Princeton MotorSports Association (PMA) hosted their first MotoX Event last weekend at Princeton Fairgrounds.

A total of 30 racers entered, including two locals - Cody Wharton (80cc 7-12 year old Class) and Garrett Preston (50cc 6 and Under Class).

Saturday was a practice day with Sunday race day with a total of 14 races (two per Class).

## PXA praises Harkness' organization

Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) praised Ron Harkness, who organized and backed "Princeton Rocks" concert on the July long weekend. At the July 13 PXA meeting, Peter Ruoss reported on the concert's use of the fairgrounds, and said Harkness did a great job of organizing the event. Everything was kept very clean, and some minor improvements were made to one of the buildings. In addition, Harkness has obtained a donation of 40 gallons of paint from Penticton Home Hardware to freshen the facade of "Similkameen Hotel" (the back of the grandstand).

In other concerns about the grounds, three windows were broken on the grounds, one in the concession stand was vandalism. The other two were accidental breakages. All have been repaired.

The Moto-X track was completed to everyone's satisfaction, and Princeton Motorsports members thanked John Bey for his help in putting in the irrigation system. Princeton Motorsports Association recommended replacing the steel horse racing track rails with white plastic plumbing pipe when repairs are necessary. Vern Preston said this is the new standard for race tracks, as the plastic causes fewer injuries to jockeys and horses when mishaps occur.

Princeton's new Moto-X track has been written up in MotorWorld magazine. Lane Carter showed the article to PXA members, saying last weekend's event received advance publicity. Moto-X received starting gates from Chilliwack, on loan.

Motorsports members passed

around some brochures and a magazine from ATV-BC. The magazine contained a nice article about their visit to Princeton in June and their barbeque at the PXA grounds.

The 16-year old barrel racer - riding a horse named Dandy - finished her first event on Friday, July 9th in second place with a time of 17.69 seconds.

Her second day of barrels, Saturday, July 10th, saw Willis finish again in second with a time of 17.57 seconds.

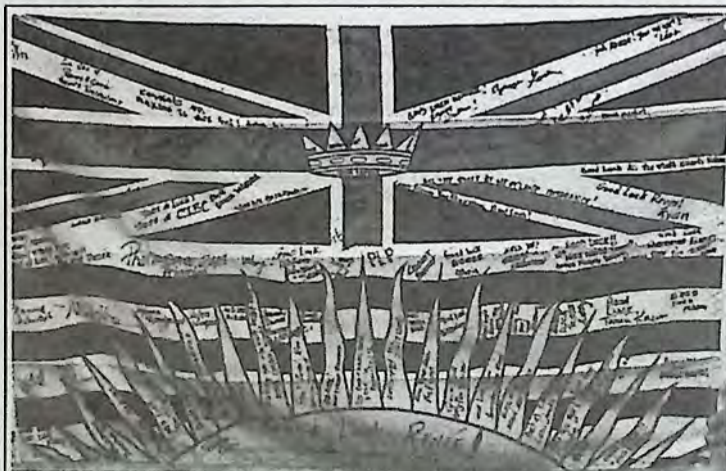
The two second place finishes put her in contention for the \$50,000 showdown, which paid out \$25,000 for second place.

By the end of the week, Willis ended up one of five Canadians in the Top Ten.

The ten ladies ran the barrels on Sunday afternoon with the fastest four moving on to the \$50,000 showdown later in the day.

Willis had a flawless run, but her time of 17.92 seconds was shy by only hundredths of a second.

She went up against World Champions much older than herself, and did extremely well!

