**Hedley has a

Doug Bratt, who owns and operates The Country Store in Hedley with his wife, Terri, has spent the past month building a skating rink. Terri describes Doug as "a man with a mission", and the extreme cold last week made his mission much more difficult.

Doug and Terri live at the top of the hill east of Hedley, and below their house is the flat area of an old tailings dump. A month ago, Doug cleared an area of knapweed, setting the boundaries for the skating rink, which is 30 feet wide (10 m.) by 180 feet long (90 m.) He began to run water from his house onto the area when Hedley's weather became cold enough.

Doug is the first to admit Hedley has a skating rink, but he felt it was in a location too far away from everyone to be properly supervised and maintained. The location downhill from his house was ideal.

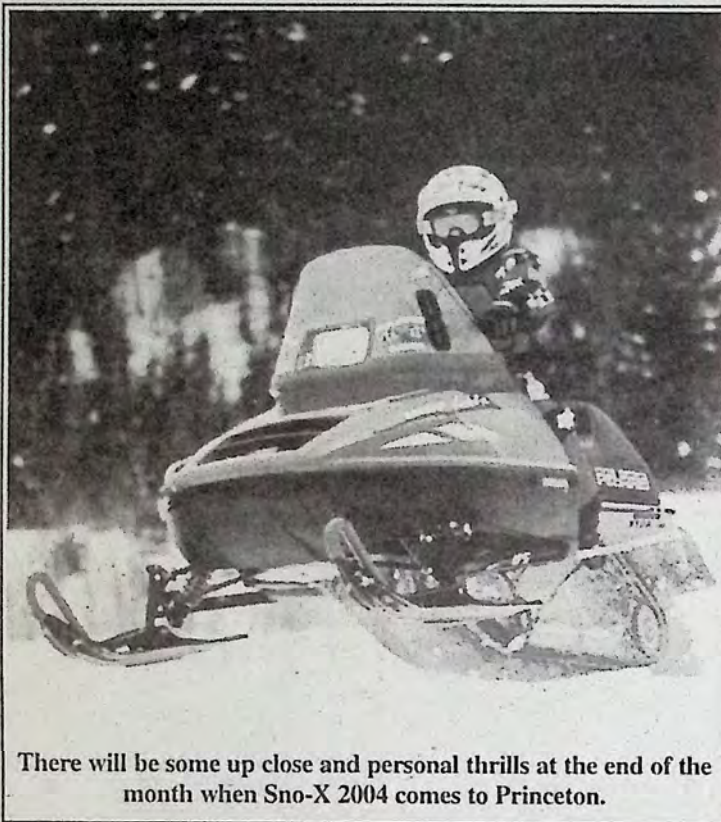
He ran approximately 400 feet of garden hose from his outdoor faucet to the rink area and began building the ice. Terri cooperated by doing Doug's shift at the store.

When the severe cold hit last week, even Hedley was in the deep freeze, and despite the water running through the hose, it froze solid. Doug hauled the entire length of hose into his bathroom to thaw it and continued to build the rink. Then more snow came, and he had to clear the rink, but the weather was a lot better last Thursday.

It is a great rink but Doug knows it will not last more than another month. One advantage right now is that the sun goes behind the mountain to the south for the afternoon. Mission accomplished!

Cruisers plan Sno-X

Snowmobilers will race at exhibition grounds



There will be some up close and personal thrills at the end of the month when Sno-X 2004 comes to Princeton.

Timberline Cruisers Snowmobile Club hosts Sno-X 2004 on January 31 and February 1, the last weekend of the month. This year, they will be using the exhibition grounds and all of the facilities, including washrooms and concession stand.

Spectators will be able to sit on bleachers and find shelter from any wind under the refreshment gardens new roofed area. The new announcer's stand will give the announcer a real advantage of having a roof over his head and some protection from the wind. Spectators are advised to wear several layers of clothing and warm (insulated) footwear. Bringing a blanket or two might be a good idea, and something warm for seating. In this location, you cannot simply pull up your vehicle to sit in and watch the races.

