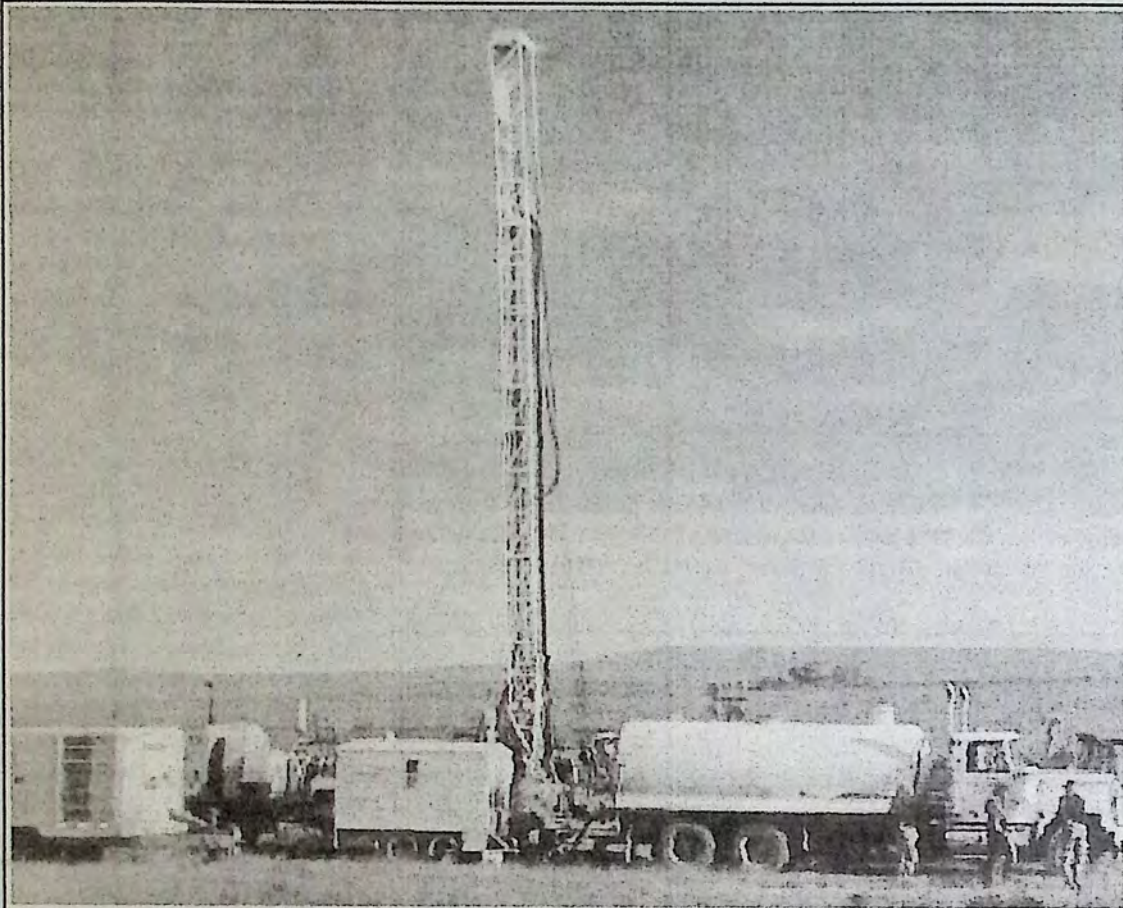

Coalbed methane raises concern

Water drainage and chemicals could be problem

Coalbed methane extraction was the topic of an information session hosted by Vermilion Forks Field Naturalists. Approximately 40 people gathered at the Skills Centre in Princeton to learn about the method of extraction and possible problem areas. Those attending included people from the South Similkameen, who raised some issues Princeton area residents may not have considered.

Guest speaker was Arthur Caldicott of Dogwood Initiatives, an organization supported by donations. The organization investigates land use issues on behalf of government, corporations, First Nations and community. He showed a video about problems with coalbed methane extraction in Alberta and Wyoming, and some of the issues did not apply in the Princeton area, but others would.

Caldicott said the BC Cattlemen's Association would be the organization with the greatest land use concerns due to the large number of well heads and service roads, which may interfere with ranching. There are pipelines and roads to each well head. In some locations, there would be compressors operating continuously, and these would be noisy.

Caldicott pointed out there is money to be made by government

and by the gas companies, but all of the impact is on landowners and local residents, who receive no compensation for the inconvenience.

Further, for the first three years of development, the gas company does not have to follow any rules and do not have to report on what they are doing as their project is initially classified as "experimental", Caldicott said.

Youth dies on ATV

Tanner Hogg, age 15, died March 18 as a result of injuries sustained when his ATV collided with a gate near the tunnel area on the Trans Canada Trail in Princeton.

The youth had ATV experience, was driving a brand new ATV and was wearing a helmet. It appears he hit the gate at about neck level. His father found him unconscious and rushed him to Princeton General Hospital at approximately 9:00 p.m. Tanner Hogg was a popular youth, and enjoyed sports. He was especially active in hockey for many years.

RCMP attended the accident scene the following day and continued to investigate, but foul play is not suspected. Sgt. Kurt Lozinski, of Princeton RCMP Detachment, says it was "an unfortunate accident".

