# Ritzy gala raises lots for hospital

## "Putting on the Ritz" reaches goal

Princeton General Hospital will have an ultrasound, thanks to the generosity of local residents and the South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation, as well as a small army of workers who pulled together "Puttin' on the Ritz".

The gala dinner raised more than \$16,000 to be split between Princeton Rotary Club for their community projects, and Princeton General Hospital and Ridgewood Lodge Foundation. The Foundation had already committed \$15,000 to the ultrasound purchase, and the Hospital Auxiliary donated \$5,000. Charles Albas, speaking for South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation, announced that foundation would make up the remaining \$22,000 to bring the total to the \$50,000 required for the ultrasound. No arrival date for the ultrasound has been set.

Bill Spring, who was co-coordina-

tor with his wife, Sandy, expressed his appreciation.

"We had tremendous support from the people who donated for the live and silent auctions, and from the enthusiasm of the buyers," Bill said.

Stockwell Day, Member of Parliament, was supposed to have been the auctioneer, but he is on a junket to the Middle East, so Dean Stinson, Master of Ceremonies, stood in for Day, and did his customary excellent job of pushing up the bids.

Many people had made cash donations in advance.

Belaire Restaurant catered the gala dinner, and all of their staff generously donated their time to serve the prime rib dinner.

The delightful atmosphere was the work of Bob Cormack and his committee, who decorated the Legion Hall in grand "ritzy" style.

## Fair revenue tops all other years

For the first time in its nearly 40 year history, the Fall Fair grossed nearly \$40,000. Treasurer Ruby Bey presented the financial report on the fair at the September 30 Fall Fair meeting. These figures do not include other income and expenses not related to the fair itself (pig roast, spring motor-sports event and ongoing expenses for improvements to the grounds).

Although the gross earnings for the fair were at a new high, the expenses were high, too. It costs a great deal of money to bring entertainment to the fair, stock the concession and refreshment area, give out trophies, ribbons and prize money, pay fair insurance, security, and advertising. Total costs were \$36,817.12 to date. More sponsorship money is yet to be received, and a few bills are yet to be paid.

Members passed a motion to pay the \$1,000 rental fee to Princeton

Exhibition Association, which is paid by Fall Fair Association annually for use of the grounds. The money goes toward the general operating expenses of the grounds such as electricity and telephone.

Bey presented an income and expense sheet to members for their perusal. Traditionally,

these figures are reviewed in depth at a later date.

Bey reminded members there is a large bill for electrical improvements to the grounds which will come from general funds, but the bank balance should be in good shape for next year's fair when everything is paid. Members were pleased with the report.

## Parents question lack of academic courses

Parents met Thursday evening in the library of Princeton Secondary School to discover why there are only four academic courses offered Grade 12 students this year. Principal Bill Lawrence led the group through a scheduling exercise to try to explain why the school offers so few.

Lawrence explained to the 30 parents how the system works. Each secondary school is allocated a number of teaching "blocks" according to the number of students enrolled in the school. These teaching blocks represent teaching time and therefore the number of teachers who will be hired.

The next step involves student choices of courses. Lawrence assured parents their students could qualify for university entrance even with the four academic courses offered, as some of the courses are staggered from year to year. For example, Physics 11 and 12 will be offered one year but not the next.

There was a second exercise in which parents were asked to choose between two alternatives, in an "either/or" situation, then examine the ramifications of these choices. Neither of the choices received whole-hearted support from the parents.

It was clear the parents wanted to maximize the number of academic course choices for students due to the increasing demands that students have these courses for entry into technical schools, regional colleges and universities. There was some concern expressed about achievement levels, as all of these institutions screen out students whose final marks are not high enough. Teacher Sue McCrae pointed out there are more students seeking to register at universities than there are seats available, therefore the universities admit only those students with the highest marks.

Parents did not enter into any discussion of the politics of education in British Columbia, although they recognized the impact of government cutbacks.

## Grasslands Council views Princeton area

The Grasslands Conservation Council of British Columbia met in Princeton on Friday and Saturday, and spent some time looking at local grasslands.

The Grasslands Conservation Council is volunteer-based, with support from the ranching community, environmental organizations, government agencies and First Nations.

