## Jarvis promotes Princeton airport use

Princeton airport will have a watchdog committee put together by Councillor Ray Jarvis. The committee includes two members of Town Council and two pilots.

Councillor Jarvis presented his plan to Town Council at the February 2 meeting. Councillor Jarvis stated, "As none of us on Council fly planes, it is only right that we have input towards the airport from people who have that knowledge, namely, the pilots."

Councillor Jarvis wants the airport listed on internet, just as other towns do, listing services available and an airport phone number. This number would connect to a cell phone carried by a member of the Airport Committee.

A proper toilet at the airport will be provided to the pilots and passengers with a portable unit.

## Judge sends thief to jail

On October 11, 2003, a man entered Vermilion Court on the pretext of being a maintenance person. After distracting the tenants of two of the apartments, he stole from them.

Following an investigation involving various RCMP Detachments and the Port Moody Police Service, Joseph Marcel Hebert of Surrey, B.C. was charged with two counts of break and enter as a result of his activities in Princeton.

On February 5, 2004, Hebert appeared in Provincial Court in Coquitlam to plead guilty. He was sentenced to 34 months in jail.

Councillor Jarvis would like to see fuel available for pilots.

In rebuttal to complaints that only five pilots use the local airport, Councillor Jarvis said he had identified 130 landings at Princeton airport up to December 2003, and in January, landings were made by pilots from outside the Princeton area, including one from Lethbridge, Alberta.

A list of local motels and their phone numbers is now posted at the airport. Owners of these

motels will arrange to pick up pilots and passengers free of charge.

Councillor Jarvis suggested a Princeton Fly-in Day at the airport. Pilots would be invited to visit Princeton's airport and enjoy hot dogs, doughnuts and coffee. If they wish to visit downtown, they would be taken by a host group. This day would help spread the word the airport is open and provide pilots with information about future plans for the airport.

## Day calls waste "shameful"

Stockwell Day, MP, Okanagan Coquihalla, expressed his outrage in the House of Commons last week regarding what he says will go down in our history as one of the worst financial disgraces ever perpetrated by a Canadian government. He was referring to the mess known as the Liberal Sponsorship scandal. In his statement and later in his speech, Day told the House of Commons about some of the groups in his constituency who would have loved to have had some of the lost quarter of a billion dollar action.

"Community groups in Merritt, Princeton and Keremeos are still desperately waiting for softwood lumber compensation, which the federal Liberals promised," Day said.

He went on to note that in Westbank and Naramata, they face urgent infrastructure needs, which just a fraction of those wasted Liberal funds would have satisfied. He added the need in Okanagan Falls and

Kaleden for more policing resources, and federal money needed in Penticton.

Day noted the focus is rightly on the Prime Minister, who presided over the whole "shameful affair" while he was Finance Minister.

"To say he had no idea of what was happening is to stretch all bounds of credibility," Day said.

# Board closes Riverside

## Student numbers drop

After two months of discussion and speculation, on February 11 School Trustees voted to close Riverside Intermediate School. Trustee Dina Slowikowski-Campbell gave the single dissenting vote.

The library of Princeton Secondary School was full to capacity for the special school board meeting. The public knew the decision would be made that evening, and some people left abruptly after the vote was taken.

In casting his vote, Trustee Ken Heuser said, he did so "with a heavy heart".

Before the vote was taken, each trustee had an opportunity to speak. Board Chair Gordon Comeau talked about "phenomenal declining enrollment" saying, "Our schools are half empty."

He added there would be a million dollar shortfall in the district bud-

get next year unless measures were taken now to avoid financial distress.

School districts are financed through an allocation of dollars per student. As enrollment declines, the provincial government allocates less money.

Trustee Dina Slowikowski-Campbell said she would not approve closing Riverside this year. She wanted to delay the decision one year.

"Closing a school in a small town is a really big thing," she began.

She noted that a lot of people in the community had not had an opportunity for input. She suggested there may be an opportunity to find an alternative.

"If we close the school now, we may never open it," Slowikowski-Campbell stated.

Closing Riverside would net the

## School Board begins 2004/05 budget process

School District #58 Board of Trustees invites the public to attend a budget planning session at Princeton Secondary School Library on February 17 at 6:30 p.m. Members of school PAC's, teacher and support staff unions, and administrators will participate in the process of planning the 2004/05 budget.

Representatives of stakeholder groups or members of the public will also have the opportunity to make a private presentation to the Finance Committee. To do so, contact Secretary-Treasurer Bruce Tisdale at 250-315-1105 to arrange a meeting. The presentation should be supported by a written submission which should be provided to the Secretary-Treasurer in advance.