Jetters ask for airport

Bill Weins, representing the interests of Model Aircraft of Canada (MAC) appeared before Town Council on March 15 to request use of the airport. Weins explained the desire of the local group to have a jet scale rally in September using Princeton Airport as a base.

Last year, unauthorized persons camped on the edge of the runway and used the airport to fly their model planes. Weins and Steve Kovacs, a Princeton resident, explained they would construct a gate and place a sign there clearly stating anyone using the field without permission would be regarded as a trespasser and would

be fined. The remote controlled aircraft clubs are now coming under the authority of Transport Canada, and unauthorized use of an airport for these models can be prosecuted under a Transport Canada bylaw.

The club would like to use the airport for practice every second weekend from May through September, with the exception of the hottest months. Weins left Council copies of the rules under which the club operates and the \$5 million public liability insurance policy.

Council is considering reinstating the club's use of the airport.

Business group will define role

A two hour brainstorming session in April will aid the Princeton Area Business Enhancement Association in setting future goals.

Michael McLaughlin, Similkameen Valley Economic Development Officer, spoke to the group at their March 16th regular meeting.

The vision building and implementation exercise will revolve around only two questions - What should be the BEA's goals and objectives? What economic development projects should the BEA engage with?

"The business community drives economic development," McLaughlin stated.

Members were asked to consider the two questions and bring

their suggestions back to next months meeting.

A list of goals and objectives would then be ranked by priority by members.

The exercise would be to help BEA define itself in terms of the roles it should play in the community.

"Input from the membership is important as it's the members who should be directing the group," says BEA President George Elliott.

Speaking on criteria for goals and priorities, McLaughlin pointed out, "They should be things this group can do in terms of measurable goals which become measurable successes."

The two hour session will take

place at the next BEA regular meeting, Tuesday, April 13th at 7:00 PM in the upstairs meeting room at Copper Mountain Bar & Grill.

Business owners see parking as area of concern

Town Council's decision to eliminate three more parking spaces in downtown Princeton generated a response from the BEA.

A letter from the group, which is made up of business owners in the Princeton area, will strongly suggest Town Council carefully consider any further steps affecting parking and traffic flow in the community.

Council forms Airport Committee

Mayor Keith Olsen, Dave Ecotte, Councillor Ray Jarvis and Dave Woodruff have been authorized to be a committee to oversee activities at Princeton airport.

Councillor Kathy Clement said she had checked into the matter of having a cell phone for a private individual to give out information about the airport, and was informed that the Town of Princeton would be responsible

(liable) no matter who was given the cell phone. The Municipal Insurance Association suggested Council find an alternative. Clement said Hope has an answering machine which gives information to callers. She recommended this for Princeton.

The details of the arrangement, and what information will be given, has been left to the Airport Committee.

Police nab drunk driver

On March 13 at approximately 11:30 p.m., Princeton RCMP were alerted by an off-duty police officer from Nanaimo who had observed a vehicle driven in an erratic, unsafe manner. With the assistance of Citizens on Patrol, who also followed the vehicle into Princeton, police were able to intercept the vehicle as it came into Princeton at the intersection of Highway 3 and Copper Mountain Road. The driver tried to evade police by detouring onto

Copper Mountain Road, but hit the concrete island. The driver of a tractor trailer unit saw the incident occurring ahead of him and blocked the highway with his rig to prevent the suspect escaping. A 51 year old Penticton woman faces charges of impaired driving, driving while over the legal limit, and driving with an expired driver's licence. She was issued a 24 hour suspension and faces an additional 30 day driving suspension.

Yurts interest BEA

Bill Shane of Basic Industries, spoke to the Princeton BEA at their March 16 meeting.

Shane plans to manufacture yurts in Princeton for sale globally.

The interest is there, as Shane explained how he put one on the internet through eBay and quickly collected 70 responses.

Tentative plans are to start with a thousand units ready to ship.

"Everything will be done here in Princeton."

When the product is ready, Shane plans to sell shares and go public with the manufacturing company.

"The exposure Princeton will get will generate interest in this

area for tourists," Shane told BEA members.

His plans generated considerable curiosity and interest at the meeting.

To extract the methane gas from the coalbed, the company must first extract the water holding the gas in the coal. Water could be pumped out for up to two years before any methane is extracted. Another potential problem may arise if the company uses chemicals to fracture the coal, thereby extracting greater volumes of gas from the coalbed.

This information raises the issues of how much water would be extracted and where it would go. A Keremeos resident posed a concern about the loss of groundwater in a valley dependent on groundwater for irrigation and human consumption for most of the year. Dumping the water into the river was not an option, so far as most people were concerned. The Similkameen River is an international river and subject to the Columbia River Treaty, as well as a river of concern to the Okanagan and Columbia salmon fishery.

The matter of "fracking" chemicals raised worries, as we do not know what these chemicals are and whether they end in the water pumped from the wells.

Flaring (burning off methane gas before extraction services are completed) raised concerns about the potential in forested areas for starting a forest fire in hot, windy conditions.

Although no conclusions were reached at the sessions, and no plan of action developed, Mayor Keith Olsen told the News Leader these concerns will be raised at the Similkameen Valley Planning meeting this week, and he did express his concerns to the Okanagan Nation Alliance who are doing a project to enhance a self-sustaining fishery in the Okanagan and Similkameen watersheds. Due to the way coalbed methane companies operate, they are not obliged to undergo stakeholder review prior to development, according to Caldicott. For further information about him and the organization he represents, go to www.dogwoodinitiatives.org

Rangeland Forest Service worker retires

After 27 years of range work with the B.C. Ministry of Forests, Gordon Comeau retires this week. His actual retirement date is April 1, but his last day of work is March 25.