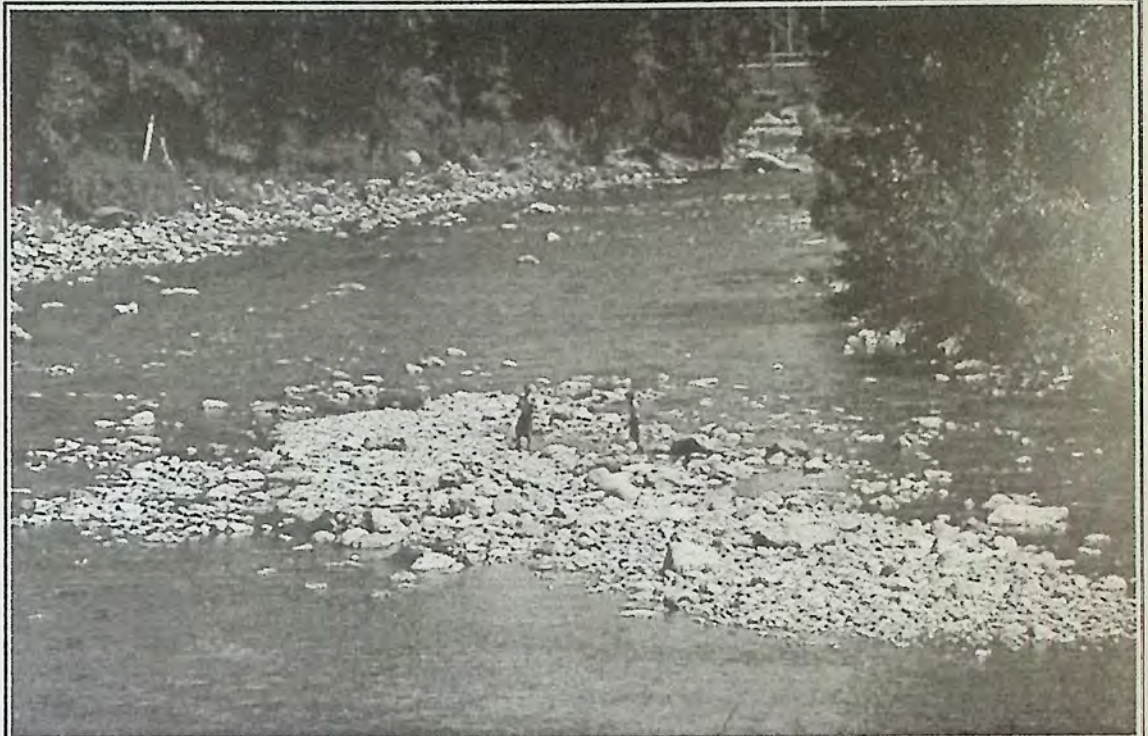

## Yale-Lillooet Parks expand

After years of criticizing the New Democrats for expanding the protected areas of the province, the Liberal government has expanded four new parks in Yale-Lillooet. The Parks Act and Protected Areas of British Columbia Act created 37 new Class A parks and expanded 34 located in nearly every region in B.C. The four provincial parks in Yale-Lillooet, new and expanded are: Coquihalla Canyon Park, Edge Hills Park, Pennask Creek Park and Trepanier Park. Together, these add 16,082 hectares in Yale-Lillooet.

Yale-Lillooet MLA Dave Chutter commented, "Preserving these areas of our province is important and I'm glad to see we're taking steps to ensure they're protected. They provide a home for our local

wildlife and a place for people to take in the scenery."

B.C. has the largest provincial park system in Canada, comprising 12.5 percent of the province and covering nearly 11.9 million hectares. The wilderness parks

attract visitors from all over the world.

The creation and expansion of the parks came as a result of land acquisitions and the success of three Land Resource Management Plans, Chutter said.

## RCMP nab one more

On Tuesday, July 13, Princeton RCMP arrested and charged another driver for being impaired by alcohol.

At approximately 10:30 p.m., RCMP followed a truck dragging the exhaust system in a shower of sparks. The driver stopped and exhibited extreme signs of having consumed alcohol. He was brought to the RCMP Princeton Detachment

office where he provided samples of his breath that were well over twice the legal limit.

The 58 year old Winfield man faces charges of impaired driving, driving over .08 blood alcohol level and assault of a police officer. He was issued a 24 hour driving prohibition and will be prohibited from driving for an additional 90 days.

## RCMP check story

On July 9, Princeton RCMP arrested a 41 year old male from Westbank for impaired driving. During the investigation, this individual alleged that earlier in the evening he had been at a residence and forcibly confined. When investigators attempted to obtain further information, the man was uncooperative and

would provide no further details.

On July 11, Princeton RCMP executed a search warrant on a residence on Highway 3 in Princeton. A local resident was taken into custody for questioning but released with no charges. At this time, no evidence was found to support the allegations.

## Keremeos red bridge gets a face lift

Traffic does not currently go over the historic red bridge near Keremeos.

The bridge is closed to all traffic to allow for a project which will include a complete redecking, the removal of existing cladding, replacement of the cladding and repainting of the finished project.

Anna Bartlett, Red Bridge Committee Chair, says the project is huge.

"We have been working with Ministry of Highways and they're footing the cost. All the committee has to do is paint the siding."

Bartlett estimates it will take 150 gallons of 'tile red' paint and lots of hours.

"We're painting with volunteers starting Monday morning."

The main reason for the cladding to be replaced is that it is currently dangerous.

The Red Bridge Committee was originally formed to dedicate efforts in having the historic bridge designated a heritage site.

## Housing starts could be record

## Cawston farmer supports T. L. Timber

In a letter to RDOS, Cawston farmer Bruce Harker writes:

Let's end this dispute now and direct our energy in supporting T. L. Timber and all their employees. Can we not be more supportive of local family business ventures that are providing economic growth for our community? Our entire family including my parents who have lived on our property for over 50 years and all our employees are in full support of T. L. Timber and their employees.

