## Snow, speed and skill mix for thrills

Everything is ready to go for this year's Sno-X race event. Races take place from 10:00 a.m. on both Saturday and Sunday. Racers register early at Princeton's exhibition grounds. Spectators pay \$10 admission at the gate.

The track receives last-minute grooming this week, after a five-truck convoy carried snow from the airport last week. An estimated 150 loads of snow was removed. Timberline Cruisers were assisted by the Town of Princeton who put their snowblower and truck at the club's disposal.

The final meeting before the races is at Princeton Secondary School at 7:00 p.m. January 27.

### Tips for spectators:

Wear warm clothing and lined boots, and take a comforter or blanket to wrap around yourself (just in case). There will be hot food and drinks available at the concession stand, and a sheltered area in which to eat. The wash-

rooms will be heated. Flat deck trailers will overlook the racecourse and spectators will be elevated high enough. Bring your own chairs.

There will be adequate parking outside the gate to the grounds, but there will be no room to pull your vehicle up to the edge of the racecourse. Unauthorized vehicles will be ordered removed from the grounds.

Timberline Cruisers and Princeton Exhibition Association have made every effort to make spectators comfortable while attending the races.

Awards presentations will take place at the arena mezzanine each day after all races have been run.

### Security

There will be security on site day and night all weekend. Any persons remaining on the grounds after the races are done must have a reason and permission from Timberline Cruisers to be there.

## Weyerhaeuser sells OSB mill

Weyerhaeuser and Tolko Industries announced last week they have signed a letter of intent for the sale to Tolko of the Weyerhaeuser strand board (OSB) mill located at Slave Lake, Alberta, for approximately \$56 million (\$43 million US). The transaction is targeted to close on February 27, 2004, and is subject to approval by the Weyerhaeuser Board of Directors as well as government

and other required approvals.

William R. Corbin, executive vice president for Weyerhaeuser's Wood Products businesses, stated, "Weyerhaeuser remains committed to maintaining a strong presence within the forest industry in Alberta, but we believe that the Slave Lake mill offers strategic benefits to Tolko that Weyerhaeuser has chosen not to pursue. This is yet another step we are making within Wood Products to improve the competitive performance of our overall portfolio."

Bill Blankenship, vice president of Engineered Panels for Weyerhaeuser, said, "We will continue to focus on our busi-

ness priority of serving our customers from our other facilities as we improve our competitive position."

The Slave Lake OSB mill has annual production capacity of 240 million square feet and a timber allocation of approximately 600,000 cubic meters per year. The mill directly employs around 140 people.

Weyerhaeuser acquired the Slave Lake mill in 1992. In Alberta, Weyerhaeuser also operates two other OSB mills at Edson and Drayton Valley, a pulp mill at Grande Prairie, sawmills in Grande Prairie and Drayton Valley, an engineered products plant at Claresholm and several sales and customer service centres.

## Police arrest truck thieves

Thanks to the information passed on from a local tow company driver, Princeton RCMP were able to locate a stolen truck from Westbank and apprehend two individuals from the vehicle.

Two men, a 35 year old from Oliver, B.C. and a 46 year old from Armstrong, B.C. are facing charges of possession of stolen property.

The truck had been reported stolen from Westbank. It became stuck on Osprey Lake Road. The vehicle was towed out, but the occupants were unable to pay cash for their tow bill and behaved in a suspicious manner.

Acting on information from the tow truck driver who recognized the vehicle and its occupants, police found the vehicle and occupants at a service station in Princeton, and arrested the men without incident.

The men will appear in court in Princeton on April 15 to answer to the charges.

## Council awards contracts

At the January 19 meeting of Princeton Town Council, contracts were discussed and awarded to local companies.

The contract with Ken's Janitorial was renewed for a one-year term at the same rate.

The garbage collection contract with 582138 BC Ltd. was extended from October 31, 2004, with an increase of \$335.79 per month plus GST, effective immediately, and an overall increase of one percent from November 1, 2004, to October 31, 2005, and an additional increase of one percent from November 1, 2005 to October 31, 2006.

