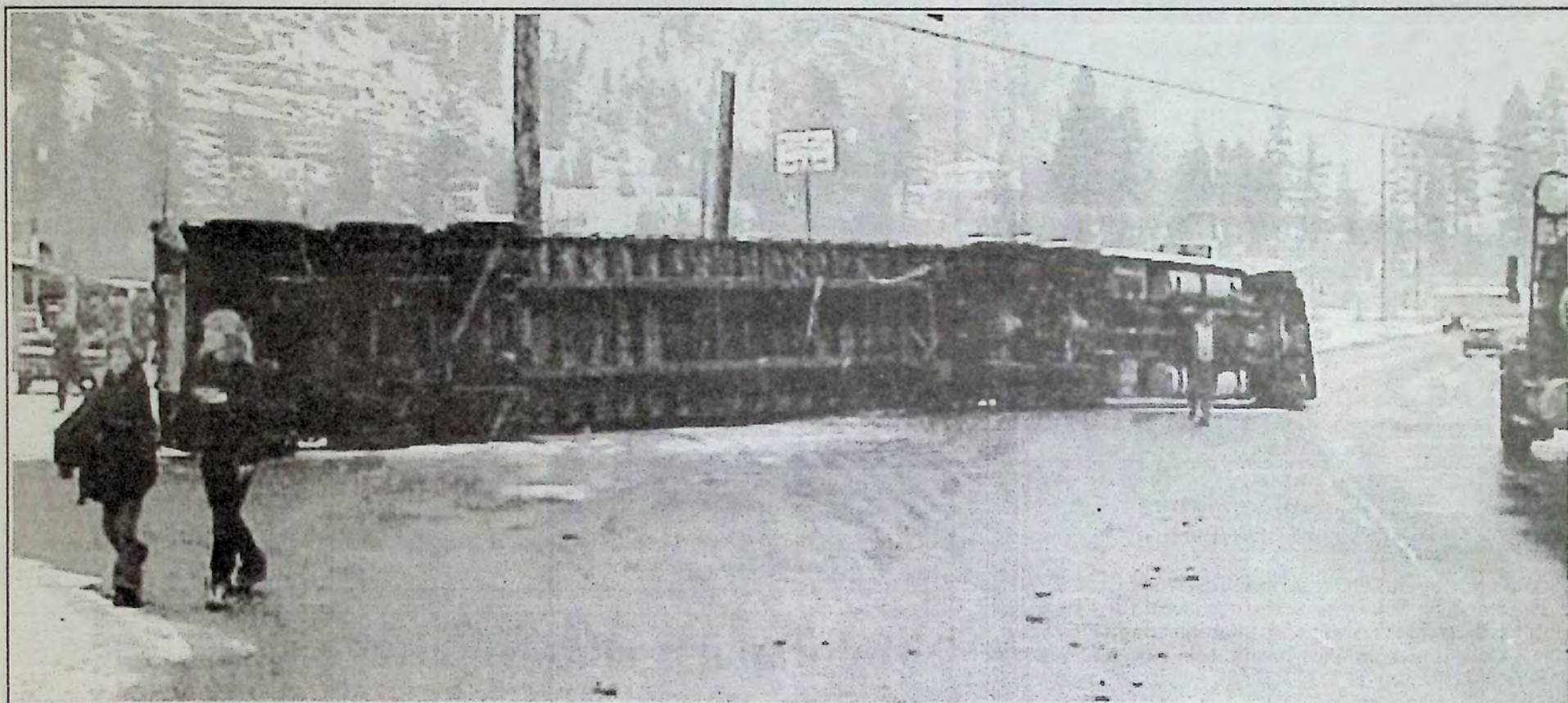

## Crash turns snow purple

*Some residents laughed, others saw potential hazards*

Hedley parents are warning their children, "Don't eat the purple snow!"

The purple snow came from spillage of either wine or grape juice from an overturned tractor trailer unit.

At approximately 12:20 p.m. on February 3, the unit failed to negotiate the curve going through the village of Hedley and overturned in the Hedley Flea Market area, blocking both Highway 3 and one of the two major accesses to Hedley. Traffic had to be diverted through Upper Similkameen Indian Reserve, then through Hedley, and out the street nearest the bridge.

