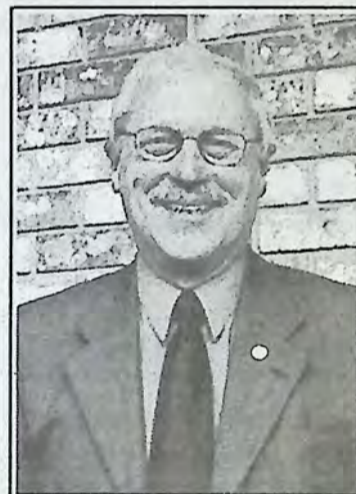

Will Board fire teachers?

Angry teachers will defy Victoria

Teachers will consider asking the School Board NOT to deduct fees to the BC College of Teachers from their paycheques, despite the potential for being dismissed from their jobs.

For years, teachers have paid annual fees to the College of Teachers, but now that the government has stacked the College Council with government appointees, teachers are refusing to pay the \$90 fee. They are angry and feel they should not pay for a professional association in which they have no elected representatives.

Neil Worboys, President of BC Teachers Federation (BCTF) was in town last week to talk to Princeton's teachers about their feelings on what the government has done. He has travelled to communities throughout BC, and the response from teachers has been one of anger.

The BC College of Teachers was formed in 1987 by Bill 20, legislated by the Vander Zalm government. It is responsible for issuing teacher certificates and imposing disciplinary measures.

In the past, teachers elected representatives to sit on the College of Teachers Council and paid fees to cover costs of the Council's activities. In June 2003, the Campbell government passed Bill 51, which effectively denies teachers the right to elect their own representatives.

Sunday Summit takes its toll

A crash at Sunday Summit occurred Friday morning when a westbound vehicle crossed the center line while passing a commercial vehicle and collided with a westbound vehicle, then was hit in the rear by a following vehicle. Police, ambulance, and highway rescue personnel attended. Five persons were involved in the three-vehicle crash.

Two of the vehicles were totally destroyed. Surprisingly, due to seat belts and air bag, there were no serious injuries. A 72 year old Kaleden resident was charged with failing to keep right. The following day, a 30 year old Maple Ridge man went off the road on the same curve. Alcohol and speed were the likely cause. He was charged with driving without due care and attention.

Highway 3 landmark will disappear

The Esso station at the intersection of Vermilion Avenue and Highway 3 will close this week and will be removed by the owners. A landmark of Princeton will disappear.

Currently operated by Sue and Bob Coyne, the service station has seen more than 50 years of B.C. history, and made some history itself.

The Esso station was originally operated by Elmer Burr, who owned a downtown service station, repair garage and car dealership (Burr Motors) in the former Keywest Motors building. The Esso station was built to service

vehicles on the newly constructed Hope-Princeton Highway, a highway which Burr had promoted for years.

When Burr hired pretty girls to operate the pumps, Princeton's Esso station became well-known to travellers as the place to stop for gas. At a time when most of the people behind the wheel, and at the gas pumps, were males, there was a lot of appeal in having pretty girls in pedal pushers filling the gas tank.

Burr's Esso station meant more locally than merely a place to attract drivers by having pretty

girls pump gas. Burr liked to hire students for the summer, and he liked to hire students who were going to continue their education and go to university.

In those days, there were a lot of jobs for girls coming out of high school but employers wanted full-time employees, not students. Burr knew the ambitious students needed money for further education, so he hired them for the summer and kept them working weekends through the school year. He loaned money to a couple of them

