Storms hit hard in Similkameen

Heavy wet snow wreaks havoc in mountains

A massive snow storm Tuesday, November 18 and Wednesday, November 19, created chaos in the southern B.C. Interior. The Hope-Princeton Highway and the Coquihalla were closed overnight, and there were numerous vehicles off the road on Wednesday morning due to icy or slushy conditions. Sunday was a repeat for mountain passes. RCMP were kept very busy on local highways.

An estimated 100 trees went down in the Similkameen Valley due to the weight of the heavy snow. One tree temporarily closed Highway 5A when it fell across the travelled portion of the road. A tree which fell onto a power transformer in the Tulameen area left Coalmont and Tulameen residents without power for a day. The Osprey Lake area had temporary power outages. In Tulameen, cell phone service was out.

People depending on e-mail found their server down, and cable television sustained long periods of interrupted service on some channels. The snow was extremely heavy, and crushed bushes, broke tree branches and shrubbery throughout the area. Due to the freeze on Wednesday night, it is likely many will not recover next spring.

Smart residents were out removing the heavy wet snow from their roofs before it could freeze. The weight of the snow was equivalent to at least one metre of the dry snow, and further snowfalls during the coming winter could put uncleared roofs in jeopardy.

Council opposes wood boycott

Town Council has shown support for the sale of forest products to China, and opposition to the environmentalist boycott being promoted to the Chinese public.

At the November 17 Council meeting, the following resolution was passed:

Whereas BC is a leader in sustainable forest practices in the world, Whereas unelected, unac-

countable extreme environmental groups are calling for a boycott of all BC wood in China, including fire-damaged and beetle-infested wood; Whereas China represents an opportunity for BC to diversify its exports and reduce its dependence on the US market; Be it resolved that this Council condemn the boycott campaign and show its support for the efforts taken by the provincial government in promoting BC manufactured wood products to the Chinese marketplace.

COPS and RCMP launch Amber Alert

Innovation and initiative best describes Princeton's Citizens on Patrol (COPS) organization. At this time, their level of co-operation with RCMP and other safe community organizations takes a leap forward by starting the Amber Alert system in Princeton area.

COPS Coordinator Jim Turner appeared before Town Council on November 17 to ask for Council's endorsement of the program. Sgt. Kurt Lozinski, O/C of Princeton Detachment, was there to lend his support, along with Robin Miller, Projects Officer for Princeton COPS.

Amber Alert is a system which launches a missing persons search immediately. It is used in a number of cities in Canada and is in operation province-wide in

Alberta as well as in 41 states in the U.S.A. It is especially useful in child abduction cases. It was launched in the U.S.A. originally for child abduction cases, but as Turner pointed out, the system can be used for any missing person, not only from Princeton but from anywhere.

"We have the highway signs that can be used. If a child is kidnapped in Vancouver, the vehicle could be headed our way and we could be on the alert here."

Turner pointed out that RCMP do not have the manpower to support an Amber Alert, but COPS has the people in place to do the job under the guidance of the RCMP.

"We can have people out immediately at no cost to the taxpayer," Robin Miller told Council.

Sgt. Lozinski commended COPS

for their initiative.

"The RCMP supports them 100 percent," Sgt. Lozinski stated.

Council members were enthusiastic in their support of the Amber Alert Project.

"It's a great thing for the community," Councillor Kathy Clement said.

Mayor Keith Olsen had welcomed the presentation by saying Citizens on Patrol are a feather in Princeton's cap, and concluded by giving 100 percent support to the idea.

"We welcome Amber Alert to Princeton," the mayor told Turner. "Thank you very much for another step forward for COPS."

He added that COPS are responsible for a steady improvement in the safety of the community.

Santa Claus is expected to arrive in Princeton this Saturday afternoon as the final entry in a Snowflake Festival Parade being organized by Princeton and District Chamber of Commerce.

Snow storm postpones PXA AGM

The snowstorm last Tuesday evening disrupted the annual general meeting planned for Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA). Due to several nominees not being available, members decided to re-schedule the annual general meeting for Thursday, November 27, at Town Hall at 7:00 p.m. Many members paid their dues anyway and membership cards were issued to them.
 The evening was not wasted, as Vice-President Jody Woodford took the chair and conducted a regular meeting.

