of September 16, 2002 and expressed opposition to the draft recovery plan's direct action approach (augmentation and access control) without any regard for the existing local populations, bear, human or other species. With all the negative feedback regarding the draft recovery plan of January 2001 it may be judicious to revise it into an evolutionary

approach where there continues to be research and monitoring of the existing grizzly bear population and where feasible, steps are taken to encourage natural recovery."

Koller sent his letter to Joyce Murray on August 10, 2003.

There does not appear to be any slow-down in the recovery plan, nor any admission of criticism levelled at it. Koller has received no response to his most recent letter to the Minister.

Otter Valley members built trail comfort stops

Women who hike the Trans Canada Trail near Princeton in the future will best appreciate the latest project of Otter Valley Fish and Game Association. Members of the outdoor recreation organization have built three wooden "outhouses" which will be placed along the trail at strategic locations. Each outhouse has proper sit-down equipment.

President Bob Montgomery described them as "one-holers but really nice."

Jim Stolth, of Vermilion Trails Society, was pleased to be consulted as to the best location for these "comfort stations". They will be located between Princeton and Youngberg Road (back of Pike Mountain). There will be one located between

Princeton and Coalmont for sure. Each will be located a short distance off the trail, and signs will be placed to show where they are.

The funds for the materials for this project were raised in the annual Walk for Wildlife.

President Montgomery says people often ask what Otter Valley Fish and Game does with the money raised each spring.

"This is our project this year," he says. "Now they know."

Otter Valley Fish and Game is not the only group benefiting from Walk for Wildlife. Although Otter Valley sponsors the walk, many community groups share the benefits through an arrangement in which money pledged goes to participants' clubs, too.

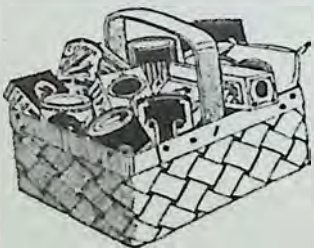

Some lessons should change laws

Forest fires are costly enough without having them burn homes. B.C. has lost more than 300 homes to forest fires this summer. There should be some changes in some laws regarding home construction, and there should be some changes in housing development regulations.

We were appalled to learn homeowners in one Kelowna subdivision were required to have shake roofs! No metal roofing was allowed in this subdivision surrounded by pine trees. Further, they did not cut down the pine trees on most of the lots.

Subdivisions in forested areas should have at least 100 metres of cleared green space surrounding the subdivision. This will not protect homes from a fire storm, but could assist fire fighters in preventing spread of fire to homes under most circumstances.

Areas like Princeton, in which homes are flanked by forested areas within city limits, should look at fuel reduction methods, such as spring burning, on a regular basis. Perhaps there should be a bylaw in place preventing anyone from having an evergreen, especially a pine tree, within ten metres of a residence or commercial building.

It may seem we are opposed to trees, but we are not. There are lots of nice deciduous trees for landscaping. A pine tree is dangerous in hot dry weather because its needles are full of flammable resin. The needles on the ground are a fire hazard, too.

People who do not follow the fire prevention guidelines to save their homes may also endanger their neighbour's homes. What can be done about that problem?

Perhaps the biggest problem is people who do not take any of the warnings seriously until they see disasters like Barriere and Kelowna, and then put off doing what they know they need to do.

The BC Interior is like no other place in Canada when it comes to forest fires. Applying the same rules the rest of the country adopts is not good enough for us. We should look to California for our guidelines.

Tuition hikes are a lose-lose proposition

Dear Editor;

For the second year in a row, tuition fees for university education are rising faster in British Columbia than anywhere else in Canada, with an average increase of 67 percent in two years. Collages are implementing even sharper increases. But is this a problem? Universities and colleges argue that higher fees are necessary to fund the demand for new spaces and ensure quality in the face of shortfalls in government funding.

A six-year tuition freeze maintained by the previous government resulted in rates that were in fact considerably below the national average. Some could argue that, while recent increases are dramatic, students in British Columbia are now simply catching up to their counterparts in the rest of Canada.

Moreover, individuals benefit financially from post-secondary education. Statistics Canada reports that in 2000, Canadian university graduates earned approximately 36 percent more than high school graduates, and

those with post-secondary certificates earned 10 percent more. Young adults with higher levels of education have lower unemployment rates. For most students, post secondary education remains a worthwhile financial investment even with high fees.

Given the financial (and other) benefits of post-secondary education, shouldn't students be expected to pay for it?

The quick answer is that they already do. Because post-secondary graduates tend to out-earn those with less education, government expenditures on post-secondary education are more than **recouped by the higher level of income taxes** graduates eventually pay.