Comeau came to Princeton from Barriere in January 1977. Originally from Nova Scotia, he had made his way west, and went to work at Tranquille School as a counsellor. When Tranquille shut down, he had the opportunity to try for a job with the Ministry of Forests. He had no regrets about entering the Forest Service.

Most of his work here in the Princeton area has been with rangeland, but he did some timber harvest and silviculture work, and a whole lot of forest fire work.

"I don't think I could have picked a better organization to have a career with," Comeau says of the Ministry of Forests. "If I had to do it over again, I would do the same thing. It's a great place to work."

Comeau and his wife, Gayle, raised their three children in Princeton. This led to Comeau's interest in the school system. He has been a school trustee for 23

years, is Chair of the Board of School Trustees for District #58, President of the B.C. School Trustees Association, and B.C. representative to the Canadian School Trustees Association.

In addition to all of this work, he is the President of Princeton Golf Club, and he intends to do a lot more golfing now that he is

retired. He plans to go fishing, too, and do volunteer work in the community.

"You never know where I'll pop up," he told the News Leader.

Looking back at his career, and his work as a school trustee, Comeau sums it up by saying, "It's been a great community to serve."

Search and Rescue needs support

Dawn Gardner, of Princeton Ground Search & Rescue Society (GSAR), spoke to members of Princeton Business Enhancement Association at their March 16th regular meeting.

Gardner explained Princeton GSAR and Princeton Rescue Society are two different groups with distinctly different duties.

Princeton Rescue Society, now identified as Princeton Highway Extraction, attends accident scenes to aid the BC Ambulance Service.

Princeton GSAR provides trained, capable and well equipped volunteers to assist the RCMP in the search for

and recovery of people or persons lost or otherwise unaccounted for in the Princeton area.

Gardner told BEA members GSAR members receive regular training to increase their skills in such things as tracking and explained the benefits of night time searches.

Search and Rescue Society is currently working on raising funds to support the outfitting of a Mobile Command Centre.

The unit is a trailer which would be equipped with all the things needed to accommodate crews in overnight rescue situations.

They have the trailer, but need to purchase all the equip-

ment.

"Our number one goal for this year is to have the command centre up and running," Gardner told the BEA.

A letter requesting financial assistance was later discussed and the BEA responded with the suggestion of approaching businesses individually.

Princeton Ground Search and Rescue meets every Tuesday night at 7:00 PM in the Princeton Hospital Boardroom for training sessions.

They hope to have a total of 17 members certified by January 2005.

Valley business survey almost complete

Similkameen Valley Planning Society's Melanie Bagley says the business survey they are conducting is near completion.

She estimates there are about one hundred businesses in the Keremeos area left to contact.

The same amount are remaining in the Princeton area.

Bagley says a total of 450 businesses in the Similkameen are on the completed database with about 29% of them stating they have a formal business plan in place.

"The majority of people don't have a business plan," says Bagley.

"It doesn't seem to matter as not having a business plan does not mean they will not have a successful business."

Trends continue to surface as a result of the survey.

Keremeos area businesses feel there should be more emphasis on promoting organics while Princeton business owners feel there should be a better use for the airport.

Another interesting fact from the survey shows most business owners in Princeton have only one business.

Business owners in Keremeos often own and operate more than one business.

Bagley will spend this week catching up with the remaining businesses to be surveyed in the Keremeos area.

Similkameen Valley EDO Michael McLaughlin will concentrate on the Princeton end of the valley.

More building lots coming to Keremeos

Changes to the Keremeos Official Community Plan (OCP) will be presented at a public meeting next month.

CAO Bob Lafleur says the plan received one drastic change.

All properties located West of 4th Street, South of the railway right-of-way are to be excluded from the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR).

These sixteen properties which measure less than two acres in size will eventually be subdivided to lots of .4 acre sizes.

The Land Commission has agreed to the changes which are good news to the Village.

"That will potentially create thirty new lots," Lafleur states.

Zoning for the new lots would be Country Residential which permits uses such as home-based businesses, bed and breakfasts and secondary suites.

"This will increase the tax base and the housing stock in the area."

The OCP public meeting will

take place Wednesday, April 7th at 7:00 PM in Victory Hall.

At that time the final OCP will be presented with submissions for changes from the

public accepted up to a week after the meeting.

Following that step, the OCP would then go to bylaw for adoption.

Council decides on sewer extension project

Keremeos Village Council approved a sewer extension at their March 15th regular meeting.

The 8-inch sewer main will be extended to accommodate the new RCMP Detachment, which will be located at the intersection of Highways 3 and 3A.

The capital cost of the project

is approximately \$180,000.

A further extension to Similkameen Elementary Secondary School will be put on hold until grant funding becomes available.

CAO Bob Lafleur points out, "The entire bench area above the Village is not currently on sewer."

Grist Mill plans open house

Keremeos Grist Mill will kick-off the season with an open house on April 15th.

Facility Manager Gwen Coates says the event is open to the public with many local tourism operators in attendance.

"We're trying to make this a traditional open house where people can mingle and visit."

Similkameen Valley EDO Michael McLaughlin sees the Grist Mill as an important component in his attempt to brand the Valley.

