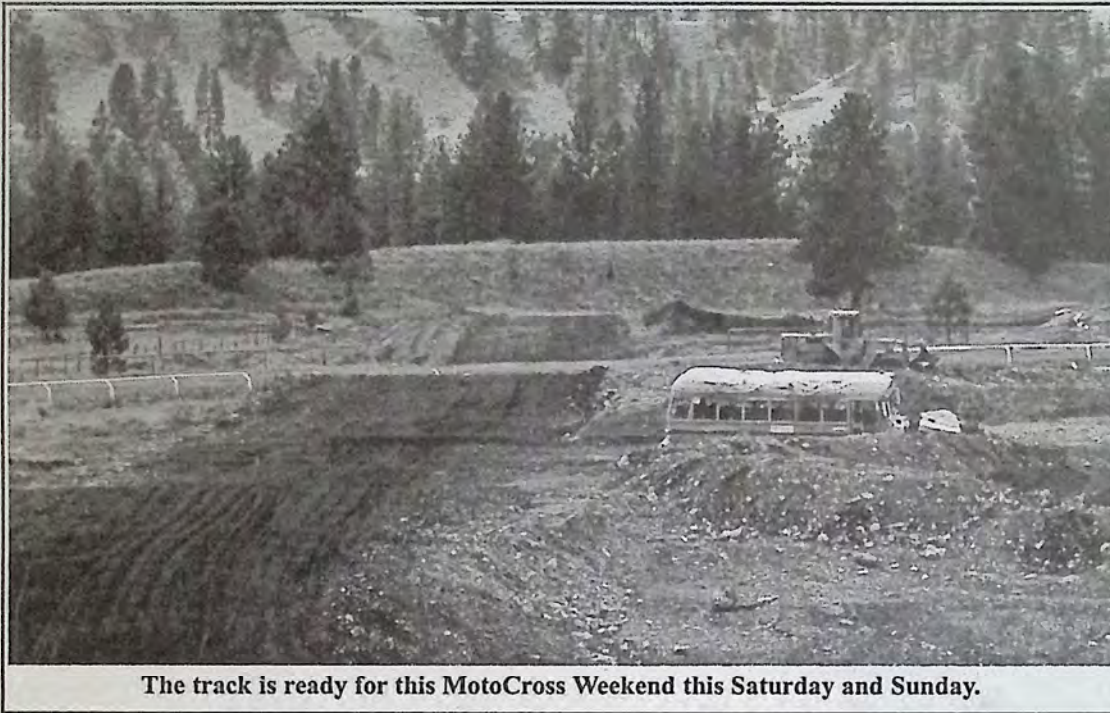
"We've reorganized from the ashes of the Princeton ATV club," Lubiak says.

## Campfire ban lifted

The B. C. Forest Service has lifted the campfire ban for the entire Kamloops Fire Centre, which includes the Princeton area.

The ban was lifted at 4:00 PM on Wednesday, July 7th.

Fire Information Officer Shelley Marsh says the cooler temperatures and recent rainfall throughout the region have reduced the fire danger in the majority of the Kamloops Fire Centre to low to moderate.

The reduced fire danger has prompted Forest Officials to rescind the campfire ban that was issued on June 28th.

Campfires are now allowed in the Kamloops Fire Centre until further notice.

The B. C. Forest Service reminds the public to exercise caution when having a campfire.

Never leave a campfire unattended and always keep water and a shovel on site to extinguish the fire.

## Arts Council elects executive

After facing a crisis situation, Princeton Arts Council held its annual general meeting on July 6 at the Cultural Centre. A total of 22 people attended. Ross Chaston, outgoing president, gave a brief review of problems which will have to be addressed, including the problem of raising money for utilities for the Cultural Centre. Power and heat use approximately \$3,000 per year, and although Town of Princeton has funded this in the past, On August 1, this assistance will cease. Public liability insurance is an added expense, putting the total annual cost of operation of the Cultural Centre at between \$3,500 and \$4,000, depending on weather and use.

There was no year-end financial statement, which is to be submitted in two weeks, but the bank balance showed the Arts Council must raise more money annually to cover the cost of keeping the Cultural Centre open and functioning.

Don Coyle conducted the election. Dawn Johnson was elected President, with Fred Leard as Vice-President, Nick Mills as Treasurer and Cathie Orser as Secretary. Directors are John Sandness, Joseph Dubé, Jean Haugland, Dell Hall, Norma Kraetor and Mary Bedford.

Following the election, the new president took the chair, and thanked the outgoing executive for their hard work at what often appeared to be a thankless job. The immediate business to be attended to includes clarification of the Town's expectations

regarding use of the Cultural Centre, as nobody appeared to have anything in writing about Council's rules for the Arts Council's role as managers of the building.

The next item of concern was obtaining grants for future programs. A motion passed authorizing the executive to find out whether Princeton Arts Council would be eligible for status as a charity under federal taxation legislation so as to be able to give tax exemption receipts to donors. Bill Spring suggested there would be far greater likelihood of receiving grants through the B.C. Access grants from lottery funds. He said he would help Nick Mills work on an application.