Further, Council approved drafting a contract with 582138 BC Ltd. to collect recyclables for the period of February 1, 2004 to October 31, 2006, in the amount of \$1,800 per month with a one percent increase from November 1, 2004 to October 31, 2005, and an additional increase of one percent from November 1, 2005 to October 31, 2006, and that the recyclables be picked up twice monthly from residents and once weekly from commercial entities. ## Councillor Coyne opposes immigration plan

Councillor Spencer Coyne opposed plan promoted by the BC and Canadian governments for regional immigration. Although the other four members of Council approved participation in the plan, Councillor Coyne requested his negative vote be recorded.

The gist of the plan is to use immigration for economic development. The plan would

provide concessions to immigrants who moved to the Interior rather than settling in the Lower Mainland.

When asked later why he had opposed the plan, Councillor Coyne stated, "I don't think it's right. The government tells people where they can live. If I was moving to another country, I don't want them telling me where I have to live."

## OUC seeks status as a university

Dr. Robert Huckstable and Board member Janet Shaw appeared before Town Council January 19 to seek support for a new status

for Okanagan University College (OUC).

Shaw explained to Council, as Huckstable controlled the power

point presentation, that OUC is underfunded. OUC has a higher growth in the number of students, yet receives one-half of what Cariboo College receives and one-third of the provincial per student average.

At this time, OUC is funded under the College and Institute Act of B.C. The OUC Board of Directors is applying for status under the University Act in order to qualify for more funding.

At the same time, OUC will continue to provide vocational and technological training as well as expanding its university opportunities to include Masters and doctorate degrees.

OUC plans to bring more programs to Princeton through the Skills Centre. There is a cost to this. There are programs for electronic education as well. Dr. Huckstable said he would discuss this with Skills Centre manager Sharan Jung.

Shaw asked Council to write to the Minister of Education indicating support for OUC's application.

When the data is collected, all information pertinent to any individual business will remain confidential. The data will be amalgamated into a report which will provide an analysis of the health of the economy and the strength of independent business sectors. This report will be a foundation document for future planning.

Either Melanie Bagley or Michael McLaughlin will contact business owners in the valley to request completion of the survey. About 25 minutes are needed.

