# Are you ready to vote?

## Here's what candidates said



The candidates for a federal seat in Ottawa presented their platform at the public forum last week. Left to right: Alex Atamanenko (NDP), Robert Schuster (Independent), Jim Gouk (Conservative), Doug Stanley (Liberal), and Scott Leyland (Green).

Candidates for Member of Parliament for Southern Interior riding attended all-candidates forums last week in several locations.

In Princeton, they spoke at Gordon Craigie as timer. People asked questions from the floor, or submitted written questions in advance. The event went very well.

The candidates were: Scott Leyland, who works in the health services industry, and is running on a Green Party ticket; Jim Gouk, a retired air traffic controller who is the incumbent for the Conservative Party; Robert Schuster, who works in business services, running as an independent; Doug Stanley, who has headed a credit union and is a Liberal; and Alex Atamanenko, a retired teacher representing the New Democratic Party.

**Scott Leyland, Green Party** said the Green Party is one that listens to people. He spoke of increased quality of life, balancing the books for long term sustainability, strengthening the United Nations, and increasing practical kinds of foreign aid. He is keenly interested in reviving social legislation to provide national prenatal and child care, and lunch programs for the needy. The Green Party believes in a community-based economy, economic diversity, and decentralization. Inefficient corporations would be taxed more and efficient corporations which contribute to sustainability would receive tax credits. He supports proportional representation.

All of the candidates supported an independent ethics commissioner to the House of Commons.

**Jim Gouk, Conservative Party** took a shot at Liberal scandals, their waste of money, and said they are "soft" on criminals. He says greater accountability is needed, along with better health care. He stated the Conservative Party policies are much the same as the policies of the former Canadian Alliance Party, and are combined with similar policies by the former Progressive Conservative Party. He is in favour of improving the highways we have rather than building new highways. To make post-secondary education more accessible to low income students, he would review the way loans are done, and would stop downloading the costs on provinces.

## School bus routes will be changed

Due to the closure of Riverside Intermediate School, bus routes will be altered for school opening in September.

The current town stop behind Golden Hills Grocery will be maintained for students attending Vermilion Forks and John Allison Elementary Schools.

School district staff have recommended a number of changes to the bus routes, but not all of the changes are confirmed. The school district will advertise the new bus routes and times prior to school opening in September.

## Teachers are on the move: no lay-offs

Several teaching positions are changing, due to the closure of Riverside Intermediate School and the retirement of Anne Elliott and Kathleen Fitzpatrick.

There have been no lay-offs of teaching staff, but temporary contracts have not been renewed.

There is one job being posted, a primary position at John Allison Elementary.

## Local man presents voting reform

Harold C. Daykin presented his proposal for voting reform for B.C. at the Citizen's Assembly in Princeton on June 14.

There were only 14 people in addition to the panel to hear his idea. After his presentation there were many comments about the apathy of local people regarding electoral reform.

Daykin proposed a proportional representation model to replace our present system. The 75 seats in the Legislative Assembly are

determined by who is elected in each constituency. In the most recent election, the Liberal Party of B.C. gained nearly all of the seats.

However, in B.C., it is possible to have this occur even though the total number of votes cast indicate the majority of voters wanted another party elected.

Daykin suggested a system in which one person would be elected from each constituency, but the number of seats would be fewer and there would be other seats open to parties who did not win a seat. This way, there would always be seats for representation by the other party.

There was a lot of discussion about how this could be achieved, and Daykin proposed a 'split ticket' ballot on which the voter could vote for the candidate, and another on which the voter could indicate a preference for a party. For example, a voter might prefer to elect a Liberal candidate but

choose a Green Party representative to fill the extra seats.

Following the discussion of Daykin's model, there was a lot of venting of voter frustration about how the voting system works to exclude some parties from representation in the Legislative Assembly. People made it clear they were not pleased with the overwhelmingly large majority which has the potential to turn government into a more dictatorial than democratic body.

The Citizens Assembly consists of 160 B.C. residents who will make a recommendation to government as to whether or not the province should change its voting system. The report from the Citizens' Assembly will go to the government by December 15. If the Citizens' Assembly recommends a change which can be implemented, voters will have an opportunity next year to vote on whether they want the change recommended.

