## Local citizens form watchdog group

A total of 45 interested local citizens attended the first meeting of the Princeton and District Health Watch Coalition last Thursday night at the Seniors Drop-In Centre.

Gordon Comeau chaired the meeting and conducted the Election of Officers.

Mayor Keith Olsen requested an opportunity to speak to the group and praised their efforts.

"The main thing I want to emphasize is the importance of a group such as this."

Olsen went on to explain his concerns about Interior Health and the lack of communication from that board to communities.

"They are not communicating at the level they should be informing and that is the people in the communities they serve."

The Mayor made it clear there is a real concern from residents on how health services are being delivered and the changes to those services.

"Hopefully this group will be able to improve the health services in our community."

Ruth Hooper was elected President with Pam Jones as Vice President. Betty Golovin is secretary, Gayle Comeau Treasurer and Monty Raine Registrar. Directors are Lois Haffey, Anita Drees, Bud Boyden and Greg Davenport.

## Check this scam

A Vincent Maduka of Abuja is sending e-mail letters to businesses and individuals asking for assistance in recovering funds belonging to their country but "floating" in foreign bank accounts. What they want people to do is give them access to personal or corporate bank accounts so they can "transfer" funds into these accounts. In return, they say they will give the account owner 20 percent of the monies transferred.

This is not how nations do business. NEVER give a stranger access to your bank account number under any circumstances.

## Towns lose fight for taxpayer liability reform

Councillor Kathy Clement is one of the elected municipal officials who has been lobbying the provincial government to change the law to reduce the liability of municipalities. Lawsuits can bankrupt a municipality even though all necessary safety measures have been taken. Some of the judgements awarded in some locations have been astronomical bills for taxpayers to pay. A resolution by the City of Surrey states, "as a result of the current

state of provincial legislation and the common law in these areas municipalities are put to a significant disadvantage in the defense and settlement of claims brought against them, regardless of the merits of the claims".

The resolution from Surrey calls for a 10 year limit to liability and to eliminate joint liability in favour of proportionate responsibility to pay which would balance the existing inequities in the law.

Attorney General Geoff Plant

reviewed the Civil Liability Reform question and ruled that a good case for reform had not been made. In the review, people who had been victims of the leaky condos were heard, and it is issues such as the leaky condos that create civil liability suits. Although most people would assume that those who built the leaky condos should be the ones sued, under joint liability, the municipality is sued as well, because the municipality is responsible for building inspection. Consequently, when such a victim wins a lawsuit, taxpayers must foot the bill. Municipalities feel this is unfair. Further, the limitation for such lawsuits is 30 years, which leaves current municipal officials responsible for flaws which may have occurred long before present officials took office or were hired. In fact, current officials may be held responsible for matters of

which they had no knowledge. The quest for improvements in civil liability legislation will continue. On June 7, Princeton Town Council voted to support the City of Surrey in the ongoing lobbying.

## Town Hall closes July 2

People working for the Town of Princeton will work on July 1 and take Friday, July 2, as a statutory holiday. Town Office will be closed Friday, July 2.

There will be only two Town Council meetings during July and August. The regular meetings of the first Monday of the month are cancelled, and only the third Monday of the month meetings will take place. Council will have public meetings on July 19 and August 16, only.

## Council okays compost plant

Gro-Wel Enterprises Ltd. has applied to Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen to establish a mushroom compost operation at the former Similco Mine site southwest of Princeton. The actual location of the compost operation would be close to Deep Gulch, somewhat west of Envirogreen Technol-

ogies and at a lower elevation. Regional District referred the application to Princeton Town Council for consideration. At the June 7 Council meeting, Council found no reason to object to the application, as the location is more than 10 kilometres from Town boundaries and is unlikely to affect anyone in Princeton.

## Thieves hit Tulameen home

Princeton RCMP are investigating a break and enter into a dwelling located in Tulameen. The break-in occurred in the early morning hours of May 27. A neighbour discovered somebody had entered the dwelling and the detached garage and alerted police.

The culprit or culprits forced entry into the garage and then into the home. The home was ransacked extensively and numerous items were stolen,

including a 52 inch Toshiba projection television set as well as scuba diving gear, a wet suit and several dry suits. A one metre tall wooden sculpture of a native holding an axe and several other collectable carvings were taken. RCMP estimate \$10,000 worth of property was taken.

Council passed a motion to send her a letter of appreciation.

Councillor Jarvis said he would like to see an Air Cadet Squadron formed in Princeton.

To achieve this, he recommended promoting Air Cadets through inviting the 18-piece marching band from Squadron 259 to participate in the July 2 Rotary Summer Heat parade. Council approved \$300 to cover the cost of transportation to and from Princeton. Councillor Jarvis said if the band could not come, he would like to see the drill team come in September and do a performance of precision marching.