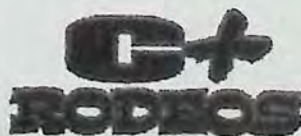

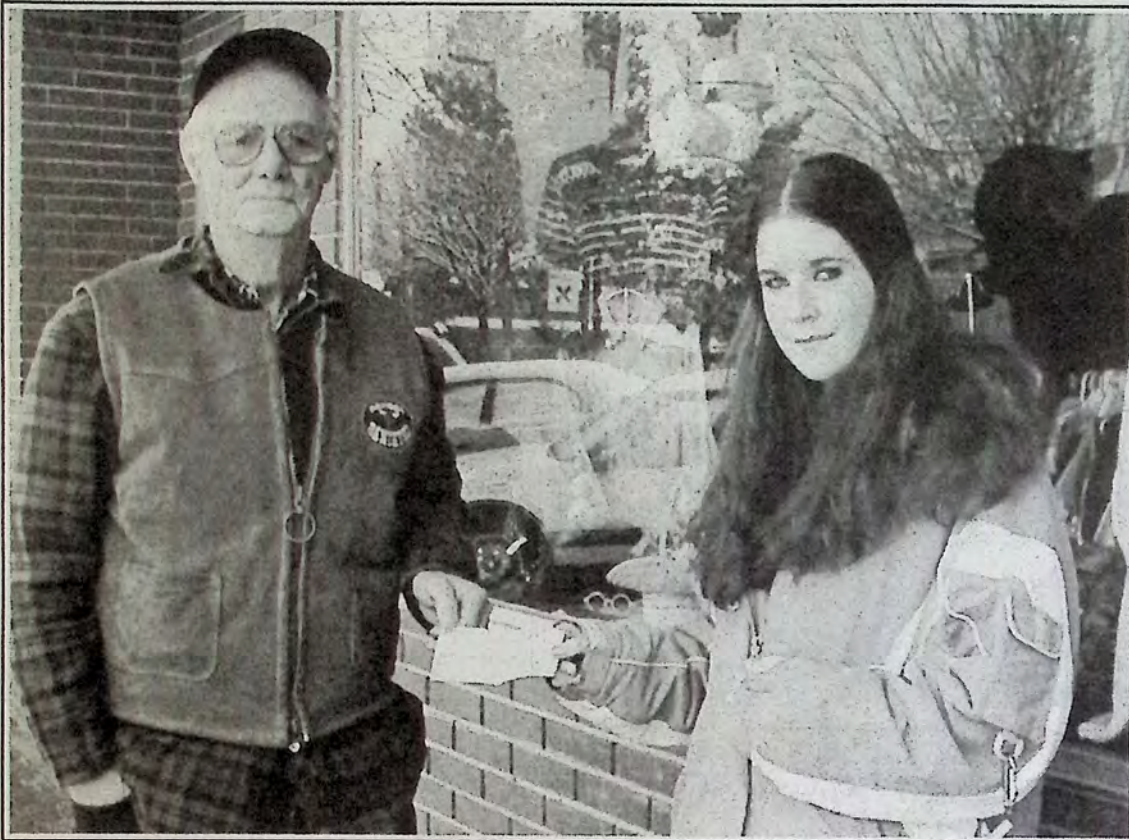

## PABEA members hear local business news

A business interested in setting up an assembly plant in Princeton was a major topic for discussion at the January 20 meeting of Princeton Area Business Enhancement Association (PABEA). The business interested in Princeton was originally contacted by PABEA member John Babiak, who has continued to do liaison work with the company. Babiak told members the company had made a presentation to Town Council requesting cost-free occupancy of the former Argo Road Maintenance site. Council had not given them a commitment, but Babiak and the company principals had gone to Community Futures to seek financing for the company to enable it to move to Princeton from the Lower Mainland. The company has taken their sports product to shows and has developed market interest and an eager distributor. The component of the product will be manufactured by specialists in China and assembled in Princeton if all goes well. The company would begin with approximately 10 full-time jobs but expects the business to grow and expand.

PABEA members discussed the situation and the consensus was to support the company coming to Princeton and to trust Council to negotiate a satisfactory agreement.

Bryan Suo Anttila, Diane Vajdermeuven and Harmony Montgomery, owners of Copper Mountain Bar and Grill, were introduced and asked to talk about

their experience at reviving a defunct business. Suo Anttila spoke briefly about moving from construction work into a new field of enterprise. They received members' best wishes for success and a round of applause. PABEA President George Elliott spoke about acquiring the News Leader newspaper, and introduced his partner, Brenda Engel. Elliott said they would continue to serve the communities of the Similkameen Valley as a community newspaper they could be proud of.

## Band has park concerns

Upper Similkameen Indian Band (USIB) has concerns about the proposed national park between Osoyoos and Penticton. The park, intended to be a high elevation grasslands park typical of drylands of the southern Interior, was the subject of a meeting held in Keremeos January 15.

Philippe Batini, USIB manager, said there are concerns about the size of the proposed study area. In the initial proposal, the size of the study area was much smaller. He noted the study area now crosses the lake on the Osoyoos side of the park, and comes much further west on the Cawston side of the park. In the north, the study area extends almost to Penticton.

The Band has no objection to a conservation area but the extent of the study area is a concern because it may lead to a larger park than originally proposed.

In the previous *Investment Insights* Article the statement was made - The benefits of international investing remain intact. In this part of the article we will discuss some of these benefits.

"Even after the recent decline, the S&P 500 has still considerably outperformed the S&P/TSX Composite over the past 20 years. Besides, the purpose of diversification is to smooth the overall volatility of a portfolio by investing in a number of holdings that perform independently. Still, it is frustrating to watch the price of your U. S. holdings rise, while, for example, the Canadian dollar equivalent value does not.

