# Mayor says "Get things out in the open"

## Town Council offers apology

Fall Fair President Jody Woodford responded to Council's criticisms at the October 6 Town Council meeting. She presented a brief addressing Council's concerns item by item. At the end of her presentation, a standing-room-only gallery applauded.

Mayor Keith Olsen began his comments by apologizing for giving Fall Fair the impression that the message to Fall Fair reflected Council's concerns.

"They were comments received from members of the public and discussed after our meeting," Mayor Olsen stated.

In regard to the item about the

mess left at the fairgrounds ("not cleaned up in a timely fashion"), Mayor Olsen said he had received a phone call as to what would happen regarding vehicles left on the grounds after the Fall Fair. He said he told the person it was the responsibility of Princeton Exhibition Association.

Mayor Olsen acknowledged the groups who have put in funds and volunteer work to improve the fairgrounds yearly, admitting the Town could not afford to pay for what the volunteers do.

At the end of her presentation, Woodford had asked Town Council whether Council would like to run the fair, or should the Fall Fair members continue.

"The Town would be more than pleased to have the Fall Fair operate the fair," Mayor Olsen said.

He went on to refer to the young people who are Fall Fair members as "an asset", and offered thanks from every member of the community for the good job you do." Councillor Kathy Clement added, "Thanks for the great work you do. Keep up the good work."

She remarked that the public should hear the brief Woodford presented. (see page 22 for the complete brief.)

Councillor Ray Jarvis told Woodford, "We are not the complainers. We hear the complaints from people as we go around town. I would never complain about this."

Mayor Olsen put a positive spin on the presentation when he said, "The only way to work together is to get things out in the open."

Neither Councillor Spencer Coyne nor Councillor Lorne Esselink offered any comment.

## Thief cons elderly couple

Pretending to be a repairman, a pudgy middle-aged man stole the savings of a couple in Vermilion Court.

On Saturday afternoon, October 11, at around 2:30 p.m., the man carrying a window screen measuring two feet by three feet knocked on the door of a couple in their 80's and said he was there to replace their window screen. They let him in.

While he was there, he located the woman's purse. The couple left the room briefly and while they were out of the room, he grabbed the purse and fled.

As well as losing a considerable amount of their savings, which were in the purse, the couple was traumatized and shaken up over the incident to the extent that the husband had to be taken by ambulance to

Princeton General Hospital for treatment.

Police need help from the public. They are seeking anyone who may have seen the man entering Vermilion Court carrying a window screen or leaving the crime scene. The thief is described as 40-50 years old, 5'8" to 5'10" in height, a

stocky or pudgy build, with brown hair and a receding hairline. He was clean-shaven, did not wear eye glasses and wore a dark coloured sweater or sweat shirt.

Anyone with any information which may assist police in identifying the thief is asked to call Princeton RCMP at 295-6911.

## Harkness reports to Council on health care

Similkameen Health Area Administrator Marilyn Harkness attended the October 6 Town Council meeting to update Council on local health issues. She began by noting statistics indicating changes in the way the hospital is used.

In comparison with last year's statistics, acute care admissions are down by 26 percent, Harkness told Council, but the length of patients stay is up 26 percent. Outpatient visits to the hospital are up by nine percent, and emergency visits are down by seven percent. Alternate levels of care (residential) are down 89 percent due to the expansion of Ridgewood Lodge. Residential care patients are not using acute care beds.

Jan Novaglia, nurse manager at Princeton General Hospital, will leave at the end of the month to become manager of the critical care step-down unit at Royal Inland Hospital. Harkness is recruiting for a replacement for Novaglia.

John Barrett is the new

Maintenance Supervisor.

Harkness expressed concern about down time among nursing staff due to illness. She said she is short of casual help and will continue efforts to recruit.

The Foundation gala night is this week, and Harkness expressed confidence that \$50,000 will be raised to pay for the Emergency Room ultra sound equipment. She added that the Foundation would like to reassure everyone in the community that money raised in Princeton stays in Princeton.

Pharmacy services for Princeton General Hospital are provided by Penticton Regional Hospital now, but pharmacy services for Ridgewood Lodge are contracted to Pharmasave and paid for through Pharmicare.

Medical records clerk Darla Biagioni has taken a Health Super Host course and will be training staff so as to improve customer service.

