'Ghost Bear' film maker rescues frightened cub

A black bear cub that wandered into Cenotaph Park on Friday at noon drew a crowd of local and foreign spectators. They took still and video photographs of the little bear, or just observed. The cub, which weighed no more than 16 kilos (40 pounds) found the attention frightening. It went up a tree in the park. Conservation Officer Al Lay was out of town. RCMP were called. Constable Kate Anderson arrived to guard the cub while the Conservation Service was consulted. Town crew brought detour barriers while Cst. Anderson and Sgt. Kurt Lozinski did crowd control, assisted by Citizens on Patrol. The cub reserved the right to remain in the tree while the humans fussed around down below, trying to decide what to do about the bear. Conservation Service left the decision to RCMP, who did not have any means of dealing with the situation.

Jeff Turner, well-known wildlife film maker whose first film was about the "ghost" or "spirit" bears of coastal B.C., lives in Tulameen area. He received a call advising him there was a cub in town. Turner arrived at the scene with a pet carrier cage.

Pest Control Officer Keith Frankland was called to bring the pole and noose used for capturing stray dogs. Turner put the noose over the cub's head and pulled it to the ground. With help from Cst. Anderson and Sgt. Lozinski, Turner put the cub in the carrier. A temporary permit was issued to Turner to harbour the cub. Turners had appropriate accommodation for the cub, and when the News Leader talked to Sue Turner on Friday afternoon, she said the cub was "safe and happy". A decision will be made as to future accommodation, either with Turners or at a rehabilitation centre in Smithers.

Emergency crews set up Spook House

The children will enter the area under the grandstand and wander through a maze of terrifying images in the fullest tradition of Halloween.

There is no charge to children or their parents to participate in this adventure. The Spook House opens at 6:00 p.m. and closes at 8:00 p.m. In addition to the Spook House, there will be treat bags for all children, soft drinks or hot chocolate, a bonfire, and if enough money is donated, there will be fireworks. Although the evening is meant for children, adults are welcome to attend and enjoy the bonfire and fireworks. Coffee will be available at the concession stand for purchase by adults.

Transportation will be available to take people to the fairgrounds. Bus pick-ups will be at John Allison School, Vermilion Forks School, Subway, the fire-

hall and the bowling centre. The bus service will begin at 5:45 p.m. and run continuously until the event is over.

The treat bags for the children are the result of donations from individuals and groups. Candy should be individually

wrapped. Donations should be dropped off at Town Hall on or before Wednesday, October 29.

For maximum safety of children walking in the dark, those going to the grounds by private vehicle MUST park outside the gates to the fairgrounds.

Resource communities pay B.C.'s biggest bills

Yale-Lillooet MLA Dave Chutter said the strength of British Columbia's health and education systems are largely dependent on the contributions from resource-based rural communities.

Chutter introduced a motion in the Legislature on October 20 calling on the House to "recognize the contribution of resource development in rural British Columbia to the health and education infrastructure of all communities".

The local MLA said industries such as forestry, agriculture, mining and energy generate billions of dollars in provincial revenue needed for health care and education.

"Over the course of the next year, we estimate health and education funding combined will rise to \$16 billion. Much of those dollars will come from rural industries," Chutter said. "The contributions from workers in Merritt, Lillooet, Lytton, Hope, Keremeos, Logan Lake, Boston Bar, Spences Bridge and Princeton have gone a long way to meeting the health and education needs of all British

Columbians."

