## Local woman enters Hall of Fame

Shirley Randall, longtime member of Softball BC, has been named to the Softball BC Hall of Fame. This modest lady would not bring her plaque to the News Leader, nor have her picture taken, but a friend made sure Shirley would receive recognition.

Shirley Randall started her career in softball in 1960 as coach of her oldest daughter's softball team. She gave up coaching to become President of New Westminster Minor, a position she held from 1961 to 1968. During her term, the association grew from 8 to 30 teams.

In 1968, Softball BC began to organize the potential growth of Minor Softball in B.C. Shirley was appointed as one of three District Coordinators. During her five years as Minor Coordinator for Lower Fraser Valley District, the District grew from three associations to 11.

In 1972, Shirley was elected to Softball BC Board of Directors as Minor Coordinator for BC. During the next five years, Shirley's name became synonymous with Minor Softball in B.C. At the end of five years, minor softball was well-established in every part of the province.

In 1974, Shirley met the President of Softball Alberta and during their conversation, the Western Canadian Championship was born. Within two weeks, Shirley had lined up Kamloops as a site for the Alberta-BC Midget boys and girls championships.

Alberta and BC were soon joined

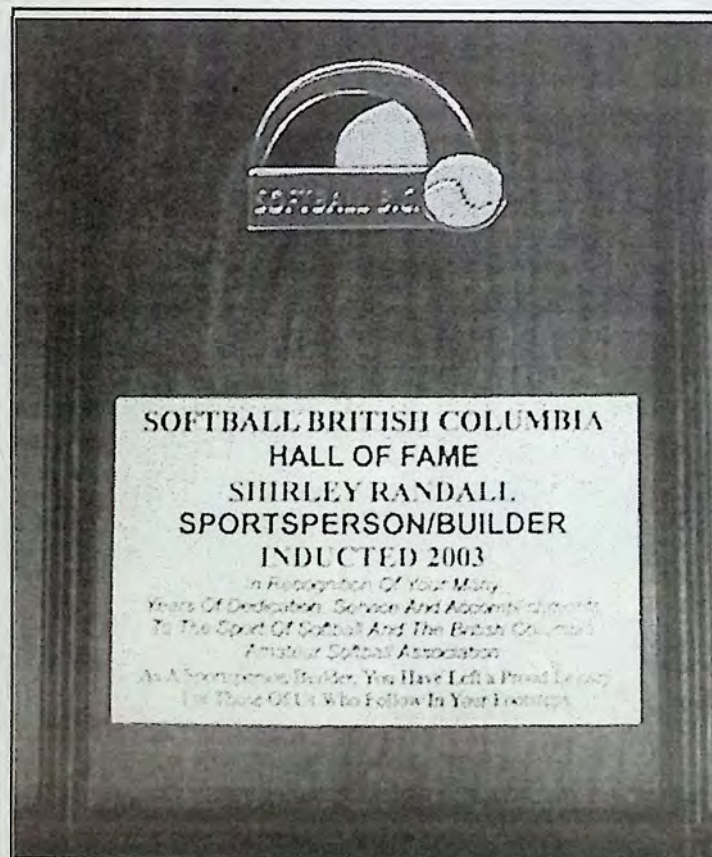
by the other prairie provinces and two territories. In 1975, Shirley was elected Chairperson of the Western Canadian Championship Committee.

In 1977, Shirley Randall became President of Softball BC. During her term as President, growth of minor softball was phenomenal and Slo-pitch was introduced. At the same time, corporate involvement and sponsorship began, and the insurance program was started. She saw the workload and recommended hiring an administrative director.

Softball Canada drew Shirley's loyalty from 1972 to the 1980s. She was elected third Vice-President, serving two terms. From 1980 through 1982, she was Commissioner of Softball Canada to BC.

One of her achievements was organizing the softball portion of the 1973 Canada Summer Games.

Honouring her was recognition of her significant contribution to softball in British Columbia, the west, and in Canada.



insurer to another, and uncertainty about what is covered. Carter said there is a group insurance opportunity for motorsports events through another association and the motorsports committee will be advised about that association.

The many items of interest Carter brought from the conference sparked some discussion, and members agreed there is plenty to review when planning sessions begin in January.

Treasurer Ruby Bey reported a healthy bank balance even after paying the \$1,000 user fee to Princeton Exhibition Association. She said \$500 for fireworks had been received from the Town of Princeton, along with thanks for helping put on a family event. The money was turned over to the firemen

immediately, as they are responsible for the Halloween event although PXA and Fall Fair are participating to some extent.