"We will be working together to create a publicity campaign," says McLaughlin.

Branding will give the Valley a marketable identity.

Antibiotic resistance can hit home

NC - Erick Labrie is an active six year old boy from Matane, Quebec, who loves to play outside. These days, when Erick's mother tells him to wear a scarf around his neck, he does what he's told. That is because Erick spent nine long months battling a resistant bacterial pneumonia.

Most kids who have pneumonia are treated with antibiotics. Their symptoms improve within days, never to return. Erick was not so fortunate. His pneumonia began in March 2003 and kept recurring until mid-December, ending only after several emergency room visits and a six-day stay in the hospital. His treatment included a procedure known as bronchoscopy as well as additional antibiotics administered intravenously.

"I didn't know there was such a thing as resistance to antibiotics," says Lyne Ouellet, Erick's mother. "Or, if I had heard something about it, it had passed in one ear and out the other."

Lyne is not alone. A survey conducted in January 2002 found that one in four Canadians believed resistance was not a problem that could affect them. The survey was conducted on behalf of the National Information Program on Antibiotics (NIPA) - a coalition of physician, pharmacist and patient organizations working to raise awareness about the appropriate use of antibiotics as part of the ongoing fight to contain antibiotic resistance.

"Canadians are very fortunate to have access to effective antibiotics, but we can't take it for granted," says Dr. Francois Boucher, a pediatric infectious disease specialist and chair of NIPA. Cases like Erick's illustrate the consequences of antibiotic resistance and the profound importance of keeping resistance rates as low as possible."

Until his bout with pneumonia, Erick had been prescribed antibiotics on only two other occasions. This demonstrates that anyone can be affected by antibiotic-resistance bacteria, regardless of how often they may have used antibiotics in the past.

Erick's mother says, "When they told me there was a resistant bug I was very concerned. I started asking what does this

mean? Is it dangerous for him? Is this common? What can we do about it?"

An antibiotic is designed to seek out specific elements within the bacteria that causes the illness. In the past, common antibiotics such as penicillin have been used so much that many disease-causing bacteria have become resistant. Infections caused by resistant bacteria become more difficult and sometimes impossible to treat.

Patients, physicians and pharmacists all have an important role to keep antibiotic resistance in check. If you have a cold or the flu, taking antibiotics won't help because they are ineffective against viruses. If you are prescribed antibiotics for a bacterial infection, such as bacterial bronchitis or strep throat, it is important to take all of your medication, not just until your symptoms improve,

and never take antibiotics prescribed for someone else.

"The worst part was the anxiety of not knowing what was really wrong with him, and whether any of the medications were actually going to work," admits Erick's father, Luis. "We were very concerned."

We all need to be concerned, agrees Dr. Boucher. "We cannot afford to be complacent. We must remain vigilant and continue to promote appropriate antibiotic use.

"If we don't use antibiotics wisely, they may not be effective when we really need them," Dr. Boucher says. "That would have a real impact on the lives of many Canadians like Erick and his parents.

Living Past 100

Hit the bugs of spring

Spring has sprung, and with spring comes those cautionary measures all of us must take to protect ourselves from serious illness due to bugs. If you want to live a long, healthy life, you must make every effort to keep insects away from you. Parents should instruct their children to do the same.

One of the first signs of spring is a number of spiders roaming around the house. They sneak in during autumn, and come to life in spring. Most spiders will bite you, and most of them will inflict a serious bite. For the most part, the bite becomes a site of infection. However, some small spiders pack a big wallop that could kill you. The best policy is to kill every little brown or black spider near you. There are two to look out for: the hobo spider and the black widow. The black widow is easily identified due to the shiny outer shell. The hobo is not so easily identified.


When you see a spider in your house, kill it. There are some big, fat speckled spiders that make big webs - don't worry about these. They rarely bite. If you like picking raspberries, watch out for the tiny red or white spiders - they give a nasty bite. Even Daddy Long Legs spiders will bite.

The next bug you need to watch out for is the wood tick. Tick bites can become a site of infection, and if a certain kind of tick bites you, you may contract Lyme disease. If you are bitten by a tick, it is best to have it removed professionally. The tick will be sent to a laboratory and examined. If you begin to have fevers and muscle cramps after a tick bite, tell your doctor. Lyme disease can be cured with early treatment.

After the ticks have arrived, they are followed by mosquitoes. West Nile virus is now a major concern in North America, and wearing mosquito repellent is a good idea even if West Nile virus is not prevalent in your area. Mosquitoes can carry other diseases, such as meningitis, which can kill you or disable you.

Flies that bite, particularly stable flies, those small brown ones of spring, can carry meningitis, too, and encephalitis. Make sure you have screens on your house, especially if you live near horses.

Flies can carry germs from a dung heap to your dinner table, so keep all flies out. If you can't keep them out, hit them dead.