Of course, this is not simply as a break-even proposition. Collectively, businesses and the economy benefit from having a well-educated workforce. As our economy has restructured, a greater proportion of job openings require some form of post-secondary education. Investment in British Columbia's "human capital" is critical for our economic development.

The real question is: do we ask students to pay for their education up front or after the fact? In B.C., the trend is clearly toward the former. High income earners have been given substantial tax cuts, direct government funding of post-secondary education is frozen, and students are being asked to make up the difference with higher tuition fees.

But from a policy standpoint, there are clear advantages to not asking individuals to pay the bulk of educational costs while they are still students. Most obviously, high up-front costs make post-secondary education less accessible for those with limited financial resources.

Here we can look at the experience elsewhere in Canada as a preview to the likely effects of tuition increases in B.C. While tuition was frozen in British Columbia in the 1990s, it rose substantially in the rest of the country. Even after adjusting for inflation, tuition fees paid by Canadian university undergraduate arts students rose by 126 percent between 1990 and 2000.

Students are lucky to have good schools

When we think of schools, we tend to think of teachers, principals and students. Few of us think about the actual school building, nor of the effort spent in keeping the building clean and well-maintained.

As students go back to school in September, they rarely think about how lucky they are to be going to a good school building. During the students' summer holidays, maintenance staff is busy cleaning and repairing the school, painting and polishing everything that needs doing. Students go back to a sparkling clean school every year.

In many places in North America, going back to a relatively new school in good repair is not one of the pleasures students

can look forward to. With education budgets being slashed everywhere, hundreds of thousands of students will return to an old school in which little has been done but cleaning and painting. Students in the Similkameen Valley, with the exception of Hedley students, will go back to excellent school buildings. Hedley students still have their old building, but have been promised a new one in the next couple of years. Still, their school is well-kept and nice to go back to.

Many students in more remote locations will go to a portable school lacking a lot of amenities our students take for granted, including a high level of cleanliness. In inner city schools, students face dreary buildings with dismal

classrooms.

Few students or parents fully appreciate the dedication of maintenance staff in keeping our schools in top condition. Directing their activities are the school trustees and District Secretary Treasurer. The money is allocated, the funds divided according to priorities, but somehow there is always enough to pay staff and fund materials to keep the buildings looking good. Even the grounds are kept clean and green.

Right now, before any students or teachers return to school, there are people working in those buildings to make them perfect for September 2. Take some time to think about those people and tell them, when school starts, how much they are appreciated.

Graduate and professional school tuition general rose even more. At the same time, the post-secondary participation rate flattened for the first time since WWII. Even more troubling, a widening gap appeared between the participation rate of young people from lower socioeconomic backgrounds and those from high or middle socioeconomic backgrounds.

The fact that professional programs (medicine, law etc.) are facing much sharper tuition increases also bodes ill for social equity, since these degrees tend to open doors to the most lucrative careers. While it is possible that wealthy applicants were suddenly more qualified, it is more likely that the high fees shut out students with fewer resources.

Higher tuition fees also mean higher student debt, which may discourage students from considering fields of study that are perceived to lead to less lucrative careers. In 2000 when the tuition freeze was still in effect, 61 percent of full-time post-secondary students in B.C. already required financial assistance to pay for their education, and the average debt load was not insignificant. Students who completed a four-year program owed an average of \$17,130. With rising tuition, both the number of students required to assume debt, and the size of that debt, will no doubt increase. Who can afford to pursue a degree in literature, social work, or early childhood development, knowing that doing so will mean years of crushing loan payments without the likelihood of secure or lucrative employment?

We all benefit from a well-educated citizenry, and it is important that funding for post-secondary education be adequate to ensure both accessibility and

quality. Asking individual students to fund an ever-increasing share of post-secondary education costs may ensure well-stocked labs and libraries, but if it undermines equality, the price is too high.

In the immediate future, there will likely be no shortage of students interested in competing for

post-secondary spaces in British Columbia, but rising fees mean that financial resources, rather than merit, will increasingly determine who is able to enter the competition.

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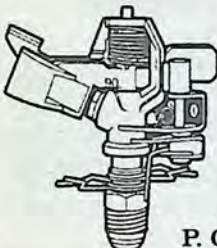

Types of Mutual Funds - Part 1

The growing popularity of mutual funds has resulted in an increase in the number and type of mutual funds available in Canada. Below is a description of some of the different types of mutual funds available in today's marketplace:

Money Market Mutual Funds invest in short-term, interest-bearing instruments, such as Treasury Bills, thus providing safety of principle and a source of interest income.

Fixed Income Mutual Funds concentrate on generating income, therefore, most invest in high-quality bonds issued by governments, provinces and corporations - either domestic or foreign.

