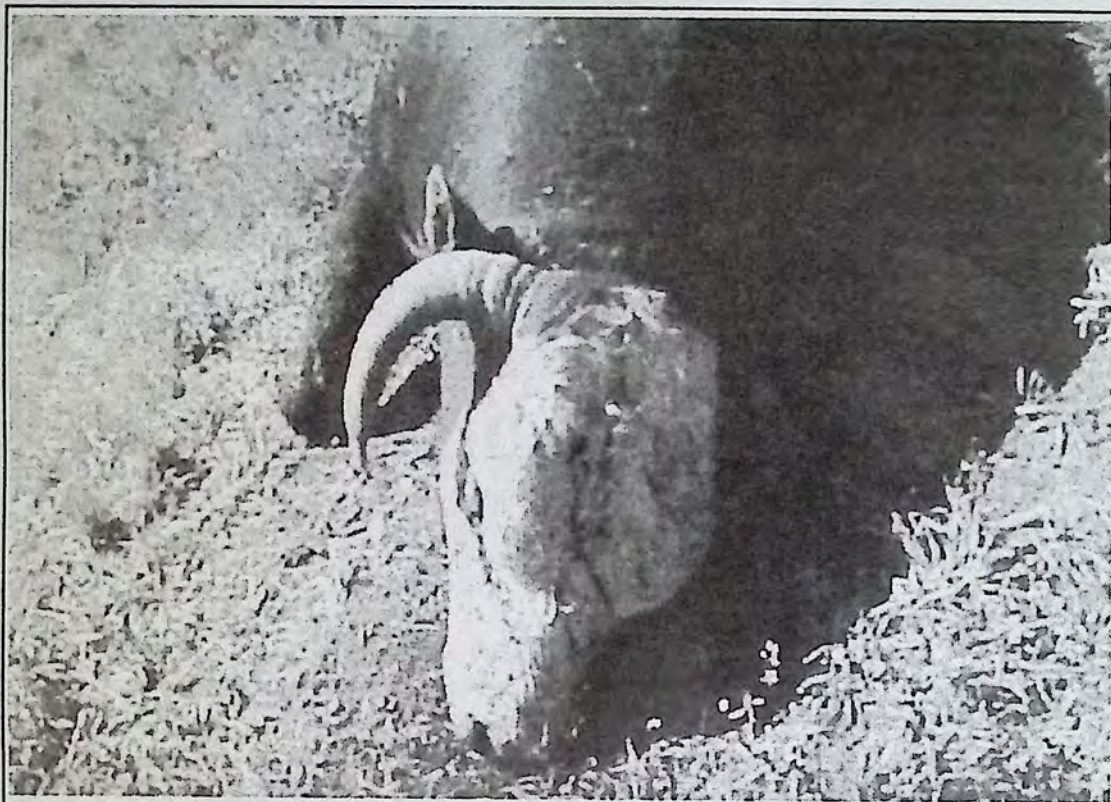

## Police seek shooter



Purebred Hereford bull lies dead, victim of criminal cruelty.

### Crook kills Hereford bull

Some unknown person or persons used a purebred Hereford bull for target practice. RCMP believe the bull was killed during the week of May 9 - 15. The animal was shot numerous times in a clearing off West China Creek Road on the outskirts of Princeton. The animal is valued at \$5,000.

Princeton Detachment RCMP officers have several leads but are asking the public for assistance in identifying the person or persons responsible for this animal cruelty.

### Air traffic

### shows increase

Princeton's airport traffic shows more fly-ins this year than last, Councillor Ray Jarvis reported to Town Council on May 17. He noted 76 landings this year to that date, as compared with 30 last year. A total of 181 people have flown to Princeton this year.

Councillor Jarvis told Council the Airport Committee will look into the potential for having shuttle flights available for local residents to fly from Princeton Airport to the South Terminal in Vancouver. He said he is investigating the possibility of having a glider flight school in Princeton and hopes to have it here next year.

This year, on September 17, 18 and 19, there will be a national Jet Rally competition for remote control airplanes. Councillor Jarvis told Council the Airport Committee will review safety and security issues before this event to ensure it conforms to airport regulations.

Council tabled a request for practice dates.

### Town lets paint tender

Traffic lines will be painted in Princeton by Active Traffic Markers at a cost of \$7,388.78. At the May 17 Town Council meeting, bids were received from three other companies - G & D Linemarking (\$7749.21), Alpine Line Painting (\$7,998.25) and Aardvark Pavement Marking Services \$7,464.78.

