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USIB strikes gold at Mascot

Guided tours start in July

The old Mascot Mine site, perched on a cliff face high above Hedley, will be a top tourist attraction this year. Upper Similkameen Indian Band (USIB) has received confirmation last week of a \$440,000 Western Diversification grant which will allow guided tours of the old mine site to begin this summer.

USIB has requested use of the old Hedley Elementary School for the downtown site of the tour bus offices and marshalling area for the tours. There is adequate parking at the school for this purpose. The school is scheduled for closure this summer and the new modular classrooms have been moved onto the school grounds in preparation for the next school term.

There is no question that this major attraction will mean expansion of tourism business in Hedley, but it will be good for tourism in the rest of the valley.

Last spring, when USIB hosted a Mascot Mine tour for government officials and media, television coverage resulted in phone calls and visits from potential tourists who wanted to know how soon they could have a Mascot tour. At that time, USIB had to refuse, explaining they were not equipped to provide tours. Tourists were disappointed then, but this year will be different.

Another aspect of the economic

impact of the Mascot Mine tours is the boost in employment. USIB tours will require, by July, several new employees to manage the tours and take care of the tourists.

At this time, a great deal of the detailed work must be taken care of by the Band office before anything visible takes place. Launching a new tourist business 1,000 feet up a cliff face is no easy task. The paperwork has been done, as it was required for the submission of a proposal for funding. Now the real "on the ground" work begins.

Goldcliff seeks more gold

Goldcliff Resource Corporation is continuing exploration work at Panorama Ridge near Hedley, and near the former Nickel Plate Mine. Goldcliff has 160 claim units in the area covering an area of 4,125 hectares (10,189 acres).

Because of the success of the 2003 field work and drill results, Goldcliff is very optimistic about the Panorama Ridge property. With their drilling program this year, the company is continuing its efforts to discover a large gold deposit of world class size in the Hedley Gold Basin.

One hundred years ago, gold was discovered in the Hedley area and the little town boomed as miners and the stamp mill extracted a total of 2.5 million ounces of gold between 1904 and 1986.

Local girl wins championship



Jenn Walton is Junior Girls Singles Champion of British Columbia. She won the title in Vernon on March 21 after competing with five other girls at Lincoln Lanes. Her average was 222, 28 pins above second place average.

Hedley's old school is the proposed marshalling area for the Mascot Mines guided tours.

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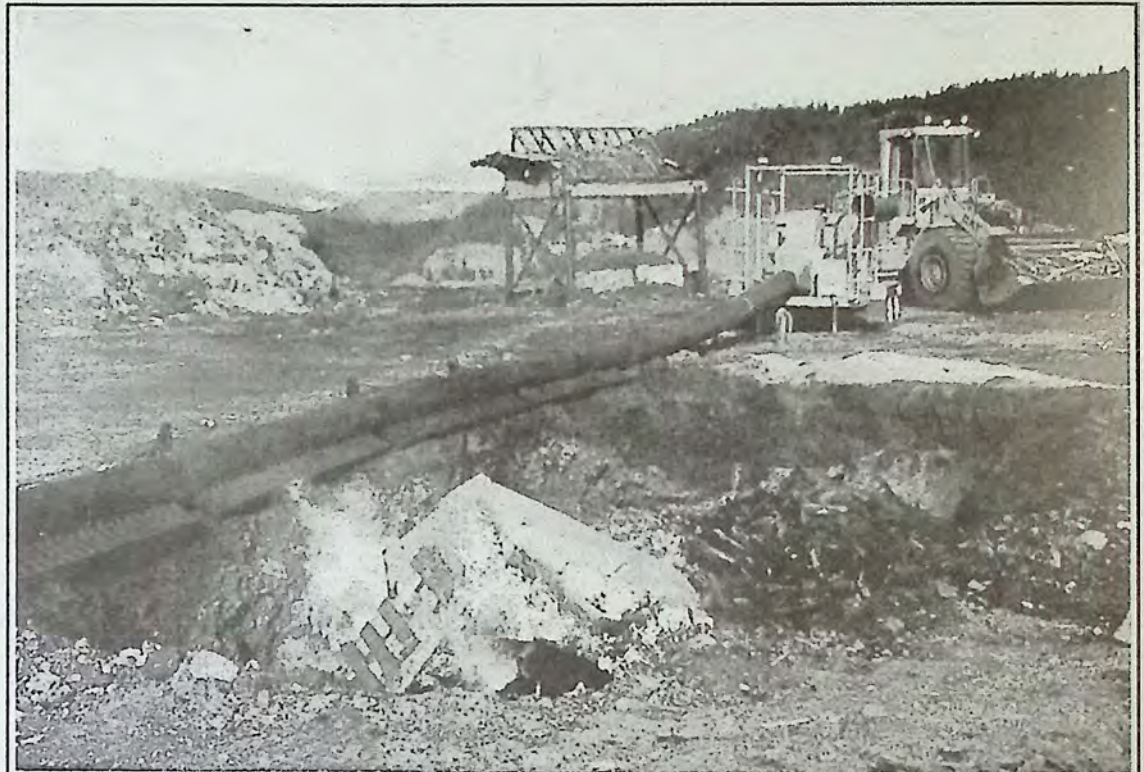
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An 800-kilogram sealed container of dead chickens infected with avian flu catches fire at the Envirogreen Technologies site last Wednesday. With assurances from many government agencies about the safety of the disposal, many local residents have not been convinced.