During the past year, the price of 3M Co. has ascended from \$64.85 to \$79.06 on the New York Stock Exchange. Unfortunately, the value of 100 shares has only risen from \$10,200 to \$10,445 in Canadian dollars. While the rise of the Canadian dollar relative to the U. S. dollar has been truly remarkable during the past year, it has reminded us of currency risk. Fluctuating exchange rates are also having a significant impact on the earnings and operations of most Canadian and U. S. companies.

In the near term, several companies have currency hedges or natural hedges such as U. S. - denominated debt on their balance sheets, but sooner or later currency risk will begin to impact the bottom line. Whether the effect is positive or negative becomes a function of relative cost structures, end markets and financing obligations. So who wins from Canadian dollar strength relative to the greenback? Unfortunately, in the Canadian equities market far more companies are hurt by a rising loonie relative to those that benefit. Chief Economist & Chief Strategist for CIBC World Markets Jeffrey Rubin warns of a potential earnings collapse in the Canadian manufacturing sector and high risk to resource profits. Meanwhile, telecommunications companies and select financials are positioned to benefit.

One of the clearest beneficiaries of a falling U. S. dollar is the U. S. equity market itself. A weak greenback is a positive catalyst for S&P 500 earnings and the 'almighty' Canadian dollar now buys more than it has in over 10 years. Could be time for a little cross-border shopping" - Craig Basinger, CFA, Retail Strategist.

**Valley-wide survey begins**

Cawston's Melanie Bagley has a huge job ahead of her.

She has been hired by the Similkameen Valley Planning Society to conduct a valley-wide business survey.

In the span of three months, she is to interview every business in the Similkameen Valley between Olalla and Princeton.

"We want it as complete as we can by the middle of April," says Economic Development Officer Michael McLaughlin.

A total of seven people applied for the position of data collection and six of them were interviewed - three from Princeton and three from the Keremeos area.

Bagley, who has a Masters of Science degree in computers, started contacting business owners last thursday and will spend a lot of time on the phone setting up appointments.

McLaughlin will handle some of the workload, but the majority of the contacts will be made by Bagley.

The survey, which takes about 20-minutes to complete, contains a total of 28 questions and eight to ten surveys can be completed daily.

"The goal of the survey is to gather the data for economic planning; to attract investment and providing strategic information for local business," McLaughlin explains.

Businesses producing a product or providing a service will be contacted.

"If you have a business license, we'll find you," says McLaughlin.

Small home-based businesses or non-licensed businesses outside of municipal jurisdictions are requested to contact Bagley for a copy of the survey.

The survey also marks an amazing level of joint coopera-

tion between communities and regional districts in the Valley.

"I think it's quite unique to have seven different jurisdictions working together on such a project," explains Bagley.

All information collected will be kept confidential and once entered into a database, individual businesses will not

be identified.

**Village supports SPCA**

There will be an increase in the Keremeos portion of a Grant in Aid the RDOS provides the SPCA.

The regular grant of \$9,000 from the RDOS costs the Village close to \$125 annually.

The SPCA has requested an increase of their grant to \$25,000 for the 2004 season.

This increase would raise the Keremeos contribution to near \$375 per year.

"Keremeos is in support of granting their request," says CAO Bob Lafleur.

The SPCA grant, which represents only five percent of their operating budget, has not increased in over twenty years.

Donations make up the bal-

ance of the budget for a group that covers an area from Rock Creek to Princeton and from Peachland to the U. S. Border.

Last year, in Keremeos alone, the SPCA answered 314 complaints and took in 1,577 animals which had to be vaccinated, spayed or neutered (if over 6 months old), and fed until they were adopted.

In the past two years, the SPCA grant of \$9,000 was exceeded twice by incidents in the Similkameen Valley.

If the grant in aid is not increased, the SPCA will have no choice but to reduce the level of service it provides throughout the regional district.

**Ultra entries received**

Ultramarathoner Moe "the Eagle" Beaulieu is pleased with the early response to his upcoming events.