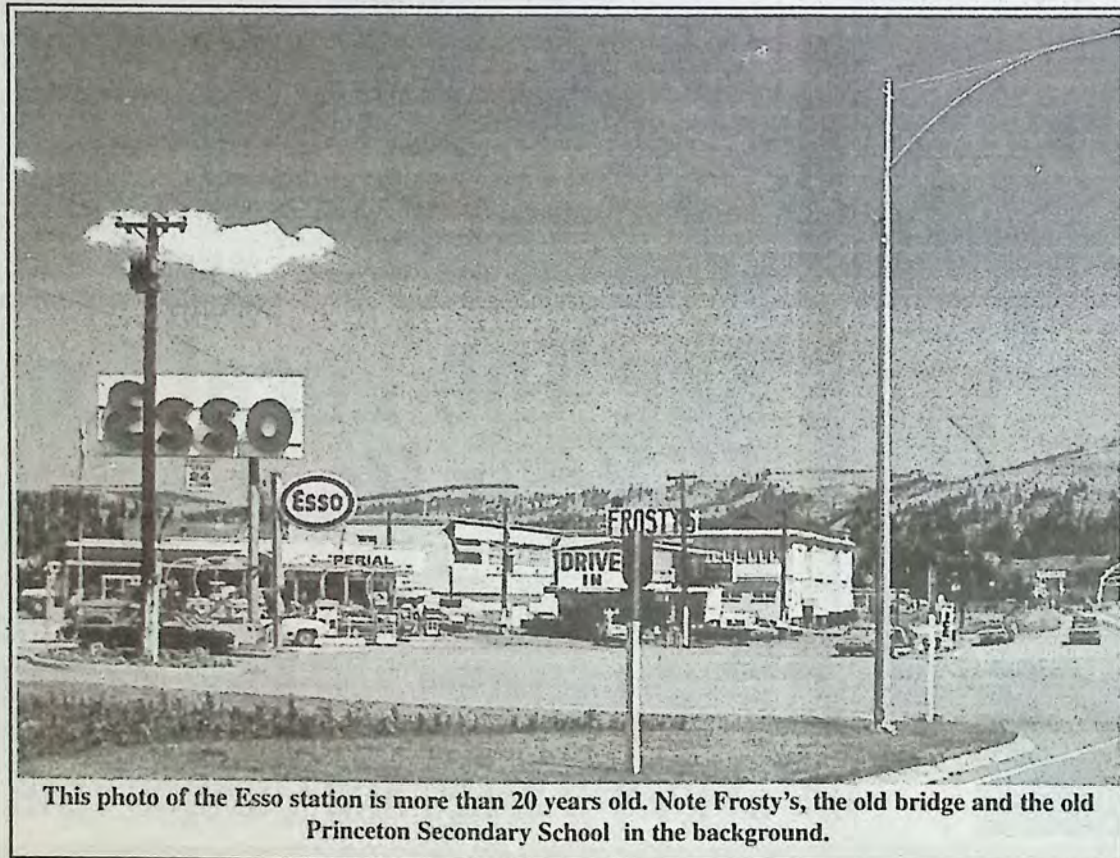
Princeton RCMP seized \$200,000 in Canadian currency and \$5,800 in American currency after a routine traffic stop on September 17.

Police were on Highway 3 doing a routine traffic check when they pulled over a speeding Lower Mainland vehicle. Police received conflicting stories from occupants of the vehicle. Police also detected marihuana in the vehicle. A search of the vehicle located the money and the vehicle occupants could not provide a reasonable explanation as to where the money came from. RCMP seized the money under Proceeds of Crime Act.

RCMP arrest reported car theft suspect

On September 18, Princeton RCMP Detachment received a report of a stolen vehicle possibly heading toward Princeton from the Lower Mainland. At 9:00 p.m., police observed this vehicle travelling north on Highway 5A. With the assistance of Merritt RCMP, the vehicle was stopped without incident. The two male occupants fled from the vehicle, and one was apprehended in a few minutes.

The 38 year old Lower Mainland resident has been charged with possession of stolen property. This person was found to have several warrants outstanding for his arrest for other Criminal Code offences. He was transported to Penticton RCMP for appearance in court on Friday, September 19.