Envirogreen opens burn site to media

Local reporters were invited to witness a burn of diseased chickens at Envirogreen last Wednesday.

Dressed in protective gear, they toured the staging area and were given the opportunity to ask questions and take photos of the entire operation.

Similco Mine Site Manager John Cullen explained the burn method used which employs an air curtain burner alongside a pit measuring about 10-feet wide by

60-feet long.

Wood waste from Weyerhaeuser is first loaded into the 15-foot deep pit and burned.

Once the wood reaches the ember stage, 800 kilogram sealed containers of dead chickens infected with avian flu are dumped into the fire.

Another load of wood waste is put into the pit over and around the burning containers.

Following the burn, there is nothing left but ash. The ash is

then processed through the thermal unit Envirogreen uses to process contaminated soil.

The final product is mixed with Nutrifor and spread over the mine site and seeded with grass seed.

Blaine Thompson, a Veterinary Program Specialist for the Canadian Food Inspection Agency explained the reason for burning the birds by saying, "the virus is readily destroyed by heating."

He says it takes about thirty seconds to destroy the virus at 68 degrees. The temperature in the burn pit is estimated at 1,600 degrees.

"We have a thermometer that goes up to a thousand degrees," says Cullen, "it pegs a thousand in a couple of seconds."

As for bringing the birds to this area, Thompson states, "The only other option is burial and that just wasn't all that appealing."

Cullen says the community is benefitting from the shipments coming to this area, "We're making use of wood waste that would otherwise have to be disposed of anyway."

"We're also employing local people, supporting local suppliers, hotels and restaurants."

All vehicles leaving the site are sprayed with disinfectant although there is believed to be little risk to humans.

"I won't say it's zero," Thompson says, "but the risk factor here is infinitesimal."

Council makes a decision

Princeton Town Council has had enough of the chickens with avian flu.

In a letter dated March 25th, and sent to Minister of Water, Land & Air Protection Bill Barisoff, is the strongly worded statement, "Council as a whole has determined that they are no longer in favour of having chickens and the chicken manure disposed of in the Princeton area."

The letter goes on to say, "We appreciated the initial calls informing us that 16,000 birds, then an additional 32,000 birds were to be disposed at Envirogreen Technologies site located in the Princeton area. Now it appears that all chickens and turkeys in the avian flu Hot Zone are ordered killed and most likely coming here."

"We have not been given

100% assurance that the methods of disposal and the disbur-ing of the remains would not affect the environment in some adverse manner. We have been criticized extensively for the willingness to assist the Fraser Valley with their serious problem."

The letter concludes with, "Council realizes that we do not have jurisdiction in the area that the disposal is taking place, but we are objecting vehemently to having any additional chickens and chicken manure disposed of in the area and would appreciate all further deliveries stopped as of today."