To date, there are a total of nine paid entrants - five for the 50km Keremeos Kruncher on May 15th, and three in the 50mile/100mile Eagle Runs planned for July 24th and 25th.

"For a new run, it's rare to get any so early," says Moe.

Organizers are hoping for up to 80 entries in the Keremeos Kruncher and a total of 80 between the two Eagle runs.

The big difference between ultramarathons and a regular

marathon, aside from distance, is that 'ultras' are mostly off-road.

"They are run on as little pavement as possible," Beaulieu explains.

The typical North American ultramarathon formula is to keep the race course 95% on gravel and trails.

The Keremeos Kruncher course contains only a few hundred feet of pavement and the Eagle 50mile/100mile runs will include about 17 miles of pavement.

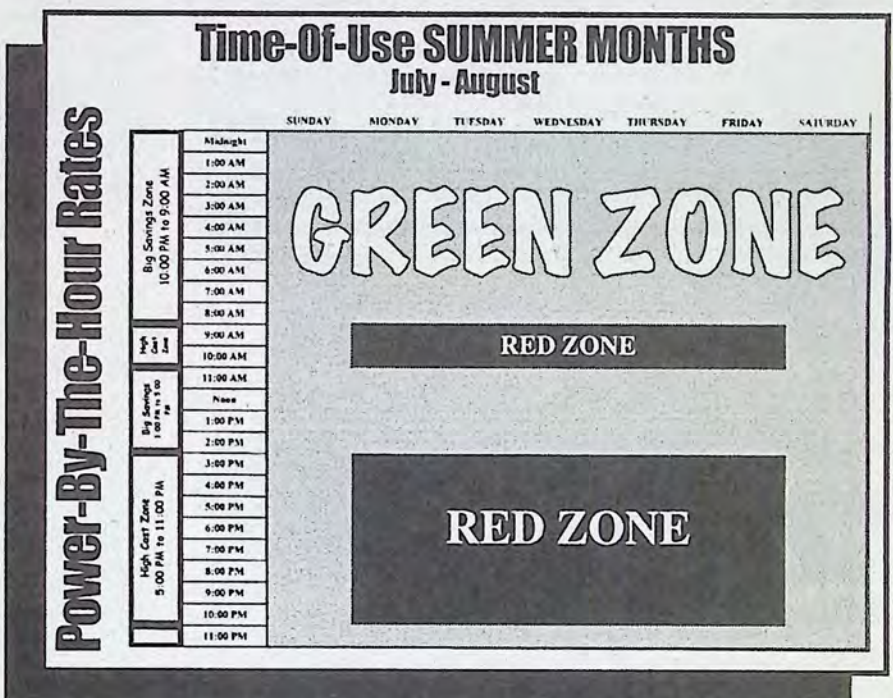
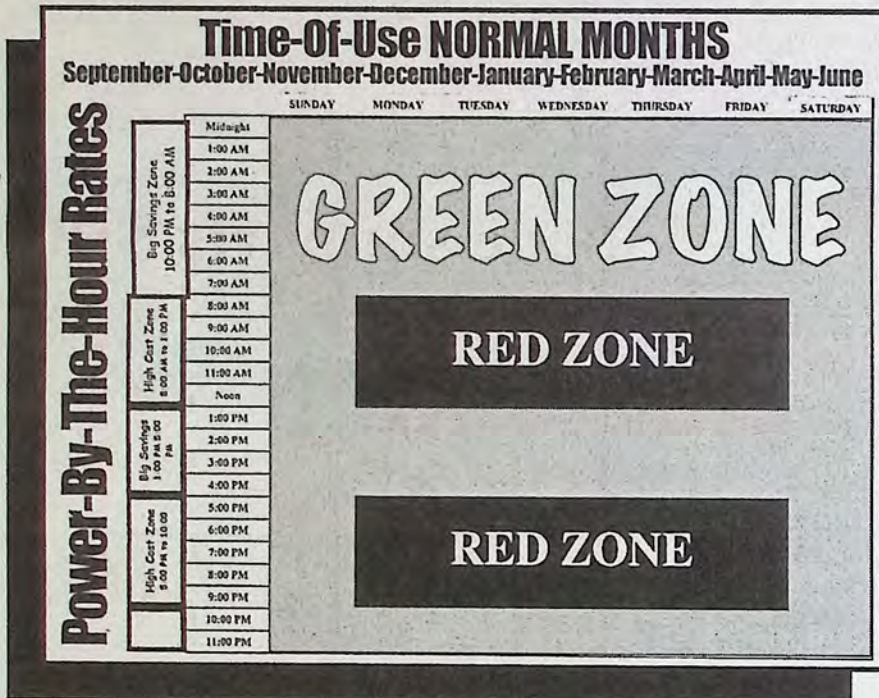