John Bey reported he is still working on the shower building plans.
 Peter Ruoss reported the fairgrounds have been winterized and Katimavik is working in other locations after building 15 picnic tables for use at the grounds. The tables will be stained next spring.
 The weigh scales need an inspection and the qualified inspector will come to Princeton in due course. This fall, 100 cattle were weighed.

Ruoss expressed some concern about the cost of heating the concession building and washrooms during the Halloween party. He said he had put in heaters because the evening was so cold he was afraid the plumbing might freeze. He suggested PXA members look at the costs for this event. (there was no charge to the Fire Department for the Halloween party).
 Lane Carter reported the motorsports group is planning a Spring Motorsports Festival to take place June 5 and 6, 2004. He said the event will expand to many different kinds of events. He expressed a desire to see grass planted in the infield to improve appearances and attract a wider range of participants.

Town buys new fire truck

The Town of Princeton will purchase a new fire truck next spring. The delivery date is June 15, 2004. The Town received three bids, ranging from \$346,861 to \$282,531.
 Fire Chief Eric Gregson presented a review of the three bids from a Fire Department point of view and recommended the bid submitted by Hub of Abbotsford, which was the middle bid, but had the advantage of being built in B.C.
 At the November 17 meeting, Council agreed with the Fire Department recommendation and will buy the truck from Hub of Abbotsford.

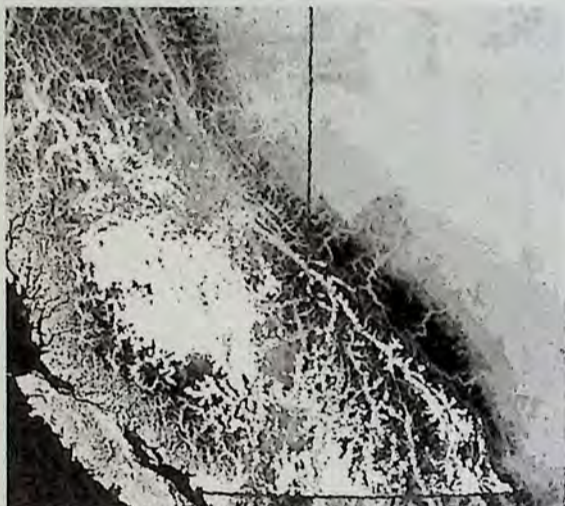

B.C. Forests are under attack.



The Mountain Pine Beetle

The current infestation is thought to be the worst insect epidemic in North America's history. It has consumed twenty times more forest than the fires this past summer, covering an area three times the size of Vancouver Island. It stretches from the U.S. border to Fort St. James and is still growing at a rate of 40 per cent every year. Abundant stands of mature lodgepole pine; warm, dry summers; and mild winters have all helped the beetle population explode. All that will stop the beetle's advance is sustained cold winter weather of -40 C or below, but we are taking steps to slow the infestation.

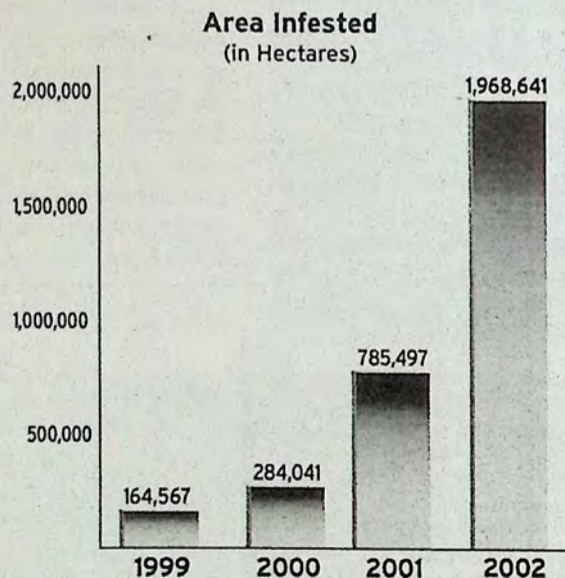
What's at Risk

Already, \$20 billion in timber value is at risk of being lost. As a result, the supply of available timber in B.C.'s interior will be affected for up to 80 years, impacting more than 30 forest-dependent communities. The dry, dead trees also increase the risk of forest fires.

Battling the Pine Beetle

A task force was appointed in 2001 to lead the development of an action plan now being implemented. This action plan includes:

- Committing more than \$100 million to control measures over the last three years;
- Increasing the annual allowable cut and diverting forest harvesting to the leading edge of the infestation; and
- Restoring damaged areas through rehabilitation and replanting.