An advanced cardiac life support course will be given to doctors and nurses in November, financed

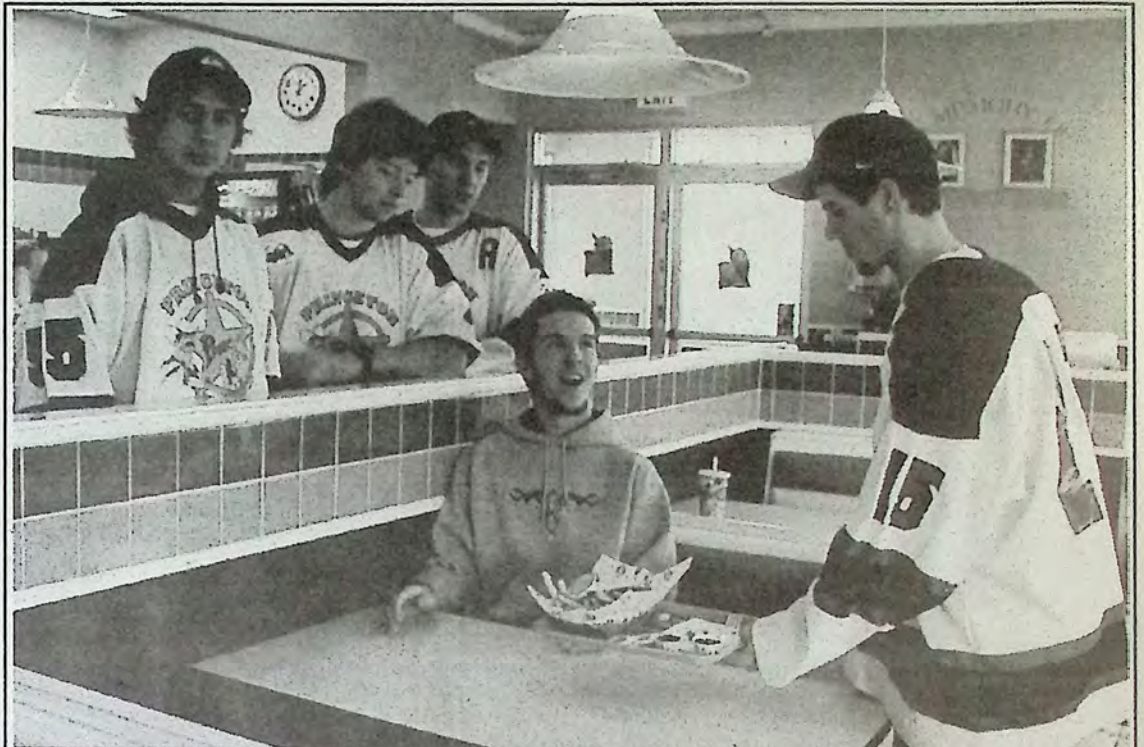

## Parks may be logged to prevent fire

Mayor Keith Olsen reported to Council on a meeting with Forests Minister Mike de Jong. They had discussed the potential for a major fire in Manning Park from standing deadwood. The Minister told Mayor Olsen the government is looking at selective logging and controlled burns in provincial parks to reduce the fire hazard. The Okanagan Mountain Park fire prompted the review of fire hazards in provincial parks.

Mayor Olsen said he told the

minister about Council's concerns about changes in stumpage rates.

In question period, a member of the public asked Town Council what plans they have for clearing deadwood and other flammables

from around Town boundaries. She was told Council has no jurisdiction over areas outside Town boundaries, so Council has no plans. However, the matter is going to be raised with Regional District.

## Trustees learn about risks

Trustee Gordon Swann reported on "risk assessment" at the October 1 school board meeting. Swann had attended a Trustee meeting of school trustees in Revelstoke in which risks faced by school boards was the topic.

When students died in an avalanche during a field trip out of Calgary, the deaths raised issues about the potential for school boards being sued by parents of children who are injured or killed during a school field trip. Swann pointed out the need for policy ensuring minimal risk to students participating in any field trip. Another form of risk was highlighted at the meeting. The summer forest fires challenged school boards and their employees in unexpected ways.

In the Kamloops and Kelowna areas, school staff rushed in the opposite direction to the evacuees. These school district employees hurried toward the fire to rescue filing cabinets filled with students' permanent records. Other matters,

such as loss of electrical power in some rural areas, resulted in the loss of refrigerators and a freezer full of organic biology materials. Many schools had to develop plans to take children from out of the catchment area, and to counsel children whose homes were burnt. Many arrived at school with nothing but the clothes they were wearing, no school supplies and no money for supplies. Swann told other trustees they should develop a plan for an emergency situation in which students may have to be moved suddenly in high-risk situations.

## Judge issues arrest warrants

Judge G.G. Sinclair issued warrants for a number of people who failed to appear at Provincial Court in Princeton on October 9. Among them were Shawn Callihoo, Daniel R. Hansen, John C. Moore and Veronica J. Shaw. A warrant was issued for Allan Materi, who could not be served with court notice because he could not be located.

through the Foundation, the Ministry of Health and the doctors.