Friday morning was spent in a Board of Directors meeting. The afternoon was a time for discussion, and a number of local people gave their views and concerns regarding grasslands around Princeton.

The top concern, expressed by Edith Currie and others, was the noxious weed problem. Currie talked about the impact of dirt bikes on their rangeland, spreading weeds.

Local people learned there should be an insect control next year for hound's tongue. This would add to the control for knapweed. At the same time, the Council was made aware of the spread of weeds

the Trans Canada Trail. The issue of weeds was changed to impacts of subdivisions, but there have been few subdivisions in the Princeton area in the past decade which would impact on grasslands. Areas of grassland in the Miner Mountain zone and across the top near Separation Lakes were not considered in good shape, but as one of the older people pointed out, the grasslands are impacted by drought as well as grazing and weeds.

There was a great deal of discussion about using fire as a tool to manage grasslands, and particularly for prevention of forests from spreading into grasslands.

The discussion shifted to fuel build-up and dry grass as fuel. Tom Lacey, a fire-protection expert from the Ministry of Forests, agreed with Judy Guichon that grazing is a good way of reducing fuels. He said he would like to see cows grazing right up to every town's boundaries to prevent interface fires.

On Saturday, the Council and local people toured the grasslands around Princeton. They visited the area near Whipsaw Creek owned by the Willis', then went to Swan Lake, where Vermilion Forks Field

Naturalists have a restoration project and viewing area. Both sites express different kinds of grassland within the Princeton area. The Whipsaw site has huge Ponderosa pines, while the Swan Lake site has few trees, a multitude of species of grasslands plants, and a natural component of cactus.

After Swan Lake, the group went to August Lake to see the Ecosystem Restoration Site, where the Forest District does planned burns to

increase grazing for elk and cattle. **Princeton grasslands facts:**  
\* 7860 hectares of native grassland  
\* most of it a continuous patch of 5360 hectares extending 10 km. north of Princeton  
\* 82 percent are privately owned  
\* forest encroachment and ingrowth are evident  
\* 1335 hectares are lost to urbanization, industrial development or agriculture, a 14.5 percent loss (not bad)

Our first annual Christmas ornament and bake sale will be held at the Auxiliary Thrift Shop on Saturday, November 22. We hope to see everyone there.

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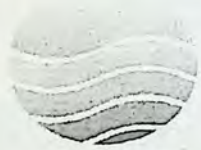

The officer noted the driver of the truck was not wearing a seat belt.

The RCMP officer testified he had noted signs of impairment and the smell of liquor on Montgomery when he questioned

him at the roadside. Montgomery was taken to the RCMP Detachment for a breath test and refused to give a sample.

Montgomery said he was not given an opportunity to call a lawyer of his choice. He did not want the duty lawyer nor any of the recommended lawyers, and his refusal of them was taken as a refusal to call a lawyer.

Montgomery was finally convicted on the refusing to blow charge. He will be sentenced on December 11, 2003.

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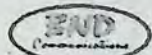

## Sierra Fund knocks BC water

Sierra Legal Defence Fund released a report showing the results of their investigation of contamination of drinking water in B.C. claiming B.C. holds the record for for waterborne disease outbreaks. The report claims that, in the past two decades, thousands of B.C. residents have been ill as a result of bacterial, viral or parasitic contamination of their community's water system. The report investigates 28 disease

outbreaks that have occurred in B.C. since 1980 and provides information on each outbreak - where it occurred, why it occurred and what public health and water officials did in response.

Further, the report compares an outbreak of illness in Anglemont, B.C. was similar to that of Walkerton, Ontario, because no boil advisory was issued for three weeks after excessive levels of fecal coliform were identified in

the water supply.

More than 25 percent of the communities under investigation had no water treatment, and the rest had only primary chlorine treatment. The report recommends that the province implement more advanced treatment systems, such as filtration, ozonation or ultraviolet radiation.

The Sierra Legal Defence Fund is a major environmentalist organization with a number of concerns.

## Government appoints assisted living registrar

A new assisted living registrar has been appointed by Katherine Whittred, Minister of State for Intermediate, Long Term and Home Care. Susan Adams appointment will be effective November 10, 2003. She will oversee the health and safety of seniors and people with disabilities who make assisted living residences their home.