There was extensive damage to the truck, but there were no serious injuries. The truck driver was transported to Princeton General Hospital for treatment of injuries that were not life-threatening.

RCMP state speed appears to have been a factor in the crash. The 50 year old driver from Maple Ridge has been charged with various offenses under the Motor Vehicle Act.

Parents in Hedley have another concern - this is not the first time this kind of accident has occurred. They say too many vehicles fail to reduce speed to the posted 50 kmph. They point to the fact the children were in

the school playground only 50 metres from the crash site, and had the truck gone out of control a bit further west, it would have gone into a playground filled with children on their noon hour break.

On a lighter note, the school children had an unauthorized "field trip" after the crash as they went to view the crash scene.

One Hedley person said the crash turned into a community event as half the village population attended the scene.

### RCMP seek car thief and vandal

In the early morning hours of January 31, a car was stolen from in front of a residence on Kenley Avenue in Princeton, and then was crashed into a nearby fence. Prior to police attending, the vehicle departed, but was located later 12 km. east of Princeton in a ditch along Highway 3. The occupants had fled. The suspect is described as a Caucasian man, 5'10", who was wearing a white baseball cap, jeans and black and white jacket.

RCMP seek a vandal who put a rock through the window of Princeton Funeral Home in the early morning of January 31.

## Lozinski reports to Council on crime

RCMP Sgt. Kurt Lozinski reported to Town Council his officers have a heavy caseload. In 2003, 100 more files were opened than in 2002. There were 22 drug search warrants issued and executed in 2003, an increase of 17 warrants over those executed in 2002.

There were 86 more motor vehicle accidents in 2003 than in 2002, but fewer fatalities. Sgt. Lozinski told Council few local people were involved in the 335 accidents Princeton Detachment dealt with last year. He said most of the accidents are caused by excess speed, and by Lower Mainland people who do not know how to drive