Mayor Keith Olsen and Councillor Kathy Clement asked Harkness about remarks made by the Minister of Health regarding more communication with the public. Councillor Clement asked whether Harkness had heard anything about reinstatement of the Community Health Advisory Councils. Harkness had heard no plans to that effect, but did say Interior Health is doing a good job of communicating with the public by sending out news letters.

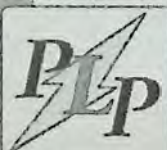

## InfoCentre needs new sign

The information sign located outside Similkameen Country's InfoCentre has been retired.

Following over twenty years of service, Similkameen Country President Ron Murdock says the sign was becoming a hazard.

"It hung over the sidewalk and letters kept falling off in the wind."

Replacing the sign will not be cheap. The original sign was donated to the InfoCentre, a replacement will cost between \$3,100 and \$4,100, based on three different price quotes obtained by Similkameen Country.

The Village of Keremeos has been approached for help in purchasing the sign.

Council dealt with the matter at their October 6th regular meeting, referred the request for financial assistance to the Budget Committee for further discussion and recommendation.

Similkameen Country requested \$1,000 from the Village as the information sign is used to promote activities in the community.

Similkameen Country will cover the balance of the cost, regardless of the amount of aid received from other sources.

Without a large information sign Murdock says, "local groups will have no way of advertising upcoming events."

The Provincial Government has also been approached for financial assistance through MLA Dave Chutter.

Murdock says the cause will not become a fundraising project as the sign will likely be replaced by the end of the year.

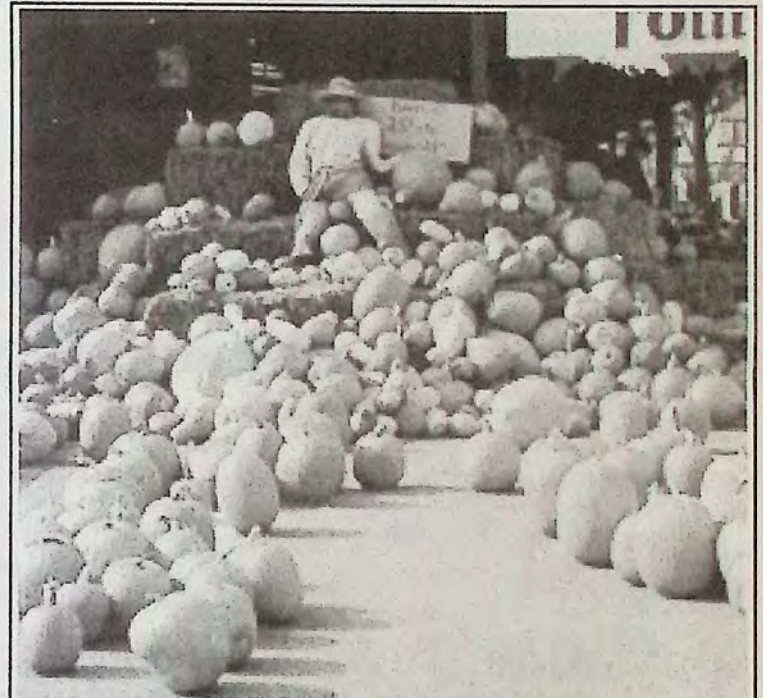
"It's something that had to be done, and now we're doing it."

Local groups will not be charged to use the sign to advertise their events, but private individuals may be charged a nominal fee to announce birthdays or anniversaries.

Similkameen Country has not finalized details on a fee schedule for such use.

The replacement illuminated sign will measure a total of 4 feet by 8 feet with room for four or

six lines of type with six or eight inch high letters, depending on which sign is purchased.

## Grant will aid families with literacy

Lower Similkameen Community Services will be receiving \$14,000 from the provincial government to develop family literacy support services in the South Similkameen area.

"Teaching parents to read better filters down through families, as they pass on the joy of reading to their children and they, in turn, will pass it on to their children," said Yale-Lillooet MLA Dave Chutter. "With this grant, we can give the gift of reading to more Similkameen families."

Lower Similkameen Family Literacy will develop family literacy support services in the South Similkameen, with emphasis on helping parents who have low levels of literacy.

Weekly family literacy activities will be organized including sessions on choosing age-appropriate books, how to read to children and family book swap.

"Increasing literacy will benefit the whole community," Chutter said. "From Tulameen to Keremeos, the barriers of poor literacy will hold no more families back from being fully active members of our communities."

More than 80 literacy projects in B.C. will receive a total of \$1.6 million in funding this year from federal and provincial governments.

No date was announced for the commencement of the literacy program.