The February 17 meeting will be followed by a meeting in Merritt for all school district representatives to identify priorities and concerns and set the framework for the budget. This will be taken back to respective groups for further discussion.

On March 23, a follow-up meeting will be held in Princeton with all of the representative

groups from the March 2 meeting. This meeting will be at the School Board room beginning at 6:30 p.m. The Board will pay mileage for representatives who must travel to the meetings.

A draft summary will be presented to the Board on April 13, and the final budget will be presented to the public at the regular School Board meeting on May 5.

## Judge orders jail at home

Bradley Nelson pled guilty in Provincial Court in Princeton on February 12 to an assault causing bodily harm. On October 4, 2003, in the early morning hours, he had struck a woman whose home he was visiting and broke her front teeth. He was arrested and placed under a no contact order.

Judge G. Sinclair ordered Nelson to serve three months for the assault and one month for breach

of the no contact order. The sentence will be served in Nelson's home under electronic monitoring. He has a curfew and a number of conditions... no liquor, no illicit drugs and no weapons. In addition, he must attend assessment and counselling as directed. Following his home jail sentence, Nelson must serve an additional one year on probation, and pay the dental bills of his victim.

## PXA raises barn rental rates

The cost of power to the large indoor arena at Princeton Fairgrounds was discussed at tuesday nights meeting of the PXA.

Current rental rates are set at \$30 for a stall per month, which Princeton Exhibition Association members learned barely covers costs during winter months.

A suggestion of implementing winter and summer rates was accepted.

Winter rates will be \$40 per stall on a monthly basis and summer rates will be the regular \$30 per stall rate.

In order to give proper notice to

all users of the indoor arena, the winter rates will not go into effect until October 1st, 2004.

Summer rates will be in place effective April 1, 2005.

PXA members felt the seasonal rates would help cover costs of power, the delivery of shavings, clean-up and general maintenance of the indoor arena.

Drop-in users will be charged a new rate of \$10 per day, with the option of paying \$30 for monthly access.

Those fees, which go into effect immediately, will be collected in a donation box on the honour system.

## RCMP bust Burton grow op

Following an extensive investigation, Princeton RCMP were successful in obtaining a search warrant for a residence on Burton Avenue in Princeton. RCMP executed the warrant on Wednesday, February 11, 2004.

RCMP seized forty marijuana plants in various stages of growth. A 26 year old female and a 27 year old male face charges of production of marijuana as well as possession of marijuana. They are scheduled to appear in court in Princeton on June 10.

## Access Centre marks second anniversary

On February 15, 2002, the Employment Access Centre in Keremeos opened its doors. The project was one spearheaded by Similkameen Country, who received funding in January that year. The former Village Office premises was renovated, and computers were brought in. Katimavik helped with painting and laying carpets and floor tiles, and all of the other work that needed to be done in the six weeks before opening. The opening day celebration forecast the success the project would become.

After two years of operation, Ken Randle and Lisa Fraser can look back on a lot of successes. They have between 350-400 visits per month in the slow winter season, and 700-900 in the busy months. They have helped people find good jobs both outside the area and within the area. Employers have become accustomed to phoning the Employment Access Centre to ask them to post jobs on their board, and local people seeking work drop in frequently to check out the job board. Unlike most government-run employment centres, at the Keremeos Employment Access Centre, people sign on as members. During the past two years, 1272 members have signed on.

"It's been interesting to see the variety of members," Ken Randle told the News Leader. "We have members from school kids looking for their first job or people in their fifties and sixties not ready to retire and looking for something to do."

There are new members every month. Ken and Lisa help them in any way they can, from teaching them how to use computers to listening to the goals people set and offering advice on how to achieve those goals.

It is located on Upper Bench Road in Keremeos, and there are signs on the highway directing visitors to the site.

**Q: Can I transfer my RRSP to an RESP for my child?**  
**A:** No, you cannot directly transfer an RRSP to an RESP. You must first deregister the RRSP, which is added to your earned income for the year. Hence you are taxed on the proceeds. You may then contribute the proceeds to an RESP, but there is no deduction for a contribution to an RESP. We do not recommend this.

**Q: If we have limited money to invest, approximately \$4000, which should we choose, an RRSP or an RESP?**  
**A:** We suggest putting the full amount into an RRSP. If we assume that you are in a 45% marginal tax rate, a tax refund of \$1800 is generated from your RRSP contribution of \$4000. You may then apply this refund to an RESP.

Folic acid deficiency has symptoms - fatigue, sore tongue, pallor, weight loss, tingling sensations, back pain, poor digestion, irritability and depression.