The letter was carbon copied to the CFIA, Envirogreen Technologies, Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries and the Ministry of Energy and Mines.

Board decides schools' future

The decision to close Riverside Intermediate School was made earlier this year. Where to put the students, how to arrange the classroom space at the three remaining schools, was an issue addressed during the past two months through long, difficult meetings, in committee and in public.

Parents, teachers and administrators filled Princeton Secondary School library on the evening of March 24, waiting for school trustees to give the verdict as to what kind of schools Princeton will have in the future. It was a long wait, as the agenda called for three presentations prior to making the decision.

Trustee Dina Slowikowski-Campbell made the motion to go to a K-3, 4-7 configuration for the schools. She followed the motion with a review of all of the factors she considered before making her decision. She looked at the K-7 model as well as the K-3, 4-7 model and outlined the pros and cons of each configuration. The data she used included what par-

ents thought best, some comparison studies from other school districts, and other reference materials including performance levels, special needs, bussing and teacher placements. Her presentation was impressive. Each trustee had the same information, which filled an entire large three-ring binder.

Trustees from the Merritt area made it clear they did not take part in the committee work to make the decision about

Princeton schools, although they reviewed all of the data. Each of the trustees spoke in support of Slowikowski-Campbell's motion, and it passed.

Detailed planning for the shift to the new configuration begins this week. Trustees promised to report their progress to the public during the rest of the school term. The next regular meeting of the School Board in Princeton is on May 5 at the Administration Office on Tipton Avenue.

Board announces three administrators will retire

Three administrators in School District #58 will retire at the end of June 2004. Two are administrators from Merritt, Ken Boyko and Jim Murdoch, and the third is Assistant Superintendent Earl Hockin, who has been involved in a number of educational projects in Princeton schools.

The retirements were announced last week.

Board Chair Gordon Comeau

stated, "The school district is losing three highly respected and valuable members of its administrative team. The commitment of Mr. Hockin, Mr. Murdoch and Mr. Boyko has resulted in strengthening of the education program in this district and helped increase student success. The Board wishes these three administrators the best of health in their retirement.

Board looks at video conferencing

School Superintendent Dr. Robert Peacock gave school trustees a video conferencing experience during the March 25 School Board meeting. Using an ordinary computer, he linked Princeton with a teacher in a classroom at University College of the Cariboo in Kamloops, demonstrating the clarity of sound and picture on both ends of the communication.

The system would cost \$10,000 to set up but, because linkage is through internet, the maintenance costs are negligible.

Furthermore, the system would actually save money by cutting

down on travel time for teachers and administrators who travel to meetings within the district. Peacock estimated a saving of approximately \$1,000 per meeting, which included the cost of hiring a substitute teacher to take over classes from which teachers are absent during the meeting.

Trustees considered the video conferencing concept, but made no decision, referring it to the technical committee to make a recommendation at the next Board meeting.

The News Leader asked whether trustees would consider using video conferencing for their

meetings, particularly in view of winter road conditions, which can be dreadful. Board Chair Gordon Comeau said they might consider using it for committee meetings but doubted they would use it for public meetings.

Ranch family earns environmental award

The Clifton family has been ranching in the Keremeos area since early in the last century. They have always considered themselves stewards of the land but on February 28, 2004, Wilson and June Clifton won an all expenses paid trip to Calgary for their efforts. They were among 19 Canadians who won a Wildlife Habitat Canada Countryside Stewardship Award for 2003/04.

Wilson "Wils" Clifton ranched with his father, Ivan, on the south side of the Similkameen River until May, 1968, when Wils, June, and their sons, Wade and

Brad, moved to their present ranch. It is located between Keremeos and Olalla.

The Cliftons do not feel they did anything special. They fenced off the creek area on their ranch to prevent the cattle entering the stream. They alternate rangeland with The Nature Trust near White Lake, and this helps preserve the rangeland. They work on projects with The Nature Trust to improve the range and wildlife habitat.