Our farm property, fruit and vegetable marketing business, is directly across and down wind from the T. L. Timber mill. Whenever a dust problem has happened the management and employees of the mill have been quick to respond and control the dust to the best of their ability. We personally have never had a problem with the mill's operation.

Over the past few years we have seen T. L. Timber invest in a water truck and a cyclone bin to reduce the amount of fine dust. They have improved their water system to prevent and reduce the chance of fire; and now are planning on fencing the property to reduce the dust and noise. We feel that they are doing their best to be good neighbours.

"Be patient as it'll look good when it's done."

The committee is still in the process of seeking heritage status for the bridge and there are other projects planned which will incorporate the structure in some way.

"It would be nice to take a little bit of pride in our heritage sites and not see any vandalism," Bartlett points out.

A detour is in place on Boundary Road at Highway 3.

## T. L. Timber stays

The future of Cawston's T. L. Timber was decided at a meeting last Thursday.

An agreement was hammered out following an hour and a half of negotiations with the Regional District.

Restrictions placed on the mill, which employs 21 people, dictate the hours of operation be set to a five-day-a-week schedule with Saturdays used only as an emergency.

T. L. Timber manufactures lumber for log homes and participates in firefighting in the region.

## Sheep farmers talk shop at local ranch

Bev Greenwell and Charlie Weber moved to Princeton in 2003 from the Fraser Valley.

Greenwell, who represents western purebred sheep breeders in the B. C. Sheep Federation, says their ranch - Happy Hollow Farms - contains, "one of the top suffolk flocks in B. C."

They were given a chance to show off their sheep, and their 320 acre hay operation, to a delegation of visiting farmers from the Southern Hemisphere last Monday night.

According to Kristie MacMillan of Farm To Farm New Zealand Tours, the group had an interesting itinerary.

"Sort of sightseeing mixed with farming," she explained.

The 27 New Zealanders, along with three Australians and two Americans, were on their way across Canada with stops in Kelowna, Banff and Calgary.

A delegation from the bus tour will be at the World Sheep and Wool Congress in Quebec City, scheduled for this week.

Snow Hellyer, Marketing and Sales Manager for Kelso Ltd., a sheep breeding business based in Marton, New Zealand, says the purpose of the Congress is varied.

"We swap and talk about ideas each country has in the sheep industry."

New technology, DNA recording and disease control are top concerns.

"In New Zealand we supply about 30 percent of lamb meat to the world market."

Hellyer says advances made in DNA research has proven to be valuable for farmers in isolating disease resistant genes.

It has also helped in identifying genes that possess other desired qualities related to health and quality of meat.

"Hopefully we'll one day end up with a super sheep."

Science is a key element for present sheep farmers, or as Hellyer puts it, "We call ourselves farmers working with scientists."

The New Zealanders - or kiwis as they jokingly refer to themselves - found farming quite different in Canada.

Ken McKenzie, one of the farmers on the Farm To Farm tour, found it interesting that farmers here have to deal with bears and cougars.

"Predators are not an issue for us."

However, one Australian farmer says it's very different where he's from as predators threatening his ranch include foxes and dingoes.

Ranch sizes were also an interesting difference.

"I have 18,000 sheep on my place and 1,200 cattle," says Bill Nichol, also from New Zealand.

The farms they have toured in Canada were what the kiwis called hobby farms.

Regulations and guidelines related to land use and forestry concerns are unheard of in New Zealand.

"We are regulated only by pro-

duction," says McKenzie.

"Basically we can run any stock we want on any field we want."

The kiwis also state their ranching operations seemed far more advanced than what they've seen touring in Canada.

But a lot of Canadian farming issues are the same Down Under and they include health concerns, disease prevention and exports.

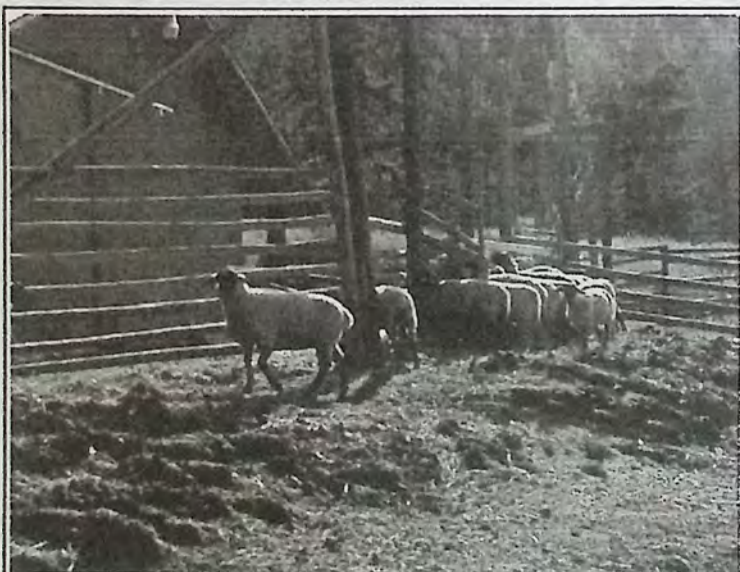
While market prices are described as reasonable, McKenzie states the amount of paperwork added on to the farmers' responsibility in recent years has been increasing.

