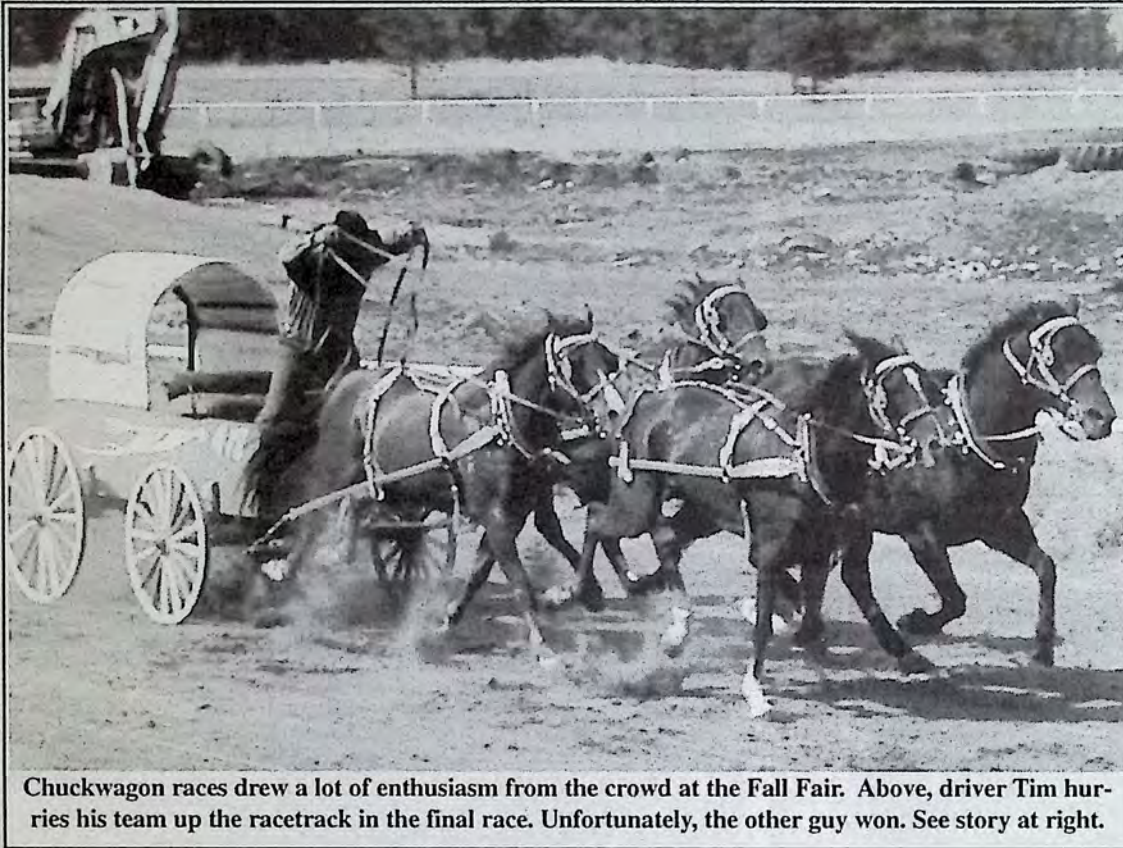

From humble beginnings 38 years ago, Princeton and District Agricultural Fall Fair has grown to become the biggest single event in Similkameen Valley. There can be no doubt of the community's support as sponsorships came in left and right this year for chuckwagons, chariots and the youngsters' free playground.

Treasurer Ruby Bey gave the News Leader an overview of what appears to be a major success story. Gate receipts were up this year over last, there were more vendors this year, and the number of exhibits increased. There were more educational displays, and more things to do.

Concession area receipts were not totalled as we go to press, but President Jody Woodford said she had underestimated the concession supplies and had to go to town for more before Saturday was over. **Continued on page 3**

Pastor wants action on intersection

Pastor Chris Haugland sent a letter to Town Council requesting they take action to save lives. He pointed out the danger to pedestrians attempting to cross Highway 3 from the Esso service station to the Chevron side and vice versa. He noted the tunnel side of the highway is a residential area where many young people live, and asked, "Why should getting home from the Skateboard Park or business centre of our community be a life or death challenge?"

Pastor Haugland suggested a pedestrian operated traffic light would be "the only acceptable solution".

Council agreed to write a letter to the Ministry of Transportation to arrange a meeting to discuss this safety concern

Cops nab Tulameen pot grower

Approximately five weeks ago, Princeton RCMP became aware of an outdoor marihuana grow operation in the Tulameen area. After lengthy investigation, Princeton RCMP arrested one male who was responsible for the operation, and seized 80 marihuana plants.

A lower mainland resident, age 40, was arrested for production of marihuana.

The investigation continues.