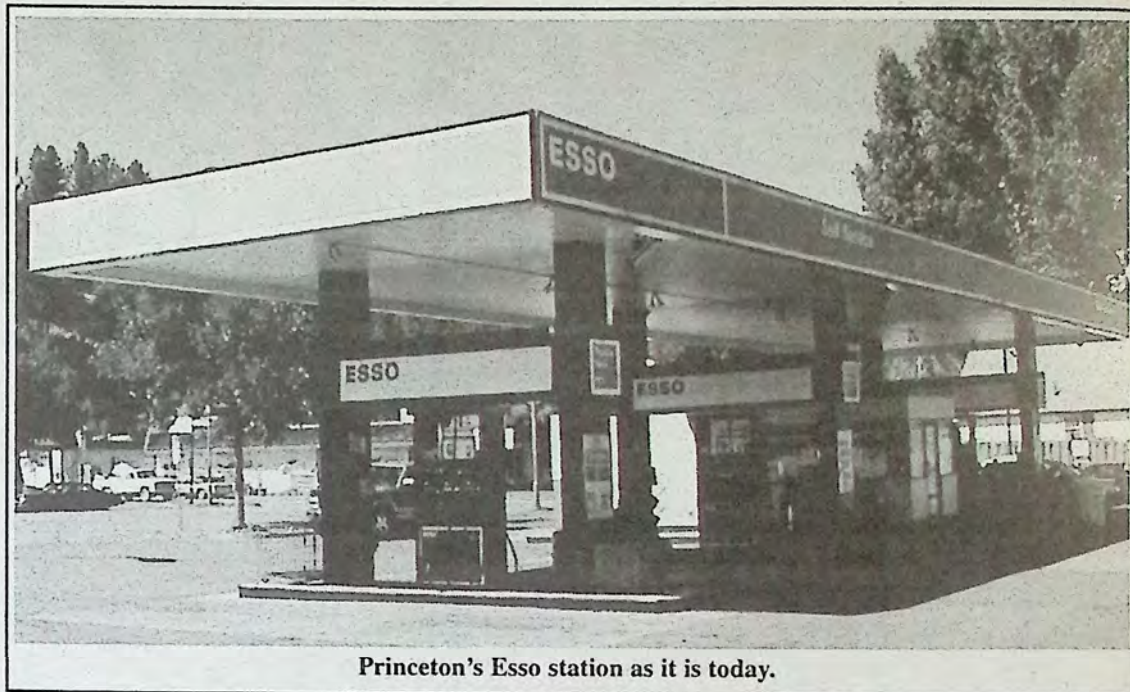

Spearman, and the Anderson sisters – Ethel, Myrt and Marg. We have the names of a couple of guys as well - Bob Callander and Terry Edstrom. The Coynes will still be in business in Princeton. They are moving their Coffee Shack to Mohawk, thanks to an invitation from Al and Lois Knowles. What will take the place of the Esso station? At this time, nobody knows. All of the equipment, including the tanks, will be removed. The soil will be tested

Students complete Marathon of Hope

Students at Vermilion Forks Elementary School spent Friday afternoon on a unique project – they completed the Terry Fox Marathon of Hope. Students ran laps around the playing field all week, each lap equal to one kilometre. On a big map on the gym wall, the distances, and laps completed, were entered onto the map.

The students began at Thunder Bay, Ontario, where Terry Fox had to give up his run due to the return of his cancer. By Friday, students had run to Calgary. That afternoon, they completed the Marathon of Hope, one lap at a time.

tatives to the College Council. Adding insult to injury, the appointed Council increased the teachers' fees to \$90 per year. The teachers must pay, because every teacher must be a member of the College of Teachers.

Worboys said the government appointed College Council is "strike three" since the Campbell government came into power. Strike One was classifying teachers as an essential service, taking away their right to strike. Strike Two was legislated contracts, which stripped them of their right to bargain. Strike Three is the dismantling of their professional association run by them.

The News Leader asked Worboys if he considers this action by the government "union-busting". He replied that, at this point, it is union busting tactics, but he compared the action to the health services experience, and related it to the privatization philosophy of the present provincial government.

Worboys pointed out that schools are underfunded, and although the

government has promised a boost of \$145 million over three years, an analysis by BCTF shows \$50 million goes to public schools, \$30 million goes to private schools, and the rest to debt servicing and other costs.

"It isn't going to the classroom," he said.

He is very concerned about the loss of 91 schools in BC, which means 14,000 students travel longer distances to go to school, and there are 3,000 fewer teachers in B.C.

"We have gross underfunding and lost opportunities for children," Worboys says. "All of us need to work together for the good of children."

Nobody knows what will happen to teachers if they do not pay their College of Teachers fees. Speculation on the results poses the question of whether they can remain in the classroom if they are not members of the College of Teachers. If they are not members, then school boards are obliged to dismiss them and send the students home.