## Business group sets priorities

Members of Princeton Area Business Enhancement Association met May 18 at Copper Mountain Bar & Grill to discuss goals and set priorities. Similkameen Valley Economic Development Officer Michael McLaughlin acted as facilitator for the workshop meeting.

Many members vented their feelings about a number of concerns regarding the lack of effective signage on the approaches to town, the need for improved customer service, and the need to finish some projects.

The first priority set was to complete Karl Lang Park, a triangular area at the west of town, hemmed by Highway 3 and Mayne Avenue. A committee will work on that project. There is money in the bank, and commitments made by local residents to do some work on the project.

### Chopper airlifts crash victim

Barry Shay, age 45, of Oliver, B.C., was airlifted to Royal Columbian Hospital in New Westminster following a serious vehicle crash in Manning Park.

The crash occurred around 6:00 p.m. Friday, May 20, on Highway 3 45 km. west of Princeton. The vehicle went off the highway to the right where it went into a small ditch then became airborne, slamming into a tree near the driver's door.

Passing motorists found Shay

unconscious in the vehicle and called for help.

Princeton RCMP, Fraser Valley Traffic Services, Hope Search and Rescue and BC Ambulance attended, removing him from the vehicle and arranging for a helicopter and airlift. The highway was closed for an hour during the rescue. Police did not report the extent of the injuries. Police do not know the exact cause of the crash but believe speed may have been a factor. The investigation is continuing.

Promoting downtown activity was

priority number three. Members agreed that it would include such things as sidewalk sales, art shows, and perhaps music events, but all of these would need input from downtown businesses to get together to plan some kind of events. Along with this would be the responsibility to improve customer service so employees would need to know what is going on in the community and promote it.

Along with the third priority, a "Welcome Visitor" program was enthusiastically endorsed. Sharan Jung explained how it worked: people who are knowledgeable about the area and its history would host a weekly session for visitors and explain some facet of the community. She had seen it work wonders in Fort Nelson and felt it could work here. Anyone willing to participate in this program should leave their name and phone number at the Skills Centre, attention Sharan Jung.

The fourth priority is the development of Princeton Airport. How can an airport be developed to provide an economic boost to a community? That question will be answered at a future meeting. When members are sure they know what they want to see happen, they will lobby Town Council to begin to make it happen.

The next meeting of the BEA will be on June 20 in the conference room at Copper Mountain Bar & Grill.



### Friends honour rancher

The many friends of longtime rancher Doug Currie attended his funeral in the United Church Hall last week. Born in Alberta in 1915, he passed away May 16, 2004, after a long life in which he turned his hand to many lines of work. Friends paid tribute to him in three eulogies during the service, sharing precious memories of time spent with "the last of the real cowboys".

James Douglas Currie was a charter member of Princeton Racing Days Association. He and his wife, Edith, raised race horses as well as operating a large ranch enterprise.

Doug Currie was noted for his love of life, his great sense of humour, and his straightforward manner of speech, as well as a generous spirit. He was respected for his knowledge of horses, ranching, and his willingness to work hard.

**Municipalities protest Bill 75**

B.C. municipalities have expressed their opposition to Bill 75, a piece of provincial legislation which gives the provincial government the power to override local government bylaws, policies and powers. The District of North Vancouver has advised other municipalities it will take the provincial government to court, and asked other municipalities to help bear the legal costs.

Although little has been discussed about it at Princeton Town Council meetings, Council has stated its opposition to Bill 75 through support of UBCM motions. No delegations to Council by the business community have expressed opposition, despite the fact that Bill 75 will allow the provincial government to override Council decisions regarding private or mixed public/private projects if the provincial government deems these projects to be in the broader provincial interests.