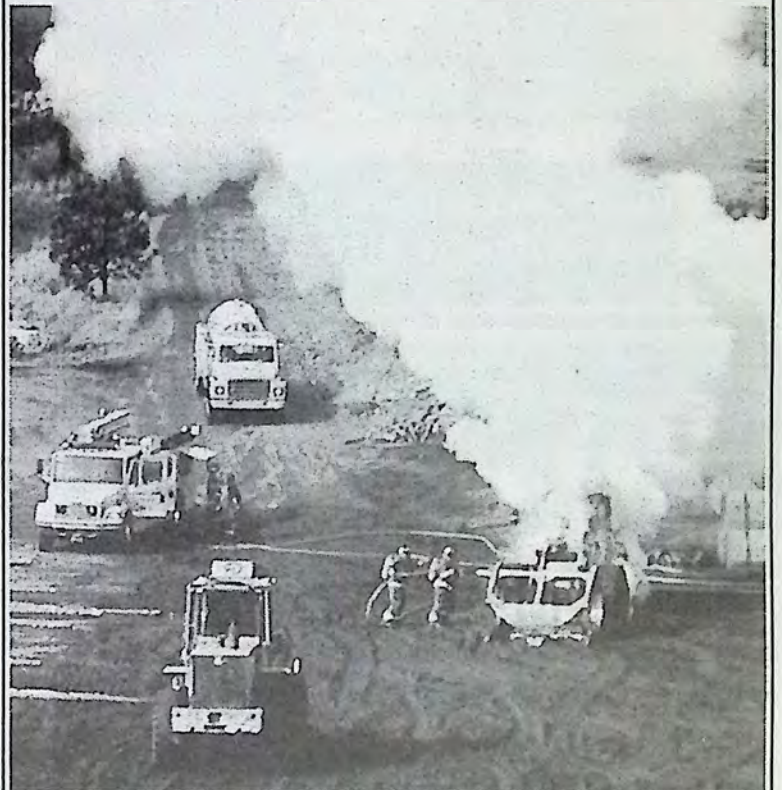
Chutter said the development of resource-based industries is critical for both local economies and to meet the rising costs of health care and education.

He said there are tremendous opportunities to expand the resource sectors, particularly mining and energy. He pointed out the potential to develop coal bed methane in Princeton and green energy projects approved near Hope and Boston Bar.

Chutter, who is one of 15 MLAs on the Mining Task Force, said the province is looking for ways to attract more mining investment and help create jobs. He said workers in resource industries deserve to be recognized for their contributions to B.C.

"Beyond personal income tax, they support their local economies by buying goods and services and paying provincial sales tax," Chutter said. "The people in my riding have a blue-collar work ethic. We work hard and are extremely proud knowing that the work we do contributes greatly to the overall growth and well-being of British Columbians."

Loader burns



Princeton Fire Department was called to a loader fire at Princeton Post and Rail on Friday at approximately noon. The vehicle was completely destroyed, but the quick-thinking driver drove it away from any combustibles as soon as he noticed the fire and parked it in an open area. The vehicle, worth an estimated \$50,000, was insured and there were no injuries.

Golf Club elects new executive for 2004

Princeton Golf Club held their annual general meeting on Saturday, October 25, at the curling rink. They summed up their year in financial terms as the first order of business. All of the numbers showed an increase, including expenses, but the budget is in good shape, with nearly \$80,000 to carry through the winter.

The club had 330 members in 2003, and they played more than 9,000 rounds. Non-members, who drop in and pay greens fees, played more than 9,000 rounds, too, approximately 2,000 more than in 2002. members played an average of 27 rounds each during the season, which gave them a cost of \$16.36 per round.

There will be no increase in mem-

bership dues in 2004, but Keith Later said there should be some way of penalizing those who do not pay when the season starts. He suggested a regular fee for those who pay at the start and a higher fee for those who wait. There were nods of assent but no motion to do so.

Later was presented with a plaque in recognition of his hard work during the past three years. He expressed his thanks to all of the members who had given him so much support.

Club captains gave their reports, and all of them reported a good year. Bill Montgomery said the Men's Club had excellent support from both members and sponsors.

Mohawk Princeton completes renovations, gives away prizes and gas in thanks

Safety concerns were handled with brighter outdoor lighting and a large weather canopy just being completed.

The final addition to the many services provided at Princeton Mohawk is an outdoor coffee kiosk serving many specialty coffees and drinks.

"More changes are coming," Knowles adds, "changes that truly address our customers needs."

A total of between ten and fifteen people are employed, depending on

the season, at the Princeton Mohawk station and are responsible for the twenty awards presented to the operation.

"These are awards from our peers and cover everything from health standards and safety to customer service," explains Knowles.

"I've very proud of the team we have here."

The standards set at Princeton Mohawk are so high, in fact, that other Mohawk/Husky stations are measured against it.