Police arrest phone bandits

Two suspects breaking into a phone booth in Eastgate were reported to Princeton RCMP on Monday, September 1. The witness provided details of the suspects and vehicle involved.

Princeton RCMP were able to intercept this vehicle and arrest the two suspects believed responsible for this theft. Two men from the Lower Mainland have been charged for this offence in addition to other criminal offences.

During the search of the suspects' vehicle, police discovered and seized several tools believed to be used during this offence.

Princeton RCMP have contacted Telus security, who advised that these two men could be responsible for up to 100 similar incidents from the Lower Mainland to the Okanagan.

Investigation of this incident continues.

Town has no plans to prevent forest fire home loss

Princeton Town Council has no plan in place to reduce the possibility of local homes being lost in a forest fire. The News Leader questioned Council at the September 2 meeting regarding possible fuel reduction burning next spring. They have no plans to do so, saying most of the property is privately owned and it is up to the owner.

When questioned about the hazard posed along the benches, where residents have been dumping lawn and garden trash for 20 years, Acting Mayor Lorne Esselink said, "I hope citizens will stop dumping."

Council clearly recognized the hazard presented by pine needles and lawn clippings dumped over the edge of the hill, as there were

signs put up in those areas which prohibit dumping. People have been doing it anyway. Acting Mayor Esselink said there is an "overloading of fuel" in those areas.

Some of the forested areas along the Tulameen River are directly below residences on the north side of the benches. Should a fire start along Tulameen River to the west, the natural wind direction would push it down the river and into those trees. Acting Mayor Esselink said it is up to property owners to do something about the fuel overloading from years of dumping over the hillside.

When asked whether the Forest Service would be willing to assist in fuel reduction burning, Acting Mayor Esselink said they do not have the money to do any on municipal property.

In regard to fire hazard trees in neighbourhoods, Council can do nothing. Acting Mayor Esselink stated it would be a civil matter between neighbours if one neighbour identified a fire hazard tree in another's property. The Town of Princeton has no bylaw or mechanism for ordering removal of the tree.

Councillor Kathy Clement had expressed concern earlier in the meeting about municipal liability. When it was pointed out to **Continued on page 2**

Indian Band is angry at disrespect for pictographs

The Similkameen's priceless heritage of pictographs may be at risk if a new book is released.

The book is published by Musio Ventures Backroads Map Books and is called "Exploring B.C.'s Pictographs, A Guide to Native Rock Art in the British Columbia Interior" written by Simon Nankivell and David Wyse.

Upper Similkameen Indian Band (USIB) has been opposed to the publication of this information since Nankivell and Wyse first started their research several years ago. Most First Nations and Tribal Councils have joined the opposition to publication, and the Union of BC Indian Chiefs, Lillooet Tribal Council and USIB wrote cease and desist letters in May 2003 requesting that the publisher

stop and the authors remove the material from publication.

The first concern was that the book would contain confidential site location information. Further concern is that the authors trespassed on Indian Reserve Lands to record sites when no permission was ever granted. Pictures of those sites appear in the book.

First Nation people are very protective of their cultural heritage, especially spiritual sites as significant as pictographs. Many First Nations are not opposed to research and study of pictographs for future generations. Some are considering publishing their own work without specific location information. USIB will take people on a guided tour provided **Continued on page 2**

Council that much of the hazardous forested area is on Town property, and the Town could be liable for houses burning, Council did not have a specific response.

In Princeton, where so many pine trees and other evergreens grow on both private and municipal property, homeowners are left responsible for protecting their homes from fire hazard trees.

Water conservation

Last Thursday, Premier Gordon Campbell appealed to the public to conserve water. Noting that parts of B.C. are experiencing the most severe drought conditions in 100 years, he pointed out that some streams are down to 10 to 25 percent of normal flow conditions for this time of year.

The Similkameen Valley is experiencing the drought, but water sources underground remain con-

stant in most areas. The Ministry of Water, Land and Air Protection say a period of sustained, significant rainfall is required to end the drought, but current forecasts indicate the drought will extend into late September. The Ministry predicts even a normal snowpack during the 2003-04 winter may not fully replenish groundwater reserves and reservoirs, making habitual water conservation a necessity.

those people are respectful and do not try to make a profit from the visit.

"The fact remains that prospecting, exploitation and profiteering of the cultural heritage is not a thing of the past," USIB stated in a news release last week.

Authors Nankivell and Wyse showed no respect with regard to those First Nations whose cultural heritage they are exploiting for profit, the Band states.

Charlene Allison, a USIB Councillor, stated, "A few years ago they show up at our office and say they have been on our reserve lands (without permission) documenting pictographs. They further go on to say that it was for research only and that they had no plans of publishing the information. When they did not like what we had to say, they lied to us and refused to meet with us when we found out the book was going to be published.