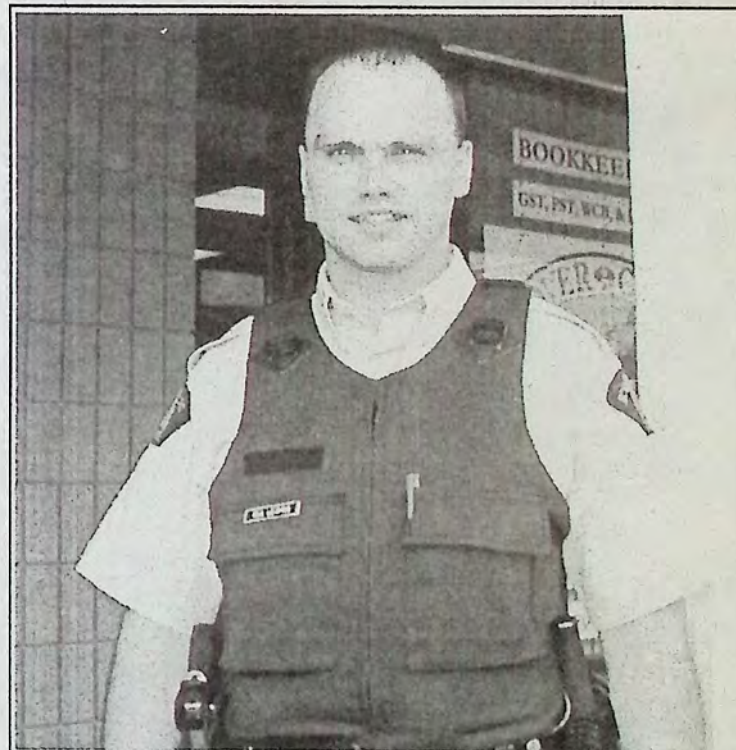
The resolution by the District of north Vancouver points out that Bill 75, the Significant Projects Streamlining Act, "has the potential to seriously undermine the current structure for ensuring cohesive regional-municipal land use planning and the important public safety protection that local government review and input brings to project development".

The municipal Corporation of Delta passed a resolution to support the District of North

Vancouver on the grounds that Bill 75 contradicts the provincial promotion of the Community Charter as a vehicle for recognizing local government as a responsible and autonomous level of government. Delta has seen the "Catch-22" quality of the two pieces of legislation. The Community Charter downloads responsibility onto municipalities for a number of costly activities handled by the provincial govern-

ment, but at the same time, Bill 75 will take away the ultimate responsibility for municipalities and regional districts or Improvement Districts to make decisions about land use and project development.

Along with Delta, the City of Burnaby has indicated its willingness to share in the legal costs of a court challenge. Princeton Town Council has not committed any funds at this time.

## Accidents kept police busy over weekend

Princeton RCMP responded to a motor vehicle collision involving two cars at Whipsaw curve on Saturday morning at approximately 11:20 AM.

A 28-year old male driver from North Vancouver was charged with Driving Too Fast For Road Conditions after the Eastbound vehicle he was dri-

ving slid over the double solid line and side swiped a vehicle going the opposite direction.

Speed and wet road conditions were factors in the collision.

The RCMP advise the speed for that section of the highway is 30 km/h.

An hour later RCMP and other emergency services units

responded to a single motor vehicle collision on Highway 3 at Similkameen Falls.

The 46-year old male driver of an Eastbound vehicle which was towing a U-Haul trailer, failed to negotiate a right hand curve and crashed into a rock face.

The lone occupant had to be cut from the vehicle by rescue personnel and was transported to Princeton General Hospital with non-life threatening injuries.

Speed and the weight of the load in the trailer were contributing factors in the collision.

## Rain affects weekend activities

A few activities were cancelled, others were altered as a result of the rainy conditions over most of the long weekend.

A ball tournament in Hedley became a mud bog and a gymkhana in Keremeos was rained out.

The rains stopped just before the Powwow began near Keremeos Saturday and started up again once the powwow completed.

The weather also left slippery road conditions in its wake which kept RCMP and emergency crews busy.

Businesses located along

Highway 3 had a steady flow of business throughout most of the weekend, even with the rain.

Princeton Museum had a very busy weekend - 48 visitors alone on Saturday - as travellers looked for indoor activities to keep them occupied while in our area.

Few complaints were heard about the weather as most visitors and residents appear to be very aware of the forest conditions and potential fire hazards.

Some even hinted at celebrating the arrival of the weekend rainy conditions!

The weather improved by late Sunday afternoon.

## Reduced hours for InfoCentre

The Princeton and District Chamber of Commerce will try to keep it's Tourist InfoCentre open during weekends this tourist season.

The InfoCentre opened for the May long weekend, and with a reduction in funding provided by HRDC, Summer hours of operation will be affected.

Princeton Town Council has put pressure on the Chamber to provide tourist information services on weekends and holidays during Summer months, but has not yet offered funding to aid in achieving that goal.

Directors and members discussed the matter at an informal meeting of Chamber members last Thursday night.