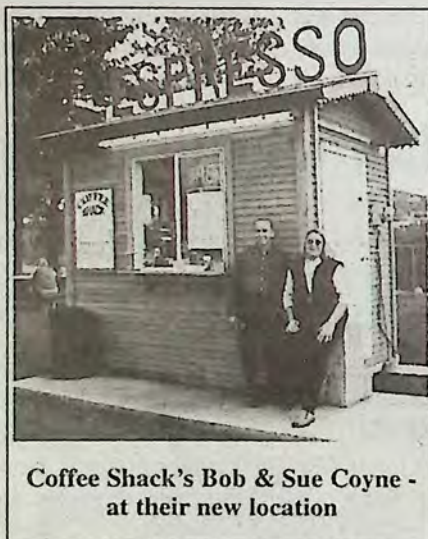

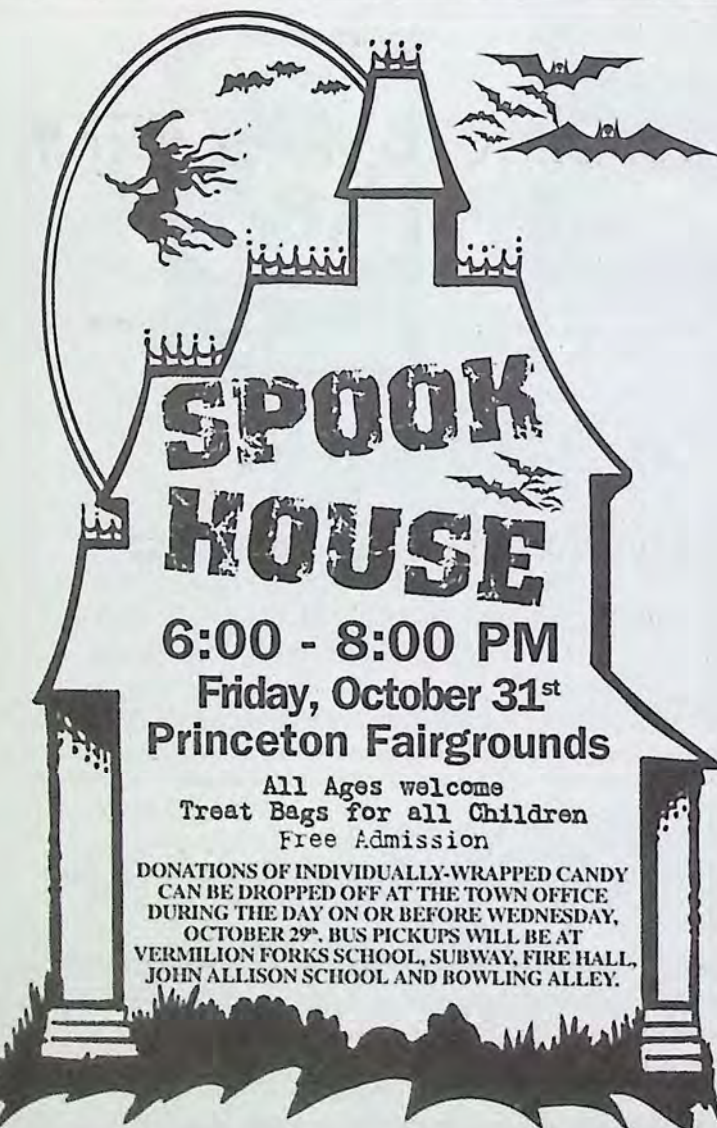
Why the campaign?