In a letter to the Cliftons, Don Krogseth, Chief Executive Officer of The Nature Trust of British Columbia, writes, "You can be very proud of this award

as it acknowledges your personal commitment to biodiversity ranching and grassland conservation. By implementing new grazing schedules, fencing-out riparian corridors, and developing alternate cattle watering facilities you have helped establish best ranching practices. You have inspired others to follow in your footsteps by sharing your experiences with other ranching operations and conservation audiences."

At the ceremonies at the Coast Plaza Hotel, the Cliftons were presented with a framed print of a cow!

Chopaka Rodeo is organized by the Allison family. Thirty-nine years ago, Barney Allison sponsored the first Chopaka Easter Sunday Rodeo, and the family has continued the tradition since he passed away in 1998.

The rodeo looks very good for the competitors. There is a \$500 added purse in the major events. Junior Barrels has \$150 added, and Peewee barrels has \$50 added. For those who like to compete in the wild cow milking contest, there will be a \$100 prize for

the winner. The fun starts at 11:00 a.m. Spectators are advised to bring their own seating, and to be sure to wear layers of clothing as the weather can be unpredictable (maybe an umbrella might come in handy).

Council bids on IH laundry

Interior Health is looking for a location somewhere in the Interior for a regional laundry service for hospitals.

Keremeos Village Council showed interest in submitting a bid to have the facility located in Keremeos area.

"It's unlikely we'd be chosen due to our location," says CAO Bob Lefleur. "Second, we'd have to make huge upgrades to our sewage plant."

There are five factors IH will consider in selecting a site: property price, property taxes, incentives and partnerships in funding the facility, transporta-

tion costs of various sites, and having a suitable labour pool to draw from in the site area.

The specification estimates call for a production capacity of 13 million pounds of laundry, and a staff of 100 persons in a project with a cost estimate of \$12 million dollars.

Despite his previous comment, Lefleur believes Village Council is right in showing an interest.

"These sorts of opportunities are coming our way, and if we don't make some changes, we may miss out," Lefleur told the News Leader.

The authentication process has also been simplified. Once a valid library barcode and pin number have been entered, members can perform multiple transactions in their account. No more repeated entering of barcodes and pin numbers with every book ordered.

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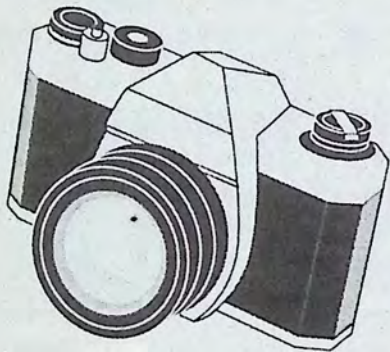
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Do you suffer from computer virus?

The more we try to simplify our lives with technology, the more we impact them with physical ailments related to lack of physical activity and movement. Depending on whom you talk to, computers are either the best thing in the world or the worst. The fact is computers and technology are here to stay and are only going to become more intertwined in our daily lives. It is estimated that over 60 percent of the population uses computers, and of that number, more than 50 percent spend more than three hours a day sitting in front of them. This is the real computer virus!

Do you recognize the symptoms – head forward posture, neck and shoulder stiffness, headaches, rounded shoulders, elbow and wrist pain, hand numbness and tingling and finally an inability to communicate with anyone except via email? These are common ailments often seen with people who use computers or sustain

long periods at a workstation. The accumulated result of physical and emotional stresses is manifest as physical ailments in the body.

So how do we address these modern-day ills? There are a number of things you can do to help. Variety is important

In this weekly column, variety of foods is continually emphasized. There is a good reason for this. A steady diet of the same kinds of food always leads to health problems. All of us should try to introduced a lot of variety into our meals.

All vitamins and minerals are synergistic. This means they act with each other to produce best results. To ensure we have enough different vitamins and minerals, we need to each a lot of different foods.

Part of the problem with lack of health in today's society is that nobody is planning menus. A lot of the time, food is a last-minute notion on the way home from work, and often, the faster the food, the happier we are. There is nothing wrong with eating out, but even when doing so, look for options to introduce variety into your diet. For example, let's say you are having a hamburger and fries. Make it a deluxe hamburger with lots of onions, lettuce and tomato. Tomorrow, how about a salad with ice cream for dessert? Maybe you should go to a buffet-style restaurant where you can load up on a real variety of items from the salad bar. Even if you eat out, you can introduce a lot of variety.