Her second complaint was in regard to bumpy, unsafe roadways. She said people in wheelchairs trying to drive in gravel are afraid of being hit by cars. She asked Council to "have Tulameen Avenue made safe for the old people and people who ride on wheelchairs".

Council addressed these issues at the June 7 meeting, but felt they did not have any solutions to some of the problems. They will take a closer look at some sections of the path leading to the wooden bridge to see if the access can be improved so as to avoid Tulameen Avenue.

## Towns face Catch 22

The provincial government is in the process of revising Streamside Protection Regulation.

This legislation governs how development shall be done in order to protect fish habitat. Municipalities have been asked to review the legislation, but they are not allowed to discuss it with anyone else.

Municipalities claim this is not true consultation. Municipal staff members who have been given access to the draft legislation have refused to sign the confidentiality agreement required, and therefore have not

viewed it. Without the ability to communicate the contents of the document to the people for whom they work, staff members are in a position where seeing the documents is of no value, as they cannot share the information with other staff members nor local government.

At the June 7 Council meeting, Council voted to support a request to the provincial and federal governments by the City of Burnaby that municipalities have the opportunity to openly discuss the revisions before they are adopted as law.

## Residents decide liquor hours

Copper Mountain Bar and Grill applied for an extension of hours during which it may serve alcoholic beverages. The matter has now gone to Town Council. Under liquor legislation, Town Council is required to consult local residents before giving an opinion as to whether the extension of hours is acceptable. Council has advertised for input from residents and will be obliged to summarize for the Liquor Control Board what residents feel is appropriate.

## Council okays subdivision

An application by Robert and Loreen Lind to subdivide their property northwest of Princeton was sent to Town Council for review. As the property is in the "fringe area" of Regional District's Area H, Regional District advises the Town of Princeton of all applications pertaining to property in that area. Council reviewed the subdivision plan on June 7, and had no objection to the subdivision. The property subdivision will allow for independent ownership by Jim Lind of a parcel of the land. The total area of the property is eight hectares, and Robert Lind will retain 5.4 hectares after subdivision.

Canadian Taxpayers Federation (CTF) sent a letter to Town Council asking for support for their petition to the federal government asking the government to return more than \$2 billion in federal fuel tax revenues to municipalities.

way construction and maintenance. The letter to Council states, "It's ridiculous that the federal government sits on billions of dollars in surplus fuel tax revenue all the while municipalities are forced to raise taxes to meet basic infrastructure needs."

At the June 7 Council meeting, Council voted to give full support to the CTF.