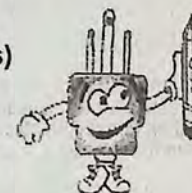

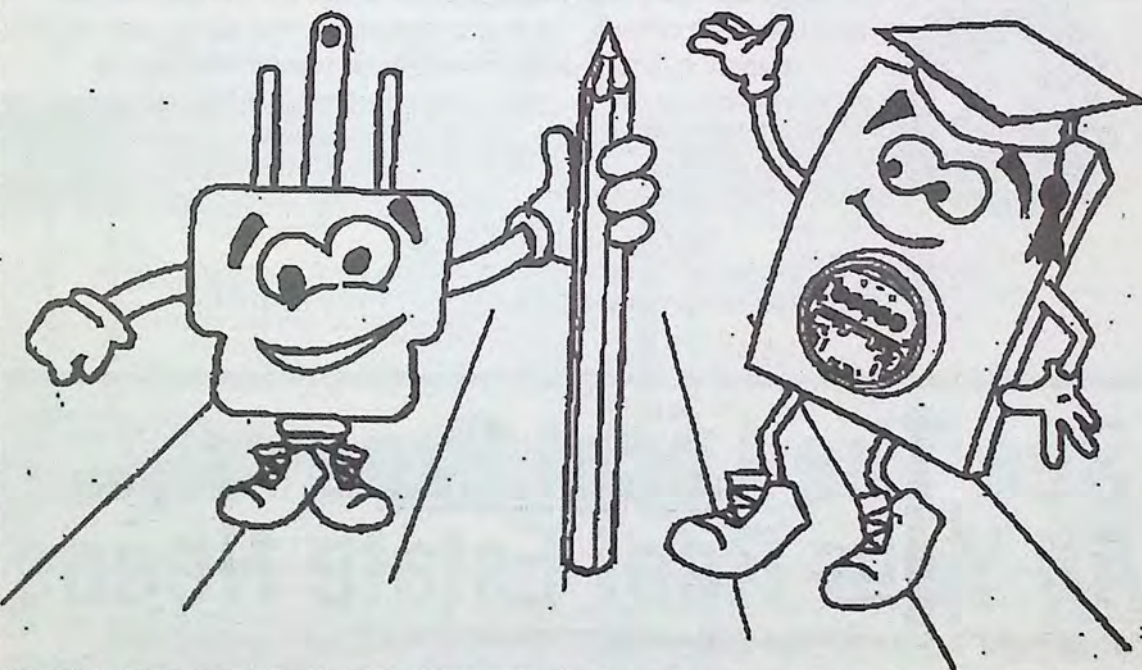

PETER'S ACTIVITY NO. 2

We know that large cars use more fuel than small cars. Well, it's the same for electrical appliances. A large appliance, such as a refrigerator, uses more electricity than a small appliance, like an iron. To calculate the amount of electricity an appliance uses, multiply the wattage by the length of time it operates. For example: If the light bulb in your bathroom used 100 watts and it is on for 10 hours, it consumes: 100 watts x 10 hours = 1,000 watt hours of electricity = 1 kilowatt hour (kWh)

- A 600 watt coffee percolator operating for 1 hour. _____ kWh (kilowatt-hours)
- A 100 watt electric Iron operating for 30 minutes _____ kWh (kilowatt-hours)
- A 200 watt VCR operating for 6 hours _____ kWh (kilowatt-hours)

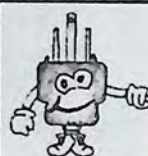
We're here to tell you about electricity - where it comes from how we use it and how we measure it. *Let's start by asking:*

What is Energy?

Energy is what makes things work. Every minute of every day we use energy in one way or another. When you ride your bicycle, you're using your own physical energy to turn the pedals. Whenever your Dad or Mom drive the family car, they're using the energy in gasoline. When you turn on a light, you're using electric energy.

There are two types of energy: **RENEWABLE** - Renewable energy comes from resources which will always be with us. Some renewable energy resources are water, sun and wind. **NON-RENEWABLE** - Energy resources that we will eventually use up are non-renewable. Non-renewable energy resources include coal, oil and natural gas.

Non-renewable energy resources are created over millions of years from the remains of animals and plants. The gasoline your parents use when driving your family car will take millions of years to replace.



Meet Your Meter!

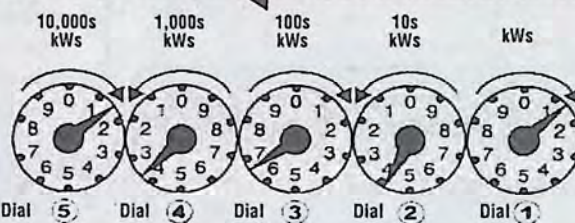
My friend, Professor Meter, can help measure how much electricity your family uses.

Reading your electric meter is as easy as telling time. By reading the dials on the face of your meter, you can figure out the amount of electrical energy (kWh) you use. Once you understand the instructions, you can do the exercise.