The InfoCentre will be open regular hours weekdays and may be only open partial days on

weekends.

A final decision has not yet been made on how to address funding for the extra hours.

## Tourist visitor numbers strong

Visitor numbers are strong at the Princeton Tourist InfoCentre.

A total of 740 visits were recorded during the month of April, down just slightly from the 788 recorded a year ago.

For comparison, only 407 visits were recorded in April 2002 when the Chamber office was located in the old railway station building on Highway 3.

Last month's figures matched the 740 recorded three years ago when the Tourist InfoCentre was located near it's present location at the East entrance to town.

## Request brings parking review

A request by a downtown businessman will result in a complete review of downtown parking in Keremeos.

A parking variance application brought before Keremeos Village Council at their May 17th meeting requested a change in the off street parking requirements from 24 spaces to 12 spaces.

The approval was conditional on a Council review of the Parking

Bylaw, and conditional that Council may apply any amendments made in the review of the business owners development.

The variance revolves around a proposed 96 seat restaurant in the downtown core.

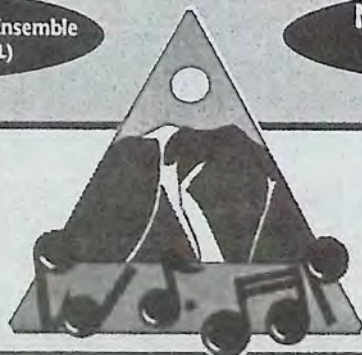

**Okanagan Nation protests**

Members of Okanagan Nation joined First Nations from throughout B.C. to protest provincial changes in forest legislation made without meaningful consultation and accommodation. On May 20, the front lawn of the capital building was the scene of a demonstration of displeasure by Indian Band members. Chief Stewart Philip, President of the Union of BC Indian Chiefs, member of the Title and Rights Alliance Steering Committee, stated, "This government has

made very significant legislative changes without meaningful consultation and accommodation that undermine legal advances made by Aboriginal Peoples in recent court decisions. This Victoria session will send a strong message to the provincial government that disregarding legal advances and utilizing divide and conquer tactics will no longer be tolerated. This government has clearly shown that legislating agreements does not produce a desirable result for either party."

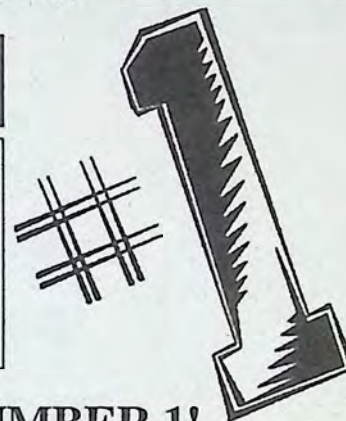
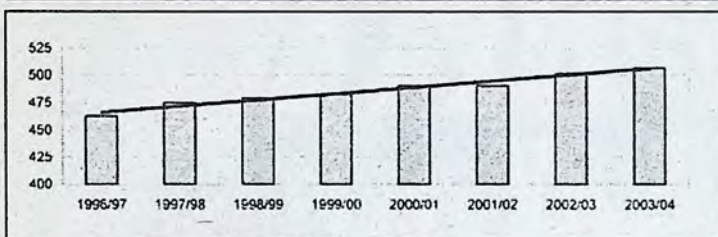

## Communities for Kids wants parents

There is a renewed effort afoot in Princeton to put the needs of kids from conception to six years of age at the front of the local agenda. On Wednesday evening, May 26, Princeton Communities for Kids will report on the past year's planning and invite ideas about where to go in the future.

One year ago, parents, caregivers and service providers held meetings in Princeton to discuss ways of supporting community based programs for expectant families, infants, toddlers and pre-schoolers. At those spring 2003 meetings, the concerns affecting families with young children included economic barriers, distances from special services, transportation issues and access to childcare.

From August to December 2003, Princeton Community Table was in a planning process led by table member Anna Markey. Action to secure good playschool access for more four year olds and research into local playground development are a sample of the type of work that is presently underway.

School readiness is a special interest of Communities for Kids. Princeton's daycare and

playschool centres continue providing needed supports to youngsters but recent cutbacks have decreased access for some families. A good Kindergarten or Grade 1 experience has much to do with what the child has been given in time and attention at home or in a nursery school setting and with the kind of time the child has had with other children.

