Running for Chief are three candidates: Michael Duane Allison, Richard Anthony Holmes (incumbent), and Dominiquea Roberta Squakin.

There are seven running for the two positions as Councillor: Charlene Kathleen Allison (incumbent), Jessi Melissa Tonasket, Brandon Lee Squakin, Carmelletta Ida Annie Homes, Marie Karen Mae Holmes, Miranda Squakin (incumbent) and Geraldine Nancy Nahumpcheen Allison.

The election will be held from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on February 20 at Chuchuwayha Community Hall. Doug Springform of Kamloops is Electoral Officer.

Elliott has been an employee of the News Leader as advertising manager for the past three and one-half years. He has 25 years' experience in media, having begun his career in radio. He has worked in Princeton for 18 years. He will now assume much of the editorial responsibility as well as the advertising component.

Dawn and Sharon Johnson will continue with the News Leader to effect a smooth transition. Dawn will remain indefinitely to assist George with reporting duties, but will not be working full-time. She believes it is time to retire and is confident the News Leader will be in good hands.

Drug dealers do time

Two Princeton men were convicted in Penticton Supreme Court of charges laid following a residential search on May 28, 2003. One man will spend months in jail, the other one day.

A house located at 214 Luard Avenue in Princeton was found to contain packaged cocaine, money and drug paraphernalia. RCMP seized these items.

As a result of the items seized in the search, William Macey Macdonald and Cordell Whitman Moore were charged with possession of an illegal drug for the purpose of trafficking.

William Macey Macdonald pled guilty to simple possession and was ordered to pay a \$200 fine and serve one day in jail plus a year on probation.

Cordell Whitman Moore pled guilty to possession for the purpose of trafficking and was ordered to serve eight months in jail, pay a \$100 fine, and serve a year on probation.

Independent candidate will run in next federal election

Osoyoos resident Robert Schuster will run for a seat in the House of Commons for the riding of BC Southern Interior (formerly Kootenay-Boundary-Okanagan) in the next federal election.

Princeton and Keremeos areas are included in this new riding.

"After a lengthy consultation with many individuals, groups and organizations in the riding, I have decid-

ed to run as an Independent Candidate," Schuster stated. "Running as an independent candidate will allow me to truly represent only the constituents of the BC Southern Interior riding.

The time is now for positive changes. People will be able to see where Robert Schuster stands on the issues through further press releases and in his upcoming website.

Man jailed after drug bust

Following the third search of his home in a year, Duane Daniel Maclellan was arrested on January 13 after police found a quantity of cocaine, money and drug paraphernalia. This was the second search of his residence at 246 Luard Avenue in the past two months. Maclellan was taken into custody, and transported to

Penticton. On January 14, he appeared in court in Penticton, where Crown Counsel requested he be remanded into custody until his next court appearance on January 19, 2004.

For the third time during the past year, Maclellan has been charged with possession of a controlled substance for the purpose of trafficking.

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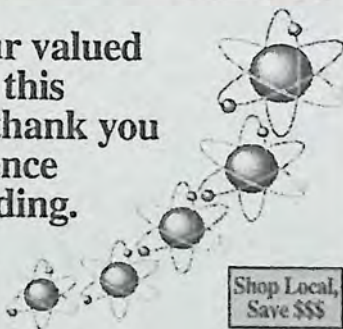