In fact, we were under the impression that the book was being held in a warehouse since June, 2003, awaiting the outcome of discussions between lawyers

for the publisher and the Union of BC Indian Chiefs. We are very upset right now and considering a lot of options as to how to deal with this. For now, we are asking store owners all over British Columbia not to carry the book."

By the end of last week, many booksellers had removed the book from the shelves. The matter is now in the hands of lawyers.

A news release from Mussio Ventures states they are "hoping to restore awareness of an important piece of North American history."

The release goes on: "Unfortunately, there is a small group of First Nations people who feel this book is detrimental to their society. As a result, they have started to spread untrue facts and defamatory comments about the authors and publisher to stop sales of the book."

The "small group" is growing daily as Bands realize there are 250 sites identified throughout southern B.C., infringing on numerous Bands' property and endangering priceless artifacts.

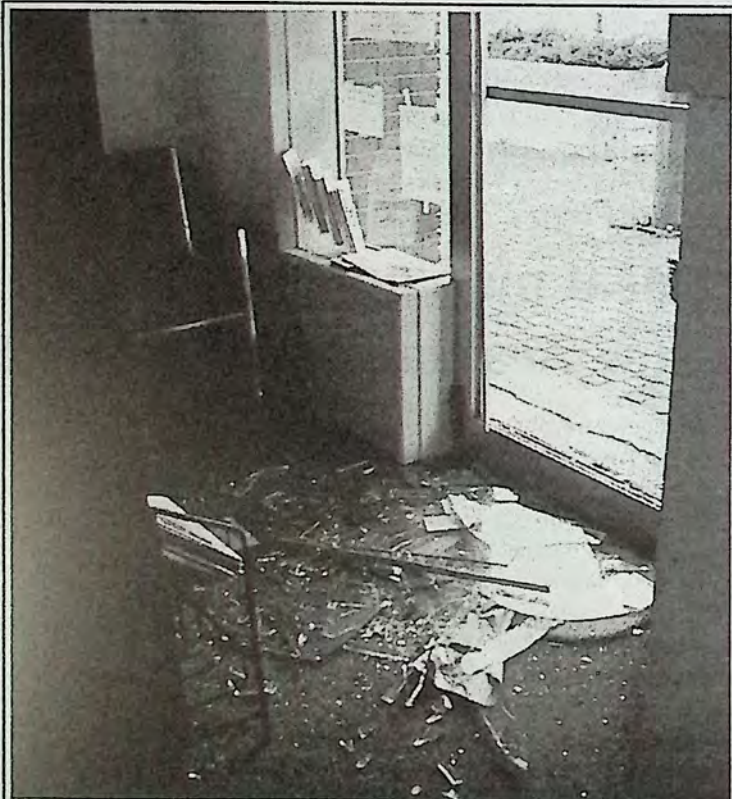
In the exhibits buildings, a lot of talent came out of the closet. The top exhibitors had not been tallied and will be presented with their trophies at a later date. It is going to be

Candidates for the Princess Pageant must register on Friday. The pageant and crowning will take place on Sunday afternoon prior to Grand Entry.

Grand Entry on Saturday will take place at 1:00 and 7:00 p.m. Camping will be permitted on the grounds.

Absolutely no alcohol or drugs will be permitted at campsites or on the grounds.

**Olalla faces
drought water restrictions**

The community of Olalla has water regulations in place, but no real water restrictions. Lawn sprinkling is allowed from 4:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. and from 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

Even-numbered addresses may water on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. Odd-numbered addresses can water on Wednesdays, Fridays and Sundays.

These regulations are in effect until September 30, 2003.

New Zealand on internship**

Peter Waardenburg is on his way to Wellington, New Zealand this Friday, September 12, on a youth internship program. He applied via internet to Pacific People's Partnership and was accepted. Peter is a GIS technician, age 26, a 1994 graduate of Similkameen Secondary School. He will be working with the Maori tribal alliance mapping traditional and other sites.

In this internship program, Peter will earn a basic living wage provided by the Partnership and by the Maoris. The purpose of the internship includes sharing

cultures. Peter is expected to join in traditional ceremonies and has learned that, after a person speaks at a ceremony, a song is expected to follow the speech. Peter's grandmother is teaching him a traditional Okanagan song to sing to the Maoris.

The internship will mean a six-month stay in Wellington, beginning in their spring. Peter says he will miss winter. He might go to the south island to see if he can do some snowboarding. If not, he has a long wait until it is winter again.

