Moto-X is a go!

Princeton will host a regional Moto-X meet on July 17. The new motocross track was tried out and approved. Officials from the B.C. Association will organize the event, which looks very promising. The schedule has not been set, and some of the details have not been worked out, but the races will take place. Princeton Motorsports Association is looking for a dump truck and driver, and some people to do flagging.

This will be the first time Princeton hosts Moto-X. Spectators are welcome, at \$5.00 per adult (all children enter free if accompanied by an adult). The track, built by volunteer labour, has been a major undertaking this spring and a real community effort to add more events to support Princeton Exhibition Association grounds.

Woman dies at Eastgate

At approximately 8:00 a.m. June 27, Princeton RCMP and members of South Okanagan Traffic Services responded to a single vehicle accident on Highway 3 just west of Eastgate. The vehicle had been travelling east when it left the road and collided with the Manning Park sign located at the entrance of the park.

When police arrived, they discovered the vehicle engulfed in flames with the driver still inside. Police believe 21 year old Tiffany Crawford of Penticton had been killed by the impact. Fatigue may have been one of the contributing factors to this accident, still under investigation.

Council says 'No' to SAR

At the June 21 meeting of Town Council, a funding request from Penticton Search and Rescue was denied. Penticton SAR had requested \$2,000 a year for five years to cover its costs of operation. Council had tabled the request pending discussions with local search and rescue personnel, who recommended Council not grant the request as Penticton SAR is not used much in the Princeton area. Local members suggested if Council is going to spend that money it should be spent for training local people.

Conservative Member of Parliament Jim Gouk held onto his seat in the House of Commons in the June 28 federal election, although it looked for awhile as if the seat would go to Alex Atamanenko, a New Democrat.

Gouk took 36.59 percent of the votes cast, with a total of 16,928. Atamanenko took 16,247 votes, or 35.11 percent of the total.

Liberal Party candidate Doug Stanley received half of Gouk's number, with 8,300 votes or 17.94 percent.

The Green Party did not do too badly. Scott Leyland picked up 3,656 votes for 7.9 percent.

Robert Schuster, running as an independent, received 591 votes, or 1.28 percent.

Councillors give back pay to Town

Princeton Town Council members plan to return 10 percent of their monthly stipend to taxpayers.

At the June 21 Town Council meeting, Councillor Kathy Clement made a motion to give back the 10 percent in order to cover requests for funding from various groups with good projects which Council has been unable to fund.

The monthly total would amount to approximately \$400, and would total several thousand per year.

Karine Cyr, who lives outside the riding, was the Marijuana Party candidate and received 421 votes for less than one percent of the total.

Canadian Action Party Farlie Paynter received under one percent, as did Brian Sproule of the Marxist-Leninist Party.

Southern Interior riding has a population of 96,144. Slightly more than half the residents cast votes.

Although it has been said the

Conservative Party could put anyone on the ballot and win in this riding, there appears to have been a distinct shift in voters' preferences. The Conservative candidate very nearly lost, reflecting a trend that occurred in many ridings across Canada. Analysts will pour over the total number of votes cast in an attempt to decipher what was going on in voters' minds, but it is clear that every vote meant something in this election.

Zeolite will be processed here

There is nothing cleaner than a zeolite mine, and Princeton's zeolite is going to be mined and processed in Princeton in the near future.

Four companies, Zeo-Tech, C2C and First International, along with Haliburton, will build an ionizing plant on Wright Road, creating an initial three jobs. It is not a big production, but it holds promise for the future.

The presence of quality zeolite in the Princeton area has been known for some time. One of the principal miners and promoters is Gordon Webster of Princeton.

There are a multitude of uses for zeolite, from absorbing dangerous radiation to odour control products to components of refrigeration to facial mud packs. Zeolite is a volcanic dust which has been compressed into soft rock, and the Princeton area is one of the locations in which zeolite is found in abundance.

Zeolite is extremely porous and works by exchanging ions with other compounds around it. For example, when used to control odour, such as in a barn, the ammonia released by animal urine undergoes an ion exchange when in contact with zeolite. The zeolite absorbs the ammonia ions, and the odour is gone. Zeolite is the best carpet freshener ever devised. When nothing else will take the

odour out of a carpet, a fine dusting of zeolite will do the job.

A Canadian from New Brunswick invented a way to use zeolite as a cooling agent for refrigeration, replacing the polluting refrigeration chemicals with an Earth-friendly substance. This is not in use yet, but with an emphasis on cleaning our atmosphere, the new method may be adopted soon.

