## Nicole Bertrand wins Weyerhaeuser scholarship

The Weyerhaeuser Community Foundation Scholarship was awarded to 18-year old Nicole Bertrand of Princeton. The scholarship is worth \$4,000 US for four years, totalling \$16,000 US. The Grade 12 PSS student says she intends to study sciences at University of Saskatchewan. She qualified for the award as her father, Brian, works for the company at the local mill.

## Deer problem will take time to solve

The ongoing aggressive deer problem in Princeton will not be solved overnight.

Princeton Town Council met with Conservation Officer Al Lay before last Monday nights Council meeting to discuss options.

Council explained there are regulations regarding the feeding of dangerous animals, but deer are not considered dangerous.

"The regulations are for bears and cats, but not deer," Mayor Keith Olsen said.

An education program, with the use of local media, was discussed as a possible start to a

long transition in moving residents away from feeding or encouraging deer to come near their homes.

"This problem has been building up over a number of years with people feeding," Olsen pointed out.

"By stopping the feeding program, you will not get rid of the problem."

Olsen explained that in the wilds the strong survive and with residents feeding deer in town, they have allowed the weaker animals to survive.

"They have, in effect, passed on the weaker gene."

When a member of the public asked who would be liable in case

of injury from a deer, Administrator Cornie Froese stated,

"Sue whoever you want."

Froese offered a possible solution to the problem of aggressive deer in the community.

"We may have to cull the herd."

Councillor Ray Jarvis summed up the situation with the statement, "There's a lot of ignorant people in town who don't realize they shouldn't be feeding the deer."

Town Council will further examine the situation, with the aid of the Conservation Officer, to come up with a reasonable solution.

## \$1.4 million coming for TCT upgrade

The section of the Trans-Canada Trail from Kingsvale (Brookmere) to Summerland will receive a huge cash injection.

Area H Director Gerry Logan made the announcement at a barbeque hosted by Similkameen Valley Planning Society last Wednesday night.

A total of \$1.4-million dollars will be spent on culvert inspection and clean out, signage, leveling, trail bypasses, new bridges, five major trailheads, tunnel stabilization and rock scaling.

Logan says it's all part of a plan by Tourism BC to market the TCT to the world.

"We have to be ready here folks," she warned.

"It's a lot of money and we have to educate our residents about the importance of this trail."

All local trail societies will be involved in the upgrade by providing input into the project.

"This is going to be a boon to us and we have to put our energy into this project," Logan explained.

"This is an outstanding trail system."

Councillor Lorne Esselink supported Logan's comments and added, "Tourism is a big part of our economy in Princeton and it's going to become a bigger part of the economy."

The timeline for the trail project is not known at this time, but is expected to begin some time during

this tourist season.

Similkameen EDO Michael McLaughlin says the Trans-Canada Trail system will benefit Princeton area business.

"We are very advantaged by our location," he says.

Being a few hours drive from Vancouver and close to the Okanagan puts the region in a great position for drawing traffic from both areas.

"I see steady growth and development," McLaughlin says.

The damage to the trail in the Okanagan Mountain fire last summer has put pressure on this end of the TCT as travellers have altered plans to visit here avoiding the fire damaged area.

## Drug round-up

### Sgt. Lozinski says RCMP will keep up the pace of drug searches

Princeton RCMP Sgt. Kurt Lozinski spoke to Town Council at last Monday nights meeting.

Lozinski brought Council members up to date on the drug problem in the community.

Local police have executed an average of one search per week this fiscal year. A total of 35 searches were carried out last fiscal year (April 2003 to April 2004).

"Obviously we have a drug problem and a demand here we have to control."

Lozinski estimates a total of 3,000 marijuana plants have been seized in the past year with one search yielding 1,600 plants alone.

There has also been a quantity of packaged cocaine seized in the area.

"It seems like we have more drugs but it's because we're proactive," Lozinski told Council, "Other communities do not do as many searches."

Mayor Keith Olsen thanked the police for their efforts, "We're pleased you're staying on top of the drug problem and we'd like to see the day we are a drug free community."

Lozinski warned there are danger signs present in the community of a more serious problem.

"What scares me is the crystal meth I have touched on in this community," he said.

"My sources indicate there are only six people in town using it and nobody selling it."

Lozinski says he is concerned about sellers in Penticton and the close proximity to Princeton.