President Jody Woodford announced building #2 "leaks like a sieve" and she and Pete Ruoss would fix the roof on the weekend if it was dry enough.

Ruoss and Dawn Johnson had done a walk-through of the poultry area and presented a possible plan to put up a better structure. The old "livery stable" false front has safety issues, and the poultry area is not as secure as it should be. The new building would house the rabbits and caveys, too, and remove them from the flower exhibits building. The proposal needs costing before being presented to members and to Town Council.

John Bey said the plans for the

showers were not yet ready to present to the PXA, but described the new location. Everyone agreed that would be a good place for the showers, as the section of the grounds by the main gate is becoming crowded. Bey advised the group about PXA plans to change the fence line at the west end of the exhibition area and heavy equipment could access the grounds at that end and remain at that end. Members agreed it was a good plan.

A nominating committee was struck for the annual general meeting. All executive positions are open annually, but only some of the Directors' positions are open for election each year.

When the meeting ended, members were grateful the road was plowed and the snow had stopped.

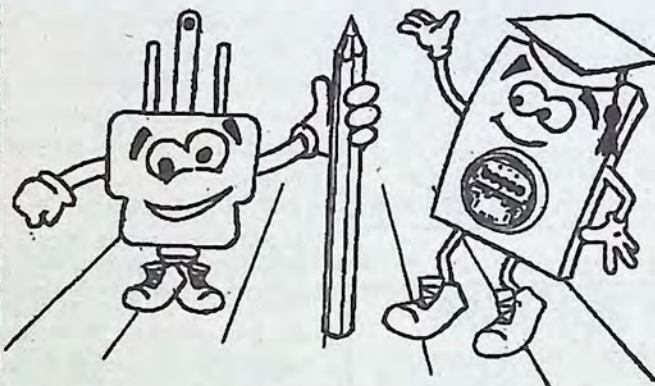

## Assisted living gains support

Okanagan Similkameen Regional Hospital District and South Okanagan Similkameen Medical Foundation have shown strong support for 14 assisted living units for Keremeos. The Hospital District voted to commit \$200,000 to the project, using money from the sale of the Diagnostic Centre.

Assisted living units are those in which a tenant receives some personal care, one or two meals a day, and yet lives independently for the most part. Assisted living provides a safe, caring environment for those who need some care but who are well enough not to need full-time residential care.

The units have not received any approval from Interior Health Region. What Lower Similkameen Community Services has done is respond to a request from Interior Health for an "expression of interest" from non-profit organizations. South Similkameen's submission will be considered along with expressions of interest from other communities.

The 14 units would be built as an addition to the existing South Similkameen Health Centre. This facility was originally designed so that 25 additional units could be attached to it with no alterations in heating equipment. The units would be built between the courtyard and the highway, and would share the courtyard.

Funding will come from a number of sources in addition to those mentioned. The capital portion would be subsidized up to \$25,000 per unit through BC Housing and the federal government as a project of Canada-BC Affordable Housing Agreement. Lower Similkameen Community Services Society would have to

take a mortgage for the balance.

Operating costs would be covered through an agreement with Interior Health, which is prepared to fund operating costs for 13 units. The tenants of these assisted living units would pay for accommodation along with BC Housing and Interior Health on a formula developed for this type of accommodation. There would be one unit not subsidized, which means anyone who could afford it could rent it.

This is just a draft plan, and subject to revision.

The next step in the process will depend on Interior Health. If IH is interested, Community Services Society will be contacted and asked to submit a proposal. The proposal will be more detailed.

At this time, Community Services is awaiting confirmation from Interior Health that they may go to the next step.

Eileen Oliver-Bauer, speaking for the Board of Directors of Community Services, told the News Leader, "We are very hopeful. There's a need in the community."

"Taste of Our Valley was fantastic," says Ron Murdoch, President of Similkameen Country. "It was the best we ever had."