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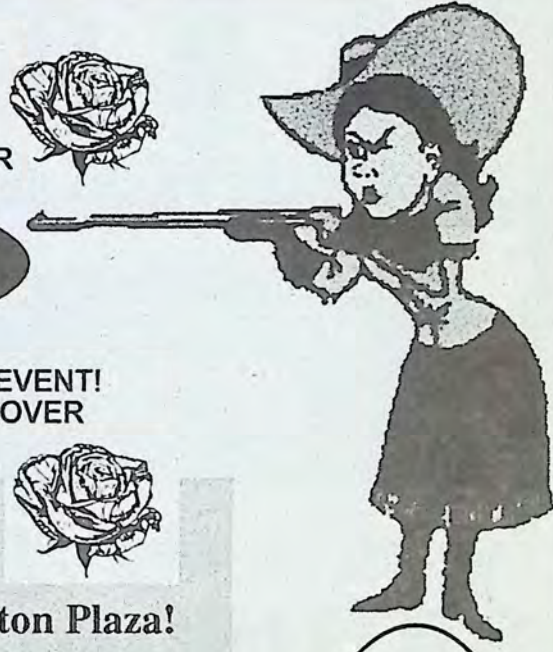

Lozinski said RCMP would like to be more active at the secondary school doing more searches, including searches with dogs, in school bags, lockers and cars. He would like to see sessions for training parents about drugs, drug effects and drug use symptoms, and drug paraphernalia. He noted the RCMP is involved in bike rodeos at elementary school level and in work experience programs with secondary students.

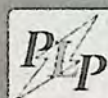

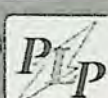

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Rodeo: our own kind of sport

During the next two months, Similkameen Valley residents will host three rodeos – Chopaka on Easter Sunday, Princeton Canadian Pro Rodeo on the weekend before the long weekend in May, and Keremeos Elks B.C.R. A. rodeo on the May long weekend.

North America "owns" a few sports – hockey, basketball, lacrosse and rodeo. Rodeo belongs to the west. The sport was developed as part of western ranch life, when cowhands (and anybody else) would gather around the corral fence and watch riders "break" mustangs or rope cattle. Cowhands began to compete with each other to demonstrate levels of skill, and eventually, the competition became organized into the sport we call rodeo. Rodeo is more than a sports event. The tradition of rodeo emerges from ranch life, and early rodeo events took place on ranches, just as Chopaka Rodeo does today. Along with the sport and its prizes for the best cowboys, there was socializing and often a meal and a dance. People travelled long distances to go to a rodeo, not just for the sport, but to see old friends, meet new friends, maybe do some romancing, and perhaps swap stories and make deals. All of this sort of thing goes on at today's rodeos.

Danger is a feature of rodeo sports, and few non-ranching people fully appreciate how dangerous the sport can be. Most people think of car racing or snowboarding as dangerous sports, but there is a key difference to rodeo. When you race a car, or ride a snowboard, the car or the snowboard is not doing its own thinking. When you ride a bronc or a bull, the animal is using its own mind and any rodeo professional will tell you the animal is the "wild card" of the sport. Horses have been known to kick or trample a downed rider, and bull riders

face the continual fear of being gored by the bull they rode. Many bull riders have been killed that way, even a few of the best. Although bull riders and bronc busters have to stay on the animal for only eight seconds, it is the longest eight seconds in the world, and then they have to get out of harm's way even if they can last the time.

Danger in rodeo can be part of the sport even when it looks like one of the so-called "easier" events, such as barrel racing. Many ladies have ended a barrel race with a broken leg when the horse took the barrel too tight or skidded and fell. Calf roping injuries often come from a hard to handle calf breaking the roper's ribs with a wild kick. Steer wrestlers (bulldoggers) who miss the animal can suffer injuries by hitting the ground the wrong way.