## Thieves steal old stove

Sometime during the winter, culprits broke into a cabin on Highway 3 west of Princeton near Similkameen Falls. The cabin is located right off the highway near Eastgate gas station, near the entrance to Manning Park.

Various items were stolen: an antique wood burning stove (cast iron genuine Fosset), an antique wooden toboggan, 1500 watt electric heater and other household and personal items.

Police believe a pick-up truck or van would have been required to move the cast iron stove, and two people would have been needed to carry it. The stove may have been stolen for resale or to be used in someone's cabin.

# What candidates said continued from front ...

**Robert Schuster, Independent** would vote for the best legislation from any party if he is elected. He sees himself as working for his constituents, and would vote according to their wishes. He would like no income taxation for people earning less than \$12,000 a year, and would work at economic development. "We must not allow the parties to have a blank cheque" he stated. He wants less squabbling in the House of Commons. He would make student loans interest-free. In regard to health care, he would follow the recommendations of the Romanow Report. He believes there is a role for the federal government in assisting resource-based communities facing problems such as the pine beetle and super mills. He does not believe in subsidies to big corporations.

**Doug Stanley, Liberal Party** said he would, if elected, work with the people of the riding. He supports government accountability, better health care, more skills training, and resource development. He believes there is nothing wrong with the existing student loan program. Stanley quoted the Prime Minister as having said his goal is to end the alienation of western Canada. Stanley would subsidize large corporations if necessary to save jobs and would judge each case on its merits. Regarding the reduction of transfer payments to the provinces, Stanley said the Liberals guarantee the payments.

**Alex Atamanenko, New Democratic Party** emphasized this is a critical time for our nation because Canadian values are threatened from outside sources, such as other countries being able to sue Canada under NAFTA. He attacked the Liberals and the Conservatives and said it is time to shake things up in Ottawa. He would promote health care, attack poverty, and

work for more affordable housing. He would protect jobs and stop depending on the export of raw logs, would reduce EI qualifying time, and would vote for no income taxes on anyone earning less than \$15,000 per year. His party, the NDP, would legislate no GST on family essentials, and would do everything possible to reduce the gap between rich and poor. The money for post-secondary education should be targeted, not turned over to the provinces to spend as they please. Tuition should be reduced 10 percent, there should be more spaces for students, and student loans should be interest-free. He advocates free access to the U.S. mar-

ket and said the present free trade agreement is not fair to Canadians. He would subsidize corporations if jobs were at stake. He supports the Romanow Report and would bring federal health transfer payments to 25 percent of what provinces spend. He was the only candidate who supported registration of all weapons, including long guns.

Following the formal part of the forum, candidates mixed with the more than 50 people who attended. Each candidate was given space to lay out information brochures and other campaign items for members of the public.

Voting takes place next Monday, June 28, at the Legion Hall.

## RCMP, Citizens on Patrol, take bike patrol training

From June 1 to 4, three members of Princeton RCMP underwent training on Police Mountain Bikes. During the four days, police officers learned about bike maintenance, riding obstacles, vehicle stops, defensive tactics and bike skills.

The course offered several scenarios in which officers were confronted with a variety of crimes and had to take appropriate action.

Course candidates were Constables Joe Houben, Mike

Leiding and Joseph Fortin.

During the course, Cst. Chris Newel (now posted to Clearwater) instructed two members of the Citizens on Patrol on bike skills, the Motor Vehicle Act with respect to bicycles and riding in traffic. Members of Citizens on Patrol will be expanding their role in the community by doing their patrols on mountain bikes. A mountain bike allows an officer to patrol areas quickly and quietly, and to access areas where vehicles cannot go.