Kristie's mother hopes Princeton people will be there to cast votes for Kristie if she is at the top. The grand prize is a CD recording and 20 copies, a professional photo package, an acoustic guitar, and glamour gift certificates.

used for any physical activity," she added.

Council agreed the cost of any maintenance of the stagecoach was high as only a few qualified wheelwrights exist.

Clement made a motion to not renew the insurance and to retire the stagecoach to the status of a historic item to be left in stationary display.

He offered help by pointing out clean air, clean water and natural resources are all values.

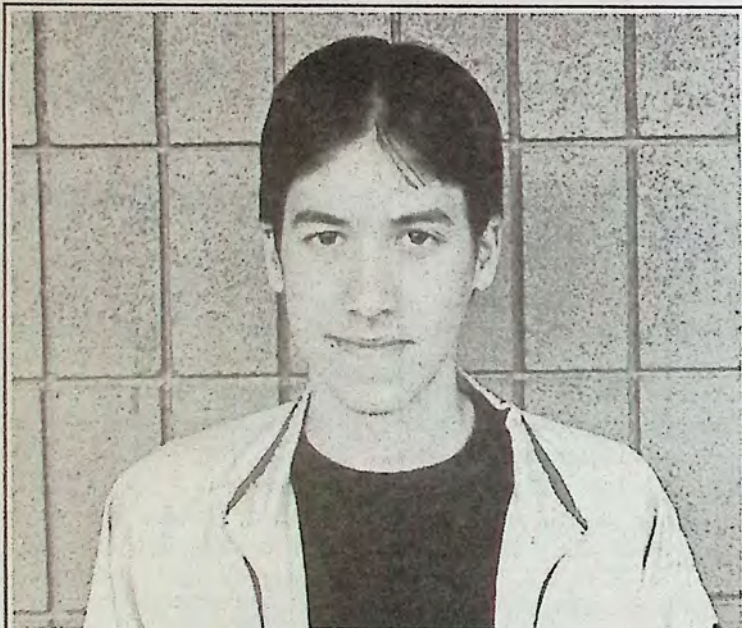
The best suggestion to come out of the session was 'History, Nature, Beauty' which McLaughlin said would provide

**Council issues challenge to students**

In an effort to combat vandalism, Keremeos Village Council has devised a plan which will involve area youth. A delegation, consisting of Councillors Jeremy Evans and Terry Zeller will present a vandalism challenge to students of Similkameen Elementary Secondary School at a school assembly.

**Book #7 remembers vets**

The Peace Tower in the nation's capital is home to Canada's six Books of Remembrance. These treasures are testaments to Canada's past, for their very title they remind us to never forget the foundations of courage on which Canada is built. The books commemorate those who lost their lives in the First and Second World Wars, the Korean War, the 1885 Nile Expedition and the South African War, as well as the Merchant Navy and the Newfoundland and Labrador Forces. Veterans Affairs Canada is asking Canadians to help them create the Seventh Book of Remembrance. Entitled *In the Service of Canada - The Seventh Book of Remembrance*, it will recognize members of the Canadian Forces who died in service to their country since 1947, and whose death is attributable to their military service, exclusive of those commemorated in the *Book of Remembrance - The Korean War*.

Veterans Affairs Canada is working with the National Archives of Canada in researching and identifying the names of those who will be commemorated in the book. To ensure the complete accuracy and integrity of this book, the Department is also asking Canadians to come forward with any information they may have on members of the Canadian Forces who have died since 1947 as a result of their service. The type of information required includes the rank, name, post nominals, service number, Branch, Unit, Higher Headquarters, and date of death. Canadians who have information are asked to e-mail it to commemoration@vac-acc.gc.ca or to mail it to Veterans Affairs Canada, Canada Remembers, Seventh Book of Remembrance Project, 66 Slater, 12th Floor, Ottawa, Ontario, K1A 0P4. This endeavour will help ensure that we continue to keep alive the achievements, and sacrifices made by those who served.

Cousins Renee and Hallie Willis will be competing at this weekends Princeton Pro Rodeo.

Renee will participate in Ladies Barrel Racing on Saturday with Hallie running the barrels during Sunday morning's slack.

Hallie, 24, scored well in 2001. Her career earnings at the time totalled \$40,932. She finished the year in 13th place with \$10,437 in winnings. She has been a CPRA

member since 1997 and her achievements include Canadian High School Finals LBR Champion 1996; CPRA LBR Rookie of the Year 1997 and CPRA LBR Permit Award Winner 1997.