If you are over age 60, you may suddenly identify a few of these symptoms in yourself. You are probably correct in assuming you may have folic acid deficiency, because many older people have this problem, not due to alcohol consumption, but due to over-cooked foods, some medications, or decreased ability to absorb folic acid. Vegetarians tend to suffer in later years from folic acid deficiency. The result is anemia and all of the symptoms.

Folic acid is essential for proper functioning of the brain and nervous system. The best sources are fresh, raw fruits and vegetables, and meat.

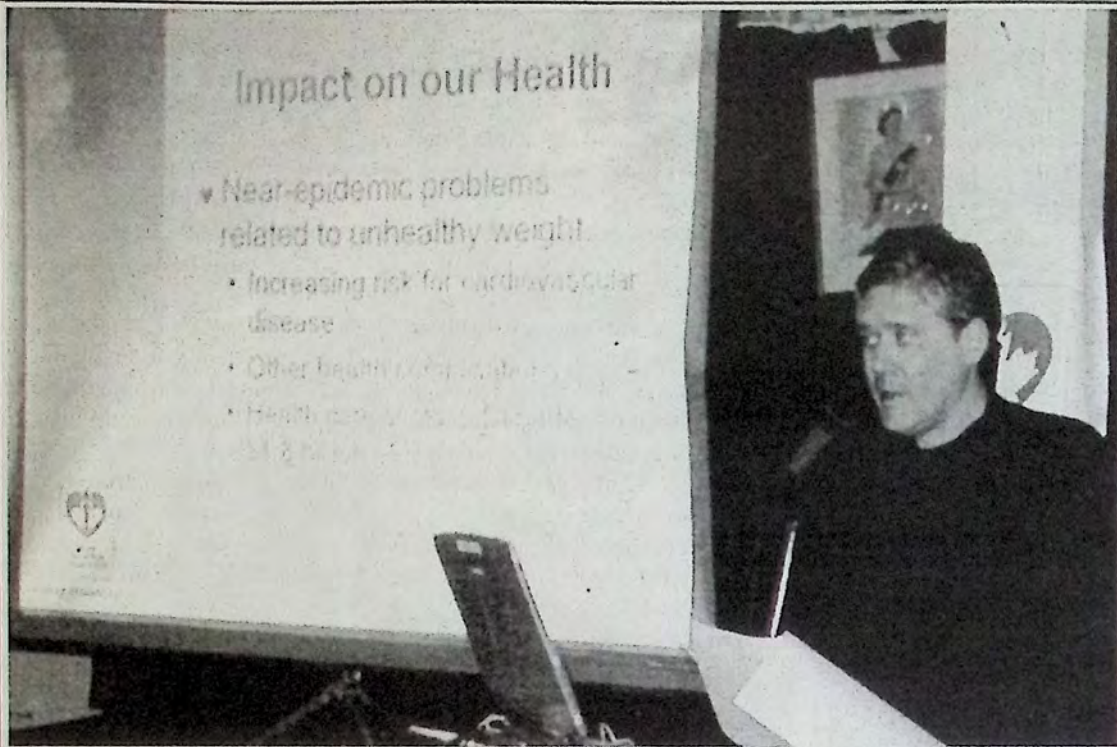
Food rich in folic acid are: brewer's yeast, chick peas, orange juice, spinach, beets, broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, pinto beans, romaine lettuce. Also good are asparagus, banana, pearl barley, brussels sprouts, carrots, egg white, grapefruit, green beans, kale, lima beans, peas, potato and tomato.

The fresher the food, the better the nutrition. If possible, eat it raw. If it must be cooked, do not overcook.

Maria Sadegur welcomed a good crowd to the 16th annual Heart Fund dinner at the Legion Hall on February 14. She advised everyone to watch for the arrival of Doug Ricketts, who undertook a 67 km. walk to raise money for the Heart Fund. Doug left home at 3:00 a.m. and completed his walk at 5:00 p.m., raising \$1,637 plus another \$100 donated at the dinner. Doug arrived shortly, receiving a great round of applause. Sadegur read a message from Ian and Rita Ricketts (son and daughter-in-law) congratulating him on his achievement.

Following the turkey dinner, Mayor Keith Olsen thanked Maria Sadegur for her ongoing work for the Heart & Stroke Foundation, and thanked the volunteer canvassers for the work they do each year to raise money for the Foundation.

The Royal Canadian Legion donates the hall for the dinner, and the Legion Ladies Auxiliary and Legion members prepared and served the dinner, and did clean-up. Sadegur thanked them.

Legion President John Haayer thanked the canvassers for their efforts and suggested a \$500 dona-

tion might be coming from the Legion.