At the end of the meeting, Joseph

Dubé was given a gift in appreciation for all of the work he does, year-round, to keep the Cultural Centre open and operational. It is a big job, and his efforts are appreciated. A gift went to Rodger and Rose Stanley for their having begun the Arts Council 12 years ago. The Stanleys have moved to Penticton due to health considerations.

The Arts Council executive will meet early in August at the call of the chair, and the next regular meeting will be in September. In the meantime, executive members have been asked to do some gathering of information and each Director has been asked to consider and define the role he or she can play in meeting the objectives of the Arts Council.

## RCMP report on long weekend on the highway

During the July 1 long weekend, Princeton RCMP conducted road checks and radar enforcement in an effort to make the highways safer for the traveling public and local residents.

Three drivers were arrested for impaired operation of a motor vehicle, seven drivers were issued 24 hour driving suspensions, there were a few small drug seizures and some charges in relation to consuming liquor in a public place.

Police responded to six motor vehicle accidents during the weekend. Two occurred on Highway 3 west of Princeton within an hour

of each other on the evening of June 30. One involved two vehicles sideswiping each other after one driver lost control. The other collision resulted when a driver lost control and left the highway and went into the Similkameen River near Eastgate. Injuries in both collisions were minor.

On Sunday, July 4, a 51 year old Keremeos woman lost control of her vehicle on Old Hedley Road. The vehicle hit an embankment, rolled, and the vehicle burst into flames. She was treated for minor injuries at Princeton General Hospital.

## Mining claims spike in Yale-Lillooet divisions

Lillooet, Similkameen and Nicola mining divisions have seen a significant increase in mining claims staked to date in 2004.

MLA Dave Chutter says this is a sign of renewed confidence. He stated, "Claims are the first step toward developing operating mines and long-term, well-paid jobs. The increase in claims in this region is an extremely positive sign that the mining industry is ready to invest in British Columbia."

Lillooet mining division saw 1,159 claims staked from January to May 2004, up from 299 during the same period last year and 246 in 2002. Nicola mining division had 491 claims for the same period this year, up

from 373 in 2003 and 131 in 2002. The Similkameen mining division had 185 claims staked this year, compared with 91 in 2003 and 155 in 2002.

Chutter credits the BC Liberal government with cutting the red tape and clearing up land use issues to make mining more appealing to investors.

"We streamlined approval processes and improved certainty for investors by creating a two-zone system that defines lands as either open or closed to mining."

Exploration spending by B.C.'s mining sector increased by as much as 300 percent since 2001. There are nearly 600 active and proposed drilling projects across B.C. this year that will create 1,000 exploration jobs.

## Local grad wins gold in USA

A team of OUC business students did extremely well at the fortieth annual International Business Strategy Competition held at the University of San Diego. The competition was conducted online beginning in January and culminating in April. The OUC team was considered at a disadvantage due to youth and inexperience, but they took top awards.

Former Princeton Secondary School grad Victor Darel, a third year OUC student, was on the winning team.

This was the second year Okanagan University College entered a team and won the gold. Last year, Victor Darel was on the winning team. The Business Education department at OUC has proven its excellence in competing internationally in business strategy competitions.

## Business moves from home to Olympics

Angela Beaudin first met her future business partner, Dallas Fish, three years ago when both were working in Vancouver.

Fish, with a degree in graphic design, was working at a sign shop when Beaudin was hired on in the accounting department.

Beaudin started working on sign production and learned how to run a press while taking a marketing course.

The two girls decided to join forces and go into business for themselves and set up a one-stop business image shop in Penticton, Beaudin's hometown.

The home-based business was a challenge at first as Beaudin explains, "We really had to pound the streets, introducing ourselves. It was a bit of a struggle."

Fish submitted a business plan to Community Futures and she received a one year grant.

In return, Brainstorm provided aid to new businesses supported by Community Futures by providing marketing strategies and logo designs.

The home-based business supplied in house graphic design, signs, printing and promotional items.

Eventually Brainstorm Graphic Studios took off.

"Once we got a couple of good

customers they started to become loyal," says Beaudin, "We quickly outgrew our home-based business in a matter of months as our client base grew so quickly."

Within six months Brainstorm expanded into a bigger shop and purchased a large format printer for bigger outdoor signage.

"With the help of our website we were drawing customers from Whistler, Vancouver and all over the United States," Beaudin explains.

"Thirty percent of our work is web-based and out of town."

This includes a number of clients in Keremeos, Hedley and Princeton.

After feeding work back and forth to a company in Surrey, the girls were approached to head up a satellite shop for Century Sign Systems in Squamish which would incorporate the design services of Brainstorm.

"We'll be focusing on the corridor's growth and associated Olympic works. We will be specializing in custom fabricating awning signage and a wide range of other types of signage and large format outdoor digital printing."

Beaudin, 32, a single mother with boys aged 10 and 11, and Fish, also 32 and single, sold

their homes and are ready to honour their eight year contract, which starts August 1st.