Dr. Clyde Hertzman of UBC directed studies conducted lately in a number of B.C. communities, including Princeton, and the results of these studies have shown that many kids need help to be ready for school. The studies are pinned to knowledge gained from brain research and from a survey called the Early Development Instrument applied by Kindergarten teachers.

Communities for Kids aims to find ways to give even more kids access to good early childhood experiences and want to see that more children up to age six benefit from regular stimulating activity.

Princeton Community Table members are eager to report back to the citizens of Princeton and Regional District, and to hear

more new ideas and recruit more volunteers, especially parents, for Communities for Kids in Princeton.

The Communities for Kids Forum takes place May 26 at Vermilion Forks Elementary School from 7-9 p.m. Childminding is provided on site. Refreshments will be served. Everyone is welcome.

## Town awards dust control contract

At the May 17 Princeton Town Council meeting, tenders were opened for dust control product for the summer months. This product is put down on alleys, and on gravel roads such as Laurie Currie Way, to prevent dust blowing around.

Premium Dust Control, from Kamloops, received the contract to provide the product and put it in place at \$0.2386 per litre.

The Town of Princeton uses 15,000 to 20,000 litres of dust control product yearly.

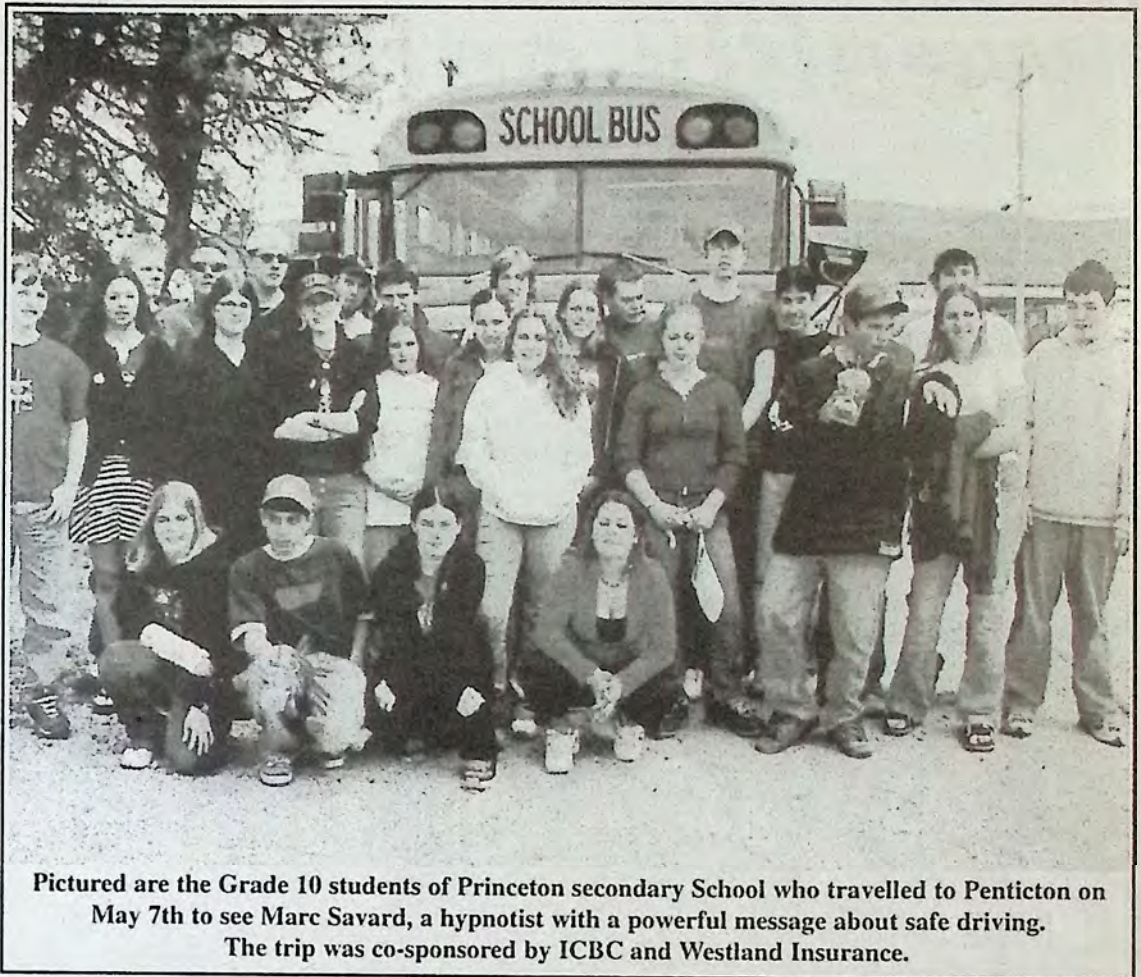

## Anti-bullying workshop was a success

Parents, teachers, administrators and Summer Recreation staff attended an anti-bullying workshop at John Allison Elementary School on Tuesday, May 18. Facilitator Gary Litke of the BC Teachers' Federation spoke about the signs of a bully, being bullied and the bystanders.