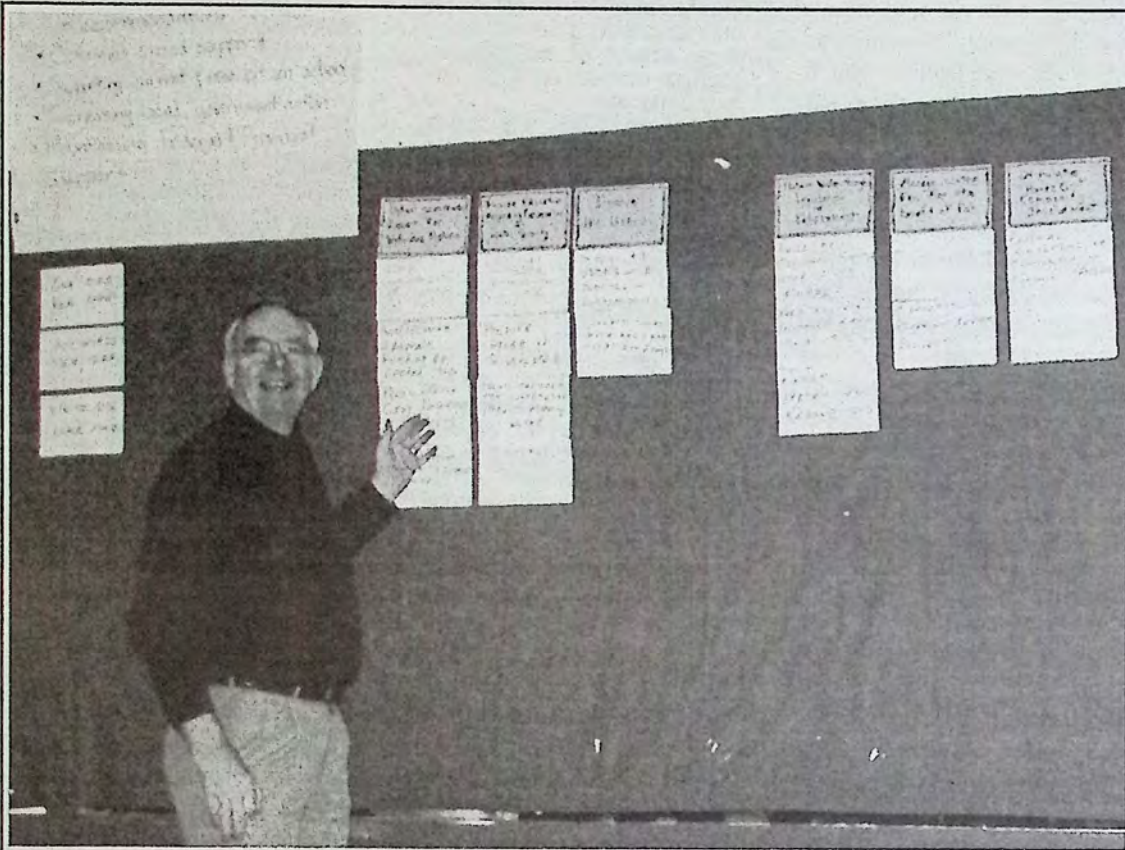

Valley residents support ONA efforts to save Okanagan salmon

Looking for support for its efforts to improve fishing, Okanagan Nation Alliance (ONA) hosted a public input session at the arena mezzanine in Princeton on Wednesday. The session was facilitated by Neils Christiansen, who was hired by ONA to conduct meetings in communities of the Okanagan and Similkameen watersheds. Jillian Tamblyn represented Okanagan Nation Fisheries Commission at the meeting.

Why the Similkameen?

Many people felt there should be a greater priority on the Similkameen, as it was fourth, and last, on the list of regional priorities. Christiansen explained the Okanagan is in worse shape than the Similkameen.

Those attending the meeting were told the approach would be "fish first" throughout the watershed.

The purpose of all of the planning is to have a self-sustaining fish populations in healthy aquatic ecosystems. All fish stocks in the Okanagan and Similkameen are in decline, and of particular concern is the Okanagan salmon fishery.

By Okanagan, ONA does not refer only to Canada, but to the United States as well. The Columbia basin watershed includes the Okanagan and Similkameen watersheds, and salmon must make their way down the complex Columbia River system to the sea, and then come back by the same route to

spawn.

Although there are no salmon in the Similkameen River, the water from the Similkameen is essential as the salmon detect it in the water system and follow it to the Okanagan. Further, the Similkameen River is a key to keeping water temperatures down and maintaining the level of flow in the Okanagan River south of the border. During the past two summers, the volume of water in the Similkameen River was very low and warmer than normal, which is not conducive to maintaining fish populations. Because of the importance of the Similkameen River to the Okanagan River salmon, the Similkameen watershed is included in the study area.

Trout Creek is linked to the Similkameen watershed, too, although Trout Creek flows into Okanagan Lake. The water source for Trout Creek is on the plateau accessed by Highway 40 (Princeton-Summerland Road) along a string of lakes fed by runoff and ground water.

The four stages of action

The plan of action calls for four stages. People at the meeting worked on Stage I issues, which the ONA has begun addressing and has taken some action. Stage I is not complete and will not be complete until early next year. Stage I of the process establishes a biophysical and sociopolitical profile of a regional river basin and identifies watersheds within

the region that are most in need of fish sustainability planning. This has begun in the Okanagan Valley. Stage II identifies the fish sustainability targets that must be met. **Continued next page**

Stage III establishes the action plan defining who will do what Stage IV adds to Stage III and identifies the actions, commitments, monitoring and reviewing the level of sustainability.

Nobody objected to the focus on salmon for the time being, but there were a few comments about improving fish stocks in the Similkameen watershed.