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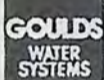

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## Backpack awareness: proper habits

Last week, I introduced a backpack awareness and safety program called "Pack it right, wear it right" developed by the British Columbia Chiropractic Association (www.bcchiro.com). Last week's article discussed the importance of backpack awareness for both parents and children, and gave some advice on what to look for when

purchasing a backpack for your child. If you missed the article, it is available at [www.thinkchiropractic.com](http://www.thinkchiropractic.com). This week I will discuss the proper use of the backpack.

The following are healthy spine habits for children and students:

1. Make sure the backpack is not too heavy. Students of all ages seem to be carrying heavier loads. Even when worn properly with both straps, leaning forward to compensate for this extra weight can affect the natural curve in the lumbar, or lower back region. Extra weight may cause a rounding of the shoulders and an increased curve in the spine. As a result, the student may experience back, shoulder and neck pain. A good rule to follow is to carry no more than 10 to 15 percent of one's body weight.
2. Wear both shoulder straps. Slung a backpack over one shoulder causes a person to lean to one side to compensate for the uneven weight, curving the spine. Over time,

this can strain the shoulders and neck and cause more serious problems.

3. Distribute weight evenly across your back. The more spread out a load is, the less strain it puts on any one part of your body. Load pack so the heaviest items are right next to your back.

4. Snug shoulder straps so the pack fits close to the upper part of your back. The further a backpack's load is from your back, the more it pulls you backward and strains muscles between your shoulders.

5. Use the waist belt and side/chest straps. Keep the load close to your body. Keeping the pack close to your hips also shifts "work" to your legs. The bottom should rest in the curve of your lower back and the top touch just below the big knob on your neck (vertebral prominence).

### Wind stinks?

George Harry asked Town Council on October 6 if something could be done about the sewer stink prevalent in downtown Princeton early in the morning. Town clerk Cornie Froese said the smell is coming from the sewerage aeration pond and is being carried by the wind.

Many people have complained during September, when the early morning inversion seems to hold the smell close to the surface of the street. Later in the day, as the air heated, the smell dissipated.

Researchers believe it will work on humans because they know it will work on human pancreatic tissue. They anticipate the product will be available in three years or less.

If the tests prove the protein can be administered with reliable results, diabetics will be able to be cured, not just treated. The only question then will be how fast they can obtain their cure.

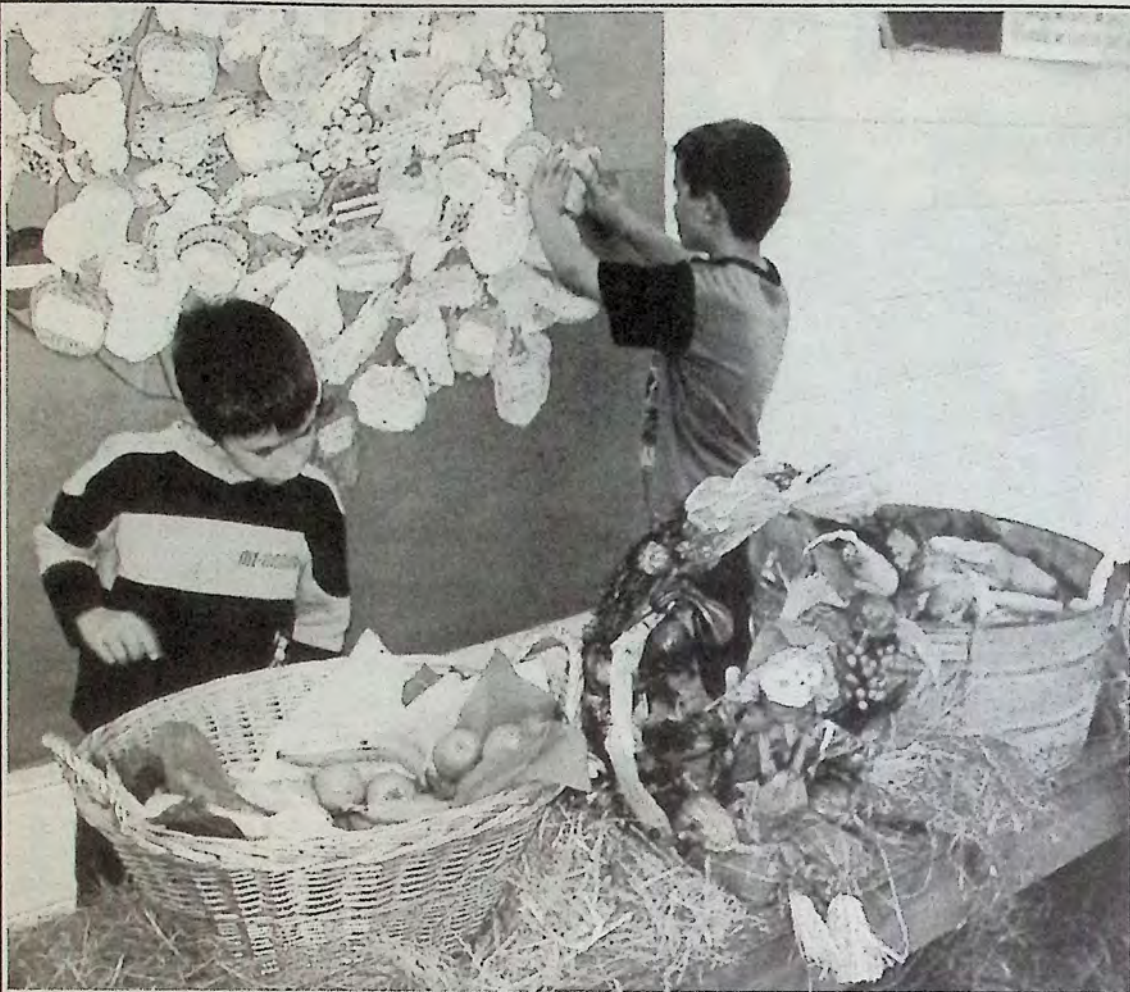
### Walking is great, but don't forget sunshine