The other wild card in rodeo sports involves the rider's own horse in calf roping, bulldogging, team roping and barrel racing. Any really good horse thinks for itself. Horses are trained to play a role in the sport along with the rider. The calf roper's horse is trained to keep the rope taut after the calf is roped. The bulldogger's horse is trained to move in close to the steer to prepare for the rider's leap to the steer's neck. On any given day at a rodeo, the horse may decide it does not feel like doing the sport, or may have its own idea of how to do it. The horse may decide it does not like some other horse or some person at the chute or gate, and may take a notion to act up. Sometimes the horse can inflict serious injury on the rider by its sudden decision to do the unexpected.

Rodeo competitors face other problems as well as those above. The cowboy can lose a lot of money if he is having a bad day, or if he is injured. The Hollywood image of the broke,

busted-up old cowboy is not so far from the truth. A bronc buster can come out of the chute, be bucked off, and hear the announcer say, "No time for the cowboy." This means a zero score and there go the fees. To enter his next rodeo, he has to come up with more money for entry fees.

As in all sports, rodeo has its various levels of competition ranging from high school rodeo to Canadian Pro, Senior Pro, and a really top competitor will go to the international finals in Las Vegas, Nevada, for a shot at the World Championship. There have been local world champions, notably Trevor Thompson, who was World Champion Bullrider at the high school level, and the most famous South Okanagan World Champion, Kenny McLean, who won so many titles he became a legend by the time he was 40 years old.

For those who have never attended a rodeo, or feel it is mean to animals, perhaps it is time to take a look at rodeo from another perspective. First, the animals in rodeo are looked after especially because they are rodeo animals. Those bulls in rodeo would be hamburger if they were not valuable for rodeo. The broncs would be dog food. These animals are prized for their wildness, which would not be tolerated long in an ordinary cattle herd or riding stable. Rodeo saves their lives. As for being treated badly – forget it. The broncs, bulls and steers usually win and they often get revenge. Go to a rodeo with the perspective of seeing the sport as one of the most skilled and dangerous in the world, and applaud those cowboys and cowgirls who overcome all of the obstacles and face all of the dangers to win top spot.

- 1-tsp salt

- 3/4-cup sugar
- 2-tsp salt
- 1-tsp cinnamon

Add, working in thoroughly:

- 7-cups flour

Work in:

- 4-tsp soft shortening

Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down and roll out 1/4-inch thick. Cut into doughnuts. Let rise and fry in deep fat. Roll in powdered sugar.

ORDER

WHEREAS:

- A. Princeton Light and Power Company, Limited ("PLP") filed its 2004/05 Revenue Requirements Application on March 8, 2004 seeking approval of permanent increases in its Service Charges and Energy Charges of 14.7 percent and 0.4 percent, respectively, and seeking approval of an interim increase to its Access Charges of 4 percent, effective April 1, 2004; and
- B. The Application was predicated in part by the purchase of the energy component from its supplier, Aquila Networks Canada (British Columbia) Ltd. ("Aquila"), and the pass-through of those costs to PLP customers; and
- C. Commission Order No. G-10-04 approved for PLP a 3.6 percent interim increase in the energy component of rates for all customers as a pass-through of increased power purchase costs from, Aquila, effective January 1, 2004; and
- D. A Commission decision on rate changes in respect of Aquila's 2004 Revenue Requirements Application is pending and therefore the Commission is currently not in a position to establish a permanent increase in Energy Charges to PLP customers; and
- E. The Commission has reviewed PLP's Application and finds that the increases to PLP's Service, Access and Energy Charges should be approved on an interim and refundable basis, effective April 1, 2004.