# Tips to help you quit tobacco

Mark Twain said, "Quitting smoking is easy - I've done it a hundred times!" It's the end of National Non-Smoking Week and if you have resolved to stop smoking, that is one of the most significant things you will ever do to improve your health.

Any quit attempt will make you stronger. It is never too late to quit and reap the benefits, some of which occur within the first few days. With the right combination of support and determination, you will be able to quit for good.

Some smokers will find quitting easier than they expected, but for others, they will have to plan carefully for success. Here are some tips to help you along your journey.

1. Write out a pro and con list ... the benefits of quitting and the disadvantages of smoking. Refer to this list often during the process of quitting. Put it in a visible spot.
2. Write out a "quit plan". Include your reasons for quitting, identify situations where you might be tempted and write your strategies to deal with those situations. Use this as a journal and record your progress. Yes, it requires a bit of work but it will keep you focused.
3. Take just one day at a time and celebrate the success of each day.
4. Be sure you have a social network. Have at least one friend you can share your feelings and progress with and you can count on to be there for you.
5. Determine the type of professional support you will need. Quitting cold turkey works for some but most other people have an increased chance of success if they access counselling, group programs or nicotine replacement therapy. You will double your chance of success if you use nicotine replacements like the patch or gum, or if you use medication

like Zyban.

6. Learn about, and prepare yourself, for possible withdrawal symptoms. Don't let the unexpected push you off the track.

7. Okay, you slipped and had a cigarette ..... don't be too hard on yourself. Look at what triggered the lapse and try to figure out how you could handle it differently in the future. Stick to your plan. You have not failed in your attempt to stop smoking.

8. For many people, weight gain is a non-issue. Stick to what you

usually eat, choose low-cal snacks and increase your exercise and physical activity.

9. What about if you absolutely HAVE TO HAVE a cigarette? Try the 4 D's: delay, distract, deep breathing and drink water.

10. If you smoked to handle the stress in your life, look for other ways of coping. Just don't trade one addiction for another.