The example below is a close-up of the dials on your electrical energy meter. Most meters in homes have five dials, but some of the older models may have four. Reading and writing down how many kWh you use is the same for both types.

Each dial turns in the opposite direction from the one beside it. Dial 1 turns clockwise; dial 2 counter-clockwise; dial 3 clockwise, etc... As dial 1 goes around completely, dial 2 will move 1/10 of a full turn. When dial 2 goes around completely, dial 3 will turn 1/10 of a full turn. In other words, dial 1 must go around 10 times before dial 2 will go around once. Read the dials from right to left, and write the figures in the same order - from right to left. When the pointer on the dial is between two numbers, write down the smaller number.

Example 1



The meter reading in Example 1 is 13641

Hydro Electricity (hydro means water)

Water is used to generate most of the electric power in B.C. A very small amount is also generated from wind, natural gas, diesel and other resources.

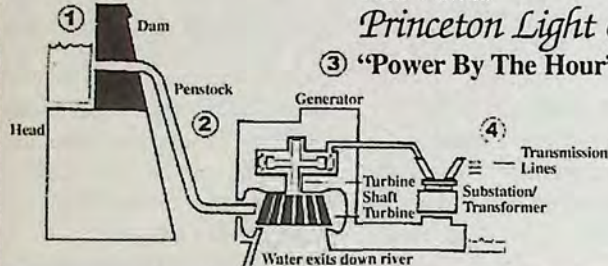
Hydro electric plants use the energy in rivers, a renewable resource, to generate electricity.

1. A large amount of water is held by a dam in a reservoir.
2. Rapidly moving water is directed through tunnels turning turbine blades, creating mechanical energy.
3. The mechanical energy is then turned into electric energy by a generator.
4. The electricity is transported to your home or farm through high-voltage transmission lines. (Those big metal towers.)
5. Smaller distribution lines carry the electricity throughout your home or farm buildings to electrical outlets.

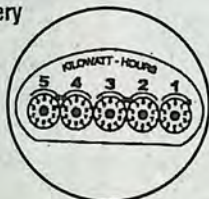
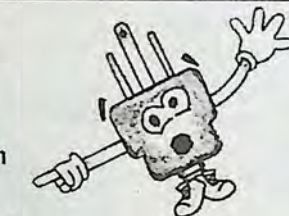
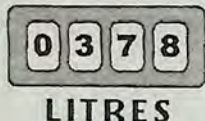

Just How Much Electricity Do Things Use?

Cars and appliances have one thing in common - they both need energy to work. A car uses the energy in gasoline while an appliance uses electric energy.

The amount of gasoline a car uses is measured by a gas pump in litres. The amount of electric energy an appliance uses is measured by the energy meter in your home in kilowatt-hours.

Just as the speed of a car at a point in time is measured in kilometres per hour, the amount of electricity an appliance needs to work is measured in watts or kilowatts (1 kilowatt = 1,000 watts) and is called wattage. Every electrical appliance has a nameplate which indicates wattage (how many watts of electricity it uses) of the appliance.

4. Record in a notebook the electrical appliances and equipment that were used each day.

In this week's News Leader, you will see an article about what MLA Dave Chutter told the Legislature about resource industries in our small towns. He was reminding Victoria that our resource industries pay the province's biggest bills – health and education. Let's hope Victoria is paying more attention than they have done in the past!

Thanks to a study done two years ago, we learned just how much money the workers of the Interior, in their resource-based industries, provide to the economy of our province. We generate more than fifty percent more revenue per person than people living in our coastal cities. At the same time, we see less of those dollars coming back to our small resource communities.

The small resource-based communities of British Columbia have been the province's "cash cow" for the past 100 years. The resources we produce go to international markets and generate jobs for people living hundreds or thousands of kilometres from us.

At the same time, as we continued to produce lumber, coal, gold, copper, natural gas, wood pellets, beef, hydroelectricity, fruit, and what have you, we have watched our hospitals shrink, our local social services shrink or disappear, our schools make do with fewer teachers, or close entirely.

Yes, there is trouble on the world market right now in a couple of commodities, but even when these commodities were sold in great market conditions, we had to do with less in rural communities when it came time to balance the provincial budget. If governments really cared about the "heartland", and those who deserve to be rewarded for their work, wouldn't you think they would ensure we had the hospitals and schools and social services? Instead, the best always goes to the cities.