Renee, 15, became a CPRA member last year.

Her career earnings totalled \$16,448, placing her in 10th place at the end of her rookie year in CPRA.

Renee placed in 22 of 34 rodeos in 2003 for an average of .640 and her best win was \$2,474 earned in Ponoka, Alberta.

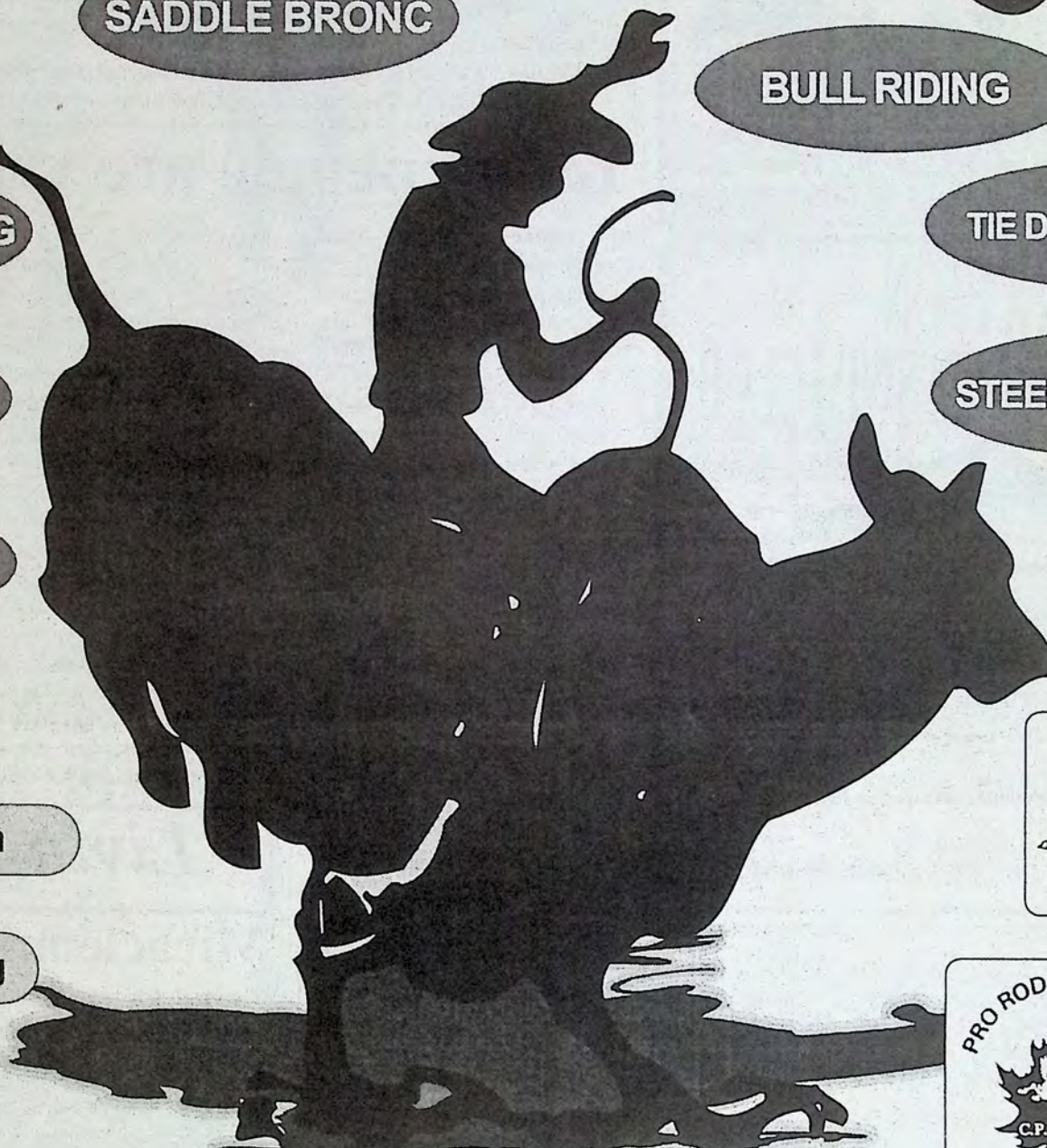

Robert F. Kennedy, author and former U.S. Senator, once said, "Our answer is the world's hope: it is to rely on youth."