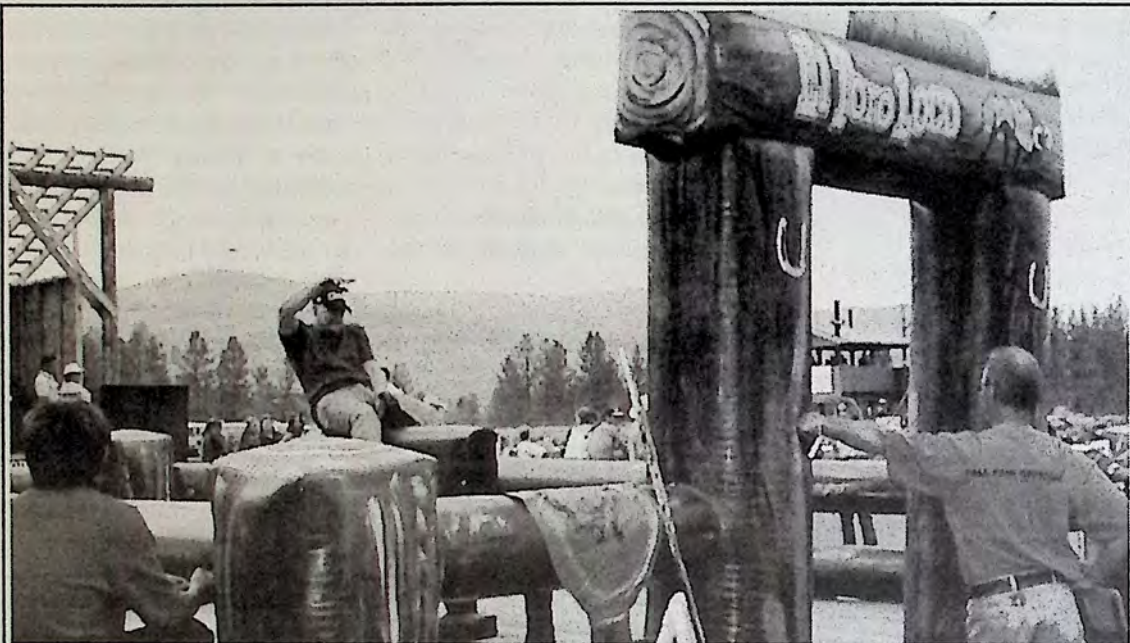

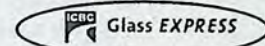

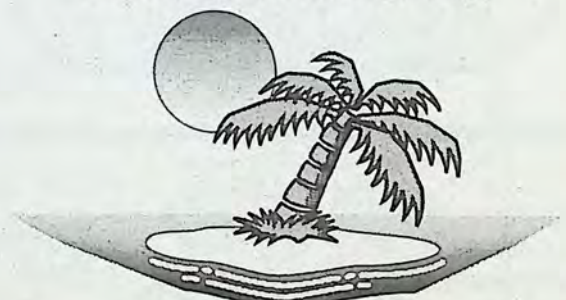

Beat those "lunch bag blues"

It's no secret - I always hated making school lunches. September would roll around and I would rise to the challenge for the first while, then would fall into the trap of boring lunches. Let's think outside the lunch box for a moment. It doesn't have to be a choice between what's "good for you" and what's "easy".

Lunch should include at least one food from each of the four food groups, so mix and match from these ideas:

Fruits and vegetables:

- apples
- bananas
- grapes
- melon balls
- pears
- juice-packed canned fruits
- broccoli
- carrots
- cherry tomatoes
- green pepper rings

Meat and alternates:

- vegetable juice
- cold chicken salmon or tuna
- hot stew or chili
- baked beans
- peanut butter
- egg salad
- nuts and seeds
- hot lentil soup

Breads and cereals:

- bread - rye, cracked wheat, pumpernickel, raisin
- bagels
- rolls and buns
- granola
- crackers
- pita bread
- muffins
- bread sticks

Milk and milk products:

- two percent or skim milk
- yogurt
- cheese
- cream soups
- milk puddings

As a parent, you have now

ensured one item from each of the four food groups is in the lunch bag, but is there any way of preventing the lunch from going into the garbage?

* Involve your child in planning and preparing - create a lunch menu for the week. Take your child to the grocery store with you. Teach your child to read labels. Buy something new and experiment. Even young children can help by washing fruit or taking the juice box from the fridge.

* Aim for variety different colours, textures, shapes and temperatures.

* Pack items tightly in plastic containers to ensure they are not squashed (flashback to childhood - squashed, soggy sandwiches were the WORST!).

* Use a wide-mouth thermos for cold milk or hot soup.

* Plan to have leftovers for lunches - baked beans or spaghetti, for instance.

* To keep food cold, use frozen bread to make sandwiches then add a frozen juice or small freezer pack.

* Surprise your child occasionally by including a small treat, such as a new pencil or stickers. Including a food not in the four food groups is fine as long it is balanced with other healthy choices.

* Keep lunches simple so they are easy to eat.