So, we're really valuable. Well, show us the money!

Do your homework on tenants

Dear Editor;

Perhaps living in a small town makes you naive. In this day and age, naiveté isn't necessarily a bad thing, you would think. I have always felt somewhat thankful of the fact that living in a small town you seem to be shut off from the scary things that go on in the city, and perhaps of the combined naiveté and the trust that comes from living in a small town is why we can also be taken advantage of very quickly.

We are new landlords and when it comes down to it, assumed way too much and didn't do our homework. Here is our story.

We put an ad on an internet site, along with placing an ad in the local papers listing our home for rent. We were elated when about a week later we had a phone call from a man at the coast who had seen our ad on internet. He came up the next evening to take a look at our house (we were still living in it at the time). He said he and his girlfriend wanted a weekend "getaway" place and it would be perfect. We had them sign a tenancy agreement, checked their references over the phone (which we were happy with) and it was a done deal.

As time passed, little things were getting stranger and stranger but they were nice people, so why should we worry? Things were getting very odd by the time summer came around. There were a few verbal incidents so now maybe they weren't as nice as we thought?

In the end of all this, illegal activity had been going on, right under

our noses, and we had no idea who these people were who had rented our family home. They were both, in fact, people who did this for a living. They were well-known to police for doing exactly what they were doing to us. How could people with a history of renting homes solely for an illegal marijuana grow operation be able to rent? in our little town? our house? They do not care who they do it to or the extent of damage being done to your home and property.

The home we had worked so hard on for years was now severely damaged. How could people do so

much damage to a home in such a short amount of town?

Looking back on the whole experience, the tenancy agreement should have added "Landlords will have a walk-through every three months or so, etc." We had no idea that could have been added, nor did we have any reason to add it.

What we have to deal with now is a complete nightmare, something I don't wish on anyone. Not only does your house insurance NOT cover for damage incurred due to an illegal activity, but the

Where is Canada's Constitution?

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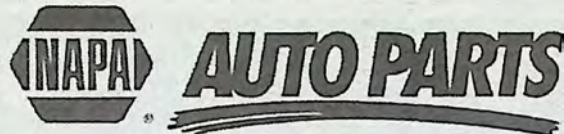

Tulameen people are Molson heroes

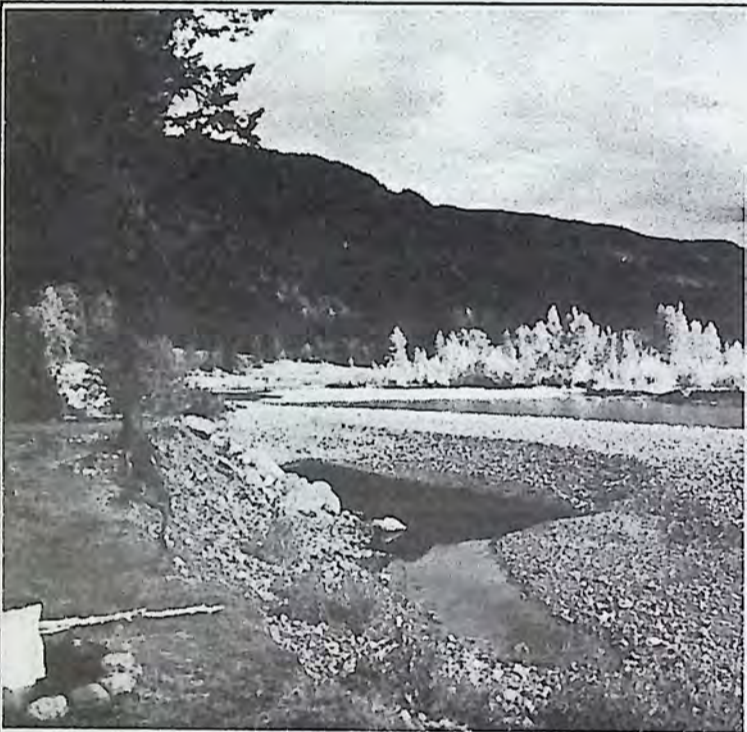