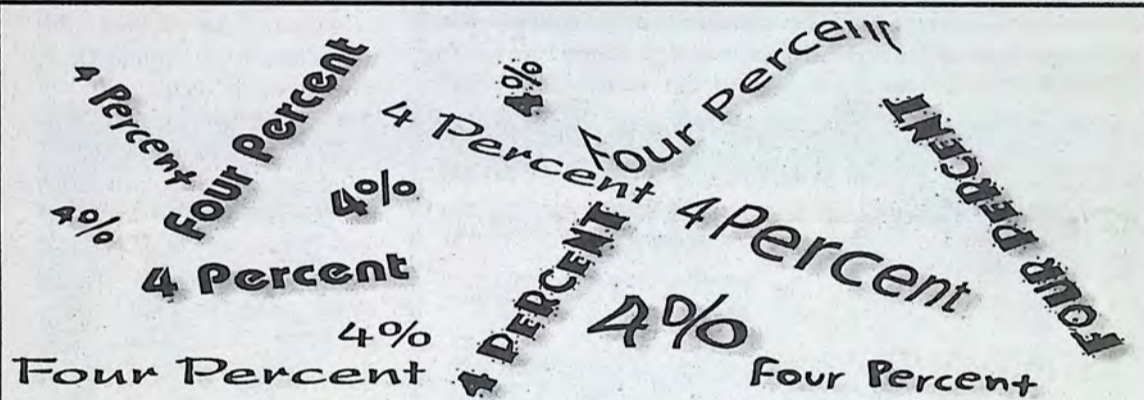

## Council releases '04 annual report

In an open letter to the citizens of Keremeos, Mayor Walter Despot provided an update on municipal services and operations for the past year.

"Council has worked with staff, citizens, and volunteers to provide its residents with the best possible municipal services. In 2003 Council undertook several major initiatives including a re-paving program, review and amendment of many bylaws, Keremeos Irrigation District Governance Study, and an Official Community Plan Review."

Current municipal objectives and progress measures include drawings prepared for a new swimming pool; support for a proposed assisted living addition to the Health Centre; sewer extension to accommodate the new RCMP Detachment; KID Governance Study completion; OCP amending bylaw and Zoning bylaw completion; assisting in creating a skateboard park; work toward the widening

of 10th Avenue; Community Forest review; work toward the creation of an industrial park and a Master Plan for recreation in the valley.

Next years goals include:

Implementing and monitoring the results of the OCP amendments and the zoning and other bylaw amendments; working toward a downtown revitalization plan and exploring options for assisting business toward this goal; the addition of recreation facilities through 2010; the creation of an RV park and campsite within the Village; continu-

ing to improve the relationship with RDOS, First Nations, Similkameen Country and residents by being more transparent and by involving the community more in the policy and decision process; continuing to apply for infrastructure assistance for the improvement of sewer and water needs and to continue with "Coffee with the Mayor" meetings to allow residents to express their concerns and wishes and to host at least one "Town Hall Meeting."

The report was presented at the June 21st meeting of Council.