Preventing Fires and Protecting Jobs

We're acting to protect forest industry jobs and to ensure the long-term economic health of forest-dependent communities. Because for every tree harvested, as many as 16 can be saved. By removing dry, dead trees today, we can reduce the risk of forest fires.

There is still more work to be done. To that end, Premier Gordon Campbell just convened a special pine beetle symposium in Quesnel to seek solutions, bringing together community leaders, industry experts, First Nations members, environmental representatives and others.

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Similkameen Country's Employment Access Centre has provided Keremeos area residents with an important link to employment services. Facilitator Lisa Fraser and Program Coordinator Ken Randle have worked hard to bring those services to their community.

Centre nears end of second year

Tucked in the bottom level of Victory Hall, in a location best known as the former home of Keremeos Village Office and the library, sits the Employment Access Centre.

The facility has been there nearly two years and has made a huge impact on employment services in the region.

There are a total of 1,017 active users of the centre ranging in age from teens to those in their 60's.

This year alone, the centre aided 23 people in securing full time employment, another 6

found part time work and 3 people established self-employment opportunities.

"We're successful in finding jobs for our clients," says Facilitator Lisa Fraser.

The facility sees an average of 23 visits per day of those using the resources available - ranging from computer career searches to attending workshops.

A total of 4,206 visits have been logged to date.

"We have people come in for a few minutes to check e-mail or spend hours researching employment opportunities,"

Fraser explains.

Impressive figures for a site that is funded wholly by Human Resources Development Canada and employees two full time with an additional relief person on staff.

Providing access to job postings through the region and the use of computers for job searching is only part of what the centre does.

"We are a self-service job search centre where we provide you the resources to find yourself employment," is how Fraser describes the primary function of the facility.

Other services available include individual assistance for resume and cover letter writing, interview preparation and job preparation workshops.

A resource library provides books and information on a variety of career options and job-related subjects and there are a few office services offered.

Access to all employment and career information is free of charge to anyone actively seeking employment.

New RCMP station inspires service to bench

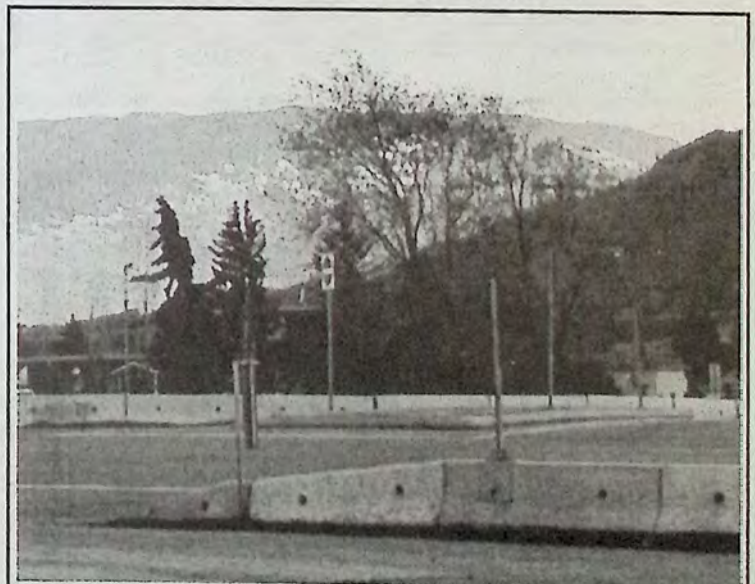
Public Works Canada will be in charge of building the new RCMP station in Keremeos. The plans have been approved, and it is likely to go to tender this winter. It will be located at the intersection of Highway 3 and Highway 3A, and across from Hilltop Esso.

The construction will involve Village of Keremeos plans. Sewerage service will go under the highway to the new building,

but the sewerage service will also link to Similkameen Elementary Secondary School and the Recreation Centre, both of which are currently on septic. This will free up land now occupied by septic fields. No work is expected to begin early next spring.

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Diabetes is a kidney disease risk

Diabetes is fast becoming a world epidemic. Every year, more people are being diagnosed with diabetes, yet there are still many more people who have diabetes and do not know it. There are currently more than 177 million people with diabetes world-wide. The World Health Organization estimates this number will rise to 300 million by 2025. Diabetes is the fourth main cause of death in most developed countries.