Living Past 100

Tomatoes: more than a man's best friend

Last year in this column we talked about how tomatoes protect men from prostate cancer. There is a lot more to tomatoes than this. Tomatoes fight cancer through a nutrient called Lycopene, which has twice the cancer-fighting ability of beta-carotene (yes, you can swap broccoli for tomatoes and come out ahead).

Israeli researchers have discovered tomatoes can inhibit the development of breast, lung and endometrial cancers, which means the tomato is a woman's best friend, too.

Italian researchers found that people who ate seven or more servings a week of raw tomatoes reduced by 60 percent their chances of developing stomach, colon or rectal cancers.

According to another research project, the lycopene in tomatoes appears to promote better health and higher energy levels in the elderly.

Tomatoes help prevent cataracts, one of the major problems of the elderly.

How much tomato should you eat?

Ten servings a week is optimum, whether raw or cooked.

This is tomato season. You can buy a big box of tomatoes now for very little. You can make tomato sauce, can whole tomatoes, and you can freeze tomatoes for use during the winter (just blanch and seal in a bag).

Tomato sauce can go on spaghetti, pizza, or meat loaf. You can make tomato soups, or just serve stewed tomatoes as a side dish. You can make tomato juice, ketchup and tomato relish (sorry, green tomatoes don't count - it is the red that does the trick).

Of course, you can eat them raw. If you buy a box of green tomatoes, you can wrap them in newspapers and let them ripen gradually, and you can have inexpensive raw tomatoes well into November.

WARNING: if you are allergic to aspirin, consult your doctor before eating many tomatoes, which contain salicylic acid like aspirin).

Council renews membership

The Town of Princeton has renewed its membership in the Council of Resource Communities (CORC). The Resource Communities Council, which represents communities which generate 80 percent of B.C.'s economy, lobbies Ministers and MLAs on forestry, mining, tourism, transportation, energy and aquaculture issues. CORC is working with rural MLAs to seek opportunities to enhance the "heartland" economy. Together, some priorities were established, beginning with settlement of the softwood lumber issue, reconstruction of the coastal forestry, and assessing the impacts of these issues.

With regard to enhancing tourism opportunities, the following priorities were identified: adequate access to lands, integrated transportation strategies, legislation for snowmobil-

ing and ATVs, sport fishing, and market outreach. Air, rail and road transportation were identified as key areas for improving economic opportunities.

Economic diversification was identified as a critical issue, as well as looking for more opportunities in enhancing mining, different types of aquaculture, power supply and coalbed methane.

As resource communities serve as the major suppliers of workers, goods and services, the need for resource communities to share in the revenues emanating from their regions was identified as a key priority. Marketing B.C. as a place for tourism, investment and business development, and marketing of B.C. products, were seen as priorities.

CORC is working with government to develop regional action plans with regional Mayors and MLAs.

Asset Development

All schools need boundaries

All schools need boundaries. They need to set clear standards and expectations for how students should act and learn.

Yet setting these standards isn't easy, and neither is enforcing them. Many schools grapple with how to discipline students in appropriate and effective ways.

As a parent, you can help the process by working with your child's school. Review the code of conduct with your child, reinforce it. Get involved in your Parent Advisory Council. Focus on the positive and build on what's working. When conflict does occur, don't be pushy. Calmly state your concern and suggest solutions.

Seek help from students in your school. For example, Streetwater High in California created "The Link Crew" - twelfth graders who explained the dos and don'ts of behaviour to new students and talked with students with whom teachers were struggling. Grades and attendance improved, and fewer new students spent time in the principal's office.

When parents, students and educators work together, everyone creates a supportive environment for establishing and enforcing school boundaries. The more families, schools and communities work together to establish consistent boundaries, the better off our children will be because they know what to expect.

Help your children and school focus on providing a safe, orderly, conducive school that improves teaching and learning.

Need more education? It is easier than you think!

Obtaining your Grade 12 graduation diploma as an adult student is a realistic goal. There are still many people who don't realize an adult student can satisfy the requirements for the Adult Graduation Program (the "Adult Dogwood") with as few as five courses, regardless of when they left secondary school. The following information answers many questions about this program which has been available since 1999.

What is the Adult Graduation Program?

Adult students finish the courses necessary for receiving their regular dogwood diploma, or may work toward the BC Adult Graduation Diploma (also known as the Adult Dogwood). Courses are offered through The Bridge, the local continuing education center. In the adult program, 20 credits (five courses) are needed for graduation. This different from the regular graduation program which requires 52 credits for graduation. To be eligible for the adult dogwood, the student must be at least 19 years of age and must take at least three of their courses leading toward graduation as an adult. An 18 year old who has been out of school for at least a year may be admitted to the adult program with approval from The Bridge.

Where is the Adult Graduation Program offered in Princeton?