"We're excited to be doing larger scale signage and the Olympic work," says Beaudin, "We'll get to be more creative with our signage - more 3D."

In just over two years in business, the girls collected over 500 clients and traded business with sign shops in Princeton and Osoyoos.

Some of their local clients included Hedley House, Cover2Cover Bookkeeping and Similkameen News Leader.

The girls say the Whistler Cup and Olympic work is an opportunity they found hard to resist and will attempt to continue servicing existing clients.

"More and more of our business is being handled electronically and we'll be offering shipping discounts to customers in the Okanagan."

One thing is for sure, while many will be watching the 2010 Olympics for the sports competition, some will be watching for something else - signs made by two girls who got to the games from a home-based business in Penticton.

"We might be back," Beaudin smiles, "In eight or ten years."

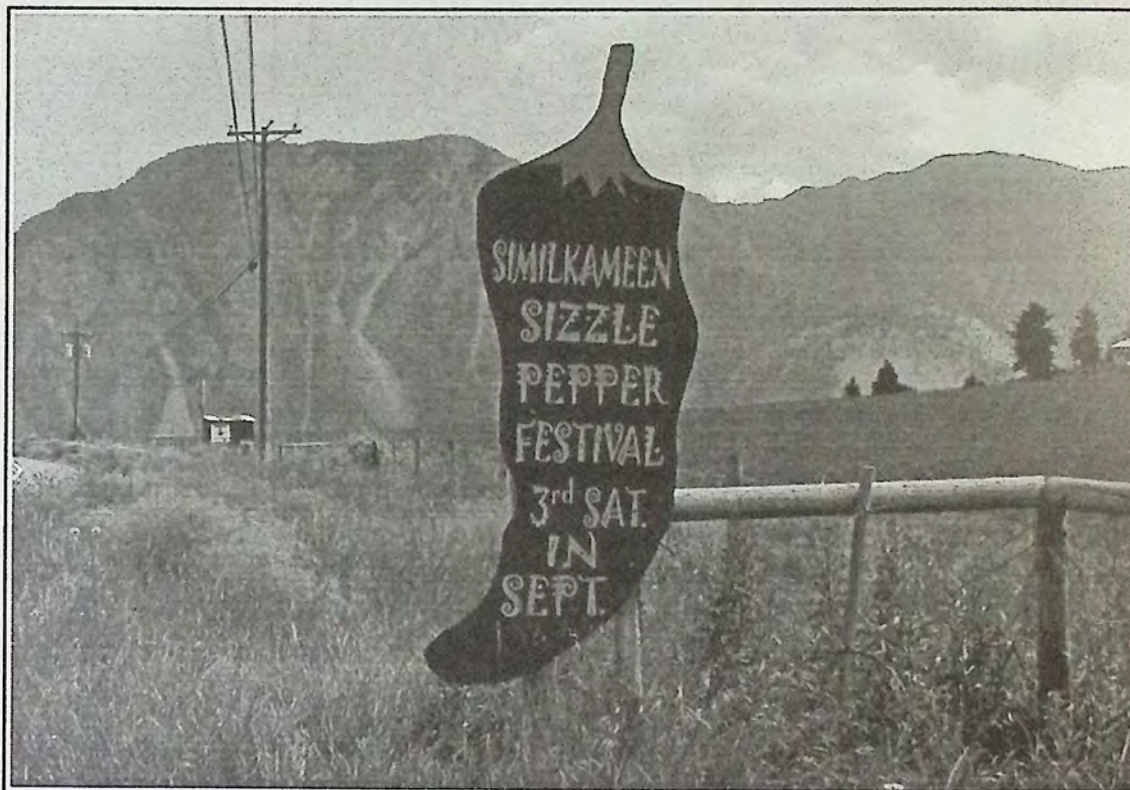

## Keremeos prepares for 100 mile race

The first 100 Mile marathon to Cathedral Park and back will take place July 24. Runners will go from Keremeos up to the 8500 foot level in Cathedral Park. This is the race organized by Moe "The Eagle" Beaulieu, and he states he is "extremely pleased with the excellent support in general" from people in the Similkameen and South Okanagan.

Sponsors are: Peach City Runners, Keremeos Valu Plus Foods, Similkameen Country, Culligan Water, Ron Sherk of Okanagan GPS in Summerland, Trail Runner magazine, and Hammer Nutrition.

Canadian Helicopters has offered to make top of the mountain water drops if there are no fires in progress, and B.C. Parks will allow the drops on Lakeview Mountain and the Rim. Keremeos and Oliver Search and Rescue will be spotters on site. Cawston and Keremeos Horse Riders have volunteered to pack water part way up Ewart Creek the day

before the race. Wayne Still will be on hand at the finish line to offer body work, sports massage, and so forth. Support is coming from Cathedral Lakes Park, who have given full cooperation to the run organizer.

## Keremeos shows top increase in real estate sales

Keremeos once again leads the South Okanagan Real Estate Board's list of sales. For the month of June, 2004, Keremeos area showed an amazing 157 percent increase over June 2003. A total of 18 properties were sold.