The new registrar will establish health and safety standards for assisted living in line with the new Community Care and Assisted Living Act which comes into effect next year and will require all public and private assisted living residences to be registered.

The registrar will also resolve concerns related to standards, such as complaints of abuse. In addition, the registrar will have the authority to conduct independent investigations of both public and private sector assisted living residences.

In Princeton, assisted living is provided by Princeton and District Community Services Society.

## Living Past 100

### Fight the common cold

Nobody dies from the common cold infection. With that said, it is worth noting that sometimes people die from pneumonia germs which invade the respiratory system weakened by the common cold.

Colds are not caused by cold air or by exposure to low temperatures. The word "cold" to describe this viral infection probably came from one of the symptoms - feeling chilled. Chills are a reaction to fever. When body temperature rises, the air around us seems colder, even though it would be comfortable or tolerable if we did not have a fever. Even a slight rise in body temperature will make the air seem colder.

The rise in body temperature, known as "fever", is not dangerous unless it becomes very high for a long time. The fever is the body's first defence against the virus, hoping to kill it off with the extra heat.

You can help your body fight a cold by keeping your mucous membranes healthy with plenty of Vitamin A from carrots, winter squash, broccoli, yams, sweet potatoes and sweet red peppers. Vitamin C is very helpful in fighting viral infections. You must take high dosages, between 5,000 to 10,000 mg. daily in divided doses, before Vitamin C is effective.

Aspirin is another good virus fighter, and so is selenium. In fact, taking selenium daily will help prevent viral infections (it won't do a thing for bacterial infections).

Zinc gluconate lozenges are great. Dissolve one under the tongue every three hours for three days.

To prevent bacterial infections from invading while fighting the virus, consume plenty of garlic.

Finally, the best cure for a cold is prevention. Your body can fight off the virus without you noticing it when you are healthy and well-rested. A poor diet, too much stress, not enough rest - these can combine to make you a target for the cold virus.

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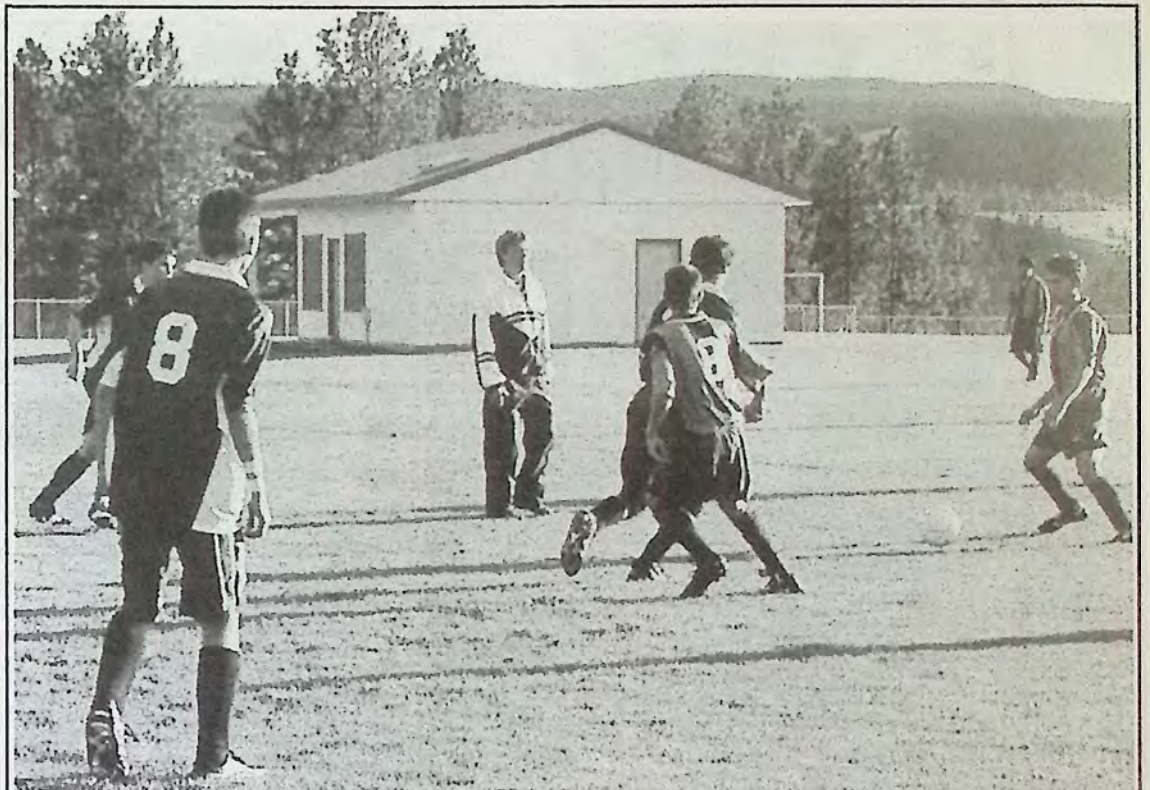