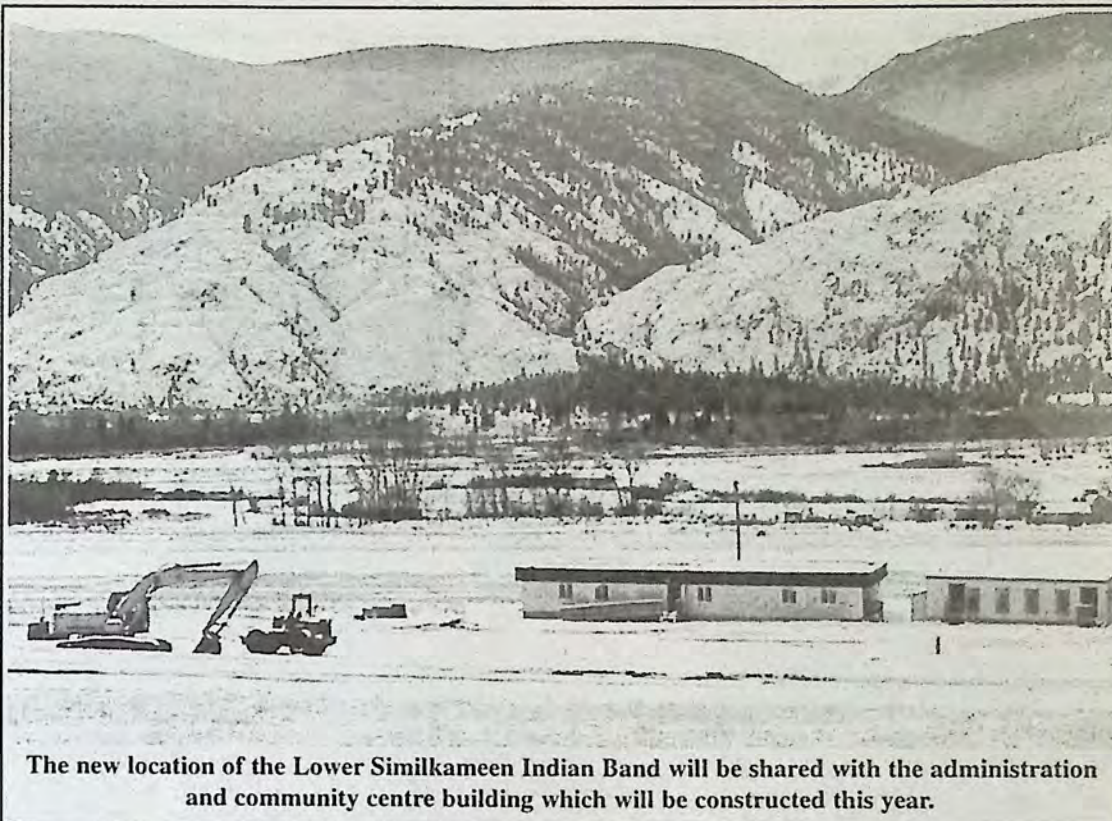

## Survey interests business owners

A total of 86 businesses have completed the Similkameen Valley Business Survey.

The survey, conducted by Melanie Bagley and EDO Michael McLaughlin, on behalf of the Similkameen Valley Planning Society, will gather important data on business interests throughout the Valley.

Most downtown business owners in Keremeos have been interviewed as well as a few Cawston area businesses and farms.

Outlying Keremeos area businesses and farms will be surveyed this week, followed by businesses in and around Princeton.

Bagley says the project has been well received.

"I'm very pleased with how helpful people are being," she says.

"There are a lot of very good suggestions being made and people are very positive about living in the Similkameen Valley."

A theme running through the interviews appears to be the desire to see more businesses coming to the area to provide jobs for local people.

"This point almost always has the proviso on it that any business should enhance rather than detract from the quality of the Valley."

Bagley says there are also plans in place to possibly use some of the data collected as the framework for a Similkameen Valley Business Directory.

"Small businesses would benefit from getting in touch with me."

Bagley says the directory would be a very useful tool in the marketing of smaller, home-based operations.

"It would help businesses in letting people know they're around and hopefully they would get more customers from the exposure."

The business listing format has

not been decided, but would likely be similar to most other directories listing business names, contact names and phone numbers.

## LSIB plans centre

Chopaka Reserve will become the nerve center of Lower Similkameen Indian Band. Construction is expected to begin this year on a combination administrative building, community hall and health centre.

The school buildings were moved to the site for January.

The site, located on the "red barn" property, was chosen because it is the most central section of the reserve with land available for development.

The reserve community has wanted a community hall for a long time, says project capital manager Karen Terbasket. Making use of resources available to them fulfills part of the community's goals of having something that belongs to the community.

The project has been in the planning stage since 2001. There have been a number of meetings inviting public input and many people wrote their suggestions to be delivered to the planning committee.

## France sets strict standards for organic farms

The Similkameen Valley is home to a lot of organic farmers who take justifiable pride in their produce. They have rules to follow to be certified, and they would find a lot in common with French organic farmers. France has the strictest standards of any European country when it comes to organic farming.

Organic farming is on the increase in France, growing by 15 percent annually, and comprising slightly over 1.5 percent of all farm production.

What is different in France from in our area is the conversion of livestock and field crop producers to strictly organic production. Livestock producers made the transition quickly as they have adequate natural fertilizer to spread on pastures. In France, livestock is pastured year-round.

To go organic in France, farmers must use nothing but natur-

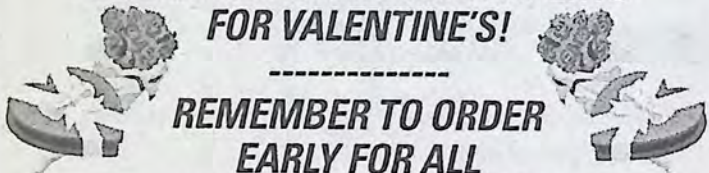
al fertilizers (no chemical compounds) and must go through a two to three year period of following all of the rules before they are eligible for the designation as an "organic" farm.

For many farmers, this is a big investment of time and energy but it does pay off in the long run. Organic produce marketing is easy in France, as a lot of the consumers go to the farm, or the food warehouses go to the producer. The products, while slightly more expensive to consumers than non-organic products, sell well without a lot of promotion. In some areas, producers of organic foods join forces for a special market day and advertise the date in surrounding towns. These markets attract all the customers they need.

There is a National Organic Farming Federation (Federation Nationale de Agriculture Biologique de France).