Professional snowmobile racers have a \$1,000 minimum prize each day, and there are lots of prizes in all classes. There are several classes of race: Pro, semi-pro, sport, ladies, juniors, masters (the old guys), Mini-Z stock, and Mod. All events are points events.

Races start at 10:00 a.m. both days. Admission is \$10 for adults

and \$5.00 for youth and seniors. Children under 10 enter free.

Racers must sign up by 8:00 a.m. For further information, racers can call (250) 295-6489 (Reichert's Sales and Service in Tulameen). This event is sanctioned by the B.C. Snowmobile Federation.

A special race will take place at half time. It is called "Sled Ed" and is for racers on snowmobiles 1980 or older. Everyone who owns an antique snowmobile is invited to enter this race (bring your sled and gear).

Hot food and drinks will be available from the concession stand.

Each day will have its own awards presentations following the entire slate of races for the day. Awards will be presented at the arena mezzanine.

Sno-X has been held at the exhibition grounds once in the past, and was successful in this location. Last year, the event was held at the airport, which brought a number of complaints about "keeping the airport an airport". Timberline Cruisers have held the event at the tailings, too, in the past, but the facilities available at the exhibition grounds are superior to other locations, especially for spectators.

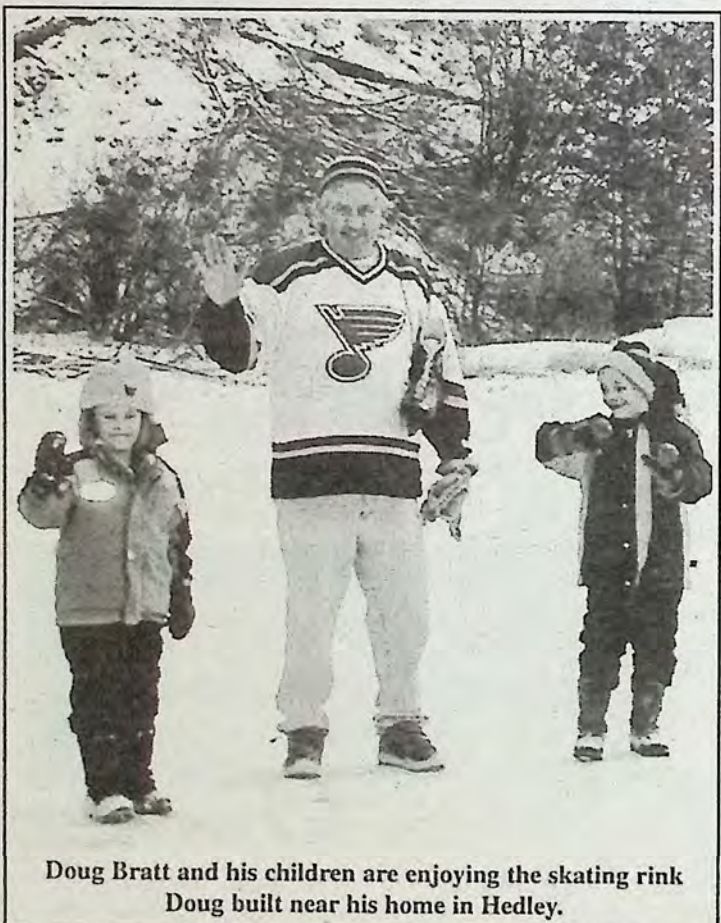
Rodeo Club starts action

Rural west is changing

Those of us who live in the Similkameen watershed are considered rural residents. A study released six months ago shows we are changing, and some of the myths about rural living are no longer true.

The Canada West Foundation released the report "The Rural West: Diversity and Dilemma" which explores the contradictory image people have of the rural west. The study covered a wide range of topics from growth in rural population to loss of young adults heading for the city.

Rural population is growing. The rate is not great, a mere three percent, but it is growth, not decline. Rural areas on the fringe of cities have shown the greatest increase in population, including increases in numbers of immigrants.

are a loss as they leave their little rural towns and head for the cities, this is not true of the adult working population age 25-65. In this age group, there has been growth.