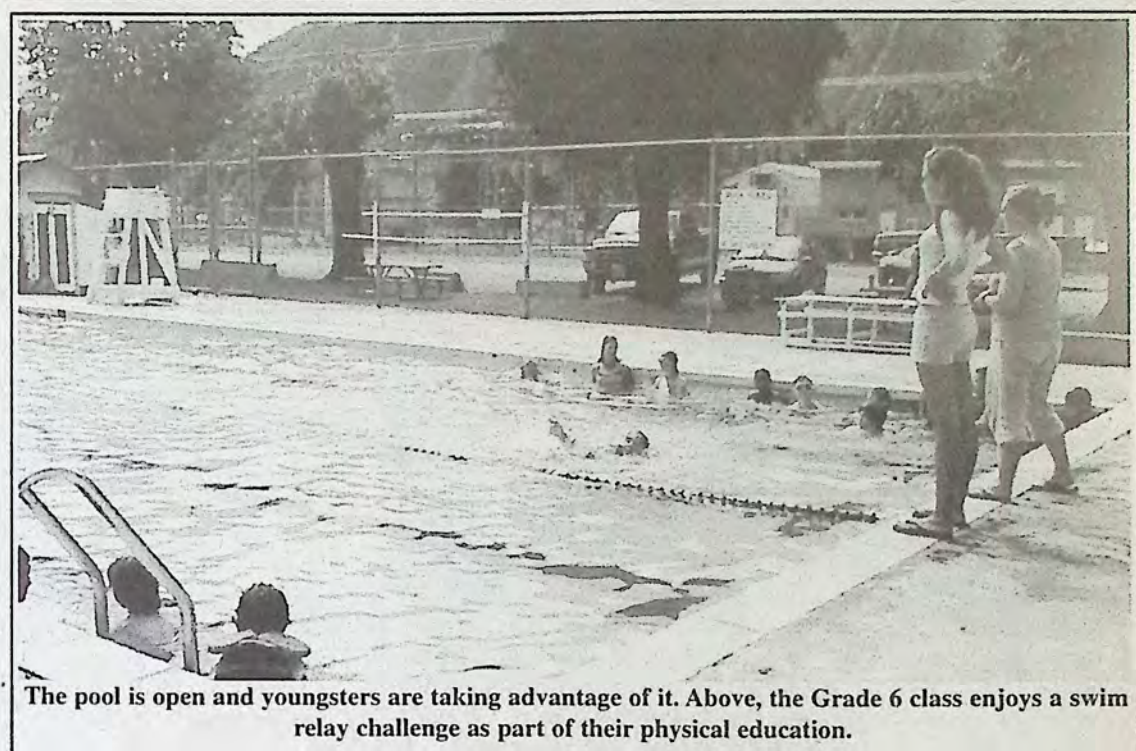

**Council meets on parking, sidewalks**

Village Council will meet with Similkameen Country from 7 - 8:00 a.m. June 23 to discuss concerns about downtown parking and businesses wishing to expand onto sidewalk areas. Some of the concerns arise from lack of parking for tourists and other customers on the main street. The meeting will discuss possible solutions. The matter of a business using a portion of the sidewalk to promote sales will be addressed, along with appropriate restrictions to prevent inconvenience to pedestrians.

**Canoes trek again**

The fourth annual Syilx (pronounced seelk) Nation Unity Trek takes place from July 10 to around July 31. Lower Similkameen Indian Band will man the lead canoe, and the Allison canoe is expected to take part, too.

The 100 mile trek will go from near Revelstoke and proceed down Upper and Lower Arrow Lakes to complete the trek at Kettle Falls. The trek recognizes the unity between two branches of the Okanagan Nation—the land people and the river people (people of the Columbia River watershed who traditionally navigated the rivers and lakes and fished for salmon and trout).

Other treks have included Okanagan Lake system, Nicola and Coldwater river systems and the Okanagan River and tributaries. LSIB has been a participant in each of the treks.

**Community supports skate park**

Councillor Steve Hecoeks advised Village Council there will be a presentation to Council at the June 21 regular Council meeting regarding a skateboard park for Keremeos. The committee will submit a proposal. Hecoeks told Council that donations for the park and support for the park remain strong.

During this time, 866 hectares have burned and firefighting costs have exceeded \$4 million.

Current weather conditions indicate this fire season could potentially be as bad as last year. To ensure no harm comes to you or the forests, **play it safe** and be extra vigilant. It's up to all of us to protect our forests.



### How you can help prevent forest fires:

- Never toss a lit match.
- Extinguish cigarettes completely.
- Before you burn, check wind conditions. Do not burn when winds are high and always ensure there are adequate people, water and shovels on site to control the flames.
- Keep a pail of water or a shovel nearby campfires and before leaving, make sure the fire is out. A good way of checking is by placing your hand right above the ashes. If it's cold, you're done.
- If you think you see a wildfire or smoke, phone 1 800 663 5555, or \*5555 on cell phones, immediately.

"Thanks, I think," were the first words spoken by Coalition President Ruth Hooper as she lightened the mood before addressing the crowd.

"This is pretty exciting to see this coalition to be launched locally and I'm excited about the job we have ahead of us."

Monty Raine explained how the group will tackle matters in the Princeton area.

A three phase approach will start with the recognition of areas of concern. Feedback gathered from area residents and home care patients will be used to help determine issues of concern.

The second step is the gathering of information and facts concerning the matters of concern.

"We can't go off on tangents until we gather facts," Raine explained.

The third and final step would see the group lobby for improvements based on the information gathered.

"We don't have to worry about what's strong," Raine said, "We have to be concerned about what's lacking and inadequate."

The main purpose of the Health Watch Coalition is to support medicare and advocate for the continuation and enhancement of health services in the community.

Complaints regarding health services and how they are being delivered in the area are welcomed by the coalition, which will examine each complaint carefully before acting.

The group agreed on the recommendation that annual membership dues be set at \$2 and membership be restricted to persons 19 years of age and older living in Princeton or Area H.

Those elected Thursday night will hold their positions until December.

## Living Past 100

### Amino acid takes new role

Medical researchers won the Nobel Prize for medicine through taking a new look at an amino acid. Robert F. Furchgott, Louis J. Ignarro and Ferid Murad investigated the role of arginine and discovered a substance called arginine-derived nitric oxide (ADNO). This essential nutrient lives for five seconds, but what it does in that short burst is phenomenal. It relaxes arteries, which maintains normal blood pressure. It helps keep open coronary arteries, preventing angina. It helps lower serum cholesterol and prevents the bad cholesterol from oxidizing. It is a powerful blood thinner that helps prevent heart attacks and strokes. It enhances sexual performance in men.