Christiansen engaged the group in activities meant to assess what people think of the project, and in making recommendations for action needed. The first activity, saying what they thought about where the fish sustainability project is going, was done quite seriously and it was clear people had done some thinking about the issues. The second activity, making recommendations, actually became fun, as people dis-

puted conclusions drawn by others and discussed them persuasively.

Recommendations

Among the recommendations made at the meeting, there were a number dealing with regulations to protect the quality of water and prevent riverbank erosion. (Some people noted the regulations are in place but there seems to be a lack of enforcement.)

Raising public awareness of the importance of water and fish habitat protection was the theme of a number of recommendations. With those recommendations goes another set which called for involvement of local people in local projects to improve water quality or fish habitat.

Ensuring all levels of government were on side was a major concern, along with ensuring the

British Columbia and federal governments provided adequate funding for the projects.

Managing water flow to ensure an adequate supply of water was another recommendation which included water conservation and building a dam on the river to control water flow, but the dam met with strong opposition from some people who did not want it even considered as a solution for salmon sustainability, but the dam was finally included as a possible solution among many.

The meeting ended on a note of goodwill among the dozen people who attended. There will be future meetings. The News Leader receives information from ONA on a regular basis and will keep readers informed of the progress of the fish sustainability project.

Start your gardening cautiously

You can start too soon!

A few warm sunny days brings gardeners out to the soil preparing to work wonders in flowers and vegetables. Some are disappointed when their efforts fail to bring them anything.

One of the hazards of being too eager to start, especially in an extreme climate such as we have in the Similkameen Valley, is the overnight freeze. Plants react to the temperature of the soil more than the temperature of the air. We humans react to air temperature, because we live in the air, but when we garden, we need to think about the environment in which the plants lives – both in the air and in the soil. The roots, the source of food for the plant, are in the soil. When the soil is too cold, the plant will not grow.

Seeds will not germinate until

soil temperature is right. Flowers bought from greenhouses will go into shock if planted into colder soils, to say nothing of the shock of an overnight frost.

There are some things you can do in your garden this early in the spring. You can work the soil, fertilize, clear out weeds, and transplant some shrubs (if they are still dormant!) You can move some perennials at this time of year, but do not move any showing signs of great activity, such as tulips, daffodils and rhubarb.

If you have a nice warm location close to your house, you could plant some seeds of hardy plants, such as bleeding heart and columbine.

This is a good time of year to spray your shrubs to protect them from insect infestation in the future. You may want to use dor-

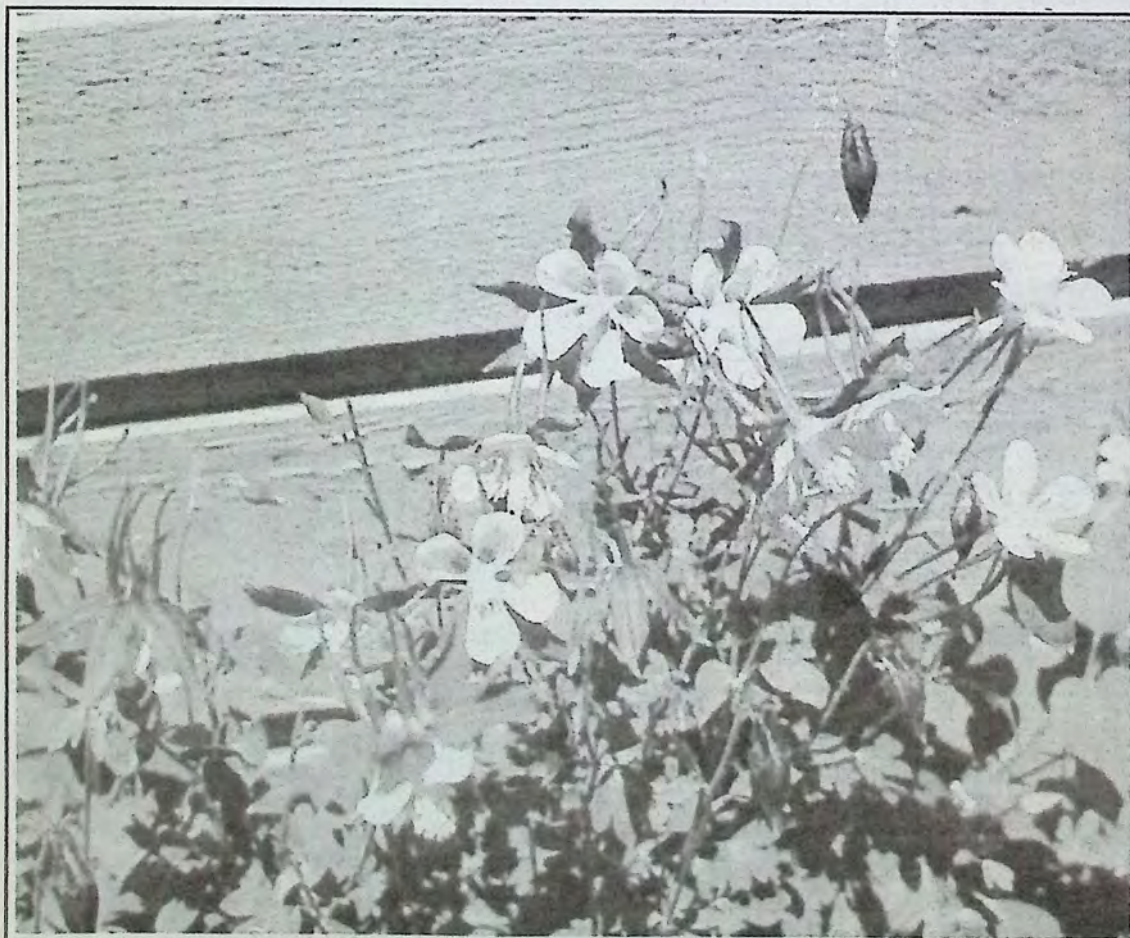
mant oil on your fruit trees and you may want to dig in some soil nutrients around trees and shrubs.