There are a lot of people who walk a great deal, and for good reason, but the time of year is coming when walking is not as good as it should be if we do not pay attention to the time of day. This is the time of year to make sure you are taking Vitamin D daily. Some people have it in their calcium supplement or broad-spectrum vitamin supplement. If you do not, be sure to purchase either cod liver oil or halibut liver oil and take it faithfully. It will boost your energy and preserve your bones.

After getting back on his skates, Gunn went over to the Sting players bench and instigated a brawl that pulled players off of both benches.

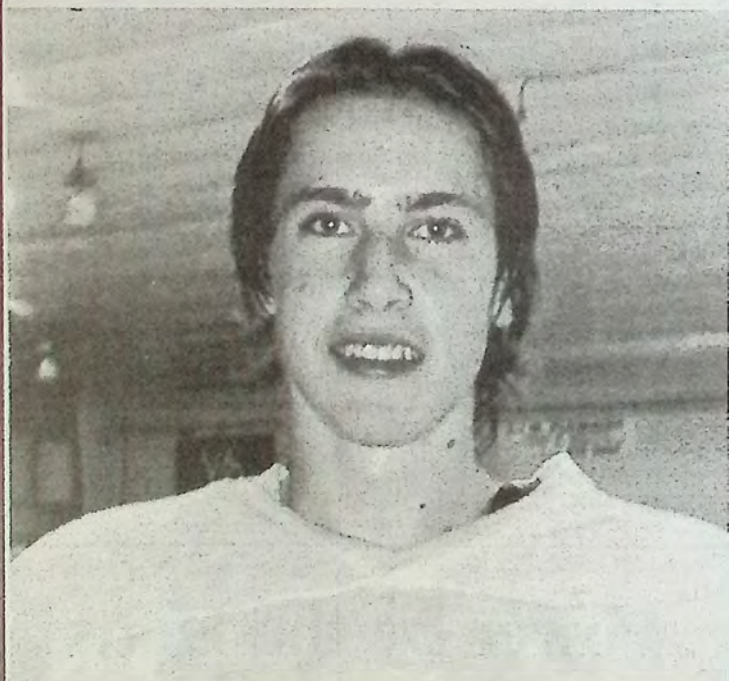
Only five players were penalized, although officials spent considerable time figuring out who did what to whom.

Summerland's Mitch Bohonos scored the final goal of the game at 7:42, with assists from Drew Nagy and Justin Giroux.

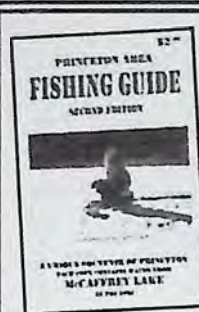

### Complaints should be public

In the recent airing of complaints about the Fall Fair, Town Council stated the concerns expressed in the letter to the Fall Fair were not concerns of Council members. Mayor Keith Olsen said these were concerns told to members of Council by members of the public. In fact, he stated that one of the matters, about the "mess" (vehicles) had been conveyed to him on the telephone.

This is the second time in recent months in which complaints and/or criticisms have been relayed from Council. The first was in reference to Karl Lang Park. At that time, Councillors said they had received complaints from members of the public and were merely expressing those complaints.

We would suggest to Council that those who had complaints or concerns about the Fall Fair could have attended a Fall Fair meeting (all Fall Fair meetings are public) or could have written a letter to Fall Fair members regarding their concerns. If people really wanted Town Council to take their concerns to the Fall Fair, they should have been required to write a letter to Town Council expressing their concerns and asking Town Council to take the matter to the Fall Fair.