There is more. It enhances immune system cells that use it to kill foreign bacteria and viruses and even shrink or destroy some cancerous tumors. It enhances long-term memory and ensures blood flow to brain cells. It functions as a "messenger molecule" allowing nerve cells and the brain to communicate with each other. It prevents hemorrhoids. It helps you breathe easier and avoid common lung disorders. 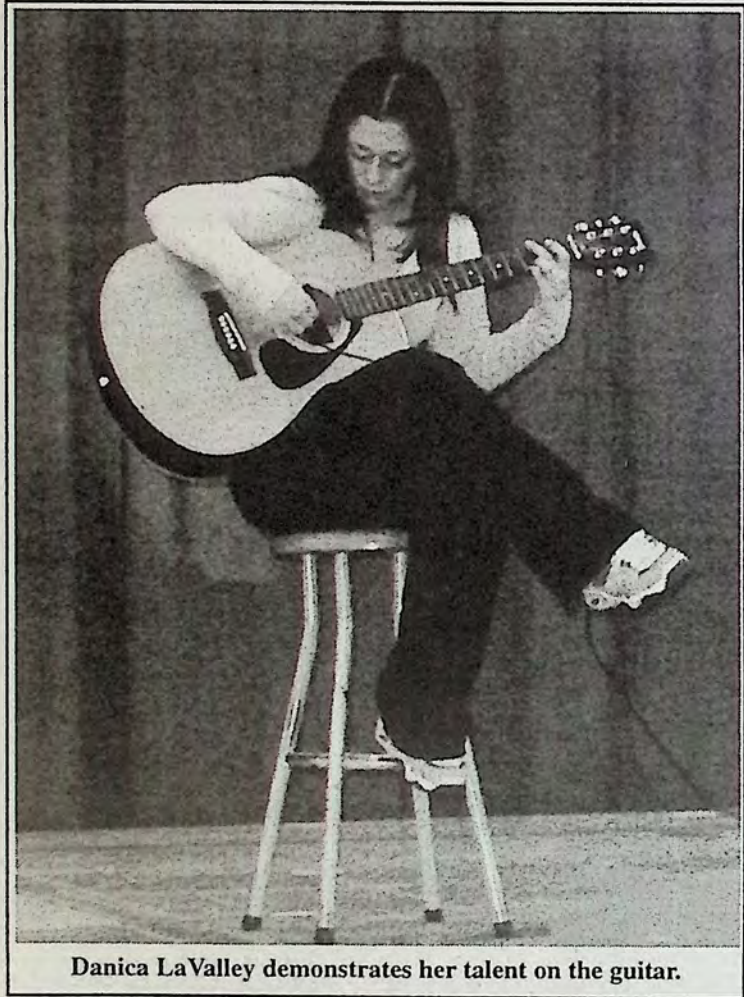

## Judge orders house arrest for trafficking

In Provincial Court in Princeton on June 10, Roy Smith, age 57, of Princeton, entered a guilty plea to a charge of possession of marijuana for the purpose of trafficking. After surveillance for six months by Citizens on Patrol and RCMP, Smith was arrested when a Sesame Street backpack in his possession was discovered to contain three eight-gram packages of marijuana, seven sandwich bags containing 7 - 8 grams of marijuana, 49 marijuana cigarettes, and both Canadian and U.S. currency.

Smith was sentenced to six months of house arrest with a curfew which allows him to go to work at his business, attend medical and dental appointments, and go shopping. Judge Sinclair ordered a weapons prohibition. Surveillance and random house calls and drug testing can be imposed on Smith during the duration of his sentence.

### Due for August sentencing

In Provincial Court in Princeton on June 10, Robert Pattison entered a guilty plea to one count of theft. His lawyer requested a pre-sentence report. Sentencing will take place on August 12, 2004.

on the same court date in Princeton, Roland Meier entered a guilty plea to a charge of production of a controlled substance, and requested a pre-sentence report. He will be sentenced on August 12. Charges against D. Gauvin, who was co-charged with Meier, were stayed.

Annette Fidler will also be sentenced on August 12 pending a pre-sentence report and suitability for electronic monitoring report.

Clarence O'Bea entered a guilty plea the same day and will be sentenced on August 12.

Smith's lawyer explained Smith had begun selling marijuana to pay for the marijuana his wife used to combat the effects of pain and a medication she was taking

which made her ill.

Smith apologized to the court. He said he never sold to kids, and would not sell marijuana again. He had no prior criminal record.

## Judge orders probation

Following his appearance in Provincial Court in Princeton on June 10, where he pled guilty to a charge of common assault and mischief, Dean C. Stevens was sentenced to a year on probation for the assault and a \$300 fine for mischief.