## This is Waste Reduction Week

Mayor Keith Olsen and Councillor Kathy Clement toured the Young Life facility under construction southeast of Princeton. They learned the grand opening will be on the July long weekend next year (July 1, 2, 3, 4).

Mayor Olsen asked site supervisor Mike Sheridan whether the facility could be used as a residence for Olympic competitors who may come to Princeton to train. Sheridan said he would meet with Princeton's Olympic Committee representative, Lyle Thomas, to discuss the potential for such use.

Thomas told the News Leader that Young Life is interested. More planning is in the works.

"I've been on probation for the past 14 years. It's over now. That's enough," Howarth said.

Judge Sinclair obliged by ordering Howarth to pay a \$250 fine.

### Road check nabs drivers

On Thanksgiving weekend, Princeton RCMP and South Okanagan Traffic Services conducted road checks as part of Operation Impact, a national campaign on seat belt enforcement.

On Friday, October 10, a road check on Highway 5A resulted in four liquor related charges.

On Saturday afternoon, October 11, a road check on Highway 5A at Bridge Street resulted in numerous charges and a significant marijuana seizure. Seventeen violation tickets were issued, including one ticket for driving with no insurance. Seven notices were issued

for defects on vehicles. Four 24-hour driving suspensions were ordered for drug or alcohol consumption.

There were three liquor seizures, plus seizures of 130 grams of marijuana, 44 grams of marijuana resin, and 5.5 grams of magic mushrooms.

One vehicle was ordered towed away due to vehicle defects.

On Saturday evening, another road check on Highway 3 resulted in several violation tickets issued, one notice for a vehicle defect, and one driver was charged for driving while prohibited.

**AMENDMENT BYLAW NO. 2242, 2003**

That the Official Rural Land Use Bylaw Map, being Schedule 'B', Map 8 of the Electoral Area 'H' Rural Land Use Bylaw No. 1725 be amended by changing the designation of the northerly portion, approximately 31.8 ha, of the property described as Lot 2, District Lot 395, YDYD, Plan 29927, except Plan E17889, KAP52208 (located approximately 0.8 km west of Tulameen at 352 Tulameen River Road) from RA (Resource Area) to SH1 (Small Holdings).

The applicants are proposing to subdivide the northerly portion of the property into thirteen ±2 ha (4.94 acre) lots and the remaining 21 ha (51.89 acres) at the south end of the property into two parcels of 12 ha (29.65 acres) and 9 ha (22.23 acres).

Permitted uses within the SH1 (Small Holdings) designation include agriculture; forestry; stables, commercial or private kennels, and animal hospitals; single family dwellings, or mobile homes, or travel trailers; home occupation; home industry; auxiliary dwellings or secondary suite; care center; public parks; fruit and vegetable stand; processing and sale of farm products; and buildings and structures auxiliary to the afore-mentioned uses.

### Shipping trash is not the answer

This is National Waste Reduction Week. It's all about garbage, and reducing the amount of garbage we produce.

A recent television "special" will give you some idea of how important waste reduction and recycling can be. Locally, we worry about finding a reasonable place to put garbage, but imagine what people in Pennsylvania and Georgia feel as New York City ships its garbage out to the rural areas of these states. This is what the television show addressed.

New York City produces thirty tons of garbage every day of the week. That is nine hundred thousand tons every month. The garbage is taken to transfer stations where it is loaded into "B" train trucks and taken out of state. The garbage contains bottles, plastics, paper and compostables. Apparently, New York City feels no obligation to recycle.