Osoyoos showed a substantial increase of 123 percent, but Oliver's sales are down slightly in comparison with last June. Penticton was up only two percent, and Princeton went down 12 percent. Kaleden and Okanagan Falls area dropped a whopping 38 percent, and Summerland dropped even lower, down 52 percent from last year.

Naramata sales increased by 14

percent.

The average selling price of a property in Keremeos increased by 18 percent, and in Princeton, the price was up 16 percent. Although Oliver number of sales dropped, the selling price increased 28 percent.

Summerland is in the same position - fewer sales, but the selling price is up by 22 percent.

The average selling price in Keremeos was \$117,836, as compared with Princeton's \$101,269. Selling prices in Princeton are lower than any other location in the South Okanagan region.

The average sale price within the region was approximately \$178,000.

There are currently close to 250 people registered to date who plan to be in Keremeos for the event.

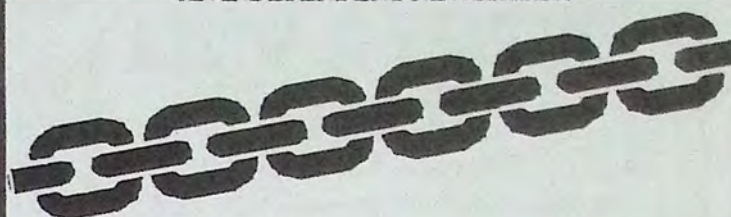
Organizers have been in contact with many of the former students, teachers and staff but not all were able to be located.

# Drownings decrease in B.C.

July 24 is National Drowning Prevention Day. This year, it will celebrate the fact that the number of drownings in B.C. is decreasing. During the past five years, the number of drownings has dropped from 112 in 1998 to 89 in 2002, a 21 percent decrease. The population of B.C. increased 3.6 percent during that same time which makes the per capita drowning rate even more noteworthy.

Dale Miller, Lifesaving Society Executive Director, stated, "We can only hope that our lifesaving programs and public education are having the desired effect."

Some drownings are predictable in time and gender. Each year, nearly half of all drownings occur in June, July and August, meaning a person dies every second day in B.C. during the summer.

Males continue to make up more than 80 percent of drowning victims, partly due to their risk-taking activities, but also due to the majority of anglers being male.

The average age of drowning was 18-34 years old. More recently, drowning is more likely among people age 35 to 49.

More than 55 percent of drownings occurred when the victim was in the company of others, many of whom attempted a rescue but were unsuccessful or would have put their own lives at risk.

## Car hits semi

On July 8, Princeton RCMP and BC Ambulance responded to an accident on Highway 3 east of Princeton near the Culbertson Way intersection. A semi unit had stopped on the highway for deer when a second vehicle heading east did not notice the vehicle was stopped and rear-ended the trailer unit. There was extensive damage to the Chevrolet Cavalier. Both air bags deployed. The female driver from Princeton was transported to hospital and released in a short time.

Lifesaving skills could reduce the number of these tragedies.

The highest risk is boating, and powerboats are involved in 71 percent of boating fatalities, primarily by the boat capsizing or being swamped.

To avoid drowning:

- \* wear a life jacket - more than 90 percent of drowning victims were not wearing a life jacket.
- \* do not mix alcohol and boating - more than 40 percent of drownings involve alcohol. It is illegal to

drink and drive a boat.

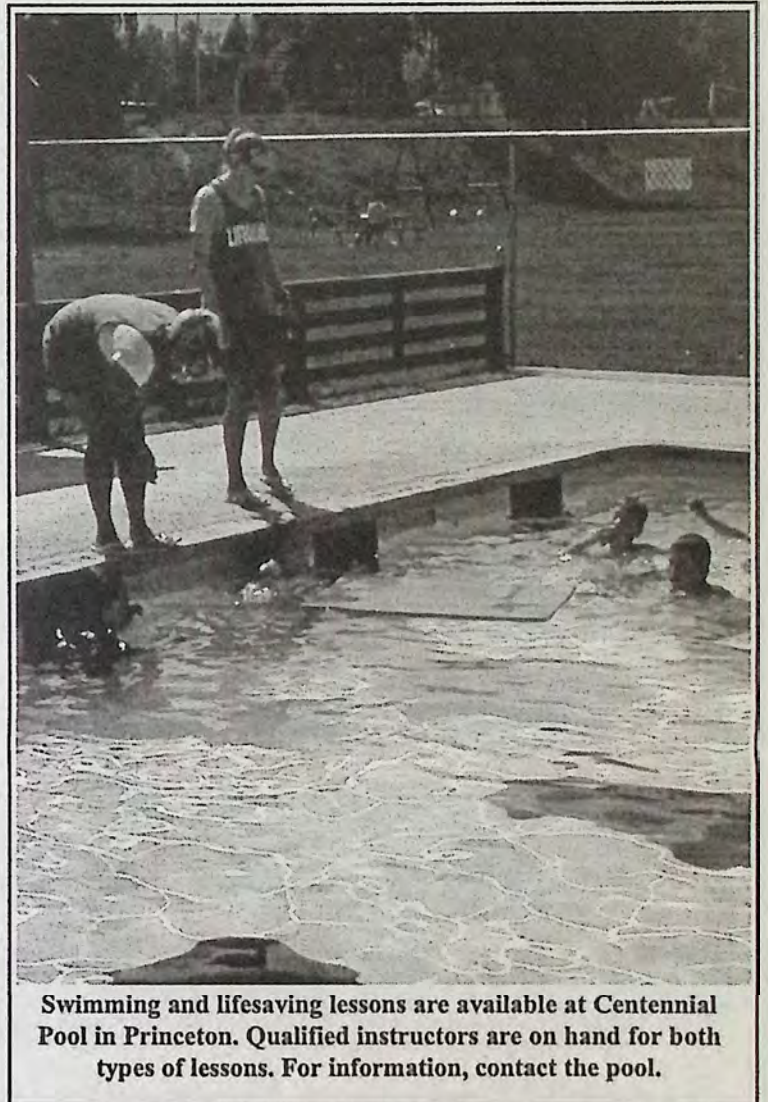
\* keep kids within arm's reach around pools, ponds, beaches or any body of water.