The ability of these complainers to remain anonymous while Town Council carries the can for them seems to be undemocratic, and then Council appears to be playing favourites among local taxpayers, allowing some a private means to complain. Others, who want a tree cut down or a street light put up, are asked to put it in writing. Why are the complainers allowed to be anonymous?

Further, it does not seem right that Council took the words of these anonymous critics and held a discussion of their complaints in private after the regular public meeting. The complainers should have been where they could be seen and heard — in the public meeting.

The mayor said it: let's get things out in the open. If the people complaining to councillors are not prepared to stand up and be identified in public, then probably Council should not be paying attention to them.

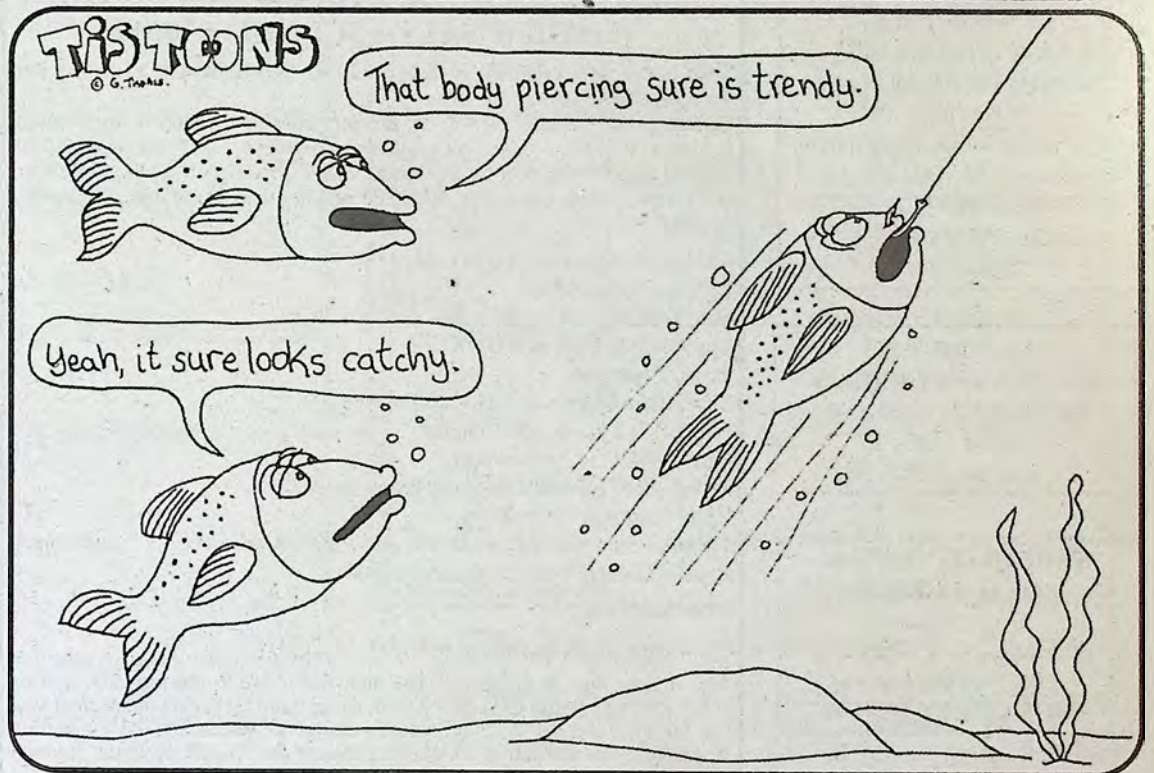

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# Fall Fair President's brief to Council Oct. 6/03

## Mayor and Councillors:

This brief is in response to a letter delivered by Councillor Spencer Coyne to the Fall Fair Secretary. We will address the issues according to the order in which they appear in the letter.

### 1. Gate price was too high.

Our gate price was \$8.00 per person per day. Many other fairs have a higher gate price. We do not recall Council writing to members of any other organization to complain about the admission price. We provided numerous events for a full day. Further, all children under 12 entered free. As an example, just to attend chuckwagon races in Calgary, the admission is \$15 per person. At our Fall Fair, we had a lower admission cost to see not only chuckwagon races, but all of the other events.

### 2. No weekend pass

We issued weekend passes to vendors, organizations putting on displays, and to participants in events in which they paid a general entry fee, as well as to volunteers. We felt everyone else should pay admission.

### 3. No senior discount

Because our gate price was so low, we did not feel seniors would expect a discount. After all, many seniors paid more to attend another major local event. Further, the majority of the bingo players are seniors and they spend at least \$20 a week to go out for an evening. We felt our admission price was affordable.