After the fire at the nuclear generation plant at Chernobyl in April, 1986, surrounding land was contaminated with radioactive particles. Thousands of tons of zeolite was dusted over the land to absorb the radioactive ions in the soil.

This is the cleanest mining and processing product anyone could wish for. Zeolite is so harmless, you could eat it without any bad effects (although it might not taste good).

Princeton RCMP have recovered an abandoned bicycle left at a residence. The bicycle is currently at the RCMP Detachment office. To claim it, the owner must call and identify the bicycle.

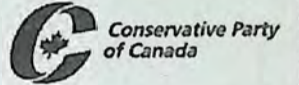

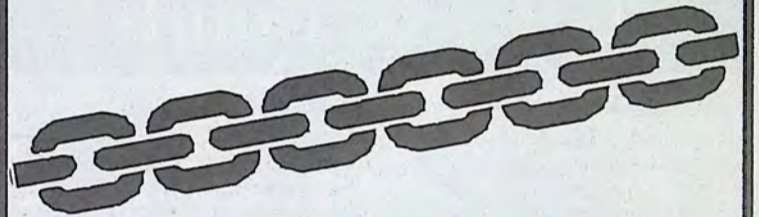

Clean up your own back yard fire hazards

It was just before lunch on Saturday, June 26, when lightning struck and lit a dead tree on the mountain to the south of our place, east of Bullock Creek. Fifteen minutes after we called 911, Ministry of Forests arrived with two bird dogs, three bombers with fire retardant, a Huey with a water bucket and another helicopter with three fire fighters arrived on the scene. We had our own private air show for awhile and for Keremeos that is great entertainment.

I am still amazed at the speed the Ministry of Forests was on that fire. Maybe they have learned from mistakes made from last summer's fires. It rained quite a lot this spring but when I see how quickly a fire can start in a lightning storm and how much fuel there is in our forests, it is very reassuring to see how quickly the Ministry of Forests can react.

In my business as a landscape maintenance person, I seem to be called now and again when a yard has been neglected for some time to help bring it back to what it should look like. A lot of people call just because they don't like the look of the yard anymore, and they don't realize they have created a fire hazard in their own back yard. When is the last time you cleaned out those eight foot wide junipers on your hillside?

If you are like most people, you think they look great on the outside so that's all right. Yes, until someone accidentally throws a cigarette or something in there. I have found junipers with 10 years worth of old potato chip bags and newspaper blown in among dry dead juniper twigs. If a match got in there, it would ignite faster than if you had put lighter fluid on it.

Some people love to keep their Blue Spruce very low to the ground so it can become bird habitat, which is just fine, but take a little bit of time to clean up dead branches inside the spruce, some of that five-year old dead grass and spruce needles. If you don't, and lightning strikes your

tree next to your house, what are the chances that the fire department can make it to your house in time?

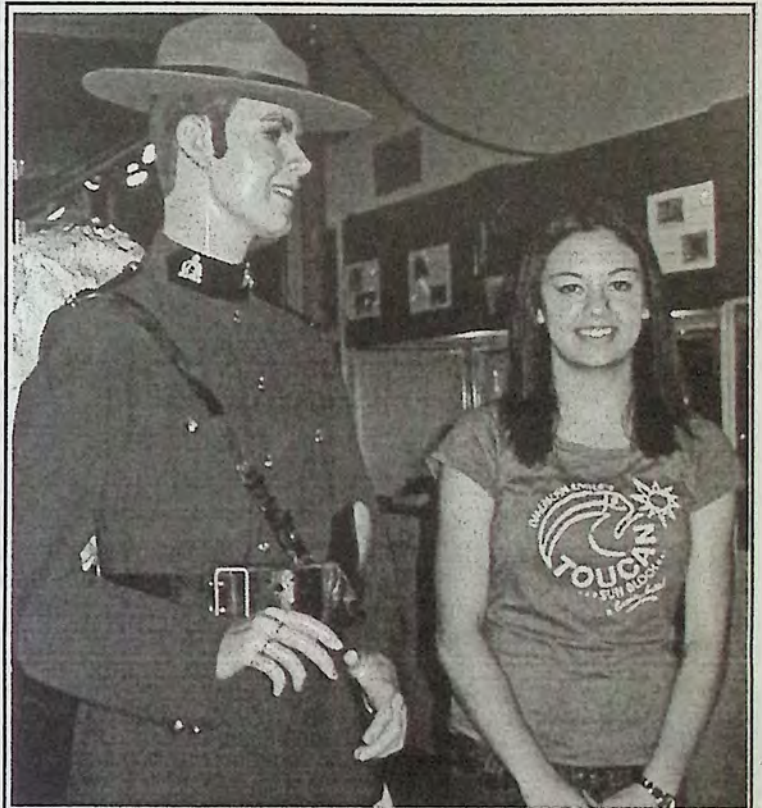
A lot of people say, "I just don't know where to start" when it comes to pruning and cleaning up a neglected yard. I always say they should start by cleaning out dead and dying branches, then shape the tree or shrub. I have seen vines such as honeysuckle and silver lace that have two truckloads of dead branches inside. Can you believe most of these are right against the siding on the house?