### Reduce cholesterol naturally

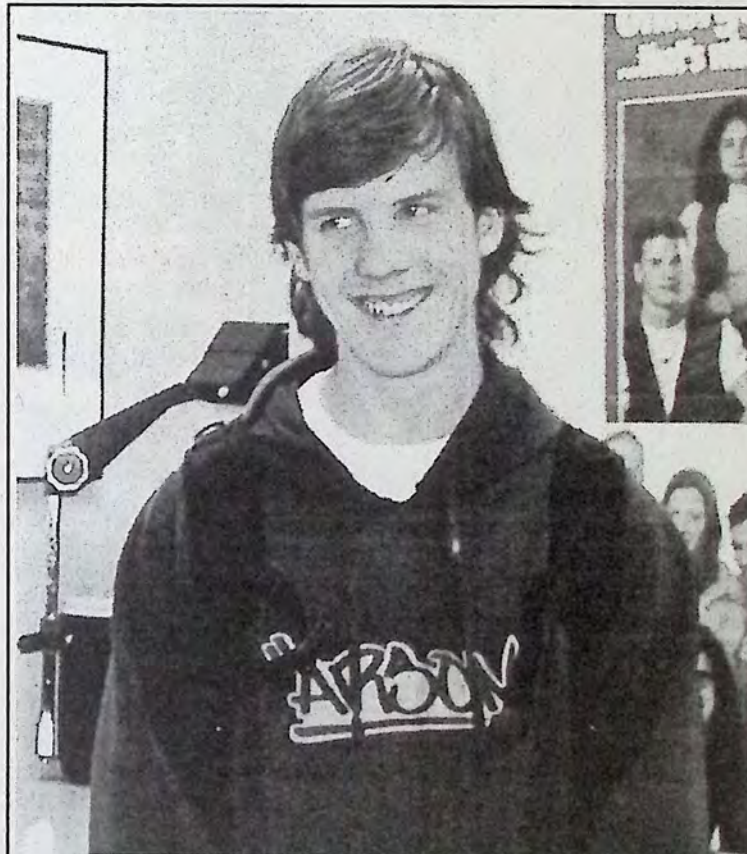

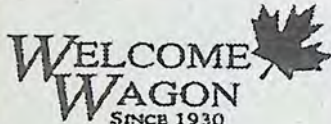

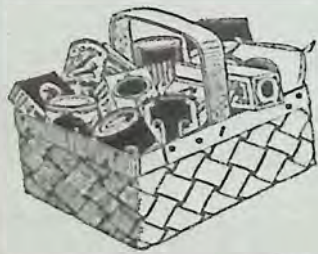

All of us depend on each other for survival to a large extent.

We know it is difficult (sometimes impossible) to survive alone.

When we become highly competitive as a society, it leads to disruption and aggressive behaviour. When we become too aggressive, we go to war. War tears down social structure and makes survival extremely difficult, not only for individuals, but for entire groups.

I wonder how many of our readers feel as I do. Do you find yourself going to the simple sitcoms or the shows on Discovery channel? Do you watch re-runs of the Waltons and Happy Days or All in the Family just to avoid the criminals and the highly competitive survivor show? Even the so-called romance shows glorify being competitive, like these "average joes" who compete for some bimbo's attention.

Do any of the people who create movies and television shows have any clue about working together cooperatively to produce an achievement worth being proud of? The nearest they can get is these shows about remodelling a house. What does that tell us?

## Reduce risk for volunteer directors

The Social Planning and Review Council of B.C. offers some good advice for volunteers who serve on boards of directors. The advice helps volunteers, and their organizations, reduce their risk of liability.

### Before you become a director of a non-profit society

- \* learn the organization's goals, objectives and programs
- \* find out how the community views the organization - what is its reputation?

- \* Find out who is on the Board of Directors, what is the financial condition of the organization, what programs or events does it sponsor, and what staff is hired.

### Directors should:

- \* have a copy of the constitution and by-laws and read them, learn the procedure of meetings as well as the powers and responsibilities of board members and officers.

- \* know the organization's budget and financial situation, and investigate anything that looks suspicious

- \* know who is authorized to sign cheques and in what amount

- \* be sure the organization is fulfilling all requirements of its non-profit and/or tax exempt status

- \* if the organization has employees, make sure all payroll deductions are being made, and WCB is being paid. If EI, income tax, CPP are not paid, a director could be personally liable for those amounts.

- \* be sure the organization's books are audited by a reputable firm or person.

- \* insist that nominating committee and membership procedures are followed as written in the constitution

- \* attend all meetings of the board
- \* make sure you understand any issue and its consequences before voting.

- \* if you have the slightest conflict of interest on any issue, disclose it and abstain from voting on it, and have the secretary record in the minutes that you abstained.

- \* review the minutes of every meeting to ensure they are correct, and if there is a motion made which is improperly

recorded, make sure the motion is corrected.

- \* Board members should have copies of documents and reports prior to the meetings to review them before the meeting.

- \* insist that all committee meetings are reported at board meetings, preferably in written form.

- \* make sure policies are clearly defined and followed by every person on the board

- \* Make sure your Executive Committee does not exceed its authority

- \* vote against any expenditure which is not covered by money in the bank

- \* if you vote against a motion, be sure to have it recorded in the minutes.