### 4. Should not be subsidizing the kids' inflatable area

The Fall Fair provides entertainment for all ages. One of the criticisms in the past was that it did not have enough for children. When a

carnival came in, many parents could not afford carnival prices for rides. People raising children are the most financially strapped in our society and child poverty is a national issue. We allow children under 12 to enter free, and we provide free entertainment for them. Parents who can afford it make donations. The inflatable playground is not subsidized by the Town. It is paid for by fundraising by the Fall Fair, the Fire Department and by sponsorships by individuals such as Otto Coers and Ron Harkness.

Each year, our fair is judged by BC Association of Agricultural Fairs and Exhibitions. The highest score we could get is 5, meaning "excellent". The children's playground was judged as "excellent".

When it comes to subsidies, we will have more to say at the end of this presentation.

### 5. Not enough agriculture

This criticism is surprising coming from Town Council, as Council is not in the business of promoting agriculture. However, in response to that criticism, we list the following items of agricultural nature:

#### Strictly agricultural:

Sheep, goats, dog obedience trials, chickens, geese, rabbits, eggs, wine, vegetables, fruit, flowers, small engines, chuckwagon races, beef display and information center, farm safety display, Similkameen Valley peppers and Pepperfest, fertilizer information booth, farm machinery, sheep shearing, AgAware information and display. We did not have hay displays due to the fire hazard. Our agricultural events, which included the sheep shearing, chuckwagon races, chariot races, farm equipment and 4-H sheep judging were rated as "excellent" by BC Fairs Association judges. The judges did not see the dog obedience trials. The following are considered agricultural, too:

home baking, canning, needlecraft, woodwork, carving, recycling, home sewing, quilting, folk art. All of these received fairly good marks from the judges. We are sorry this seemed inadequate to Town Council, but we cannot force people to bring their exhibits.

#### Non-agricultural events

When our fair was judged, the portable sawmill, chainsaw demonstrations, demolition derby, mud bog and the children's area all received a rating of "excellent". BC Fairs recognizes the importance of getting people through the gate in order to make money to continue providing the urban-rural link which promotes agriculture in our society.

### 6. Too much mess after the fair and was not cleaned up in a

timely fashion. We have no idea what this statement means. The terms "too much mess" and "timely fashion" are vague. The PXA and Fall Fair had one more weekend of events a week after the Fall Fair. The PXA gave Fall Fair two weeks to clean up the grounds after the fair, and clean-up was completed within that time. The PXA held an event the following weekend and the Rodeo Club held an event this past weekend. Some things were left outdoors to be moved to where other groups wanted to use them. If Council wants it done faster, Council should inform the PXA as to what seems a more appropriate time frame.

Members of the Fall Fair, Rodeo Club and PXA have done a tremendous amount of grounds clean-up, beginning in April this year. We burned knapweed and other weeds, removed a lot of bits of rubbish, moved rock, raked and swept. We continued to do clean-up as we entered into projects of benefit to all of the groups. In terms of grounds maintenance, we are certain Fall Fair members have spent much more time cleaning the grounds than any other group, including the hired employees of our landlord, who put in very little time in grounds clean-up or maintenance, especially when we compare the amount of time spent by the Town crew on Memorial Park and other parks, which must be a substantial expense to the Town.

#### Community involvement:

The Fall Fair has been involved in Summer Heat (the parade, the bed race and pig roast) and in Tulameen Days. We are a community-minded group.

#### Conclusion

To raise funds, we have put on a pig roast, and a motorsports event, which raised money to help us cover the costs of what we presented for public enjoyment. We know Town Council gives \$4,000 per year to the Curling Club because the club promotes people coming to Princeton. We know Town Council gave \$3,000 to the Rodeo Club, spends thousands of dollars a year on the arena, spends money on wages to operate Centennial Pool and we have heard between \$25,000 and \$30,000 per year goes to the Chamber of Commerce.

We have mentioned the lack of cost to the Town for grounds clean-up. We wish to point out that thousands of dollars worth of materials, labour, and equipment use have gone into construction and enhancement projects on the grounds this year, increasing the value of Town property at no cost to the Town. The Fall Fair, the Rodeo, the Busnuds and the ATV Jamboree have attracted a great many people to Princeton, at very little cost to Town taxpayers.

These events, and the barn rentals, have generated income which goes to pay bills on this Town property. The Fall Fair pays \$1,000 a year to PXA. In comparison to the Curling Club, Memorial Park, Centennial Pool, and the arena, the PXA grounds are a huge asset with little taxpayer support. To date this year, the Fall Fair has received only \$1,500 in a grant from Area H of the Regional District.