Insurance companies are very

strict on what type of heat used inside a house, but until they start fining people for the dead wood just outside their house, I guess we will not learn.

After seeing the damage around Kelowna last fall and what could have been prevented with a little clean-up in the area, I wonder why there can't be more funding for community projects to get rid of dead wood in populated areas.

Who should be responsible for the land near a newly developed sub-division of 100 houses that has 125 acres of forest surrounded with 20 percent of it full of dead and dying wood?

Better to have cherries than the pits

This is the season for cherries, and although they seem expensive, they are worth buying as fresh fruit and even preserving for winter, because cherries are good for you. They not only taste great, they contain Vitamin C and Vitamin A. Of even greater value, cherries contain factors which block the formation of cancer in the breast, lungs, stomach, liver and skin. Cherries contain Vitamin E, so necessary for heart health, and are actually better for you than Vitamin E capsules. Because cherries contain no fat, they are better sources of Vitamin E than nuts and oils, which are main sources of Vitamin E in most meals.

Cherries also contain quercetin, which works like Vitamin C in scouring free radicals and may help reduce the risk of stroke and cancer. Although the best cherries are those big black ones that taste the sweetest, they are lower in calories than a lot of snack foods. You could eat a whole cup of cherries and consume only 80 calories. You can't do that with candy or potato chips!

Anyone who suffers from gout should eat a lot of cherries and drink cherry juice daily. You can buy cherry cider at most fruit stands. Yes, it is expensive, but it will stop the pain of gout (gout sufferers should quit eating red meats and organ meats as well).

There is no cholesterol in cherries, and there is 2.2 grams of fibre per cup. What a great treat!

Taking Steps To Protect Your Inheritance

At some point in your life, you may inherit a sizable sum of money and what you do with it could have a major impact on your financial future. How should you handle your inheritance? To begin with, don't make any quick decisions, especially if the money is coming from a parent or a particularly close relative. Even as an adult, you need time to recover from a major loss. So, rather than making any emotional choices, you may just want to "park" the inheritance funds in a money market account for a while.

Eventually, though, you will need to decide how to put this money to its best use. Here's one suggestion: If you are carrying a large balance on a high-rate credit card, you may want to pay it off now. Many cards have interest rates of 16 per cent or more; since you would have a hard time finding an investment that paid that kind of return, your decision to get rid of the debt is a smart use of your money.

Once you've paid off any credit card debt, you'll want to look at other ways you can maximize your inheritance. Some people make the mistake of assuming that since they didn't have the money before, they are now free to invest it aggressively. And yet, if their investment goes sour, they end up regretting it just as much as if they'd invested money they had earned. Don't make hasty decisions without considering potential risk, as well as your comfort level with that risk.

If you're a moderate or conservative investor who wouldn't feel comfortable investing aggressively under normal circumstances, there's no way you're going to feel good about putting your inheritance in high-growth, high risk vehicles.

So, before you invest a dime of your new money, ask yourself: "What sort of investor am I?" If you've been investing for a while, it won't take long to come up with the answer. Then, ask yourself some more questions:

- "What are my long-term investment goals?"
- "When will I need this money?"
- "Is my portfolio properly diversified?"