Princeton's children and young people are valuable resources within their own families and community. They are bright, helpful and positive. Each day we see a young person mentoring a fellow student within our schools, organizing activities, volunteering their time, and problem-solving with adults on such issues as drugs in our community. As a family and community, we need to value and listen to our young people.

Think about a time when you did a project that allowed you to make decisions, have input that others took seriously, and capitalized on your talents and knowledge. How

did you feel?

Not only did you probably feel excited and energized, you also felt empowered. Even when the project encountered difficult obstacles, you were more likely to complete the project when you had an important, meaningful role in it.

Youth as resources is an ASSET adults need to tap more often. Having young people give their opinions and giving them a chance to act on their ideas provides them with useful roles in our community. As children, these roles start in families and at home. As children grow, they have roles in their schools, their congregations, their clubs, and their com-

munity. Children and youth know these roles are useful and meaningful.

Building this asset entails valuing young people's talents, skills, interests and opinions. It means setting aside the old hierarchy that adults know best, youth know some, and children are too young to know anything or contribute. When we start seeing children and youth as valuable resources, our young people will start feeling empowered and contribute to our communities, our schools and our families in meaningful, thoughtful ways.

## Living Past 100

### Miracle mineral saves lives

Somebody is doing a local survey about the high incidence of cancer in the Similkameen Valley, and in Princeton in particular. StatsCan figures show B.C. has the highest rate of cancer. Cancer is the problem, and in this column, we have repeatedly offered a solution, but people do not seem to read and absorb the information.

Any geographic area lacking the mineral selenium will have a high rate of cancer and heart disease. B.C. is such a location. There is no selenium in our soil or water. We cannot get it through what we eat the way we get other minerals. China has faced this problem in two provinces, and for the past 40-plus years, has given selenium tablets free to every resident of those provinces. The cancer and heart disease rate dropped dramatically.

There is nothing secret about the way selenium is linked to preventing cancer. The information has been around for a long time. Why our health authorities do not insist everyone take selenium is more mysterious than the powerful preventative effects of selenium. To date, four types of cancer have been found to be caused by a virus. Selenium is the best virus-fighter in the spectrum of anti-virus natural elements.

Talk to any local rancher and you will find that all the ranchers put out salt blocks containing selenium. Without selenium, their herds become weaker, lack resistance to disease, and cows have calving problems. Why do we protect our livestock from selenium deficiency but do nothing to protect ourselves?

In Britain, another location lacking selenium, doctors treating patients for depression and anxiety now tell their patients to take selenium tablets. Is depression linked to overall poor health, or is lack of selenium playing a direct part in causing depression?

It would be interesting to learn whether our area is being surveyed for a link between high cancer rates and depression and heart disease. A study in Britain is targeting a possible link between chronic fatigue and selenium deficiency.

You have a choice. You can take selenium or not. However, you cannot change one fact: you need selenium and the only way to get it is by taking it in tablet form. There is none here.

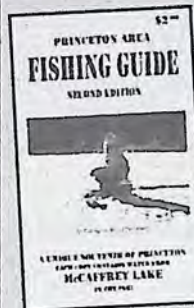

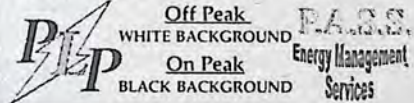

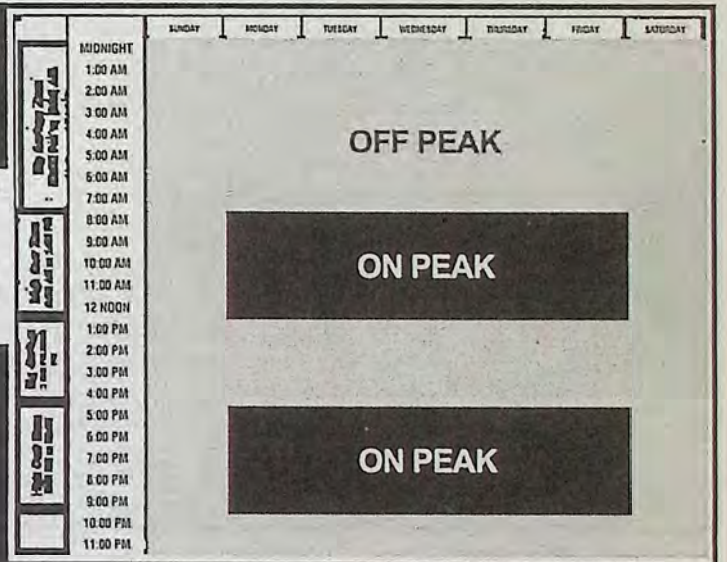

As for the extra cost to taxpayers, we say it will be worth it.