\* fence your backyard pool and ensure gates have self-locking latches.

\* be trained in rescue techniques

\* the whole family should learn to swim.

## Living Past 100

To make matters even better, this fruit is good for your skin, eyes, digestion, and builds up resistance to colds and sinus problems. Apricots are loaded with Vitamin A (carotene).

Medical research has shown the benefits of carotene in fighting cancer of the stomach, bladder, esophagus, lungs and throat. You can get all the carotene you need from apricots. People of the Tashkent, who normally live past 100 years of age, swear by the bountiful harvest of apricots on which they depend.

Apricots are good for heart health as they contain both carotene and lycopene, both of which have been shown to fight cholesterol and turn it into good fat.

Apricots help prevent macular degeneration, the leading cause of loss of sight in older people.

Need fibre? Apricots contain plenty.

Apricots contain other good stuff - potassium and iron.

Generally, in the Similkameen, apricots are not too expensive to buy in quantity and preserve. You can use them for canning, making jam, or apricot sauce for desserts such as ice cream or cake, and for pancakes. However, eat them raw as long as the season lasts, because eating them raw is the best way.

Tip: do not peel apricots. Just rinse the dust off them and enjoy!

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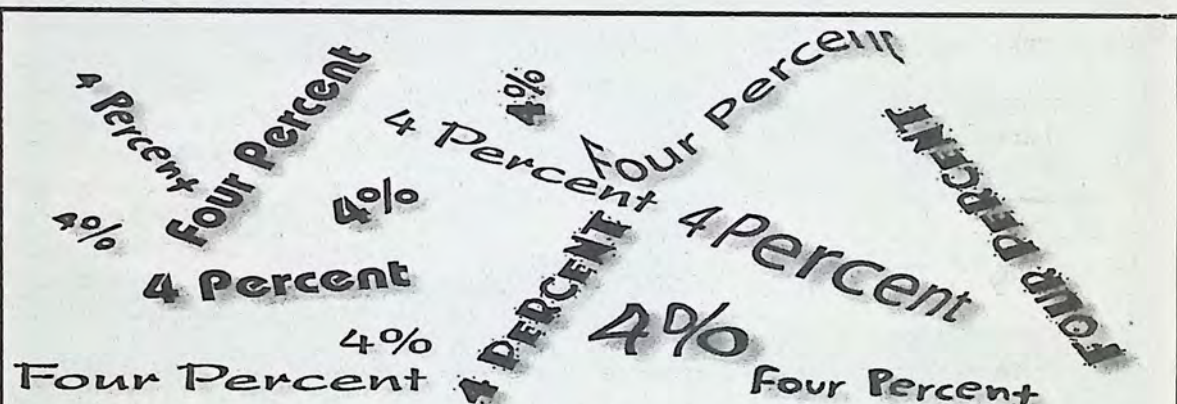
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**Ministry of Skills Development and Labour says:  
More jobs for British Columbians in June**

The June 2004 labour force survey, coupled with continued good news on the housing starts front, reinforces the fact that B. C.'s economy is on the rebound, said Skills Development and Labour Minister Graham Bruce last week.

"Last month more than 35,000 full-time jobs were created, bringing the total to 167,800 new jobs since December 2001," said Bruce. "The June 2004 employment level of almost 2.1 million marks the 17th consecutive month where B. C.'s workforce has topped two million."

Taking into account a decline of 7,900 part-time jobs, B. C.'s

net total of 27,200 new jobs remains the highest in Canada. The job gains were primarily in construction, information, culture and recreation as well as food and accommodation, and virtually all of it was outside the metropolitan Vancouver area.

"The data from Stats Canada supports the anecdotal feedback we're hearing that tourism is making a comeback in B. C.," said Bruce.

"In the tourism sector there were 13,100 more jobs in June than in May, and in the resource sector, which includes forestry, we saw 2,200 more jobs in June than one month earlier."