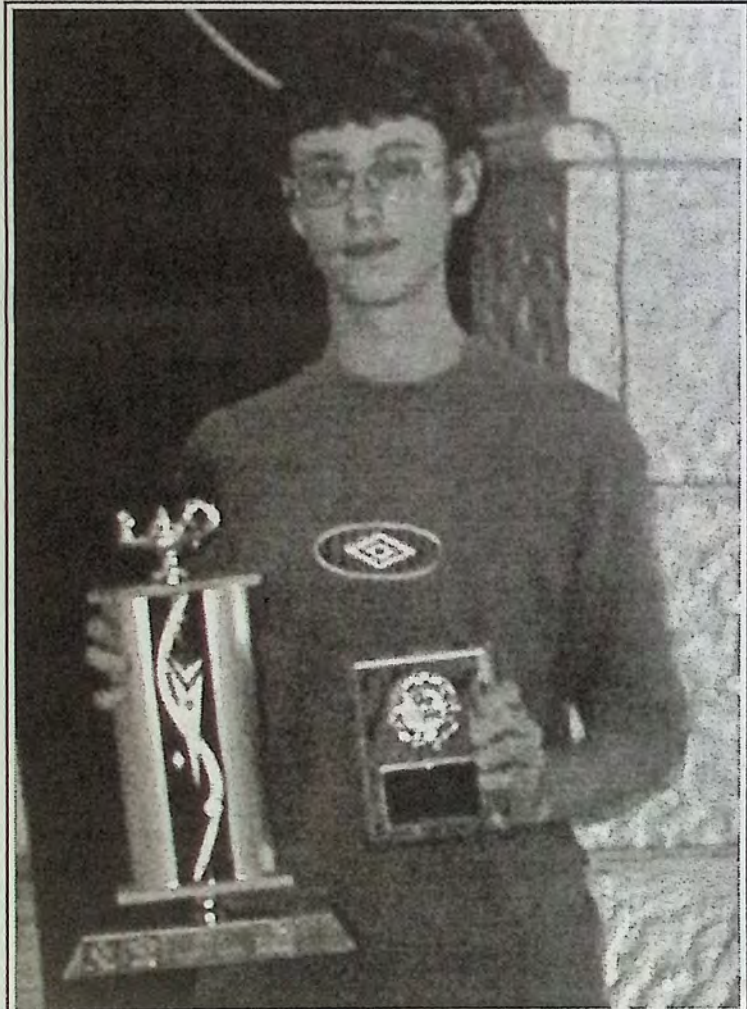

RRSP or Mortgage Pay-Down?

Which is better, contributing to your RRSP or paying down your mortgage? The RRSP-versus-mortgage question is a source of ongoing debate among many investors and financial professionals. The question is complex, and there is no definitive answer. The challenge is to determine what is more appropriate for you, given your current situation and long-term goals.

Three possible options are:

Option 1:

on Highway 3 at Mayne Avenue, is a memorial park where residents can plant a tree or install a bench in memory of a departed loved one.

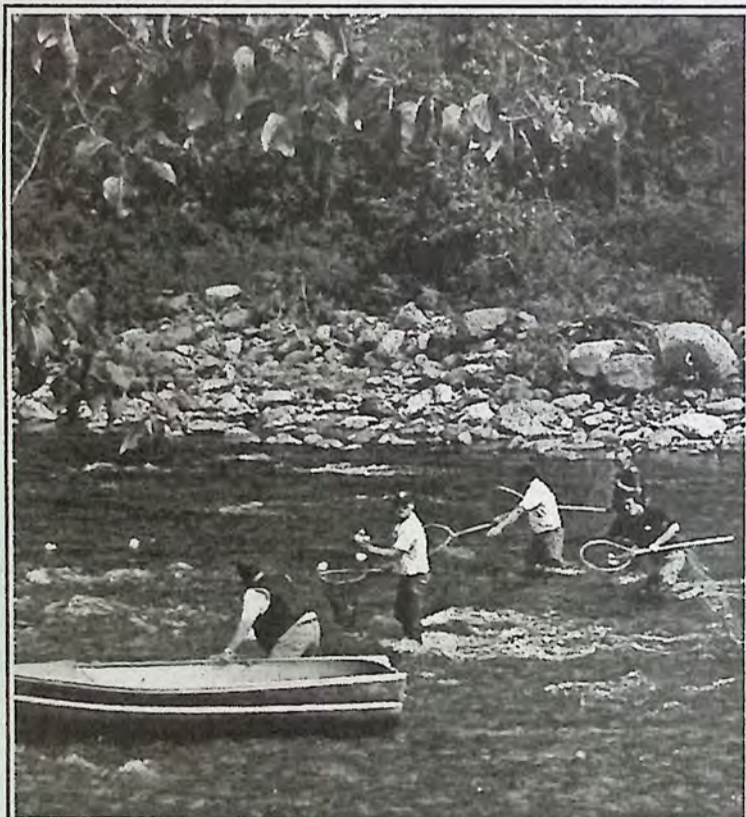
"The Penticton Rose Garden was developed this way, and the Karl Lang Park Committee sees the same thing happening here."

