



### Semi creams pick-up

A small, older model pick-up truck had its driver side fender and wheel removed on Saturday morning when a westbound semi took the curve too wide near Friday Creek west on Princeton on Highway 3. The semi lost a wheel at the rear of its trailer. An injured woman was taken by ambulance to Princeton General. The passenger suffered minor injuries and the couple's tiny dog was not hurt. It was a miracle nobody was killed.

### Hedley gold drilling starts

The drilling phase of Goldcliff's 2003 exploration program is now underway. Heavy equipment arrived at the Panorama Ridge gold project near Hedley on September 22. Access roads and drill pads will be completed and diamond drilling commences on October 6.

Back country closures during this summer's forest fires delayed the heavy equipment work by about a month, but Goldcliff President Leonard W. Saleken, PGeo, is confident the work will be completed on target.

"We've got some great crews in there," Saleken said. "They're really happy to get back to work and make up for lost time."

The Panorama Ridge gold project is a substantial discovery of seven showings/anomalies covering an area measuring 1.2 km. by 2.3 km. Field work conducted since the property was acquired by staking in 2000 includes mapping, rock chip and channel sampling, geochemistry, induced polarization and magnetic surveys and trenching. This work has highlighted gold skarn targets nearly identical to the historic Nickel Plate Mine located four kilometres to the west.

Earlier in the 2003 field season, Goldcliff completed 527 soil samples and 52 line kilometres of magnetic surveys to further define drill targets. Since property acquisition, more than 1100 surface rock samples have been collected. These samples have an average grade of 1.303 grams per tonne at a 0.50 grams per tonne cut-off. ### Victoria postpones policing costs

Communities in B.C. will not have to pay for policing costs until 2007. An announcement by Solicitor General Rich Coleman last week took the pressure off small communities facing new costs.

Coleman said communities had identified significant inequities in how community policing costs were determined under the proposed methods. He stated, "... our priority is to work with those communities to ensure changes are made fairly and equitably for local taxpayers." The new time frame gives communities three more years to plan for policing costs. It will allow them to use the 2006 census to calculate costs.

When the changes are implemented in 2007, communities having populations of fewer than 5,000 will fund 35 percent of policing costs. Communities having populations greater than 5,000 will pay 70 percent, and communities with a pop-

ulation greater than 15,000 will pay 90 percent.

Communities having no RCMP contract will pay 100 percent of their own policing costs.

The province will pay a further \$190

million for policing to ensure full and adequate law enforcement across the province.

In both Princeton and Keremeos, the population within municipal boundaries is less than 5,000.

### Firemen tackle fire on slope behind hospital

Princeton Volunteer Fire Department was called out on the morning of Tuesday, September 23, to extinguish a grass fire on the slope below Princeton General Hospital. The slope back of the hospital goes down to the Tulameen River. Fire Chief Eric Gregson says the fire is believed to have been started by a small campfire or a cigarette in the grass.

Chief Gregson asked the News Leader to advise the

public to continue to be conscious of the need for fire prevention.

"The fuels are still very dry, even though it rained," Gregson stated. "The soil underneath the surface is extremely dry."

The potential for a full-scale fire exists despite cooler weather, and in the area in question, the wooded slope, the fire hazard will "always be there", Gregson said.

### Naturalists present 'living edge'

Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists will present the workshop "Healthy Shorelines" on October 4 in coordination with the Living Water project.

The topic is an introductory presentation providing a place to share information, showcase successes, discuss concerns and educate citizens about the role and value of healthy, natural shorelines.

The workshop will be facilitated by a representative of the Living

Water project, which is in partnership with the Federation of BC Naturalists and other community groups. A field trip to a local "shoreline" will be part of the program, giving participants a visual and practical example of a healthy or otherwise affected shoreline.

There is no registration fee - a donation jar will be available. The handbook "On the Living Edge - Your Handbook for Waterfront Living", the project's

recent publication will be on sale at \$14.95 plus GST (\$16.00). The book is a must for all shoreline residents as it provides practical information on a wide range of topics.

# Posse trouble!

## Deficits loom ahead

A mere handful of people attended the Posse public information meeting on September 24. The news they received was not good.

Clayton Hamilton chaired the meeting and commented on the poor turnout. The meeting was

advertised in newspapers and at the Saturday night Posse game.