# Interior Health Surgical Review

Interior Health has received the Surgical Services Review Report commissioned last spring. There is increasing demand on surgical time and resources throughout Interior Health. IH is committed to providing excellent surgical care for patients with equal access no matter where in the health authority a person lives or who their physician is.

IH wants to move toward an integrated system of surgical services rather than isolated site surgical programs. In this integrated system, patient's individual needs are what drive the system and access to surgical care is based on equitable access to the best service.

The recommendations of the IH Surgical Services Review are both site specific and general to Interior Health region. All findings will be assessed against the findings of the updated IH Acute Care Role Review.

Some of the key recommendations are:

1. Create a single surgical system for IH, moving to a perspective of how available resources can be used to treat as many patients as possible.

2. Create a system where patients with similar clinical conditions are treated in a similar manner, regardless of surgeon, anaesthetist, hospital or Health Service Area.

3. Work within the updated Acute Care Role Review to clearly define the role of each surgical site: in other words, determine which site performs what type of surgery.

4. Set up a physician/health care provider driven IH wide Surgical Council to ensure a well-coordinated and communicated approach to Surgical Services Redesign in IH.

5. Create a standard IH-wide wait list with standard classification, monitoring and transfer all responsibility for updating wait list information from surgeons offices to scheduling office.

6. Implement a common block OR scheduling system at all sites, allow any IH surgeon to have access to any IH OR, surgeons/anaesthetists to determine allocation based on set criteria.

7. Implement a minimum annual

number of surgical cases for all sites, to be checked against IH Acute Care Role Review, BC Reproductive Care recommendations for obstetrics, Provincial Surgical Review (IH is discussing surgical outreach and day surgery program maintenance or expansion with rural communities).

8. Develop a plan to decant appropriate volume out of Kelowna General Hospital to allow access to critical services.  
9. Review physician manpower plan to ensure recruitment is adequate.

## Living Past 100

## Plan your own garden

When we talk about good health and eating a healthy diet, we should talk about home-grown food.

There are lots of advantages to growing your own food. The first and most important advantage is high quality. Eating food fresh from your garden ensures the highest nutritional content. Produce that sits on shelves in the grocery store are still good but not as healthy, as nutrition is lost as the picked vegetables or fruit age.

The second advantage of growing your own food is the exercise you get in the sunshine, which is good for your bones. The best way to absorb calcium is to exercise in the sunshine. Gardening is excellent exercise, requiring many different motions which increase flexibility, and because it is hard work, you exercise your heart, lungs and muscles, building strength.

You may think there is not much you can grow where you live, but anybody can grow things in pots. Lettuce, green onions and radishes make a good salad and are easy to grow. You could start growing them indoors in pots, using seeds and onion sets.

Many people do not think about the fresh fruit they can grow in their own gardens, but strawberries, raspberries and rhubarb do not take up much space. Ever-bearing strawberries can be grown in strawberry pots or old tires filled with soil. Raspberries can fit along the wall under the eaves (and every rainfall waters them!). Rhubarb likes a deep tub with plenty of manure in the bottom layer of soil.

You can grow a lot of vegetables without much effort: carrots, beets, cabbage, potatoes, turnips and spinach require little knowledge and minimal care (other than keeping out the deer).

If you are going to plant a garden, now is the time to plan how big it will be, where it will be and what you will grow.



## Reading for pleasure equals Assets

by Nadine McEwen, Asset Development Coordinator

Jim Trelease, author of a number of books about reading, once said, "If you hook a child with reading, you influence not only that child's future but also that of the next generation."

Reading is a basic skill that is the cornerstone for a child's success in school and throughout life. Reading is one of the greatest assets any of us can have.

While we understand the importance of literacy, why is it important for young people – in fact, all people – to read for pleasure? Reading for fun teaches young people how to become strategic, skilled readers. When researchers DL Forest and TG Wallace asked third and sixth graders to read two stories, one for pleasure and one for a test, they found skilled readers read the two stories differently. They remembered more of the story read for the test than the unskilled readers.

What was the difference? Skilled readers know there are different reasons for reading. They know they must change the way they read

depending on the circumstances. For example, skilled readers know that reading for pleasure does not require an understanding of all of the details, whereas reading for a test may.

Skilled readers are more likely to ask questions, go to a dictionary for words they do not know and take notes on what they are reading. Skilled readers are more apt to say reading is fun.