Diana Barker, area coordinator for the Okanagan-Kootenay, told the audience she loves coming to Princeton, and thanked the volunteers, saying they are "the heart of the Foundation." She added that Princeton area donated a total of \$9,000 toward heart and stroke research last year. The Foundation funds 74 percent of all heart and stroke research in Canada and has helped reduce heart and stroke deaths by 50 percent.

Guest speaker was Tom Gies, manager of marketing and communications for the Foundation in B.C. and Yukon. He gave a talk on his personal experience with heart problems and the corrective surgery he had undergone. He spoke of the support he had received from people at the Foundation office in Vancouver, and how he later came to work for the Foundation.

The main topic for his power point presentation is the need for Canadians to lose weight. He said 4,000 Canadians die each year from the effects of excess weight and stated research has shown obesity can shorten life by 10

years. Statistics show 47 percent of Canadians are overweight and 15 percent of those are obese. In children, 35 percent are overweight. B.C. residents had a better record than people from the prairies and Ontario. Gies said Canadians must make healthier food choices and engage in more physical activity.

We need to show our appreciation to the players, coaches and volunteers and in doing so we also send the message to the rest of the community - and anyone visiting Princeton - we are winners.

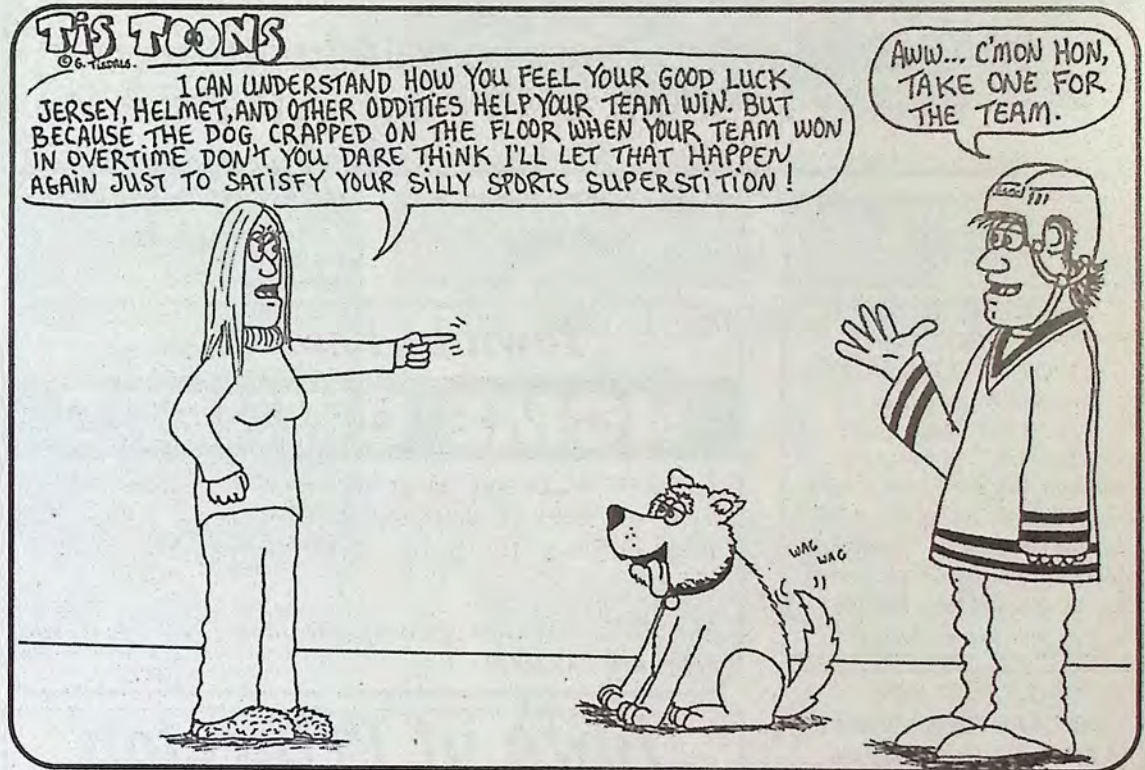
For many years it appeared the negative and 'bad' part of Princeton was all outsiders knew about our home.

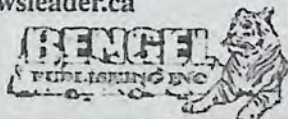

## Moscow bombing hits close to home

When you see some of the terrible disasters and terrorist attacks on television, you never know who might be involved. In the case of the Chechen subway bombing in Moscow on February 6, where 39 were killed and 130 injured, a grandmother in Princeton was grateful the life of her grandson was spared.