NOW THEREFORE pursuant to Sections 58, 61, 89 and 91 of the Utilities Commission Act, the Commission orders as follows:

1. The Commission approves PLP's applied for Energy Charge on an interim basis, effective April 1, 2004, subject to refund with interest following a decision of the Commission on the Aquila Revenue Requirements Application that will establish the pass-through Energy Charge to PLP.
2. The Commission approves PLP's applied for Service and Access Charges on an interim basis, effective April 1, 2004, subject to refund with interest following a written public hearing process under the Regulatory Timetable attached as Appendix A to this Order.
3. PLP must provide a copy of this Order to previous Intervenor and Interested Parties no later than Friday, April 2, 2004. PLP must also post a copy of this Order in various community centres and give notice through other community resources, in order to adequately notify its customers of the applied-for rate increases.
4. Intervenor and interested Parties are to inform the Commission, in writing by Thursday, April 8, 2004, of their intention to actively intervene in the proceeding, or become Interested Parties. PLP is to provide all Registered Intervenor with copies of the Application, all correspondence and filed documentation. PLP is to provide all Interested Parties with copies of the Application's Executive Summary and all Orders issued.
5. Information requests from Intervenor about issues concerning the Application are to be filed with other Intervenor, the Commission and PLP by Friday, April 23, 2004.
6. PLP shall respond to all information requests no later than Friday, April 30, 2004.
7. Intervenor may submit written submissions on the Application to other Intervenor, the Commission and to PLP by Friday, May 7, 2004.
8. PLP shall reply to the written submissions of Intervenor by Friday, May 14, 2004 after which time the Commission will make its determination on the Application.

There should have been more information fed to the media from all sources including Envirogreen, the Canadian Food Inspection Agency, Town Council and Area H.

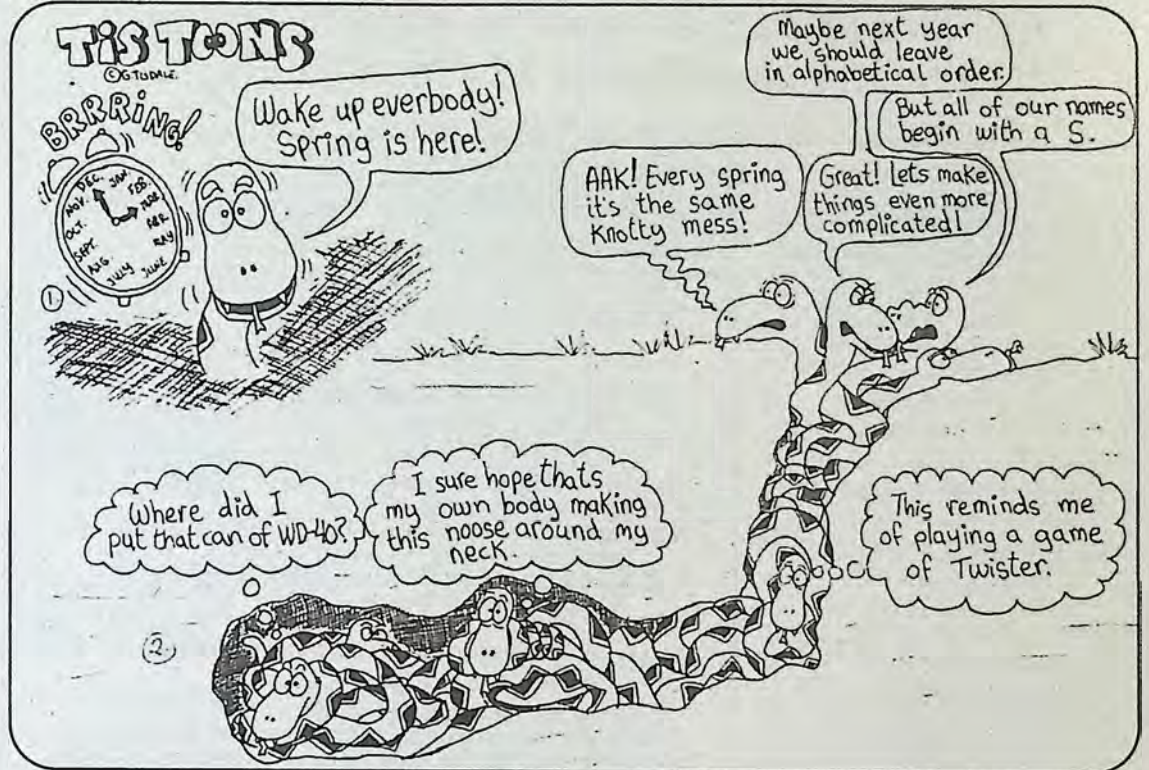
Had there been more information, maybe some of these misunderstandings we've been hearing may not have taken place.