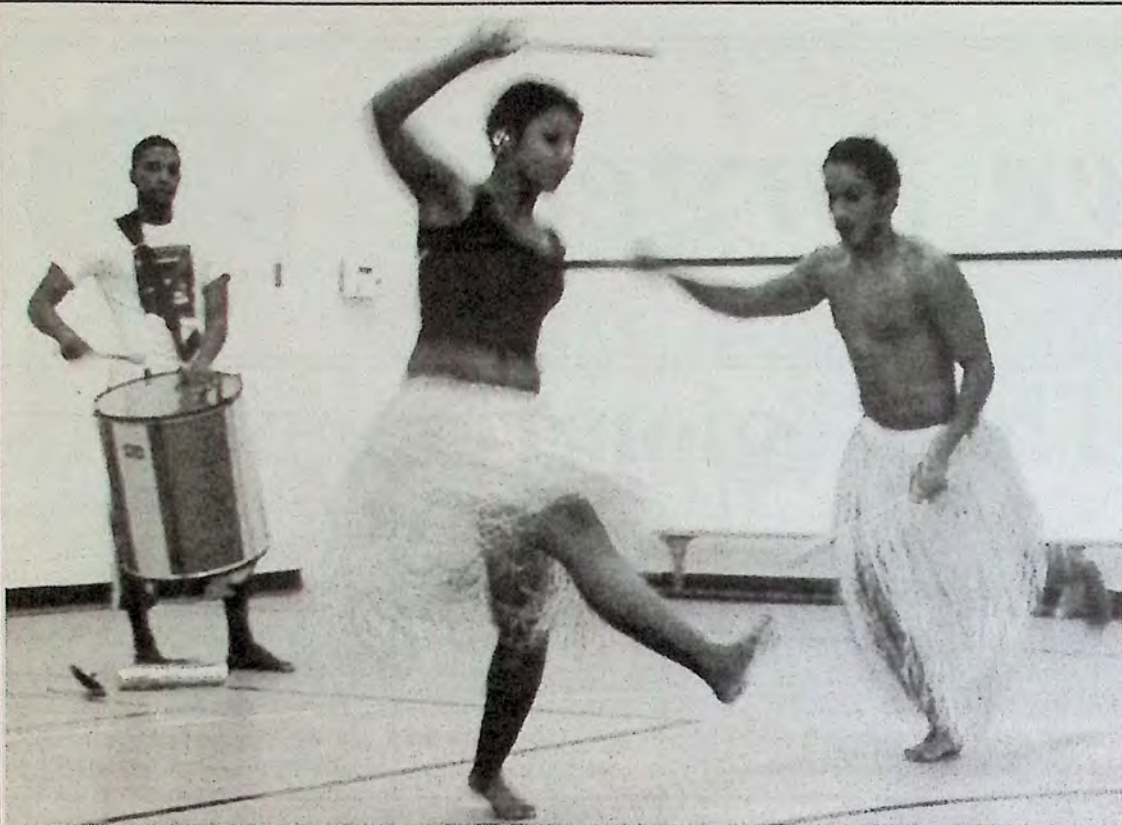
Murdoch estimated 500 people attended the annual event, which promotes products of the Similkameen Valley.

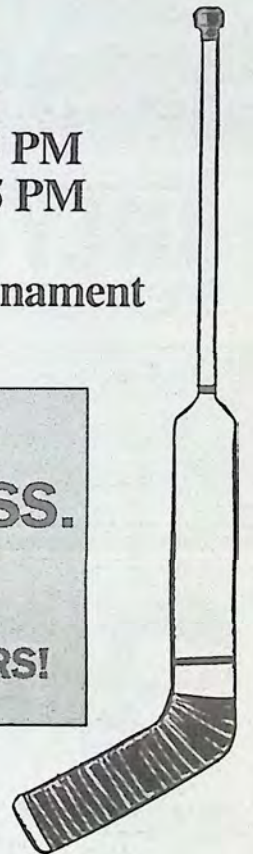

**Princeton Remembers**

## The Legion remembers

Each year, in our schools and in our communities, the Royal Canadian Legion conducts Remembrance Day services to mourn Canadians who lost their lives in wars. These services, and the distribution of poppies, wreaths and crosses, are part of the annual Remembrance Day activities. The purpose of these activities is to remind us of the toll war takes on the lives of those who fight, and those who lose loved ones.

The educational value of Remembrance Day services is only part of what the Legion does for communities across Canada.

### The eleventh hour

The eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month was the time the first World War ended. People danced in the streets, cheered, shouted, sang ..... it was the end of the bloodiest war mankind had ever seen. The day was called Armistice Day.

### The poppy

In May, 1915, Lieutenant-Colonel John McCrae of the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps was working in a dressing station on the front line to the north of Ieper, Belgium, when he wrote *In Flanders Fields*. The poem begins, "In Flanders fields the poppies blow ....". In 1918,

Moira Michael, an American, wrote a poem in reply, *We Shall Keep the Faith*, in which she promised to wear a poppy in honour of our dead and so began the tradition of wearing a poppy in remembrance.