Stevens had entered the home of a woman with whom he had had a prior relationship despite her refusal to open the door to him. She called police, and he ripped the phone from the wall and threw it across the room. He

began pushing her around and being verbally abusive. Her eight year old child entered the scene and demanded Stevens leave. At that point, he left.

During his probation, the 38 year old Stevens faces a number of conditions, including counselling, no contact with the woman nor her daughter except with permission from his probation officer, and the standard probation conditions. Judge Sinclair imposed a lengthy weapons prohibition.

## PXA readies for rock

Work will begin on the showers at the fairgrounds very soon. John Bey reported to Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) at the June 8 meeting that he hoped to have the shower building completed to lock-up by fall. He advised PXA members that the operating grant had been increased by the Town of Princeton from \$1,000 to \$4,000, but the additional \$3,000 was taken from the \$32,000 allocated for construction of the showers, leaving Bey with \$29,000 to work with over a two-year period.

Ron Harkness, the entrepreneur producing the Princeton Rocks concert on the July long weekend, attended the meeting to discuss arrangements for use of the fairgrounds and presented a cheque for \$2,000 as rental for the property. He requested that a section of fence along the track be torn out, the security shack be moved, and the rodeo grounds harrowed. John Bey agreed to do this.

Motorsports Association mem-

bers reported on the upcoming Moto-X regional meet, and said July 18 weekend, and October 2 are still scheduled.

The next PXA meeting will be held July 13 at the fairgrounds office.

## Thief was in jail already

Kevin Leclerc, age 35, of Oliver, appeared in Provincial Court in Princeton in custody. He pled guilty to stealing a 1990 Dodge Ram owned by a Kelowna woman. Leclerc was arrested in the Chevron parking lot in Princeton on January 18, 2004, when a towtruck driver noticed a jimmied ignition in the vehicle and called police.

As Leclerc is currently serving a jail term for possession of stolen property, and because that sentence was imposed for a crime occurring after January 18, Leclerc was sentenced to six months concurrent.

## Be cautious with campfires: keep B.C. green this summer

Summer is here, and with it comes hot, dry weather. Most British Columbians want to go into the great outdoors to camp, go fishing, mountain biking, and hiking. The B.C. Forest Service asks everyone to be smart about building campfires this summer.

First, select a site away from things that burn easily. Do not build a fire under a bush or tree, nor in tall grass or pine needles. Pick a spot covered with sand or gravel, or an area with few plants and plenty of open space between it and the forest or grassy area.

Second, put your fire in a pit. This means taking a spade with

you (advance planning is essential). Keep the spade and a bucket of water near your fire. Never leave your campfire unattended. Do not drop things into the fire which will cause a lot of hot ash - avoid dropping grass, twigs, needles and paper onto a burning fire.

When you leave, kill your fire dead. Pour water onto the fire until you can put your hand into it, stir it, and it feels cold on your hand.

Never use gasoline, kerosene nor diesel fuel to start your campfire. You could be seriously burned.