Stan Turner distributed the Posse financial statement up to June 30, 2003, which showed \$1,935 in the bank account. However, \$5,000 for season tickets for the 2003-04 season was included in that amount, so the Posse was actually operating in a deficit position.

Hamilton said, "Operating a Junior B hockey team is tough." Sponsorships are down, there are 50 fewer season tickets (season tickets are going at a reduced rate now). Although the admission cost is now one dollar higher, it is not generating any increase in revenue, indicating attendance is down.

To add to the financial troubles, bussing costs are up \$7,000 more this year. The Posse issues a tender for bus charter services and takes the lowest bid for the package. Expenses last year were \$124,000 and this year are expected to go up to \$130,000.

John Babiak remarked on the sudden decline in business due to the backroads closures and loggers out of the bush due to the fire hazard situation. This may have influenced sponsors and attendance.

Stan Turner noted the uncertainty in the community, such as what might happen if Weyerhaeuser workers strike.

Hamilton commented, "We still have great fans, but we don't know why attendance dropped off."

There will be a fundraiser show by the doctors and hospital staff to support the Posse.

Blair Noel, manager, said there is potential to raise more money, but the club is short of volunteers to make the contacts. The public meeting had been to look for a half dozen more volunteers, especially somebody to do sales and marketing.

addition to surface sampling, 2,007 soil samples have been collected, 100 line kilometres of magnetic and 75 line kilometres of IP have been conducted.

Individual targets to be drill tested include the "Epic", which measures 400 metres by 500 metres and has an IP chargeability high anomaly to 150 metre depth. The "Panorama" which measures 1000 metres by 500 metres has an IP chargeability high anomaly to 150 metres. The "Castle" target measures 1.0km. by 1.0 km. The 2003 diamond drill program includes 20 holes at

an average depth of 100 metres for a total of 2000 metres.

The Nickel Plate Mine recovered 1.5 million ounces of gold at an average grade of 0.46 ounces per ton from 1904-1955. The open pit component was conceived and developed in the late 1980s by Mascot Gold. Goldcliff Directors Len Saleken, Ed Rockel and Paul Saxton were all part of the Mascot Gold technical team that developed the successful open pit mine which produced an additional one million ounces of gold from 1989 to 1997.

## Living Past 100

### Peppers are good health

At this time of year, peppers are plentiful on the fruit stands and reasonably priced. Dollar for dollar, you cannot buy better nutrition. Sweet red peppers are the best buy because they contain huge amounts of beta-carotene and Vitamin C. Green bell peppers have good amounts of Vitamin C and beta-carotene.

What do peppers do for you? First and foremost, they help prevent cataracts. German researchers call peppers a "must have" food because of this.

Although peppers contain much more food value when eat fresh and raw, they do not lose a great amount of food value if cooked. It is important to cook them with a little fat, so gentle stir-frying is good. Fat helps the body absorb the nutrients in peppers.

Peppers are extremely expensive most of the year, but they can be frozen successfully and used in soups, stews and anything else you can think of. To freeze peppers, wash them, remove the seeds, and cut the peppers in strips or chunks. Spread the pieces on a cookie sheet and freeze. When frozen, put the pieces in bags and return to the freezer.

Of course, all of us know that beta-carotene and Vitamin C are cancer fighters. Because peppers are so rich in these nutrients, they fight cancer, too.

Make the most of peppers now. They can save your eyes and your life.

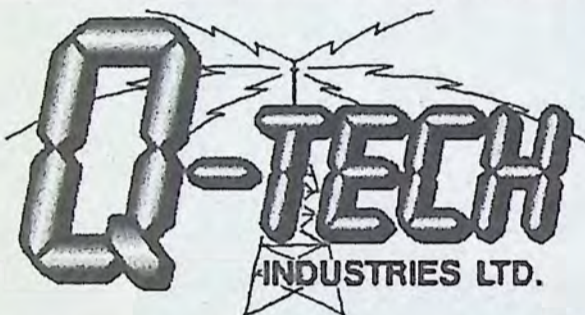

## Curling Club faces budget woes

Budgetary worries were the topic of most of the discussion at the annual general meeting of Princeton Curling Club. Gary Angstadt, Treasurer, gave the financial statement showing he had borrowed \$2,500 from the ladies' league to pay the bills, and the club itself is actually in the hole until the \$8,500 cheque from

Weyerhaeuser is received. He said he expected that cheque any day.