French YMCA Secretary, Madame Guerin, conceived the idea in 1918 of selling silk poppies to help needy soldiers. The idea caught on. Poppies were first sold in England in 1921 by members of the British Legion to raise money for those who had been incapacitated by the war. Canada's Royal Canadian Legion adopted the practice, too, asking Canadians to give money to help soldiers injured in the war.

### The Poppy Fund

As Royal Canadian Legions sprang up in every community across Canada, the Poppy Fund became a sacred trust. Money from the fund went to assist veterans in many ways, from providing prosthetic limbs to helping to build veterans hospitals and provide comforts for veterans and their families.

The Poppy Fund benefited from the annual Remembrance Day custom of wearing a poppy or buying a wreath for the cenotaph ceremony. The good done by the Poppy Fund is immeasurable, not only in Canada, but in most European and Commonwealth countries.

In the Similkameen Valley, the Legion branches in Princeton and Keremeos carry on this tradition of giving a poppy in return for a donation to the Poppy Fund. The money raised in each community goes strictly to charitable causes which will benefit veterans or their families. The money is not kept by the Legion to promote itself, nor is the Poppy Fund money used for any Legion activity.

Poppy Fund money has gone into health care centres, hospitals, wheelchairs, prosthetic devices, and financial assistance to veterans or their families in need.

### Remembering in many ways

Although the Royal Canadian Legion was established to assist veterans and their families, Legion members have served their communities in many ways. Most communities have a Legion Hall and a Cenotaph where those who served, and those who gave

### Remember their sacrifice

As we approach Remembrance Day, we are asked to remember those who gave the ultimate sacrifice to fight for what they believed in. We mourn the passing of those who fought and died in wars involving Canadian soldiers. We mourn the loss of Canadian troops whose lives were forfeited in peacekeeping action, the result of conflicts which Canadians did not start and in which Canadians did not have much of a stake.

We urge everyone to attend the Remembrance Day service at the Cenotaph next week. We ask you to think about war and its cost. This day of remembering began November 11, 1918, to commemorate the end of World War I, "the war to end all wars".

War has not ended on this earth, and shows no signs of ending. At the end of World War I, a League of Nations was formed to create an international body dedicated to peaceful resolution of differences between nations. It failed.

At the end of World War II, the United Nations Organization was formed by men and women determined to find peaceful solutions to international problems. Although many nations see this new organization as failing, it has been under the United Nations auspices that Canadian soldiers have gone to foreign nations to keep the peace or, as in Korea, to push back an invading force.

We take time to remember those who lost their lives as military personnel, but many of us will remember those who lost their lives as civilians, too. The devastation of war goes far beyond the military lives lost, and the cost of war continues to escalate in the devastation to civilians, to infrastructure, and to the environment. Due to increased expertise in the development of armaments of all kinds, soldiers and civilians, and plants and animals, continue to die long after the conflict has ended. Let's remember that peaceful solutions kill nobody, damage no environment, and create no illnesses.

### Day visits Middle East nations

Hostage-taking used to be her claim to fame. Remember back in 1979 when Iranian students stormed the U.S. Embassy in Tehran, and held 440 American hostages for over a year? She was one of the militants who led the charge over the wall that day. Now, 24 years later, here I am in Tehran, sitting across the table from her.

I'm leading a three-person delegation for Canada and she's the Vice-President of Iran. She's traded her university Levis for the Moslem robe and headscarf. I've traded mine (jeans) for a tie and jacket.

Our team had just come from two days of meeting with government officials in the Moslem nation of Turkey. They have a law there that forbids Moslem women from wearing the headscarf. But here in Tehran, the Vice-President is staunchly defending her Moslem government's law, which forces all women to wear it. (Men were exempt) Even the two female Canadian MP's travelling with me are clad in robes and looking kind of chic in their silk headgear. (They informed me later, in no uncertain terms, that they were not feeling one bit fashionable in their mandatory black uniforms.)

Two days later, in Saudi Arabia, we see dress codes for men as well as women. Law forbids Saudi Arabian women to drive, while women in other nations are allowed to.

In Turkey, the stores stay open during the daily prayer times.

However, in the Saudi capital, Riyadh, even in the fanciest malls, the fleaming doors of every name brand boutique are locked at each call to prayer.