Most rural communities grew through providing services. Trade, health care, manufacturing and tourism brought the greatest growth to growing western communities.

Rural homes cost less

The study discovered that rural households required 13 percent less in expenditures in B.C., and 20 percent less in Alberta, and a whopping 25 percent less in Saskatchewan, as compared with city households.

Rural people are more locally involved

People living in western Canada's rural communities are more likely to identify with their local community and province than city

 The myth of a rural west falling into sharp decline is not true. The exodus from the "farm" to the city does not appear to be a problem today. The Canada West Foundation plans to publish more information on this topic this year.

Runner plans 'ultra' races

Ultramarathoner Moe "The Eagle" Beaulieu sees tourist potential in road races in the Similkameen Valley.

Combined with his years of running and business interests, Beaulieu has established three different runs to take place in the Keremeos area this Summer.

The Keremeos Kruncher is a 50-km run set for Saturday, May 15th and the Eagle 100-mile/50-mile Runs will take place Saturday and Sunday July 24th and 25th.

Beaulieu, who goes by the nickname "Moe the Eagle", has been a road race runner since 1981. He has run numerous 10-km races, four marathons and 85 ultramarathons.

"Ultras are generally any distance beyond the standard marathon (26.2 miles/42-km) with 50-km being the generally accepted 'starter' distance," the Eagle explains. "Many are 40-mile, 50-mile, 100-km and 100-mile and even multi-day events."

Runners and volunteers in the Keremeos events will be on the courses for many hours with a time limit set at 15 hours for the 50-mile race and 33 hours for the 100-mile race.

Beaulieu has done his homework, stating the growing interest in ultramarathons attracts all ages with demographics showing 20% of the runners are 20-30 years old; 70% are 30-50 years old and 10% are older than 50.

An economic profile of ultramarathoners indicates 40% of them are considered retired upper middle-class professionals and 60% are middle and upper middle class members of the current workforce.

These stats spell economic success to Beaulieu.

"I feel these events will grow and bring much needed eco-sports tourism dollars to our area."

They will also attract participants from throughout the world.

"The 100-miler will see 70% of the runners from the U. S., 25% from Canada and 5% from Northern Europe and Asia."

A few sponsors are already

on board, including Valu-Plus Foods supplying food and water for the runners at aid stations for all three races, but

more are needed to help with costs associated with the events.

Volunteers are still required to help with the longer races and according to Beaulieu, the experience is worth it.

"My events are well-organized, safe and enjoyable with exciting, memorable scenery."

Currency Matters - Part 1

The benefits of international investing have become accepted as gospel for most investors, promising diversification and a broader set of investment opportunities. But, it was really the high-octane performance found in U. S. equity markets during the 1980s and 1990s that lured so many into selling their Canadian investments in lieu of foreign assets.

This is largely evident in the proliferation of cloned mutual funds that sidestep foreign content limits for registered accounts. Unfortunately, the performance trends seem to have reversed of late. While the indices in Canada and the U. S. have both appreciated nicely during the past year, a falling U. S. dollar has robbed most of the upside for Canadians investing south of the border.

On a nominal basis, the S&P 500 rose 18.6% during the past year. All but 0.5% of this performance was lost to currency. Has the phenomenon of international investing come to a close? We don't think so. The benefits of international investing remain intact.

In the next "Investment Insights" article, to appear in the January 27th Similkameen News Leader, these benefits will be discussed.

How to keep your resolutions

do it for a month

3. keep trying the different activities until you find the one you like best

4. commit to that activity.

* Write it down and put it where you can see it so it is a daily reminder to you and the commitment you made. As time passes, you can evaluate your progress and make changes to the wording if necessary.

* Keep resolutions within your control. You may have limited success if you resolve to have a job at a Fortune 500 company by next summer. However, you could resolve to send out an updated resumé to a specified number of companies by summer.

* Have a buddy. Find a friend who will support you in your endeavour and do the same for that friend. Never underestimate the importance of social supports.