The Bridge offers a non-traditional learning environment designed to accommodate the educational needs of adult learners. Some courses are done on paper and some are offered through computer-managed learning. Students have the flexibility of fitting their learning needs into their timetable whether they are employed or not.

How do I get involved with the Adult Graduation Program?

Contact the staff at The Bridge and book an appointment to speak with one of the staff members. If you are working and cannot visit them during the regular school day for this first meeting, someone will arrange to meet with you at a time that fits your schedule.

Can I complete the adult program if I am working full-time?

Yes. If you have the ambition and can find a few hours each day to work on your courses when you are not working at your job, it is definitely possible. In the long run, it will be worth putting out that extra effort for the short term. Having an Adult Dogwood

Certificate will help you in the job market; a lot of employers now require Grade 12 graduation.

How long will it take me to complete the program?

It depends. If you can attend The Bridge on a regular basis it could be completed in as little as one year. If you are working full-time and can find the time to work on your courses a little each evening, it may or may not take a little longer. Putting your foot in the front door and returning as an adult student is the difficult part, but remember each course you complete is one step closer to your goal of graduating.

Can I attend college or university with an Adult Graduation Certificate?

Yes.. Adults can satisfy the entrance requirements to many post-secondary institutions by choosing the correct courses for their adult graduation program. Many post-secondary programs have different entry requirements for adult students. These are the decisions that will be discussed when you meet with a staff member of The Bridge.

I have taken other kinds of courses and training since I left high school. Will they count for anything in this program?

Possibly. Prior Learning Assessment may be used to meet any of the requirements for the Adult Diploma. Prior Learning Assessment involves a variety of techniques including equivalency reviews, challenge processes, in-depth interviews, etc. and any course that is Ministry-authorized by either the Ministry of Education (4 credits) or the Ministry of Advanced Education, Training and Technology as requirements for graduation may be used toward the BC Adult Graduation Diploma. It is important that you bring any certificates that show completion of any courses or training with you to the initial interview.

Do I have to pay tuition fees for the adult program?

All courses leading toward graduation at The Bridge are tuition-free. The only cost involved is an annual registration fee of \$35.

For information, drop into The Bridge at 206 Vermilion Street or call 295-3180. The Bridge is open Monday to Thursday, 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. If you can only call after 3:30-p.m., call 295-1187. A program will be put together to meet your needs.

Will Americans ever get over 9/11?

This is the second anniversary of 9/11, or the destruction of the World Trade Towers. It may take many more years to judge the full effect of the changes that event made in American policy.

Since that time, we saw a sudden decline in financial activity worldwide, and a sudden hike in insurance rates across the board. A lot of the effects of the destruction of the World Trade Towers were more psychological than financial. Regardless of the financial impact, the psychology of Americans changed to the typical reaction of the victim – increase defences at all costs.

Homeland Security was implemented, as well as a manhunt for Osama Bin Laden and the rest of the Al Qaeda. At the same time, we Canadians noticed a hardening of attitudes toward Canadians, another manifestation of the victim who looks for somebody to blame and finds many at fault. Two of the people involved in the events of September 11, 2001, had come into the U.S.A. through Canada, therefore Canadians were suspect. It did not matter that it is the American's responsibility to determine who should enter the U.S.A., nor did it matter that the rest of the Al Qaeda crowd had been living in the States for months. Canada had to be watched.

The attitude toward Canadians hardened regarding softwood lumber. Then, when the U.S. decided to go after Saddam Hussein and Jean Chretien would not come out officially on side, the American attitude toward Canada became even harder. One case of mad cow disease shut down the border to Canadian beef, and still the softwood lumber disagreement carried on, despite a World Trade Organization ruling against the U.S. tariff.

The most recent trade attack on Canada is against Canadian wheat. There is a slight relaxation on the beef, but now they do not want our wheat without a tariff. They are determined we will pay, regardless of the Free Trade agreement.

We can only hope the Americans recover psychologically from 9/11 before they find another tariff to slap on us.

All of this anti-Canadian sentiment seems strange to us because we have never threatened nor harmed the United States, but George W. Bush warned us when he said, "Those who are not for us are against us." We have, in their minds, become the enemy, although we have always been their friends.

Newspapers fail on coverage of new drugs

Dear Editor;

It's hard to miss the explosion of media stories regarding miraculous new pharmaceuticals – but given that medicine can both help and harm, how reliable is the information Canadians – including patients and health care professionals – receive from our country's mainstream newspapers?

Nobody in Canada ever researched this question before, so no one really knew how well the media – one of the most trusted and valued sources of information about health care – was doing its job.

To remedy this situation, I set out with a team of researchers to systematically examine the accuracy, completeness and balance of reports in major Canadian newspapers on a sample of five new drugs. Before I tell you what we found, take this simple skill-testing question to measure your drug-reporting savvy:

* would you take a cholesterol-lowering drug that has minimal side effects every day for five years in order to reduce your risk of having a heart attack or stroke by 42 percent? – yes or no?