The youth component is also showing renewal growth. A total of 304,600 people between the ages of 15 and 24 were working this June, Vs. 285,500 a year ago. The proportion of youth working or looking for work this month is 64.2 per cent, a jump of more than 4 per

cent from 59.9 per cent in June 2003.

"The numbers show more young people are finding work and, in turn, more young people are being drawn into the labour force to look for jobs," said Bruce.

Housing starts in the province continue to produce good results. Vancouver leads Canada in housing starts with a 42 per cent increase over June 2003.

January to June this year saw a 46.5 per cent growth over the first six months one year ago. On Vancouver Island, homebuilding is 40 per cent ahead of the 2003 January to June totals.

"The numbers are good, and show a positive trend in economic growth across B. C.," said Bruce. "It's important that we, as government, continue to look for new ways of stimulating the economy because a strong, vibrant economy is the foundation for strengthening communities and families."

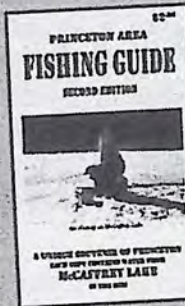

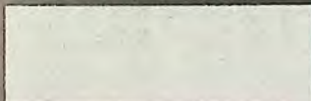

## What to do on a Summer day in Princeton

Is Princeton boring? Are you stuck with a bunch of visitors and don't know what to do with them? Start exploring your own home town and the whole area. Here are some things you could do:

\* You could visit **Phifer's Fountain**. Local residents donated money to have this giant wood sculpture moved alongside the Trans Canada Trail in downtown Princeton, right across the street from Irlly Bird Builders Mart. You could have lunch at the picnic table then take a walk (or bike) westward and go through the tunnel and cross the trestle bridge over the Tulameen River.

\* You could visit Princeton's

museum and see the artifacts of days gone by, and the world class fossil and mineral collection in the Pollard Wing of the museum. Joe Pollard lived in Tulameen and Princeton and collected rocks and fossils for many years. After his death, his widow, Shirley Pollard, donated his vast collection to Princeton Museum & Archives, and the provincial government gave a grant that, added to local donations, built the Pollard Wing on the museum.

\* You could go swimming, boating, fishing, camping or picnicking at more than 100 lakes within a short driving distance of Princeton.

\* You could swim or play tennis at Memorial Park, just east of the

Similkameen River near downtown Princeton, or you could go tubing down the river (or canoeing or kayaking or rafting).

\* You could trace the historic **Dewdney Trail** along Old Hedley Road east of Princeton. Some of the old sections remain above the present road near the first forestry camp. Look for orange granite bluffs by the river, then look up the hill.

\* You could go to the **skateboard park** near the arena and enjoy skateboarding.

\* You could go **gold panning** in Tulameen or Similkameen River.

\* You could drive to **Coalmont** and visit the historic **Coalmont Hotel** and ask for directions to Granite Creek where a gold rush was launched in 1885 (yes, there's still gold in them thar hills).

\* You could **golf** at Princeton's 18 hole golf course three kilometres east of the town.

\* You could **hunt for fossils** at Whipsaw Creek (10 km. east of Princeton) or along Highway 5A north of Princeton or along the Coalmont Road.

\* You could go to the **Royal Canadian Legion** or **Senior Citizens Hall** and meet local people, or you could visit a local pub.

\* You could go **hiking** on the many trails in the Similkameen Valley (buy a hiking guide at the Tourist Information Centre).

\* You could **play in the rivers** (but do wear shoes, the rocks are slippery).

\* You could **hunt for driftwood** on the river sandbars downstream from Princeton.

\* You could go **horseback riding** at local guest ranches.

## TURKEY SLOPPY JOES

1 lb. ground turkey  
 1 cup onion, thinly sliced  
 1/2 cup green pepper, chopped  
 1 cup ketchup  
 1/4 cup sweet pickle relish  
 1 1/2 tsp. chili powder  
 1 tsp Worcestershire sauce  
 1/2 tsp seasoned salt  
 1/2 tsp garlic powder  
 1/4 tsp celery seed  
 1 loaf French or Italian bread  
 (or hamburger buns)

In a large skillet, over medium-high heat, saute turkey, onion, and peppers 5 minutes or until turkey is no longer pink. Add ketchup, relish, chili powder, Worcestershire sauce, seasoned salt, garlic powder and celery seed. Bring to boil. Reduce heat to low; cover and simmer 30 minutes. Slice bread in half, lengthwise and toast under broiler 1 to 2 minutes or until lightly browned. To serve, spoon turkey mixture over one half of bread and top with other half. Cut into eight slices.