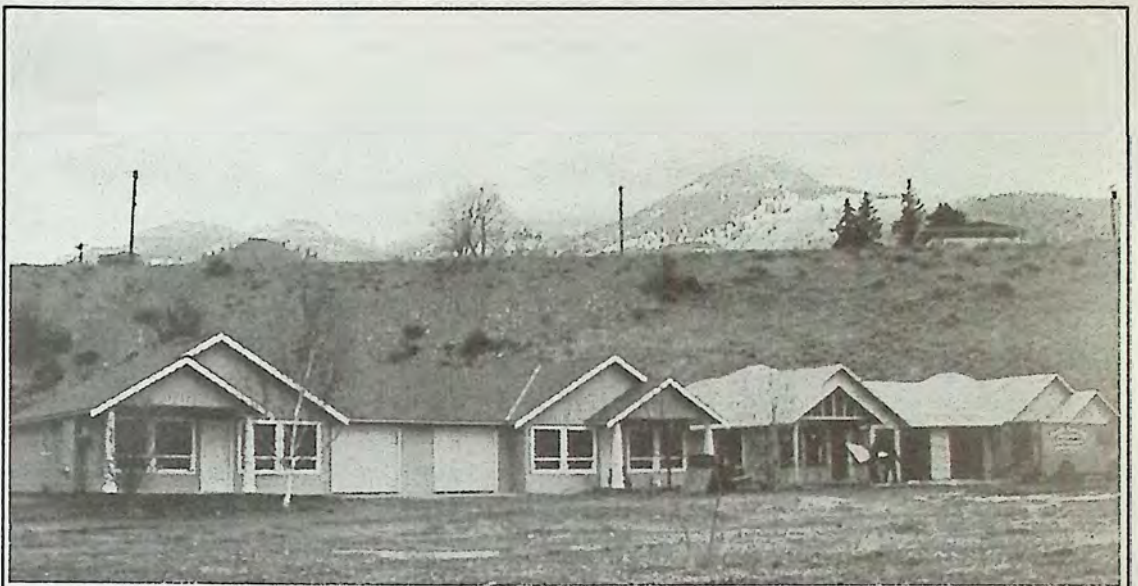

Village faces land "crunch"

Land, land, everywhere, but no more for the Village of Keremeos.

Vera Roberts attended the January 5 Village Council meeting to petition Council to resist an application by a local property owner to have 13 acres of ALR land encompassed within Village boundaries. The application was intended to give the Village some property to be zoned as Light Industrial, and Roberts did not want to see this land used for that purpose.

The property in question is adjacent to the southeast boundary of the Village.

Council listened to Roberts, but made no commitments. There is to be a public meeting next month about the Community Plan during which the public will have an opportunity to

Council enacts safe driving policy

Village Council has enacted a new Drinking and Driving Policy recommended by ICBC and is one of the first municipalities in B.C. to adopt this policy.

The policy states, "It is in the Village of Keremeos' best interest to ensure that the serving of alcohol is conducted prudently with the highest regard to the safety of patrons and the public at large."

The policy calls for organizers of events at facilities or parks where alcohol is served to have a Designated Driver Program in place. Organizers will be required to post information and inform assembled guests that a designated driver should be in attendance or alternate transportation for the event should be arranged. Event organizers will receive or told how to obtain Designated Driver Program materials.

Local politicians hear grasslands park plan

Elected officials and Indian Band managers from the Similkameen met in Keremeos Village Council chambers January 14 to learn about the proposed national park in the South Okanagan. The park is a high elevation dryland area extending from near Osoyoos to just south of Penticton and encompasses the area between the Similkameen Valley and the Okanagan Valley.

Douglas Harvey, from the Parks Establishment Branch of Parks Canada, explained the project is in its first stages of public consultation. The establishment of a national park is a long process. A

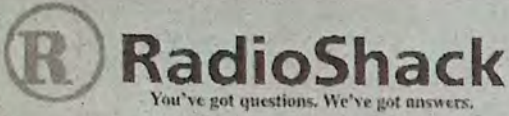
The entire Keremeos area desperately needs industry, and Village Council hopes to be able to address this need but has no land available for development. Further, as more and more services formerly paid by the province are downloaded onto municipalities, the taxpayers of Keremeos will need industry and more population to pay the costs, or property taxes for people within Village boundaries will escalate.

feasibility study must be done, along with an inventory of natural assets which make the land worth designating as a park. Then a series of public consultations must take place, followed by consultations between provincial and federal government before a decision can be made. When the decision is made, management agreements must be drawn, and construction of public facilities can begin. This is just a brief outline of what must be done. It will take five to eight years to go through the initial stages of the process.