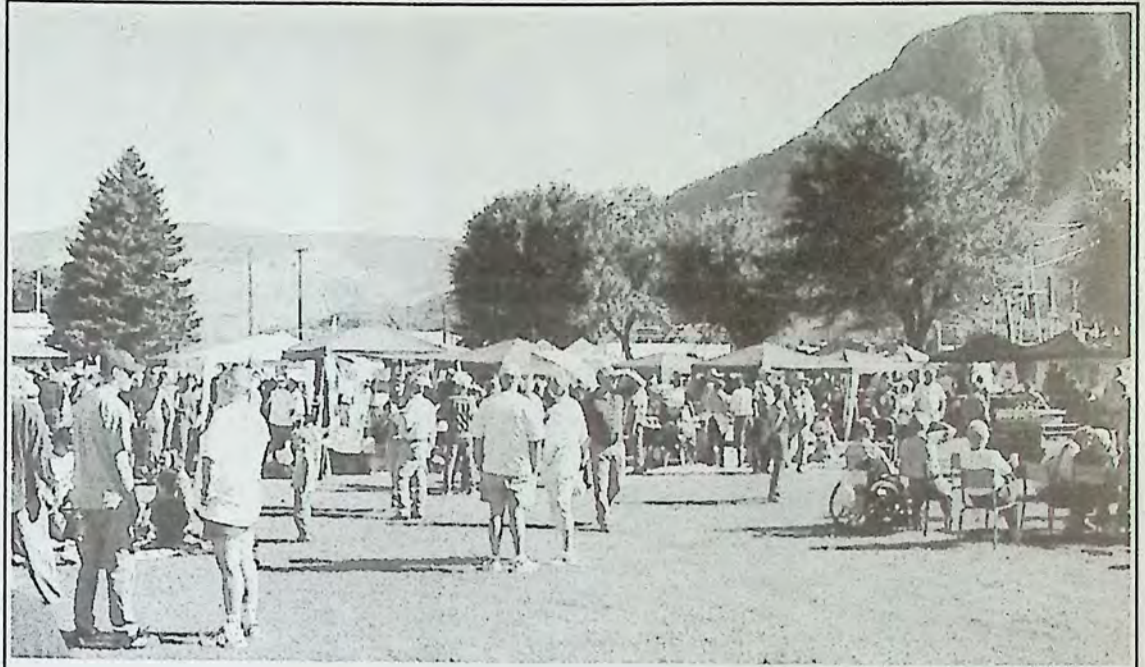

Okanagan Nation wants resource collaboration

Okanagan Nation Alliance (ONA) announced a new last week to defend aboriginal rights against provincial forestry and land use initiatives.

At a joint strategy meeting hosted by ONA, Chief George Saddleman, Chair of ONA, stated, "We seek reconciliation with the provincial Crown, but it is time for First Nations to take our rightful place in decision-making about forestry and land use on our territories."

The meeting in Kelowna was convened to build land and resource alliances among First Nations and develop an effective and united response to new provincial forestry legislation and initiatives.

The Kelowna meeting reviewed legal and other strategies to counter government initiatives that:

- * place significant restraints on First Nations access to tenure and revenue-sharing;
- * amend the *Forest Act* in ways that