Angstadt reported expenses totalling \$52,763 for the past year, giving the club a net loss of \$2,810. Although expenses were down \$4,300, revenues were down \$2,200. The Curling Club has lost money for the past two years.

Sharon Beausoleil, acting as secretary, suggested the ladies might not request their money be returned. She noted Angstadt's comments about the club paying the cost of bonspiel expenses while the bonspiel profits go to the leagues. He had suggested the leagues pay their own expenses, and Beausoleil agreed, saying it should be discussed among the leagues.

Dan Sulentich said the club, which receives \$4,000 per year as a subsidy from the Town of Princeton, should go back to Council and Regional District and ask for more. He noted the Town pays \$125,000 per year in wages for the arena, and the curling bonspiels attract people to town. The executive agreed it was worth a try.

The ice will go in on October 1. Karen Brewer will coordinate Wednesday nights, Liz Murray will be seniors' coordinator, Cathy Turgeon will coordinate Mondays, and Rob Marshall and Ian Elko will coordinate Tuesdays.

Membership dues will remain the same as last year: \$135 for one league, \$180 for two leagues (plus \$10 Curling Association dues). Seniors pay a reduced rate of \$100 for one league and \$150 for two leagues, plus association dues.

Rick Marcicki, who curled in Red Deer, remarked on how reasonable the rates are in Princeton.

Angstadt said membership is down - a drop of 10 members. Shauna Jorgenson said the Curling Club booth at the Fall Fair had caught the interest of 11 people who left telephone numbers and asked to be called. Many had expressed interest in curling clinics. Those interested should call Shauna Jorgenson at 295-7971.