"We've got to have traceability," he says, "and only one person pays and its the producer."

The bus load of visitors followed their tour of Happy Hollow Farms with a dinner hosted by Greenwell and Weber and prepared by Eileen Walsh.

Doug's Homestead, St. Laszlo's Estate Winery, Parson's Fruit Stand and Schoolside Suffolks of Keremeos all provided something to the meal.

Following a little social time and dessert, the bus loaded up and headed for Kelowna.

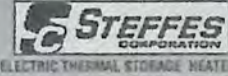

## Be careful with campfires!

A dry lightning storm passed over the Thompson Plateau on July 15, sparking 20 lightning fires in the Kamloops District. Air tankers, helicopters, crews and heavy equipment worked to contain these fires.

The Spuis Creek fire southwest of Merritt grew to 10 hectares. This fire is burning at the top of a mountain in a remote area and no homes or structures are threatened. Twenty-five fire fighters and two pieces of heavy equipment worked to establish control

lines on this fire. Three groups of air tankers provided support throughout the afternoon. The fire is burning in open timber. Visibility was poor due to thick smoke that drifted over the Nicola Valley into Merritt.

Hot dry weather was expected for the weekend and several days. The fire risk was moderate but could climb quickly to extreme. Use caution with campfires, and if you spot a wildfire, contact 1-800-663-5555 or \*5555 on most cellular phones.

## Avoid stress in heat

This is one of the times of year when people tend to overdo a lot of things. When the days are bright and sunny, people have a tendency to overdo enjoying the sunshine hours, but this can be dangerous in many ways. We can eat too much, drink too much, stay up too late and stay in the sun too long. We can become over-heated and over-stressed. We can be so keen on getting things done, we over-work in the heat.

In countries where the weather is hot and sunny most of the year, people adapt to the heat and learn to live with it by having a sensible schedule. They work hard in the morning, have a siesta in the afternoon, then go back to work in the evening. This is not likely to happen in Canada, even if you live in the South Okanagan or Similkameen. Our schedules remain the same. Still, we can adapt what we do to the temperatures in which we have to work.

Very hot days combined with heavy work can result in more than heat exhaustion. Over-stressing the body could result in a heart attack in the heat, with a high potential for death. The heart is over-stressed in the heat because the internal body temperature soars. There is very little leeway for body temperature - an increase of 2.5 degrees in internal organs will probably bring on a fatal heart attack. Even young athletes can die of this.

While heart attacks are the extreme, the majority of us will push ourselves too much in the heat, especially if we are having a lot of fun or working hard. We place ourselves in stress, and stress does damage.

If you want to live a long, healthy life, you need to use good common sense about your activity on hot days.

## The Bridge leaves Skills Centre

Princeton's Centre for Lifelong Learning, better known as The Bridge, has been moved to the former Riverside Intermediate School. Riverside's potential students have been divided between John Allison and Vermilion Forks Elementary Schools. The Bridge, begun as a storefront school for adults, will

share the new location with students in alternate education programs.

The move has left Princeton & District Community Skills Centre short the \$25,000 a year rent paid by the school district (although the district does own the building anyway).

Skills Centre Society Chair Jim

Manion commented to the News Leader, "I don't know why they would move it (The Bridge) from downtown when it's been so successful in that location."

Manion was quite open in assessing the impact of the move on the Skills Centre. Although the Skills Centre does have some reserve money from the Community Forest, it is being cut back \$60,000 by the federal government as well as losing the rent from The Bridge. As a result, employees of the Skills Centre have been notified of lay-offs in order to save money to keep operating. The Skills Centre helps people find jobs through teaching resume writing, handling job applications and interviews, putting them in contact with potential employers and helping them with Employment Insurance. As well, the Skills Centre has offered a number of programs to assist people in developing technical skills.

The community has benefited from the Skills Centre's function as a public access to Internet.

Manion says the cutback in employee hours is being done in a manner that will safeguard the services offered. "Our staff has been very resourceful," Manion says. They have operated at a deficit in the past, and will now operate at an even bigger deficit while looking for more sources of funding and more ways to provide education and training for Princeton residents. They intend to budget to keep the Skills Centre open for the next four years.