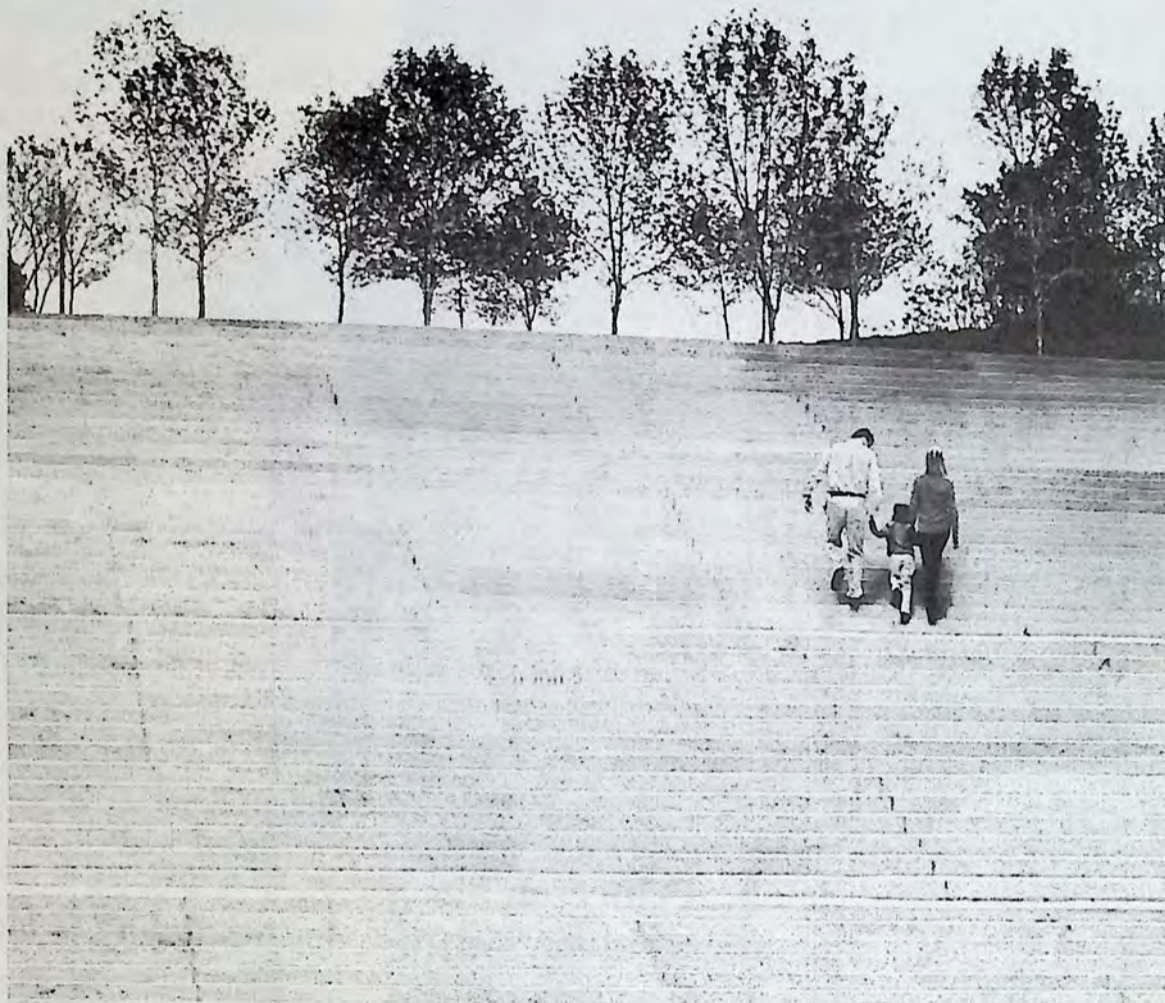
lead to infringements of Aboriginal Title and Rights; and

* use interim measures to restrict the exercise of Aboriginal Title and Treaty Rights.

BC First Nations believe this meeting will show that First Nations will use legal, financial and political opportunities to protect the integrity of the land and resources and advance Aboriginal title, and Aboriginal and Treaty Rights. This was the first of a series of such meetings.

You're going to pierce where?

Body piercing has become much more mainstream. For your own health and safety, it is important to go to a piercing parlour that is reliable and has a good reputation.

Ask these questions:

* Does the parlour have an autoclave? That is the only way to sterilize equipment. Does the piercer wear disposable rubber gloves?

* Are the piercers using ear piercing guns? If they are, go elsewhere. A piercing gun cannot be fully sterilized and may harbour bacteria.

* Does the shop re-use needles? NEVER let a piercer use a needle on you that was soaked in a liquid.

All needles should be in individual packages and should be opened while you are present.

* Does the studio seem clean? There should be a clean zone for doing the actual piercing and a "dirty zone" for sterilizing and doing other shop business.

* Does the piercer seem knowledgeable? Ask the piercer how long they have been piercing, how many clients they have had, and how they learned.

* What about consents? The piercer should ask questions about your general health and have you sign an informed consent. (Young people under age 16 need parental consent for all piercings but ears.)

* What do your friends say? Is this where your friends went? Did any

of them have problems or infections? Was the staff helpful? Would they get pierced there again?

* Does the piercing parlour have an aftercare sheet? Read this sheet before your piercing. If you are told to clean your piercing with ointment or hydrogen peroxide, the studio is not keeping up with industry standards.

* What are the jewelry choices? Jewelry MUST be new and should be made from stainless steel, not nickel, to limit allergies (some people will have an allergic reaction even to stainless steel).

When you decide to go ahead with your piercing, select a time when you are healthy, well rested, have eaten recently and are mentally ready.

* Follow the after-care instructions and clean the pierced site with the appropriate solution as frequently and for as long as recommended.

* Always wash your hands with soap and water before touching the pierced area or jewelry.

* Keep the pierced area free of chemicals like hair spray and after showering, rinse the pierced area with clear water to remove soap, or shampoo residue.

* Do not hold a public telephone against a newly pierced ear, and clean your own phone frequently with a disinfectant.