What is bullying? Dr. Dan Loweus states bullying is a pattern of repeated aggressive behaviour with negative intent directed from one child to another where there is a power imbalance. Bullying is equal among boys and girls. Boys tend to be more physically aggressive through pushing, shoving, spitting, kicking and hitting, while girls are more subtle through gossiping, setting up others to look foolish, spreading rumours or excluding from a group. Both genders utilize verbal abuse such as mocking, name-calling, teasing and giving dirty looks. Very serious bullying can lead to threatening with a weapon, stealing, defacing property or sexist, racist or homophobic taunting.

Signs should you watch for that your child or friend is being bullied include complaint of an upset stomach on a regular basis, sleepiness, avoiding school, missing personal possessions, lack of contact with friends, or coming home disheveled or hungry.

What can you do when your child is being bullied? Promote assertive behaviour. Self-confidence is the first line of defense against children who bully. Teach your child to look the other child in the eye, call them by name and tell them to stop what they are doing. Teach your child it is better than okay to speak with an adult about what is happening or what is uncomfort-

able. Communicate with your child. Ask your child how he is treated by others and how he treats others at school.

Discuss with your children different situations and teach them an appropriate response. Encourage and increase positive interactions. Encourage sleepovers, welcome friends over and include friends in family outings. Join a program that interests them. Encourage your child to spend time with friends. A loner is more easily targeted. Groups of children are less likely to be bullied.

Teach your children that being a bystander to a bad situation is as bad as being a bully. When bystanders walk away or challenge the bullying situation and speak up, they set a norm with other kids watching. As a group, they let the bully know it is not okay and they will not tolerate such behaviour. As adults do not see or hear about bullying, kids can become active witnesses,

standing up for their peers and taking responsibility for what happened among them.

Bullying is not a problem anyone should have to face alone. It is our job as adults to teach children empathy and that it is safe to report bullying. Always intervene. Adults play an important role in the socialization of children. Set positive examples of solving problems. Talk with other parents, your school and neighbourhood about bullying.

Remember: your interactions with your child and child's friends allow them to learn from you. You can make it clear what is accepted behaviour. Children and youth need their boundaries and expectations outlined for them. This is something everyone can help with. Through Asset Building, a community can help raise its children.

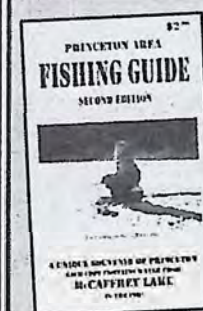

Apparently, nobody else is interested.

"It's unfortunate for the town of Princeton," Lubiak commented.

To insure ATV's for PL&PD, the owner must belong to some club and work with ATVBC. Individuals can join ATVBC and receive insurance that way, but insurance companies would prefer local clubs. Any ATV

operator found to be without insurance is subject to a \$350 fine, and if not wearing a helmet, an additional \$250 fine. The insurance would cost \$150 and club membership \$40.

New ATV regulations are expected to be made law by 2005. This would include vehicle registration, which will be a help in view of the high number of thefts of ATVs which cannot

now be traced. This will mean mandatory insurance, registration and licensing of all ATVs.

Before leaving, those who showed up received ATVBC application forms to complete. "It looks like the Princeton club is defunct," Lubiak said.

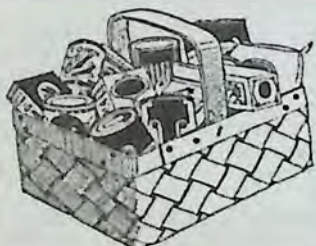

**TUNA BITES FOR DOGS OR CATS**

- 1 can tuna in water (include water)
- 1 cup rice flour
- 1 cup cornmeal
- 3/4 cup whole wheat flour
- 1/4 cup hemp seed oil
- 1/2 cup water

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Blend tuna, water and hemp seed oil. Combine dry ingredients and mix together, then add the blended liquid ingredients to the dry ingredients and mix. Knead dough and add more flour or water if necessary. With a rolling pin, roll dough on a flat surface, cut into small pieces and place on a cookie sheet. Bake for 10 - 15 minutes then shut off heat and let cool in oven. Freeze any portions you won't use within a week to 10 days.