Mayor Walter Despot said he could see no reason for concern by the Village of Keremeos. He saw the meeting as beginning the process of talking to all of the stakeholders. He noted that all private land which may be absorbed into the park will be "willingly sold" and the concerns about horses and cattle grazing were answered - national parks do not forbid grazing. He could see some future potential for tourism, but it is a long way off.

Princeton Mayor Keith Olsen felt much the same way, and had no concerns.

"It's an opportunity. If the park goes ahead, we'll have a lot of traffic going through to this grasslands park," May Olsen said.

What's good about freezing?

An icy Canadian winter is something we endure and hope it ends sooner than later. It was these cold Canadian winters that launched the frozen food industry.

In 1912, an American, Dr. Birdseye, began to raise fur-bearing animals in Labrador. During the first winter at his fur farm, Dr. Birdseye saw local native people ice fishing in 50 degrees below zero Fahrenheit. The fish would freeze as soon as they came from the water, and when thawed later, were still fresh. He discovered birds and game meats were fresh after being fast-frozen.

The following autumn, Dr. Birdseye tried dipping cabbages in sea water and fast-freezing

them. He found the cabbages stayed fresh and he could have fresh cabbage greens in a land where greens were rare in winter.

He went back to the United States and spent 10 years trying to duplicate the extremely cold conditions. He had many problems, but when he finally duplicated the 50 below conditions, and froze some produce, he had problems persuading people that foods cleaned and packed in moisture proof containers were good to eat if fast-frozen.

Although it took a long time, he was finally successful, and Birdseye frozen food products were in high demand. Fast-

freezing was the most important development in the food industry since canning. Frozen foods have almost as much food value as fresh foods.

This new method of preserving food added a lot of opportunity to farmers for preserving crops, especially berries, peas, and other produce that deteriorates rapidly.

For the consumer, this method of preserving food offered higher quality products containing more nutrition, better appearance, and greater variety for foods out of season. The frozen food industry is taken for granted today, but began with frozen fish in Labrador.

Women eligible for this service must be BC residents who have never had breast cancer, have not had a mammogram during the past year, and must provide the name of a BC health care provider.

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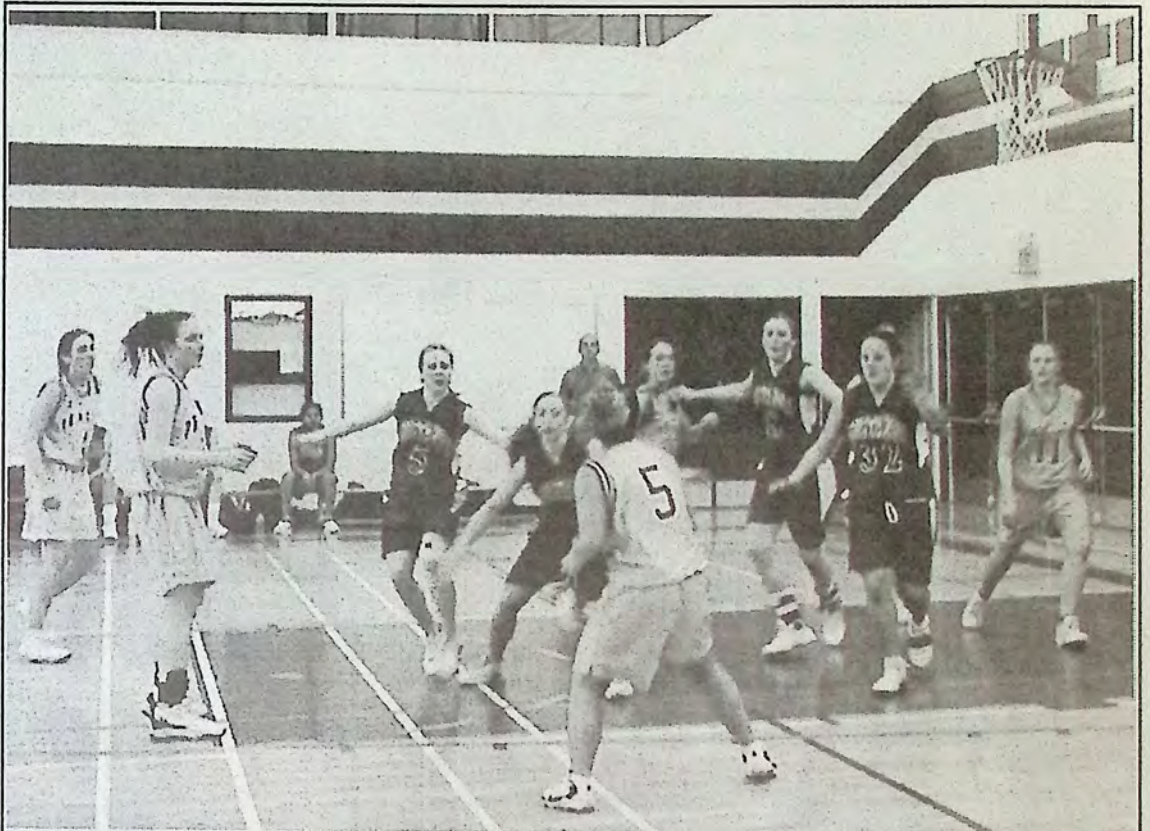