* change your pillowcase frequently if you have had facial or ear piercing. When the issue of piercing comes up in your home, the decision should be a joint one based on the best information available.

Living Past 100

Being a "senior" is not being "special"

Among many people in the category of "senior citizen", there is a tendency to think of being senior as some kind of handicap. Such seniors request special treatment in all sorts of situations. This attitude is not justified in today's world, except perhaps financially.

The attitude of being "special" and requiring extra consideration is not justified unless the senior is ill with a debilitating disorder such as Alzheimer's, osteoporosis or crippling arthritis. Just being "senior" is no excuse for self-pity nor self-indulgence. In fact, that kind of attitude will ensure illness and earlier death!

Turning 65 today is no more traumatic than turning thirty or forty or fifty. As there are increasing numbers of people living past 100, turning 65 is more like middle age. Most seniors today participate in all kinds of events, travel, work, and learn new skills. These are the seniors who will live past 100.

There are plenty of seniors who do have physical problems. They suffer from thyroid disease, diabetes, arthritis, and all sorts of chronic ailments. However, people of all ages can have these disorders, learn to live with them, and go on to achieve great things. Even relatively young people can succumb to Alzheimer's, cancer, kidney failure, heart disease, stroke, liver problems and osteoporosis. Flu and pneumonia are a senior's deadliest enemies, because they strike quickly and intensely.

It is by having the right attitude, staying active, eating properly, taking vitamin supplements and exercising the body and mind that people live past 100. "Special" treatment leads only to death.

The best role of a senior citizen is as a leader who teaches the young good attitudes. Too many grandparents will be remembered, after their early deaths, as rude, crabby, self-pitying cranks. What memories will you leave?



New Hope for local gardeners

Town insurance costs soar

Taxpayers face a 38 percent increase in the cost of insurance for the Town of Princeton. The insurance covers property and crime, boiler and machinery, and accident and travel. The policy cost \$13,811 this year, and Town Administrator Cornie Froese stated the Town is lucky to be able to find an insurance company willing to cover the Town.

In a letter to Town Council, the insurers stated, "Over the last few years, many catastrophic events have hit the insurance industry. Major natural disasters and other events have influenced global insurance rates. Since the disaster of September 11, 2001, the total claims paid is almost \$100 billion dollars, and the recent European floods, total claims paid is almost \$20 billion dollars. With lowered interest rates and a downturn in stock markets, insurance companies world-wide are having to rebuild the global insurance reserves in order to be prepared for other catastrophic disasters, such as earthquakes or hurricanes. Insurance rates are increasing an average of 30 percent and much higher in some situations."

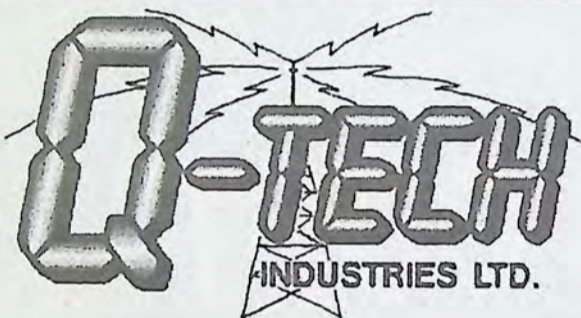

Be a partner in your child's education

It's a downward trend. As children start kindergarten, parents are quite involved with the child's education. We attend parent-teacher interviews, cheer on our kids at school concerts and events, and hang up school work on the kitchen gallery, the refrigerator.

As children become older, parents grow farther away from school. Kids seem to be doing well without our involvement. They're supposed to be independent, right? Yes, but not by parental retreat. Kids need their parents to stay actively involved in their education throughout middle and high school.

Parents can easily stay involved in small ways that will make a big difference. Children reap great benefits when parents participate in their children's education. Kids are more motivated to do well in school. They are committed to pursuing higher education. They are less likely to use alcohol, become violent or engage in anti-social behaviour. They are more likely to be involved in positive school activities. Parents can easily stay involved in small ways that will make a big difference. You can maintain communication with your child's teachers. Call to check with them every month. Call before real trouble appears. Attend all conferences. If you can't make it, arrange another appointment. Talk with your child about homework - focus more on the issues and topics than specific assignments. Ask about daily happenings at school.

Join your local Parent Advisory Committee. This is a great place to find out what is happening in your school. It is a great place to meet people and keep in touch with your principal and school trustees. These meetings are open to everyone.