One of the main complications of diabetes is kidney disease. This occurs in about one third of people with either Type 1 or Type 2 diabetes, and adds greatly to the

morbidity, mortality and cost of treatment. It is extremely important to draw attention to the consequences of diabetes and kidney disease and to encourage early detection and treatment. The kidneys provide three main functions: remove wastes from the blood via urine and return clean blood to the body; regulate water and mineral levels for good health, and produce hormones that control other body functions.

Diabetic kidney disease is a chronic, progressive kidney disease. High blood sugar levels affect the small vessels of the whole body. These vessels can become damaged and therefore not work properly. When the

small vessels in the kidneys are damaged, the filtering process is affected. Wastes build up in the blood whereas other valuable substances, like protein, can leak into the urine. If this continues, kidney damage can lead to kidney failure. At this time, the kidneys almost completely stop cleaning the wastes out of the blood. Unless treated, wastes will build up to dangerous levels and can cause death.

Risk factors for diabetic kidney disease are smoking, high blood pressure, high blood sugar levels, and family history of kidney disease. Kidney damage may occur without you even knowing it. There are often no symptoms of diabetic kidney disease until the kidneys fail completely. However, there are some early signs for you and your doctor to look for: protein in the urine, high blood pressure, leg swelling or cramps, increased need to urinate, especially at night, less need for insulin or diabetic pills, nausea and vomiting, and weakness and anaemia. Early screening can make a big difference.

Ways to prevent diabetic kidney disease include maintaining excellent blood sugar levels, controlling blood pressure to 130/80 or better, reducing dietary protein intake, avoiding smoking and alcohol, treating urinary tract infections, having urine albumin levels checked at least once a year, and taking regular physical exercise and losing weight if necessary (under doctor's care).

Hospital Auxiliary reports on success

Princeton Hospital Auxiliary has had another busy year and we wish to express our heartfelt thanks to all those who support our work, either by donating items to the Thrift Shop, by coming here to browse and buy, and by attending the Florence Nightingale Tea.

It is your support that enables us to buy equipment for the hospital and for Ridgewood Lodge, and to make donations to health-related groups in the greater community.

Most items in the Thrift Shop sell for less than \$5.00.

It is impressive that these purchases added up to more than \$50,000 in 2003. Out of this, of course, we pay telephone, electricity, insurance and the like, but all the work is done by volunteers.

You can see that by far the largest part of our income is then spent on equipment for Princeton General and Ridgewood Lodge and as donations to health-related community organizations.

For the hospital, we bought an ECG machine (\$7,000), a transport ventilator (\$8,700) and an ultrasound unit for the physiotherapy department (\$3,000). Less expensive items were a Hyfrecator and Holter Monitors. For Ridgewood Lodge we bought two patient lifts (\$4,488).

The role of small-town hospitals is changing, and the trend is for auxiliaries to support organizations such as New Beginnings, Ground Search and Rescue, the Highway Rescue group, and the women's shelter. We have donated to all of these, an amount in excess of \$6,000.

Smaller sources of income are the Gift Shop in the hospital lobby and the Florence

Nightingale Tea. The hand-crafted items in the Gift Shop are made not only by members of the Auxiliary but also by a number of other ladies who are very skilled at knitting, crocheting and quilting. We are very grateful to all these generous people.

The Florence Nightingale Tea is put on to welcome the public and to entertain you with a lively fashion show that accents the excellent garments available at the Thrift Shop.

All these activities are made possible by YOU, and we thank you for all of your wonderful support!

Living Past 100

Heal your dry skin

One of the worst effects of living in a northern climate is suffering from dry skin during winter. Almost everyone of every age has this problem. Those who live in semi-arid areas, such as the Similkameen Valley, may suffer more than those who live where the air contains more moisture.

Hands and face can become dry in any season, but in winter, the entire body seems to dry. Many people suffer from itching, flaky skin during the coldest months of the year.

Top on the list of treatments for internal use is primrose oil, which contains linoleic acid. Two capsules three times a day will help the skin recover.

Vitamin A is necessary for healing and construction of new skin tissue. Carrots, apricots and squash or pumpkin are excellent sources of vitamin A, but you must eat a lot of these vegetables to reap the benefits. Taking Vitamin A by capsule will help supplement your need for this vitamin. You will find it helps mucous membranes, too, such as are found in lungs, nasal passages, mouth and digestive system.