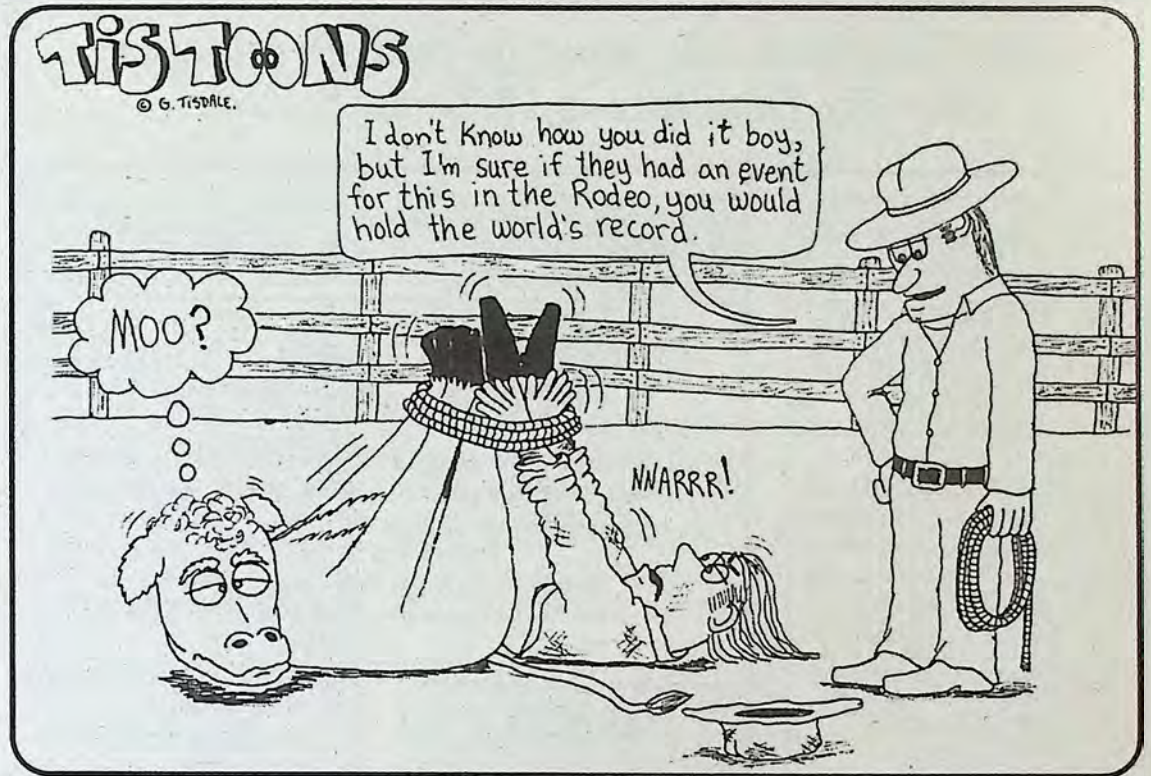
Either go for it, or eliminate all bylaws and see what happens.

### We lose our right to free speech

## Local man has doubts about methane project

Dear Editor:  
Methane gas problems?  
Are you concerned? See the April 28, 2004 information packet handed out by Petrobank Energy and Resources Ltd. (Petrobank) at the Legion Hall meeting of that date, also available at 2600 240 - 4th Avenue SW, Calgary, AB T2P 4H4.

1) Few jobs for the annoyance and potential risks involved: a) water supply, b) traffic, c) possible odors and airborne waste coming our way on westerly winds, d) potential health hazards, e) tourism (influence on it), f) disposal wastes (water, sulfur, etc.)

2) I attended the April 28 meeting at Legion Hall and after three hours of listening and asking questions, came to the following conclusion - it is too risky a proposition. a) the provincial government has already sold the lease to these people (Petrobank), so it is too late to object to that issue. b) When the Petrobank representatives pre-

sent were asked about any risks, i.e. to water supply, they could not guarantee no danger to health or no damages to environment. They say they are under strict government regulations, but we have seen how industry has continually come to court on violations, both intentional and accidental, in the past, and how they have fought penalties. c) When asked about a bond that would guarantee they would leave any abandoned wells in a secure, safe condition, they said they were not required by the province to have one. Where is this bond regulation showing strict enforcement by the government?