In Princeton, all PAC's meet at 7:00 p.m. in the library or staff room of the school. John Allison - third Wednesday of

every month. Vermilion Forks - second Tuesday of the month. Riverside Intermediate - first Monday of the month. PSS - last Monday of the month. Children and youth are more likely to grow up healthy when their parents are involved in their education and school. You are your child's first educator and you should forge a partnership with your child's other educators from the first day of class.

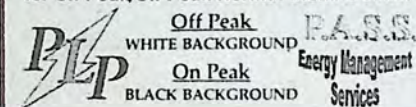

BC teachers raise a question of principle

One of the principles on which Canadian Confederation is based is the principle of "no taxation without representation". The teachers of British Columbia are now asked to pay a fee for an arm of government in which they have no say. The government has appointed people to replace democratically elected representatives of the teachers on the Council of the BC College of Teachers. Therefore, the annual fees paid by teachers are now taxes.

The College of Teachers is like the College of Physicians and Surgeons, or the Bar Association. The College of Teachers decides who meets the qualifications to deserve a teaching certificate, and disciplines members through removal of a teaching certificate. In order to be eligible to be hired by a school board, a teacher must have a certificate and must be a member in good standing of the BC College of Teachers. If that membership is lost, the teacher can no longer teach. This is law in British Columbia.

Teachers are proposing to refuse to have school boards automatically deduct the College of Teachers fees.

From the standpoint of teachers, this is understandable. Teachers are being asked to pay the government for taking away representation on the teachers' own professional association. The consequences of not paying are that every school board must then fire every teacher who is no longer a member in good standing of the College of Teachers. Under current legislation, teachers cannot strike and they cannot bargain, so they have few weapons with which they can protect themselves. Of concern to the public, however, is what happens when all of the teachers are dismissed due to lack of membership in the College of Teachers. Where do all the children go for education? Will all parents be expected to send their children to private schools or will teachers in private schools show solidarity with their colleagues and be out of work, too?

The other question we need to address is whether this trend of assuming control of professional associations will extend to the BC Bar Association and the College of Physicians and Surgeons? The teachers are challenging the government's action in court. What will the legal profession decide is fair?

There is a lot less freedom in British Columbia these days. While the present provincial government may pride itself on union-busting and smile with satisfaction at their extreme right-wing policies, there are other words which can describe the extreme right wing.

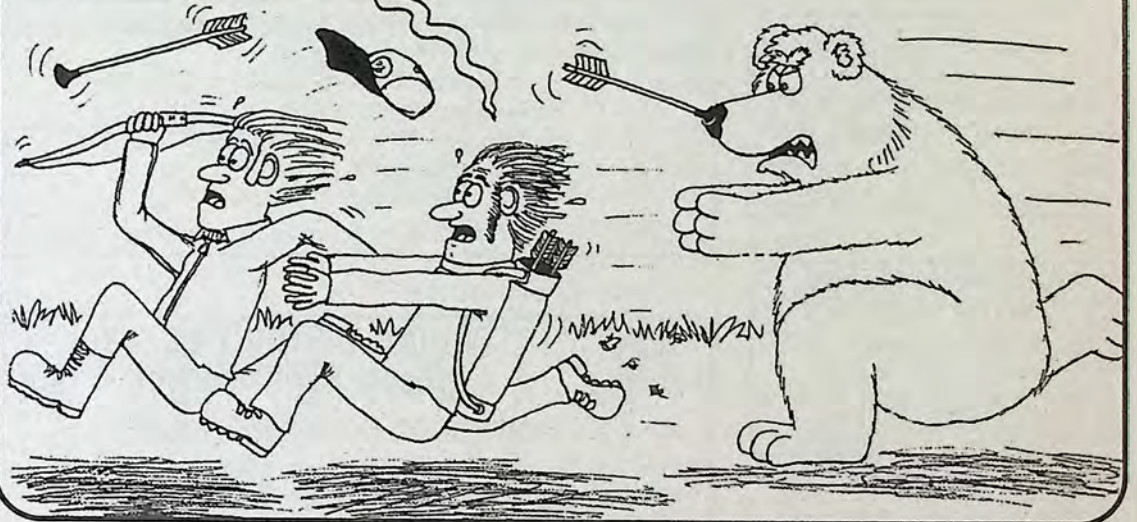

Taxpayers Federation takes dim view of health workers' bribe

Dear Editor;

We hope there is a cash prize for taxpayers who do not become sick with contempt over the announcement that health care workers will be rewarded, above their regular pay and benefits, for fulfilling their basic contractual obligation. In other words, bonuses for coming to work – when they are not sick.