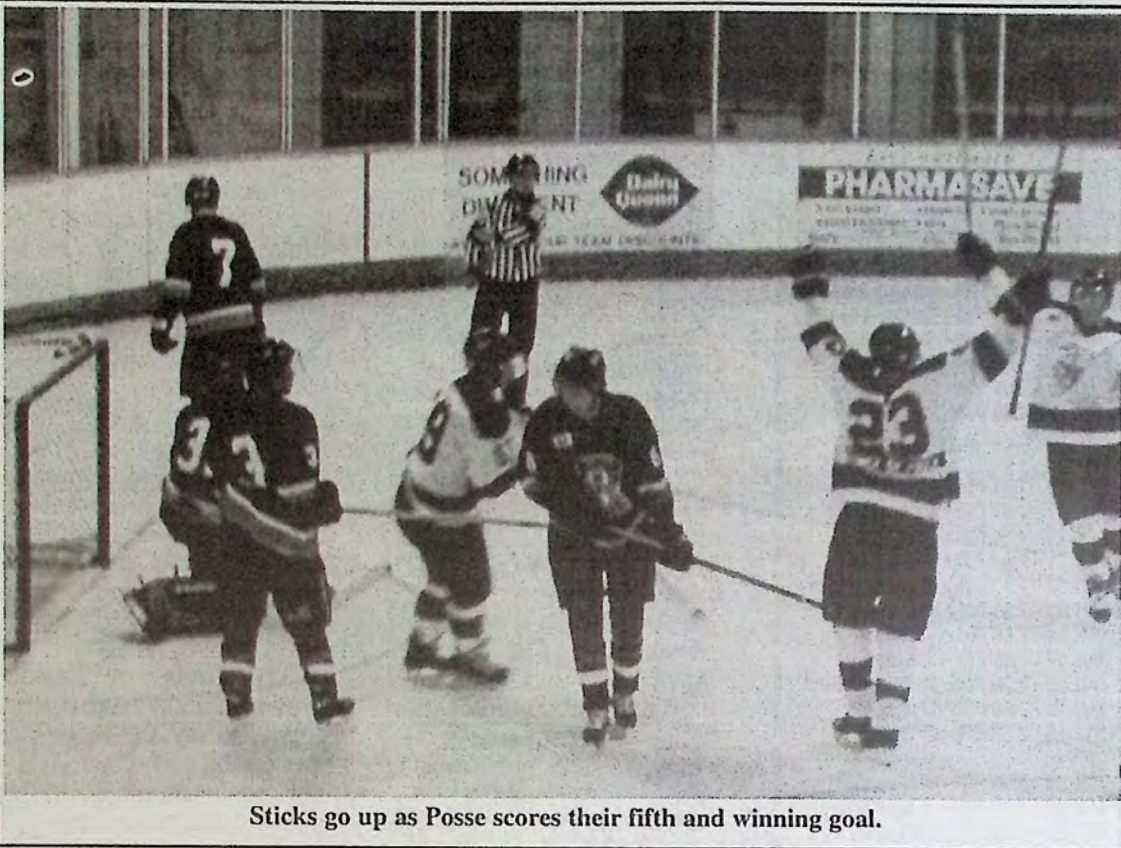

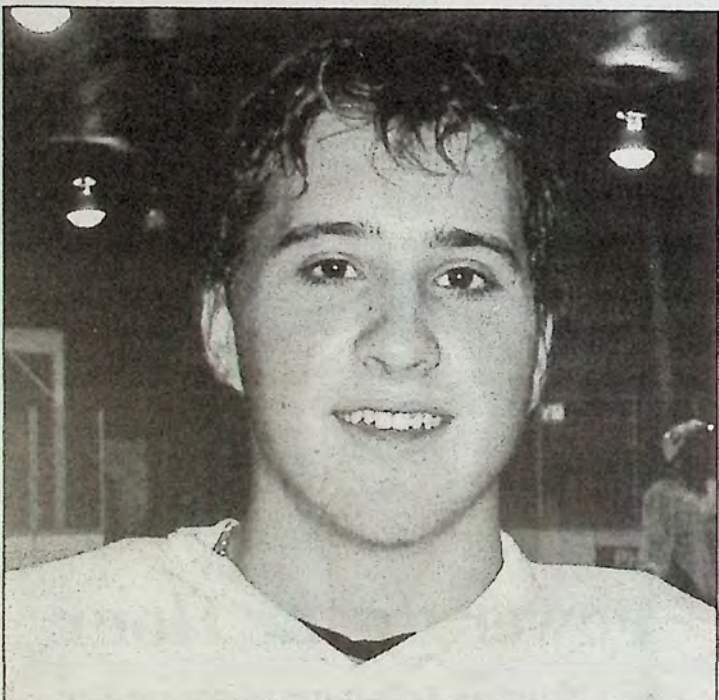

### Province undermines local control

Dear Editor,

What do greenhouses in Delta and fish farms on the coast have in common?

In both cases, the provincial government is willing to trample on the interests of local government and local citizens in order to impose its own will.

You may have heard about the escalating brouhaha between the province and the municipality of Delta over greenhouses – which featured prominently in discussions at last week's Union of BC Municipalities convention. Delta has been trying to pass a bylaw limiting the size of greenhouses on agricultural land. The municipality is worried about productive farmland being lost under ever-expanding greenhouses. A new bylaw, submitted to the province in January, has local support, but the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries rejected it.

How? by using the Farm Practices Protection Act, otherwise known as the right-to-farm act. The act, passed by the previous government, requires municipalities to obtain approval from the province whenever they want to pass a bylaw dealing with agriculture.

The original intent was valid: to protect farmland from inappropriate development like golf courses, and to protect farmers from people moving into neighbouring subdivisions and making unreasonable demands about how agriculture should sound and smell.

Nevertheless, for Delta, a city

known for its vast, rich farmland, regulating agriculture is a pretty big part of its mandate. So you can understand the frustration of the mayor and council over this seven-year fight with the province to protect farmland.

Lately, Delta has been getting some sympathy. The province wants to similarly handcuff coastal communities such as Salt Spring Island and Comox, this time over fish farms.

Bill 48, introduced in the spring and scheduled to be passed in the fall, will allow the provincial Cabinet to pass an Order-in-Council to designate any Crown land – including coastal waters – as a "farming area". That farming area would become subject to the right-to-farm act, and voila! municipal governments and regional districts no longer have any say. No debate in the legislature. No need to consult local elected officials.

Not surprisingly, Bill 48 has attracted the attention of local governments all along the coast. Four resolutions opposing Bill 48 will be voted on at the Union of BC Municipalities convention. Delta, Powell River Regional District and Island Trust have all asked that Bill 48 be scrapped.

The Islands Trust (elected representatives of the southern Gulf Islands) is concerned about the proposed Sablefish nursery on Salt Spring Island. The trustees oppose the development since it will be in a sensitive ecosystem and disturb a First Nations gravesite, but the trustees have no ability to stop it. The right-to-

farm act allows the province to trample on local democracy.