The worst news about New York's garbage was that it was all residential. Industrial and commercial garbage was not included in the thirty thousand tons per day. Who knows where that garbage goes?

Many people feel hard-pressed to make the effort to recycle. They do not want to clean out glass and metal containers, bundle papers, fold down cardboard, or check plastic bottles to see if they are Number Two and recyclable. It seems like too much work to do all of these things, and then take all these items out to the recycling area. However, unless we do our share to reduce our garbage, we will be in danger of having no place to put it except in our own back yards.

There are better solutions for major cities, such as incinerating the garbage rather than putting it in the ground where it contaminates water. Incinerators are cleaner, in the long term, than any landfill. If we must make choices, let's opt for burning safely rather than contaminating ground water. Let's keep close watch on what our government does about landfills, recycling and incinerators. Let's insist on recycling rather than putting out more garbage. Let's insist on legislation which promotes waste reduction, gives incentives to safe incineration, and prevents water contamination.

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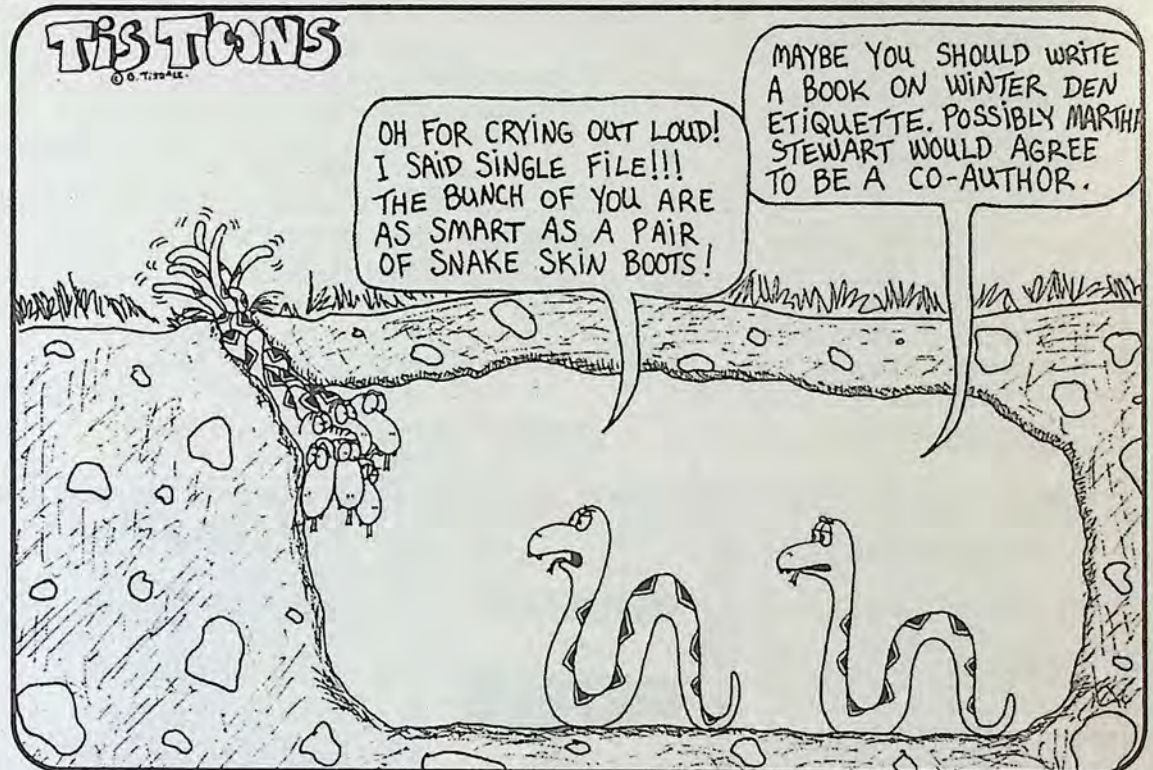

# Give tyranny a name

He was arrested for a crime he did not commit, tortured until he signed a phony confession, and sentenced to death in a country that didn't care. William Sampson talked to me on the phone a few days ago about his horrific years as a "guest" of Saudi Arabia.