3) When asked what jobs would be created for our LOCAL people, they said possibly 24 or more jobs at first, some of which would be experts and trained people brought in from outside. Later, approximately four to six people would be able to run the program. So many risks for so few jobs, which may, at the most, last 20 years when the wells

(their words) "will normally be exhausted". Some last a little longer.

4) When asked where the gas is going: a) one Petrobank person said to California, b) another said into the provincial gas grid.

I see another resource, which we will need badly in the future, is going south, when our gas prices are going sky high - think back how your natural gas bills have gone up in the past three years!

I am especially concerned about the issue of water supply. This is the area which I have studied extensively. Our water table is dropping. Ask people who have had to drill their wells deeper locally because of this.

Also, we are entering a global warming period. We may have to deep-drill wells in our town in the near future. This would require us to go down and tap very deep aquifers, potentially the same ones the methane gas wells will be placed near.

dom of association."  
Section 7, under legal rights, reads, "Everyone has the right to life, liberty and security of the right NOT to be DEPRIVED thereof except in accordance with the principles of fundamental justice." The guide for that section spells out the basic legal protection that will safeguard us in our dealings with the state and the machinery of justice. They are designed to protect the individual and to ensure simple fairness should he or she be subjected to legal proceedings, particularly criminal cases.

Section 12 states, "Everyone has the right not to be subjected to any cruel and unusual treatment or punishment."

Look at Section 15 under Equality Rights and as this question of yourself and all whom you talk with about what the M.P.'s and the Senators have done to discriminate against the majority of Canadian citizens. Section 15 (1): "Every individual is equal before and under the law and has the right to the equal protection and equal benefit of the law without discrimination, and in particular, without discrimination based on race, national or ethnic origin, colour, religion, sex, age or mental or physical disability." So 22 years after Trudeau's Charter became law, the Senators, on Wednesday, April 28, 2004, just sabotaged it for the majority of Canadian citizens.

I challenge the readers of this article to contact your M.P. to get this Bill reversed or amended by

the next governing party in Canada.

This subject will haunt Paul Martin and his Liberals through the next election.

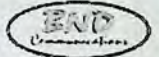

At the Cultural Centre behind the Legion on April 29 we set up an Art Show with the show on April 30 and May 1.