- \* keep the minutes in a binder or file for easy reference

- \* insist the board seek advice from professionals (in writing) on any project or issue or activity in which liability may be a concern

- \* evaluate the performance of

your executive on a regular basis.

### Who could sue?

When organizations are sued, it is usually by an employee who was not paid, or by Revenue Canada for unpaid remittances to the federal government. Following this are failure to enforce regulations (labour, health), wrongful acts or acts of negligence, and discrimination against an employee or wrongful dismissal. Conflict of interest suits arise when a board member has directly profited from a deal made with the board and has voted on the decision. Conflict of interest rules apply to all levels of government and are rarely applied to non-profit organizations.

Most organizations avoid risk by keeping good books, remaining solvent, paying their bills, and following the rule "honesty is the best policy". If all business is conducted openly and honestly, the chances of being sued are negligible.

## Party re-appoints Day

Stockwell Day Member of Parliament for Okanagan-Coquihalla, confirmed today that, once again, he has been appointed Senior Critic for Foreign Affairs for Canada's Official Opposition in the House of Commons. The Conservative Party of Canada made the announcement today as it released the list of the new Party's Shadow Cabinet, under interim leader Grant Hill.

Day said, "For the past year and a half, I've been fighting for Canada's national interest as the Official Opposition Foreign Affairs Critic. I'm also pleased the position has allowed me to profile the Okanagan-Coquihalla region on the national and international stage. Another group of ambassadors will be here in May to see first-hand what our area has to offer."

Day remains concerned that our country is still suffering from a diminished influence internationally because of the federal Liberal government's utter inconsistency in foreign affair matters. Day observed that delays in resolving the softwood lumber crisis and mad cow crisis are symbolic of the federal government's influence.

"The federal Liberals' soft power approach continues to guide Paul Martin and Foreign Affairs Minister Bill Graham to the detriment of the country's security and our place in the world," Day concluded.

## Items that WILL NOT BE picked up are:

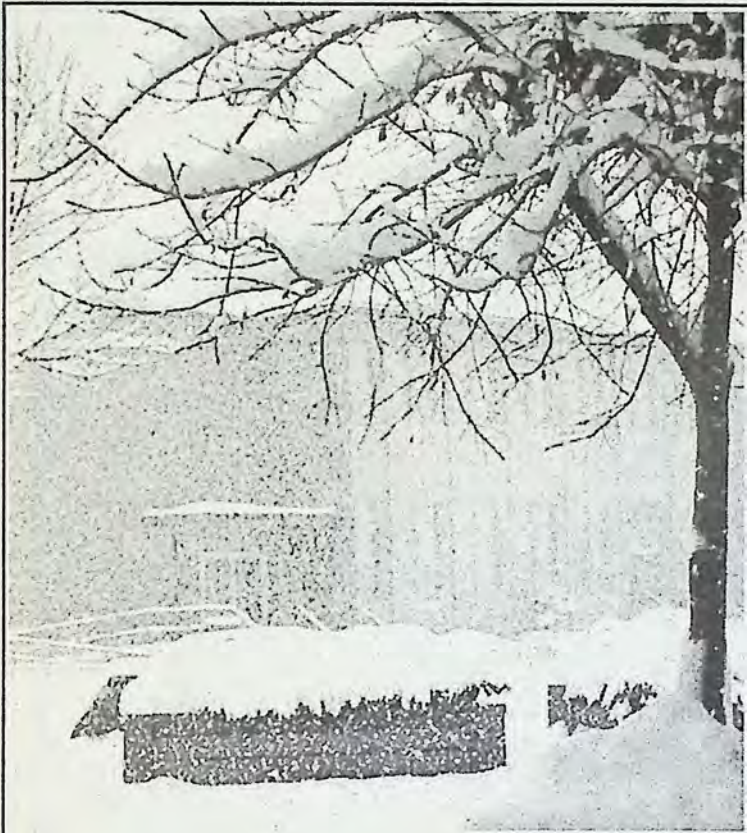
- glass jars, bottles