"We're one of the very few Community Skills Centres still in operation out of the 25 that were established," Manion says. "We will look at every avenue we can find to keep it open."

Environmental Forest Policies, found that B.C.'s stringent, mandatory approach to forest policy regulation development was near the top of all the jurisdictions studied. Forest policy areas included in the study were riparian zone management, clearcutting regulations, road building and reforestation requirements.

"This study confirms that Canada's forest products industry meets those expectations - it is among the most advanced nations in the world and its performance is improving every year."

Customer approval counts for a great deal in today's consumer market where the buyers want to be sure forests are not being decimated to make lumber. Due to the activities of environmentalist lobbying during the past 10 years, British Columbia's forest industry has suffered the effects of buyers believing B.C. was killing off all of its forest land in an effort to bring in export dollars. The new study may help reverse some of the market damage done in the past.

## B.C.'s forest laws are among toughest

An independent study comparing international forest policy regulations shows British Columbia has some of the most stringent forest sustainability requirements in the world.

Forests Minister Michael de Jong said, "The detailed data in this ground-breaking study reinforces that B.C. has some of the toughest forest regulations on earth. This kind of academic analysis is important and shows the world B.C. cares about its forests and is taking the necessary steps to manage them responsibly and sustainably."

The BC Market Outreach Network and the Forest Products Association of Canada commissioned Yale University professor Benjamin Cashore to conduct the independent study. Cashore is an associate professor of sustainable forest policy and chair of the Program on Forest Certification at the Yale School of Forestry and Environmental Studies in New Haven, Connecticut.

For the study, Cashore, in collaboration with postdoctoral research associate Constance McDermott, chose key environmental forest practices criteria in 38 jurisdictions around the world, using Canada and four Canadian provinces, including B.C., as the constant case comparison. The resulting report, Global

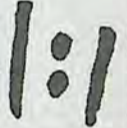

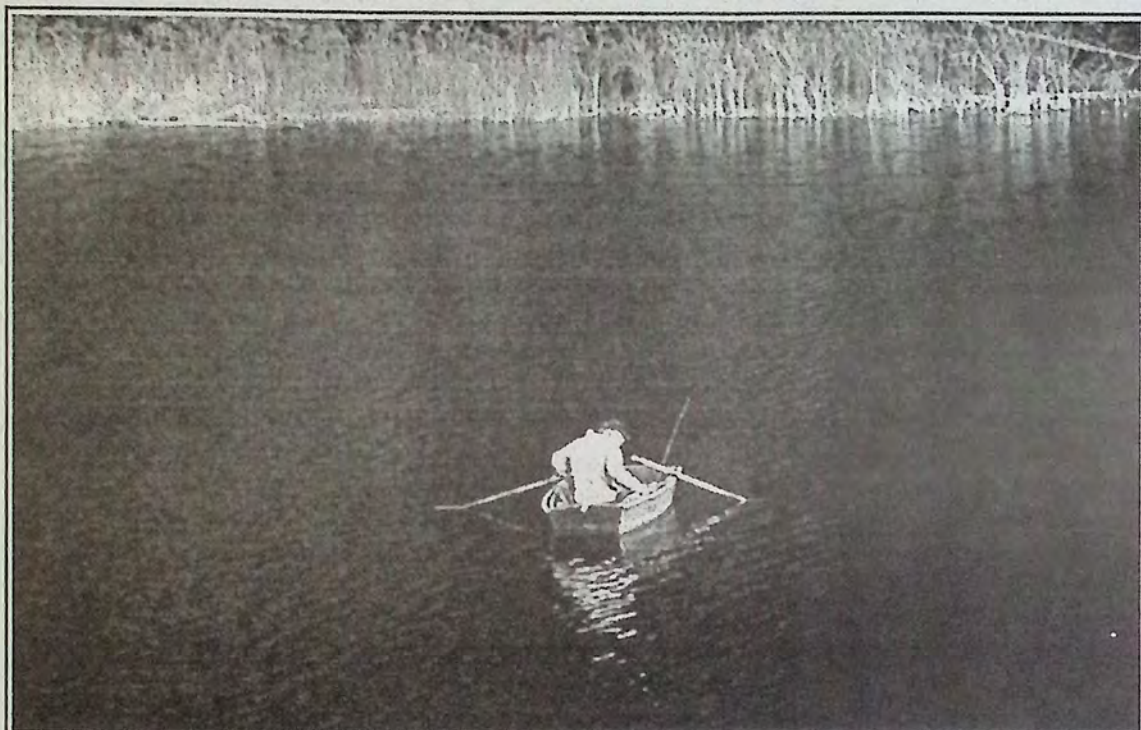

## Eagle ultra marathons this weekend

In the 50 miler there will be 24 men and 6 women competing. I doubt the first place runner will break 10 hours, unusual as 50 mile trail races some runners can do in 8 to 9 hours.