Even in Princeton, you can probably get away with planting spinach, radishes and onion sets if you have a nice southern exposure. These will give you salad fixings in about a month.

In a couple of weeks, you can probably have some success with planting lettuce, onions and beets. Leave peas and carrots another couple of weeks.

If you have a small greenhouse or hotbed, you can start planting now for transplanting later, but keep in mind, if you are a beginner, you must be sure what you are planting can be successfully transplanted. If not, just wait until later.

For beans, corn, squash and potatoes, June is not too late to plant.

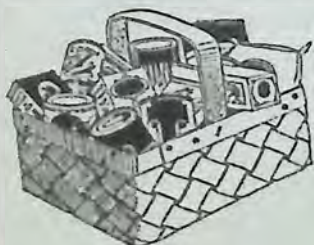

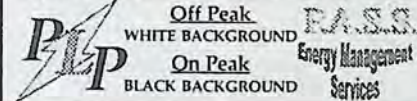

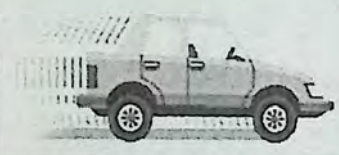

Downtown loses more parking space

Town Council decided at their March 15th meeting to remove three more parking spaces from the downtown core.

They identified a safety hazard along Billiter Avenue - one of the many narrow side streets we have in our community.

The quick fix turned out to be the elimination of parking on the only side of the street parking is allowed (beside Stedman's V & S).

One member of Council even suggested it was time residents started to walk a little more.

Angela Avenue is the next target, they warned.

We agree there is a very real problem with narrow side streets with barely enough room to park on both sides and provide safe passage for two lanes of through traffic, but we also feel eliminating downtown parking space is not the solution.

There are far too few existing places to park vehicles already, and with business owners requiring spaces for staff, there is hardly room for customers to park.

This is an issue that needs close examination and not a quick fix.

Town Council should be consulting with businesses for input with the Business Enhancement Association and Chamber of Commerce also involved.

Turning Angela Avenue, and other side streets into one-way routes is a possible solution. The reconfiguration for single-lane, one-way traffic would open most of the narrow side streets up for parking on both sides.

This move may actually add extra spaces for parking.

Considering the amount of taxes paid to the Town by the business sector, those who make up the commercial downtown core deserve more than a band-aid and the suggestion of customers benefitting from the extra exercise.

Your power bills are at stake in sale

Re: Aquila agreed to sell our utility operation!

About three weeks ago I read that Fortis applied to buy the Canadian Aquila utility operation. The application process already started before the British Columbia Utilities Commission (BCUC). As you may know, Princeton Light and Power Company is a customer of Aquila.

Would the sale be a similar grave mistake like when our West Kootenay Power (WKP) was allowed by then Premier Vander Zalm to be expropriated to U.S. owned UtiliCorp. The

Premier denied the Regional District's bid to buy WKP, one of the most efficient utility operations in North America. Maybe the ratepayers haven't noticed that rates doubled within 10 years after the sale. I still have to figure out how much the rates increased up to date since then.

Closing date of the proposed sale of Aquila BC was anticipated before middle of this year.

I noticed BCUC's regulatory time table (see BCUC's link) <http://www.bcuc.com/PUBPROCEEDINGS/fortis/fortisAquila%20Acquisition.htm> is suspiciously short time-framed. It is obvious that financially trou-

bled Aquila and Fortis shareholders love and use the law of electricity's physics, the path of least resistance (by us innocent and ignorant ratepayers). and upon lately contacting many people, I found they believe that BCUC is acting in the best interest of the ratepayers firstly and then the interest of the corporations. Not so, as I have experienced myself in the involvement of various application processes since 1998!

If you are not concerned about the future of our former WKP utility and the still every increasing rates, ignore this and get back to your daily TV programs after work! If you do however, why not express your interest and/or concern to BCUC (1-800-663-1385, fax 604-660-1102). If BCUC does not allow you to become involved as an intervenor, please ask either Regional District Chair Dan Ashton (1-250-763-4918) or your area Regional Director that they include and present your concerns before the ongoing application process.

Wake up, get involved now, your hydro bills are at stake as well as all assets (generation plants, power lines, equipment, hammer and screw - all what bears now the name Aquila - was and will always be paid for by us ratepayers and yet the shareholders take the cream!