Taking four or five kelp tablets will give you good skin tone and provide a balanced supply of minerals.

Vitamin E is one of those essential vitamins and should be taken by capsule. Skin creams or lotions containing Vitamin E are helpful, too, but any good skin cream or lotion helps protect the skin from drying.

Clean, well-scrubbed skin is the least likely to be itchy or flaky. Sometimes a good scrub followed by body cream will work wonders. For best results, cut down on your consumption of wheat flour and sugars.

If skin irritation persists and becomes too itchy, see your doctor. The problem could be a mold or bacterial infection.

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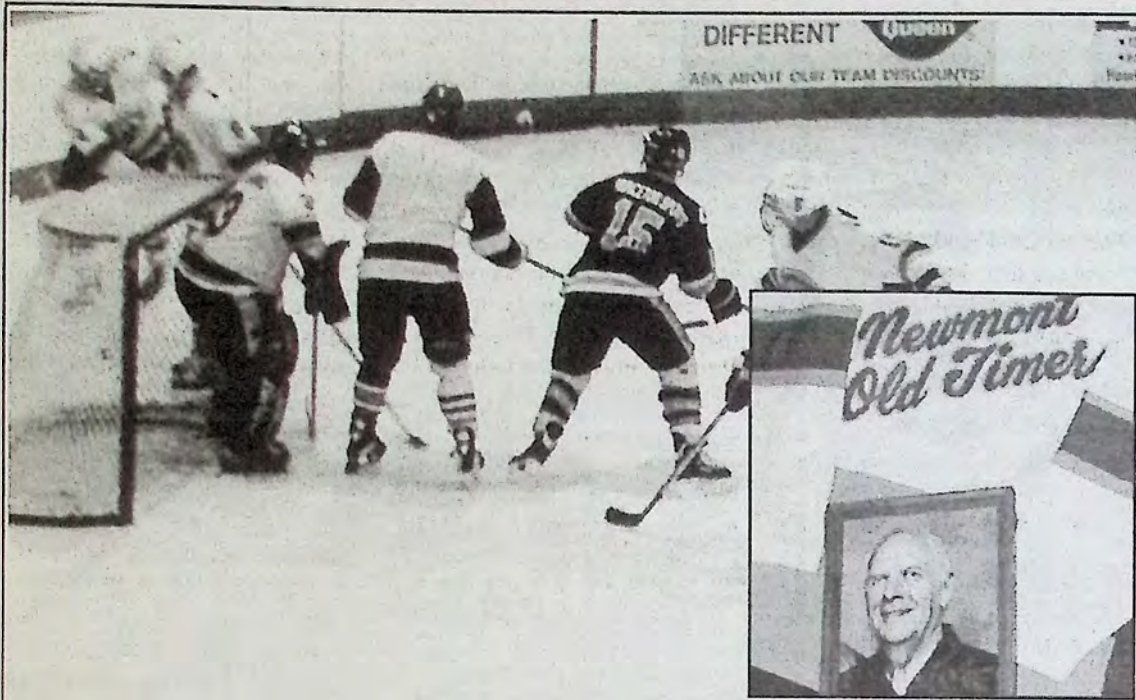