Our call was private, so I cannot go into details. I can say, however, that I asked him for advice on what type of questions I should put to members of the Saudi regime when I visit them a few days from now. Let's just say his overview was far from encouraging.

As you read this, I will be leading a delegation of three M.P.'s into another challenging "information" session with representatives of the Iranian regime in Tehran.

The painful lament of Zahra Kazemi is even more sorrowful than that of William Sampson's because Mrs. Kazemi's torture in an Iranian jail ended in death. The so-called suspect is out on bail because he only "semi-premeditated" her murder. (It sounds more like the government's slack approach to crime here in our country.)

I don't know if we'll ever get to the bottom of these two cases or not. What I do know is history clearly shows the "soft power" approach to dealing with tyrant regimes will almost always fail.

Appeasement might work with your mother-in-law, but believe me, it has never worked with

despots and tyrants. They only understand strength.

That doesn't mean we have to resort to military responses at times like this. The power of words, rightly spoken, can have a powerful effect on regimes which hate public exposure.

Our government has avoided this approach too often. It's as tough they are more afraid of

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**Asset Development**

**Four keys to responsibility: Asset #30**

John D. Rockefeller, Jr., U.S. senator, once said, "I believe that every right implies responsibility; every opportunity, an obligation; every possession, a duty."

Teenagers and young adults don't magically become responsible overnight. It takes time for young people to learn to value and take responsibility.

In Raising a Responsible Child, authors Don Dinkmeyer, Ph.D., and Gary D. McKay, Ph.D., point out four keys to instilling the value of responsibility in your

child.

**Key #1** - Let your child do it. Too many times we do tasks for children instead of letting them try to do these tasks. Why? Some adults think children are incapable of accomplishing a task (which is true if they are never given a chance to learn). Also, our busy lifestyles often keep us from taking the time to let our children learn and master skills.

**Key #2** - Expect it to take time. The best time to teach children responsibility is when you're not in a hurry, when you both do not have pressures to be elsewhere or doing other things. Children will become discouraged, self-conscious, and uncooperative when they sense they are being rushed

or if they're not living up to a parent's unrealistic expectation.

**Key #3** - Ask, don't demand. Instill responsibility by invitation. Begin by asking a child to help you with something, such as doing the laundry. Do it together. Gradually teach the child so he or she can do it alone.

**Key #4** - Use consequences. When children do not follow through with something for which they are solely responsible for, stop talking and nagging or rescuing them. Let natural and logical consequences occur. For example, one family said each family member should take responsibility for putting away their own things. Anything not put away would be put in a box in the garage. The kids gradually took responsibility for putting things away because they got tired of walking outside to the garage to dig through a box to find their things.

Another important way to encourage responsibility is to model it yourself. Follow through on your commitments, especially to your child. When you can't or don't do something you should have, don't make excuses. Talk to the child about how you plan to avoid getting into a similar situation in the future.

Create an environment that allows children to identify new ways they can succeed in being responsible so they can try again.

The above information was taken from the Practical Suggestions for Building Assets in Your Child, from the Search Institute of Minneapolis.

**Who pays the gas costs?**

Former councillor Dan Sulentich attended the October 6 Town Council meeting to question why local taxpayers should pay for gasoline for fire trucks to travel out of their designated area. He was referring to two incidents when local firemen went to fires located far beyond their regular area.

Councillor Lorne Esselink explained it was part of a mutual aid system implemented during the severe fire season, and there is still potential for forest fires.

Sulentich said he saw no reason for local taxpayers to pay the extra cost, and it should be paid by ICBC, in the case of a vehicle fire, and by the Ministry of Forests when it was in a forest area.

**Gun owner loses handgun**

In Provincial Court in Princeton on October 9, Dean Ayers pled guilty to a charge of having possession of a prohibited weapon, a handgun.

The 33 year old Vancouver resident was fined \$400 and given a two-year weapons prohibition. Judge G.G. Sinclair ordered the handgun and ammunition destroyed.

## Museum cancels annual flea market

The assistance of Katimavik participant Andrea Burwell is making possible some clean-up work at Princeton Museum. Burwell works three days a week with Ann Jensen and Evelyn McCallum two Museum Society members.

At the October 14 meeting of the society, Jensen told members they are doing an inventory of artifacts which have been neglected for a number of years.