In fact, a lot of the competitors coming to the Keremeos Eagle Runs regularly do. There is a 16 hour cut-off for the 50 miler, the longest allowed time limit in any North American 50-mile run.

This is a reflection of how tough this course will be!

It has some of the longest sustained climbs anywhere. You stay at or near 8,000 to 8,500 feet for about 11 of 14 miles at one point. It can hail, rain, snow or be unbearably hot all in one day.

With over 10,000 feet of climb and nearly that in descent this is one super test of character!

Watch for top finishers like Rob Grant, Rob Smith from Victoria, Michael Wardas from North Vancouver to name a few.

Also, the Race Director's son, Logan Beaulieu from Edmonton will likely have a strong race.

Then there is always a dark horse that can surprise.

For the women, I would say Lorraine Lees from Kelowna and Donna Mazurewich from Penticton are top contenders.

Canadian Helicopters has donated a delivery of Culligan's water on the bare rock at approximately Mile 30 at 8,400 feet on Lakeview Mountain. This is a first for an Eagle run!

Race starts at 4:00 AM Saturday, July 24th at the Ashnola Pow Wow Campgrounds 5 miles from the Red Bridge, down the Ashnola towards Cathedral Park.

Carbo Dinner is at Victory Hall the night before in Keremeos. Tickets available at the door and everyone is welcome!

For the 100-miler, there are 16 men and 6 women entered. This will be an almost staggeringly impossible feat in the terrain.

No one in the field would ever admit that, however.

The first two finishers will win a 24-hour Eagle Buckle. The rest will fight it out for a 33-hour Buckle or just to finish in the time limit.

At the 50-mile turnaround, any runner not having left for the second loop before 16-hours (15:59:59) will be scratched.

This is a safety precaution and the Race Director's much thought out decision.

Anyone scratched will be noted as DNF - Did Not Finish. No three words in the English language are more offensive and

hurtful to these folks.

Each DNF becomes a nightmare of memories over riding 20 good races or finishes.

Even runners with only ONE DNF are likely to not forget it EVER and give you step-by-step descriptions and reasons why years later!

Look for Matt Sessions of Port Moody to do well and perhaps Jeff Heasley from Gunnison, Colorado.

Also Clarence Wiens from Chilliwack - with family in Keremeos - should do well.

Surprises could come from Christopher Larouche of Kamloops, Jeff Mike Sell of Kent, Washington; Peter Zubick of Port Moody and Tim Doyle of Edinburgh, Scotland (just emigrated to Penticton two weeks ago). Tim's 40th birthday is race day - how fun is that?