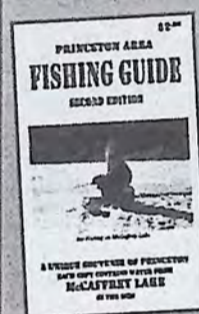

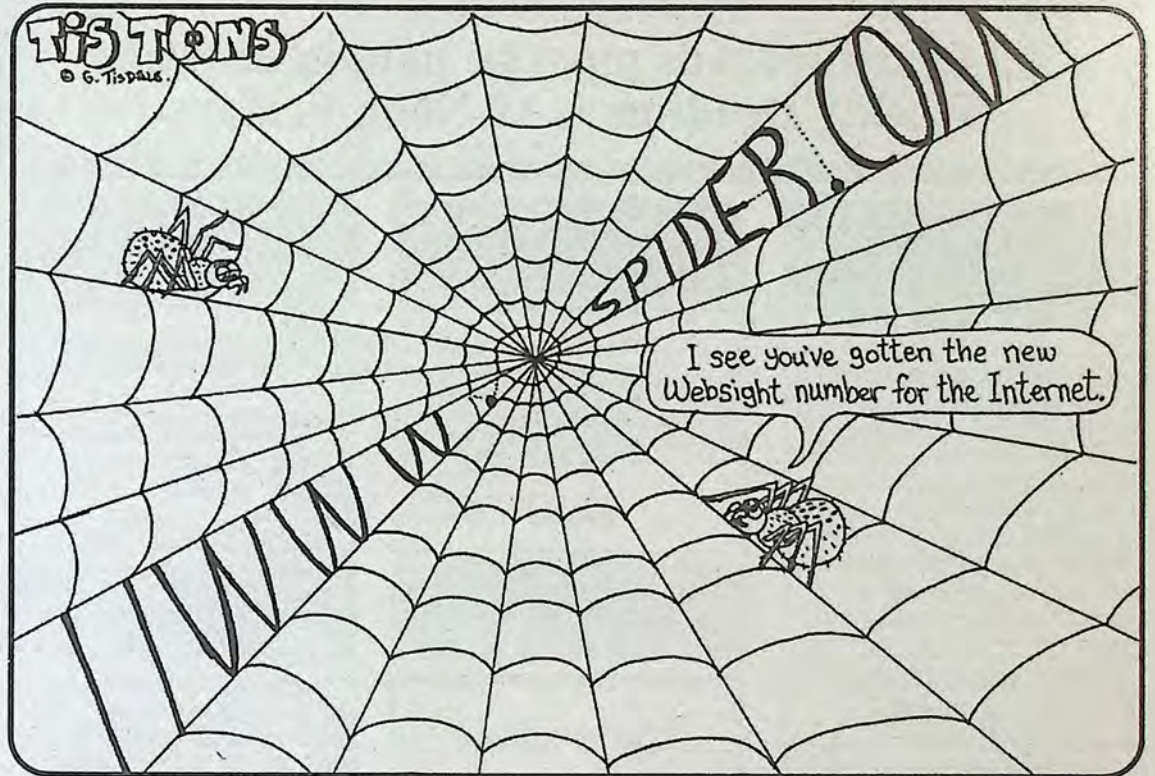

When are we our most "human" selves?

Brain research tells us a great deal about what it means to be human. There are those who maintain being human is just being the top of the evolutionary scale, that we are just an animal with a bigger brain. However, that bigger brain is what makes us unlike the rest of the animals. When we enter into "animal" behaviours, we are being less than human.

The human brain, like the brain of other mammals, is actually made up of three brains. Each of these brains relates to behaviours. We may share these behaviours with other creatures, but each, on its own, is not uniquely human.

The oldest part of the brain is the reptile brain. This part dates back to the dinosaurs, and is common to all animals. This reptile brain is the source of aggressiveness, love of rituals, establishing a "pecking order" and claiming and defending territory. When we see people behaving in a dictatorial manner, or insisting on ritualistic behaviour, killing or brutalizing others and fighting over territory or "turf", we see the dinosaur brain in charge of their behaviour. It is not particularly human. Aggressive behaviour, a pecking order, and ritual behaviour are common to not only reptiles, but birds, and most mammals.

The next evolutionary step in brainpower was the development of the limbic brain, which is connected to the reptile brain but has different functions and is twice the size of the reptile brain. The limbic brain gives us emotions, and the ability to nurture others. Some people believe our emotions and our caring for others are what make us most human, but this is not so. The limbic brain is common to all mammals, nearly all birds, and even a few reptiles, although it may not be as fully developed as in humans.