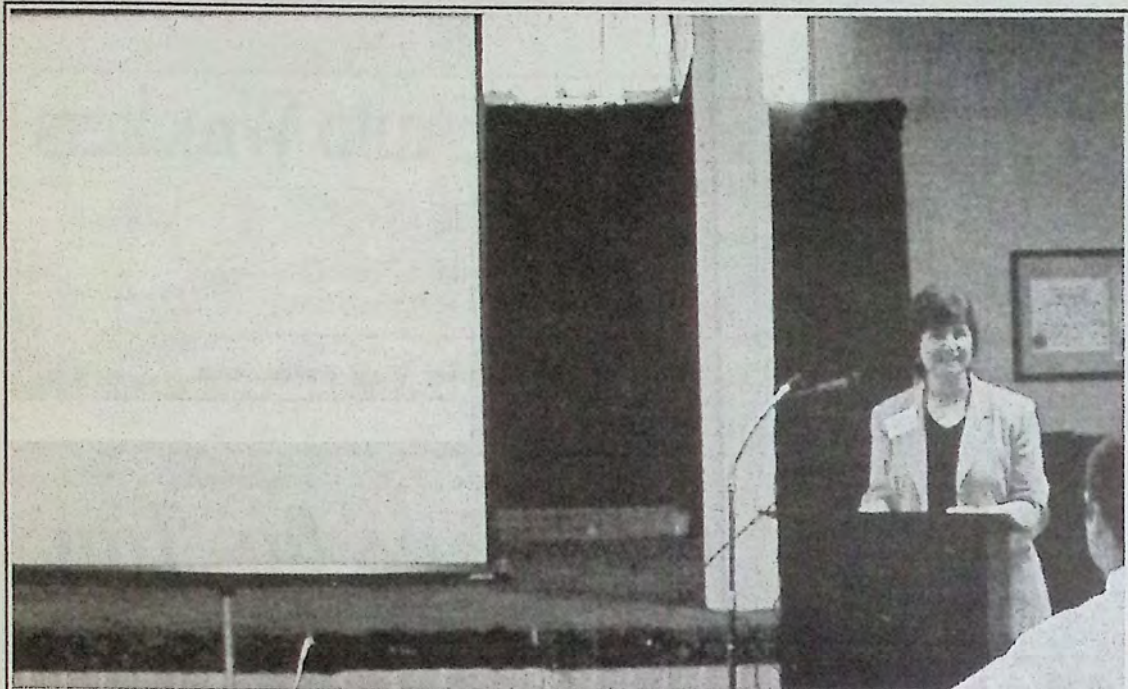

## Government explains coalbed gas laws

More than 50 local residents, and CHBC-TV, turned out to hear what the Ministry of Energy and Mines, and the Oil and Gas Commission, had to say about coalbed methane exploration in the Princeton and Tulameen basins. The meeting took place at the Legion Hall May 4.

Dallas Brant was on hand to represent MLA Dave Chutter. She said Chutter had visited coalbed methane extraction sites in Wyoming, Colorado and New Mexico, and had seen "the good, the bad, and the ugly". She said Chutter believes it can be "done right" in the Similkameen.

Mayor Keith Olsen spoke, thanking the ministry for coming, and said, "Council feels quite assured the regulations will maintain the beauty of the valley."

Area H Regional Director Gerri Logan spoke briefly, thanking people for attending and thanking the ministry for coming to explain coalbed methane.

Philippe Batini, manager for Upper Similkameen Indian Band, told the audience the Band has a strong interest in keeping a balance between preserving the environ-

ment and gaining economic strength.

Program Manager for the Ministry, Mary Coward, spoke of the opportunities for development of coalbed methane. She said an estimated 90 trillion cubic feet of gas is beneath B.C. soil, with 1.5 trillion in the Princeton area. She reminded people that the demand for natural gas is increasing while the supply is decreasing.

Devin Scheck, of the B.C. Oil and Gas Commission, which regulates oil and gas activities, said the Commission believes in sound development, conservation, and safe and efficient practices. The Commission screens applicants for permits, encourages participation of First Nations, and resolves disputes.

After drilling a test hole, the company must determine whether or not it is economically feasible to go into production. At that point, an application for development would be made, and owners of private lands would make an agreement with the company for access.

As water pumped from the wells is considered "waste", Water, Land

and Air Protection Ministry people would monitor what is done with the water.

Bruce Cazes talked about compliance and enforcement. He stated the government inspects each coalbed methane project from start to finish, from wells to pipelines to noise and odour complaints to land reclamation. He reminded everyone that the Oil and Gas Commission has more than 50 years experience with natural gas development.

Les Macdonald advised there is a new, up-to-date Environmental Management Act coming which will regulate coalbed gas produced water. There will be a new Coalbed Gas Produced Water Practices Code. Water quality is based on salinity and toxicity to aquatic life. If it is not up to standard, it must be treated before being released into a stream.

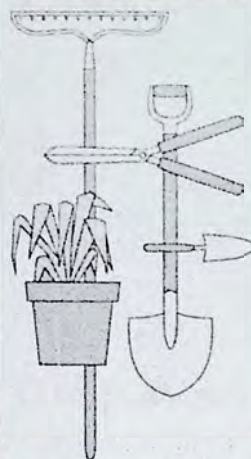

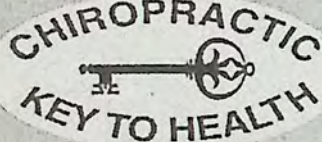

Environmental Resource Information Project which is aimed at keeping the public informed. Princeton

is a "pilot" area for the project. At the end of the presentation, the public was invited to enjoy a grand

offering of sandwiches, and to ask questions of individual representatives. During the presentations and the question period, CHBC-TV kept the camera rolling and interviewed various people. Local residents talked to each other about how they feel. The best suggestion heard by the News Leader was a proposal to have a local stakeholders group to monitor the coalbed methane project.

"We've heard two sides - the proponent (Petrobank) and the government," he said. "The public distrusts both. What we need is a group of local people who can deal with both, see it for themselves, and tell the public."

He made his views clear to the government representatives. Energy and Mines will be back in the future, as the coalbed methane test well is evaluated. If economic development is not feasible, the whole thing will go away. If is feasible, local residents will hear a lot more.