* Reward yourself. Years ago, each time I had exercised three times, I rewarded myself with a piece of stemware. I bought all my fine crystal that way. It was a great external motivator and it got me to the point of wanting to exercise for me, not the crystal.

* Don't give up. If you have broken resolutions in the past, don't abandon the idea of setting them in the future. Credit yourself for successes and examine the reasons why you didn't succeed. The beauty is that you can try again and you don't have to wait until next January!

The most important thing about dealing with winter is attitude. If you hate winter, then figure out ways to beat it.

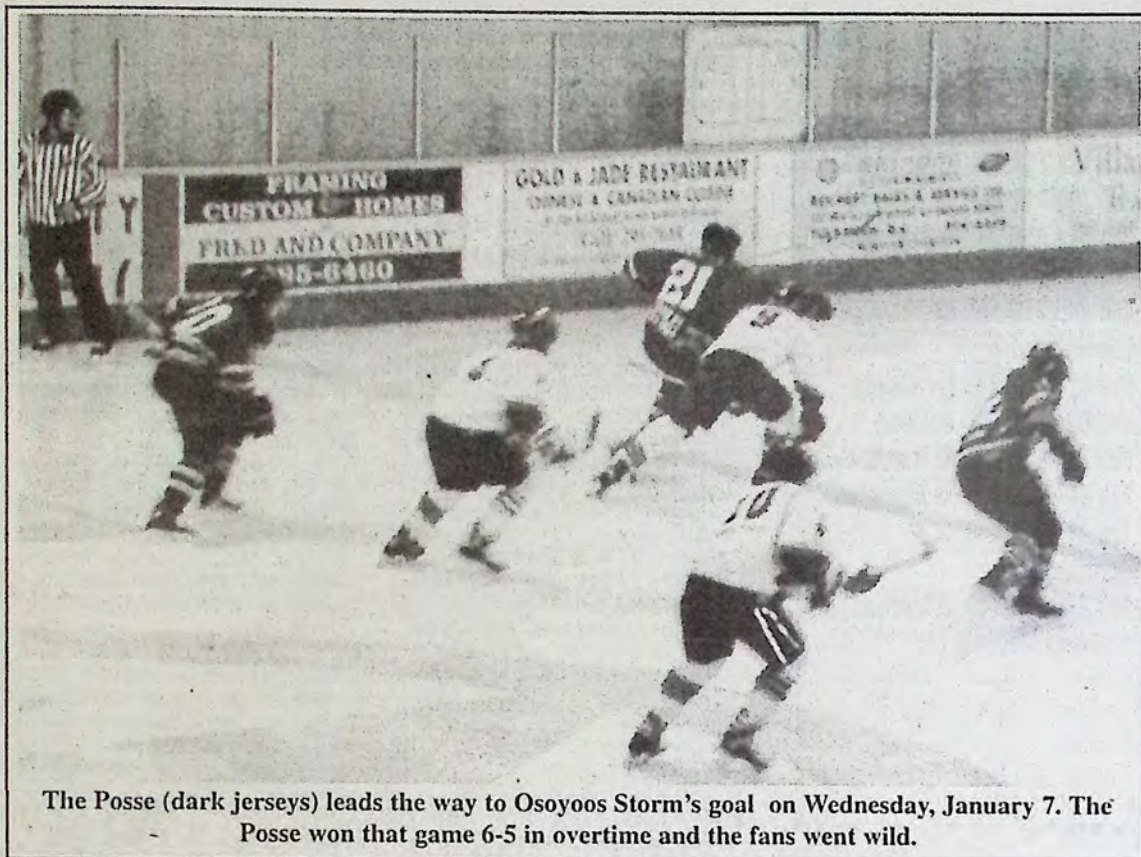

Heart Food

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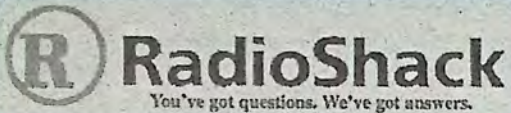