The third brain is the final step in the evolution of brain. The third brain is the neocortex, which is found in all mammals, with the biggest neocortex in humans. Dolphins are a close second, and chimpanzees third or fourth in terms of neocortex size. In the human brain, the neocortex is much larger than the reptile and limbic brains put together. Still, it

is not this big brain which makes us "human", although without it, we would not be human. The neocortex is where we do our abstract thinking, where we analyze, imagine, strategize, develop vocabulary, mathematical skills, and a sense of ourselves as individuals. Without proper linkage to the other two brains, we are at a disadvantage. Pure intellect is not really human, either.

What makes us truly human is the way the neocortex is linked to the other two brains. One scientist described the role of the neocortex as similar to one of those circus performers who rides two horses at once and controls both at the same time. When the neocortex, or the reasoning, analytical part of the brain is in control of the limbic and the reptile brains, then we are being our most human selves.

I have a hunch we are in an evolutionary process right now which is leading us further from the reptile brain. People my age and younger appear to be impatient with rituals, have no respect or admiration for dictatorships (even in the home), are less concerned with "who's boss?" (the pecking order) and look down on those who need to defend turf (unless it is physical, such as defending one's home or homeland). If such evolution is taking place, we need to look at why and how. It seems

those nations freed from the old European class system (such as North America and Australia) are the places which appear most free of social hierarchy, most interested in teamwork versus command from above, and least inclined to build military to claim more territory. We really need to know whether this evolution is occurring and how to make it happen elsewhere, because so much of the world seems to be attached to the behaviours of the reptile brain. We are not going to see real evolution until all of us can be the rider in control of the two wild horses beneath the newest brain.

We can look at our television news and see the ritual beheadings and territorial demands (reptile brain), the military hierarchy (reptile brain), the corporate territoriality and hierarchy (reptile brain) and the religious rituals and hierarchies (reptile brain). We can see the health care issues (limbic brain), the education and cultural development (limbic brain) and the maudlin emotions of all sorts of movies (limbic brain). In much shorter supply are the shows about analysis, such as detective shows like CSI, but have you noticed these are at the top of the viewer charts? We see the killer (reptile brain) pitted against the scientists (neocortex), and we like that show better than most others. Are we evolving? Let's hope so!

Victoria plans more, better weed control

Ranchers, gardeners and naturalists will be pleased to learn that Victoria has allocated a lot more money for noxious weed control. An additional \$3.3 million is added to the fund, bringing the total to \$8 million over the next two years, beginning now.

This is particularly good news in the Similkameen Valley, where knapweed, toad flax, and hounds tongue have spread out of control. As these plants are not native to the land being invaded, the local ecosystem has no way to combat their spread. Invasive weeds such as these "noxious" weeds crowd out native plants, cause damage to wildlife habitats, reduce crop yield and lower land values.

Premier Gordon Campbell has announced an Invasive Plant Advisory Panel which will provide long-term solutions to control

Council says 'No' to Red Rock

Rosemary Doughty, who runs the Cindy Parolin Safe Homes Program, and Shirley Low, representing Red Rock Productions, a local non-profit film company, made a funding request to Town Council on June 21.

Doughty outlined the uniqueness of the Princeton safe homes program, which offers a safe home in

the community for women who are victims of domestic violence. Doughty explained the local program is unique thanks to the high level of cooperation between the RCMP, Citizens on Patrol, Victim Services and other community resource people. Doughty said she feels a film about the program should be made because it illus-

trates how the needs of rural women differ greatly from those of urban women when homes are unsafe due to domestic violence. The film would guarantee confidentiality to individual cases used to illustrate how the program works.

Council was unable to grant the funds due to an extremely tight budget this year.

Mayor Keith Olsen told the two women, "This is the tightest budget I've seen in five years. There's no money available."

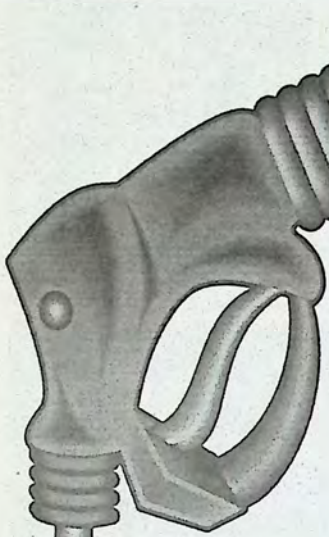