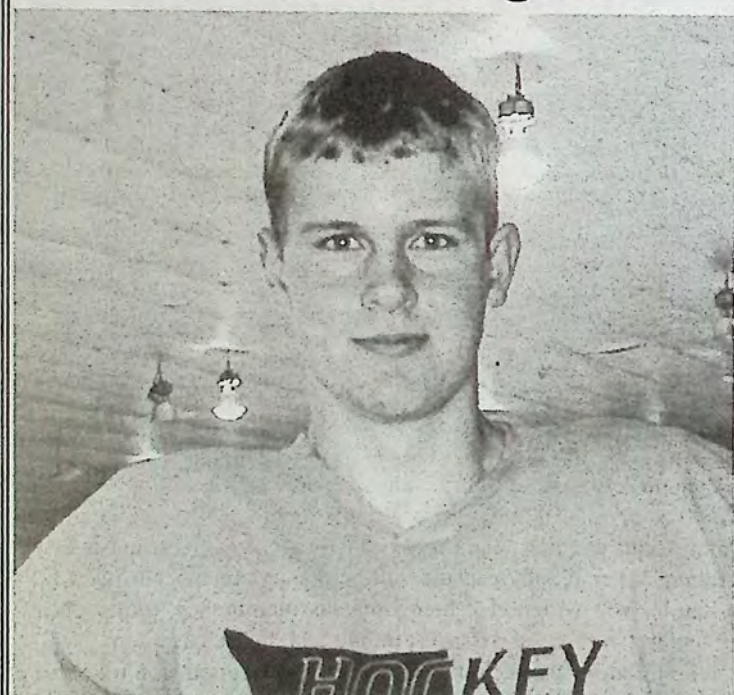

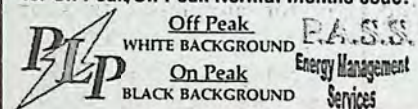

Open letter to school trustees

Dear Mesdames/Sirs:

We have written this letter to express our concern for the lack of academic courses presently being offered to Grade 12 students at Princeton Secondary School (PSS).

PSS currently offers our Grade 12 students 4.5 (teacher-taught) courses. They are English 12, Math 12, Biology 12 and History 12. The .5 is Physics 12 which is offered every other year. Chemistry 12 is being taught through a "virtual" computer program. Students taking this Chem 12 course are finding it extremely difficult. The Ministry guideline is set at a minimum of four academic courses.

We have been told by administration that Pss cannot afford to offer courses to students if enrolment in the course is less than seven students. It is interesting to note Similkameen Secondary School in Keremeos offers nine Grade 12 academic (teacher-taught) courses with as low as five students in a class. The total student enrolment at Similkameen Secondary is lower than the enrolment at PSS. However do they do it?

We realize that the Ministry has made drastic cuts to education budgets for each district. We are of the understanding that the budget dollars for PSS is number driven - meaning that for every student we have enrolled,

we receive so many dollars. Funding is relative to school size. In the past two years, we have seen a decrease in teachers, teacher aides and courses offered to our students as a result of the declining enrolment. However, we have not seen any decrease in the administrative positions at the school. Should not administration needs decline along with declining student enrolment?

School administrators have said there has been a decline in the number of students choosing the academic route. Why aren't our students being steered in an academic direction? Why aren't the course counsellors guiding our students in that direction? From

discussions with current Grade 12 students, it would appear that some students have been discouraged from taking certain academic courses. Many Grade 12 students have been forced into learning by self-directed correspondence to meet requirements for entrance into post-secondary institutions.

We believe that through education we offer our children the best chance for their future. As parents of a child currently enrolled at PSS we see our options as being: 1. hope that the academic programs improve at PSS or 2. enroll our child in another school.

Elections were held and Sister Nellie will be our Noble Grand in 2004. She laid a wreath on our behalf on Remembrance Day.

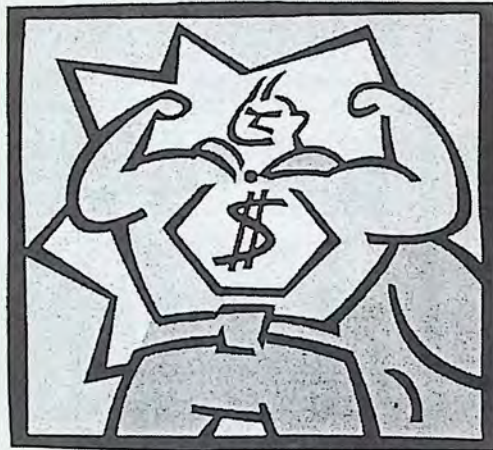

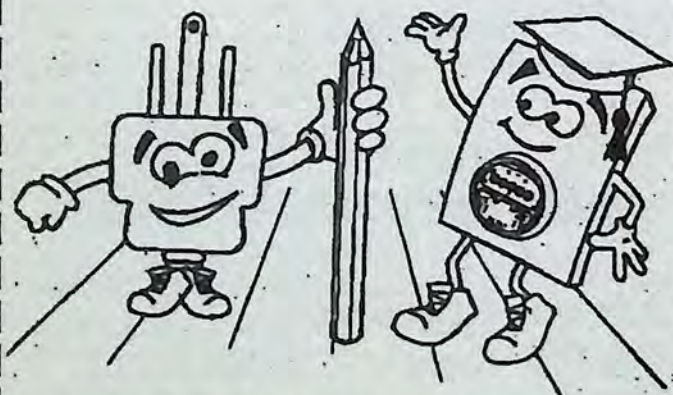

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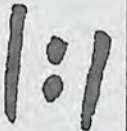