Dr. Markey presents Nepal

More than 60 people turned out to the Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists meeting to hear Dr. Scott Markey talk about trekking in Nepal. Dr. Markey has made seven trips to Nepal between 1989 and 2001, challenged by the peaks surrounding the Kumbu glacier below Mt. Everest. One could safely say this was mountain climbing – not your normal trek along a beaten path. Scott regaled us with information, beautiful slides and humorous side bits.

Did you know Nepal is 600 km. long, 200 km wide? There are three different geographical areas. Twenty-six million people live in Nepal and speak 56 different languages. Nepal is the largest recipient of foreign aid. Life expectancy is about 50 years. Hinduism is the predominant religion in urban areas and Buddhism more predominant as elevation increases. Rice is their main crop. There are

800 species of birds in Nepal.

It was a most informative presentation and generated a lot of questions regarding high altitude climbing (base camp at 1600 metres and the highest peak he climbed was 7500 metres).

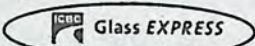

game went into the last minute.



provincial to national. If Princeton wants to build a track and become part of the circuit, the track would have to first be inspected and approved by an official from MotoCross and then would be given a regional event to see whether the local group could organize and run an event satisfactorily. If Princeton organizers did a good job, then more race events would be approved for Princeton.

The next step for the local men is to take their proposal and report to the January 27 Fall Fair meeting. Fall Fair has become the motorsports sponsor to help the loose-knit various motorsports enthusiasts an opportunity to form their own group and manage their own events. Fall Fair has already indicated support for expanded motorsports, including MotoCross.

After presenting their report to the Fall Fair, the MotoCross concept will be presented to Princeton Exhibition Association in February to seek PXA support for the project of building a track suitable for MotoCross events.

The motorsports group includes representatives from Timberline Cruisers Snowmobile Club, the tuff truck and demolition derby

group, and the MotoCross group. Their plan is to build a multi-purpose track at the exhibition grounds that could be used for all of the motorsports events.

To date, no opposition has been expressed by either PXA or Fall Fair, but a petition is circulating to find whether the public supports the idea of MotoCross in Princeton.

Mike Baines told the News Leader that Princeton is in an ideal situation to begin hosting MotoCross events. Many of the communities hosting events are doing so on Crown land, Reserve land, or private land. Many have water problems and no facilities for the public. Princeton has the exhibition grounds with full facilities, no water problems and plenty of convenience for the public as well as for the racers. When the showers are built at the exhibition grounds, and some kind of secure camping area developed, Baines believes Princeton could eventually host provincial and national MotoCross events, which draw thousands of people. The MotoCross promoters believe building the right kind of track will do nothing but good for Princeton.