For those away or working off a coma this week, we were made to believe it's not enough that Vancouver area health workers are paid handsomely to perform their duties; now they must be enticed with \$300 cash prizes to prompt any sense of responsibility toward their patients, colleagues and employer (i.e. taxpayers).

By 2006, Vancouver Coastal Health Authority's budget of \$1.9 billion must be cut by \$175 million, or 11 percent. The VCHA, which oversees the health needs of 1.1 million resi-

dents of the Lower Mainland, hopes to save \$4 million a year by getting more of its 27,000 employees to show up for work every day. An authority spokesperson said a cash enticement would help workers ponder the all-important question: "Do I really feel like going to work today? Nah, I think I'll call in sick."

In yet another classic case of failing to ask: what is the problem that requires this, that or any other solution? the VCHA has prescribed a cure for a budgetary problem with side effects that worsen an already chronic absenteeism virus.

Consider the perverted message being sent to these health care workers: as a reward for not feigning some mysterious Friday or Monday illness, they will qualify for a chance to win \$300. The terms of this lotto are that they not be sick for

You really don't have to flush

We have heard more about water conservation this year than in any other year, but while all of the water conservation measures described are good, there is one that never seems to reach the light of day. Can you imagine how much water would be saved if everyone stopped flushing toilets?

I know what you're thinking: imagine the stink. That does not have to be true. There is a kind of toilet that does not need flushing, and does not need a sewer system. It is the composting toilet run by electricity, and it does not stink.

Let's say the average household flushed the toilet 10 times a

day, using four litres of water in each flush, that makes 40 litres of water a day, or 280 litres of water a week or 1200 litres of water a month. There are approximately 800 residences in Princeton, so we are using 96,000 litres of water a month just for toilets. That is more than a million litres a year for flushing toilets in one little town!

Now imagine how much water Kelowna could save, or Vancouver.

There is a plus side - the compost. Think how much compost could be generated by these composting toilets. Each toilet needs to be dumped once a month and generated about two kilos of compost. We could be manufacturing 1600 kilos of badly needed compost every month. We could have a compost collection truck come around, or just put it in our gardens. What a splendid benefit that would be!

We not only waste water, we waste beneficial soil nutrients in a land where soil nutrients are at a premium because we have so little soil.

If all of us went to composting toilets, we would have a lot more water. If every residence with a

lawn also had a holding tank for all of the other water that goes into the sewer in summer, these residences would be able to water lawns and gardens any time of day or night! We would not have water restrictions!

Right now, the building code does not permit residences to have composting toilets. If everyone insisted this was the way to go, we would have to persuade the government to change the building code.

There are other benefits to the no-flush toilets. The toilet would never become plugged and run over, flooding the bathroom. You would never have to buy expensive cleaning products to clean it.

There is one bad side-effect. What would we do with all of those porcelain thrones? Imagine the whole province converting - could these items be recycled?

What would we do with all of the septic tanks from rural areas? What would backhoe operators do for a living?

When you look at it from an economic standpoint, saving water from the flush would be bad for business, and maybe that's why the no-flush toilet is not allowed in the building code.

six months between September and March, which just happens to be the start, heart, and end of flu season. There must be some very high fevers running at VCHA to come up with schemes like this. The same authority spokesperson estimated the average health employee takes at least 10 sick days annually. Fortunately, more accurate statistics exist. Over the three-year period 2000 - 02, workers in the health care industry averaged 15.2 days off. That's 50 percent more than the health authority's "estimate"; it's 65 percent more than the total rate of absenteeism across B.C. over the same period (9.2 days a year) and it's 79 percent higher than Statistics Canada's absenteeism calculation across the country (8.5 days per year).

There is one solution, however, that may not get the attention it deserves. And that is to pronounce as shameful, as unprofessional, and as irresponsible any person who wilfully breaks their contract. Shame won't get everyone out of bed on those days when they'd rather sleep in. And so, rather than a prize, how about a \$300 penalty for every day anyone goes over the national average for absenteeism?

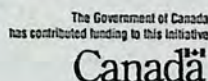