### Putting conditions on the work of volunteers

Last week Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) received a \$1,000 operating grant and a \$32,000 grant (with unknown conditions) to construct a shower facility.

In the past, the operating grant was between \$4,000 and \$5,000, plus a matching operating grant from Regional District.

Neither were enough to cover expenses.

Utilities and insurance are costly at the property we now call Princeton Fairgrounds.

It's time the PXA started putting conditions on the way it operates the site, which is owned by the Town of Princeton.

Before accepting the responsibility of managing the use of the grounds for another year, the PXA should do so on the condition that the Town of Princeton cover the utility costs at the Fairgrounds for the next five years.

Water is not cheap, and there's no doubt the shower facility will go through lots of it once it becomes public knowledge.

Even a coin-operated shower will not cover costs.

The Town of Princeton should also pick up the tab for insuring the events hosted at the Fairgrounds, a debt each user group has had to cover in the past.

Failure on the part of the Town of Princeton to meet these conditions would put the PXA in a position to hand over the keys to the Fairgrounds and leave it up to Princeton Recreation Commission to operate - the way it should have been in the first place.

The volunteers (close to 500) who make up the handful of user groups managed by the PXA create events which attract hundreds and thousands of visitors to our area.

That's got to be worth more than a \$1,000 operating grant.

Maybe once the Town starts paying bills the PXA - and it's user groups - have graciously been doing for years, they will realize what a deal there were getting when volunteers did all the work and paid all the bills on Town owned property.

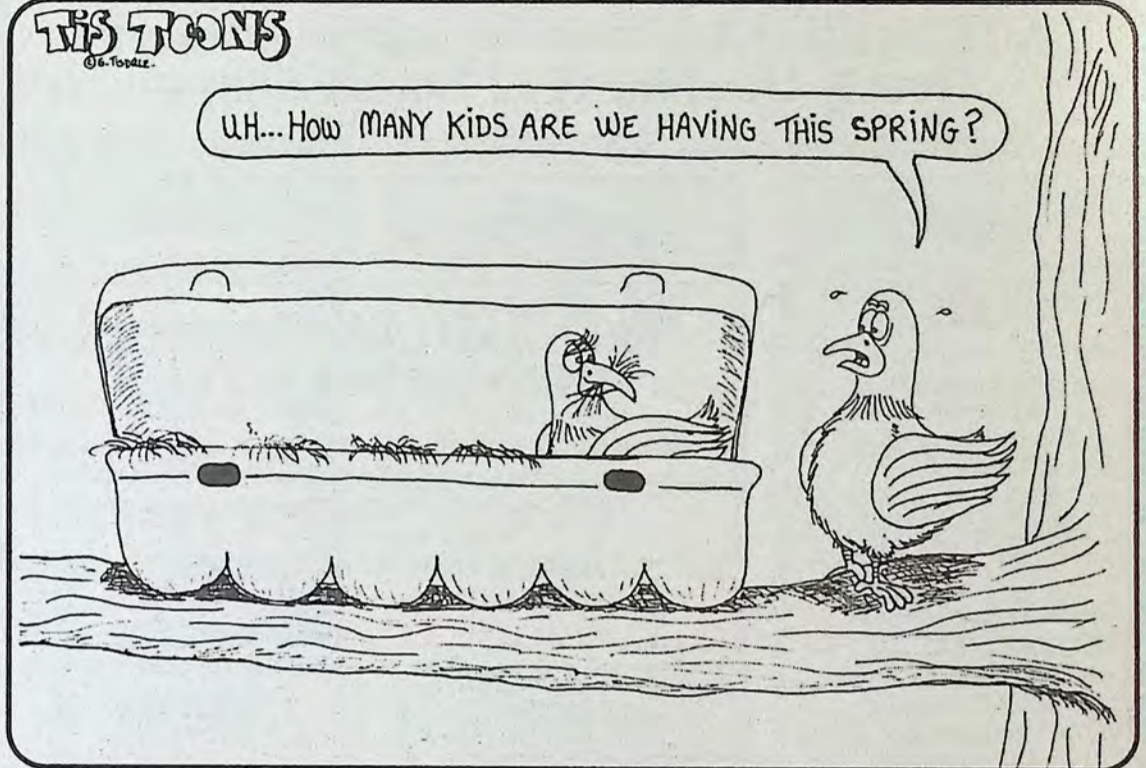

provisions that protected learning conditions for children.