Nearly every organization in Princeton has trouble attracting younger members. The Fall Fair has been successful in attracting a strong core of younger members, especially young men. These young men have ideas about what young people want, and we have chosen to listen to them and have developed the motorsports events. These motorsports events seem to be a bone of contention with the Rodeo Club and others. However, if we do not want the fairgrounds to become a million-dollar white elephant, we must pay attention to the young people of our community and encourage them to develop what they like, because they are the future of our organization. Our motorsports events have developed a reputation for safety, and the insurance for our Fall Fair has gone up only 10% when the Town's own insurance has increased by 38%. We see no reason to discourage our younger members from enjoying these sports, particularly when the BC Fair judges gave them top marks as events, and we received top marks for safety, too.

During the past 20 years, Council has not criticized the admission cost, nor the after-event clean-up, of any local volunteer organization using the PXA grounds. This criticism is disheartening to our members, who are among the hardest-working people in our community. We do not expect Council to pin medals on us, but neither do we expect a kick in the pants. So, we would like to know whether Town Council plans to run the Fall Fair itself or will it allow us to continue to generate public support and increasing success?

## Council plans free garbage day

Councillor Kathy Clement told Council the single day in May for free pick-up of extra garbage, such as yard or other clean-up, is not enough. She said she had checked with other communities, and they have at least two of these days.

She added that the May free pick-up had taken three days to remove from residences, an indication that one day is inadequate.

Council passed her motion to make October 29 a day for residents to put out their extra garbage for pick-up.

cheques. This deduction has been made automatically in the past. This year, the B.C. College of Teachers will not receive these funds on schedule. Teachers have until the end of November to pay their dues.

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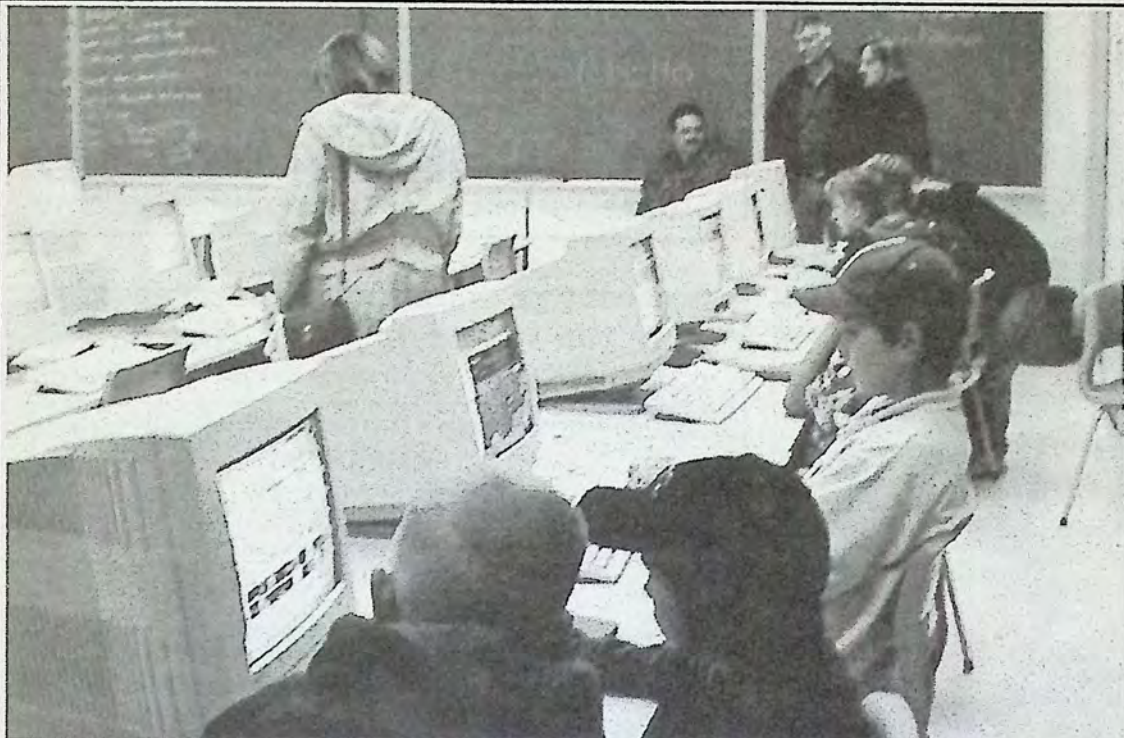

## Council voices concerns about intersections

Councillor Kathy Clement reported to Council on October 6 about a meeting with Ministry of Transportation representatives regarding the intersection on Highway 3 leading to Burton Avenue.

## Theft brings work order