Equity Mutual Funds are often called growth funds, and invest mainly in common stocks. The primary investment objective is growth of capital, however, the investment style will differ from fund to fund.

Dividend Mutual Funds invest in high-yielding, dividend-paying preferred and common shares. These funds are attractive to investors who seek a steady stream of income and who want to take advantage of the dividend tax credit to increase their after-tax return.

Balanced Mutual Funds usually invest in a combination of equities, bonds and short-term money-market instruments, and are an ideal investment for investors who want long-term capital growth combined with a source of income.

Index Funds generally mirror the performance of a particular index, such as the NASDAQ, S&P/TSX or S&P 500. Generally considered to be "passively managed" funds, there is no active selection of the securities held within the fund. These funds are maintained according to their weighting in the comparable index.

I feel well-qualified to speak on this subject as our company deals with it on a daily basis.

This utility cannot stand another round of 'cut and slash' from a new owner who manages from the bottom line upwards. It is going to be extremely important that the new owner has the knowledge, depth and proven experience to put this company back on its feet. These are monopoly assets that carry the responsibility to serve the customer first rather than as an afterthought. At 10:50 p.m. on Wednesday, August 27, police responded to a single vehicle accident on Highway 3 near Sunday Summit.

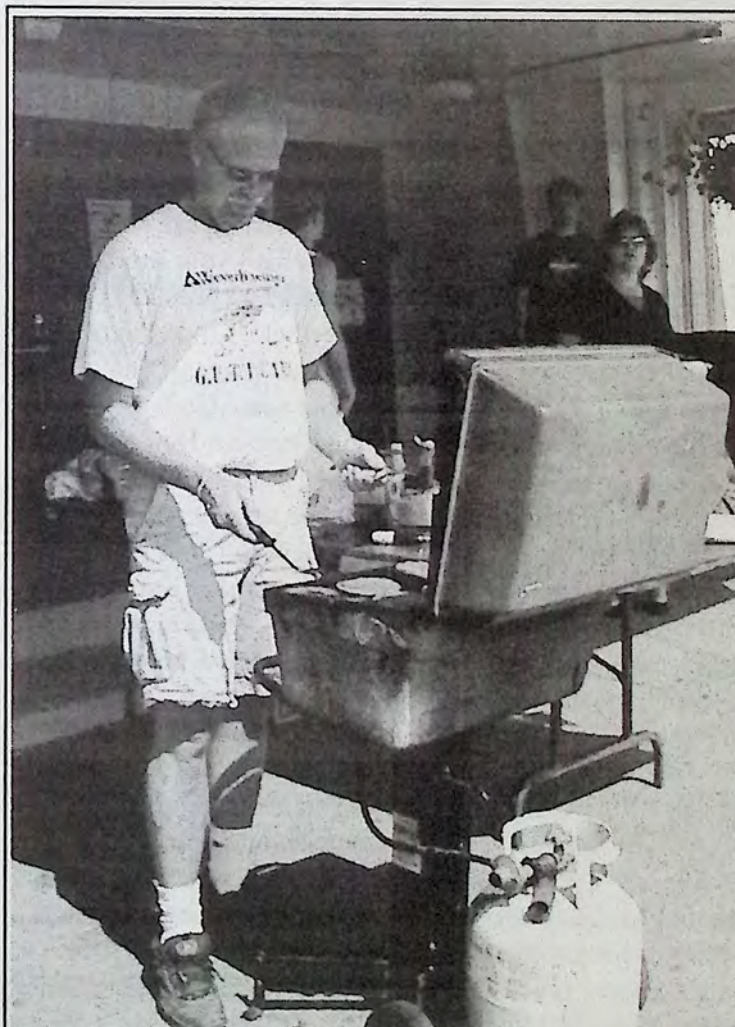
Police arrived to find a black pick-up truck had gone off the road to the left. The pick-up sustained front end and undercarriage damage.

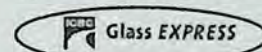

ICBC steps up to assist fire-impacted customers

ICBC will waive the deductible for vehicles with ICBC comprehensive or specified perils coverage that are total losses as a result of forest fires.

ICBC staff will also try to ensure that customers receive a cheque for the full amount of their loss at the earliest possible opportunity - in many cases, at the time of their first meeting with claims staff.

"This is an unprecedented situation and we want to take the proper steps to assist those who are impacted by these devastating events," said ICBC's chief operating officer Bill Goble. "ICBC is attempting to provide its customers with the fullest coverage possible under these extraordinary circumstances."

In addition, ICBC has contributed \$25,000 to both the North Thompson and Kelowna relief funds.