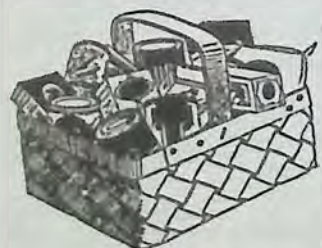

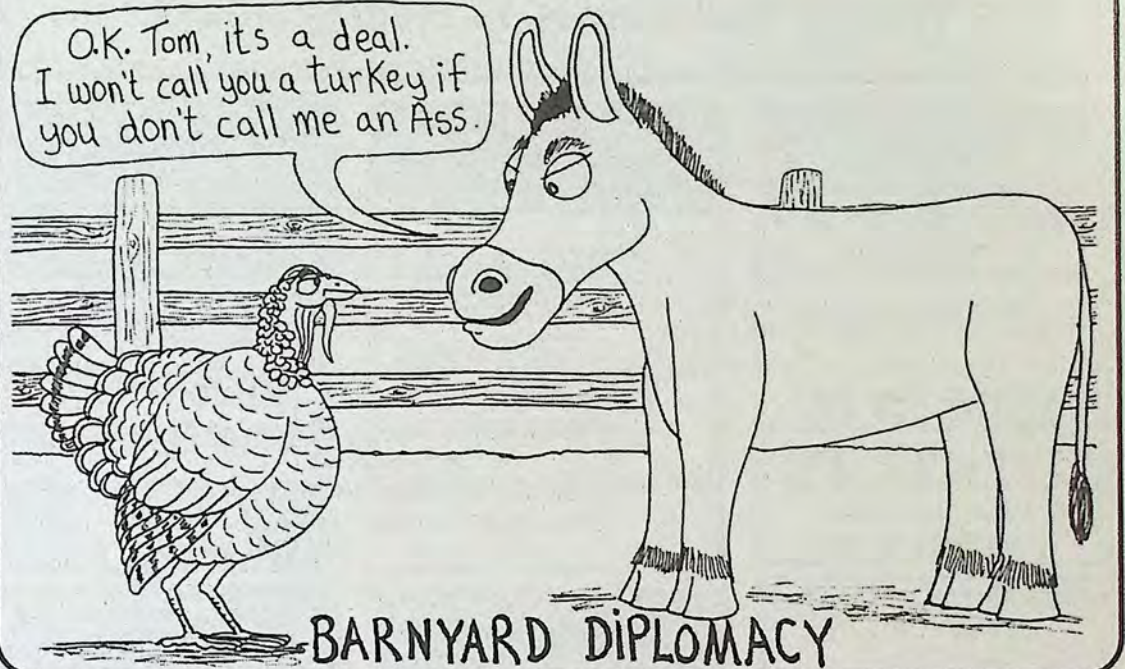

We lived in the Lower Mainland for almost 40 years and my allergies and asthma drove us on in our search. We found it in Princeton.

Since then we have discovered this jewel, the hiking, the clean water in the rivers, the lack of noise pollution. All of this can be jeopardized with the Coalbed Methane drilling and mining planned for this area. Do you realize that landowners have no control on the subsurface rights of their land? Drilling will be a reality. We have an opportunity now to voice our concerns and at least put some control on the way the drilling and mining will be done. Controls, over our water, our air, and our noise pollution.

The Vancouver Sun, June 1, 2004, \$50 million was contributed to our economy through residents of British Columbia through tourism. A much higher figure than previously thought. The predominant theme that tourists were looking for was hiking, fishing, biking and outdoor experiences. We have all that in abundance in Princeton.

I have been to all three of the presentations in Princeton, the OIL and Gas Commission, the presentation by Petrobank Energy and Resources Ltd., and the presentation by Karen Campbell of the Vancouver

Foundation and I am concerned that the drilling and mining of Coalbed Methane Gas will definitely affect our quality of life. It may affect our economy, as the potential for growth in that area could be in the future as Princeton has many of the requirements people are looking for, living in the congested, polluted Lower Mainland. Where will we go when our area is destroyed by roads, drilling, noise and potential for water contamination. This means less control over private land, few new jobs for the community, more traffic on municipal roads, loss of property value, large and visible impact on the landscape, no direct tax benefit to the municipality. ## Schuster gives his point of view

Universal health care is one of the things most Canadians feel is part of the definition of Canada. I am committed to maintaining Canadian universal health care.

Most health issues fall under provincial jurisdiction. Like all Canadians, I am in favour of making the best use of our tax dollars. Having said that, I believe in making the present system work better and I am not convinced that privatization will provide a more cost effective health care system. The federal government is responsible for providing some funding for health care and unfortunately they have set the rules and then abandoned their responsibilities. Now that the election has come around they are finally doing something. I do feel the level of federal funding should be increased to meet the recommendations of the Romanow Report.

Everyone has had complaints regarding health care: we have all heard some of the horror stories. I feel that the Romanow Report addresses those concerns, and I would support all efforts to bring about the recommendations in the report.

We also have to realize that, per capita, Canada spends more on health care than any other country, yet our service is ranked 16th. Clearly, if money is the key criteria, our health services should be the best in the world. The fact that it is not suggests that we do have to review and streamline our medical services delivery model.

One of the key aspects of the Romanow Report that I liked was the creation of the Health Council of Canada. The main

objective of the Health Council would be to involve all stakeholders and from their input create and manage overall health system objectives and make the system fully accountable. The constituents in our riding are telling me they are confused about what is fact or fiction about our health care system. They simply don't know who to believe. I would like to suggest to your readers they should read the summary or full Romanow Report for themselves.

Recently, I had the opportunity to talk to some of our constituents about a national home care program. As our population

ages, this is becoming a much bigger issue. Some material from one group has suggested maybe a national standard across Canada, a one-glove-fits-all model. I feel that having a rigid universal set of standards eliminates the opportunity to take advantage of local or regional situations which would benefit the patient. We must be careful to not set too rigid a set of standards. It is for that reason health care was turned over to the provinces in the first place.

I support protecting our health care system in any free trade agreement. Anything less is unacceptable.

restricts such random spending. Or perhaps it's just as I suggested in my first letter: they will promise anything to get your vote.