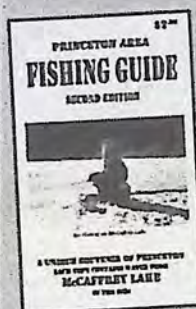

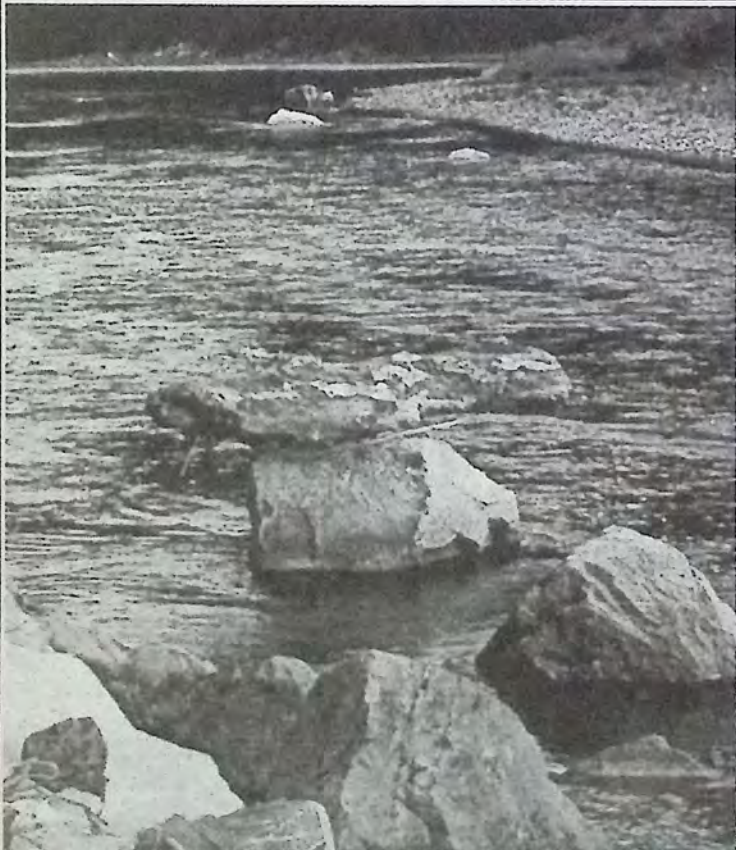

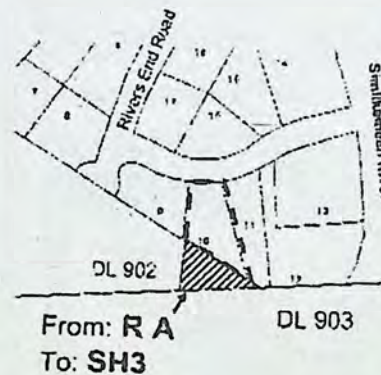

# Manning Park is a tragedy of idealism

People who fight forest fires have looked at Manning Park with dread each summer, wondering "Is this the year it explodes?"

According to one fire-fighter I spoke with, 60 percent of the trees in Manning Park are dead, and the "duff", or accumulation of forest debris on the ground, is half a metre deep. Manning Park is notorious for being the site of lightning strikes during summer storms. As many as a thousand lightning strikes can occur during one storm. With so many dry trees and deep duff, the fire fighters say, with the right strike, Manning Park will simply explode. They will let it burn because it will be too dangerous to try to fight the fire. They may protect the highway and lodge facilities, but those are the only clearings in the vast deep forest.

When Manning Park burns, there is the potential for other fires to start. If the wind blows from the southwest, we will be showered with sparks right down the Similkameen Valley. This is scary.

I remember when a fire consumed an area downhill from Allison Pass. For decades, this area was called "the burn". I was a little girl when this happened, but I have never forgotten the sky filled with smoke, and the sun showing a red glow overhead as the light filtered through the smoke. This went on for days.

Fire fighters tried to make a dent in it, and some were badly burned. Crews of women made coffee, sandwiches, jugs of cold drinks, and all sorts of other foods, to send out to the crews. Crews of men attempted to keep the fire fighters fed and supplied

with enough water to prevent heat exhaustion.

Manning Park has been used as a resource for studying the "natural" forest, but this natural forest is the result of a major fire more than 100 years ago. In some ways, it is not a natural forest, because nearly all of the trees are the same age, due to the previous forest having burnt. I remember the old folks of my youth talking about that fire so long ago. It began between Merritt and Aspen Grove as a grass fire ignited by sparks from somebody's campfire. The wind blew the fire southward, and it burned all through the month of August and into September. The fire went here, there and everywhere. Some places were missed, but when the fire reached the big timber, nearly every tree was consumed.

Some people may consider this just a legend, but I recall sharing the old folks stories with the late Laurie Guichon, and he remembered pretty much the same story I had heard.

So these trees at Manning Park are pretty well all the same age. When they burn, they will clear the way for a whole new forest in which all the trees will be the same age, and the cycle of beetle infestation will occur in another century. Naturalists and environmentalists will say that is just "Mother Nature".

I learned a lesson from the burn

that occurred when I was a child. The forest in the high country does not come back as quickly as lower elevation forests. The growing season is too short for rapid regeneration. We could wait 30 or 40 years before we see the forest really begin to grow again.

The idealism of environmentalists is such that they love to let Mother Nature take over, but we saw the devastation of a park burning in the Okanagan last year. When a park burns, we lose more than trees. We lose the very reason we set aside parks. We lose our hiking and biking trails, our fishing and boating spots, the birds and animals who made their homes in the park, and we lose the splendid sights, sounds and smells we enjoyed in the park. These are the reasons we paid taxes for years to maintain the parks.

Yellowstone was a lesson in just letting Mother Nature take over. When Yellowstone burned, nobody fought the fire except where buildings needed to be saved. At the end of a documentary on the Yellowstone fire, the Secretary of the Interior stated, "This will never happen again. We will never just let it burn."

This time, we will have to let Manning Park burn, but when the fire is finally out, we can tell our politicians there has to be a better way to make a park and keep it beautiful, healthy, and safe for every living thing within it.