According to the Search Institute, those who have the reading asset in their lives read for pleasure three or more hours per week. How can you encourage your child and each family member to take the time to read for pleasure? Turn off the TV, computer and phone half an hour before bedtime and set that time aside for reading. Read together with your younger child, or even read a challenging book with your older child or teen. Discuss the book with them. Visit Princeton Library once a week together. Encourage everyone to read something – the newspaper, a magazine, book, cartoons or comics.

Create a book of the month club

within your family or group of your child's friends. Host an end of the month book club party to discuss the book. Give rewards such as movie passes, gift certificates to book stores, or simply offer a treat when family members read 10, 20, 50 or even 100 books during a year. Make reading fun and everyone will benefit from this most important asset.

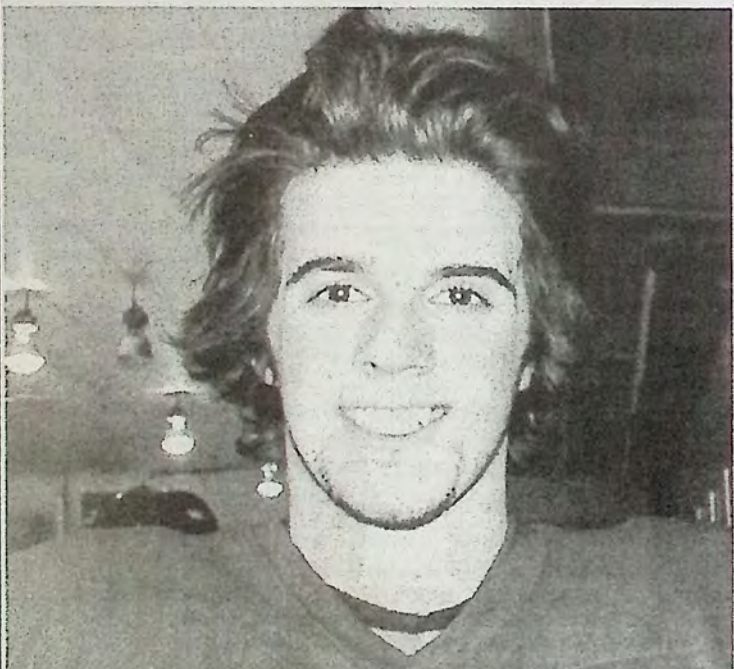

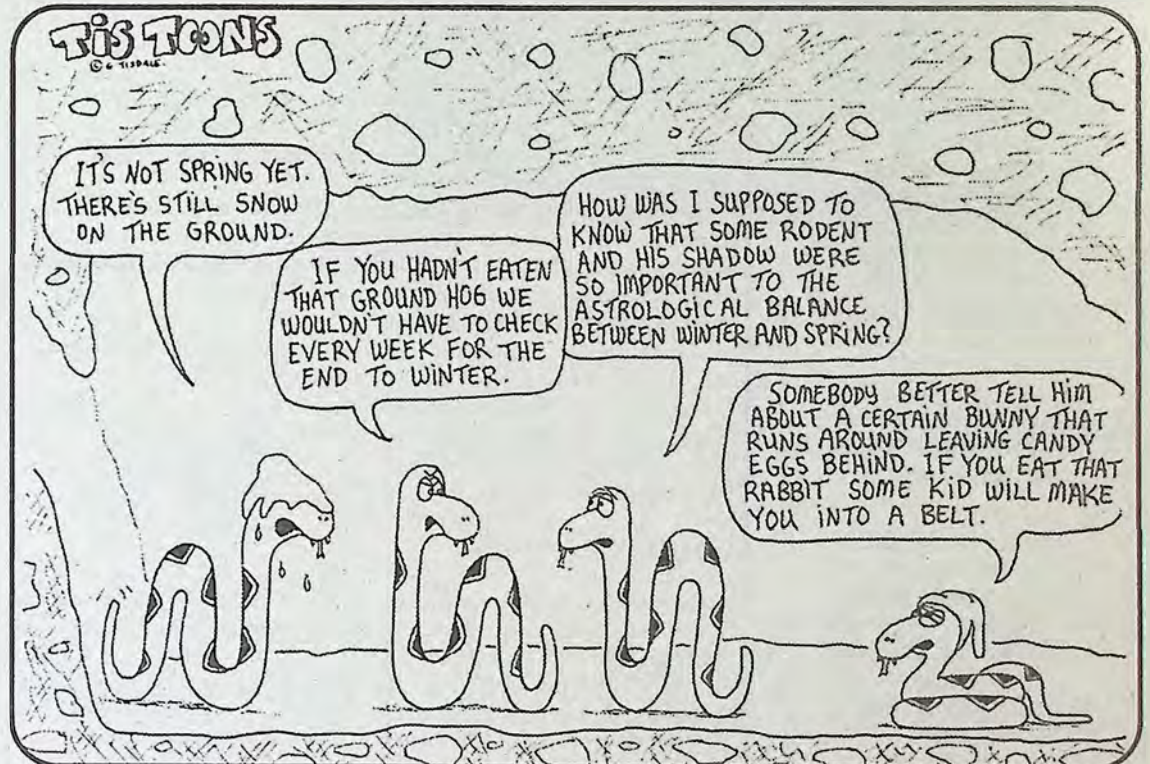

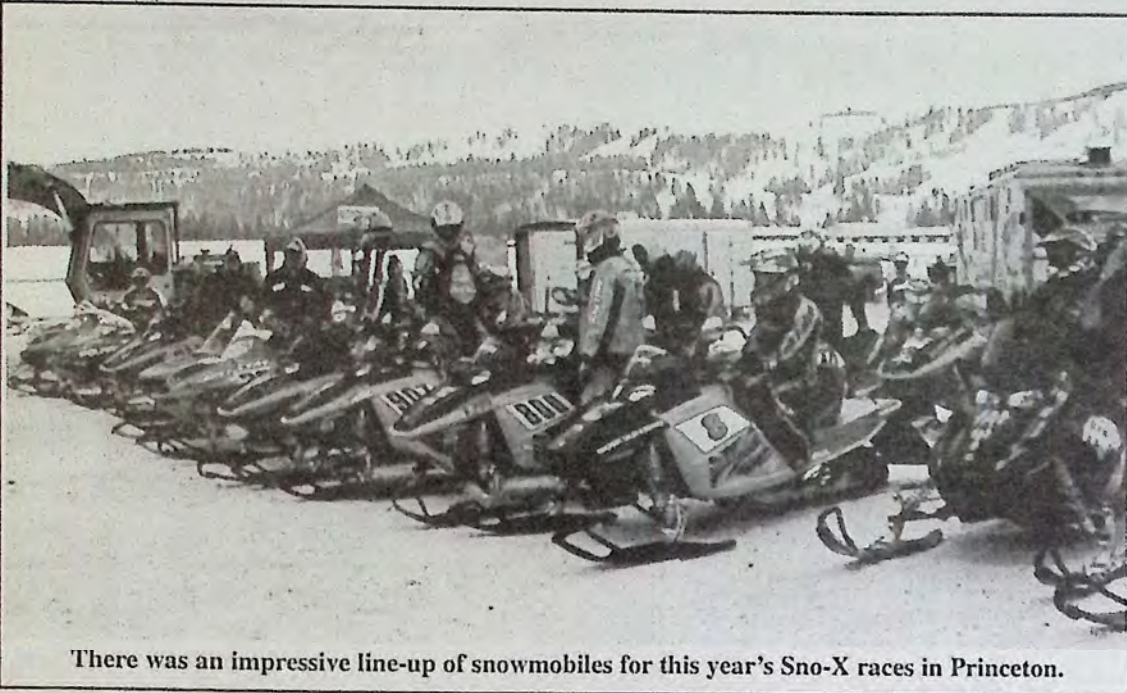

## Chutter briefs forestry students

Yale-Lillooet MLA Dave Chutter told forestry students at Nicola Valley Institute of Technology last week that recently implemented forest policy changes are critical to the long-term viability of BC's number one industry.

The Forest and Range Practices Act came into effect on January 31 and changes the structure of how forests are regulated. The changes reduce red tape and increase maximum penalties. In view of the current softwood lumber dispute, Chutter said it is important BC wood producers find other markets to sell their products.

When those opportunities present themselves, he said it is important all stakeholders are able to capitalize. For this reason, the government is taking back 20 percent of long-term timber licences and redistributing those timber rights.