As for your comments questioning why I oppose an additional constituency office when I have opened campaign offices throughout the riding, there is no comparison between the two. My campaign offices have no computers, photocopiers or most of the other equipment normally expected in an office. The locations are used as is, without the modifications necessary to function as a regular constituency office. Also, campaign offices are staffed strictly with volunteers. My campaign has no paid staff. I find it very ironic that you seem critical of my efforts to provide the best access to each region during a campaign where it is important for people to access information on candidates and their policies in a very short time period.

Even more ironic is your failure to comment on my opponents who claim they may open addi-

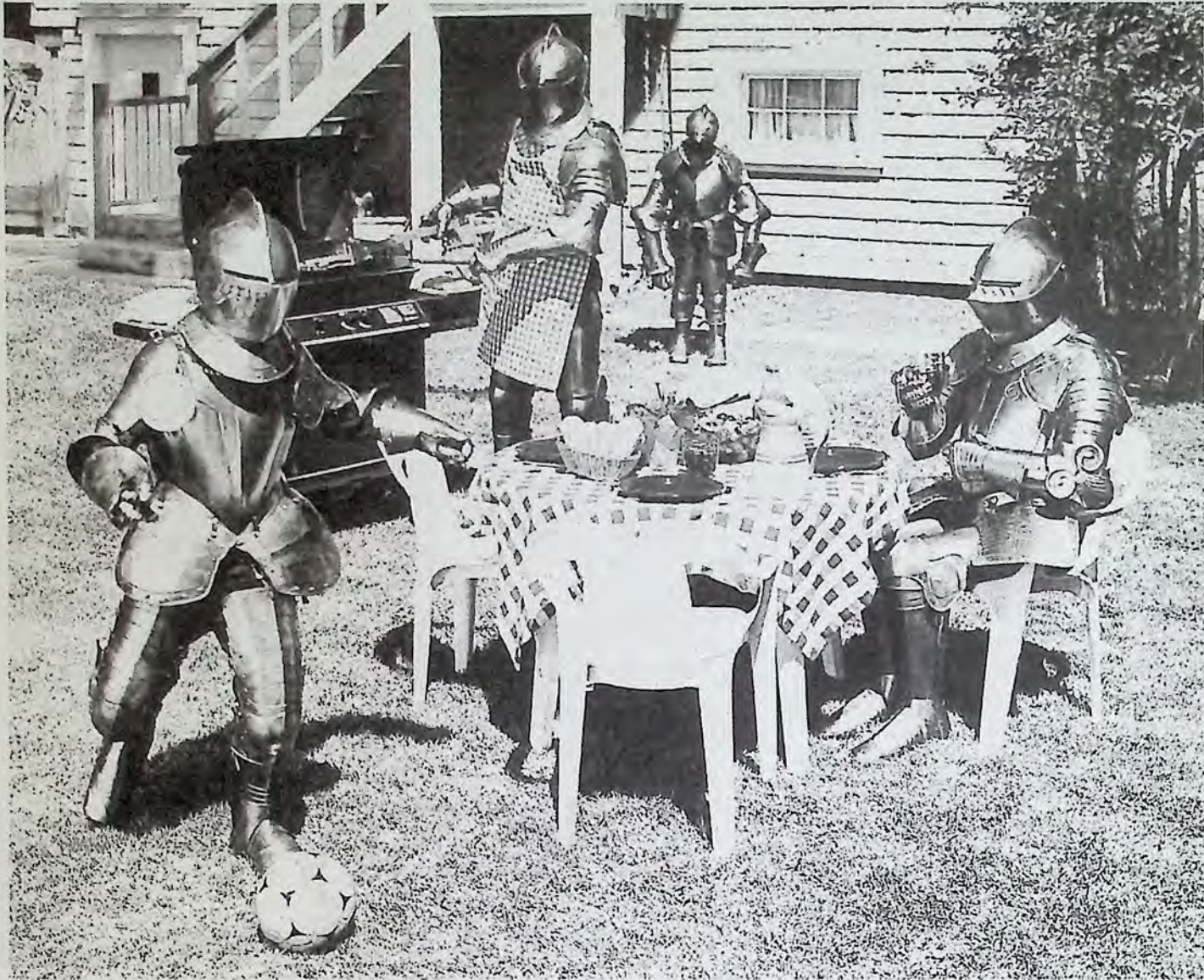
tional constituency offices (one candidate promising offices in several towns) but haven't opened campaign offices in the same manner despite the higher justification and much lower cost.

You ended your article by stating you will cast your vote for the candidate who chooses to agree with you and opens a constituency office in Princeton. You can obviously vote for whoever you like, but I sincerely hope you pick something far more important than an additional constituency office to decide who is going to represent you for the next four years.