PXA okays motocross track plan

Construction began on the motocross track at Princeton Exhibition grounds. Princeton Motorsports Club presented a map of the track layout to Princeton Exhibition Association at a special meeting on March 23. Stan Thompson, President of Princeton Rodeo Club, disputed one section of the map due to his perception that it would interfere with rodeo parking. Motorsports members agreed to change the configuration of the track to comply with Thompson's need for cowboy parking space north of the demolition derby pit.

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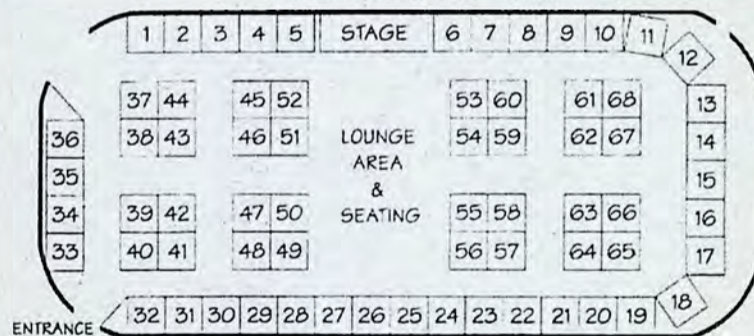

Citizens Assembly on Electoral Reform will hold public meetings across B.C. in May/June

The Citizens Assembly on Electoral Reform has issued a Preliminary Statement to the People of British Columbia inviting public input on B.C.'s electoral system and on the specific values British Columbians want reflected in it, such as local representation, voter choice and proportionality.

The Assembly stressed it has not come to any conclusion about whether the present electoral system needs to be reformed. "In fact, we have deliberately refrained from doing so. This is a time for discussion and debate and we invite all British Columbians to join us in this process."

The 160-member Assembly did say any alternative system to be considered "must reflect the values it believes are central to the political health of the province's democracy."

It went on to outline two important defining features of the electoral system:

1. Local representation: "Our tradition has long valued a system of representation that provides for local representation - for its politicians to speak for and answer to the distinctive communities that make up the whole province (The Assembly) anticipates any reformed electoral system would need to maintain a strong element of local representation."

2. Proportionality: "The Assembly believes it is important that the outcome of an election, in terms of the distribution of seats in the Legislature, should reflect the expressed intentions of citizens as expressed in their votes. This is the principal of proportionality - seats won should be proportional to votes won."

There are a number of possible proportional systems. The

Assembly believes these offer rich possibilities for B.C. and deserve careful consideration. Systems not responsive to the goal of increasing the proportionality of the system would seem to offer little in the way of advantage over the single-member plurality system we now use.

The Assembly wants to hear from British Columbians. It wants to hear if the public shares its conviction that local representation needs to be an important element in the province's electoral system, and whether a more proportional system would better reflect the basic values of our province's population. It wants to hear what kind of choices the public would like to see at the polls.

The Assembly will be holding public hearings in 49 communities across B.C. in May and June. The public hearings will be immediately followed by a meeting in Prince George June 26-27 at which members will discuss what they heard from British Columbians during the hearings.

Plot thickens on stolen pick-up truck

On March 26, Princeton RCMP received a complaint of an abandoned auto in the alley off Vermilion Avenue. A 1980 blue Mazda 323 with a stolen licence plate was left, wires cut under the dash. The vehicle had not been reported stolen and was last known to be at an auto wreckers yard to be crushed.

It now appears that somebody stole a valid licence plate, put it on a poorly running vehicle, drove that vehicle to Princeton, abandoned it and stole a dark green Ford F350 pick-up truck licence #0867GT.

Members of the Assembly must decide by December 15 if they will propose a change to B.C.'s current system of translating votes into seats in the Legislature. If they recommend a change, it will be the subject of a referendum for all voters in the May 2005 provincial election. Any change approved by the voters would take effect with the 2009 election.

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