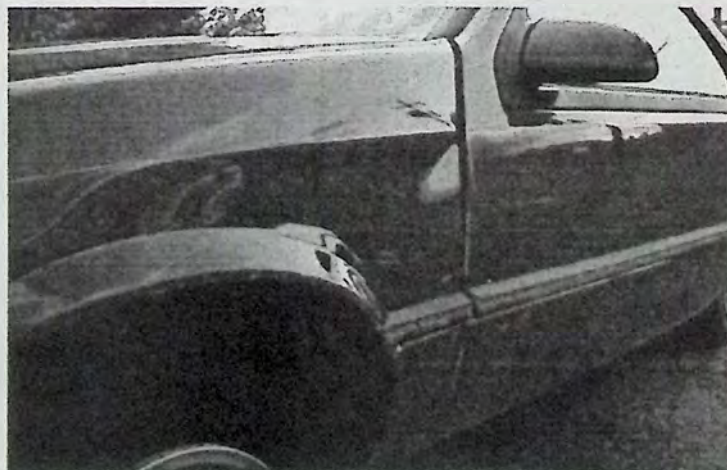

# You have to watch those immigrants!

Recently, I listened to a speech from a person who warned about immigrants to Canada who object to our ways, and for whom we change the rules and laws. I agree with her. We do have to observe the impact of our immigrants on our way of life if we want to preserve what we believe Canadians should be. I agree because immigrants ruined the society in which my great-grandmother was raised, and almost completely destroyed her culture and language, and certainly changed laws and rights.

My great-grandmother's people welcomed the immigrants. Initially, there were only a few immigrants and although their ways were strange, everyone got along with each other. There were some arguments when the immigrants wanted my great-grandmother's people to convert to their religion and to change marriage customs. However, the majority ruled.

As more immigrants came, they made an increasing impact. It was not all bad. New enterprises

sprang up, and the local people and the immigrants did business with one another to the benefit of both.

By the time my great-grandmother married, there were lots of immigrants coming every year, and conflict escalated. A man from her family was shot by an immigrant who felt he should not have to pay for the horses he wanted to use. Justice was done by the immigrants. There was another incident in which some immigrants raped local women, and this time it was my great-grandmother's brother who saw justice was done.

The year her first child was born, the immigrants had taken over a neighbouring nation, but they made a deal with my great-grandmother's nation to have the right to live among her people but abide by her people's laws and customs.

By the time her first child was a teenager, the immigrants had taken over her people's nation, had lost the papers they signed, and had actually turned over my great-grandmother's nation to a foreign nation! The foreign nation imposed new laws. They told my great-grandmother's people where they could live, what they could own, what the laws would be, and where the children would go to school. The children were taught the immigrants' religion, language and

customs. All of my great-grandmother's people became impoverished, because they could no longer engage in businesses. They became second-class citizens in their own land. The immigrants took over everything.

My great-grandmother was born near Keremeos around 1843. All of what happened to my great-grandmother's people happened right here. Yes, you really have to watch out for those immigrants!

This story may seem to belong to another century, but we have seen, in this century, how immigrants went into a country on the Mediterranean coast, bought up land, kept moving in, and eventually, when they were the majority, claimed it as their own. I am speaking of Israel, and no, I am not anti-Semitic. I am merely speaking the truth about what happened.

Most of the time, immigrants come in bearing arms and declaring war. The conquered nation submits to the conquerors. In the case of my great-grandmother's people, they shared what they had with the newcomers and eventually the newcomers took everything.

If you want to preserve your rights, your culture, your religion and your territory, you can learn a lot from what immigrants did to my great-grandmother's people.

## Think green for fall fashions

So you think it's too early to worry about fall fashions? Think it over - if you know what's coming, you can purchase summer clothing that will move into the new fall look.

**Jewelry** - Lots of beads, glitter and pearls come in ropes, chokers and bracelets. Brooches decorate collars, lapels and scarves. Body piercing is out, except for earrings.

**Hair** - Long hair is worn in a bun or chignon (nape of the neck bun). Shorter hair is sleek. The goal is elegance, simplicity. Waves are in, but curls are out, especially those long ringlets.

**Make-up** - Get rid of black mascara unless you are naturally dark-skinned. Go to brown, and line with soft shades of grey, green or mauve. The look is softer, more natural. Lipstick is in softer shades, so is eye shadow and blush. The look is more natural, keeping in tune with the

look of health and fitness. Even nail polish is toned down, not only with lighter shades, but with sheers, so the healthy nail can be seen through the polish. If you have been plucking your eyebrows to a pencil line, let them grow in again. The look is more natural this fall.

## Preparing exhibits for the Fall Fair

The annual Fall Fair is an opportunity for people in the Similkameen Valley to show off the products from farm and garden. Many people hesitate to put their crafts, canning, baking, or needlework into the Fall Fair because they did not think about it in advance. A Fall Fair prize list and rule book will come out in August, but before that time, think about what you want to exhibit. Select your items, put them in a separate place from items you regularly use, and prepare them as exhibits. Unless you exhibit flowers and vegetables, nothing should be left to the last minute.

Needlework should be clean, pressed if needed, and mounted on a paper backing if necessary. Canning jars should be sparkling clean in proper canning jars, not in commercial recycled jars. Crafts should be at the peak of appearance. Art work and photography should be framed and/or mounted as required well in advance.