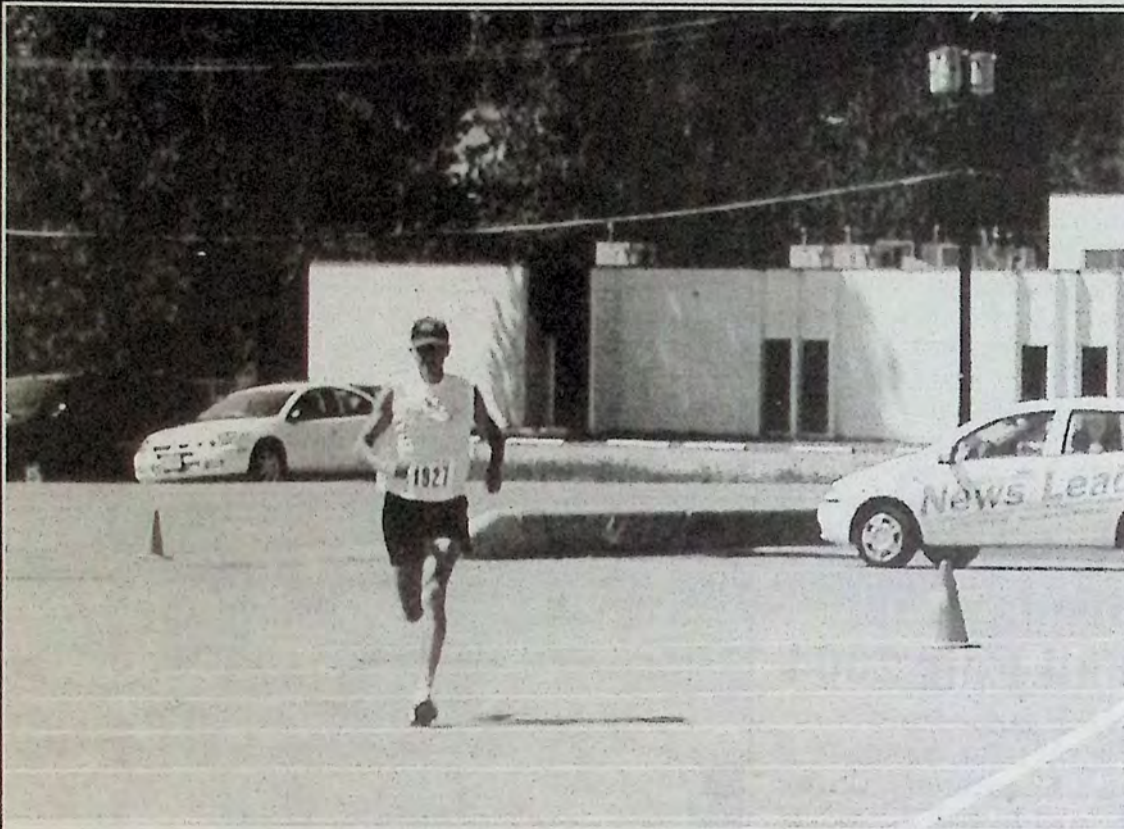

Last, but definitely not least, do not forget the role exercise plays in helping you lose weight. A good walking program, even on a treadmill, can take off the pounds. Gardening, swimming, hiking, biking and even shopping the malls can be great exercise.

Can't seem to lose weight? Check with your doctor. There may be many reasons you cannot lose weight, and these reasons may indicate a serious health problem that has not yet been detected. There are a number of conditions which make weight loss nearly impossible without special treatment. Diabetes, even borderline diabetes, is serious, and should be treated as a serious condition. You will not know you have it until you are tested. Other conditions include thyroid and pituitary deficiencies, which are undetectable without medical tests. If you really cannot lose weight, you must tell your doctor.