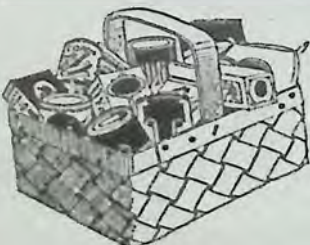

New Museum President gives views

Dear Editor;

Through the columns of the News Leader, may I as the new incoming President of the Princeton and District Museum and Archives Society have the opportunity to share some personal thoughts on what I consider and under-used and misunderstood resource to the community.

During the relatively short period of time I have been associated with the Museum, I have been amazed at the number of residents who have yet to cross the threshold of the building and I mean not only those new to town but also some who have lived her for 50 years! They are all unaware of the little, and some not so little, secrets of the town's history that lay hidden away there. For example, there are not many B.C. communities that can boast a copy of every newspaper ever published in the town. March 3, 1909, was the first copy of The Similkameen Star. The first branch of Overwaita was opened here in 1933, but did you know in which building? Or did you know that English suffragette Emily Pankhurst addressed a meeting here in Princeton in 1929?

Personally, I find not only Joe Pollard's Rock and Fossil collection fascinating and second to very few in the whole of Canada, but also some of the pioneer artifacts, be it the cocktail shaker and the slot machine from long gone Granite City or the early version of the carpet vacuum and butter churn! Have

you got something relevant to Princeton's history tucked away that you would consider sharing with others this summer by loaning or donating to the Museum?

Having become President it is my hope that in 2004 that with the help of all townfolk, the Museum can develop apace and become a meaningful resource for residents and visitors alike, both young and old.

As my research has shown me, the history of Princeton is fascinating and something the town should be proud of, something we should be willing to share with others. Whether it is as a member of the Museum Society (membership is only \$5 per year), volunteering as a guide for visitors to the Museum or just being an interested and supportive resident, I encourage people of the town to get involved. I hasten to add I think the most important of those three is probably the last. I believe the other two will follow when curiosity has been aroused!

In coming months, plans have already been put in place to improve the lobby entrance area to the Museum, upgrade current displays, continue with a number of ongoing projects including work with the newspapers and archives plus the completion of a Timeline History of Princeton CD. Hopefully this is in addition to furthering the involvement of Princeton's younger generation (this is meant in all senses of the word!).

During the coming year, none of my vision for the future of

Princeton's Museum will happen unless it has the support of a lot of new faces who are not only willing to help the already dedicated small band of Museum members with their own personal skills, time and effort, but perhaps most of all their moral support. On the afternoon of November 18, 2003, the Princeton areas was hit with an unusually concentrated snowstorm. This storm lasted well into the next day and delivered a very heavy blanket of wet snow that toppled a number of trees, thus creating havoc with the power and telecommunications lines and roads in this area. Snowstorms are not unusual in the Princeton area but this one contained a record amount of very heavy wet snow and covered the entire service area all at one time. It was reported that the large line trucks were plowing as much as a foot of snow with their front bumpers in some areas.

There were outages in all regions, causing the Princeton Light & Power (PLP) crews to be required in many places in the same time frame.

Fortunately, PLP managed to obtain the services of two extra

crews. One crew was from the Penticton division of Aquila Networks Canada (BC) and the other from Plowe Powerline Contractors out of Kamloops. These crews worked along with the PLP crews to get power restored to most areas by the next day.

Due to the large area covered by these outages, some customers were without power far longer than PLP would have liked and PLP offers its apologies to all PLP and Aquila customers who were inconvenienced through that period.

The restoration process was further hampered by the telecommunications services being out in some of the areas so some customers were not able to report their outages immediately when they were not adjacent to the major telecommunications feeders.

By now all services have been restored by the repairs required will go on throughout the winter, as the amount of damage was extensive. PLP and the crews would like to extend their sincerest thanks to all of our great customers who patiently waited and helped out where they could to assist in the restoration process.