## Heart Food

God's grace produces covenant. This covenant is unbreakable and incorruptible. It will, in fact, last for eternity. 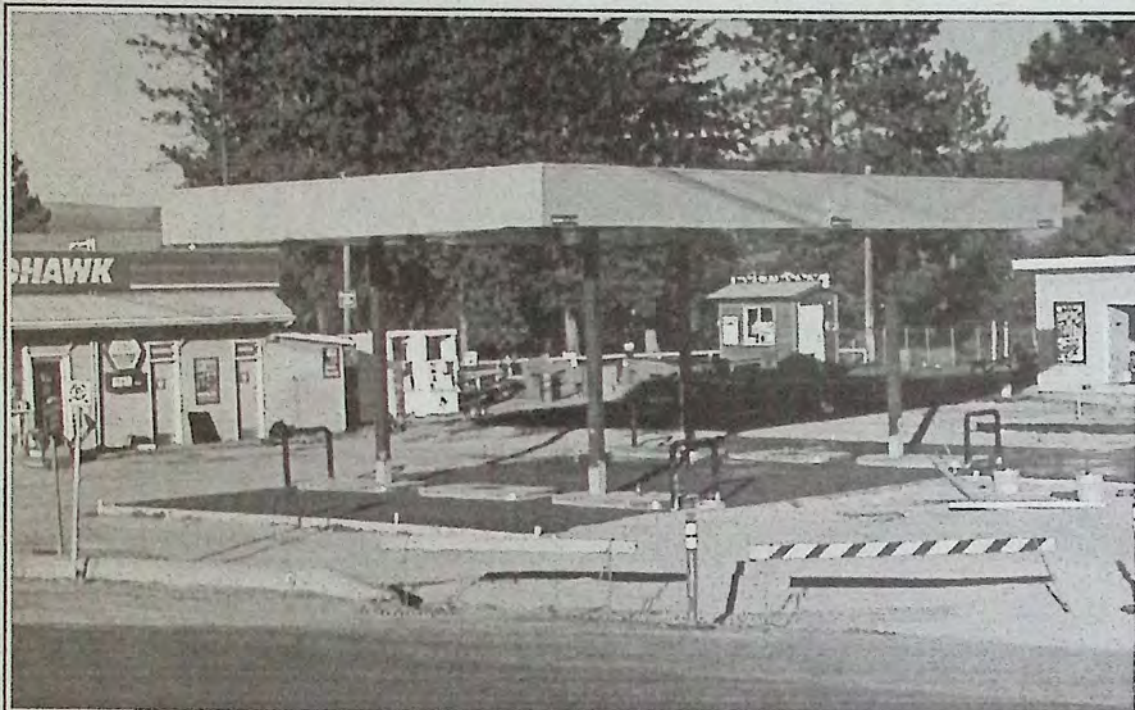

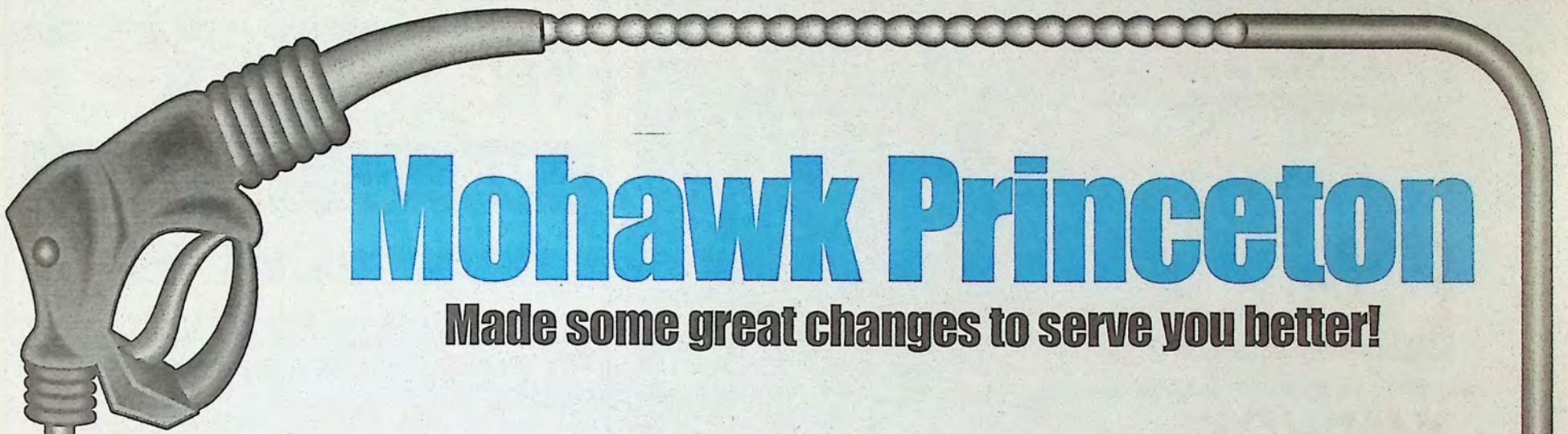