## There are better ways to protect you and your family from West Nile.

### Know the risks

You've likely heard about West Nile virus (WNV), a mosquito-borne virus. Mosquitoes can transmit the disease to humans after becoming infected by feeding on the blood of birds that carry the virus.

WNV has been spreading across North America in the past few years. Officials predict it will show up in British Columbia this summer.

While we don't think you'll need a suit of armour, there are some simple precautions you can take to protect yourself and your family from contracting this disease.

WNV is transmitted to humans through bites by infected mosquitoes. The virus is not spread by direct person-to-person contact, nor from animal to human, or from drinking water. Most people bitten by an infected mosquito will not become ill. About one in five people infected develop mild, flu-like symptoms lasting less than a week. Symptoms may include headache, fever, skin rash, body aches and/or swollen lymph glands. These symptoms may develop from three to 14 days after being bitten by an infected mosquito. About 1% of those infected develop serious health problems such as encephalitis or meningitis (inflammation of the brain or its lining). This can result in long-term complications or even death.

### What can you do right now?

Prevent mosquito breeding around your home and yard. Mosquitoes only need a teaspoon of water in which to breed.

While testing to date does not show the presence of WNV, you can keep mosquitoes from breeding by emptying all outside sources of standing water at least once a week. These include

flowerpot saucers, tin cans, plastic containers, tires, tarps, pool covers and trampolines. In addition:

- Change water in birdbaths and pet dishes regularly and empty wading pools.
- Install a pump in ornamental ponds, stock them with fish, or change water weekly.
- Unclog rain gutters and drainage ditches.
- Use fine mesh to cover rain barrels and containers that cannot be dumped.

### What can you do when West Nile virus arrives?

Public health in B.C. is monitoring for signs of WNV and will inform the province if the virus does arrive here. Meanwhile, following these simple steps will help ensure a safe and enjoyable summer for your entire family.

Protect yourself and your family against mosquito bites by covering up with light-coloured clothing, long pants and long-sleeved shirts. Reduce time spent outdoors when mosquitoes are active and use a mosquito repellent (those with DEET are very effective).

If using products containing DEET, make sure the concentration does not exceed 30% for adults and 10% for children between two and 12 years old. Insect repellents containing DEET should not be used on children six months and younger, and only occasionally on children between six months and two years in situations where the risk of disease is high. Carefully follow the instructions on the label of all insect repellents.

Make sure window screens have no holes or gaps. If you don't have screens, keep windows and doors closed between dusk and dawn, when mosquitoes are most active.

# Museum plans a "yard" sale to start July

Museum Society members met on June 8 and welcomed the good news. More than 1,300 people have visited Princeton Museum between opening in April and the end of May. This is a huge increase in the number of visitors for what is a "slow" time, and is due in large part to the efforts of President Nick Mills to keep the museum open, and to the assistance of Katimavik worker Jennilee Austria. Donations reflected the increase in visitors: in 2003, donations for the same period totalled just over \$100, this year the total was more than \$900!

Visitors have come from nearly every nation in the world this spring. Of special interest were two geologists, one from China, who were excited about the rock and mineral collection in the Joe Pollard wing. The second geologist said Princeton's collection was superior to the collection available at the university while he was studying geology. Many local people are

unaware of the treasure housed in the Pollard wing of the museum.

Members welcomed a new employee, Phillip LePoidevin, who has been attending Carleton University in Ottawa and was an exchange student to Finland last year. He began work on June 1 and will be employed until September 1.

Weyerhaeuser has once again agreed to fund an additional student employee for the museum for July and August. This is the third year Weyerhaeuser has provided funds for a student to enter the work force for the first time, and Museum Society members are grateful the museum is an approved employer. The student employees are invaluable during the busy summer months.

Bad internet information about Princeton stirred some serious objections, and Nick Mills contacted one of the offenders, crow'snest highway, and had the

information corrected. LePoidevin is going after the other website, lonelyplanet, to have the Princeton information corrected. On this last website, the information is so out of date and jumbled it makes one wonder if the author ever actually visited Princeton.

Kathy Clement donated some curling trophies to the museum. These came from Copper Mountain and are engraved with the name "O. Liabo", a man who resided in Princeton for many years. The Copper Mountain and Allenby reunion will take place September 11 and 12 this year, and there will be a display of Copper Mountain and Allenby memorabilia in the museum for that occasion. Members decided to hold a "yard" sale on Saturday, July 3. The items for sale will be partly from the museum itself and partly made up of donated articles from members. The money raised will go into the Princeton Museum bank account. Anyone wishing to donate items for this sale should bring the items to the museum. The sale will be held on the lawn in front of the museum.