Beryl Taylor, a longtime resident of Princeton, raised her daughter, Carolyn, here. Carolyn met and married Peter Belicic in Princeton, and they gave Beryl a grandson, Michael. Today, Michael Belicic is a long way from Princeton. He teaches English at two of the universities in Moscow.

On the morning of February 6, Michael Belicic changed his routine. Ordinarily, he would have taken the early subway train, but that day, he was teaching a later class. His girlfriend, Anya, usually took the early train, too, but that day, she was 15 minutes late. Both would ordinarily have taken the train that was bombed!

closed for the same reason Tulameen Elementary was closed: not enough students. The provincial government funds education according to the number of students.

There is an underlying problem we need to face. The absence of economic development, leading to the absence of full-time permanent jobs for breadwinners, is at the root of the problem of declining numbers of students. Young families move to the cities because that is where the jobs are. Many young families have moved north or east, but always for the same reason – jobs.

Declining enrolment is not the cause of school closure so much as it is a symptom of failure of Town Council and Regional District to attract industry to small rural communities. We can point a finger at these groups, but the finger will point back to us to some extent. We continue to blind ourselves to the effects of having inadequate numbers of jobs, despite the efforts of local entrepreneurs to create jobs.

Recently, some approaches

were made regarding bringing industry to Princeton. When that happens, we must not put obstacles in the path of companies interested in moving here. The idea we must promote is to get them here any way we can, coddle them for the first few years if necessary, but keep them here. We need industry.

It is the young families who fill our schools, shop at our stores, and create jobs for other people. Those of us who lived here during the burgeoning years of sawmilling and mining know these young families do more – they fill our arena with activity, they support local entertainment, and they give energy to many local organizations. When the spirit of the community is young, the community thrives.

Without industry to support raising a family, we are sunk. We cannot grow if we are a community of old people. Members of Town Council and Regional District must mobilize to bring industry to the valley and keep it here, before we lose much more than one school.

# Protect yourself from identity theft

Identity theft is the fastest growing type of fraud in North America. The Council of Better Business Bureaus estimates the cost of identity theft at \$2.5 billion a year to consumers, banks, credit card firms, stores and other businesses. Project Phonebusters (www.phonebusters.com) a national call centre targeting fraud crimes, reported more victims in the first nine months of 2003 than in all of 2002 combined. ID thieves can, and do, use all sorts of tactics to take your personal information: by looking through your garbage or recycling box, pretending you need to provide such information in order to claim a prize or lottery win-

ning, stealing your mail, placing bogus newspaper ads for jobs locally and internationally, sending unsolicited e-mails posing as your financial institution, and on and on.

It can take a long time to clean up the mess resulting from having your identity stolen. If you suspect you have become a victim, act immediately to stop the thief's further use of your identity. Report the crime to the police. Call your bank and credit card issuers. Contact the fraud unit of the credit reporting company and request a "fraud alert" be placed in your file, as well as a victim's statement asking creditors to call you before opening any new accounts or

changing your existing accounts. You may want to consider a small "at home" paper shredder to shred personal documents before recycling.

Recent reports of people buying online who have not received what they paid for online may have had their identities stolen by a fake sales company. The old adage, "Let the buyer beware" applies to all sales transactions online as well as when using plastic anywhere.

## Arbitration awards raises to Crown Counsels

B.C. Crown Counsels will receive a 13 percent pay increase as a result of an arbitration decision last week. Starting positions will be \$56,000 per year and top level will be paid \$140,000 per year. This brings B.C. Crown Counsels in line with those of Ontario, Alberta and the Department of Justice in Vancouver. There are only 400 Crown Counsels in B.C. Pay scales are based on "levels", with the fourth level as the highest paid. There are very few level four Crown Counsels. The next level down is 3B. The majority of current 119 murder trials, including the Pickton trial, are conducted by levels 3B or 3A Crown Counsels.

## Real estate market booms

South Okanagan Real Estate Board reports a continuing hot market in real estate throughout the region. Sale prices are climbing in all communities except Keremeos, Kaleden and Okanagan Falls. Top increase occurred in Naramata, where prices jumped 23 percent.

Princeton prices climbed five percent in December 2003, to an average sale price of \$98,476. The number of units sold in December 2003 was up dramatically over the previous year.

January's figures are slightly

down for sales in Princeton, but show a huge increase in Keremeos. Selling prices in Keremeos, at an average of \$162,000, showed no increase over January last year, but Princeton's selling prices were up slightly to an average of \$111,650 for residential properties. Princeton continues to have the lowest selling prices in the region.

In numbers of units sold, Keremeos showed a decrease, as did Kaleden. Summerland had the highest number of units sold, a 700 percent increase over 2002.