In Egypt, where the headscarf is not mandatory, over 90 percent of women and girls now choose to wear it, which has been an interesting shift in the last few years, when most did not. In Egypt, a Moslem woman can drive, work, and go out in the evening. Painfully, however, Egyptian women told us that an estimated 90 percent of the female popula-

tion has undergone some variant of female circumcision.

Despite different traditions in different Moslem states, I remain convinced of some basic realities: first, as with most Christians, Jews or non-believers, Moslems want security and happiness for themselves and their children, and hope for the future; second, as in other religions, there are always a small number who distance their own scriptures for personal reasons, sometimes with horrendous consequences.

# Rural medicine: past and present

by Dr. John Adams, rural practitioner

Historically, Canadian rural medical practice has been associated with a certain pioneering spirit and rural practitioners have been very willing to take on a wide variety of medical, surgical and obstetrical challenges. Their local communities have generously supported them in these goals. Indeed, these communities were instrumental in the creation and improvement of local hospitals. Success in recruitment of medical personnel was largely dependent on the facilities offered by the community and their hospital. The hospitals were constructed to cater for G.P. surgeons, obstetricians, and anaesthetists with an O.R. delivery room, nursery, E.R. and a sufficiency of acute care beds.

The "raison d'être" of most rural practitioners was the challenge of providing comprehensive in-house medical care for the majority of their patients. Under this system, rural practice was always challenging but full of diversity and interest. At times daunting and sometimes exhausting, particularly for the solo small town practitioner, it nevertheless remained absorbing, mainly because of its completeness.

### THE PRESENT

The past few years have been dominated by Health Care Reform.

Initially, this reformation was seen as an urgent economic necessity, but with a promising outcome for rural practice – the widely promoted "closer to home" philosophy. Regrettably, this forward-looking philosophy was rejected in favour of "centralization of Health Care" which has "borrowed" heavily from Western European models. In these countries, town and country are in very close proximity and transportation of patients can take place quickly with modern paramedical and ambulance services. Rural emergencies are usually treated in urban centres as rural hospitals are greatly diminished.

By emulating these models, many facets of our Canadian rural practice have been destroyed – e.g. G.P. surgery and hence anaesthetics are severely curtailed, and obstetrics and neonatal care (since Caesarean sections are no longer available).

This decimation of acute care beds has not only greatly reduced the facility for local care but has led to disillusionment, uncertainty and local unemployment.

Triage and transportation is proving to be frustrating and costly both to the system and visiting families.

Regionalization, with mandated fiscal restraint, has given significant autocratic managerial powers to Health Authorities. These

include the ability to unilaterally develop and introduce policies relating to hospital and health care facilities and contracts.

The newly introduced "on-call" contracts demand, under certain circumstances, obligatory "one in three" coverage – e.g. when a town of say 6,000 population with six doctors is reduced to three. However altruistic and committed rural doctors may be, one in three coverage rapidly causes exhaustion, particularly in older physicians.

### THE FUTURE

How will rural health care evolve without the impetus of comprehensive patient care and (likely) reduced medical manpower?

Government health care plans seem to be based on several assumptions

1) that community health centres will be created (at not insignificant costs) and that physicians will become part of a health care team;

2) physicians will be compensated on a population-based system;

3) health care centres will be managed by non-medical administration to ensure "efficiency", "accountability" and "economic viability";

4) that these centres will be serviced by reduced numbers of physicians contractually obliged to provide 24 hour per day coverage;

5) expanded roles for Nurse Practitioners, R.N.'s, L.P.N.s and midwives (unfortunately these highly appreciated professionals are unable to provide comprehensive on-call coverage).

At the present time, it remains unclear as to whether the economic and political will exists to enact these changes.

### Redefining and Rejuvenating rural practice

#### Alternative solutions

A) by identifying specific common goals of 21st century rural practice – e.g. excellence in emergency and resuscitative care;

B) bully funding established goals – e.g. providing "in-house" courses in emergency and resuscitative care on an ongoing basis – e.g. one or two days every three months for all physicians and nurses, cultivating efficiency by a team approach in the emergency room and would be a substitute for those day-to-day operating room and anaesthetic skills no longer available (this would enhance morale);

C) establishing approved training courses for rural practice, with emphasis on emergency room and resuscitative skills (certification might be appropriate);

D) encouraging expansion of the Rural Specialist Visiting Program so that patients and physicians would have easier access to specialist services;

E) optimization and implementation of Telemedical advances – e.g. for radiology and at-distance consults for difficult problems