* would you take a cholesterol-lowering drug that has minimal side effects every day for five years in order to reduce your risk of having a heart attack or stroke by 3.5 percent? – yes or no?

The 42 percent sounds impressive. If I thought I was at risk for those diseases I would probably take the first drug. But the second? A 3.5 percent reduction in risk seems pretty insignificant to me for the trouble of swallowing a pill every day for five years.

If you answered 'yes' to the first drug and 'no' to the second, as I did when I first saw those numbers, then you've been bamboozled by statistics. That's because both questions refer to the same study of the same cholesterol-lowering drug 'simvastatin (trade name Zocor). The results were just reported to you in two different ways.

The trick comes in understanding the distinction between *relative* difference and *absolute* difference. You see, in the clinical trial of this drug, 8.5 percent of people taking a placebo had a heart attack or stroke, compared with five percent of those taking

People make the big difference at Fair

Speaking as a Fall Fair member of many years, I want to talk about this event an example of the community support of which people in the Princeton area can be justifiably proud.

The Fall Fair emerged out of a Women's Institute and 4-H event 38 years ago. There were no buildings and no "fair grounds". The event developed a little each year, but even 20 years ago, it was no big thing. Now, it is the biggest event of the year in Princeton.

When I joined the Fall Fair Association, it was because I had attended meetings to report on plans, and they had no money to pay postage on some letters!

The fair has been a boom or bust event until recent years, when the Town of Princeton and Area H provided grants giving the bank account some stability regardless

of the weather. At one time, B.C. Fairs Association, thanks to grants from the provincial government, allocated substantial grants based on merit, and our Fall Fair always received good marks when it was judged. B.C. Fairs no longer gives such generous grants, and it is the big fairs, like IPE and PNE that get the lion's share of the money.

The dedication of a small group of people has kept the fair running. The community would be amazed at how, through the years, a handful of people have put on a fair involving loggers sports, three exhibits buildings, livestock judging, vendor displays, entertainment, demonstrations, concession, refreshment garden, demolition derby, and now the children's special area and the mechanical bull, well-known band, Tuff truck, and mud bog.

One of the most promising things

to happen recently is the influx of young people into the Fall Fair Association. They work really hard, and really well. They tackle big projects and move ahead in ideas and concepts. This is not to say the older members I do nothing. On the contrary, they are delighted to work with the young people and hear new ideas while passing on organizational skills.

The Fall Fair is an organization anyone of any age can join. President Jody Woodford joined as a pre-teen, and I remember working at the fair with Vice-President Tophy Hanna when he was in his teens. The entire Woodford and Hanna families were involved.

Volunteers do the work, but it cannot be done without financial support. The people and businesses of Princeton give generously to make sure the fair is a bigger, better event each year.

Zocor. That's an absolute difference of 3.5 percent, but a relative difference of 42 percent (5 is 42 percent less than 8.5). Guess which number grabs the spotlight? Voila! Welcome to the world of drug reporting.

I wanted to know how often this kind of statistical manipulation happened. Our team looked at all articles published in 24 major English and French newspapers during the year 2000 on five recently launched drugs.

We found, for starters, only one-quarter of the articles even mentioned how much a drug worked - meaning, the articles didn't tell us if the drug helped three percent of the people who used it or 60 percent. Knowing how much better the drug works than a placebo is a pretty important piece of information. If a drug supposedly prevents heart attacks, strokes or broken hips, how many of these events did it prevent?

More than 68 percent of the articles did not mention a single side effect or harm related to the drug and when harms were mentioned, they were usually placed toward the end of the article. Information on who shouldn't take the drug was mentioned in only four percent of the articles.

Why does completeness and accuracy in drug reporting matter? Because drugs are an increasingly important part of health care. Collectively, Canadians now spend \$1.5 billion per year on pharmaceuticals. A side effect of misleading media reporting on new drugs is that it can lead to much wider use of a drug than is warranted. Overly rosy reporting may lead to demands on doctors to prescribe the latest new drugs, or pressure on policy makers to cover them - even if they're not better than last

year's batch of "wonder drugs".

The information people get from the media on new drugs should be balanced and accurate, and it should contribute to informed health care decisions. Journalists have a duty not to raise unrealistic expectations or to participate

in disguised advertising. Because the news is such a trusted source of health information, journalists need to inject a higher dose of healthy skepticism into their reporting.

Projections for the future cost of a post-secondary education indicate that a university education is forecast to cost \$96,000 20 years from now. Fortunately, there are ways to begin saving for that goal now.