These are simple, sensible tips, and appropriate for things you can do well in advance, but what about those flowers, fruit and vegetables? What about the baking? You cannot do them in advance, but you can decide what you are going to display and make a list of what you will need in order to display them. For example, you will need a certain number of flowers, fruits or vegetables to meet the requirements of the exhibit. Do not be discouraged if you

cannot, because there are categories for mixed vegetables and flowers.

If you are exhibiting livestock or poultry, make sure they are in top condition a day or two before entering them as an exhibit. Every animal or bird must be healthy and properly groomed. Even chickens and ducks must arrive clean and be kept clean. Make sure you have the necessary equipment to move the animal or bird to the fair, and that your grooming equipment is ready to move.

If you are entering baked

goods, prepare your recipe cards in advance, and make sure you have the paper plates on which to exhibit your product. Elaborate baked goods, such as a wedding cake, will require a lot of advance planning and display space. Other items, such as cookies, can be made a day in advance, but for top marks by the judges, you will want to do your baking the same day it will be judged. You have until 6:00 p.m. Friday, September 10, to enter your products.

It is often the pre-planning which makes exhibits a success.

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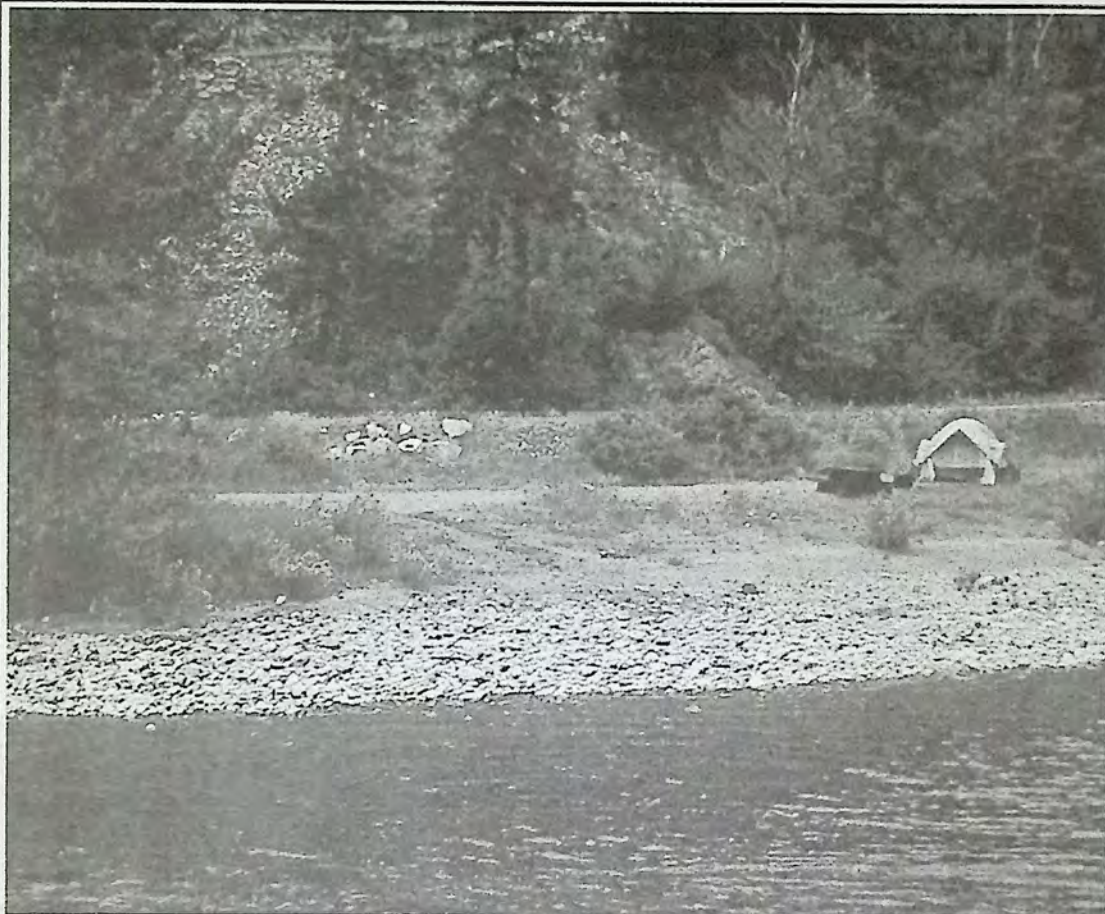

Planning to rent a table at the Fall Fair and sell your product? Here are some tips from B.C. Agriculture to help you make the most of your opportunity.

- \* Customer service should be your top priority.
- \* Put some positive energy into your presentation - make it exciting, connect with your

customers, make it fun.

- \* Provide some information about your product that will interest your customer.
- \* If you can offer free samples, do so.
- \* Don't be afraid to give away a product - have your customers put their names in a draw.
- \* When customers buy, encourage them to give you their names and addresses for future contacts.
- \* If you have brochures, be sure to give them to every person who comes to your booth. If you have e-mail ordering, be sure to include that information.
- \* Advertise in advance that you will be at the fair and specify what you will sell.
- \* Always thank your customers!