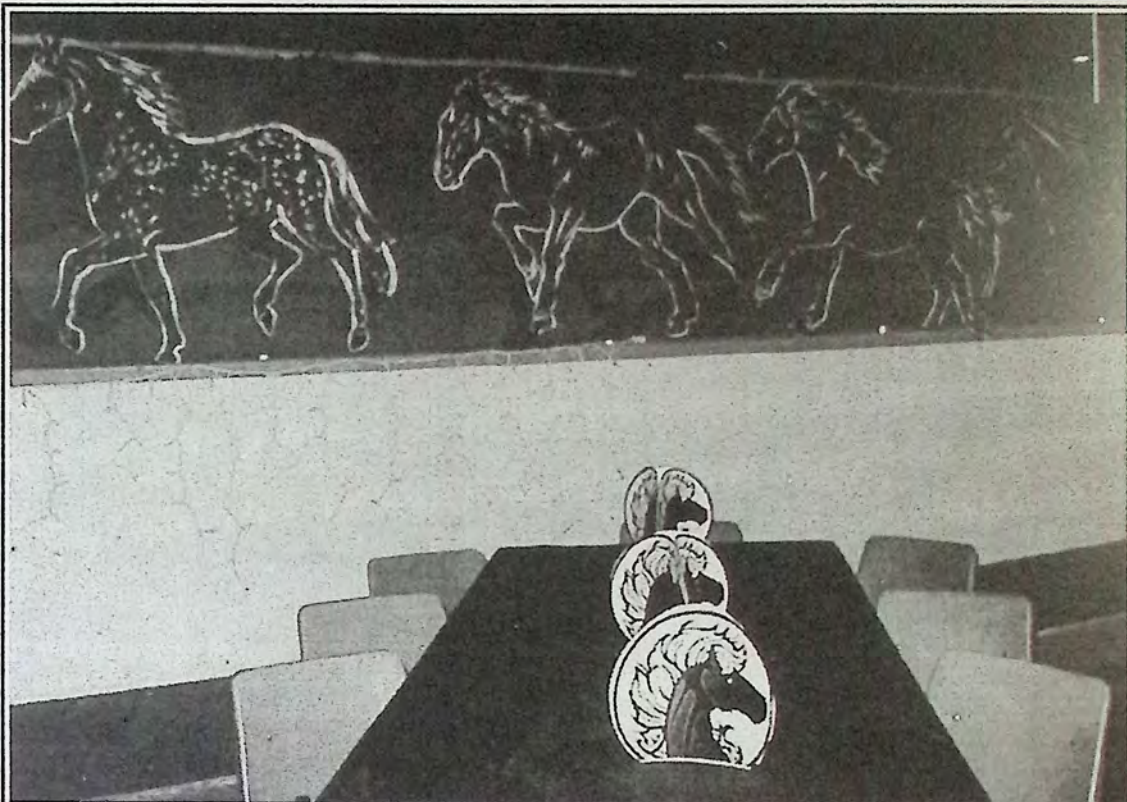

Clarke stated the Parenting Wisely Program is good because

it teaches techniques for deal with children, and it is a "very positive link between home and school."

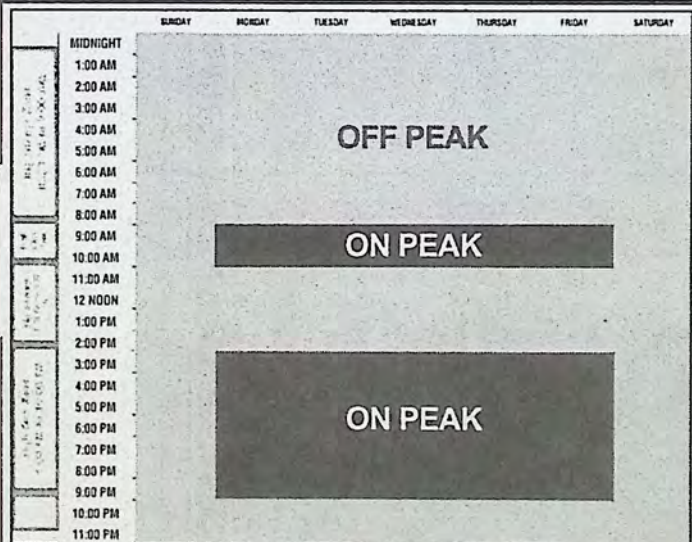

### Reviewing Your Tax Bill? Planning Ahead - Tax Effective Strategies - Part 2

In the previous "Investments Insights" article "Reviewing Your Tax Bill - Planning Ahead - Tax Effective Strategies - Part 1" two strategies were discussed: Consider Carrying Forward Deductions & Use Tax Deductions for Investment Expenses. The following are two more strategies you may wish to consider:

#### Strategy #3 - Tax Exempt Life Insurance

Life insurance products offer attractive investment options for tax sheltering your savings. The Income Tax Act allows for the tax-sheltered accumulation within insurance contracts, subject to certain maximums. You can take advantage of this tax-sheltered growth to meet your various insurance needs (such as RRSP/RRIF Insurance, Capital Gains Insurance, Business Insurance, etc.) as well as to provide for future income. ## Board, CUPE reach agreement

The Board of School Trustees and CUPE Local 847 announced they have reached a three-year agreement covering the period July 1, 2003 to June 30, 2006.

The agreement calls for no wage adjustments within the term of the agreement but does offer increased job protection for those regular employees currently employed by the district. Some of the other changes include an adjustment to sick leave benefits so they are integrated with the Long Term Disability Plan, modifying the contracting out language to comply with the PESEC mandate, the establishment of a Benefits Committee to look at stabilizing the rising cost of benefits, and pro-

vision for greater access to bumping for senior employees.

CUPE Local 847 represents approximately 90 support staff employed by School District #58 (Nicola-Similkameen). This includes janitors, secretaries, maintenance personnel, bus drivers and special education assistants.

Burt Wiley, Chair of the Personnel Committee, expressed his appreciation for the positive climate that prevailed at the bargaining table. This allowed the parties to address issues of concern to their respective constituents while keeping the focus on the provision of the best education program possible for students in the district.