Many Canadians open registered education savings plans (RESPs), for their children or relatives. An RESP allows you to put away up to \$4,000 a year toward a child's post-secondary education. Contributions can be made until the child turns 21 for family plans, and until the end of the 22nd year of existence for individual plans. Although contributions are not tax deductible, the contributions grow tax-sheltered. The money becomes taxable as it is withdrawn by the beneficiary, but since many students have limited income this is not likely to be significant.

The federal government offers an incentive, known as the Canada Education Savings Grant (CESG). The grant equals 20% of the first \$2,000 contributed annually, with the funding capped at \$400 a year. If you don't receive the full grant amount in a given year, it can be carried forward to future years. If the beneficiary was born in 1998 or later years you can earn grant for those years even if the RESP was not established yet. You must open an RESP and contribute in order to collect any grant for these years.

The restrictions placed on RESPs prompt some people to save for a child's education using an in-trust account instead. With an in-trust account, funds are vested for the child as soon as they are deposited. While the income and dividends from in-trust accounts are taxed in the hands of the donor, capital gains may be taxed in the hands of the child. The contributed education savings could be frittered away by the recipient on less important items.

Some investors use a mix of an RESP and an in-trust account to save for their children's future plans. The child has the growth and grants of the RESP, with other money set aside in the in-trust account should a post-secondary education not be an option.

Councillor will talk to MLA

Councillor Kathy Clement stated at the September 2 Council meeting she will discuss municipal insurance with MLA Dave Chutter this week. She wants to impress on him the importance of changing the wording of municipal insurance. As a representative of Municipal Insurance Association (MIA), she has often expressed to Council the taxpayers' liability under present legislation.

MP wants action from feds on home insurance

On Friday, September 5, Okanagan-Coquihalla Member of Parliament Stockwell Day appealed for help for b.c. homeowners unable to secure home insurance. He contacted Minister of Finance John Manley saying "insurance shutouts threaten to paralyze the economy". Day asked him to advise immediately on what steps the federal government is prepared to take to resolve the insurance crisis.

Day stated, "If the insurance situation is not immediately addressed, the effects will be as devastating on the local economy as the fires have been on the forests."

stated, "The law of joint and several liability has effectively cast local government in the role of the insurer of insolvent or uninsured co-defendants and plaintiffs. This is not a role that local governments can afford to fill and still provide the services expected by their residents and the provincial government."

Referring to "the alarming trends of expanding liability, increasing legal costs and shrinking insurance coverage", the MIA asks for reforms.

"The changes sought will elimi-

nate the inherent unfairness that requires local government to make good the fault of others."

Councillor Clement is concerned that a court deciding against the Town and awarding a major settlement could raise property taxes and reduce municipal services.

MIA wants the current system of "joint and several liability" to be replaced with "proportionate liability" so liability is assigned in proportion to each defendant's role in causing damage or loss. Further, MIA wants the limitation period reduced from 30 years to 10 years.

Weyerhaeuser supports treaty offer to Haida Nation

Weyerhaeuser announced its support on September 4 for the treaty land offer made by the provincial government to the Haida Nation. The government offered 200,000 hectares of Crown land in a bid to re-engage the Haida in treaty negotiations.

"This land offer and reinvigorated treaty discussions will contribute to improved relations," said Tom Holmes, Weyerhaeuser's vice president for timberlands operations on the BC coast. "We fully support the BC

government's efforts to resolve outstanding claims with the Haida Nation."

"Weyerhaeuser will continue to work hard to develop mutually beneficial relationships with the Haida," Holmes said. "But only the Haida and governments can resolve long-standing claims. It's critical to the social and economic health of this region that these issues are resolved so that the local economy can expand and provide stable employment for island residents."

Former Nickel Plate executive joins Goldcliff

A third member of the team that successfully tapped the historic Nickel Plate gold mine has joined the Board of Directors of Goldcliff Resource Corporation. Paul Saxton, PEng, MBA, mining engineer, was Vice President of Operations of Mascot Gold where he was responsible for building the Nickel Plate open pit mine. Saxton joins other Mascot veterans Leonard Saleken and Edwin Rockel on the Goldcliff Board.

Goldcliff President Leonard Saleken said he is confident Saxton's experience with Mascot in the Hedley Gold Basin will be a real asset to the company.

"He was part of the Mascot-Nickel Plate team that put the mine back into production in 1987," said Saleken, "That resulted in the production of one

million ounces of gold from surface mining."

The original Nickel Plate underground operation produced one and a half million ounces of gold from 1904 to 1955.

The Mascot-Nickel Plate mine site is just four kilometres west of Goldcliff's target exploration area, Panorama Ridge. The company is exploring three significant gold zones in what it believes is an extension of the Nickel Plate formation.

Paul Saxton has been active in the mining industry since 1969, holding positions in numerous Canadian mining companies as mining engineer, mine superintendent, vice-president and president. He was responsible for design, construction and operation of mines including the Nickel Plate mine.