So much for the Community Charter, intended to give municipalities "more local autonomy". According to the government "the Community Charter will be the most empowering local government statute." So long as it is not decision-making power about agriculture or aquaculture, I guess.

The right-to-farm act also makes a mockery of the Salmon Aquaculture Review. The government lifted the moratorium on new fish farm licenses based on the Review's determination that the environmental risks were acceptable. Completely forgotten or ignored are the recommendations that were supposed to accompany the lifting of the moratorium.

One recommendation is that local advisory committees should be set up to get input from local government and residents about where fish farms are appropriate. And yet, advisory committees have not been established anywhere. Why would they, if the province will override them anyway?

The Islands Trust, with the support of local residents, does not want aquaculture development – neither a sablefish hatchery on Salt Spring Island nor a shellfish farm on Denman. Aquaculture simply does not fit in with their vision for their community. However, with Bill 48, residents and elected local governments will become even more powerless

If the province is truly interested in empowering local governments, it should scrap Bill 48. It should revamp the right-to-farm act so local governments have more power over land use decisions, not less. Adopting a more inclusive, conciliatory approach with municipalities and regional districts will go a long way to convincing them the province is on their side.

### Time To Go Back To School - Part 1

As summer comes to a close and the days grow shorter, children are once again grudgingly preparing for another school year. Arguably, the most critical academic lesson for investors has been the importance of asset allocation in reaching their long-term goals. In fact, studies show asset allocation is by far the most decisive factor in successful investing, responsible for roughly 90% of long-term portfolio returns\*, far outpacing security selection and marketing timing.

Despite this knowledge, some investors view the distribution of their investments across stocks and bonds as an afterthought in the investment process, while others attempt to time the market, placing large portions of their investment in whichever asset class is believed to outperform going forward. Neither of these approaches is recommended for conservative investors.

So far this year, the stock markets have performed very well, with many indices advancing 20% or more. This, combined with the lacklustre performance of the bond market of late, leaves many investors wondering if they should sell bonds and buy stocks. Perhaps.

Unfortunately, attempting to time the market this way by reading near-term performance data in either direction has proven to be extremely risky. If, by looking in the rear view mirror or overreacting to markets outlooks, an investor missed the 12 top-performing months between 1950 and today, the long-term performance declines by approximately 25% for each asset class. If the top 24 months were missed, performance is almost cut in half.

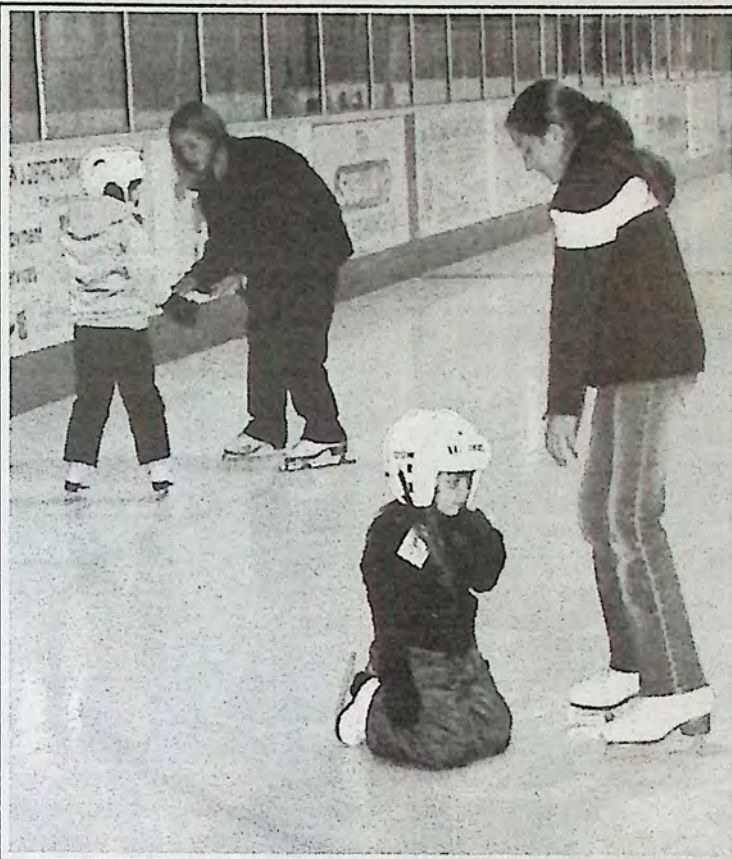