The B.C. Teachers' Federation challenged Rice's ruling in the B.C. Supreme Court and won. Last January, Justice D.W. Shaw concluded that, in light of "fundamental" errors on "points of law that are of importance to the education system of British Columbia, including the teachers, the school boards and the students".

Now, with Bill 19, that fundamentally flawed ruling has been made law. Perhaps most frightening for what it says about the government's attitude to legal restraints on its powers, Bill 19 actually provides that it applies "despite any decision of a court to the contrary". 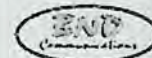

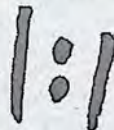

# The Valley looks healthier than ever

People say a good memory can be a curse. Sometimes it can be a blessing. I have a good memory, and the current concerns about coalbed methane extraction cause me to think about how things used to be in the Similkameen Valley.

When I was a kid, the roads were not paved, and every moving vehicle raised dust. The coal mines were in operation, and coal dust blew around. Every chimney in town belched coal and wood smoke year round, as we cooked as well as heated our homes with coal and wood. We burned our garbage in the heaters and ranges, or in the back yard. The sawmills had burners or just piled the scrap and burned it. The tailings from the mine created a toxic dust which blew across the town when the wind came up the valley, or blew down the valley with the west wind. Trees and grass were often coated with a layer of tailings dust, like they were when Mt. St. Helens erupted.

In Keremeos, orchardists sprayed with insecticides banned today, and the sawmills there belched smoke along with all the chimneys.

In Hedley, the gold mine created

The valley is far cleaner now!

While the valley is cleaner, we suddenly have this huge concern about coalbed methane extraction threatening to ruin our landscape, drive away tourists, and threaten our health. Frankly, I cannot see how one well per 640 acres is going to ruin the landscape and drive away tourists. Where is the health threat? We will not be inhaling methane. The producers do not want methane escaping, they are trying to harvest it.

The water situation was one of my concerns, but the depths to which these wells go, and with surface groundwater cased off in the well, the wells will not tap the water we use. In fact, if water pumped out of the wells is good, we will have more surface water.

I compare coalbed methane extraction with the old style coal mines. My father worked at one of these mines. It extended from Deblyn Mobile Home Park area down under Tulameen River and under First and Second Bench. There was constant water leakage, and the excess water was pumped out into the river. Who knows what was in it?

There is simply no comparison between coalbed methane extraction and our defunct copper mine. Waste became tailings. Occasionally, it spilled into the river, carrying its load of toxic chemicals, and the company would be taken to court where it would pay a fine. This was a lot worse than coalbed methane extraction. What is even more to the point, hard rock mining leaves behind the tailings, and tailings reclamation is expensive.

Compared with the coal mines and copper mines, the number of permanent jobs is low with

coalbed methane wells in place. Are we saying we can turn a blind eye to environmental abuse on a massive scale if enough good jobs come our way?

If we were really a clever community, we would see the tourism potential of a coalbed methane operation so close to the Okanagan and Vancouver. Tourists like to see how things are done. There could be tours and educational workshops centered around the way it is done. People would pay to see what we are complaining about. We could have continuous loop film running at the Tourist Information Centre, along with maps on the wall and information showing how the methane gas is used.

Recently, 50 people turned out to learn about coalbed methane extraction. I hope some of them, who have lived here as long as I have, took the time to remember how we used to extract resources without giving a damn about the environmental costs. Today, we have laws governing every industry. Ask any rancher how close the laws have come to demanding diapers for cattle on the range!

There are too many old people around here who have forgotten how it feels to be young and looking for a good job. Let's stop giving our area the reputation of discouraging every industry that wants to come here. During the past 22 years I have worked as a reporter. I have seen us turn into that kind of people, all in the name of protecting our environment. We even turned against our best and most permanent industries - ranching and the forest industry - for a few years.

Let's learn all we can about an industry, and then say, "Do it, but do it right."

When we react, instead of pro-act, all we show is our ignorance.