F) urgent introduction of modern equipment to rural hospitals – e.g. ultrasound

Probably the most important factor in the maintenance of a stable complement of rural physicians is for management to fully understand and correct problems with rural on-call coverage. Because of its isolation and often significant night-work and attendant stress and hazards (such as dealing with motor vehicle accidents and other trauma), rural on-call is extremely demanding and draining. If rural physicians are to be retained, Health Authorities need to become vigorously proactive in acquiring weekend and holiday relief for isolated communities or those with reduced number of physicians. Existing emergency room physicians could be given financial and travel incentives to provide weekend coverage in the country, or by a pool of emergency room physicians working full-time in rural hospitals (three days on, four days off).

Our organizations need to actively "educate" our political representatives on the importance of maintaining viable and healthy hospitals for our rural communities, not only for our local economies but to reduce travel costs for patients and families.

### CONCLUSION

Regionalization and curtailment of medical services is affecting all Canadian.

Rural communities have always proudly supported the concept of "closer to home" medical care. They have been instrumental in the construction, management and expansion of rural hospitals. They have been enthusiastic in the recruitment and maintenance of hospital personnel and have gone out of their way to provide the best of facilities and equipment to encourage people to stay in their community.

Bureaucratization of medicare care, associated with regionalization, has taken away all local involvement in medical care including any rights to appeal. Rural medical personnel have become disenfranchised as their specialities and interests have been systematically eliminated.

We all wish to have optimal medical care, wherever we live or travel in Canada. Rural practice has to be urgently redefined and revitalized with the introduction of well-defined standards of care, particularly in Emergency medicine and Trauma Care.

Rural communities have always respected and avidly supported the common good. They deserve our respect and support in return.

### Taking Steps To Protect Your Inheritance

Don't make hasty decisions without considering potential risk, as well as your comfort level with that risk.

If you're a moderate or conservative investor who wouldn't feel comfortable investing aggressively under normal circumstances, there's no way you're going to feel good about putting your inheritance in high-growth, high risk vehicles.

So, before you invest a dime of your new money, ask yourself: "What sort of investor am I?" If you've been investing for a while, it won't take long to come up with the answer. Then, ask yourself some more questions:

- "What are my long-term investment goals?"
- "When will I need this money?"
- "Is my portfolio properly diversified?"

The answers to these questions will help you determine how to invest the money from your inheritance. A qualified investment advisor can make you aware of any family law issues that may be relevant to your situation, and help assess your investment goals to make appropriate recommendations.

## One of the hazards of fall is falling!

They don't all it "fall" for nothing!

Seniors may be surprised to find the peak season for falling is upon us. Statistics available through Vernon and Enderby ambulance service indicate fall-related injuries are at their highest during autumn months.

While many people may think winter is the most dangerous season for falling due to snow and ice, fall brings its own set of hazards including increasing inactivity, changing weather conditions, wet leaves on sidewalks, and reduced vision due to grey days and fewer daylight hours.

What can you do to reduce your risk of having a fall this fall?

\* Stay active. Don't restrict your activity by staying at home and expect that this will reduce your risk of falling. In fact, the opposite is the case. Seniors who are inactive are more likely to fall and the home is where most falls occur. If you no longer feel safe walking outside because of the weather, find some other source of activity. Join an indoor

walking group if your community has one, or switch to an indoor activity at your local recreation centre. Tai chi is particularly good for improving balance. Other options include: swimming, aquafit, seniors weight training, yoga, and seniors' fitness classes. \* Rainy days mean wet feet. Wear appropriate footwear when you are out and about: low heels, waterproof, non-skid soles. Also, be aware that your feet may be wet when you move indoors.

\* Take your time. Allow yourself plenty of time to get to appointments. When we hurry, we don't take the time to think, are less aware of our surroundings and fail to see potential falls hazards. Don't dash in the door to answer the ringing telephone - your wet feet, combined with slippery floors, could cause you to fall. Slow down, remove your footwear, and answer the phone at a reasonable pace.

\* Clear fallen leaves and debris off all sidewalks, driveways and pathways. If you are unable to do it yourself, ask a neighbour or contact your local church, seniors' centre or seniors' bureau. They

may be able to arrange for a volunteer to come out and do it for you.

\* Have your eyes checked annually and make sure you wear your glasses if you need them. Be especially careful if you wear bifocal or multi-focals, since they can alter your depth perception.

\* Use your walker or cane when you are out and around. Don't be too proud to use it if you need it.