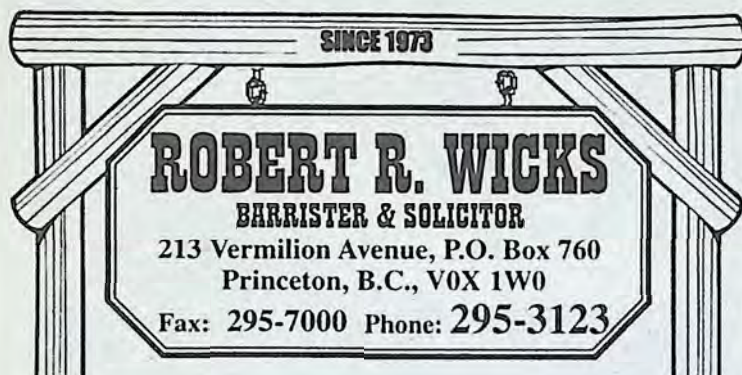

on some kind of international border! Rwanda has 20 percent of its protected area on the Zaire border, supposedly to protect the gorilla population. In fact, this area served as protection for a guerrilla population in the disgusting civil war between the Tutsis and the Hutus. How did the guerrillas take over the gorilla lands? Why did WWF let that happen?

In the Kootenays, a great battle was fought to establish a protected area now called Valhalla. Note the proximity of this park to the Canada-U.S. border. Another park, a world heritage site, was established in the Tatshenshini, amid great protests from a lot of people who had invested in the valley to establish a major copper mine. Note the proximity to the B.C. - Alaska border.

The Similkameen Valley had its own battle in 1994 when the south side of the valley was to be linked in a huge Class A park extending along the border from Manning Park to the south Similkameen. Thank goodness we raised a really big stink about that and showed what the economic losses would be. That does not mean the idea died. On the contrary, the Stein Valley and the so-called Great Bear Rainforest

were achieved. Note how these extend northward from Manning Park toward Alaska, forming a corridor. My guess is the fight for the Similkameen is not over yet. They are likely waiting until a younger population has forgotten what happened in 1994. In the meantime, they use grizzly bears as an excuse to "protect" some of the same area they wanted in their original plan.

Another border-line park was to go from Idaho and Montana right up the west side of the Rockies and into Alaska. It is supposed to be a wildlife corridor.

Billions of dollars have been poured into these "protected" area projects by all of the world's major corporations. Most of it goes to publicity, to convince people these ideas are good for the environment. I would bet some African nations would have a different opinion, but then, Africans have lived with parks like this for longer.

The Bilderburgers are notorious for their One World Government promotion and their manipulation of the world's economy. Why would they care what happens to the environment, especially when you consider how many of their members are corporate heads of the very polluters the average

environmentalist complains about?

Perhaps the WWF agenda is closer to One World Government and economic manipulation than we have considered. It seems to me that if you want to rule the world, "protected" corridors between nations would be really handy.

In 1994, I read a book written by ecology professor Robert Lee of the University of Washington. In it he said indigenous people (those who have traditionally lived in an area) are best qualified to manage the natural environment. I read the rough draft, and I do not know if it was ever published. It certainly was not popular among the environmental clubs.

Looking at his recommendations from a different perspective, there is a threat to major corporations if local people decide how to manage their own environment, especially in Third World countries. If they successfully manage their environment they survive without any need for big loans from the International Monetary Fund, no loans to repay, and no international aid "experts" coming in to help (and perhaps help them into starvation). People who can maintain their independence are a threat.

Sick chickens should be worth money

Dear Editor;

Last week, health officials quarantined the Abbotsford area. Chickens aren't even allowed to cross the road for fear of spreading Avian flu. One concern is that this bird flu may be spread in the underground aquifer - yet, on the same day, another load of dead,

diseased birds was transported some two hundred kilometres to Princeton and was incinerated a few kilometres upstream from our town. Health officials usually say that diseased animals should be contained and not be transported.

Princeton's mayor has told us he's not concerned. Our Area H repre-

sentative told an enquirer that she's not the least bit worried because the federal health inspectors know much more about those things than we do.

I disagree with her for the following reasons. Health experts said 1) Mad cow disease could not be transferred to humans, yet it is believed that at least eight people died from the disease in Europe; 2) We don't have to worry about humans contracting Avian flu, yet Asian bird handlers died after handling diseased birds; and 3) To catch SARS, people would have to be in close proximity for extended periods, but we soon learned that SARS could be acquired by touching a door handle.

I do not think our officials have the right to take chances with the health of the residents of the Similkameen Valley and the residents of Washington.

The people of Cache Creek were generously rewarded for accepting the household garbage from the Lower Mainland. If we were to accept the premise that burning these diseased chickens is a safe practice, shouldn't we be compensated accordingly? Surely, tons of diseased chickens burned in a pit near the Similkameen River must be worth a lot of money. So, how much did our area's officials settle for?

Our Mens Team finished respectfully in the "B" division and all the guys gave their best.

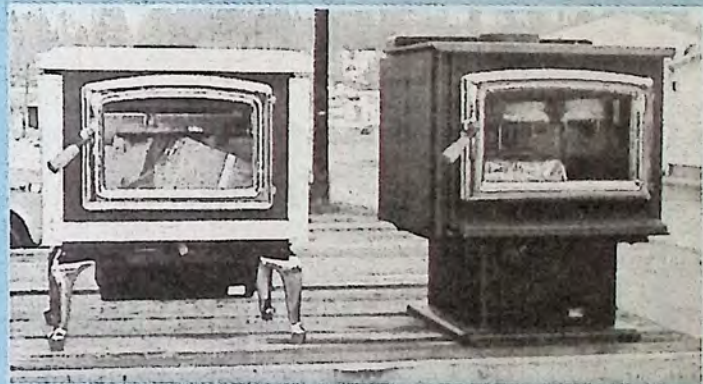