PLP thanks all of our staff members and their families for the extraordinary efforts provided in the emergency situation, and thanks the outside crews who helped us through this very unfortunate event. This was very hard work under very extreme conditions and everyone managed to reach down and find the extra strength required and to work the long hours safely. PLP is very proud of all of you!

PLP thanks all of its customers for their help and patience during that difficult period.

B.C. leads the way in new job creation

Yale-Lillooet MLA Dave Chutter says many of the new jobs in B.C. are in the Interior.

B.C. leads the nation in job creation and the Thompson-Okanagan Region, which includes Merritt, Princeton, Lillooet and Keremeos in Chutter's constituency, saw the largest increase in jobs in 2003. In total, 19,800 jobs were created, a 9.4 percent increase over 2002.

"One of our top priorities has been to restore the province's economy so we can create jobs and opportunities for British Columbians," Chutter says. "A recent report from Statistics Canada shows our economic policies are working and we are starting to see the results here in the Interior."

During the past two years, from December 2001 to December 2003, B.C. added a

total of 154,600 new jobs. That is an increase of 8.1 percent, the highest in Canada and well ahead of the 5.5 percent national gain.

"There is no doubt that we still have a lot of work to do," says Chutter. "While we have implemented policies that will support key resource industries such as mining and forestry, we must also continue to work with communities to diversify their economy. For example, many communities I represent are working to grow their tourism industry. The 2010 Olympics will certainly help do that and I'm looking forward to working with communities to help create even more job opportunities."

How to reduce liability of volunteers and volunteer organizations

The Social Planning and Review Council of B.C. offers some good advice for volunteers who serve on boards of directors. The advice helps volunteers, and their organizations, reduce their risk of liability.

Before you become a director of a non-profit society

- * learn the organization's goals, objectives and programs
- * find out how the community views the organization - what is its reputation?

- * Find out who is on the Board of Directors, what is the financial condition of the organization, what programs or events does it sponsor, and what staff is hired.

Directors should:

- * have a copy of the constitution and by-laws and read them, learn the procedure of meetings as well as the powers and responsibilities of board members and officers.
- * know the organization's budget and financial situation, and investigate anything that looks suspicious
- * know who is authorized to sign cheques and in what amount
- * be sure the organization is fulfilling all requirements of its non-profit and/or tax exempt status
- * if the organization has employees, make sure all payroll deductions are being made, and WCB is being paid. If EI, income tax, CPP are not paid, a director could be personally liable for those amounts.
- * be sure the organization's books are audited by a reputable firm or person.
- * insist that nominating committee and membership procedures are followed as written in the constitution
- * attend all meetings of the board
- * make sure you understand any issue and its consequences before voting.
- * if you have the slightest conflict

of interest on any issue, disclose it and abstain from voting on it, and have the secretary record in the minutes that you abstained.

- * review the minutes of every meeting to ensure they are correct, and if there is a motion made which is improperly recorded, make sure the motion is corrected.
- * Board members should have copies of documents and reports prior to the meetings to review them before the meeting.
- * insist that all committee meetings are reported at board meetings, preferably in written form.
- * make sure policies are clearly defined and followed by every person on the board
- * Make sure your Executive Committee does not exceed its authority
- * vote against any expenditure which is not covered by money in the bank
- * if you vote against a motion, be sure to have it recorded in the minutes.
- * keep the minutes in a binder or file for easy reference
- * insist the board seek advice from professionals (in writing) on any project or issue or activity in which liability may be a concern
- * evaluate the performance of your executive on a regular basis.

When organizations are sued, it is usually by an employee who was

not paid, or by Revenue Canada for unpaid remittances to the federal government. Following this are failure to enforce regulations (labour, health), wrongful acts or acts of negligence, and discrimination against an employee or wrongful dismissal. Conflict of interest suits arise when a board member has directly profited from a deal made with the board and has voted on the decision. Conflict of interest rules apply to all levels of government and are rarely applied to non-profit organizations.

Most organizations avoid risk by keeping good books, remaining solvent, paying their bills, and following the rule "honesty is the best policy". If all business is conducted openly and honestly, the chances of being sued are negligible.
